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5	JUDGE STEARLEY: Who from Staff do we have up
6	in Gallatin?
7	MR. OCHOA: Judge, Gregg Ochoa and Tom Imhoff.
8	JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, Mr. Ochoa. And do
9	you have a witness list put together?
LO	MR. OCHOA: We do. And, at this time, I've got
L1	four witnesses signed up to testify.
L2	JUDGE STEARLEY: Very good. Let me get my
L3	introductions here and we'll pick up with our
L 4	witness list.
L5	I don't have a microphone on this bench. Can
L 6	you all hear me all right?
L7	MR. OCHOA: Yes.
L8	JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Well, good
L 9	evening. It's February 11th, 2008. Missouri Public
20	Service Commission has set this time for a local
21	public hearing in Case Number GR-2008-0060 in which
22	Missouri Gas Utility seeks to implement a general
23	rate increase for its natural gas service in
24	Missouri. This case has also been consolidated with
25	Case Number GR-2007-0178 involving energy used, ACA
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My name is Harold Stearley. I'm the Regulatory
Law Judge. I'll preside over tonight's hearing.
While the Commissioners aren't here in person,
several of them are watching our webcast. They will
be reviewing the cast tonight and will be listening
to all of your comments. And we do appreciate you
coming.

This is an official hearing of the Missouri Public Service Commission. Testimony and statements taken from the witnesses tonight must be under oath. I will swear you in. And the purpose of this hearing is to hear from you on the subject of the proposed rate increase. It's your opportunity to testify. Your remarks will be part of our official record. Once we get the entries of appearance from the attorney's tonight, we will have Mr. Ochoa call the names off the witness list in the order in which you've all have signed it. I will, at that time, swear in the witness. I will ask you to spell your name for our record so that we have it clearly in the record, and might have an introductory question or two for you, and then you will be allowed to give your remarks. At the conclusion of your remarks, don't disappear because we may have a couple of COVERING MISSOURI ST. LOUIS TO ST. JOSEPH 1-800-633-8289

other questions for you. And we will go in that 1 2 procedure. 3 Does anyone have any questions about the way 4 we're going to proceed tonight? 5 MR. OCHOA: No questions. JUDGE STEARLEY: We'll begin our public hearing 7 on Case Number GR-2008-0060 in the matter of the general increase for natural gas service provided by 8 9 Missouri Gas Utility, Incorporated. And we'll begin 10 by taking oral entries of appearance starting with 11 Missouri Gas Utility. MR. COOPER: D.L. Cooper from the law firm of 12 13 Brydon, Swearengen & England, P.C., P.O. Box 456, 14 Jefferson City, Missouri 65102, appearing on behalf 15 of Missouri Gas Utility, Inc. JUDGE STEARLEY: Staff of the Missouri Public 16 Commission. 17 18 Thank you, Judge. Lera Shemwell MS. SHEMWELL: of the Staff of the Missouri Public Service 19 20 Commission, Post Office Box 360, Jefferson City, 21 Missouri 65102. 22 JUDGE STEARLEY: The Office of the Public 23 Counsel. 24 MR. POSTON: Yes, Judge. Thank you. 25 Poston appearing for Office of the Public Counsel.

1	JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, Mr. Poston.
2	And do we have a court reporter up in Gallatin?
3	MR. OCHOA: Yes, we do, Your Honor.
4	JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. Very good. Well, it
5	looks like we're set to go here. I would like to
6	extend our thanks to our host up in Gallatin. The
7	Commission wouldn't have the opportunity to reach
8	out to so many members of the public if we didn't
9	have this ability to utilize the videoconferencing.
10	And so I do extend my thanks to our host.
11	And with that, Mr. Ochoa, I'd have you call the
12	first witness.
13	MR. OCHOA: Debbie Breeden.
14	JUDGE STEARLEY: Could you please repeat loudly
15	and spell your name for us?
16	MS. BREEDEN: Debbie Breeden. It's D-E-B-B-I-E
17	B-R-E-E-D-E-N.
18	JUDGE STEARLEY: Ms. Breeden, if you'd please
19	raise your right hand.
20	
21	DEBBIE BREEDEN,
22	called as a witness herein, having been first duly sworn,
23	testified as follows:
24	

