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1	(Hearing commenced at 7:00 p.m.)			
2	PROCEEDINGS			
3	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Good evening, everyone. Once			
4	again, my name is Morris Woodruff. I'm the presiding			
5	officer here, a Regulatory Law Judge for the Public Service			
6	Commission. And to my left, we have one of five			
7	commissioners, Commissioner Stephen Stoll.			
8	COMMISSIONER STOLL: I wanted to just briefly			
9	bring greetings from the Commission. Obviously I'm the			
10	only one here this evening. We had an earlier local public			
11	hearing and three of us attended that one. But because of			
12	scheduling, I'm the only one here this evening. But I			
13	wanted to reassure you that those who aren't here will be			
14	looking at reading the transcript. We have a court			
15	reporter here that will be recording every word. And those			
16	will be ready for review in just a couple days, so they			
17	will be looking at those.			
18	I also wanted to mention a couple things.			
19	This is the beginning of the process in this rate case. We			
20	start with the local public hearings, and then beginning			
21	the last few days in February we begin what are called			
22	evidentiary hearings in Jefferson City. You could even			
23	you can attend those, but you would probably be more likely			
24	to look at them online. You can go to the website			
25	psc.mo.gov and you'll see how you can actually watch the			

hearings online. And it might be good to do that if you 1 2 have the opportunity. They will -- they are scheduled for 3 several weeks, and you'll kind of get a flavor for how we make our decisions. We don't take any of this lightly. 4 5 I mentioned the court reporter. I mentioned the transcript. And lastly, I look forward to and my 6 7 fellow commissioners look forward to reading and hearing your comments this evening. So thanks for coming out on 8 9 this foggy night, and I look forward to hearing your 10 comments. 11 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you, Commissioner. The 12 process is that we have a -- I have a sign-up sheet here that was out in the lobby when you came in, so I'll call 13 14 that in the order that they were signed. And after those people have a chance to speak, if there's anyone else out 15 16 there who wants to come forward and testify we'll give you 17 an opportunity to do that also. You may have noticed the screen up here. 18 We try to -- we ask people to try and limit their comments to 19 20 about five minutes just so that they can respect everyone 21 else that wants to get their chance to testify as well. So 22 this will be counting down. It will actually ding when you 23 get to five minutes. Don't feel like -- I'm not going to 24 shut off the microphone or anything. When you get to five 25 minutes, if you want to finish your thoughts, we'll welcome

that. But try to keep that in mind, about five minutes. 1 2 I'll call you up here and ask you to come up to the podium, and I'll swear you in to tell the truth, the 3 whole truth and nothing but the truth, and then I'll give 4 you a chance to tell the Commission whatever it is that you 5 б want to tell us. 7 So with that, we will call the first witness, which is -- oh, I'm sorry, there is one more thing we have 8 9 to do. Thanks, Commissioner, for reminding me. We need to 10 take entries of appearance from the attorneys who are representing the parties. For Ameren? 11 12 MS. GRUBBS: Thank you, your Honor. I'm Jermaine Grubbs. I'm here tonight be behalf of Union 13 14 Electric Company doing business as Ameren Missouri. Thank 15 you. 16 JUDGE WOODRUFF: And for the Staff? 17 MS. MYERS: I'm Jamie Myers for the Staff of 18 the Public Service Commission. JUDGE WOODRUFF: And Public Counsel? 19 20 MS. SHEMWELL: Good evening, Lera Shemwell 21 representing Office of Public Counsel and the public. 22 JUDGE WOODRUFF: And there are other parties in the case that are not represented here tonight. 23 24 All right. I'll call the first person, which 25 is Patricia Schuba. There you are.

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MS. SCHUBA: I didn't think I was the first 1 2 person speaking. 3 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Actually, the first person that signed the list included a notation that she wanted to 4 5 be the last person to speak. MS. SCHUBA: No, I didn't. 6 7 JUDGE WOODRUFF: No, you weren't the first on 8 the list. You are the first person that didn't request to 9 be the last person. 10 MS. SCHUBA: Oh, okay. JUDGE WOODRUFF: Let's put it that way. 11 All right. Let me -- first of all, tell us your name and spell 12 your last name. 13 14 MS. SCHUBA: It's Patricia Schuba, S-c-h-u-b-a. 15 16 PATRICIA SCHUBA, 17 of lawful age, having been first duly sworn or affirmed to testify the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the 18 truth in the case aforesaid, deposes as follows: 19 20 JUDGE WOODRUFF: What would you like to tell 21 us? 22 MS. SCHUBA: First I'd like to say thank you 23 for being here tonight and allowing us to have a meeting in 24 Union. That wasn't always the case. And we appreciate it 25 because we live next to the largest power plant in the

