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Page 4 1 The following proceedings began at 6:16 p.m.: 2 JUDGE CLARK: Why don't we go ahead and go on 3 the record. Good evening. It's February 1st of 2023, and the current time is 6:16 p.m. The question and 4 answer portion of the hearing just ended. If you had 5 questions about this rate case, I hope you were able to 6 7 get answers to those. Now, the Missouri Public Service Commission 8 has set aside this time for a local public hearing in 9 10 File Number No. ER-2022-0337, a general rate case which is captioned as In the Matter of Union Electric Company 11 12 d/b/a as Ameren Missouri's Tariffs to Adjust its Revenues for Electric Service. 13 My name is John Clark, and I'm the Regulatory 14 15 Law Judge overseeing this hearing this evening. the Missouri Public Service Commission regulates the 16 17 rates charged by investor-owned utility companies in 18 Missouri to ensure that those rates are just and 19 reasonable. The Commission also regulates the quality of service and the safety of operations of 20 21 investor-owned utilities. 22 Now, the Commission is made up of five 23 Commissioners: Chairman Scott Rupp and Commissioners Maida Coleman, Jason Holsman and Glen Kolkmeyer. 24 25 Commission seat is currently vacant. Now, the

Public Service Commission - Public Hearing February 01, 2023 Page 5 Commissioners are appointed by the Governor to fixed 1 2 terms and confirmed by the Senate. The Commissioners 3 employ a staff of engineers, accountants, attorneys, financial analysts and other specialists in the field of 4 5 utility regulation. Now, the Commissioners that are with me today 7 are Commission Chairman Scott Rupp, Commissioner Maida 8 Coleman and Commissioner Jason Holsman, and they are 9 participating tonight via WebEx. And would any of the Commissioners like to make an opening statement? 10 11 CHAIRMAN RUPP: No, thanks, Judge, but I think Commissioner Kolkmeyer is also on the line. 12 13 JUDGE CLARK: I apologize. I'm sorry. And Commissioner Kolkmeyer is here, so we have a full house 14 15 of Commissioners this evening. 16 Now, there's a court reporter sitting next to 17 So if you make your comments, be aware that a court 18 reporter is going to be taking those down for the record 19 so that we can review those comments later should we 20 need to. 21 I'm going to begin by asking counsel to enter 22 their appearance for the record starting with Ameren

Page 6 1 hearing this evening. Thank you. 2 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you, Mr. Lowery. For the Commission Staff? 3 MS. ASLIN: Casi Aslin for Commission Staff 4 5 and my contact information has been provided to the 6 court reporter. 7 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you, Ms. Aslin. And on behalf of the Office of the Public Counsel? 8 9 MR. WILLIAMS: Nathan Williams appearing on 10 behalf of the Office of the Public Counsel and the public. I have provided my information to the court 11 12 reporter as well. Thank you, Mr. Williams. 13 JUDGE CLARK: are a number of intervenors in this case. Are there any 14 parties that are present this evening I have not called? 15 I hear nothing and see nothing. Now, for those who are 16 providing comments today, I'm going to call the names 17 18 listed on the sign-up sheet in the order they appear. 19 When I call your name, please come down to that podium right there. At that time I'm going to ask you to state 20 21 and spell your name for the court reporter for our 2.2 record. At that time I'll place you under oath and 23 you'll have an opportunity to offer your comments to the 24 Commission.

Also, after you've made your comments, please

Page 7 1 remain at the podium for just a second. I may have 2 questions for you, the Commission may have questions for 3 you, and some of the attorneys present may have questions for you. If anybody has questions, please 4 feel free to just kind of pipe up and let me know. 5 is for the attorneys and the Commission as well, because 6 7 I have no way of knowing otherwise. Now, the Commission will not be able to answer 8 any of your questions this evening. 9 That's because they 10 have to remain impartial until after the evidence is presented at the evidentiary hearing. If you have 11 12 questions about this case, please speak to representatives of the Company, Commission Staff or the 13 Office of the Public Counsel. Also, when people are up 14 here speaking at the podium, please give them the 15 respect they deserve and treat them as you yourself 16 17 would like to be treated. 18 I'm going to say, because I know there's only 19 a few people that have signed up tonight and I don't know how many people have come to just watch, if you're 20 21 on the fence about offering comments to the Commission, I would urge you to lean towards doing so. 2.2 23 Commission is going to have an opportunity to hear the parties' arguments and evidence at the evidentiary 24 25 hearing and in the parties' briefs, but this is the

2	very much want to hear what you have to say.
3	With that in mind, I'm going to call the first
4	witness to offer comments. Is there an Adam Weber
5	present? Mr. Weber, would you please come down to the
6	podium.
7	MR. WEBER: Thank you, sir.
8	JUDGE CLARK: Would you state and spell your
9	name for the record and then I'll place you under oath.
10	MR. WEBER: Yeah, Adam Weber, A-d-a-m
11	W-e-b-e-r.
12	JUDGE CLARK: And do you solemnly swear or
13	affirm that the testimony you're about to give at this
14	local public hearing this evening is the truth?
15	MR. WEBER: I do swear.
16	JUDGE CLARK: And what would you like to tell
17	the Commission this evening?
18	ADAM WEBER,
19	having been first duly sworn, testified as follows:
20	MR. WEBER: You want me to go ahead and talk
21	about the statement I prepared?
22	JUDGE CLARK: Please.
23	MR. WEBER: Okay. Thank you. So I live just
24	outside of Jefferson City here. I first want to say
25	that Ameren has always provided good and reliable