JUDGE STEARLEY: Very well. And are you a 1 2 current customer of Missouri Gas Utility? 3 MS. BREEDEN: Yes, we are. JUDGE STEARLEY: Please proceed with your 4 5 statements. MS. BREEDEN: My main concern, as I stated here at the question and answer service, nobody, I don't 7 think, would be here if it wasn't such a gigantic 8 9 increase. 30.27 percent is just outrageous. I 10 don't know of any company, and I definitely don't 11 know of any company here in Gallatin, that gives their employees an increase in wages of 30.27 12 13 percent. The company states, in the question and 14 answer session, that they are not financially in 15 trouble. And their big call into Gallatin -- local 16 Gallatin paper is that they've been able to hold the prices down and that has increased their customer 17 18 service. Maybe not their customer -- but their 19 customers. That's been their big draw. So why do 20 we have to have such a big increase of 30.27 21 percent? Yes, everybody needs to make a profit. 22 And we understand that costs have gone up, but that 23 just seems an outrageous amount. And I understand 24 that, yeah, you ask for a big amount and you might 25 get a smaller amount. And maybe that's what they're

- looking for, but let's get it a little bit more in 1 2 line with what our wages are here in Daviess county 3 and think about our older citizens that are on a 4 locked income. 5 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Ms. Breeden, do you have anything else you'd like to add? 6 7 MS. BREEDEN: Not at this time. JUDGE STEARLEY: Have you had any problems with 8 9 your service? 10 MS. BREEDEN: No. Our service is fine. 11 Anytime we have called with a leak, they've always 12 been very prompt to reply to us. No problem with 13 our billing. We have great service. Not a problem 14 with that at all. It's just the increase is what 15 our main concern is. 16 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. Thank you. Do we have any questions for Ms. Breeden from any of our 17 18 counsel? 19 MR. COOPER: No, Your Honor. 20 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Poston? 21 MR. POSTON: No. Thank you. 22 JUDGE STEARLEY: Very well. Unless you've got 23 anything else you would like to add, Ms. Breeden, 24 you are free to step down.
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Thank you.

1	JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Ochoa, if you'd call our					
2	second witness, please.					
3	MR. OCHOA: Joyce Still. The second witness					
4	decided she would not testify.					
5	Mr. Ed Nixon.					
6	JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Hickman, if you'd please					
7	say and spell your name for our court reporter.					
8	MR. NIXON: It's Ed Nixon. E-D, N-I-X-O-N.					
9	JUDGE STEARLEY: So it's Lichtman? Did I get					
10	that correctly?					
11	MR. NIXON: Nixon. Just like tricky dicky.					
12	JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Mr. Nixon, if					
13	you'd please raise your right hand.					
14						
15	ED NIXON,					
16	called as a witness herein, having been first duly sworn,					
17	was examined and testified as follows:					
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19	JUDGE STEARLEY: I'm assuming you, too, are a					
20	customer of Missouri Gas Utility?					
21	MR. NIXON: Yes, I am.					
22	JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. You may proceed.					
23	MR. NIXON: On the literature that was passed					
24	out, they used an example of 70 CCF's a month would					
25	mean a \$24 a month increase. It kind of worries me					
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1	that this doesn't present a realistic picture of
2	what the people in town were facing. I used over
3	400 CCF's last month, which would have meant an
4	increase of well over a hundred dollars for my gas
5	bill last month. It was explained during the
6	question and answer period that that 70 CCF might
7	indicate an average over a total year taking into
8	account the summer months when very little is used.
9	However, if you pay a flat fee, a monthly fee,
10	during the summer months, when you're trying to save
11	your dollars to pay for increased electricity costs
12	for air conditioning, you're still paying last
13	winter's heating bill. I think I can see where
14	there is a need for increase just for operating
15	costs. But I would ask that you take a close look
16	at the profit margin, if that's not an archaic term,
17	and kind of have a little compassion for the people
18	that are out here, especially on a fixed income and
19	the elderly, where a \$500 gas bill for January would
20	it just would not be manageable.
21	That's all I have to say.
22	JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Nixon.
23	Have you had any problems with your service or
24	billing?
25	MR. NIXON: I have not. They probably had

problems with me because I've complained, but 1 2 they've been very patient and answered all my 3 questions. 4 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Thank you. And do 5 any of the attorneys have any questions for Mr. Nixon? 6 7 MR. COOPER: No, Your Honor. MR. POSTON: 8 No. 9 MS. SHEMWELL: Good evening, Mr. Nixon. 10 Lera Shemwell. I represent the Staff. Mr. Nixon, 11 you mentioned the possibility of getting a gas bill 12 that you could not pay. I'd like to encourage you, 13 if that happens -- or anyone else out there -- that 14 happens, for you to contact the company right away 15 and discuss it with them. Because they can probably 16 assist you in making arrangements to pay it. MR. NIXON: Yes, ma'am. And I know they have 17 18 done that to some people here in town. I'm just 19 saying that with that kind of an increase and that 20 kind of a bill in the winter, it's -- you know, it's 21 just going to grow and grow and grow. There's going 22 to be more and more people that are not going to be 23 able to handle it. 24 MS. SHEMWELL: Mr. Nixon, we'd like to thank

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you and all of the witnesses for coming out tonight.

