This rate change is interim subject to refund.

There are a number of key factors in the natural gas industry causing rates to go up. Some of these factors include: recent high crude oil prices, significantly lower natural gas storage levels and colder than normal weather the end of February into the first part of March. Natural gas storage inventories are problematic due to a rapid storage draw down at the end of the heating season. Current inventories are more than 50 percent below the 5-year average for natural gas storage. In addition, the Energy Information Administration says natural gas production for the first 10 months of 2002 was 2.6 percent below 2001 levels.

A residential customer currently pays \$0.5901 per Ccf (per 100 cubic feet of gas).
