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1	PRODEEDINGS
2	MR. WOODRUFF: Good afternoon, everyone. We're
3	going to get started. My name is Morris Woodruff, and
4	I'm the Chief Regulatory Law Judge for the Public
5	Service Commission, and I'll be the presiding officer
6	here this afternoon. And to start off the afternoon,
7	we're going to have a question and answer session. This
8	is your opportunity to ask questions of our commission
9	staff, the Office of the Public Counsel, as well as
10	Ameren's representatives. This is going to be your only
11	opportunity to ask questions. When I come back in a few
12	moments, or however long it takes the question and
13	answer session then we'll be getting into the formal
14	part of the proceedings, and we'll bring people up to
15	give us testimony. I'll swear you in, and everything
16	you say is going to be taken down by the court reporter.
17	And the important thing to remember is the question and
18	answer session will not be recorded. So if you have
19	something you want to tell the commission, wait until I
20	come back and we'll get you on the formal record and
21	make a record of all this.
22	At this point then, I'll turn it over the Debbie
23	Qick, who is our representative for the commission, and
24	she'll start with the question and answer session.
25	(WHEREUPON, AN INFORMAL QUESTION AND ANSWER

1 SESSION WAS HELD) MR. WOODRUFF: Good afternoon once again. 2 3 Welcome to the formal part of the public hearing. that you have had a chance to ask some questions and 4 5 hopefully get some answers, we'll begin with the more 6 formal part of this. I have a sign-up sheet here that 7 was out in the hallway before. And I'll go down the 8 list and call the names of the individuals who have signed up. After I've got through the list, if there's 9 anyone else I didn't call who would like to testify and 10 didn't sign up, we'll give you a chance to testify also. 11 When I call your name, just come on up to the 12 podium. You can make your statement, I'll swear you in 13 14 to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth. As I indicated before, we'll have the court 15 reporter here who will be taking down everything you 16 17 say. 18 I have two of the five commissioners here with To my right is Commissioner Stephen Stoll, and to 19 my left is Commissioner Maida Coleman. And once you've 20 testified, I'll ask the commissioners if they have any 2.1 22 questions for you. The attorneys for the parties are 23 here as well, and they may have some questions for you 24 also. So remain at the podium until we let you know. You might also notice the timer up here. Just to 25

- 1 keep things moving, we like to try to limit people to
- 2 about five minutes. So once you're sworn in and start
- 3 testifying, I'll push the button and it will count down,
- 4 and we do that just to kind of keep things moving, so
- 5 one person doesn't dominate the entire hearing.
- 6 All right. Before we actually bring up -- we
- 7 have a question back there.
- 8 MR. CRANMER: Yes. So this is not a question
- 9 time, this is a statement time.
- 10 MR. WOODRUFF: That's correct. We can't answer
- 11 your questions because these are the decision-makers for
- 12 the hearing. All right. Before I call the first
- 13 witness, I need to find out which attorneys are here for
- 14 the parties. So I'll ask, is there an attorney here for
- 15 Ameren?
- 16 MR. MITTEN: Russ Mitten. Brydon, Swearengen &
- 17 England. 312 East Capital Avenue, Jefferson City.
- 18 Appearing on behalf of the Union Electric Company, doing
- 19 business as Ameren Missouri.
- 20 MR. WOODRUFF: Thank you. Attorney for the Staff
- 21 of Public Service.
- 22 MS. ASLIN: Casi Aslin. Counsel for the Staff of
- 23 Public Service Commission. 200 Madison Street, P.O.
- 24 Box 360, Jefferson City, 65204.
- MR. WOODRUFF: And public counsel.

MR. OPITZ: Thank you, Judge. From the Office of 1 Public Counsel, my name is Tim Opitz. My address is 2 P.O. Box 2230, Jefferson City, Missouri, 65102. 3 MR. WOODRUFF: Thank you very much. Any other 4 attorneys here for any other parties? All right. I 5 don't see anybody else. So we'll go to the first 6 7 witness on the list here. Howard Scott Howes. Good 8 afternoon, Mr. Howes. MR. HOWES: Good afternoon. MR. WOODRUFF: Please raise your right hand. 10 11 I'll swear you in. 12 (Witness sworn) MR. WOODRUFF: Thank you. What would you like to 13 14 tell us? MR. HOWES: My name is Scott Howes. And I'm more 15 than happy to provide this written so she can make sure 16 17 that it's correct. To Ameren Missouri Public Service Commission, the Public Counsel, and Commissioners: I 18 come to you today on the 17th in Cape Girardeau, 19 Missouri. Senator Doug Libla of Poplar Bluff announced 20 that there was going to be a public hearing, and I 21 22 decided to come. Ameren is a monopoly utility, and 23 there is evidence that they are earning more than the citizens have allowed them to earn. I think that Ameren 24

