2	(Starting time of hearing is 12:40)	
3	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Let's go on the record.	
4	Good afternoon. Today is May 5th, 2015. The Missouri	
5	Public Service Commission has set this time for Local	
6	Public Hearing in file number ER-2014-0370, which is	
7	captioned as in the matter of Kansas City Power and	
8	Light Company's request for authority to implement a	
9	rate increase for electric service. My name is	
10	Michael Bushmann. I'm the regulatory law judge that	
11	will be presiding over today's hearing. With me here	
12	is Judge Robert Kenney and Commissioner Scott Rupp.	
13	If you would like to make an opening statement.	
14	MR. KENNEY: Good morning good	
15	afternoon, everybody. Thank you for being here on a	
16	Tuesday afternoon and taking time out of your busy	
17	schedule. We do appreciate the fact that you have	
18	taken time out of your schedule to be here today.	
19	This is the third of five local public hearings that	
20	we are having in this matter. We'll have another one	
21	tonight in Kansas City and the final one tomorrow in	
22	Gladstone. The purpose of these local public hearings	
23	is to allow you, the public, an opportunity to express	
24	your opinions with KC P & L's request for rate	
25	increase. As you see, the court reporter is here, and	

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- 1 she is taking down the words that we say. So, this
- 2 will become transcribed and will a part of the case
- 3 file. There are five commissioners on the commission.
- 4 Two of us are here today. You shouldn't read anything
- 5 into the fact that the other three are not able to be
- 6 here. Part of the benefit of having a transcribed
- 7 record is that those other commissioners will have an
- 8 opportunity to read your testimony and weigh it and
- 9 consider it once we get to the point at which we are
- 10 deliberating and making a decision about the case. So
- 11 this is just a part of the process that will conclude
- 12 with a hearing, an evidentiary hearing in Jefferson
- 13 City. But this is a very critical and important part
- 14 of the hearing and we do appreciate the fact that
- 15 you've taken the time to be here. And we do look
- 16 forward to hearing what you have to tell us. Thank
- 17 you very much.
- 18 MR. RUPP: I'm Commissioner Scott Rupp.
- 19 It's a pleasure to be here. I just wanted to also
- 20 remind you when you do come up and testify, if you
- 21 have any information about customer service, how the
- 22 company has been performing, and things of that
- 23 nature, and you want us to take into consideration
- 24 along with anything about this rate case that's before
- 25 us, it would be a good time to let us know your

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1	thoughts as well. And also to remind you we might ask
2	you some questions about what you testify or to
3	clarify what you're going to say. But we, as
4	commissioners, are unable to answer any questions
5	being posed to us. Our jobs, like judges, we have to
6	decide the case. And you wouldn't walk up to a judge
7	in the middle of a court room and ask them a question
8	and expect to get an answer. So we are here to listen
9	and we will not be able to answer any questions, but
10	we want to hear all your thoughts, especially about
11	the rate case and the customer service and how the
12	company is performing in your area. Thank you.
13	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Let's have the attorneys
14	make their entries of appearance. For Kansas City
15	Power and Light Company.
16	MR. STEINER: My name is Roger Steiner. My
17	address is 1200 Main Street, Kansas City, Missouri.
18	JUDGE BUSHMANN: For commission staff.
19	MS. MAYFIELD: Cydney Mayfield. My address
20	is 200 Madison Street, Jefferson City, Missouri.
21	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Office of Public Counsel.
22	MR. OPITZ: Appearing on behalf of the
23	Office of Public Counsel, my name is Tim Opitz. My
24	address is P. O. Box 2230, Jefferson City, 65102.
25	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Consumers' Council.

Page 6 MR. KAUFMAN: John Kaufman on behalf of 1 2 Consumers Council of Missouri, 871 Tuxedo Boulevard, 3 St. Louis, Missouri, 63105. We're a consumers advocate organization. 4 5 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Ameren Missouri? MS. GIBONEY: For Ameren Missouri, my name 6 7 is Sarah Giboney of the law firm of Smith Lewis, LLP, 119 South Ninth Street, Columbia, Missouri, 65201. 8 9 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any other counsel present from any other intervenors that I have not mentioned? 10 11 Okay. Well, the process this afternoon is I'm going 12 to call the names that are listed here on the sign-up 13 sheet. And when I call your name, please come down to the podium in the front. I'll put you under oath and 14 ask you to state where you live, and you can offer 15 your comments to the Commission. Also, some 16 17 commissioners have expressed an interest in the sharing of rate cases between the company and the 18 customers. So if you have any opinions on that issue, 19 20 please feel free to state them. The first name I have 21 on the list is Art Jacobi. Please raise your right hand. Do you solemnly swear or affirm that the 22 testimony you're about to give will be the truth? 23 24 MR. JACOBI: Yes, sir. 25 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Could you state your name

Page 7 and spell your last name please? 2 MR. JACOBI: Art Jacobi; J-a-c-o-b-i. 3 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live. MR. JACOBI: 1900 South 65 Highway. 4 5 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please go ahead. MR. JACOBI: I don't think they deserve an 6 7 increase. They don't care about anything except KCP & L. And their service is lousy. Why should I give 8 them a rate increase? They don't do anything I want. They don't care. They don't care about the customer. 10 11 All they care about is KCP & L. That's it. I have no 12 reason for them to have an increase at all. They 13 don't care about the customer. 14 JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Sir, could you hold on a 15 minute? 16 MR. JACOBI: Yes, sir. 17 MR. KENNEY: Mr. Jacobi, thanks for being here today. I'm guessing you have had some experience 18 19 with their customer service. 20 MR. KENNEY: Yes, sir. 21 MR. KENNEY: Would you be willing to share 22 some examples about things that you are talking about that lead you to that conclusion. 23 24 MR. JACOBI: I can't get a hold of anybody 25 that will tell me anything. This is real simple.

