HAVE YOUR GAS FURNACE CLEANED AND SERVICED REGULARLY. The air filters on forced-air systems should be cleaned or replaced monthly.

ADJUST YOUR HOT WATER HEATER. Every degree counts and setting your temperature to 120 degrees Fahrenheit (F) is recommended .

RAISE SHADES TO ALLOW SUNLIGHT IN. Allow the light in during the day and close the shades at night or on overcast days. Make sure storm windows are closed.

CLOSE DAMPERS ON UNUSED FIREPLACES. If not used for long periods, add insulating material around perimeter or damper. According to the U.S. Department of Energy air escapes in the following common places: floors, walls, ceiling, ducts, fireplace, plumbing, doors, windows, fans and vents, and electric outlets.

KEEP YOUR THERMOSTAT AT A LOW BUT COMFORTABLE SETTING. Consider the recommended 68 degrees Fahrenheit and wear several light layers of clothing instead of one thick one.

KEEP IN TOUCH WITH FRIENDS OR RELATIVES. During cold weather, check on your older friends or relatives to see how they're feeling. Call or visit them daily.

Find Out If You Owe Less In Taxes And Have Some Cash Coming Back

The Earned Income Credit (EIC) is a special federal tax benefit for people who work full or part-time. If you qualify, you'll owe less in taxes and you may get cash back. Even if you don't owe any income tax, you can still qualify for the EIC.

If You Are Eligible For The EIC, You Can Get:

- √ UP To \$4,300, if your income is under \$34,458 and you have two or more qualifying children (or you are married with joint income under \$35,458).
- √ UP TO \$2,604, if your income is under \$30,338 and you have one qualifying child (or you are married with joint income under \$31,338).
- √ UP TO \$390, if you have no qualifying children, are between 25 and 64 years of age and your income is under \$11,490 (or you are married with joint income under \$12,490).

Here's How You Can Get The Earned Income Credit:

If you were raising children in 2004, file federal Tax return Forms 1040 or 1040A, not Form 1040EZ. Be sure to attach Schedule EIC. If you weren't raising children in 2004, just file any federal tax return.

There Are Other Cash-Back Options, Too

The Child Tax Credit (CTC) is a federal tax credit worth up to \$1,000 per child in 2004. Families who earned more than \$10,500 and claim dependent children under age 17 on their 2004 Federal tax return may qualify for a refund through the CTC. Follow the tax form instructions to find out if you are eligible for a credit. You must file Form 8812 to claim a CTC refund.

Apples, Oranges & Natural Gas

Nature is the true regulator of our nation's natural resources.



Cold Weather Rule Information

The Cold Weather Rule period begins November 1 and remains in effect through March 31. It is designed to help customers with delinquent accounts avoid service disconnections or to get their service reconnected during the winter. If you are unable to pay the full amount of your natural gas bill and want to take advantage of MGE's Cold Weather Program this winter, please follow these simple steps:

- Contact Missouri Gas Energy at (816) 756-5252 in the Kansas City metropolitan area or 1-800-582-1234 elsewhere and ask to apply for a payment plan under the Cold Weather Program. We will gather required information and ask you to make an initial minimum payment. You also may want to apply for financial assistance from any Federal, State, local or other funding programs (see a list of agencies elsewhere on this flyer.)
- Each month you'll receive a bill for the amount agreed upon in your payment plan. Paying this amount will enable you to pay for all past due, current and projected gas use over the next 11 months.

Payment Arrangements

If you meet the Cold Weather Rule qualifications, you will be required to pay an initial payment and then enter into a payment agreement that will take into consideration the following:

- Your current payment due;
- Your total amount past due; and,
- Your projected natural gas bills for the next 11 months.

If you miss a plan payment, you will need to pay the amount equal to the total of missed payments to remain on the plan. Failure to make agreed upon payments may result in the discontinuance of your service.

Financial Assistance May Be Available

There may be funds available to help pay your heating bill. Households meeting government income eligible guidelines may receive assistance under the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP). For more information, contact your local Community Action Agency Office. If you qualify for LIHEAP assistance, that amount you receive can be applied to your Missouri Gas Energy account as a "pledge" toward your initial payment or toward your agreed-upon monthly payment.

