Page 3 1 PROCEEDINGS 2 (Starting time of the Hearing: 7:02 3 p.m.) 4 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Good evening. Today is May 5th, 2015. The Missouri Public Service 5 Commission has set this time for a Local Public 7 Hearing on ER-2014-0370. The caption is in the 8 matter of Kansas City Power & Light Company's 9 request for authority to implement a general rate increase for electric service. 10 My name is Michael Bushmann, I'm a 11 Regulatory Law Judge, and I'll be presiding over 12 the hearing this evening. With me this evening is 13 Chairman Robert Kenney, Commissioner Stephen Stoll, 14 and Bill Kenney. 15 16 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Good evening everybody. I just wanted to take an opportunity to thank you 17 18 for being here tonight, and this is the fourth of 19 five Local Public Hearings that we'll have in this 20 matter. 21 This is your opportunity to share with 22 us any feedback that you have about the company and 23 express your opinion with regard to KCP&L's request to increase the rates. This is a very important 24 25 part of the process and we take it very seriously.

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- 1 We do appreciate you coming and taking the time.
- 2 The Court Reporter will transcribe the words that
- 3 you say into a written transcript of these
- 4 proceedings that we will be able to review and take
- 5 into account once we get them to read.
- 6 So again, thank you for taking the time
- 7 to appear tonight and we look forward to hearing
- 8 what you have to say. Thank you.
- 9 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Let's have the attorneys
- 10 state their entries of appearance. For Kansas City
- 11 Power & Light Company?
- 12 MR. STEINER: My name is Roger W. Steiner
- 13 and my address is 1200 Main Street, Kansas City,
- 14 Missouri 64105.
- 15 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Commission Staff?
- MR. WILLIAMS: My name is Hampton
- 17 Williams with the Staff Counsel's Office, P.O. Box
- 18 , Jefferson City, Missouri 65102.
- 19 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Office of the Public
- 20 Counsel?
- 21 MR. OPITZ: Thank you, Judge. Appearing
- 22 on behalf of the Office of Public Counsel, my name
- is Tim Opitz and my address is P.O. Box 2230,
- 24 Jefferson City, Missouri 65102.
- JUDGE BUSHMANN: And is there counsel for

Page 5 the Intervenors? 2 MS. FINDLEY: For Intervenor Ameren 3 Missouri, I'm Beth Findley with Smith Lewis, LLP, at 111 South 9th Street, Columbia, Missouri 65201. 4 5 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any other counsel 6 representing Intervenors? Okay. 7 The process this evening is you have been told earlier, and I will call the names on the 8 9 sign-up sheet. When I call your name, please come 10 forward to the podium, I'll put you under oath and ask you where you live, and you can give your 11 comments to the Commission. There's no time limit, 12 13 but please try to keep your remarks to under five minutes so that everybody has a chance to testify. 14 15 The first name on the list is Andrew 16 Linhares. 17 ANDREW LINHARES, duly affirmed by Judge 18 Bushmann, testified as follows: 19 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Could you please state your name and spell your last name? 20 21 MR. LINHARES: Andrew Linhares, L-I-N-H-22 A-R-E-S. 23 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live? 24 MR. LINHARES: I live in Columbia, 25 Missouri.

1 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please go ahead. 2 MR. LINHARES: Good evening. My name is 3 Andrew Linhares, as I said. I am the Staff 4 Attorney for Renew Missouri. I'm also happy tonight to be representing Renew Missouri's roughly 5 6 supporters in Kansas City Power & Light's 7 service territory. 8 Renew Missouri is a non-profit clean 9 energy group and our mission is to transform 10 Missouri into being a state in energy efficiency and renewable energy. I would like to make three 11 12 point tonight, and this is mainly about KCP&L's 13 proposal to raise the fixed customer charge from \$9 to \$25. 14 My two points are that raising the fixed 15 16 charge, you're slowing the customers. It serves as 17 energy conservation and renewable energy and it 18 takes away choices and control over repairs. So as 19 to the appearance of raising the fixed charge hurts 20 only the customer because they bear the largest 21 burden as the rates go up. Because their bill, the 22 electric bill takes up a higher portion of their 23 income than other repairs, it's just a portion of the affected by these increases. And if their 24

utility is taking away from other portions of their

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- 1 budget like their ability to pay their rent,
- 2 groceries, gas and whatever.
- 3 This is especially true of a fixed
- 4 charge. Like for a kilowatt hour rate hike, they
- 5 turn off the lights more, they can go without using
- 6 their air conditioning and find other ways to
- 7 reduce energy costs. With a fixed charge hike,
- 8 however, they can do nothing to avoid the added
- 9 extra cost.
- 10 A fixed charge hike also discourages
- investing in renewable energy and energy use.
- 12 Adding the fixed charge while lowering the kilowatt
- 13 hours give customers less incentive to be wise
- 14 about managing consumption. Since energy
- 15 consumption makes up the lower percentage of your
- 16 electric bill, the customer has less incentive to
- 17 consume less energy or solar customer costs
- 18 (inaudible) increases.
- 19 Not only has this been allowing Kansas
- 20 City Power & Light to send the wrong signal to
- 21 customers, it will hurt businesses that work in the
- 22 energy efficiency and renewable sectors. We
- 23 recognize that Kansas City Power & Light is a
- 24 leader here in energy efficiency and renewable
- 25 energy and we feel that supporting more not to

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- 1 waste goodwill and (inaudible) success in recent
- 2 years.
- 3 My final point here is that by
- 4 increasing the fixed charge portion of the electric
- 5 bill, it impairs the ability to take control of
- 6 their energy cost and customers should only be
- 7 charged for the amount that they use and it serves
- 8 as required to (inaudible) by having their meter
- 9 read and having the bill printed, the connection
- 10 from the pole to the meter. You the utilities'
- 11 right to limit the customer's ability to lower
- 12 their bill. This move would only serve to alienate
- 13 customers by taking away their control over the
- 14 energy portion of their household budgets.
- 15 At this point, I feel it's important to
- 16 know that I've done some research on this topic
- 17 recently and this issue of wanting to go into the
- 18 fixed cost, what will be considered fixed cost, is
- 19 not a new issue and they've been discussing this a
- 20 long time and it's the truth. In fact, there's a
- 21 big difference of opinion in exactly what is fixed
- 22 costs.
- One could consider simply the cost of
- 24 getting it from the street to the house, connecting
- 25 the house, simply those lines and then any costs of

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- 1 sending the bills to the customer and the costs of
- 2 entering those. These are completely in the costs
- 3 that are fixed and in fact, and before that, and
- 4 that has changed.
- 5 So my point here is that this is a
- 6 question of policy, the Commission decides it's not
- 7 a question of equity and fairness for the utility's
- 8 question that's before the Commission to decide
- 9 which policy preference to take on when we're
- 10 talking about the fixed charge.
- 11 So in conclusion, we ask the Commission
- 12 to deny Kansas City Power & Light's request to
- raise the fixed customer charge from \$9 to \$25
- 14 because it hurts low income customers, discourages
- 15 them to use conservation and takes away choice and
- 16 control. Thank you for the opportunity to give
- 17 comments tonight.
- 18 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Thank you for being
- 19 here. Has Renew Missouri, either in this context
- 20 or in any other context, taken a position on
- 21 decoupling?
- MR. LINHARES: I understand that the
- 23 Commission are going to consider decoupling. We
- 24 have not taken any formal position on decoupling,
- 25 but I think it would absolutely be (inaudible) to

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- 1 decouple rates from (inaudible.) I think it's set
- 2 on (inaudible) and could really open up some new
- 3 doors.
- 4 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Okay.
- 5 MR. STEINMAN: (Inaudible.) Are they
- 6 intervening in the Kansas City Power & Light rate
- 7 case?
- 8 MR. LINHARES: No, we are not in
- 9 Intervenors.
- 10 MR. STEINMAN: Did you have an
- 11 opportunity to do so?
- MR. LINHARES: We did have an opportunity
- 13 to do so, Renew Missouri intervenes in rate cases
- 14 from time to time, but we have specific issues of
- 15 to engage on, and in this case, it didn't seem that
- 16 it could add anything substantive to the case.
- 17 MR. STEINMAN: Thank you for your time.
- 18 MR. LINHARES: My comments tonight are in
- 19 support of our supporters. They are on behalf of
- 20 our supporters and we're not taking an intervening
- 21 case or a positive position on this for our power
- 22 source in opposition.
- MR. STEINMAN: And you're not a KCP&L
- 24 customer; correct?
- MR. LINHARES: No, I'm not.