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- 1 They show up on my property one day and do whatever
- 2 they want on their right-of-way, but it's in front of
- 3 my house, and inexcusable, no way that is the right
- 4 thing to do. I mean there is no excuse. You could
- 5 drive anywhere you want and you cannot find what they
- 6 did to me in front of my house. They just show up one
- 7 day and do whatever they want. And that is not fair.
- 8 That's not the way to treat a customer at all. It's
- 9 pathetic.
- 10 MR. KENNEY: What did they do for your
- 11 property,
- 12 MR. JACOBI: They show up one day and put
- 13 three huge poles in front of my house with three big
- 14 transformers right in front of my house right-of-way.
- 15 They had to drive up my driveway to get -- they don't
- 16 maintain them, don't do anything about weeds, and
- 17 don't do anything on my driveway or nothing. And they
- 18 are doing this to help the quarry six miles up the
- 19 road. And they can't find some place six miles up the
- 20 road instead of in front of my house. That's not
- 21 fair. I got a farm, 150 acres. They could go down
- 22 the road and put it anywhere but in front of my house.
- 23 It's incredible. I can't find any other place they
- 24 have done this do but me. They got a transformer
- 25 behind me on gravel road, perfect. There is nothing

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- 1 down there. But in front of my house is ridiculous.
- 2 All they are doing is affecting the property, my
- 3 value. And they want an increase? How about them
- 4 cutting something, how about cutting pay on these
- 5 guys.
- 6 MR. KENNEY: And before they put these
- 7 transformers on your property, nobody contacted you
- 8 ahead of time.
- 9 MR. JACOBI: No. They just showed up one
- 10 day. That's it. They just show up one day and don't
- 11 say jack. I go out there and I get no answers. They
- 12 are drilling holes. I'm going what the heck am I
- 13 going to do with it. They are on the right-of-way,
- 14 yeah. But they got to drive up my driveway about an
- 15 8th mile -- inexcusable. Go up the road some place
- 16 and put it. You don't have to put it in front of my
- 17 house.
- 18 MR. KENNEY: Is this project complete?
- 19 MR. JACOBI: Yeah, it's done. Like I say,
- 20 I couldn't stop them. You can't stop big brother. I
- 21 couldn't stop them.
- 22 MR. KENNEY: Well, one of the benefits of
- 23 coming to these local public hearings that you do have
- 24 the company here, and you also have the Office of
- 25 Public Counsel, and I'm not really sure about any

Page 10 specific solution. But if you feel compelled to, you 2 might have additional conversation with KCP & L's 3 representatives. 4 MR. JACOBI: Fine. 5 MR. KENNEY: And Office of Public Counsel. MR. JACOBI: He is a lawyer? 7 MR. KENNEY: Yeah. MR. JACOBI: You, too? Wonderful. Thank 8 you. 10 MR. KENNEY: Mr. Jacobi, thank you. Can you hang on one second please? 11 12 MR. JACOBI: I don't have anybody I can 13 talk to KCP & L but lawyers. That's it. 14 MR. RUPP: You mentioned their service is lousy. Were you just saying their customer service is 15 lousy or --16 17 MR. JACOBI: They treated me as a customer, 18 that's what I'm saying. 19 MR. RUPP: And their electrical reliability and what you get from them, how has that been? 20 21 MR. JACOBI: Like anybody else. JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Any questions from 22 attorneys? So the record is clear, are you a KCP & L 23 24 customer? 25 MR. JACOBI: Yes, sir. I have two

Page 11 different places -- I have KCP & L two different 2 places where I have them. I don't know why you think 3 this is funny. I don't get it. JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Anything further? 4 5 MR. JACOBI: Whatever. JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Any other questions. 6 7 Thank you, sir. The next witness is Carl Johnson. 8 you solemnly swear or affirm that the testimony you're about to give will be the truth? 10 MR. JOHNSON: Yes, I do. 11 JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Could you please state 12 your name and spell your last name? 13 MR. JOHNSON: Carl Johnson. Last name, 14 J-o-h-n-s-o-n. 15 JUDGE BUSHMANN:: And where do you reside? 16 MR. JOHNSON: 32998 240th Road, East 17 Marshall. I'm here representing for Frank Lawless that's unable to a tend. He lives out here east just 18 south of Water Mill Road. He runs a refrigeration and 19 heating business, and he has voltage problems at his 20 21 house. The morning when the quarry starts up, his voltage drops. Before they put in the voltage 22 regulator it would actually trip off some of his 23 24 appliances because the voltage was so low. I had the same experience in 2005. I complained. My problem 25