1 state. It happens to be an Ameren plant. So it's good 2 that you're here. 3 I wanted to say, in looking at the rate case, from the perspective of somebody close to the power plant 4 and sort of absorbing local factors of pollution that we 5 would prefer that the Public Service Commission supports 6 7 the move for clean energy. And I was very happy to hear tonight them talking about it and talking about making the 8 9 transition to clean energy, funding that, closing large 10 power plants. I think that's in the interest of all of us. So I would ask that the Public Service 11 Commission be very critical of the cost increases they are 12 asking for and make sure they support that transition, 13 14 because that's where everyone's looking is forward five, ten, fifteen, twenty years to where we'll have clean 15 16 energy. And that cannot come too quickly. So if we continue to support the building of the Labadie landfill 17 for the deposition of coal waste, we're just supporting the 18 further life of these plants to burn dirty energy, which 19 20 liberates the things that we heard about earlier about 21 arsenic, lead, mercury into the environment. 22 Even with all of the changes that they've 23 made, we'll have even less mercury being liberated into the 24 environment. The last time the filed that information with 25 the EPA it was well over 800 pounds per year. And that's

1	in the air, coming down over water bodies or coming in
2	contact with people in the area immediately around the
3	power plant, which is a nonattainment area for SO2.
4	There's 23,000 people who live there. And a lot of them
5	are children, elderly and people who are sick.
6	So as a Missouri Public Service Commission, if
7	you could keep a special eye toward that in looking at this
8	specific case that we're now on the brink of looking
9	forward to renewable or cleaner energy, that we make sure
10	we're supporting that, not the extension of a life with
11	dirty coal plants. Thank you very much.
12	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you. Any questions?
13	COMMISSIONER STOLL: No questions. Thank you
14	for your testimony.
15	MS. SCHUBA: Thank you. And thank you for
16	always listening to the public. We appreciate it.
17	COMMISSIONER STOLL: You're welcome.
18	MS. SCHUBA: Thank you.
19	COMMISSIONER STOLL: Can the folks in the back
20	hear? We might need a mic check just in case. Can
21	everybody hear okay? Oh, good. Okay, never mind. I think
22	they said it's they can hear fine.
23	JUDGE WOODRUFF: You need to make sure
24	you're when people are speaking, you need to be very
25	close to the mic, I think.

1	Okay, next name is Joe is it Bachant? It's			
2	sometimes hard to decipher signatures. Sounds like I			
3	butchered your name. What is your name, sir?			
4	MR. BACHANT: Joseph Bachant.			
5	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Bachant, okay.			
6	JOSEPH BACHANT,			
7	of lawful age, having been first duly sworn or affirmed to			
8	testify the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the			
9	truth in the case aforesaid, deposes as follows:			
10	JUDGE WOODRUFF: What would you like to tell			
11	us?			
12	MR. BACHANT: First of all, my background is			
13	serving 32 years for the Missouri Department of			
14	Conservation in terms of environmental matters. And we've			
15	kicked around the term mitigation tonight, but mitigation			
16	is just part of the overall process that I'd like to advise			
17	you about.			
18	First of all is avoidance. If there is going			
19	to be environmental impacts, try to make the implication or			
20	the consequences less. That's mitigation. And then last			
21	of all, if you have problems that have been occurring, then			
22	it's important to try to compensate. It is in the public			
23	interest at least to try to leave something as good as when			
24	you found it.			
25	Tonight I recognize there is quite a			
1				

1	difference between what the commission is seeking as far as
2	a rate increase and what the company is asking for. It
3	occurs to me that I'd like to suggest that given that
4	middle, there's probably a middle ground which is in the
5	best public interest, and I would say under the rubric in
6	your statutes of public safety.
7	There is, after all, quite a bit of
8	environmental damage that has occurred that the previous
9	speaker referred to a little bit. I could go on if I had
10	the time about all the ecological impacts that we're
11	starting to see from the use of fossil fuels over the
12	years. I believe that any sort of continued use of fossil
13	fuels has some sort of a mitigation procedure to that that
14	would help to offset some of the problems that occur as far
15	as impacts. And further on down the line, as we see these
16	lands put aside and put to rest, there could be some sort
17	of means in terms of further sequestration, if you will, of
18	some of the atmospheric greenhouse gases.
19	I think that there are opportunities for both
20	a win and a win for both the company and the public in this
21	situation. If you would take those very brief comments
22	into consideration. I thank you for your attention
23	tonight.
24	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you, sir. Any
25	questions?

