5	COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: I've been to this
6	auditorium many times to participate in our local public
7	hearing process. Mexico, with the utility providers that
8	you have, whether it be Ameren, whether it be water, lots
9	of reasons to be here, on the work that we do at the
10	Public Service Commission.
11	However, this is the first time that I've been in

10	again, this year I got a rate increase for a house I
11	barely even get to live in because I'm out there working
12	so hard and trying to up my income bracket.
13	Like I said before, it's not fair; and if there's
14	nobody to take from because Americans can't afford to pay
15	their bills, if they're going to make choices between the
16	electricity and eat, they're going to eat. Greed and
17	profit is a nasty ugly thing, and I think the same thing
18	will happen that has happened since the beginning of time.
19	You're going to greed yourselves out.

SAPP: Because it should be so help me God. 7 I've lived here for nine years. I have, my husband and I have done every kind of improvement that we can. We're 8 9 always getting flyers in the mail for AmerenUE to tell us, "Do this improvement," "Do this improvement. You'll see 10 the difference." We have not seen a difference, except 11 for our bill going up. That is one thing I have to say. 12 The other thing I have to say was I am still very 13 14 unhappy about the Taum Sauk situation. I still believe 15 that we are paying for it no matter how it's -- it's stated that it's an improvement that needed to be done --16 17 we're paying for Ameren's mistake. 18 Um, a lot of us live on fixed incomes. I am on 19 disability. I did not get a raise this year, I did not get a raise last year, but my utilities have gone up. 20 My water, my gas, my electric, everything, phone, 21 22 everything, has gone up. I am with this lady here 23 (indicating). We had to make a choice sooner or later, do 24 we pay the bills or do we eat, and, unfortunately, as you 25 can tell, I like to eat.

1	Page 9 The other thing is let me see I can't read
2	my own writing. They tell us that the rates haven't
3	increased since 1991. Well, maybe they're figuring, I
4	don't know how they're figuring that because I see rate
5	increases, and nothing costs today what cost it in 1991.
6	And I feel like we don't really get the choice in this
7	matter. We're all here and we're all speaking out, but I
8	have a feeling that we're just the little people, so it's
9	going to happen whether we want it or not. There will be
10	an increase and we will have to pay it and in order to
11	stay warm or stay cold in the summer time or have
12	electricity.
13	So, I just hope that they take it to, somebody
14	takes into account that America is hurting right now. We
15	are all hurting. The little people, the big people,
16	everyone is hurting, and we can't afford to keep adding
17	more on our electric bill, more on on our gas bill, more
18	on our food bill. Our food is outrageous in this town.
19	It's cheaper to drive 30 to 35 miles to Columbia to get
20	your food because our food is so expensive here.
21	And it's just, we just don't see a point where
22	anything is getting better for us. It's getting worse.
23	And when we moved here in 1991, there were a lot of houses
24	for sale because the brick plant had closed. I've got a
25	feeling it's going to happen again because people just

14	MR. STEINMAN: I would like to know how much money
15	the Public Service Commission use from lobbyists to take
16	them out to dinner? That's the first thing I would like
17	to know. That's a question, but, in 1973, No. 2 plant was
18	proposed with the No. 1 plant. AmerenUE had enough money
19	to build the No. 2 plant at that period of time. I worked
20	at the No. 1 plant when it was built. They forget to
21	realize there's not a railroad there anymore to haul this
22	heavy stuff. We haul on the river over a period of time.
23	The other factor is how many millions of dollars I
24	bought for \$10,000 worth of stuff when they sold it to me
25	for surplus. I bought ten thousand twelve hundred