Page 9 service to my family and I believe their transmission 1 2 and distribution service is very good. We appreciate 3 that and I hope that trend continues and I have no concerns that it won't continue. 4 I am concerned, however, with Ameren's ability to provide sufficient generation in times of extreme 6 7 weather, which is when the end user needs it most, which 8 is partly what was said earlier. So from my research, I believe the following 9 10 facts to be true just in looking through things that I can find. Ameren is a member of MISO, the Midcontinent 11 12 Independent System Operator. MISO declared in 2022 that they may not have enough generation for an extreme 13 summer peak. NERC's 2022 Summer Reliability Assessment 14 15 stated that MISO was at a high risk for insufficient 16 generation for a summer peak. 17 NERC's 2022-23 Winter Reliability Assessment, 18 it was just before the winter storm in December, also 19 stated that MISO was one of four US regions with risk 20 for firm load shed during extreme weather. They stated 21 that this was because 4,200 MW of coal and nuclear generation had been retired since last winter. 2.2 23 In 2022, MISO strongly urged Ameren to keep Rush Island open until transmission improvements could 24 25 be made, which I think is a good thing. I appreciate

- 1 that. And just some things in general that I've seen
- 2 from the industry over the last couple years. MISO
- 3 released a Max Generation Alert three times since
- 4 February 2021, so two winter storms ago. I think MISO
- 5 issued an EEA-2, an Energy Emergency Alert on December
- 6 23rd of 2022. I believe MISO issued an EEA Energy
- 7 Emergency Alert-3 including load shed in February of
- 8 2021.
- 9 And there was -- In the February 2021 winter
- 10 storm, there was Manual Load Shed, including rolling
- 11 blackouts in ERCOT, SPP and MISO. And in December of
- 12 2022, during extreme weather, there was Manual Load Shed
- in the New England-ISO, PJM, TVA, utilities in North
- 14 Carolina, and in Georgia.
- I believe California-ISO has also load shed in
- 16 the recent past as well, which I believe includes every
- 17 market in the United States except the New York ISO. So
- 18 I believe from what I could tell from MISO's website
- 19 that the solar contribution to the MISO evening peak on
- 20 December 23 was zero, because it was an evening, it was
- 21 dark. And it appears the peak exceeded the NERC's
- 22 Winter Reliability Assessment's extreme weather peak
- 23 demand that was in the report, the projection that was
- 24 in the report.
- 25 So it seems to me that we're seeing load

Page 11 1 growth in our areas, and to me these facts are very 2 alarming when we see so many plants being retired before 3 we can get reliable and dispatchable generation online. So my request, I would ask that Ameren not 4 5 retire reliable and dispatchable power plants while 6 we're seeing load growth so that we can all have the 7 energy we need when we need it the most. I appreciate 8 the opportunity and I support what you guys are doing. 9 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you. I've got a couple 10 questions for you and then I'm going to ask you a 11 question about your statement if you would like. 12 You spoke very specifically about a lot of these things in a way I'm not used to hearing at public hearings. Do 13 you have a utility background of any kind? 14 15 I do, yes, but this is all from me MR. WEBER: 16 as a ratepayer for Ameren. I live just outside of 17 Jefferson City. That's fine. Can I ask what 18 JUDGE CLARK: 19 your utility background is? 20 MR. WEBER: I'm an electrical engineer. 21 JUDGE CLARK: And if I had to summarize your 2.2 two major points, it would be sufficient generation, 23 you're concerned that there won't be sufficient 24 generation during extreme weather events due to growing 25 load and the retirement of generators?

1	Page 12 MR. WEBER: That's correct. I hope that some
2	of the money can be used to keep these reliable and
3	dispatchable power plants online so that we don't have
4	the rolling blackouts that virtually everywhere east of
5	Missouri saw, or many states east of Missouri saw in
6	December, and many other states saw in February of 2021.
7	JUDGE CLARK: Now, you had indicated that you
8	had good reliable service; is that correct?
9	MR. WEBER: Yes.
10	JUDGE CLARK: During any of these events you
11	mentioned, was your service at any point cut off?
12	MR. WEBER: No. Everything was really good at
13	our house.
14	JUDGE CLARK: That's good to know. You
15	indicated you had a written statement; is that right?
16	MR. WEBER: Yeah, that was just what I read.
17	JUDGE CLARK: Were you satisfied with having
18	read it into the record or would you like to admit that
19	as an exhibit?
20	MR. WEBER: I can leave it if you would
21	prefer.
22	JUDGE CLARK: That's a hundred percent your
23	choice. If you would like me to mark that as an exhibit
24	and attach it to the record, I would be happy to do so.
25	MR. WEBER: Okay. Yeah, that would be good.

Page 13 1 Who do I need to give it to? 2 JUDGE CLARK: I'll come get it. 3 MR. WEBER: Very good. Thank you, sir. Thanks for the opportunity. 4 JUDGE CLARK: Wait just a second. Are there 5 any questions for Mr. Weber? I hear none. 6 Thank you 7 very much for your time this evening, Mr. Weber. I 8 appreciate your comments. Thank you. 9 MR. BROWNING: Sure. 23 JUDGE CLARK: Are there any questions for Ms. 24 Browning? 25 MR. LOWERY: No questions.