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- 1 got fixed. So I'm here to help him get his problem
- 2 fixed as well as some of the other people in the
- 3 audience that I'm good friends with, and I try to help
- 4 support them. And the reason I know is because I'm
- 5 retired -- I used to be utilities superintendent of
- 6 line crew, so I have basic -- some knowledge of what's
- 7 going on. And representatives that I had when they
- 8 took voltage checked, they put on a computer. They
- 9 always said the computer ate it, but I had a
- 10 mechanical recorder at the time and it recorded the
- 11 voltage as low as 90 volts whenever they start up the
- 12 quarry. So I know how some of their public -- the
- 13 people that Brunswick operate, so I think you will
- 14 have the same testimony of some of the people in the
- 15 audience that they had the same problem. KCP & L
- 16 representatives always passed the buck some place
- 17 else. So, I don't think they should have a rate
- 18 increase until they fix the problems for the customers
- 19 in the east district. Unless you got some questions.
- JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Any questions?
- 21 MR. KENNEY: Mr. Johnson, thank you for
- 22 your testimony, and thank you for standing in for Mr.
- 23 Lawless.
- MR. JOHNSON: Okay.
- 25 MR. KENNEY: There is a quarry in the area

Page 13 as I understand it? 2 MR. JOHNSON: South of town, just north of 3 Marshall junction; Apax. 4 MR. KENNEY: And when it starts up, you 5 notice your voltage level dropped. 6 MR. JOHNSON: Yes. 7 MR. KENNEY: And it's not just you; it's 8 multiple customers. 9 MR. JOHNSON: That's right. 10 MR. KENNEY: And you said this has been 11 going on since 2005? 12 MR. JOHNSON: I'd say the last time I 13 complained in front of the Public Service Commission 14 was 2005. 15 MR. KENNEY: Okay. 16 MR. JOHNSON: Our problem at the farm, my 17 farm, has been fixed because they switched us from substation in Marshall to Gilliam. But Frank Lawless 18 is in between our farm and the substation, which he is 19 still currently fed off of the same as the quarry. 20 21 And that's where his problem is at. 22 MR. KENNEY: Do you know if Mr. Lawless has complained directly to --23 MR. JOHNSON: I think he has, yes, multiple 24 25 times.

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1	MR. KENNEY: How long after you complained
2	the first time in front of PSC in 2005 how long
3	after that were you switched to the different
4	substation?
5	MR. JOHNSON: 21 days exactly.
6	MR. KENNEY: So I'm sorry Mr. Lawless isn't
7	here, but as I was indicating to Mr. Jacobi, you might
8	take this opportunity so that you're advocating on his
9	behalf to have a conversation with the folks from KCP
10	& L about maybe the same solution would be to Mr.
11	Lawless.
12	MR. JOHNSON: Like I say, Rob Davis and
13	some other people in the back have the same problem as
14	Mr. Lawless has got. So they'll help them.
15	MR. KENNEY: Thank you.
16	MR. JOHNSON: Okay.
17	JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Thank you, Mr. Johnson.
18	Elmer Fisher. Mr. Fisher, do you solemnly swear or
19	affirm that the testimony you're about to give will be
20	the truth? MR. FISHER: Yes.
21	JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Could you state your name
22	and spell your last name?
23	MR. FISHER: Elmer Fisher.
24	JUDGE BUSHMANN:: And how do you spell your
25	last name?

Page 15 MR. FISHER: F-i-s-h-e-r. 1 2 JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Where do you live? 3 MR. FISHER: I live in Lamont, Missouri, northwest of Lamont about seven miles. 4 5 JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Okay. Please go ahead. Go ahead, you can give your comments now. 6 7 MR. FISHER: Okay. I have built a new 8 house up next to the road and I sold all my farming ground to another fella. I kept 3.8 acres around my 10 house, and where they had put a line down to my old 11 house unbeknownst to be me to start with, I had a row 12 of trees down there. And I jumped the fella when I 13 got home from work that day and he said, oh, it wouldn't kill those trees, but I have still got the 14 stumps there. You can see them where it killed them. 15 And I had planted some big hickory nuts that are 16 17 growing up almost to the line now. Since I built the new house, there is no need for the wire down to the 18 old house and the barn because the other fella bought 19 all of that. And he's taken all the wires down back 20 21 to the meterand doesn't want it there. And I have 22 been trying for the last three years to get them to take that out. And if they are trying to save as much 23 money as they can, like they say, they have got two 24 25 enormous poles there the same size they use out on the

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- 1 main line and then one smaller pole. But they have
- 2 got those two poles and the line is still hot. It's
- 3 still hooked up out there by the road, and there is a
- 4 transformer there and there is a meter there. And if
- 5 they are trying to save money like they say they are,
- 6 why don't they come and take them out of there. I
- 7 have been trying to get them out so they don't kill
- 8 these hickory nut trees that I have planned there for
- 9 nuts. And I just can't get anything done. They sent
- 10 a young fella out there. He didn't know come here
- 11 from no way. He said somebody would be paying for
- 12 that meter if there is a meter down there, but it's
- 13 been there for three years now since I quit paying for
- 14 it when I built my new house up there. And they
- 15 haven't done a thing about it. He said he'd have his
- 16 boss to come and talk to me, but he never did. So,
- 17 there you are.
- 18 MR. KENNEY: Mr. Fisher, thank you for
- 19 being here. It's very helpful. Can you hear me okay.
- MR. FISHER: Not very good.
- MR. KENNEY: Is that better.
- MR. FISHER: Yes.
- 23 MR. KENNEY: Sorry. I was going to ask you
- 24 about the meter that's still there. There is nobody
- 25 taking service there?