1	forty dollars' worth of stuff from them, and I figured
2	just the scale alone I bought was worth \$50,000. They
3	eliminated it because somebody wouldn't put it in their
4	grubby hands, and it wasn't Daniels that did it. It
5	wasn't anybody but the officials from AmerenUE.
6	I was in Washington State in 1982 and Washington
7	State at that period of time was building five nuclear
8	power plants online. One was completed, the other four
9	was over a fourth of the way done. They're still in
10	existence. When they got their rate hike to finish up the
11	other four, that was in 1982, every customer in the State
12	of Washington had paid those other four to sit there and
13	rot.
14	Now we have a lobbyist in here I know who he
15	works with John Britton, and John Britton lives
16	extravagantly. He's known all over the United States as
17	best lobbyist all over the world, and he is a friend of
18	mine but we have a problem. There are people out here on
19	Social Security fixed incomes that haven't got a 2 percent
20	increase in the last, I think, three years. Everything
21	else has been going up, up, up, up, and up. When these
22	people get tired, we got five countries in the world right
23	now that are doing the same thing. United States is
24	getting ready to do the same thing, so watch yourself.
25	That's not a threat, that's not a promise. That's what

Page 16 1 people are getting tired of. And utilities garbage, oh, it's not a utility. 2 3 Eldon, Missouri, now they're starting to charge you for existent water that you've been paying for for a long 4 time. One person pays for water for 50 or 60 units in a 5 6 trailer park, and now they want to charge you door-to-door 7 service charge. When is it going to stop? That, that is what people are getting tired of. And I'm here to be a 8 9 voice for everybody, tonight, I've talked to in the last 59 years of my life. 10 Thank you. 11 12 Question? COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Just -- Mr. Steinman, just 13 14 to answer your question, you asked how many times have lobbyists taken me out to dinner, and the answer is zero. 15 It's a crime, and it's against the law. 16 17 MR. STEINMAN: I appreciate it. Nobody here 18 really knows that, so I'm glad that came out. Thank you. 19 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: I wanted you to know. (Whereupon, the Witness left the podium.) 20 21 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Next name on the list is Ron 22 Beedle. 23 (Indicating.) 24 RON BEEDLE, a witness, being duly sworn by Judge Woodruff, testified as follows: 25

2	Mexico, Missouri. B-e-e-d as in David-l-e.
3	One of the first thoughts that I would like to
4	share is on your payroll. It's amazing to me how it takes

7	Second thought is on your rate of return. I'm on
8	a fixed income, and I haven't had a return in two years
9	with Social Security, and what little I have invested I'm
10	not getting much more than 2 percent, and here you're
11	asking for over 10 percent.
12	And second thing is under your advertising.
13	There's computers. You overkill sometimes on what the
14	other people have said, maybe, about sending out
15	information about energy efficiency and things like that.
16	I just think that they need to do a better job of what
17	you're trying to do business with.

11	gallons you're buying, you know the price per gallon.
12	It's more complicated because you've got a meter on the
13	side of your house, but what we're trying to do is to help
14	people use a little less or understand where it goes.
15	And I'm wondering, the folks you're talking about,
16	what can the Commission do better in trying to give people
17	the tools to take control of their bills? And I
18	completely understand what you're saying about increases
19	and costs.
20	MS. SMITH: Uh-huh.
21	COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: But as fuel prices go up at
22	the gas pump, on many occasions those fuel prices go up
23	for electricity that it takes to generate electricity.
24	So, anyway, to use a more efficient car, or something like
25	that, it works the same way at home.

1	Page 22 My question to you is what can we do better at the
2	Commission in giving you the tools to understand and try
3	to take control of bills and understand where that, you
4	know, that cost is coming from? Are you following me?
5	MS. SMITH: You're talking about like when I was
6	working with Vanillas. I don't do that now, but I was.
7	COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Okay?
8	MS. SMITH: And these people would talk. I never
9	went further, you know, with these people as to their
10	personal needs. We only took care of what we could as a
11	church, you know, and me and Chairman of Benevolence.
12	But I do think when I don't know whether
13	this is as to my husband and I, yes. We had, we do these
14	things to cut costs. We have to, and we did. You know,
15	but when I'm saying, I don't know. I really don't have
16	that answer. I really don't. I really don't.
17	COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Okay.
18	MS. SMITH: You know, if you offered it to them
19	free, you know, but some of this, some of these people
20	have lived in rental houses, too, and there is another
21	factor.
22	COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Rental housing.
23	MS. SMITH: Yeah; and they pay their utilities.
24	COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: You're right. Someone owns
25	their own home, they make an investment and can fix it up.