is out of touch with the citizens of this area, and you

- have to stand up and take this rate increase off the
 table. Or if you think the citizens will walk away from
- 3 it, I will not. To this PSC, you are on notice as of
- 4 now, you either do you job and lower the rate of Ameren,
- 5 or I will ask Senator Doug Libla to bring a bill to
- 6 recall the PSC, and to have the governor to bring in new
- 7 citizens to work with the citizens of Missouri to lower
- 8 the rates of Ameren. Your service, Ameren, is a
- 9 monopoly, and you are making over the guaranteed income.
- 10 That needs to go down and be corrected immediately.
- 11 The PSC takes free lunches, Lake of the Ozark
- 12 weekends with Ameren, and does make it hard to take the
- 13 free gifts and be independent. This is very difficult,
- 14 but this needs to stop. It is hard for you to do your
- job and be independent. That's why I'm also asking that
- 16 we bring Drew Juden, the new Public Service and Safety
- 17 Director, to look at the free meals and to the getaways
- 18 that everyone is going to, and tell him about the safety
- 19 is in the balance of your votes.
- 20 Why am I standing up for this? Well, in
- 21 November, the republicans won. The laws are coming in
- 22 and being voted in in Jefferson City, and by the middle
- 23 of February, we're going to have Right to Work, so all
- 24 wages will be lowered. So if this happens, the citizens
- 25 will have less income to spend and pay bills. I'm

- 1 calling on you not to increase in Missouri. Missouri
- 2 has to cut the budget. As of yesterday, Governor
- 3 Greitens has cut another 146 million from the budget.
- 4 That includes tens of millions of dollars from public
- 5 colleges and universities. Thank you very much for your
- 6 time.
- 7 MR. WOODRUFF: Thank you, sir. Anybody have any
- 8 questions?
- 9 MR. HOWES: I'm sorry.
- 10 MR. STOLL: That's okay. I would ask you to
- 11 maybe talk to the Office of Public Counsel about one of
- 12 your earlier statements regarding this case. Right now,
- 13 it skips my mind what it was.
- 14 MR. HOWES: Okay. I didn't mean to speak fast
- 15 for you.
- 16 MR. STOLL: No. You did okay. I was thinking
- 17 about some of your latter comments about the free
- 18 lunches.
- MR. HOWES: Yes.
- 20 MR. STOLL: You must have mistaken us for someone
- 21 else. We don't even take so much as a bottle of water.
- 22 These were brought by the commission. So you might want
- 23 to talk to our staff about the realities of what we can
- 24 and cannot do.
- 25 MR. HOWES: Well, I think that it's more than

- public record. It's in the St. Louis Post-Dispatch that people have taken free weekends down to Lake of the
- 3 Ozarks -- and don't nod your head.
- 4 MR. STOLL: No. That's incorrect. Go ahead and
- 5 talk to staff.
- 6 MR. HOWES: I beg to differ with you.
- 7 MR. WOODRUFF: I will add, there is a statute
- 8 that's been in the books since 1913, that no public
- 9 service commission or anyone from their staff can take
- 10 anything from a public utility. That's already in the
- 11 statute. I'm not here to argue with you about it, I
- 12 just wanted to point that out. Commission Coleman, did
- 13 you have anything else?
- MS. COLEMAN: No. Thank you, sir.
- MR. STOLL: Thank you, sir, for your comments.
- 16 MR. WOODRUFF: I believe the next name on the
- 17 list is Ray Gunter? Am I close? Good afternoon.
- 18 MR. GUNTER: Roy Gunter.
- MR. WOODRUFF: Gunter. G-U-N-T-E-R?
- MR. GUNTER: Yes, sir.
- 21 MR. WOODRUFF: Okay. Please raise your right
- 22 hand.
- 23 (Witness sworn)
- MR. WOODRUFF: Thank you.
- 25 MR. GUNTER: My main complaint with this