1	MR. FISHER: No.
2	MR. KENNEY: Okay.
3	MR. FISHER: There hasn't been taking
4	service for over three years.
5	MR. KENNEY: And the young man that came
6	and spoke to you who said his boss would come speak to
7	you, did he give you a name?
8	MR. FISHER: He didn't tell me. Well, he
9	might have told me, but my mind isn't that good any
10	more. I can't remember that good.
11	MR. KENNEY: I can't either, so that's
12	fine. I would encourage you to take the opportunity,
13	like I encourage everybody, to talk to the folks from
14	KCP & L about your issue and see.
15	MR. FISHER: I'd love to talk to somebody
16	about it, but I'm going to have to be leaving here in
17	a few minutes. I have got an appointment in Sedalia
18	at 2 o'clock.
19	MR. KENNEY: I'm sure they'll try to
20	accommodate your time schedule.
21	MR. FISHER: Okay. Thank you.
22	JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Thank you, Mr. Fisher.
23	Rob Davis. Do you solemnly swear or affirm that the
24	testimony you're about to give will be the truth?
25	MR. DAVIS: I sure do.

Page 18 JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Just please state your 1 2 name and spell your last name? 3 MR. DAVIS: Rob Davis; D-a-v-i-s. JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Where do you reside? 4 5 MR. DAVIS: 25215 155th Road, Marshall. JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Go ahead. 6 MR. DAVIS: We've had a lot of issues with 7 8 our power. And it's been ever since Apax bought the quarry. You're probably going to hear this over and over again. I live about a mile from the quarry. 10 11 Every morning whenever they fire up, power goes to 12 zilch. My lights dim. My bathroom fan just about 13 It takes hardly anything to run a bathroom fan. I have complained. We've had voltage recorders, 14 results are always lost. I fought that and fought it. 15 I finally just about gave up until this meeting. 16 17 know several people that work for KCP & L. My brother is a foreman at the quarry, so I've got a little bit 18 of insight in this. Kansas City Power and Light tells 19 20 them they are going to have to put a substation in to 21 cure this problem. They do not want to spend the 22 money, plain and simple, so we got to suffer. I can't 23 keep light bulbs in my house. I can't keep 24 appliances. I can't keep my air conditioner working. 25 It goes out about three or four times a year from low

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- 1 voltage or spike voltage, whenever the power kicks
- 2 back up. We fought it and fought it. All my
- 3 neighbors, you know, everybody that's on the south
- 4 half of Marshall. That's on Kansas City Power and
- 5 Light has the same problem. Hair dryers will quit in
- 6 the mornings, and they just won't repair the problem.
- 7 Apax has went in to phasing in the motors, changed
- 8 motors, to try to alleviate the problem because they
- 9 are getting tired of people complaining to them.
- 10 There is just nothing being done about it. And we
- 11 would just like to have that repaired before they get
- 12 a rate increase to do anything else. I mean that's a
- 13 major problem to us, it's not to a lot of people, but
- 14 for our community -- my repair bills are pretty good
- 15 when you go through four or five light bulbs a week.
- 16 That's a little excessive.
- 17 MR. KENNEY: Mr. Davis, thank you for
- 18 taking the time to be here. When was the first time
- 19 that you complained to KCP & L about this?
- 20 MR. DAVIS: It was shortly after Apax took
- 21 over and brought in all the new equipment. I don't
- 22 really remember what year it was. We had the quarry
- out there for years in Reilly, and we never had any
- 24 problems. They were a smaller operation, but Apax has
- 25 brought in big crushers, asphalt plants, and there is

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- 1 just not enough power there to supply them and the
- 2 community.
- 3 MR. KENNEY: Would it have been
- 4 approximately around the same time that Mr. Johnson
- 5 indicated; around 2005 or after?
- 6 MR. DAVIS: You know, I'm not really sure
- 7 exactly whenever it happened. And I'm not -- I
- 8 researched this and I may be wrong, but the way I
- 9 understand the laws to this if there is an offending
- 10 load like the quarry, they should be taken off line
- 11 until the problem is repaired.
- 12 MR. KENNEY: I can't advise you with respect
- 13 to the law, but I'm sure Mr. Opitz from the Office of
- 14 Public Counsel can. You mention the south half of
- 15 Marshall is affected by this. How many households
- 16 would you estimate that comprises?
- 17 MR. DAVIS: I would say several hundred if
- 18 not thousands.
- MR. KENNEY: Households or people?
- MR. DAVIS: Households.
- 21 MR. KENNEY: And you said they have done
- voltage recordings, but the results have been loss?
- 23 MR. DAVIS: I had a voltage recorder in my
- 24 house for weeks at different times and the results
- 25 have always been lost.

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1	MR. KENNEY: So they have never provided
2	you with any of the outcomes of those tests?
3	MR. DAVIS: No.
4	MR. KENNEY: About how many times do you
5	think you have had those tests done?
6	MR. DAVIS: I had them done twice at a week
7	at the time.
8	MR. KENNEY: And both times they didn't
9	provide you any
10	MR. DAVIS: No results. The only thing
11	they said is the readings were within tolerance.
12	MR. KENNEY: So how were they able to tell
13	you that if they were actually lost?
14	MR. DAVIS: That's a good question.
15	MR. KENNEY: All right. Thanks for your
16	time, Mr. Davis.
17	MR. RUPP: Getting back to the result being
18	lost, it's the same thing that the gentleman before
19	you said.
20	MR. DAVIS: Mr. Johnson, yeah.
21	MR. RUPP: So a bit curious. If there is
22	anyone else to testify that they had this same issue
23	and their results were lost as well, I would
24	definitely want to hear that. Thank you.
25	MR. DAVIS: Thank you.