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1	MR. STEINMAN: Have any KCPL customers	
2	contacted you about the case?	
3	MR. LINHARES: Yes.	
4	MR. STEINMAN: Can you give me names?	
5	MR. LINHARES: No, I'm not at liberty to	
6	do that.	
7	MR. STEINMAN: You're not at liberty?	
8	MR. LINHARES: I am not at liberty to.	
9	MR. STEINMAN: Thank you.	
10	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Michael Patterson?	
11	MICHAEL PATTERSON, duly affirmed by	
12	Judge Bushmann, testified as follows:	
13	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Could you please state	
14	your name and spell your last name?	
15	MR. PATTERSON: Michael Patterson, P-A-T-	
16	T-E-R-S-O-N.	
17	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live?	
18	MR. PATTERSON: Kansas City, Missouri.	
19	Basically, my comments are going to be pulled from	
20	information found on the New York Stock Exchange	
21	and from the annual reports of GHP Energy, who is	
22	the parent company to KCP&L, that we're here for	
23	this rate increase about.	
24	First, I've got to tell you, I'm totally	
25	against these rate increases. Mainly, we've had	

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- 1 way too many in the past eight years. I think
- 2 we've had five of them. The total amount of rate
- 3 increases for those five is fitting right in at
- 4 \$283,100,000 worth of increase in an eight year
- 5 period, and that's to the consumer. I understand
- 6 that the charges are for work that has to be done,
- 7 required by the Federal Government, but in the
- 8 process of this, this company has also managed to
- 9 pay dividends on shares.
- 10 Now, the dividend costs that I've been
- 11 able to locate for outstanding shares on four
- 12 separate types of shares the company has comes to
- around \$16,500,000; alright? Now, granted, that's
- 14 not a lot, but those increased dividends have
- increased every year, 2 percent, 6 percent,
- 16 whatever, every year for the last four years.
- 17 According to the company, they're on a schedule to
- 18 make the dividends increase annually with a payout
- 19 ratio of 55 to 70 percent of earnings for 2016, and
- 20 then 60 to 70 percent of earnings long term. So
- 21 there's obviously no indication that the dividends
- 22 is going to go down, okay, and this is drawn from
- 23 their own annual reports.
- 24 If the customers are required to foot
- 25 the bill, and I understand we are, including

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- 1 investment costs, at some point, their investors
- 2 need to foot part of these costs too. They buy the
- 3 stock for broke, the company, the equipment is no
- 4 longer usable or functional, the company is not
- 5 going to the company's not going to make money
- 6 and the investor's stock values are going to drop
- 7 like fire bombs, okay. So it would behoove the
- 8 company's investors to throw in part of their
- 9 dividends they have incurred with these costs to
- 10 maintain equipment, upgrades that the EPA requires,
- 11 all these things.
- 12 Concerning this \$25 charge instead of
- 13 higher utility rates, that thing is not going work
- 14 because the gas company already proved it won't
- 15 work. Back years ago, the gas company asked for
- 16 this same type of situation, raise the monthly fee
- from \$11 up to \$22, we'll get rid of the energy
- 18 charge during the winter of 26 cents per CCF. Now,
- 19 we're talking about the same thing with the
- 20 electric company, only now it's kilowatts.
- 21 Wasn't it just about a year ago, after
- the gas company's monthly charges declined
- 23 approximately \$27 or something a month, just for
- 24 the privilege of doing business with them, whether
- 25 you use that gas or not. They came back last year

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- 1 or the year before, I believe it was and asked to
- 2 have a monthly charge or a CCF charge put back
- 3 on. The monthly charge didn't go away.
- 4 Basically, it's not going to work.
- 5 You're killing the consumers to no point. And the
- 6 ssecond part of this is, according to the company's
- 7 records, you have 737,400 737,400 residents under
- 8 the part of their pool of Great Plains Energy. You
- 9 have 98,400 commercial firms and 2,600 industrial,
- 10 municipal, municipalities and others. So the main
- 11 share of people that are being hurt by this are
- 12 their residential customers.
- 13 Like I've said, we've had way too many
- 14 rate increases, one right shortly after another.
- 15 At some point, we need to stop and let the consumer
- 16 catch their breath too. Quite truthfully, I'm on
- 17 disability. My pensions are small, I have Social
- 18 Security and that's all that pays. It goes up just
- 19 a given amount. I'm struggling to make my bills
- 20 now. The problem is I make enough that I don't
- 21 qualify for aid. I'm managing to make it, scraping
- 22 the inner bowl, but things like this, you might as
- 23 well break me at that point. It serves no purpose.
- 24 At that point, I need to start (inaudible,) which I
- 25 find very depressing for me to do.

Page 15 1 That pretty much comes to the end of my 2 comments. Thank you. JUDGE BUSHMANN: Sierra Stahi. 3 SIERRA STAHI, duly affirmed by Judge 4 Bushmann, testified as follows: 5 6 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Could you please state 7 your name and spell your last name? MS. STAHI: Sierra Stahi, S-T-A-H-I. 8 9 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you reside? 10 MS. STAHI: Kansas City, Missouri. JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please go ahead. 11 MS. STAHI: So I am - intend to be here. 12 13 For those of you here who don't know this, one of 14 the agents largest environmental grassroots organizations. As much as I, especially to the 15 16 environment and sustainable energy. 17 So it's my understanding that the Public 18 Counsel wishes to ensure that all costs or requests in raised rates will be reasonable and prudent. do not think that the electric rate increase made 20 21 by KCP&L is reasonable or prudent. According to 22 KCP&L, the increased cost paid by consumers will go 23 towards wet charters and new chimneys for LaCygne currently. The environment, as was stated before, 24 25 (inaudible) for coal plants for many reasons and

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- 1 that is because much of the country is moving
- 2 toward renewable energy. So these are to then
- 3 support continued use of the coal and fossil fuels,
- 4 pushing Missouri farther away from renewables and
- 5 energy efficiency. Therefore, I feel that this
- 6 projects is not reasonable.
- 7 Low income families will especially feel
- 8 the brunt of this rate increase and many are in
- 9 (inaudible.) The economic relief pilot program
- 10 that was mentioned by KCP&L wasn't it wasn't
- 11 clear whether or not we were actually going to
- 12 people to cover families. It may help some, but it
- doesn't cover us all. Shouldn't we have motive to
- 14 enhance energy by removing coal fired plants, and I
- 15 know a whole lot about this because of spending
- 16 time with officials of the City, talking to
- families near the one (inaudible.)
- 18 So these are families who are struggling
- 19 to pay their bills, and then they're being asked to
- 20 pay for something that will support the continued
- 21 use of coal fired plants. This is not prudent.
- 22 The turbo injected and the loss of the turbos and
- 23 renewable energy and energy efficiency. If you are
- 24 asked to pay a higher base rate, then you may be
- 25 less willing to invest in energy efficiency or

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- 1 creating your own renewable energy. (Inaudible)
- 2 energy needs to be sent on by energy efficiency.
- 3 LaCygne is going to take about 49 percent of the
- 4 environmental upgrade costs by KCP&L, is promoting
- 5 only a portion percent on the technician costs that
- 6 will come from the wind and solar plants.
- 7 Let's not try to create a quick fix by
- 8 using much of this rate increase to support non-
- 9 renewable energy. Especially when this non-
- 10 renewable energy, coal (inaudible.) So I ask the
- 11 Commission to deny KCP&L's request to proceed.
- 12 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Questions? Amrita
- 13 Burdick.
- 14 AMRITA BURDICK, duly affirmed by Judge
- 15 Bushmann, testified as follows:
- JUDGE BUSHMANN: Could you state your
- 17 name and spell your last name?
- MS. BURDICK: My name is Amrita Burdick.
- 19 My first name is spelled A-M-R-I-T-A, last name B-
- 20 U-R-D-I-C-K.
- JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live?
- MS. BURDICK: Huh?
- JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live?
- 24 MS. BURDICK: I live in Kansas City,
- 25 Missouri.

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- I am here, I'm a retired librarian and I
- 2 wanted to sort the information and see what it
- 3 looks like. I'm also a person on a fixed income
- 4 myself as a retired person and I have a stake in
- 5 the case. And as I looked at this, probably most
- 6 of you here got this mailer, charge here, charge
- 7 there, charge everywhere. Well, originally that
- 8 was about only electric cars, which is not a bad
- 9 idea, but unfortunately I feel like it probably
- 10 also applies to this rate increase.
- 11 The company, I have three concerns. The
- 12 company seems to be doing pretty well. According
- 13 to Great Plains officials and annual report did
- 14 terrible. 2014 was in here, solid returns for its
- 15 shareholders. It delivered a total shareholder
- 16 return of 21 percent, and over the past two years,
- 17 a return of 51 percent.
- 18 As of the funds, some earlier data, the
- 19 earnings per share for 2014 was \$1.57, which is in
- 20 line with 2013 earnings and upped the employee
- 21 total earnings of \$1 per request. To me, it sounds
- 22 like what they're telling the shareholders, of
- 23 course, is that they have a really strong plan to
- 24 pay. Despite this, they are asking for a rate
- 25 increase of 8.8 percent to cover environmental

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- 1 upgrades. And it's my understanding, as we've been
- 2 talking here earlier this evening, it just looks
- 3 like service charges.
- 4 I'm really concerned about these other
- 5 service charges and just being (inaudible.) And
- 6 again, it has no incentive to reduce electrical
- 7 consumption. I'm concerned that the company has
- 8 simply passed on any and all posts and this
- 9 implicates KCPL has no incentive to make prudent
- 10 business decisions.
- 11 Recent studies, and I note there are
- 12 five of you sitting up there, I brought the data
- 13 and the references to these like a librarian, but I
- 14 didn't bring them, but I've seen at least two
- 15 studies that go on a state by state basis, and when
- 16 they compared this to constant electricity for this
- 17 state and how much they have gone to alternative
- 18 energies.
- Now, there was time when alternative
- 20 energy was higher. That's fine, and what's
- 21 happening how is that alternative energies are much
- 22 cheaper than carbon based energies, as well as
- 23 foreseen by our requirement. Missouri was on the
- 24 bottom of the list of states. Given that, I'm
- 25 asking why should we send money to other carbon