1	Page 23 The landlord/tenant issue is a real problem. No one can
2	come up with a solution because each one has their own
3	incentive to do their own thing.
4	MS. SMITH: I was just borrowing from one. You
5	know, they said their lights were going to go out and they
6	had children, and things, and gas lights. Just broke my
7	heart, you know, but we can't as in our church at that
8	time, we couldn't help just everybody because we didn't
9	have that kind of funding, you know.
10	COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Was your experience, did
11	the utility, did Ameren try to work with folks that you
12	were trying to help or
13	MS. SMITH: The problem, they did try to work with
14	them and some of people didn't do too well managing.
15	COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Okay.
16	MS. SMITH: I'll be honest about it.
17	COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: I understand.
18	Thank you for your time.
19	(Whereupon, the Witness left the podium.)
20	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Next name on the list is Ray
21	Anderson.
22	(Indicating.)
23	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Good evening, sir.
24	Please raise your right hand.
25	

Page 24 RAY ANDERSON, a witness, being duly sworn by Judge 1 Woodruff, testified as follows: 2 3 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you. MR. ANDERSON: I lived in Callaway County, and I 5 have property in Call --6 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Your name is Ray Anderson? MR. ANDERSON: Ray Anderson, yes. You know, I don't begrudge these guys their 8 salary. It may be a little much but, you know, I don't 9 begrudge that. I don't begrudge the EPA saying that we, 10 basically, need to have clean air and water. It's our 11 choice, that's where we live at. So, whatever that costs, 12 it has to be paid. 13 14 One thing that does upset me a little bit is that when Ameren looks at and makes a statement that nuclear is 15 clean and green energy that's just nuts. It will be here 16 17 30, 40 years, then for the next 250,000 years it will kill 18 anybody who touches it, and it's such a hot topic the 19 Federal government doesn't have anything to do with it. 20 No state wants it. 21 Ameren could do a lot in lines what you're asking 22 with having ads, having conferences like this, having 23 expositions and demonstrations on what people can actually 24 do to save, to save energy. They do little or nothing on 25 That would be, be a big benefit, I think. that.

1	Another thing, they talk about our future 40 years
2	from now. Hay, it's solar and it's wind. There is no way
3	around it. We're going to have to stop using coal because
4	it will poison us and all of our kids will die. So, we
5	have to phase that out.
6	I really think, like I said, I have a house in
7	Columbia, and Columbia has done a wonderful job offering
8	people low loans, 1 percent, less than 1 percent, to
9	energize their house. They have people come out, look at
10	your house, say, "This needs to be done. It will cost you
11	50 bucks, City pays the rest of it." They realize they
12	can't keep producing more and more and more energy.
13	Somewhere along the line we have to say we have to bring
14	in efficiency, and Columbia's done a really good job on
15	that. They've encouraged people to save energy. Ameren
16	has not. "We'll build another plant. The new one will
17	come online and save us all." No, no, no, it won't. It's
18	your job.
19	Basically, our state is in really tough times, and
20	when people talk about on being on fixed incomes or low
21	incomes, they have to, when you increase their rate here
22	for electricity, you increase their rate for bread, for
23	water, for everything. There's a multiplier effect. So,
24	we have been asked, basically, in this state, "Well, cut
25	expenses, going to have to lay people off, blah, blah,

1	Page 26 blah, blah, blah." Maybe it's the time to tell Ameren
2	this time, "Well, you're right. It should be zero until
3	we come out of this economic slump."
4	And, really, it is all about the economy, most of
5	the people right here. I look at the economy, but I also
6	look down the road at this whole nuclear thing and more
7	coal plants. We have to do something else, and I don't
8	see Ameren leading the charge when they should be leading
9	the charge in that area.
10	That's all I had to say. Thank you.
11	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Yes, sir.
12	(Whereupon, the Witness left the podium.)
13	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Next one on the list is Bob
14	Hanke. Bob Hanke.
15	(No response.)
16	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Bob Muensterman. Bob

25	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Please raise your right hand.