Page 22 JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Kevin Walter. Do you 1 2 solemnly swear or affirm that the testimony you're 3 about to give will be the truth? MR. DAVIS: Yes. 4 5 JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Could you please state your name and spell your last name? 6 7 MR. WALTER: Kevin Walter; W-a-l-t-e-r. 8 JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Where do you live? MR. WALTER: 2667 Private 177th Drive about 9 six miles south on 65. 10 JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Go ahead. 11 12 MR. WALTER: Same problem as everybody 13 else. I used to live ten miles south and Apax bought this quarry. Light bulbs, appliances. In 2009, I 14 15 built a new house out here on 65; the exact same problems. Darned near every day you go home there is 16 17 a new light bulk burned out, dryer elements, the exhaust fans in the morning at five to seven o'clock 18 when they are firing up their crushers, and then they 19 kick on, spike up, light bulbs flash. It's an ongoing 20 21 problem. And I'm like everybody else. I don't think there should be an increase until the problem is fixed 22 in this area. 23 24 MR. KENNEY: Are you finished? 25 MR. WALTER: Yeah.

1	MR. KENNEY: Mr. Walter, thank you. Let me
2	just ask you a couple questions about whether you
3	reported the issues to KCP & L.
4	MR. WALTER: Oh, yeah.
5	MR. KENNEY: About how many times?
6	MR. WALTER: Between five and ten.
7	MR. KENNEY: Have they done voltage
8	recording at your house?
9	MR. WALTER: Not at my house they have not.
10	MR. KENNEY: Have they offered you any
11	explanation or solution?
12	Mr. WALTER: They just said they are
13	working on it at the quarry, and they would going put
14	in a couple of these things or couple of them things.
15	MR. KENNEY: Some solution that would take
16	care of what's going on at the quarry?
17	MR. WALTER: That's what they said, but the
18	same problem is here in my other new house. If they
19	did do something, it's not showed up at people's
20	residence. Just down the road, REC customers, which
21	is probably a mile from me, they have no problems at
22	all. No light bulbs, no appliances, no spikes. So
23	it's got to be Kansas City Power and Light.
24	MR. KENNEY: Co-op customers don't have any
25	of these issues?

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1	MR. WALTER: No. And it's all due because
2	of the Apax Quarry.
3	MR. KENNEY: Can you tell me when you were
4	in your first house when this first happened?
5	MR. WALTER: That was probably 2000 or 2001
6	and then the problem probably really started 2004 or
7	5, somewhere in there. And now I built my new house
8	in 2009, and it's still going on.
9	MR. KENNEY: Okay. Mr. Walter, thanks for
10	letting us know.
11	JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Brian McCorkle. Do you
12	solemnly swear or affirm that the testimony you are
13	about to give will be the truth?
14	MR. MCCORKLE: Yes, I do.
15	JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Please state your name
16	and spell your last name.
17	MR. MCCORKLE: Brian McCorkle;
18	M-c-c-o-r-k-l-e.
19	JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Where do you live?
20	MR. MCCORKLE: 21493 Highway YY here in
21	Marshall.
22	JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Go ahead.
23	MR. MCCORKLE: I had a few things. I can
24	echo the same thing that the recent gentlemen have
25	brought up here before is the quarry deal. I recently

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- 1 was married and my new wife -- I think she thought the
- 2 house was haunted because in morning time you'd be
- 3 getting ready, and we live in an earth-contact. That
- 4 means we have less lighting -- natural lighting. So
- 5 when you're getting ready for work in the morning, all
- of a sudden you'll be in the shower and lights start
- 7 going out and flickering and everything else. It's
- 8 kind of nerve-wracking to someone who hasn't been in
- 9 the situation before. And especially when it happens
- 10 every day. Then it becomes more of, I guess, a pest
- 11 to you. Also ends up costing you money. I have
- 12 replaced appliances, and I have also replaced a lot of
- 13 light bulbs. The only bulbs that you have to replace
- 14 are those fixtures that are on in the morning, so you
- 15 try to keep as much things off in the morning as you
- 16 can, so that way you don't have to end up replacing
- 17 anything if you can keep from it. But, you know I
- 18 have asked about it, I have called, and I have
- 19 complained. And I was told that the new deal they put
- 20 in Mr. Jacobi's front yard in his house was going to
- 21 take care of that, and it didn't. So, I feel sorry
- 22 for him for what he has to look at every day, but it
- 23 didn't fix the problem. So we still have the same
- 24 problem. And I live just outside of town, outside of
- 25 Marshall here on south edge. And that's where I'm

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- 1 receiving all the way up there. Whereas the gentlemen
- 2 in the back, they are all the way down towards the
- 3 plant itself, which is about eight miles south of
- 4 here, I guess, is where the quarry is. That's one
- 5 thing that I was wondering about. We've had this
- 6 problem for so long, why haven't they been able to fix
- 7 that. Is KCP & L bankrupt or is that why they need
- 8 more money? So they can fix these problems they have
- 9 had for years. Also, they say that they are having
- 10 15.8 percent increase, a lot of us don't see 15.8
- 11 percent increase in other wages. So I just find it
- 12 hard to believe that they need 15.8 percent increase.
- 13 Especially whenever their customer base is growing in
- 14 dramatic numbers. I know this town, I'm pretty sure,
- 15 went all KCP & L pretty much, and they have their own
- 16 power plant here, but they are buying the majority of
- 17 the power from KCP & L. And they talk about all these
- 18 new cross plants and everything that they are
- 19 building, I would think with that larger customer base
- 20 -- I mean I run a business. And as we grow our
- 21 customer base, that increases our profits. You know,
- 22 so their customer base is growing, you'd think their
- 23 profits would be increasing naturally. I don't see
- 24 why they see a need to raise the rates for additional
- 25 customers to build all this great infrastructure they