1	It's cold here, not very nice weather, and we
2	appreciate you coming out to speak to us.
3	MR. NIXON: Thank you for listening.
4	JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Poston, do you have any
5	questions for Mr. Nixon?
6	MR. POSTON: No, thank you.
7	JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, Mr. Nixon. You may
8	step down.
9	Mr. Ochoa, do we still have another witness?
LO	MR. OCHOA: Yes. Wayne Shaw.
L1	MR. SHAW: Good afternoon.
L2	JUDGE STEARLEY: And if you would please state
L3	and spell your name for our court reporter.
L 4	MR. SHAW: Wayne Shaw. S-H-A-W. I am a
L5	Missouri Gas Utility's customer in Gallatin,
L 6	Missouri. And I'll make an
L7	JUDGE STEARLEY: Before you continue, let me
L8	swear you in real quick; okay? Raise your right
L 9	hand.
20	
21	WAYNE SHAW,
22	called as a witness herein, having been first duly sworn,
23	was examined and testified as follows:
24	

1 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you. You may proceed. 2 I have had good service. I can't MR. SHAW: 3 complain about it. I've had no problems. And I've 4 had no occasion to really call any serviceman. 5 I think my primary concern is in regard to this 30.27 percent. When you consider that social 7 security annual was two and three-tenths percent, I gained seven dollars a month. Now, that is for the 8 9 entire monthly by the -- the year. Now, if Missouri 10 Gas jumps their rates up thirty percent for a month 11 and I have to pay possibly \$35 to \$50 and my social security increases only seven dollars, where is that 12 13 money going to come from? That is the question. 14 And I think that Missouri Gas might review their 15 issue at the present time and realize that 30.27 16 might be a little bit high. I do realize that 17 expenses are bound to go up. And we're all affected 18 with that. But I believe they should see if they 19 could get that 30.27 percent increase lowered down 20 to where the older people on social security and 21 those on a low fixed income could better afford to 22 pay it. And I think that is about my general 23 attitude. Thanks for your time. 24 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Mr. Shaw, let me 25 ask if any of the attorneys have any questions for COVERING MISSOURI ST. LOUIS TO ST. JOSEPH 1-800-633-8289

1 you. None here. 2 Do you, Mr. Poston? 3 MR. POSTON: No. Thank you. 4 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Shaw. 5 MR. SHAW: Thank you for your time. JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Ochoa, did you say we have 6 7 another witness or --MR. OCHOA: No. I have no one else on the 8 list. Is there anyone else who wants to speak 9 10 tonight? 11 Your Honor, I don't see anybody at this time. JUDGE STEARLEY: We certainly appreciate any 12 13 other comments that anyone else would like to make. 14 MR. OCHOA: Don't have anybody else, Your 15 Honor. JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. There's -- I would like 16 to remind the audience that if you do decide that 17 18 you have comments, you can go to our website and make them or contact the Office of Public Counsel 19 20 and they can assist you with -- or even our Staff --21 and they can assist you with registering your 22 comments in writing to us in this matter. And we'd 23 certainly welcome any additional comments that 24 anyone would have. 25 I guess just to let you all know, a reminder,

1	that the evidentiary hearing for this matter is set
2	for April 7th through 11th. That hearing is open to
3	the public if anyone wishes to attend. Or if you
4	have internet access, you can watch our hearing live
5	over the internet as we broadcast those from our
6	webpage.
7	Since none of the Commissioners are here
8	tonight, we don't any opening or closing remarks. I
9	don't have any addition remarks to add. I do want
LO	to thank all of the people in Gallatin who did come
L1	out tonight, for braving the weather and giving us
12	your feedback. We certainly do appreciate that.
13	And with that, the public hearing in Case
L 4	Number GR-2008-0060 is hereby adjourned.