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- 1 based plants than to lock into increasing carbon
- 2 fuel electrical protection while we (inaudible.)
- 4 has a public Power & Light holding committee. It
- 5 uses 81 percent coal, 16 percent nuclear, 2 percent
- 6 wind and 1 percent natural gas, as per its reports.
- 7 And according to their annual report, coal costs
- 8 about \$2.05 per kilowatt hour, compared to \$7.75
- 9 for natural gas and oil.
- I had to do this calculation for wind,
- 11 but they didn't put it in there, but it looks like
- 12 wind costs about one eighth of the purchased power
- 13 cost of 253.3 million, and a purchase agreement for
- 14 megawatts of wind energy, wind likely costs
- 15 \$1.10 for that kilowatt hour, which is about half
- of the coal and that other costs of gas.
- 17 Another company, Independence Power &
- 18 Light is seeing the look at the bottom line, and
- 19 Independence decided that they're going to
- 20 appropriate energy because it's going to be cheaper
- 21 to the consumer in the long run. If you want to
- 22 (audible) in Kansas City, I'd say let Kansas City
- 23 Power & Light (inaudible) on this archaic coal,
- 24 nuclear, wind use, which is very heavily oriented
- on coal, nuclear, that virtually ensures higher

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- 1 carbon rates with an adequate financial base, the
- 2 rate increase should be denied.
- 3 KCP&L should be required to assume this
- 4 practice which will allow them to make clean at an
- 5 affordable level, and they can do this by investing
- 6 in green and alternative energies, so the public
- 7 won't be caught on an ever-increasing wheel of
- 8 higher markets. Thank you.
- 9 SERGEY VARTANOV, duly affirmed by Judge
- 10 Bushmann, testified as follows:
- 11 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Could you please state
- 12 your name and spell your last name?
- MR. VARTANOV: My name is Sergey
- 14 Vartanov. First name Sergey, last name V-A-R-T-A-
- 15 N-O-V.
- JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live?
- 17 MR. VARTANOV: Kansas City, Missouri. I
- don't support the rate increase which we are here
- 19 today for KCPL for the following reasons. I looked
- 20 at my electric bill, it's from December of 2014 and
- 21 January 20th of 2015, which was recently. And
- 22 there's some of it, customer charge, \$9, DSIM
- 23 charge which is the program and we gave, it's money
- 24 for them to implement taking out of commission old
- 25 appliances, heaters, so that DSIM charge was

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- 1 \$28.20. (Inaudible.) So some people have \$55.66,
- 2 that does not equal any other charge itself, and
- 3 they want to even charge more?
- 4 I don't think it's fair to pay for low
- 5 income families to everybody, to the middle income,
- 6 it's just not fair. Also apparently, KCPL
- 7 representatives that when they change the meters
- 8 because they're old, outdated and how many of those
- 9 meters are they are mechanical meters. They're
- 10 very reliable. They've worked for years. I
- 11 haven't had any issues with mine personally and
- 12 I've heard from my neighbors also. Only the rates
- 13 for all this.
- 14 So we incur extra charges according to
- one contractor, contracted by KCP&L to install
- 16 meters now, he said it costs \$80. We're talking
- 17 about thousands of dollars of meters. So we're
- 18 talking about one meter. So I don't think that
- 19 cost increase to justify, I could say those meters
- 20 specifically, if they are creating no issues.
- 21 (Inaudible) one size fit them all.
- 22 Also, I want to say, about 867 of the
- 23 kilowatt hour that's average consumption, which
- 24 costs us about an extra \$14 dollars a month. I
- 25 calculated in April is about 62 cents an hour, so

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- 1 kilowatt hours, if I interpret correctly, it
- 2 would be single household, which actually use
- 3 heating and cooling, just occasional used of
- 4 electric. So basically this low power application
- 5 our consumption. That's what it is. So if we have
- 6 the power consumption generated by the major
- 7 appliances in our houses, so that doesn't matter.
- 8 So we're not talking about \$14, by this rate, it
- 9 will be more, so the final rate will show.
- 10 The other calculation that's the KCP&L
- 11 representative said that this is case about
- 12 (Inaudible), and I think it is here for four times.
- 13 It costs me about increased rates. I'm thinking
- 14 we're having an issue here, something about the
- 15 rates, I think probably proper manage. Their
- 16 finance investment, it's all about how it's
- 17 managed. If they can properly manage, make the
- 18 discoveries, it would have saved it might have
- 19 solved the rate increase. That's all.
- JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you. Looks like
- 21 Vito Meyer. Diana Payne.
- 22 DIANA PAYNE, duly affirmed by Judge
- 23 Bushmann, testified as follows:
- JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name
- 25 and spell your last name?

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1	MS. PAYNE: Diana Payne, P-A-Y-N-E.	
2	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live?	
3	MS. PAYNE: I live in Kansas City.	
4	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Go ahead.	
5	MS. PAYNE: Okay. I noticed during the	
6	presentation, KCP&L said that, or it might have	
7	been from the Public Service Commission, that in	
8	your testimony, you could give on quality of	
9	customer service. So mine will be coming in from a	
10	total different angle, from the representative	
11	terms.	
12	I'd first like to say that Alice Walker	
13	once said the most common way people give up their	
14	power is by thinking they don't have any.	
15	With that being said, this past summer	
16	of 2014, there was a huge storm that caused an	
17	extremely large tree to fall in the backyard of the	
18	home behind my home, which caused a power pole	
19	which services my home, to crack. I heard the	
20	crack in the pole as the tree fell. I called KCP&L	
21	to report that the pole was cracked, but was	
22	informed since I still had power, and due to the	
23	storm - that due to the storm, restoring power to	
24	homes was the most important.	
25	Subsequently, two KCP&L workers showed	

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- 1 up to the pole saying that there was a problem, but
- 2 there were no resolutions then. Around about the
- 3 5th of October, 2014, I noticed lights dimming in
- 4 my house and TV was slippery. It was kind of like
- 5 a poltergeist effect in my home.
- On Friday, October the 10th, the power
- 7 went out in most parts of my home. I called a
- 8 friend to come and check the fuses in my box.
- 9 Everything checked okay, he couldn't find any
- 10 problems noted with the fuses or anything with the
- 11 power in the house. All weekend, I continued to
- 12 have dimming lights, power outages in certain parts
- of the house, could not figure out the problem.
- 14 Sunday night, October the 12th at about
- 15 p.m., most of the power went out in the home. I
- 16 called my licensed electrician and explained to him
- 17 the events. He graciously came to my home and made
- 18 a thorough check and informed me that the problem
- 19 was outside the home and probably on the pole, and
- 20 that I needed to call the emergency number for
- 21 KCP&L.
- The emergency dispatcher arrived Monday
- 23 morning, October the 13th about 2 a.m. I informed
- 24 him that I had reported the problem to two KCP&L
- 25 workers about the cracked pole, but that he stated

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- 1 they had no record of it. After the emergency
- 2 dispatcher from KCP&L climbed the pole, he informed
- 3 me, as an electrician, that the neutral wire was
- 4 broke, and he could only provide a temporary fix.
- 5 The problem with him providing the temporary fix,
- 6 the main brain boards in my range, refrigerator, my
- 7 Bose radio system and my refrigerator were damaged,
- 8 and my Bose radio and my refrigerator were
- 9 unrepairable. I had spent close to over \$1,000 in
- 10 repairs to the stove, the refrigerator. I replaced
- 11 similar the part in the refrigerator and they
- 12 replaced my hose.
- On Wednesday, I had a conversation with
- 14 the KCPL worker that came, he was a troubleshooter.
- 15 I talked with the worker, stating to the KCPL
- 16 worker, stating that he's a troubleshooter and he
- 17 evaluated the situation regarding the pole. He
- 18 also stated the pole is in a mess which we both
- 19 affirmed, and he also affirmed that the one tube
- 20 wire that was coming in let's see, the one tube
- 21 wiring out and the other one 110 wire, were trying
- 22 to compensate the non-working wire, and then the
- 23 neutral wire was compensated in the process. The
- 24 neutral wire was broke, connected on the pole.
- 25 The troubleshooter stated that he will