1	MARCIA KADEN, a witness, being duly sworn by Judge
2	Woodruff, testified as follows:
3	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Can you please tell us your name,
4	please?
5	MS. KADEN: Marcia, M-a-r-c-i-a, Kaden, K-a-d-e-n,
6	and I live here in Mexico.
7	JUDGE WOODRUFF: What would you like to tell us?
8	MS. KADEN: Well, as you can see, I'm on
9	disability, and I'm struggling like everybody else. And I
10	think, in theory, they look at this nine dollars and
11	thirty cents added expense a month as not being that much.
12	Well, it's not if you make over a hundred thousand. But
13	it's, it's a burden on those who are on fixed incomes,
14	because ours hasn't gone up for the last couple years;
15	and, yet, even the government has raised Medicare A, B,
16	and D so that, you know, I think everybody is just trying
17	to squeeze everything out of it, but yet we want to be
18	able to stay in your own home because you don't want to
19	have to go somewhere where the State has to help support
20	you to live.
21	And besides choosing between food and bills, you
22	also have to consider that the disabled and the elderly
23	are on more medications. And, you know, with Medicare D,
24	everybody thinks it's harder, so, so great and all that,
25	well, they raised the limit before you get out of the

1	Page 28 donut whole and then raised the limit that you had to go
2	before you got in the donut hole, so that, I think that
3	the disabled and the elderly are just being wiped out.
4	These are supposed to be years that you can enjoy
5	as much as you can with your disability or with your
6	elderly care, and instead it's, you know, everybody wants
7	you to give this, give that, give that, and give that. I
8	mean, they have made no real evidence of cutting their
9	budget. You know, it's fine to say, "We laid off a couple
10	of people," or whatever. But how much did they really cut
11	their budget, operating budget? Because the church I go
12	to, I had some input on the budget and our budget for our
13	church went down 9.4 percent.
14	So, I think going up the rate set by a utility is
15	ridiculous.
16	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you, ma'am.
17	MS. KADEN: Thank you.
18	COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Thank you.
19	(Whereupon, the Witness left the podium.)
20	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Next name on our list is Hazel L.
21	Roberts.
22	HAZEL L. ROBERTS, a witness, being duly sworn by Judge
23	Woodruff, testified as follows:
24	JUDGE WOODRUFF: All right. Thank you.
25	And could you tell us your name, please?

1	Page 29 MS. ROBERTS: I am Hazel L. Roberts.
2	THE COURT: Thank you.
3	What would you like to tell us?
4	COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: R-o-b-e-r-t-s.
5	MS. ROBERTS: I'm one of the those fixed-income
6	people. I have a retirement account that is worth a whole
7	lot less than it used to be, and my life, it's based on
8	stocks and so forth, and if I take as much as I need out
9	of that every year, they're going to have to shoot me
10	pretty soon because there's just not going to be anything
11	left. And Social Security, as everyone has attested, has
12	not gone up and they will not because there is no COLA,
13	there is no cost-of-living adjustment. Our cost of living
14	has gone up and is continuing to rise.
15	Gasoline today is three twenty-five a gallon. I
16	had a few palpitations when I saw that. I think if my
17	bill goes up even ten more dollars a month, I'm not sure
18	I'll be able to pay it. I would have to do without
19	something. I work hard all my life to be able to retire
20	and have a livable income. I own a home, you know, I can
21	do things.
22	But if I can't do anything else to save on my
23	energy costs, that I can see, my little house that I live
24	in, it was very I've had insulation checks, all that
25	stuff, windows and everything. I retired, the last few

