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Page 3 1 PROCEEDINGS 2 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Good afternoon. Welcome to 3 today's local public hearing in Case No. GR2014-0152. am Ron Pridgin. I am one of the judges with the Public 4 5 Service Commission, and with me are two of the 6 Commissioners. This is Chairman Kenney to my immediate 7 left, and Commissioner Rupp is on his left. 8 And before I go into an opening statement and see if we have anybody who wishes to testify, let me see if 10 the Commissioners have any welcoming remarks for you 11 today. 12 Mr. Chairman? 13 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Thank you-all for being here. As you probably already heard, this is the portion of the 14 15 hearing in which you get to express your opinions and thoughts about Liberty's request for a rate increase. 16 17 Your testimony at this stage will actually be recorded by a court reporter and will be transcribed. 18 there will be a transcript for the other Commissioners to 19 read. I do want to stress that. There are five 20 21 Commissioners on The Commission. Two of us are here. The other three Commissioners will have the opportunity to 22 listen -- or read your testimony, rather, and take that 23 24 into account as we deliberate, once the evidentiary hearing is concluded. 25

Page 4 So we do appreciate you being here. Your 1 2 testimony and presence here is an integral part of the 3 process. And we thank you for being here and look forward to what you have to tell us. 4 5 COMMISSIONER RUPP: I just want to welcome everybody. One thing I'd like to remind you of is we may 6 7 ask you some questions to clarify your testimony, but we 8 are not allowed to answer my questions, as that might be considered as prejudging the case. We have to get all of 10 the information. So if you were to have a question for us, we could not able to respond at this time. You have 11 12 the Office of Public Counsel. That is the person that 13 would be your advocate and the person that could answer your questions. 14 15 But thank you very much for being here, and, like he said, we're here to listen, and we're looking forward 16 17 to hearing your comments. MR. CRAVEN: I'm sorry, I don't have a question 18 but just for information, what exactly is a Judge -- and 19 20 you two gentlemen, if you could, give your background and 21 where you are from; if would that be possible. Thank you. CHAIRMAN KENNEY: So the Commission are five 22 23 Commissioners, and we are appointed by the Governor and 24 subject to confirmation by the Missouri State Senate. And we are appointed for six year staggered terms. Our 25

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- 1 backgrounds are varied. I am an attorney by trade. I
- 2 spent a significant chunk of my career practicing law in
- 3 St. Louis at a law firm. I've also worked as an Assistant
- 4 Attorney General in the Customer Protection Division and
- 5 I've served as the Attorney General's Chief of Staff for a
- 6 period of time before I got appointed to The Commission.
- 7 I was appointed in July of '09 by Governor Nixon and was
- 8 named Chairman by Governor Nixon on March of 2013.
- 9 COMMISSIONER RUPP: My background, I was a small
- 10 business owner; had several small businesses; sold them;
- 11 went into the Missouri State Senate. I was a State
- 12 Senator for 8 years, in which I was term-limited out. At
- 13 that point, the Governor appointed me to the Public
- 14 Service Commission of which I have been there now for
- 15 three months.
- 16 JUDGE PRIDGIN: And I am a Judge with The
- 17 Commission. I hear the case and I essentially write the
- 18 Orders for the Commissioners. I have been employed as a
- 19 Judge with the Commission for 12 years now.
- 20 All right. The Missouri Public Service
- 21 Commission has set this time for a local hearing in Case
- No. GR2014-0152. The Commission regulates the rates
- 23 charged by investor-owned utility companies in Missouri to
- 24 ensure that those rates are just and reasonable.
- 25 The Commission also regulates the quality of