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- 1 attempt to submit getting the pole repaired. After
- 2 getting the runaround, finally a supervisor came to
- 3 inspect the pole and it was discovered that the
- 4 pole belonged to AT&T, and that KCP&L is renting
- 5 space on the pole. He stated that once KCP&L was
- 6 certain the pole was not theirs, they dropped the
- 7 ball and did not follow through, since it was an
- 8 AT&T pole.
- 9 I was directed by KCP&L to submit a
- 10 claim form with the original receipt for the repair
- 11 and damage, which I did this on December the 8th,
- 12 , only to receive a letter dated on 12/23/14
- 13 that they denied my claim. They also did not
- 14 return any of my original receipts for the repairs.
- 15 I later received a voice mail from AT&T
- 16 stating that the problem had been referred to the
- 17 construction department to find out when the pole
- is to be replaced. I was referred to a Manager
- 19 with AT&T who I left several messages or returned
- 20 call to discuss the pole problem, but I never
- 21 received a call.
- 22 As of today, I have not heard from
- anyone regarding the pole, the pole remains cracked
- 24 to this day. It's still not been repaired. I say
- 25 all this to say that service is extremely lacking,

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- 1 and that for them to ask for a 15.8 increase, which
- 2 will partially pay for placement and recharges of
- 3 electrical station in certain parts of the City for
- 4 electric cars. I truly feel that that's wrong by
- 5 KCP&L.
- 6 I also discovered that when I called and
- 7 reported the pole problem, they noticed the bill
- 8 was still in my deceased husband's name and they
- 9 changed the energy usage monthly data from that day
- 10 forward. I am not currently on the level pay plan,
- 11 as I just recently retired as a Registered Nurse,
- 12 but I understand that if I switch, I am ineligible
- 13 due to not having a full year of energy usage
- 14 reported under my name.
- This is a problem we've had when as the
- 16 old saying goes, a poor rat has but one hole to run
- 17 to, and that is our case here with KCP&L. And if
- 18 any of you have noticed I'm going to quit
- 19 bringing that up, that's a whole other issue, the
- 20 faulty wiring, to refinance our house in a lot of
- 21 the urban core area, that's a whole other issue.
- But in closing my remarks, I would like
- 23 to quote some words from a song by Michael Jackson
- 24 just prior to his death. "All I want to say is
- 25 that they don't really care about us. Tell me what

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- 1 has become of my life? Am I invisible because you
- 2 ignore me? Your proclamation promised me free
- 3 liberty. I'm tired of being a victim of shame.
- 4 They're throwing me in class with a bad name. I
- 5 can't believe this is the land from which I came.
- 6 The government doesn't want to see. Tired of being
- 7 the brunt of hate and raping me of my pride."
- 8 And J.K. Robbins said this, "If you want
- 9 to see the true measure of man," or in this
- 10 instance, a company, "watch how you treat the
- 11 inferiors and not just the equals."
- 12 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Ms. Payne, thank you
- 13 for taking the time this evening to come here. Can
- 14 I ask a couple of questions?
- 15 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Sure.
- 16 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: When did KCP&L switch
- 17 the account to your name from your dead husband's -
- 18 your deceased husband's name?
- 19 MS. PAYNE: I made a copy of that, hang
- 20 on. It must have been in June of 2014.
- 21 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: And was that at your
- 22 request?
- MS. PAYNE: No. They told me I had to do
- 24 it, and my husband had been deceased since April of
- 25 .

Page 30 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: So they just noticed 2 it? MS. PAYNE: Yeah, because I started 3 4 calling and complaining about the pole, and then they're telling me, "We show that as in the name," 5 and I said, "I'm his wife. He's deceased." "Well, 7 we can't do anything because it should be in your name." So I didn't have any other choice. 8 9 Now, I had been paying the light bill 10 for years. They had no problems with me, my record is immaculate with KCP&L. Then I find out since 11 I'm retired, I've been giving some consideration 12 13 about going on the level payment, but I can't do that because I don't have a whole year's record of 14 energy usage right now, energy usage. 15 16 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Have you made a 17 decision yet about whether to switch from the old 18 plan to-19 MS. PAYNE: Not yet. It's kind of close. 20 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Did they say to you any 21 tariff language, or some rule or regulation that 22 prohibits you from using that prior data? 23 MS. PAYNE: No. I just know, it's from someone else personally that it's happening to. 24 25 COMMISSIONER STOLL: Let me ask you a

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- 1 couple of questions. Are you still is the power
- 2 quality still affected by the cracked pole? Are
- 3 you still seeing occasions of dimming lights and
- 4 such?
- 5 MS. PAYNE: No, I haven't recently, but
- 6 the pole is still cracked. But I did an upgrade
- 7 since then and so they had to put some new wires
- 8 from the pole to my house because I upgraded to a
- 9 watt system, you know, in the time being. So
- 10 there's different wires, so I don't know if they -
- 11 I don't know what they done. They stabilized it or
- 12 whatever, but it's still broken, an AT&T pole, and
- 13 KCP&L just changed out the wires on the pole.
- 14 COMMISSIONER STOLL: Well, I would
- 15 encourage you to take the time to meet Mr. Opitz
- 16 with the Office of Public Counsel and he can
- 17 provide you some additional guidance.
- 18 Your issue with your bill dates switched
- 19 from your husband's name into yours is a similar
- 20 problem that we heard at a Local Public Hearing
- 21 about a week or two ago, and I understand and it's
- 22 perhaps somebody can help you resolve that
- 23 situation, while you're here today, as well.
- 24 Thanks again for taking the time to be here
- 25 tonight.

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- 1 MS. PAYNE: Thank you.
- 2 COMMISSIONER STOLL: I would just say one
- 3 additional thing, that many times people may not
- 4 know this, but if you have a customer service
- 5 issue, you can also call our customer service
- 6 office at the Public Service Commission, or really
- 7 any number at the Public Service Commission, and
- 8 you will be transferred to that office, and they
- 9 also can be of assistance to you.
- 10 MS. PAYNE: I kind of learned that as I
- 11 was going down the road with this process, to
- 12 contact the Public Service Commission with my
- issues, but then I was directed to just wait and
- 14 come to this hearing and that's this whole
- 15 scenario.
- 16 COMMISSIONER STOLL: Yeah. I think it's
- 17 one of those things where you want to go to the
- 18 source of what you think, you know, where the
- 19 problem is, and probably ten or fifteen years ago,
- 20 I wouldn't have known to call the Public Service
- 21 Commission either, but I would just give that
- 22 information.
- MS. PAYNE: Thank you.
- 24 COMMISSIONER RUPP: Thank you for your
- 25 information. You said something that stuck out in

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- 1 my mind is the company lost the record of your
- 2 complaints when you called, they had no record of
- 3 you-
- 4 MS. PAYNE: That's what the
- 5 troubleshooter that came at 2 a.m. in the morning,
- 6 he stated that there was no record of any
- 7 complaints, of any calls to them about that pole.
- 8 COMMISSIONER RUPP: How did he know to
- 9 make contact?
- 10 MS. PAYNE: Because I called them because
- 11 my power had been out, and when my electrician
- 12 stated that the problem had to be on the pole, we
- 13 stated that to him when he came at 2 a.m. in the
- 14 morning, and that's when I told him, I said, "I've
- 15 been calling and complaining about that pole got
- 16 cracked in that storm and nobody has ever done
- 17 anything about it, " and then I was still under the
- 18 impression that it was KCP&L's pole. Not until the
- 19 supervisor came out did we look on the pole and it
- 20 said AT&T on it.
- 21 MR. RUPP: That's designated there is a
- 22 that people contact so they can't lose
- 23 information and that stuck in my mind. The second
- 24 thing is I want to hear about the roads KCP&L,
- 25 they're owned by the City. Do you know of any

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- 1 information on that indicating-
- 2 MS. PAYNE: Well, when we called, me and
- 3 another girlfriend of ours because we take that, I
- 4 think it's off of 71 and the 29th Street exit, we
- 5 take that all the time. What we had noticed, it's
- 6 just pitch black when you get off at that exit, and
- 7 then, so it makes you what if you stopped at the
- 8 stoplight and maybe your car stalls and I mean, it
- 9 is just black.
- 10 So I changed my route at night, I don't
- 11 take that exit just for that reason, there's no
- 12 lights. But if I can't get there the other night,
- 13 I went on and took that exit, I noticed long up on
- 14 , there was about five streetlights that were
- 15 out, but this-
- 16 COMMISSIONER RUPP: How long have you
- 17 noticed them being out?
- 18 MS. PAYNE: About a year.
- 19 COMMISSIONER RUPP: About a year. So you
- 20 contacted the company, and?
- MS. PAYNE: Well, we were told that the
- 22 copper has been stolen out of the light fixtures.
- 23 That's what we were told, and we were told that
- 24 KCP&L was going to fix it, but not one light has
- 25 been fixed since then.

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- 1 And also, I've noticed on 70 Highway,
- 2 right in that run where it's like kind of right in
- 3 the core of the City where I-70, you take the 31st
- 4 Street exit or the I forgot which exit that is,
- 5 but it's the next one. But as you get closer into
- 6 getting to downtown, the lights are all working,
- 7 but all of them in that whole area, none of the
- 8 pole lights are working along I-70 or 71.
- 9 COMMISSIONER RUPP: When were you told
- 10 that they were going to be fixed?
- 11 MS. PAYNE: They just said they were
- 12 going to be, that they were working on it.
- 13 COMMISSIONER RUPP: Was that six months
- 14 ago, three months ago?
- MS. PAYNE: It's probably been somewhere
- 16 between three and six months.
- MR. OPITZ: May I? During your contact
- 18 with the company, either in person or over the
- 19 phone, were you ever informed of your right to
- 20 contact the Public Service Commission and file a
- 21 formal complaint?
- MS. PAYNE: No.
- MR. OPITZ: Thank you.
- JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any other questions?
- 25 Thank you. Joseph Jackson.

