11	Regulatory Law Judge and will preside over
12	this hearing.

16	This is an official hearing of the Missouri

3	As was stated as has been stated
4	in the past in previous rate cases, it's,
5	folks are experiencing a lot of hardship now
6	both now financially and health wise as we
7	experience the impacts of climate change and
8	airborne pollution and water pollution caused
9	by continued reliance of fossil fuels.
10	In my community in the City of
11	Kansas City the city has worked over the last
12	couple of years to undertake an update to its
13	climate protection plan, a climate protection
14	and resiliency plan to ensure that we are
15	being thoughtful in our considerations for
16	policymaking and development as it relates
17	particularly to energy production, how we set
18	up transportation, how we build commercial and
19	residential buildings, how we're taking how
20	we can go about ensuring that we're putting
21	the health and well-being of residents, Evergy
22	customers, above all else, particularly given
23	the varying consequences of the climate
24	crises.
25	We talk about, you know, acting now
	9

1	to prevent a harder future, but we're seeing
2	these impacts now. I have colleagues in
3	St. Louis who are sick today because they were
4	moving out of an office that's flooded due to
5	the terrible flooding that we've seen in
6	St. Louis. I have friends and neighbors here
7	in Kansas City who have been, you know working
8	you know there was an election in Missouri
9	recently but who are still kind of feeling
10	a little out of it and sick, some more sick,
11	as a result of exposure to very intense heat
12	that we've seen.
13	So these are we talk about I
14	remember in high school and even college and
15	before that talking about, you know, we need
16	to act to prevent future harms. We're seeing
17	these harms happen now in our state, in our
18	cities. And they're hitting the most
19	volnerable in our communities first, and
20	they're hitting them the hardest.
21	And Evergy, while being an
22	investor-owned utility, it's a public utility.
23	It's accountable to the people of Missouri.
24	And we need to ensure that the peoples' needs,
25	our communities' needs, our goals, including
	10

1 transitioning away from fossil fuels, are put 2 first. 3 And So when considering any rate 4 increases I would ask and implore that the PSC 5 to ensure that Evergy is using customers' 6 dollars to invest in things like greater 7 energy efficiency, renewable energy that's 8 shown to be affordable, cleaner, better for 9 customers and for the planet so that we're ensuring that we're leaving this place --10 11 we're ensuring that folks can thrive now, but 12 also ensuring that we can allow our children and children's children to thrive. 13 14 I just hope you will all take that 15 into consideration. 16	like utilities, everything's up for them as
17	well. So I understand obviously costs have
18	gone up, and I don't see any end in sight to
19	it right now, the costs that we're going to
20	incur incur. But, you know, it's a, it's
21	putting a burden on everyone.
22	More specifically and someone
23	asked me earlier to say what I had said before
24	on the informal part of this is that Evergy
25	did a good job putting these power poles and

2	Meta, and if they were paying for a good
3	portion of this, and they said they were going
4	to be paying it in their rates. But the
5	contractor I think I'm talking about
6	contractor workforce I'm retired, and, you
7	know, I probably didn't have anything better
8	to do but watch these guys work, and they work
9	hard, they work in all kinds of conditions,
10	but what I saw, you know, a quarter or a half
11	of them didn't work while the other half did.
12	And that was kind of disconcerting to me.
13	You know, being on your phone and
14	doing whatever, or walking, you know, as slow
15	as molasses as you could be to carry a board
16	from one place to the next you know, it's
17	just I understand unions and contracts, and
18	you can't always say there's only going to be
19	this many people on a project, or whatever,

4	ethic I'll say it that way there has to
5	be a huge cost overrun in wages and benefits
6	for contractors, or however it's paid, by
7	Evergy. And so I feel a little bit sorry for
8	Evergy I guess because they've got to go
9	through that, but just from my standpoint,
10	just an average guy living in Kansas City,
11	seeing what you've got to pay day-to-day, and
12	then another 130 bucks a year for electricity
13	alone, and then to see some of the stuff that
14	goes on, it's just kind of mind boggling.
15	Obviously I probably don't have all
16	the information I'm sure I don't but
17	that's just one person's perspective. And I
18	appreciate it, Judge, for you being here, and
19	the Commissioners, and taking the time to
20	listen to me. That's it.
21	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, Mr.
22	Feldman. I appreciate the comments, and we
23	certainly appreciate you taking the time out
24	of your evening as well. One more call. Is
25	there anyone else on our WebEx who would like

4	progress, and I think they do a great job with
5	their consumer relations and try to encourage
6	adoption of energy efficient appliances, but
7	it seems as though as innovative and amazing
8	of a state that we live in, we could do better
9	than that on our score.
10	As far as for our rate increase,
11	obviously it's something that all families
12	kind of have to share that burden, but if we
13	do have to make that rate increase, I would
14	just encourage Evergy to put it towards more
15	long-term kind of future-innovative,
16	future-ready services, and less towards the
17	outdated coal-fired power plants that have
18	powered them, you know, likely been there to
19	power us in the past, but to accelerate that
20	transition away. Thank you for your time.
21	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, Mr.
22	Stephens. Thank you for your comments. Are
23	there any Commissioner questions for Mr.
24	Stevens? Okay. Are there any other
25	witnesses, anyone who would like to testify