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1 COMMISSIONER STOLL: No questions. Thank you 2 for your testimony. 3 Thank you, sir. MR. BACHANT: 4 COMMISSIONER STOLL: Appreciate it. 5 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Next name is Sue Nichols. MS. NICHOLS: Good evening. 6 7 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Your name is Sue Nichols? 8 MS. NICHOLS: I am. 9 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Spell your last name for the 10 court reporter. MS. NICHOLS: N-i-c-h-o-l-s. 11 12 SUE NICHOLS, of lawful age, having been first duly sworn or affirmed to 13 14 testify the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth in the case aforesaid, deposes as follows: 15 16 JUDGE WOODRUFF: What would you like to tell 17 us? 18 MS. NICHOLS: Well, I'm concerned about the elderly and those on fixed income. And I happen to be one 19 20 of those. I know Ameren has said that they have several 21 means of offering lower rates, i.e., budget billing and 22 organizations that will aid in helping pay for bills. But that really doesn't help anyone, nor does it solve the 23 problem for all. And I just want to know what -- what 24 25 about these people that are on a fixed budget that are at

1	the cusp of welfare who do not qualify for any help?
2	I recently moved to the town of Owensville and
3	there was and increase in the electricity. And I knew that
4	when I moved from the co-op. So I immediately put fans in.
5	Luckily I had shade trees. And I also opened windows. I
6	did not use air-conditioning. And I do not have children,
7	i.e., the age. And I did fine, but some of these people do
8	not do as well as I am. And they are not as healthy as I
9	am. The same for the winter, I keep my thermostat at
10	63 degrees. Now, that might be country living. But what
11	I'm worried about is these older people that cannot do what
12	I do.
13	I don't think they offer if these people
14	get their electric raised, how can they take care of
15	themselves? I have an elderly woman that I took care of.
16	She's 90 years old. She finally could not afford to pay
17	her electric. She moved in with her sister and they split
18	the bill. That's not living. There's something wrong with
19	this. It needs to be amended. So I come as a worried
20	energy user who lives on a fixed income who wants to help
21	others that are on a fixed income. That's all.
22	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you very much, ma'am.
23	Any questions?
24	COMMISSIONER STOLL: No questions. But thank
25	you, ma'am. Appreciate your testimony.

JUDGE WOODRUFF: All right. Rosalyn Pursley? 1 Good evening. If you could spell your last name for the 2 3 court reporter. MS. PURSLEY: Might have to spell the first 4 5 one too. JUDGE WOODRUFF: Well, do that too. 6 7 MS. PURSLEY: My name is Rosalyn Pursley, 8 R-o-s-a-l-y-n, Pursley, P-u-r-s-l-e-y. 9 JUDGE WOODRUFF: And I mispronounced your 10 first name, so I apologize. If you'd please raise your 11 right hand. 12 ROSALYN PURSLEY, of lawful age, having been first duly sworn or affirmed to 13 testify the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the 14 truth in the case aforesaid, deposes as follows: 15 16 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you. What would you 17 like to tell us? MS. PURSLEY: It's a credit to Ameren Missouri 18 19 that I have heard no complaints about their reliable, 20 dependable service this evening. I, too, am grateful for 21 their excellent service, and I thank you. 22 However, I feel I don't pay only for the kilowatt-hours used. I pay for dependability. If the 23 electric goes off, I can call Ameren Missouri, where I will 24 25 be assured they know the situation and they are already on

the way. They are there to repair it. I never have to 1 2 call a second time because they are a reliable company and 3 have given us excellent service at our home for over 50 4 years. 5 The monthly statement is clear and concise. I know what I am billed per kilowatt and I can also readily 6 see that the reason my bill may be slightly higher than the 7 previous month is because last December was two degrees 8 9 colder than the previous year. And January, to date, was 10 8 degrees colder than last January. I am satisfied with Ameren Missouri's 11 performance and I support their decision to update the 12 infrastructure to benefit the consumers and the rate 13 14 structure as necessary to continue the excellent service we receive today. 15 16 Until I have a power outage on Friday evening 17 at 7:00 p.m. and get a recorded message, "Thank you for your call. Our offices are closed. Please call during 18 regular business hours Monday through Friday, 8:00 to 19 20 4:30." And until then, I am a very satisfied customer. 21 Thank you. 22 COMMISSIONER STOLL: No questions. Thank you 23 for your testimony. 24 JUDGE WOODRUFF: I just have a quick question 25 out of curiosity. Are you an Ameren natural gas customer

1	also?
2	MS. PURSLEY: Natural gas, no.
3	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Just electric?
4	MS. PURSLEY: No, we live in the country.
5	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Okay. Thank you.
6	MS. PURSLEY: Thank you.
7	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Is there anyone else in the
8	audience who didn't sign the sheet who wants to come
9	forward and testify? I don't see any hands going up.
10	All right then. Thank you all for coming and
11	we will be adjourned. And please drive safely out in the
12	fog.