Page 36 JOSEPH JACKSON, duly affirmed by Judge 1 2 Bushmann, testified as follows: 3 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Could you please state 4 your name and spell your last name? MR. JACKSON: My name is Joseph, J-O-S-E-5 6 P-H, Jackson, J-A-C-K-S-O-N. Mr. Chairman and members of the Public Service Commission, I'm here 7 8 to testify as to the 15.28 rate increase requested 9 by KCP&L. Financial information references my 10 testimony as obtaining (inaudible) 10th day of December, 2014. (Inaudible.) 11 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Mr. Jackson, could you 12 slow down? 13 COURT REPORTER: Sounds like slurring. 14 (Witness is mostly inaudible.) 15 16 MR. JACKSON: The Form 10K is a financial document that has been provided just to the 17 18 Security & Exchange Commission from KCP&L and the 19 other utility corporations. Missouri and Kansas 20 and Aquila as of recent, as a result, the 21 electrical utility does not compete with any other 22 utility providers, to manage electric in our 23 franchise service area, and this allows them to 24 operate as a monopoly. 25 Customer service. Over the last few

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- 1 years, (inaudible) day and night and they can last
- 2 anywhere from 30 minutes to sometimes over four
- 3 hours. The last time was about two months ago, it
- 4 was very dark on my street about 10:00 at night.
- 5 (Inaudible) and they had oxygen, some of them
- 6 (inaudible). This is happening (inaudible).
- 7 From the testimony given by the
- 8 (inaudible), you can see it would be a threat that
- 9 this (inaudible). (Inaudible.) Private policy
- 10 requires that (inaudible). We worked with KCP&L
- 11 (inaudible) and there's nothing they can do
- 12 (inaudible) the location of (inaudible).
- 13 (Inaudible.)
- I see the request for rates coming in in
- 15 June, 2004 and it was not completed until October,
- 16 2014. This (inaudible.) (Inaudible.) KCP&L filed
- 17 a (inaudible.) (Inaudible.) KCP&L petitioned for
- 18 a fuel adjustment charge to (inaudible.)
- 19 (Inaudible.) KCP&L's cost for natural gas went
- 20 down from \$2.79 per kilowatt hour generated to
- 21 \$7.75 per kilowatt hour generated. This fuel
- 22 (inaudible) is a 3.2 per kilowatt hour.
- 23 (Inaudible.) They had 95 percent of the required
- 24 2015 (inaudible.) Fuel costs for KCP&L went
- 25 down to (inaudible) in 2014. This is a \$15,000,000

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- 1 decrease.
- 2 According to Form 10, it heightened up
- 3 the increase in coal price, but only (inaudible) in
- 4 2015. They heightened up the increase of 10
- 5 percent and adjust the price (inaudible) increased
- 6 the fuel expenses in 2015. (Inaudible), why do
- 7 they need the fuel adjustment charge. After that,
- 8 what is fuel adjustment charge. KCPL operates on
- 9 four types of fuel, coal, nuclear, gas, wind. 2014
- 10 (inaudible) coal. The cost was (inaudible.) 2015
- 11 (inaudible) directly to coal. The estimated cost
- 12 is (inaudible.) Nuclear, 2014, 16 percent costs
- 13 (inaudible) per kilowatt hour. 2015, 0.66, 66
- 14 cents for a kilowatt, 50 percent, gas fell to 1
- 15 percent.
- In 2014, it's 2.7 (inaudible.) In 2015,
- 17 estimated cost is 7.75 percent per kilowatt hour.
- 18 Wind is 2 percent. (Inaudible.) I can't see 6
- 19 percent being a significant part in this
- 20 (inaudible.) Total cost per kilowatt hour in 2013
- 21 estimated (inaudible.) In 2014, it's going to be -
- 22 in 2014, it was \$1.95 per kilowatt, this is on page
- 8. This year, it's estimated to be \$1.80.
- 24 (Inaudible) gives us an increase by 15
- 25 percent by 2016 and 28 percent by 2020.

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- 1 (Inaudible) renewable energy sources, 10 percent by
- 2 and 15 percent by 2020. Then we partly have
- 3 two megawatts of solar resources. Renewable energy
- 4 is the cheapest source of energy (inaudible), not
- 5 only is the cost less, but the future delivery will
- 6 (inaudible.)
- 7 Any of the increases accrued, KCP&L
- 8 currently now according to this chart has had 48.1
- 9 percent increase since 2006/2007, while Kansas has
- 10 had a 21.8 percent increase. (Inaudible.) KCP&L
- 11 (inaudible.) (Inaudible) Missouri didn't receive
- 12 any increase and it should have been seeking
- 13 (inaudible.) Kansas City (inaudible.) This water
- 14 increase is very (inaudible.) This water increase
- 15 is (inaudible.)
- 16 In 2010, we paid \$2.81 for our
- 17 (inaudible.) In 2011, water went to \$3.18 per
- 18 (inaudible.) 2012, we had a 3.67 per CCF of water,
- 19 so the price (inaudible.) 2013, we paid 4.02 for a
- 20 CCF of water, surcharge is now 11.90, (inaudible.)
- 21 In 2014, we paid 4.45 per CCF of water,
- 22 (inaudible), sewers, 15.10. 2015, (inaudible), we
- paid 4.60 per CCF of water, 13.50 surcharge,
- 24 (inaudible.)
- 25 Water rates in Kansas City alone reached

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- 1 about 3 percent over the next five years, which
- 2 sewer rates increased by 15 percent over five
- 3 years. Gas increases, light increases, water
- 4 increases. Each time a utility goes up, prices go
- 5 up, we don't have any increase in wages.
- 6 (Inaudible.)
- 7 Kansas City had over 14,000 (inaudible.)
- 8 How is this going to effect Kansas City?
- 9 (Inaudible) about 50 percent. 50 percent of
- 10 enrolled students (inaudible.) (Inaudible) due to
- 11 inability to afford the rents. 65 percent out of
- 12 percent hold on. That 65 percent is the rent
- 13 that moved when costs went up (inaudible.) Crime
- 14 increases (inaudible.)
- 15 When KCP&L went to build the
- 16 (inaudible), they can't even endure the costs, on
- 17 the record \$300,000. (Inaudible) and customers
- 18 cover the cost. While KCPL (inaudible), all
- 19 profits have taken appreciation on an average of
- 20 customers pay for it. (Inaudible) KCP&L needs to
- 21 subsidize on these (inaudible.) (Inaudible) in
- 22 some cases, \$2.
- With gas prices always going up, what is
- 24 the incentive to purchase (inaudible.) I'm asking
- 25 the Missouri Public Service to disclude Kansas City

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- 1 Power & Light's request for a 15.8 percent
- 2 increase. (Inaudible.) This will allow customers
- 3 to budge and brace for the increase, rather than
- 4 being his all at once. This increase is due to be
- 5 put in place September 13th. (Inaudible.)
- 6 Missouri Public Service is mandated with
- 7 renewable sources of energy rates he high than
- 8 those (inaudible.) These include utilities, food,
- 9 medicines and shelter. According to the United
- 10 States (inaudible.) This is in March. There are
- 11 (inaudible) people on the waiting list,
- 12 (inaudible.)
- 13 KCPL did most of the (inaudible.) If
- 14 they're going to assist people having difficulties,
- 15 they can donate some of the \$240,000,000 in profit
- 16 and take that and try to (inaudible.) (Inaudible)
- 17 people who urgently need help now. What about the
- 18 others that are going to be affected? (Inaudible)
- 19 don't get an increase in wages, Social Security,
- 20 (inaudible.) Why don't you think about that before
- 21 you decide who (inaudible.)
- 22 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Mr. Jackson, thank you
- 23 for being here. Did you come to a satisfactory
- 24 resolution of your situation?
- MR. JACKSON: Yes. It took about a week

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- 1 and we were able to get the utilities in our name
- 2 so she did not qualify for (inaudible.)
- 3 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Let me ask you and I
- 4 want to make sure I heard you right. When did you
- 5 request your-
- 6 MR. JACKSON: I turned the paperwork in
- 7 in June, and they sent it back and it didn't get
- 8 resolved until this October. It was the end of
- 9 September or the first of October.
- 10 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: I don't have any other
- 11 questions. Thank you for your testimony. Thank
- 12 you for taking your time to be here tonight.
- 13 MR. JACKSON: I have a signed petition by
- 14 about 150 (inaudible) Public Service Commission.
- 15 We are not in favor of KCP&L raising our rates.
- 16 COMMISSIONER RUPP: Sir, the only thing
- 17 we haven't heard tonight is usually, we hear
- 18 something about how the economy is, the community
- 19 partner, and they're very involved in the
- 20 community. The community, keeping that in mind,
- 21 are they the community partner?
- MR. JACKSON: I would say this, if they
- 23 want to be involved in the community, they can
- 24 donate funds too and services (inaudible) waiting
- 25 on the waiting list. Because throughout this