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- 1 have now. And then I also was told, and this is
- 2 something I haven't heard, and I should have probably
- 3 brought up in the Q & A session, but I wanted that to
- 4 get over quick. That was fact that the monthly
- 5 service charge was going to change from \$9 a month to
- 6 \$25 a month. That's what I was told, but I don't know
- 7 if that's true or not, but if they are going to raise
- 8 monthly service charges for the customer from \$9 to
- 9 \$25, then that would be \$16. All right. And then the
- 10 average person is going to receive \$14 a month
- 11 addition to their bill. Then that's \$360 a year for
- 12 the average customer. So it's really \$30 a month
- 13 increase, if that's the case, for the average
- 14 customer. They never did say what the average
- 15 customer's actual electric bill was dollar amount.
- 16 So, I don't know what the average is, so I'm not sure
- 17 what my bill will grow from this. Needless to say, I
- 18 don't think it should grow anything. I don't think
- 19 they should be able to do it because they haven't been
- 20 able to fix the problems we've had for years, and they
- 21 have grown it, the business. I don't see why they
- 22 need to have even more money when you already know
- 23 they are already making tons of it. So that's all I
- 24 have.
- 25 MR. KENNEY: Mr. McCorkle, thanks for

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- 1 taking time out of the middle of your day to be here.
- 2 Let me just ask you a few questions about your voltage
- 3 issue. How long have you experienced that issue?
- 4 MR. MCCORKLE: Probably about eight years
- 5 that I own the house.
- 6 MR. KENNEY: And have you complained to KCP
- 7 & L?
- 8 MR. MCCORKLE: Yes.
- 9 MR. KENNEY: Do you know about how many
- 10 times, starting when?
- 11 MR. MCCORKLE: I probably only complained
- 12 about two or three times because nothing ever happened
- 13 from it. Sometimes you just know you're wasting your
- 14 time. My parents also have KCP & L, too. They live
- just up the road and they have the same problems.
- 16 MR. KENNEY: Have they came to your home to
- 17 do any type of voltage readings?
- 18 MR. MCCORKLE: No. They did tell me,
- 19 though, the last time that I complained that the
- 20 additional transformers that they installed at Mr.
- 21 Jacobi's was supposed to take care of the problem, but
- 22 it didn't.
- MR. KENNEY: How long ago was that?
- 24 MR. MCCORKLE: I don't know. Whenever they
- 25 put that out there, four or five months ago or six --

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- 1 six months ago or so.
- 2 MR. KENNEY: So they installed the new
- 3 transformer on Mr. Jacobi's land and your
- 4 understanding -- what they told you was that would
- 5 correct the problem?
- 6 MR. MCCORKLE: That would correct the
- 7 problem, yes.
- 8 MR. KENNEY: And you have seen no evidence
- 9 of that?
- 10 MR. MCCORKLE: That's not corrected the
- 11 problem, no. It didn't change at all. And I even
- 12 called and talked to one of the KCP & L guys. I
- 13 called him out at a gas station one day, and they told
- 14 me they pulled stuff out there, but hadn't brought it
- 15 on line yet because I was like nothing changed. And
- 16 now they brought it on line and nothing still has
- 17 /KHAPBLGD.
- 18 MR. KENNEY: Regarding the changes to the
- 19 fixed customer charge, Mr. Opitz can provide you some
- 20 more information about that, and I'll say as a general
- 21 proposition, no decisions have been made yet. So the
- 22 if the company requests a rate increase, we'll decide
- 23 that some time after the evidentiary hearings in June
- 24 and July. So no decisions have been made, but Mr.
- 25 Opitz will be happy to provide you more information

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- 1 about that. Thank you for being here, Mr. McCorkle.
- JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Any questions. That's
- 3 all the names I have on the sign-up sheet. If there
- 4 is anybody else who has not testified that would like
- 5 to come forward. Sir, do you solemnly swear or affirm
- 6 that the testimony you're about to give will be the
- 7 truth?
- 8 MR. SASSMANN: Yes, sir.
- 9 JUDGE BUSHMANN:: And could you please
- 10 state your name and spell your last name?
- MR. SASSMANN: My name is Dale Sassmann;
- 12 S-a-s-m-a-n-n And my address is 13339 Jewel
- 13 Avenue. It's about three-quarters of a mile beyond
- 14 Apax quarry.
- JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Go ahead.
- 16 MR. SASSMANN: So thank you all for being
- 17 here today, first of all. I appreciate the
- 18 Commission, KCP & L representatives, and all our
- 19 interested parties and others who have spoken to our
- 20 issues. My comments -- my question is a customer
- 21 service issue and my concern is the voltage power
- 22 quality issues related to Apax quarry has been a very
- 23 common theme here today. As I stated earlier, I'm
- 24 three-quarters of a mile beyond Apax quarry. So I'm
- 25 on the single phase line that's beyond the quarry. I

