4	time is 6:37 p.m. My name is Ken Seyer. I'm a
5	Regulatory Law Judge with the Missouri Public Service
б	Commission and will preside over this hearing. The
7	Commission has set this time for a local public hearing
8	in File No. ER-2022-0337, which is captioned as In the
9	Matter of Union Electric Company d/b/a Ameren Missouri's
10	Tariffs to Adjust Its Revenues for Electric Service.
11	The Commission has scheduled this local public
12	hearing to give members of the public a chance to
13	comment about Ameren Missouri's rate case. The Missouri
14	Public Service Commission regulates the rates charged by
15	public utility companies in Missouri to ensure that
16	those rates are just and reasonable. The Commission
17	also regulates the quality of service and safety of the
18	operations of public utilities.
19	Ameren Missouri is a public utility under the
20	Missouri statutes and as such is subject to regulation
21	by the Commission. The Commission is made up of five
22	Commissioners. The Commissioners are appointed by the
23	Governor to fixed terms and confirmed by the Senate.
24	The Commissioners employ a staff of engineers,
25	accountants, attorneys, financial analysts and other
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1	Page 4 specialists in the field of utility regulation.
2	The Commission currently has a vacancy, and so
3	there are currently four Commissioners. And we do have
4	Commissioner Maida Coleman here in person. And
5	Commissioner Holsman, I heard you. Are there any other
6	Commissioners on?
7	All right. This is an official proceeding of
8	the Missouri Public Service Commission, and the
9	statements and testimony of witnesses will be recorded
10	by a court reporter and must be given under oath. Once
11	the hearing testimony is transcribed, the Commissioners

4	I'm sure none of you have a bill this high. I have a
5	little statement I wrote up. I'm going to read it here.

7	their woke agenda, solar panels, windmills, which are
8	unsustainable. Submitting to the radical agenda of the
9	EPA gestapo is causing electric utility rates to become
10	unsustainable. We are burdened with double interest
11	rates thanks to the Biden regime and 20 percent
12	inflation.
13	We don't need Ameren and the utility
14	commission to continue to raise our utility rates to a
15	point where we can no longer afford to pay our utility
16	bills. Our wages have not increased. Neither have
17	retirement benefits, certainly not mine for us seniors.
18	Yet Ameren can afford to send their lobbyists
19	to Jefferson City and bribe politicians to look the

3	getting \$3 million, just over \$3 million a year.
4	Michael Moehn, \$2,369,137. And so he's getting almost

б	Richard Mark, \$2,028,542. And some other guy, I can't
7	pronounce his name, it's some foreign name, but he's
8	making over a million. So these people are making
9	millions of dollars every year. They make more money
10	than I make in my whole life. And how And I'm paying
11	for it. And the problem with Ameren is it's a monopoly.
12	It's a monopoly. So they can do whatever they want.
13	Anyway, you people tell us to go to our local
14	agencies if we are unable to pay our electric bills.
15	Well, the only agency in my area is East Missouri Action
16	agency, and they run out of money before we even apply
17	for assistance. I mean, the druggies, they don't have
18	any income. So of course they run to Ameren and Ameren
19	gives those druggies money. And they even when decent
20	people need it, there's no money left. So forget about
21	East Missouri Action agency. They're the only ones I
22	know of around.
23	On the other hand, Ameren just gave \$1 million
24	to some organization called Beyond Housing in north St.
25	Louis County, which I might add, I'm not prejudiced but

1	Page 10 I think Ameren is, because these people in north St.
2	Louis County are all blacks. They're all black people.
3	Now, is there anything wrong with helping black people
4	out? None. It's fine. Why don't they help us out too.
5	I mean, where is the financial assistance for the rest

7	see any.
8	So I think this whole thing with Ameren has
9	been a scam and continues to be a scam and it's going to
10	continue to be a scam until we get some decent