Page 43 entire process, one of the things is KCP&L gets 2 paid, no matter what happens. 3 COMMISSIONER RUPP: (Inaudible) are they 4 involved civic-MR. JACKSON: They're involved in civic 5 6 contributions in the situations. The thing that 7 they're involved in (inaudible) assistance between 8 lights, food and shelter. 9 COMMISSIONER RUPP: Okay, thank you. 10 CHAIRMAN BUSHMANN: Thank you, Mr. Jackson. 11 MR. WILLIAMS: Mr. Jackson, for the 12 record, could you clarify your neighborhood, 13 14 please? MR. JACKSON: It's 27th Street, which is 15 16 Linwood and Prospect to Indiana. 17 MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you very much. 18 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any other questions? 19 STEPHEN W. MCBRIDE, duly affirmed by 20 Judge Bushmann, testified as follows: 21 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name. 22 MR. MCBRIDE: Stephen Wayne McBride of 23 Kansas City, Missouri. I think what KCPL is wanting is ridiculous. I been thinking of the 24 25 community part, yeah, say in the 1980's, you know,

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- 1 they were a real good company. My dad, Nathan
- 2 Wayne McBride, worked full time for American Clutch
- 3 and in here for KCPL and that company dates back to
- 4 .
- 5 As a descendent of him, I would think my
- 6 dad would be appalled the way the company is doing
- 7 the customers today. Like if you look at the
- 8 simple ways to save energy here, turn the page
- 9 here, it has CFL costs. Actually these days, it's
- 10 telling these folks. So really right there, it
- 11 admits to me.
- 12 Number two, I've had to go to United
- 13 Services for assistance because I'm on a very fixed
- 14 income, less than \$1,000 a month, and I have called
- 15 the electric before, on the level or the loss, and
- 16 until very recently, about maybe three months ago,
- 17 there was a man that was sitting there which is the
- 18 same type that was in there when it was an office
- 19 building before it was an office, and they finally
- 20 changed it. But by then, my electric bill was
- 21 getting up in the thousand dollar range. So I
- 22 mean, I had a huge between move that kind of stuff.
- 23 They also said something in their
- 24 pamphlet about saving on heating and cooling and
- 25 you see a program of double standard. Yeah, I've

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- 1 got one, I've got the only in the bill.
- 2 (Inaudible) in my bill. And it's simply that I
- 3 should not have to tell them about my (inaudible)
- 4 in my heating and air conditioning system. And I
- 5 showed them everything else, was down on kilowatts.
- 6 (Inaudible) is telling me to do it the same.
- 7 (Inaudible) on people, and I don't have the luxury
- 8 of the wind (inaudible).
- 9 I live in the hood (inaudible) which is
- 10 obviously low income. I'm on Section 8 now and you
- 11 know, it's like we're barely getting by. And I
- 12 could understand a rate increase if it was like
- 13 to 12, or even 15, but not \$25. That's
- 14 preposterous. (Inaudible) with KCPL, I would
- 15 demand that if at all possible, you guys reject
- 16 this rate increase. If they need the money that
- 17 bad, let them (inaudible) like the school district
- 18 still does. Thank you.
- 19 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Mr. McBride, what did
- 20 you say you were mandated in your apartment
- 21 building?
- 22 MR. MCBRIDE: It was about three months
- 23 ago, they replaced all of them, you know, and I
- 24 would say about 80 percent of the meters were
- 25 demand. On my floor, you know, all the meters were

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- demand except for Apartment 1706, and I'm 1707. So
- 2 they quit selling that very recently, and I called
- 3 KCPL on this before and they have said, "We ain't
- 4 got no demand meter in there," but now, I don't
- 5 know if I had had my Time Warner cable cut off, and
- 6 the cable, that should be in the same room as the
- 7 meters. (Inaudible.)
- 8 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Thank you for your
- 9 testimony, sir. Thank you for being here tonight.
- 10 MR. MCBRIDE: Thank you.
- 11 COMMISSIONER RUPP: So when you called
- 12 the company, they said that there were no demand
- 13 meters there?
- 14 MR. MCBRIDE: Right.
- 15 COMMISSIONER RUPP: But there actually
- 16 was?
- 17 MR. MCBRIDE: Yes.
- 18 COMMISSIONER RUPP: Thank you, sir.
- MR. MCBRIDE: Thank you.
- JUDGE BUSHMANN: Ben Proffer.
- 21 BEN PROFFER, duly affirmed by Judge
- 22 Bushmann, testified as follows:
- JUDGE BUSHMANN: Would you please state
- your name and spell your last name?
- MR. PROFFER: Ben Proffer, that's P-R-O-

Page 47 F-F-E-R. 1 2 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live? 3 MR. PROFFER: Kansas City, Missouri. 4 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Go ahead. MR. PROFFER: I wasn't going to say 5 6 anything because I didn't know very much about the 7 rate increase or the reason for it, but I'm also on 8 the Kansas City Environmental Management 9 Commission, and when I heard that the rate increase 10 was because the EPA is demanding that Kansas City Power & Light retrofit its power plants to better 11 serve the public health and the environment, I felt 12 13 compelled to come here today. 14 I don't have any figures. Mr. Jackson had all those and his testimony was very, very 15 16 compelling. But I would say that I agree with the 17 data, which it's part of the public's testimony 18 that the increase should be denied because it's not 19 customer service costs, it's mandated by the Federal Government. 20 21 I ask the Commission as you decide this 22 matter, you have to decide whether or not to let 23 the public (inaudible) did this whether or not it's right, its mandated cost for service to the public 24 25 and we have the most desperately poor customers

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- 1 part if the rate increase happens. Again, more
- 2 people that are more closely affected do that than
- 3 I have leave in testimony, then again, it's very
- 4 compelling.
- 5 Furthermore, I think you're going to
- 6 have to ask yourselves during the current plan,
- 7 Jeff City, there were stories in the newspaper
- 8 about the welfare being cut, Jeff City talking
- 9 about denying people even the basic cost to
- 10 survive, during a time when there has never been a
- 11 greater disparity in the income in the United
- 12 States.
- 13 Who are these shareholders from Kansas
- 14 City Power & Light who won't have to worry about
- 15 paying rent, or public I'm sorry. So in terms of
- 16 whether or not it's prudent, I would say no, it's
- 17 not. Whether or not it's right, I would also say
- 18 no, it's not right.
- 19 If anything, the company owes the public
- 20 in the interest of public health, in the past by
- 21 the coal fired power plants, and if it costs the
- 22 record that it's the energy that's produced that we
- 23 have no choice but to consume. It's basically
- 24 asking us to pay for monies though. It's going to
- 25 correct to abuse and I wish for Kansas City Power &

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- 1 Light to be proud to make the (inaudible) of this,
- 2 and I don't think 2 percent wind power is nearly
- 3 enough. And Missouri discourages the public from
- 4 supporting greater (inaudible.)
- 5 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Questions? Thank you
- 6 very much.
- 7 UNKNOWN: I got a question for you. I
- 8 was wondering what your organization thinks about
- 9 the smart meters they're putting in, if it's even
- 10 more on PCB's and stuff.
- 11 JUDGE BUSHMANN: You can talk about that
- 12 in the back, so we can continue on with the
- 13 hearing.
- 14 DAVID BENNETT, duly affirmed by Judge
- 15 Bushmann, testified as follows:
- JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name
- 17 and spell your last name.
- 18 MR. BENNETT: My name is David Bennett,
- 19 B-E-N-N-E-T-T.
- JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live?
- MR. BENNETT: In Buckner, Missouri.
- JUDGE BUSHMANN: Go ahead.
- MR. BENNETT: I've listened to the other
- 24 testimony that was redundant, but obviously, the
- 25 flat rate is going to hurt a lot of people, they

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- 1 don't have control, and they'll get an increase out
- 2 the user side or more use, which, to pay for it.
- 3 The other thing is anyway, a person asked a
- 4 question about the meter, replacing the meter.
- 5 This should have been an ongoing part of their
- 6 maintenance, and there are years that and you've
- 7 got to replace them. Then you add this increase to
- 8 say, "Well, we're going to replace the meters,"
- 9 things that should have been maintained all along
- 10 aren't being maintained, and I've worked in this -
- 11 as a matter of fact, I've worked there on this
- 12 upgrade and I'll tell you the ongoing maintenance
- is poor.
- 14 Their maintenance is like you driving
- 15 your car and not putting oil in it and then the
- 16 engine blows up and it costs you a lot more than an
- 17 oil change is going to cost. And now they want to
- 18 pass this onto to the consumer for the lack of good
- 19 maintenance on these things and they have an
- 20 obligation to the consumer, especially the consumer
- 21 that has noplace else to go, and we're a captive
- 22 consumer, there's no competition. They need to
- 23 make sure these things are maintained and not
- 24 trying to roll them over into a rate increase like
- 25 they're doing now. Thank you.