1	Page 30 years I have replaced the gas furnace, the gas-blown
2	heater, and the electric air conditioner. I have CFL
3	bulbs all over my house. My thermostat is sitting on 66.
4	It used to be the other way around. I turned the
5	thermostat up in the winter, down in the summer. Now I
6	turn it up in the summer and down in the winter.
7	As far as energy costing, we do get what we're
8	paying for, I think, but if it gets any higher there's not
9	going to be anything to pay it with. I have seen how they
10	expect the average person even those that are still
11	employed. I have family members that are employed that
12	aren't making all that much money now, either. They
13	aren't being able to pay their bills, too. If we don't
14	have some kind of control to keep these costs down, I
15	don't know what we're going to do. I really don't.
16	I have a room shut off in my house, and I'm doing
17	everything reasonable to control costs. I don't want to
18	give up everything I have just to keep warm or cool in my
19	own home.
20	Thank you.
21	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you, ma'am.
22	COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Ms. Roberts, may I ask you
23	just a few questions?
24	MS. ROBERTS: Absolutely.
25	COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: The investments that you've

1	$$\operatorname{\textit{Page}}31$$ made over time and you've been in your home for quite
2	awhile, and those are significant, air conditioner, water
3	heater, furnace, windows, sounded like you've been
4	checking the insulation those are all things that are
5	part of the energy efficiency package.
6	My question is have you ever compared your bill
7	for the number of kilowatt hours that you use today versus
8	the kilowatt hours that you used before those investments?
9	Did you recognize savings from those investments?
10	MS. ROBERTS: I haven't compared them that much.
11	I haven't gone back that far. But there was a time I was
12	paying more. But I was working. I could work a little
13	overtime to make a little extra money. So, on Social
14	Security, you don't get any overtime.
15	COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Okay. Thank you.
16	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you, ma'am.
17	(Whereupon, the Witness left the podium.)
18	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Next name on the list is Darrell
19	Sapp.
20	(Indicating.)
21	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Good evening, sir.
22	Raise your right hand.
23	DARRELL SAPP, a witness, being duly sworn by Judge
24	Woodruff, testified as follows:
25	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you.

1	Could you state your name, please?
2	MR. SAPP: Darrell Sapp.
3	JUDGE WOODRUFF: What would you like to tell us?
4	MR. SAPP: Well, I've lived here about nine years
5	and worked, been working down in Fulton. Cost of gas,
6	whenever it gets to three, four dollars a gallon two
7	years ago, your gas just to commute back and forth comes,
8	got a full tank of gas a week is forty bucks in my little
9	truck. It has like 211,000 miles. You can buy one, you
10	know, eventually it will have to be replaced sometime.
11	Anyways.
12	The raise I get every year goes to health costs.
13	My health insurance where I work at goes up at least that
14	much every year. So, there's nothing there. Social
15	Security, these people are losing their Social Security
16	that's getting it. When I get to the point to retire, it
17	probably won't be, be there.
18	I guess that's about it.
19	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you, sir.
20	COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Mr. Sapp, I don't have any
21	questions. Thank you very much.
22	(Whereupon, the Witness left the podium.)
23	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Next name is Eldon
24	MR. MELLOTT: Mellott.
25	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Mellott. Thank you very much.

Page 33 Sometimes it's hard to decipher signatures. 1 MR. MELLOTT: Yeah, and I'm getting old and shaky. 2 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Good evening, sir. 3 Please raise your right hand. 4 ELDON MELLOTT, a witness, being duly sworn by Judge 5 Woodruff, testified as follows: 6 7 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you very much. MR. MELLOTT: My name is Eldon Mellott, 8 9 M-e-l-l-o-t-t. 10 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you. MR. MELLOTT: I was here about a year ago and, at 11 that time, I said I blamed the Public Service Commission 12 about as much as I did the AmerenUE. AmerenUE was asking 13 14 for 18 percent then and I said you'd all give 9 percent 15 and pat yourselves on back and would said, "Boy, we held them to 9 percent," and AmerenUE would be patting 16 themselves on the back saying, "We got 9, we only needed 17 18 2." 19 And we pretty well blowed all their advertising out of the water. It's nothing but propaganda. 20 haven't got raises, nothing, hasn't had raises, hasn't for 21 22 two years. If one's lucky enough to have a job, they 23 probably didn't get a raise. And we got the runaround 24 tonight like who paid for all this advertising. And last 25 fall when we had the gas hearing, they said, oh, the