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- 1 think the other people you have spoken to are on
- 2 different phases north of the quarry. I have got some
- 3 meter readings here that I captured myself. I have
- 4 contacted KCP & L probably about six times over the
- 5 last six or eight years about power quality issues.
- 6 In response to that, they have made some repairs in
- 7 that area that eliminated a lot of our outage problems
- 8 that were related to storm, so kudos to them for
- 9 taking care of that issue about outages, but as far as
- 10 brown-outs and power quality related to the quarry,
- 11 that's still unresolved. I wasn't aware of the
- 12 voltage regulator or transformer at Mr. Jacobi's, but
- 13 they did set a single voltage regulator on a single
- 14 phase line immediately in front of my property. They
- 15 were responsive when I asked -- when I was aware they
- 16 were going to set a voltage regulator actually on the
- 17 pole on my property, I asked them if they could set it
- in one pole over, not on the right-of-way -- county
- 19 road right-of-way, and they did relocate that. That
- 20 took them a little bit of guide wire work and little
- 21 bit of pole work. Again, they were responsive in my
- 22 request, but I was aware of that before it actually
- 23 got built. I just saw the "X" on the pole and asked
- 24 was something happening. Two times KCP & L has placed
- 25 recorders in my home. And in both of those cases, I

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- 1 asked for a report back on their findings. And in
- 2 both cases neither by phone nor by e-mail did I ever
- 3 get any response back, but I have got readings here
- 4 from this morning, from back in March of 2014, back in
- 5 there, so I have got about four different reports
- 6 reported here that if someone from the Commission
- 7 would like to receive this report, I'd be glad to
- 8 leave that with them. And if KCP& L would like a copy
- 9 of this, I can generate another one or they could make
- 10 a copy of that. That would be fine with me. Voltage
- 11 readings down to like 103 volts on the 120 side, when
- 12 the largest crusher starts, and then about seven
- 13 seconds of duration typically the voltage climbs up,
- 14 and the voltage regulator then gives us about 135-volt
- 15 peak after that. And then it kinds of gets into a
- 16 cycle for a little while, and then evens on back out.
- 17 But it's all related to start up of that one user,
- 18 Apax quarry. That's it.
- 19 MR. KENNEY: Mr. Sassmann, thank you. The
- 20 two times that they had voltage recorders out there,
- 21 when was that if you can approximate?
- 22 MR. SASSMANN: I would guess it was
- 23 probably the last time was in March of 2014. That was
- 24 probably a few months after they installed the voltage
- 25 regulator in front of my property. And then probably

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1	two years before that.
2	MR. KENNEY: Okay. And neither time were
3	you able to review the results?
4	MR. SASSMANN: No.
5	MR. KENNEY: And what did they tell you?
6	They just didn't have them or what?
7	MR. SASSMANN: The first time they told me
8	that they were going to take some measures with some
9	voltage regulation, and that they were reviewing that
10	customer, Apax quarry's procedure for start up
11	sequence to try to make some improvement there. But,
12	I don't I haven't seen any marked improvements.
13	MR. KENNEY: So they installed the voltage
14	regulator and they moved it at your request?
15	MR. SASSMANN: Yes.
16	MR. KENNEY: But it's not been effective?
17	MR. SASSMANN: No; not as far as I can see.
18	MR. KENNEY: I think, yeah, we'll probably
19	like to see your records?
20	MR. SASSMANN: Okay.
21	MR. KENNEY: I'm sure the company would,
22	too. Thank you for being here, Mr. Sassmann.
23	MR. SASSMANN: Who do I leave these with?
24	JUDGE BUSHMANN: If she'll mark that
25	Exhibit A, and I'll receive that into the hearing

- 2 MR. RUPP: So, Mr. Sassmann, so when you
- 3 made the request for the results of the meeting and
- 4 you never got it, did you get a reason or did they
- 5 just never respond to your phone call or e-mail?
- 6 MR. SASSMANN: You know, I don't recall. I
- 7 don't remember them saying that they were corrupted or
- 8 lost or anything. I just didn't receive them. And I
- 9 e-mailed about it, too. But I didn't get a response.
- 10 I thought -- I'm an engineer by training and so I
- 11 want hard copies of stuff. I want statistics. I want
- 12 values. I want data, and I didn't get it.
- MR. RUPP: What you just handed to the
- 14 court reporter, did you have your own meter reader?
- MR. SASSMANN: Right I got a flute 289
- 16 digital volt meter with a recording function, software
- 17 to go with it.

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- 18 MR. RUPP: One thing I haven't heard from
- 19 anybody in the audience today, and I'll ask you
- 20 because I don't know how many people are going to
- 21 testify -- is community partner. A lot of times in
- 22 public hearings we hear the company is a good
- 23 community partner, they participate. I haven't heard
- 24 that. How would you rate the company's being a good
- 25 community partner in this community?