Page 51 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Questions? 1 Thank you 2 for being here. Rudolph Pieters. 3 RUDOLPH PIETERS, duly affirmed by Judge 4 Bushmann, testified as follows: JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name 5 6 and spell your last name. 7 MR. PIETERS: My last name is Pieters, P-8 I-E-T-E-R-S, and I live in Raytown, Missouri. 9 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Go ahead. 10 MR. PIETERS: I'm not going to be very 11 long. But one of the issues that was brought up and I'd say this is a better way of going about it. 12 Whether than a flat service charge, if you do need 13 the rate increase, do it on the use of it. 14 The reason I say that is this, over the 15 16 last few years, me personally at my house in 17 Raytown, I have spent money on putting in more 18 energy efficient lights, bulbs, LED's. I have 19 changed the light fixtures, put on the T flow versus the T8 to make it more efficient. I have 20 21 put in LED bars on the under cabinets, so I went 22 from one fixture that was fifteen watts at the time 23 it was on to using a fixture down to (inaudible) in

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two spots. So we're talking about recuperating

costs.

24

25

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- 1 Well, I thought that over time, that I
- 2 would see my light bill decrease, so to recuperate
- 3 my costs. And I want to say that KCP&L has their
- 4 costs to recuperate as well, but I don't think that
- 5 necessarily this is the way to go about it, by
- 6 putting more of the increase on the flat, and I do
- 7 have, on the fixed part. I think more of it should
- 8 be on the user end of it, because the less you use,
- 9 hypothetically, is the less you pay.
- 10 But at the same time, I feel like my
- 11 efforts and I second or third, the statements that
- 12 were made earlier regarding that this creates a
- 13 less incentive to be energy efficient. I feel like
- 14 my efforts and my own money, and I've spent
- 15 probably in the neighborhood of 200 plus, I was
- 16 buying these lights fixtures, and now I put them in
- 17 myself so I didn't have to pay the electric folks,
- 18 but, and I noticed that in the last nine bills that
- 19 I have, six of them have shown the decrease in
- 20 kilowatt hours. So whatever I'm doing is working
- 21 and it's exactly that over a period of time.
- However, with a rate increase coming
- down, it's not going to work and I feel like my
- 24 efforts, in a way they were wasted, and I feel like
- 25 I'm against this rate increase. This half, I know

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- 1 that companies have to spend money and they have to
- 2 recuperate some of the costs, but not this. If
- 3 there was a more factual reason that they need a
- 4 rate increase, begin on the user end of it because
- 5 my feeling, I don't understand, make somebody pay
- 6 (inaudible) charges for kilowatts, one is 600 and
- 7 another one is 840.
- 8 It's weird to me, so based on
- 9 (inaudible), I don't understand why there's some
- 10 monthly flat okay, this is how much you pay per
- 11 kilowatt hour. So again, I would just like to say
- 12 that it's not just about me. It's about thousands
- of KCP&L customers in this area, and yeah.
- 14 It is it will hurt, on the lower
- 15 income brackets, the hardest. I do feel that we
- 16 are at a time where if you live in Kansas City, you
- 17 are seeing tremendous water increases. As a matter
- 18 of fact, in Raytown, they want to increase the
- 19 water rates there too. So, you know, let us find
- 20 different ways to reduce our energy consumption
- 21 because putting it on the customer charge does not
- 22 support the cause. We need (inaudible), but
- 23 putting it on the user end so that people can find
- 24 different ways to make their homes or their
- 25 apartments sufficient by buying LED bulbs or

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- 1 changing out light fixtures and so forth so that we
- 2 can continue, because see, I believe in the
- 3 environment too, so I believe that my contributions
- 4 at my own household is using less power.
- 5 I'm using a smaller power equipment, but
- 6 at the same time, I want to be compensated for my
- 7 efforts through a lower electric bill, a lower
- 8 electrical bill. But if you approve this rate
- 9 increase, you're going to say to all of the people
- 10 who have done these things, and I know other people
- 11 who are going through their houses and doing the
- 12 same exact thing. It was a good try, but now
- 13 they're going to approve a rate increase and the
- 14 money you've tried to be saving, well, you're just
- 15 going to spend it anyway. Thank you.
- 16 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Thank you for your time
- 17 and testimony here tonight. If you need some
- 18 further clarification on some line items on your
- 19 bill, I would encourage you to take a minute and
- 20 talk to the representatives from KCP&L or our
- 21 office or the Office of Public Counsel will be able
- 22 to provide you some clarity with respect to each of
- 23 the line items. Thanks again.
- MR. PIETERS: Thank you.
- JUDGE BUSHMANN: Jamekia Kendrix.

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- 1 JAMEKIA KENDRIX, duly affirmed by Judge
- 2 Bushmann, testified as follows:
- JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name
- 4 and spell your last name.
- 5 MS. KENDRIX: Jamekia, I'll spell both,
- 6 J-A-M-E-K-I-A, Kendrix, K-E-N-D-R-I-X.
- 7 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live?
- 8 MS. KENDRIX: 3316 Benton Boulevard,
- 9 Kansas City, Missouri. First, I want to thank you
- 10 all for having the Public Hearing and inviting us
- 11 here to speak. I'm actually running for City
- 12 Council in the Third District, so I've done a lot
- of research on demographics in that area, and my
- 14 testimony is going to focus on that area, as it
- 15 relates to the rate increase.
- And it's my understanding that you all
- are here to protect the interest of the residents,
- 18 seeing how KCPL is essentially a monopoly. And so,
- 19 and then you're also to determine whether things
- 20 are prudent, and so I went to look up the
- 21 definition of prudent, just to make sure that I'm
- 22 asking you for the right things. And it is, a
- 23 prudent act is one that shows care and thought will
- 24 be ensured. And, so my testimony is going to kind
- 25 of focus on that.

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- 1 Within the Third District, the
- 2 boundaries of that are Independence Avenue to 54th
- 3 Street, these are the rough boundaries, and the
- 4 eastern most boundary of Kansas City. And in that
- 5 area, there's only about 75,000 people out the
- 6 about half million that are in Kansas City.
- 7 This is one of our most blighted
- 8 communities, and to describe, I actually the U.S.
- 9 Environmental Protection Agency has had indicators
- 10 of like, which would be low income, high racial,
- 11 and undeveloped lots or vacant properties. So in
- 12 the Third District, even though the medium income
- 13 for Kansas City is \$57,000, the Third District
- 14 income is \$26,000 a year, and that household size
- 15 is 2.5. Poverty in this area is 36 percent, which
- means 27,128 people are living below the poverty
- 17 level in this area. 17,000 of those are seniors,
- 18 who are over the age of 65. Within this area, we
- 19 have 26 percent of our houses that are actually
- 20 vacant. We had 55 percent of our homes that are
- 21 being rented and 76 percent of our homes that were
- 22 built before 1970, which is when insulation codes
- 23 weren't active.
- We have an unemployment rate of of
- 25 percent, that's 5,159 individuals were unemployed,

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- and the rate of homes in our area, there's 10,622
- 2 vacant homes in the Third District, that is 26
- 3 percent of our housing.
- 4 So I give you all this information to
- 5 paint a picture of what we're looking at in one
- 6 community or one area that KCP&L serves. And then,
- 7 at a meeting on April 23rd, we talked about the
- 8 programs that KCPL has, two active programs for
- 9 those who can't afford to pay their bills. That
- 10 was expected to increase by 8 percent, that's what
- 11 they were asking for. When I asked for the number
- on that, it's 1,500 residents, which is a 50
- 13 percent increase.
- So what that says is, with our seniors
- 15 for a in the Third District alone, there would be
- 16 200 who are still not served by these programs,
- 17 even with an 8 percent increase. So this is about
- 18 78,330 residential customers that I was told that
- 19 KCP&L had on April 23rd.
- I also wanted to look at the hourly
- 21 cost, because in Jeff City, that you spend around
- 22 30 percent of your income on housing. In the Third
- 23 District, 3,175 of our homeowners are saving 35
- 24 percent more on their housing, and there are 8,692
- 25 folks who are actually regulars for spending 35

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- 1 percent or more on housing. Mainly, I'm just
- 2 talking about fixed incomes for individuals and how
- 3 that affects them. I'd like to talk about the use
- 4 a lot, and so I wanted to look at how many seniors
- 5 are in the Third District who are actually on a
- 6 fixed income. So we have 8,781 individuals in this
- 7 area that on Social Security, 1,851 who are
- 8 receiving public assistance.
- 9 So why am I getting involved in this?
- 10 There's 25,628 individuals who would still be
- 11 looking for assistance because we had over
- 12 who are living below the poverty level. Even if
- 13 all of those dollars are going towards these
- 14 programs that help low income folks or directed
- 15 towards people specifically in the Third District
- 16 living under the poverty level. And as I said
- 17 before, we have 220 seniors who still are not
- 18 served.
- 19 So Kansas City Power & Light has come to
- 20 you and asked for rate increases, and because I
- 21 understand they've had about 50 percent increase
- 22 over the last eight years. And, so they don't have
- 23 any intention if we continue to approve rate
- 24 increases, to look elsewhere. They're not looking
- 25 at grant funding which was said earlier today.