1	stockholder paid for that advertising out of their
2	profits. But the little paper they sent out with us said
3	they wanted a raise so the stockholders could have a
4	reasonable profit.
5	I said, "Now, wait a minute. We're getting put on
6	the hook and being left out of the loop and the whole
7	economy's in the crapper? Oh, no. No, no. That's not
8	guaranteed. But they had enough profit left over to pay
9	for television ads, newspaper ads, billboards, a whole
10	flood of bulletins they mailed out to us. And now we find
11	out tonight the head guy over the whole thing makes about
12	\$900,000 in wages and the rest of it is bonuses and
13	incentives. Where does that come from? "Oh, that comes
14	out of the stockholder's profit." So, somebody is making
15	some profit somewhere.
16	My dad used to say liars could figure and figures
17	don't lie. But they can sure be shuffled around because
18	the Federal government told that there wasn't no cost-of-
19	living increase. Didn't go up. Between now and anytime
20	last year, it cost me about 56 or 60 dollars more a month.
21	AmerenUE went up 10.3 on their electric. They went or
22	10.4 on electric, 4.3 on their gas, and come to find out,
23	the Public Service Commission is paid by the utilities.
24	Now, you all might be straight as a string, honest
25	as the day is long, but there's a conflict of interest

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- 1 there, and then any other situation you would preclude
- 2 yours. We got the fox guarding the hen house is what it
- 3 amounts to.
- 4 Now, it might not be. This is, this is the
- 5 impression we're getting. Last time they said we're
- 6 having 18 percent raise; we're having trouble buying
- 7 little luxuries like toilet paper, and I tell you toilet
- 8 paper and haircuts ain't gone down a bit last year. They
- 9 come in and winterized my house for me. I hated to have
- 10 them do it, kind of on the government dole, but I could
- 11 get it done. They come in and put new forced-air furnace.
- 12 My folks had a furnace in there, it was as big as a
- 13 Volkswagon. It was coal. They converted it to gas,
- 14 natural gas, so it had a burner in there as big as a
- 15 washtub. When you kicked it on, you could hear it a
- 16 half-a-block away. Put a new furnace in it and the new
- 17 furnace didn't heat, like no heat into the basement, so my
- 18 floors is always cold, and what I saved on the gas, the
- 19 electricity on the blower ate up. So, you didn't gain
- 20 much. And you can only conserve so far. There's only so
- 21 much you can do.
- 22 And three years ago, AmerenUE was crying to need a
- 23 raise. Everybody had followed their instructions and
- 24 conserved and they weren't selling enough electricity.
- 25 Well, gee whiz. Where do you go from there, I asked them.

Page 36 This nuclear power, I have nothing against it. 1 Three-Mile Island didn't put out a new chip x-ray but 2 3 you've got every tree hugger in the world fighting it. So, I said, "What about solar panels?" They didn't even 4 know how many acres they had down there, a little, 5 6 seventy-two hundred a year ago; now we think there's 4,000 7 acres down there. What about coal? Never heard one critical of glass over a parking lot in 500 years. Well, 8 9 but it only works during the daytime. Gee, summertime, I thought that's what the big draw for electricity was. 10 Well, what about wind star. You're going to have a little 11 trouble from tree huggers if you kill sparrows. I'd take 12 out two sparrows over heat stroke and hypothermia any day. 13 14 I think it costs 12 cents per kilowatt wind power, 15 and we only get two cents, two cents a kilowatt rebate from the Federal government. But we have to have this 16 17 raise because our transportation costs and our coal has 18 went up because we didn't convert our coal furnaces back 19 in the '70s when the clean air went through. 20 I don't believe, they didn't have the technology so they couldn't burn high sulphur coal from Illinois and 21 22 Missouri; we went to Wyoming and got it. Fine and dandy. 23 Now the economy in the crapper. They ain't selling no 24 electricity out of state. We got to have rigs. So, they 25 had an abundance of electricity. They weren't selling all