For more information about financial assistance to help with your energy costs this winter, contact your local Community Action Agency Office. Other sources of assistance may be available through social services or charitable organizations.

There are many buried utility services around every home, including water lines, natural gas lines, sewer lines, and sometimes telephone cables, underground electric lines and other facilities. Since the depth that each utility service is buried beneath the ground varies, it is important that you contact the Missouri One-Call system if you are planting trees, putting in a fence or building a deck. Don't forget to call even if you are doing a small job, such as installing garden lighting — you still could be seriously injured or cause damage to the utilities.

If you "Call Before You Dig," dangerous situations can be avoided WITHOUT COST to the homeowner, builder or contractor.

Registered Customer -Third-Party Notification Program

If you are 65 years of age or older, or if you are disabled and have a medical letter or formal award letter from the federal government of disability benefits, and if your household income is less than 150% of the federal poverty guidelines, you may want to inquire about becoming a Registered Customer with MGE.

Through this program, you can designate a relative, friend, clergyman or other person as a third party that MGE can contact. The third party is not responsible for the Registered Customer's bills. However, this program provides an opportunity for the third party to be notified and assist in resolving any payment problems before service is interrupted to the Registered Customer.

What To Do II

As colder weather draws closer, this is a good time to be on the alert for the odor of natural gas. Because of the change in ground temperature over the winter months, the ground might shift, putting a strain on underground pipes. However, even though natural gas is a safe, clean, reliable and efficient source of energy, gas leaks can be dangerous if they are not handled properly.

If you smell the odor of natural gas, even inside your house, it might mean that a natural gas pipe has developed a leak. When you first smell gas (it smells similar to a skunk or rotten eggs), play it safe and act quickly!

LEAVE the area immediately: DO NOT look for the source of the gas leak yourself: GET OUT of your house — DO NOT activate your electric garage door opener to leave your house. The internal circuitry of the motor in the door opener could ignite the leaking natural gas.

CALL Missouri Gas Energy at 1-800-582-0000 from your NEIGHBOR'S house — DO NOT use your cellular or cordless phone to call MGE even if you are outside and away from your house. Using any type of telephone could ignite leaking natural gas.

Call 1-300-182-0000

DO NOT turn any light switches or other electrical devices on or off. Do not ring a doorbell or flip any switches – Anything electrical could cause a spark and ignite leaking gas.

DO NOT try to relight a pilot light or strike a match. Leave gas furnaces, water heaters and other gas appliances alone. Get out of the house immediately.

It is important for you to remember that in addition to gas costs, weather dramatically affects natural gas bills.

When temperatures drop, you use more fuel to heat your home and business, and energy conservation becomes very important.

By following a few easy tips, you can save money on your gas bill:

- Read your gas meter and monitor your gas usage. By reading the meter, you can gauge how fast you are using gas and can make adjustments to stay within your budget.
 - O Keep a log of your weekly consumption.
 - Adjust your gas usage. For example, if halfway into the month you are nearing your budget limit for gas, you can experiment with lower gas heating thermostat settings to see if comfort is adequate while reducing gas usage.
 - o Read instructions for reading your gas meter.
- Have your gas furnace cleaned and serviced by a professional for greater efficiency.
- Clean or replace air filters on heating or cooling systems.
- Set back your thermostat by 5 or 10 degrees when sleeping or when your house is empty for four hours or longer.
- Set the thermostat control setting for your furnace no higher than 68 degrees F during the heating season.
- Set your water heater temperature to 120 degrees F. or to the "warm" setting.
- Set your water heater temperature control to the pilot position when your home is vacant for two days or longer.
- Place nonflammable insulation or nonflammable pliable materials in gaps around pipes, ducts, fans or other items that enter the attic or basement from a conditioned space.
- Close dampers on unused fireplaces. If not used for long periods, add insulating material around the perimeter of the damper.
- Add insulation to attic or basement doors or access panels.
- Caulk or tape any leak in ductwork of cooling or heating systems.
- Tighten or plug leaking joints in hot water or steam pipes.
- Raise shades to allow sunlight to enter your home during the day. Close shades on overcast days and at night when no warm sunlight is shining.