particular rate increase has nothing to do with Ameren's 1 expenditures on anything. And I'm sure they do their 2 3 very best to try to keep costs down. My main objection is with the idea that Noranda Aluminum went to Ameren 4 somehow just out of the blue. I suspect this was a bid 5 6 process from Ameren UE against AECI to provide power for 7 the Noranda Aluminum plant. And Noranda -- I understand 8 why they wanted lower rates. But I suspect that that wasn't something that was forced on Ameren UE. If I go out and purchase a car, and it turns out 10 11 to be a bad deal, I'm stuck with having made that bad decision. I believe the cost of Noranda Aluminum not 12 buying the electricity from UE should be borne by the 13 14 stockholders of the company, because they made a bad decision. The ratepayers did not make that decision, 15 nor did we have anything to do with it. That's my only 16 concern with this rate increase. 17 18 I do understand and have seen a lot of the things that Ameren has said. They put in special poles, you 19 know, to keep the price down, laminated poles. I pay 20 attention to all that stuff. And they do a good job 2.1 22 providing power in general. There's always some small 23 stuff. But this rate increase and the Noranda Aluminum deal bothers me a lot. Like I said, I feel like if you 24 make a bad business decision, asking the ratepayers to 25

cover your business decision that you made is unfair. 1 2 Thank you. 3 MR. WOODRUFF: Thank you, sir. Any questions. Thank you for your testimony. MR. STOLL: No. 4 MS. COLEMAN: Thank you Mr. Gunter. 5 6 MR. WOODRUFF: We've got Dan and Carol Phelps 7 signed up together. 8 MS. PHELPS: Hi. I'm Carolyn Phelps. 9 MR. WOODRUFF: Let me swear you in. (Witness sworn) 10 11 MS. PHELPS: Anyway, what I don't quite 12 understand is you're going to raise these rates for 10 Why 10 years? Is that a statute of limitations 13 14 for these rate increases? Why not do it for 20, 30 years? One thing, too, is going to be a lot different, 15 we just had a president that seemed bent hell on not 16 creating jobs, a job killer, killing the regulations in 17 the United States. I mean, no growth. But we have a 18 new sheriff in town, and he's going to bring back jobs. 19 Does Ameren think that this president is not going to 20 bring jobs, not only to Missouri, but other states? 21 22 Where you're going to be able to increase your revenues. 23 So then we're stuck paying more for something when they're growth is growing. Basically that's my comment. 24 But America is going to get better. And you guys have 25

- 1 to stop being negative. These little small businessmen
- 2 are going to explode, and the jobs are coming back.
- 3 MR. WOODRUFF: Any questions?
- 4 MR. STOLL: You might want to talk -- what was
- 5 your comment about 10 years?
- 6 MS. PHELPS: Why set it at 10 years? Why not 20
- 7 or 30 years?
- 8 MR. STOLL: What is that? What is set at 10
- 9 years?
- 10 MS. PHELPS: Your rate increases for 10 years.
- 11 MR. STOLL: Yeah. I would --
- MS. PHELPS: You don't think -- you're not going
- 13 to make back the money before then?
- MR. STOLL: I would ask -- I would ask you to
- 15 talk to either the Office of Public Counsel --
- MS. PHELPS: It doesn't do any good to talk to
- 17 anybody.
- 18 MR. STOLL: It does, because the 10-year figure
- 19 is not quite correct.
- MS. PHELPS: But that's what they said. It's
- 21 going to raised for 10 years, is what she said.
- 22 MR. STOLL: I don't know about that. Who said
- 23 that?
- MS. PHELPS: Somebody said it was going to be
- 25 raised for 10 years.