Page 37 this extra electricity. They got an abundance of 1 electricity, but they're buying electric wind power from 2 3 Iowa when they got electricity going to waste. And they're right back in a year's time wanting another raise. 4 5 And every one of these raises they want pays for 6 something they supposedly paid for. So, the customer, the 7 customer is the one on the tail end have ended up owning AmerenUE. They lay a mile of new wire, string a mile of 8 9 new wire, they come back to the consumer, "We want you all to pay for it. "We have a new gas pipe we want you to pay 10 for." Everything they put in their business they come 11 back wanting the Public Service Commission to grant them a 12 raise to pay for it. 13 14 So, we've ended up paying for the blocks to build a new store, we've paid for the materials to build the 15 company store, we've paid to stock the company store, we 16 17 paid the employees to run it and, low and behold, it's the 18 only store. We cannot go down to the corner, record 19 store, and choose from A, B or C brand of electricity. We're stuck with one. 20 Eighty, ninety years ago, if you come in your 21 22 house, throw a switch, a light come on, man, that was a 23 luxury. That was a modern marvel. If you could plug a 24 refrigerator in, keep your food fresh, it was a modern 25 marvel. You had natural gas, you could heat your home, a

1	Page 38 modern marvel. Today, it's not a luxury. You go home and
2	throw a master breaker on your panel box off, your house
3	goes dead. No food preparation, you can't save any food,
4	you've got no heating or cooling. You've got a gas stove,
5	
	you've got an electric lighter on it, you can't light the
6	stove. The furnace won't work. If you've got a water
7	conditioner, it won't work. Everything in that house is
8	tied in to electricity. Use to be a kid could throw that
9	breaker, so it's not a luxury anymore. It's become an
10	obsession.
11	And they keep raising these rates and raising
12	these rates and pretty soon it will cost you \$25 to do a
13	load of wash, \$15 to fry an egg in the morning, five bucks
14	to heat up a can of soup. If you have a manual can opener
15	to open it. So, we're fighting a losing battle. They
16	don't want wind power, they don't want solar power. The
17	State finally made it start trimming trees that they
18	should have been doing all along just for the safety of
19	their own linemen. And the only thing that I can see
20	AmerenUE has done to try to save any money was they don't
21	pay their linemen as much as the consolidated guys, and
22	without those linemen and ground men they don't got a
23	company.
24	So, for me, it costs me about 60 bucks a month

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since last year. I've got cable T.V. yet, but I've got

25

1	Page 39 basic and it only works half the time. It went up in the
2	last two years. One reason I got it, I'm too old and
3	stove up to crawl around on the roof to try to mess with
4	an aerial. My old crook got insurance, believe it went up
5	twice in the last two years. The water has went up. Our
6	city sewer bill has doubled, and it's going to go up every
7	October for the next 10 years because the Federal
8	government said they had to clean the mess up.
9	I really figured we'd be back here because of this
10	big passing of the tax bill and they say we've got to
11	convert all our coal fire to natural gas to get rid of the
12	carbon. But now the EPA here took it upon themselves to
13	say, "Oh, you got to do it all. You got to do it all."
14	They're trying to get the farmers to stop throwing dust in
15	a dirt road when you're driving down a dirt road. So,
16	where do we go, gentleman?
17	I make \$694 a month. A lot of these people out
18	here (indicating) might not even be making that. And
19	they're not making no profit. They (indicating) just said
20	their stockholders made 5 percent last year. They made
21	enough profit that the big shot of the company had made
22	\$400,000 worth of bonuses and incentives. But they're
23	broke. They've got to have this raise. They want 2
24	cents, or two dollars a year from all of us so they can
25	just get a permit to build a nuclear plant.

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1	$$\operatorname{Page}40$$ But the Governor said, "Get them altogether. If
2	one of you can't afford it, get them altogether and see if
3	you can build" if all the utility companies in this
4	state can't come up with four million, forty million bucks
5	without coming back and charging us for it? That's
6	enough. I know I'm not the conservative side. I may be
7	way off base on this. But it stinks.
8	Taum Sauk. The dam broke because they didn't keep
9	their maintenance up, didn't watch what the devil we've
10	been doing, and caused thousands of dollars of damage,
11	and, thank God, it didn't happen at a different time of
12	year. Because all the tourism would have been down there.
13	But they're still, they want us to pay for part.
14	Now, somehow or another, the courts have allowed
15	them to charge us everything they do. The whole business
16	in the world where everything is paid for. Reaganomics
17	were called trickledown. Well, think about it. They've
18	got 10.4 percent raise last year. Every grocery store,
19	barbershop, T.V. repair shop, gas station, barbershop had
20	to raise their prices. They had to to stay in business.
21	And it all boils down to us, the consumer, the low man on
22	the totem pole, and we got triple dog.
23	These idiots in Washington, D.C., all work no cost
24	of living, computers didn't go off. Not a one of them's
25	been to a grocery store. And if you're making like the