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- 1 service and the safety of the operations of the
- 2 investor-owned utilities.
- 3 The Commission is made up of five Commissioners,
- 4 two of whom are here today. They are appointed by the
- 5 Governor to fixed terms and are confirmed by the Senate.
- The Commission also employs a staff of engineers,
- 7 accountants, attorneys, financial analysts, and other
- 8 specialists in the field of utility regulation.
- 9 This is an official hearing of the Commission,
- 10 and the statements and testimony of witnesses will be
- 11 recorded by the court reporter and must be given under
- 12 oath.
- 13 All of the Commissioners will have a chance to
- 14 read the remarks. The purpose of this portion of the
- 15 hearing is to hear from you. The Company will not present
- 16 witnesses and will not answer questions at this time.
- 17 This is your chance to testify.
- 18 I will call the name of each witness who has
- 19 signed up to speak, and after I call your name, I'll ask
- 20 that you take an oath. I will then ask you a few
- 21 preliminary questions, such as how to spell your name so
- 22 the court reporter can record it accurately, and I'll ask
- 23 if you are a customer of Liberty Utilities and then will
- 24 allow you to make your statement.
- 25 There may be questions from the Commissioners, or

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1	from me, so please don't leave any kind of witness area or
2	please remain standing until you are excused. For someone
3	who wishes to testify, but for religious reasons cannot
4	take an oath, please let me know, and I'll ask your
5	testimony to be affirmed instead.
6	Does anyone have any questions before I call the
7	first witness?
8	All right. And I hope I'm reading this name
9	correctly, Bud Craven?
10	MR. CRAVEN: Yes, sir.
11	JUDGE PRIDGIN: If you will, please stand and be
12	sworn.
13	BUD CRAVEN,
14	having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified
15	as follows:
16	EXAMINATION
17	QUESTIONS BY JUDGE PRIDGIN:

- 18 Q. Thank you. If you would, state your name and
- 19 spell it for the court reporter.
- 20 A. My name is Bud Craven, B-U-D last name Craven,
- 21 C-R-A-V- as in victory, E-N.
- Q. And are you a customer of Liberty Utilities?
- 23 A. I am. And I live in Jackson.
- Q. All right. Do you have a statement for the
- 25 Commissioners?

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- 1 MR. CRAVEN: I am retired teacher of Government
- 2 History for 36 years. I received this notice from
- 3 Liberty, and it was timely, or it was at least a month or
- 4 so ago, and I also went to a meeting that -- they had an
- 5 open house, and I was very appreciative of Mr. Green and
- 6 the others. And, Dave, you did a good job while we were
- 7 there.
- 8 Now, I brought up at that time that I basically
- 9 am outraged when I do my math and I see a 31 percent
- 10 increase, which I find preposterous. I know the
- 11 explanation, and I know that gas actually is cheap right
- 12 now in the United States. It's -- I don't know it's the
- 13 lowest it's ever been, but it's awful darn low.
- 14 And I'm also aware that Mr. Rupp pointed out that
- 15 that's -- that the gas price itself is not within, you
- 16 know, this cost, that that's separate, and I understand
- 17 that, but I would consider a 12 to 13 percent increase,
- 18 outrageous, which is the figure that they come up with
- 19 when you take those other things out.
- 20 One of my concerns, especially here, is not only
- 21 after being teacher of many years and teaching virtually
- 22 thousands of students for all those years, but, also, I
- 23 was raised in Dexter, and I've lived in and know a lot
- 24 about the Boothill area. And I know that that area going
- 25 south from here in Stoddard County and going on down into