Page 35 MR. SASSMANN: You know, I'm probably not 1 2 the best person because I don't get involved in civics 3 and community things that much. Public relations, community service, you know things like that. I have 4 5 always felt like KCP & L was pretty responsive. Whenever I call them and talk to them about issues, 6 7 they always seem to take interest. But for some 8 reason, that's been a hard nut to crack. And I think, I have just thought my opinion is that what the large motor loads and sizing of the line out there, that 10 without spending a lot of dollars, they are just not 11 12 going to be able to address that with some line 13 building or like what's mentioned earlier, a substation or something. But my opinion is like a lot 14 15 of the others, I'd really like to see this addressed. I don't mind paying more for electricity if I have got 16 17 quality service. 18 JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Thank you, sir. 19 MR. SASSMANN: Thank you. 20 JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Is there anyone else that 21 would like to testify? Yes, sir. Do you solemnly

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Page 36 and spell your last name? 2 MR. CASSELL: Gene Cassell; C-a-s-s-e-l-l. 3 JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Where do you live? MR. CASSELL:: 12096 Jasmine Avenue, 4 5 Marshall, Missouri. 6 JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Go ahead. 7 MR. CASSELL:: I can add on to what the 8 gentlemen in the back have talked because they live the closest to the rock quarry and Apax. I live the furthest south of this group, which is at the 10 11 intersection of 65 Highway and 70. KCP & L has been 12 good service to us, but the term of it is when I pay 13 for something I like to be able to get it 24 hours a day. In the morning our power drops very low. I have 14 lost a pump in my well. I thought it just went out 15 due to age. We replaced it. A short time later it 16 17 went out again, no apparent reason. So, we kind of started watching and our light bulbs dropping in 18 intensity. And usually that's around seven o'clock. 19 So we get in the habit now, we live with this thing of 20 21 cutting our power back around 6:30, quarter to seven. 22 Nobody takes a shower until after seven. We don't run our air conditioner or any extra power until after 23 24 we've had our fluctuations on the lights. Now, like I said, if I pay for this thing for 24 hours a day, I 25

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- 1 expect to use it 24 hours day; not have to limit my
- 2 use of the power. Other than that, KCP & L had been
- 3 good to us. We've had problems with transformers go
- 4 out, took them about an hour to come out, they
- 5 repaired it and went on. But this issue of having to
- 6 live with their system of seven o'clock, that's for
- 7 the birds.
- JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Questions?
- 9 MR. KENNEY: No questions. Thank you, Mr.
- 10 Cassell.
- 11 JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Thank you, sir. Anyone
- 12 else like to testify? Yes, sir. Do you solemnly
- 13 swear or affirm that the testimony you're about to
- 14 give will be the truth?
- MR. HARDENBROOK: I do.
- 16 JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Please state your name.
- 17 MR. BROOK: J. Hardenbrook;
- 18 H-a-r-d-e-n-b-r-o-o-k. I live at 4425 Morning Dove
- 19 Court in St. Louis.

- 21 MR. HARDENBROOK: I am the associate state
- 22 director for advocacy with AARP in Missouri.
- Obviously, we've heard a lot about service issues as
- 24 well as what I would say is reliability and safety
- 25 issues, which I know is one of the things the PSC is

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- 1 tasked with looking into when you deal with a monopoly
- 2 like KCP & L for us. The biggest concern is increase
- 3 in the customer service charge of \$9 to \$25. That's
- 4 not 15.8 percent increase. That's an increase of over
- 5 150 percent. And especially for people on a fixed
- 6 income who are using very, very little power. That's
- 7 a huge increase for them. And what we've heard back
- 8 from our volunteers, from our members as we've reached
- 9 out about this rate case is that that is their number
- 10 one concern. And that's what we'd like to bring to
- 11 the PSC today. I will try to be at the next two here.
- 12 This is the second one. I was in the one in Milton as
- 13 well. I will definitely be there tonight, but I
- 14 figure this is as good a time as any to bring up our
- 15 issues.
- JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Questions.
- 17 MR. STEINER: I have a question. Are you
- 18 testifying on behalf of yourself or on behalf of AARP?
- MR. HARDENBROOK: On behalf of AARP.
- JUDGE BUSHMANN:: Thank you. Any others?
- 21 I don't see any.
- 22 MR. KENNEY: Yeah. I just want to say
- 23 thanks to you all for being here. You have given a
- 24 quite a bit of information to digest. And, again, I
- 25 encourage all of you to take some time now to talk

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- 1 with representatives from KCP & L about your specific
- 2 issues. Again, this is one more of things all the
- 3 other commissioners will have an opportunity and will
- 4 take advantage of that opportunities to read your
- 5 testimony and take it into consideration after
- 6 deliberating the case. So please know that your voice
- 7 is valuable. And we thank you for taking the time to
- 8 appear today.
- 9 MR. RUPP: I'd like to encourage everyone
- 10 that is here -- not everybody in your community can be
- 11 here today at noon in the middle of the work day --
- 12 but you're a great community, you're a tight-knit
- 13 community, and you will have friends, and speak to
- 14 each other and your neighbors. If you have neighbors
- 15 and friends that have experienced the same issues that
- 16 have been coming up about -- that have been brought
- 17 up, especially if they have done any record -- trying
- 18 to do any recordings of the voltage in your home and
- 19 not have the information supplied to you, I would
- 20 really like to have that information. You can send
- 21 that into a letter to the Office of Public Counsel, to
- 22 our offices, it will be entered into the record. But
- 23 we're trying to establish is there a theme here, or
- 24 are they isolated instances. So the more we can hear
- 25 from the community, the better. So I encourage you to

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1	talk to your neighbors and your friends that have had
2	these issues and to have them contact us via e-mail, a
3	letter, or whatever so we can continue to see if this
4	is a pattern that has been continuing in this
5	community. Thank you.
6	JUDGE BUSHMANN:: That concludes our
7	hearing. Thank you all for coming. The hearing is
8	adjourned. We're off the record.