MR. STOLL: Okay. Talk to our staff regarding 1 2 that. 3 MS. PHELPS: I don't know. I heard 10 years. 4 Thank you. MR. STOLL: Thank you for your testimony. 5 6 MR. WOODRUFF: Ma'am, Tim Opitz is here from the 7 Office of Public Counsel. You can talk to him if you 8 like. He represents the public on this. Dan Phelps, do you want to testify also? (Witness sworn) 10 11 MR. WOODRUFF: What would you like to tell us? MR. PHELPS: Well, I'm here to gripe about the 12 rate increase. Number one, they want this rate increase 13 14 in part to supplement their loss of revenue for the sale of power to Noranda. That's crazy on two different 15 fronts. Number one, why should I have to pay for 16 something like that? They simply have lost business 17 there. And number two -- forgot what I was going to say 18 about this now. But you know, just because they lost 19 their biggest customer, I've wondered before why Noranda 20 never did build their own power plant and just be 21 22 independent. Anyway, another thing that really sticks 23 in my craws is why we have to pay for the cost of them giving the efficiency incentive to customers, 24 25 businesses, residents, whatever. That's between them

and that customer. It's not me. And they keep saying 1 that the efficiency trickles down to me as well. Well, 2 3 that's really neat because they're always raising rates. And I heard a comment a while ago, about that Ameren 4 might not be in touch with customers, or in touch with 5 6 the market. They are precisely in touch. They come at 7 you guys regularly, all these rate requests, these 8 increase requests. And you don't always give them everything they want. It's a shell game. They say, oh, we want 2, we'll ask for 12. They'll give us 1.75. 10 11 So I don't like the idea having a rate increase to pay for other things that don't affect me. The loss 12 of business to Noranda, they didn't lose any business. 13 14 They're still generating all that power and they're selling it for, I imagine, more than what they would 15 have sold it to Noranda. And something else about that, 16 Noranda kept coming at Ameren, wanting a rate decrease, 17 18 and I'm sure you guys had something, some part to play in all that. 19 But they just, again, you were asking the 20 customers, all the ratepayers, to supplement that and 21 22 pay for it. And because they were selling the power to 23 Noranda at a lesser level, they have to make up for that, so now we're going to raise your rates. That's --24 it makes me wonder if both Ameren and you folks as well, 2.5

- 1 are not a part of the federal government. You don't
- 2 have to balance checkbooks. So anyway, that's about all
- 3 I wanted to gripe about.
- 4 MR. WOODRUFF: Thank you, sir. Any guestions?
- 5 MR. STOLL: No. Thank you for your testimony.
- 6 MR. WOODRUFF: And I assure you, we're not a part
- 7 of the federal government. We're very glad of that
- 8 sometimes. All right. Next name on the list is Mary
- 9 Barnes. Mary Barnes.
- 10 SPECTATOR: I agree with everything he said.
- MR. WOODRUFF: That was the last name on my list.
- 12 Is there anyone else who wishes to come up and testify?
- 13 Yes, sir. Come on up.
- 14 MR. WOODRUFF: Good afternoon. Could you tell us
- 15 your name.
- MR. CRANMER: Robert Cranmer.
- MR. WOODRUFF: Can you spell you last name,
- 18 please.
- MR. CRANMER: C-R-A-N-M-E-R.
- 20 MR. WOODRUFF: All right. Please raise your
- 21 right hand. We'll sear you in.
- 22 (Witness sworn)
- MR. WOODRUFF: Thank you. And what would you
- 24 like to tell us?
- MR. CRANMER: Well I've recently joined this

world of fixed income people. And this past year, the 1 government saw fit to give us a .3 percent raise in our 2 3 social security. My health insurance has gone up 12 percent. Now my electricity, which are my two top 4 bills, is going to go up 8 percent. So my concern is 5 6 really not a thing to do with Ameren, other than they're 7 asking for a 8 percent increase. Matter of fact, my 8 service has been pretty good from Ameren. So that's not my issue. So the issue boils down to, when is this all going to stop? Because the City of Jackson will be 10 11 proposing some bills that was increase taxes. Before 12 long, everybody keeps increasing, increasing, the government doesn't give me any increase in my social 13 14 security, I run out of money. And this population is becoming more and more on fixed income. So it becomes 15 16 even more critical that we think about those people. 17 And sometimes I get concerned that people on the 18 commission, don't really know what the people down here think, feel, okay. That are on fixed incomes and that 19 kind of thing. So my comment is just more around total 20 cost than it is around service. And I believe that 2.1 22 customer service boils down to two things: cost, 23 quality of service. My quality of service has been good. But what about my cost? 24 25 MR. WOODRUFF: Thank you, sir. Any questions?