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- 1 They're not looking at even increasing the usage
- 2 rate for corporate or small businesses, even though
- 3 they represent about half of the customer base that
- 4 they have, according to one of the gentlemen who
- 5 testified earlier. And, so what I'd like for you
- 6 to do is look towards the future.
- 7 In the Third District, we are completely
- 8 blighted, we have people moving out all of the
- 9 time. Over the last four years, ours has gone from
- 10 to over 11,000, which is the number I just
- 11 gave you. And part of the reason for this is
- 12 because people are not coming to live in this area
- 13 because it's not affordable, and when we have homes
- 14 that were made before 1970, you're using more
- 15 energy to heat and cool those homes. You're
- 16 spending more on energy, and so you're putting it
- 17 an unfair burden on these folks who cannot afford
- 18 it.
- 19 And I understand that Kansas City Power
- 20 & Light, look at their entire customer base, will
- 21 determine what they're doing. But when you take
- these small pockets, and actually it's not that
- 23 small, but when you takes these pockets of poverty
- 24 that are in the City, this is an unfair charge for
- 25 these folks. This is not looking towards the

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- 1 future of Kansas City, because Kansas City cannot
- 2 move forward if all its residents cannot.
- 3 And, so I'm going to ask that utilities
- 4 look at increasing the corporate user rates. You
- 5 don't have to increase it by 280 percent like
- 6 you're trying to do to residential, but you need to
- 7 at least look at it. Also, to look at increasing
- 8 the amount of assistance, look at the amount of
- 9 money that's allotted towards those assistance
- 10 programs.
- Because what you're doing right now is
- 12 causing us, the taxpayers, to pay on the back end,
- 13 because the people who cannot afford to pay these
- 14 bills are going to non-profit organizations, and
- 15 those organizations to figure out, "How do I get
- 16 the money to meet the X," and that's taxpayer
- 17 money. And KCP&L does not come to taxpayers and
- 18 ask us if we approve the improvements at those
- 19 rates.
- They didn't ask us if we wanted electric
- 21 vehicle charging stations. They didn't ask us
- 22 about the Wolf Creek Nuclear Generation Station.
- 23 But we're paying for it with our tax dollars by
- 24 subsidizing the electric bills for these folks who
- 25 can't afford to pay.

Page 61 In the Third District alone, that's over 1 2 25,000 people. And, so I'm asking you to actually 3 not give them the rate increase and ask KCPL to 4 look at some other things in order to meet their needs, as well as to do things that look toward the 5 future of their customers and our community, rather 7 than just looking towards the money that their 8 shareholders need to get, and the money that they 9 need to cover expenses that they chose to make, 10 without even coming to us. And I believe that's it. 11 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Ms. Kendrix, thank you 12 for taking the time to be here tonight. The 25,000 13 14 people that you indicated, those are the 25,000 people just in the Third District living below 15 16 poverty level? 17 MS. KENDRIX: Yes, yes. 18 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: And that's the 19 federally defined poverty level? 20 MS. KENDRIX: Yes. 21 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Is that 25,000 individuals or 25,000 households? 22 23 MR. KENDRIX: Individuals. 24 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Okay. 25 MS. KENDRIX: And this is American

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- 1 Community Survey from 2013 data, rather than 2015
- 2 date, so that's the American Community Survey 2013
- 3 data.
- 4 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Thank you very much for
- 5 being here tonight.
- 6 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you for your
- 7 testimony.
- 8 COMMISSIONER KENNEY: Ms. Kendrix, thank
- 9 you for being here. I've been a Kansas City
- 10 resident since 1979 and I'm in the area of Kansas
- 11 City now. When is your election?
- MS. KENDRIX: June 23rd.
- 13 COMMISSIONER KENNEY: Kind of close
- 14 coming up. But I just wanted to compliment you for
- 15 having had your children here so that they can
- 16 educate from the experience, and the City needs
- 17 individuals like you.
- 18 MS. KENDRIX: Thank you. Thank you.
- 19 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Johnell Davis.
- JOHNELL DAVIS, duly affirmed by Judge
- 21 Bushmann, testified as follows:
- JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name
- 23 and spell your last name.
- MR. DAVIS: My name is Johnell Davis. My
- 25 last name is D-A-V-I-S.

Page 63 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live? 1 2 MR. DAVIS: Kansas City, Missouri. 3 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please go ahead. 4 MR. DAVIS: I'm totally against this increase. In the last eight years, you've had 5 6 percent total percent increase, and now you want 7 more. When are you going to stop? I mean, in 8 eight years, you didn't do nothing with the first 9 increase to maintenance this equipment. 10 Everybody here has spoke about buying bulbs and appliance, Star appliances and things of 11 12 that nature, to cut back energy costs in our homes. 13 I'm another person that bought the Star appliances and all that. So by you cutting back energy, KCP&L 14 should have known they're not making enough money 15 16 because they're cutting back energy, so let's raise 17 the price. 18 So it's like people has gone to the 19 trouble to right it and it isn't enough. Since 20 we're not using as much, they've upped the ante. 21 This has to stop. There's been rate increase after 22 rate increase, and they should be having enough 23 money (inaudible) the consumer to give, when are 24 they going to bring what they want to the 25 shareholders. Why don't the shareholders, why

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- 1 don't they stop taking so big of a check home,
- 2 because they don't have these problems of how to
- 3 pay their bills. They don't have these problems
- 4 with their utilities. Only the ones working 9 to
- 5.
- 6 The wages are not going up, but
- 7 everything else is. So if you care about the
- 8 people here, you at the Commission, you care about
- 9 us, then do something about it. Do something for
- 10 us, do something for us. Tell the big companies,
- 11 "No more. No more, cut it out, stop it."
- 12 My whole house is electric, I can't
- 13 afford another increase. I can't, and I work every
- 14 day, two jobs. I'm barely home at times, I'm
- 15 working, and I'm barely making ends meet working
- 16 two jobs, and my wife works, and I have no kids.
- 17 All I have is utilities. I got a water bill today
- 18 for \$170 all for one month.
- 19 So I don't understand when is going to
- 20 stop. People are hurting. People are actually
- 21 hurting because they have to make a choice, food or
- 22 utilities make a meal, especially if you don't
- 23 have the utilities to even cook a meal. People use
- 24 their barbecue grills to cook their dinner on
- 25 because that's all they can use. They don't have

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- 1 gas, they don't have electric.
- 2 It's like going to the stone age again,
- 3 cooking outside. That's what happens in my
- 4 neighborhood, grills all over the back porch, front
- 5 porch, everybody using grills. It needs to stop,
- 6 and you guys are the only ones that can stop it.
- 7 Thank you.
- 8 JUDGE BUSHMANN: That's all the names
- 9 that are on the list. Was there anybody else
- 10 that's not on the list that would like to speak?
- 11 Yes?
- DANITA KAMEHAMEHA, duly affirmed by
- 13 Judge Bushmann, testified as follows:
- 14 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Could you state your
- 15 name and spell your last name?
- 16 MS. KAMEHAMEHA: My name is Danita
- 17 Kamehameha, so K-A-M-E-H-A-M-E-H-A. I want to
- 18 thank you gentlemen for being here. And I've heard
- 19 the testimony and I must say, the people of
- 20 Missouri are really involved here. As someone
- 21 said, the seniors are suffering, they aren't making
- 22 ends meet. Many of them are losing their homes,
- and they're losing because they don't have gas, you
- 24 can't stay in your home. If you can't have lights,
- 25 you can't see. All this, and if you don't have

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- water, then, you know, it's not healthy for you to
 be in your home. So they're losing their homes,
- 2 and it's a shame. And then they go to a senior facility, many of them may have to life pills, and
- 3 they get kicked again.
 - So I'm saying to the Public Commission,
- 4 you know, we're not supposed to have a monopoly in this country, but the gas, one gas company, one
- 5 light company, one water company. I think it's time for us to consider that immoral. Are we
- 6 paying for the Power & Light District? This is all we've got? Because seniors don't have time for
- 7 entertainment, they're too busy trying to put their fence together, to determine whether they're going
- 8 to have food or are they going to have to stay in their senior facilities if they can afford it, or
- 9 go to a home, and I think it's disgraceful.

But I know they're good people at Power

- 10 & Light Company because there are people who are working to feed us. They've been working for the
- 11 company, and I know they're good people here too. But the point is, greed has set in this country.
- 12 Corporations are taking advantage of the very people they're supposed to serve, and I'm asking
- 13 the Commission to please consider the low income people, seniors, disabled people, and people with
- mental disabilities and, you know, they don't have it. What are you going to do for the people with
- 15 (inaudible)? If we can't afford to pay the light bill, that means we can't afford to be here.
- 16 That's what that means.
 - So I'm asking the Commission to please
- 17 consider not allowing this rate increase. If they want to increase, do a very small increase. You're
- not suffering. It's not like you're going to lose money. If you're going to lose money, that's
- 19 different. I know that you have certain costs, that's understandable, but reasonable costs.
- 20 Don't make the people suffer because you
- want more money. It has to be more than that, and I think there is a moral issue here with companies,
- and people living in this country. For those of
- 22 you who live in this country and work for
- corporations, you have a moral issue and Americans
- are suffering seriously. You're going to have more people on the street. We're going to have children
- on the street, mothers who can't afford these things. So I'm asking of the Commission, I'm
- 25 asking you to bring your rates down to a reasonable