1	Page 41 man there makes \$900,000 a year, two or three dollars a
2	month probably doesn't make any difference to him. But
3	the ones out here on fixed incomes, and even the ones with
4	an income are fixed. Gas prices are going back up, so
5	where does it end?
6	They put up solar, they don't want nothing to do
7	with it. They put wind, don't want nothing to do with it.
8	I asked him, "You buy natural gas basically wholesale?"
9	Their answer is, "Yes." I said, "How many vehicles have
10	you converted to burn natural gas?" "None." "Why?"
11	"Nobody sells it." I didn't ask him to buy new equipment;
12	I asked how many they converted. If I had a place to fill
13	my old truck and could scrape up enough money, I'd be
14	burning natural gas. It's 40 percent cleaner and a whole
15	bunch cheaper. My main deal is it's cheaper.
16	Because all this global warming stuff, you put a
17	hundred scientists in a room you'll get a hundred
18	different opinions. Because why has Mars' temperature
19	changed now, how can you tell what the temperature on
20	Mars is? I don't know, but the temperature on Mars has
21	went up the exact identical amount as Earth. And I'm sure
22	the EPA says we're running out from Mars' greater
23	temperature, so we're right back where we started. We're
24	fighting EPA, fighting AmerenUE, we're fighting Federal
25	government.

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- 1 And they're a monopoly. They're trying to
- 2 flashbulb the competition. They aren't competition.
- 3 They're a monopoly. That's why the Public Service
- 4 Commission is there.
- 5 And I've got a lot of material. I've kind of lost
- 6 my place, but we've all kind of lost our place. Because
- 7 it gets to the point where I think I say I either heat or
- 8 eat. It's getting to the point you can't eat or heat.
- 9 And they say, "Well, we're the lowest in the State."
- 10 Well, good deal. California is paying four times we are,
- 11 why should we have to pay four times more, and they have
- 12 no incentive whatsoever to try to conserve on their own
- 13 use. As long as we put it in, Public Service Commission
- 14 lets them charge us for it. And the stockholder is trying
- 15 to get left out of the loop. They try to say no, no, but
- 16 it says "a reasonable". Well, this day and age,
- 17 "reasonable" maybe would have been 1 or 2 percent.
- 18 They've got 5 percent. Nobody in this room has got zilch.
- 19 And it all comes right back downstairs to the poor
- 20 guy on the street. I wish I could get out and work. I've
- 21 worked all my life until my ticker wouldn't. I'd like to
- 22 have a job for nothing else just to go have a day off. I
- 23 haven't had a day off in 10, 15 years.
- 24 So, that's about the long and short of it. I'll
- 25 get home and I'll think of a lot more.

Somewhere, I realize, of course, that the Public Service Commission charges the utility 15 companies for their expenses, but I don't know if 16 17 everybody realizes the utility companies then put that in 18 to our rates. We rate bearers pay for the Missouri Public 19 Service Commission, couple minutes out here. 20 Second thing, I heard somebody talking about this all being done at a thousand. If you count everything, it 21 22 was 4.7 million a year, and all he does, he's -- Mr. 23 Clayton -- in a noncompetitive industry, comes in, the 24 morning light's on, he goes out, the light's off. I hope 25 we take a look at that salary, all the employees make, and

1	Page 46 it's kind of money in a noncompetitive energy.
2	Another thing I wanted to say before Mr. Clayton,
3	the Legislature has played a savage trick on us rate
4	bearers. They give us all this information about how to