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- 1 Mississippi County -- we're talking about poverty here.
- 2 These people -- I mean, the unemployment rate is one of
- 3 the highest it's ever been in history. The graduation
- 4 rates, births with people not married... I mean, it's the
- 5 highest, not only here in Missouri, but some among entire
- 6 United States.
- 7 And I'm sure that Liberty has worked with those
- 8 people and goes to those homes down there. I hope that
- 9 they are cognizant of, you know, what's actually taking
- 10 place there.
- 11 And I live in Jackson. I moved -- I lived in
- 12 Cape Girardeau for many years and I moved to Jackson
- 13 several years ago. And what I see when I drive around
- 14 Jackson is, Jackson is not a place of wealthy people. You
- 15 know, there are a lot of people who are well-off, but when
- 16 you drive down the streets and you're looking at houses
- 17 that are -- a lot of them are 100,000 at most or less, as
- 18 you drive around -- anyone that drives around, you know
- 19 that. And especially when businesses go in around these
- 20 homes, you know how people are living.
- 21 And my point is, these people are -- I don't
- 22 think, I know, cannot afford this kind of increase. You
- 23 know, I could see 2, 3, 5 percent. Something like that, I
- 24 find, you know, is a reasonable amount or whatever.
- 25 But in -- considering the economy these days, and

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- 1 since it's been -- since '08, you know, when everything
- 2 fell apart with the poor government running at that time,
- 3 we are in desperate straits here. And, again,
- 4 considering the fact that gas is cheap, that's why it
- 5 especially seems very shocking.
- I -- it almost looks like in some way that we're
- 7 being gouged, you know. And I asked Mr. Green before
- 8 about the building, and I understand how it's divided and
- 9 all of that, and I appreciate that, and hopefully you're
- 10 making good business judgments, and that's what we want
- 11 for you, and we're happy that you're here and all of that,
- 12 but, again, it just seems shocking to have this.
- 13 And this is what I hope the Public Service
- 14 Commission will look at and obviously look at the
- 15 technical things that his and her staff did, to make sure
- 16 this is justified, because it seems preposterous. It
- 17 seems like at this time, at this place, it's unbelievable.
- 18 It's almost like a Canadian company that comes
- 19 down here, you know, and they buy into -- you know, take
- 20 out most all of these (inaudible) and they want to get
- 21 their money back, and it just seems greedy, to say the
- 22 least. That's what -- how it appears to me, as I look at
- 23 what happened. Thank you.
- JUDGE PRIDGIN: Mr. Craven, thank you.
- Mr. Chairman, any questions?

Page 11 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Mr. Craven, thank you for your 1 2 time and well-thought out testimony. I don't have too 3 many questions. Just one. EXAMINATION 4 OUESTIONS BY CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Could you share with me any perspective that you 6 7 have about the quality or caliber of the customer service 8 you've been receiving? 9 I haven't really had any contact as such. You know, they're new, really. They fortunately have some 10 11 great people. Mr. Green, I met him, and maybe I can get 12 him to smile. He is the one right there (indicating), and 13 he is a nice gentlemen, cares about what he is doing and all of that; I perceived all of that. So, you know, all 14 15 of that is good. And I assume at the new building you can actually 16 17 pay your bill there, right? Or I learned of that in their little episode, but... 18 19 So I hope that was a good investment for them, but I just -- you know, I understand how you can separate 20 21 it off. I just don't want to be gouged. And, again, I'm -- I'm not rich, but I'm well-off and comfortable. But, 22 23 again, being a teacher for many years and knowing the Boothill, which they deal with, it's just -- it's 24 25 shocking.

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1	But, no, I haven't nothing but positive things
2	to say about their people and their operations at this
3	time.
4	It did seem unbelievable that they built such a
5	building, but once I understood and I understand better
6	today, hopefully, it was smart business sense, rather than
7	doing something else. But everything has been nothing but
8	positive. But it just started.
9	CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Thank you again for your
10	comments, and thank you for being here.
11	JUDGE PRIDGIN: I have no questions.
12	Thank you for your testimony, sir.
13	The next name and I hope I'm pronouncing this
14	correctly Brian Gerau; is that correct?
15	MR. GERAU: Yes, sir.
16	JUDGE PRIDGIN: All right. If you will, come
17	around and be sworn, please.
18	BRIAN GERAU,
19	having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified
20	as follows:
21	EXAMINATION
22	QUESTIONS BY JUDGE PRIDGIN:
23	Q. State your name and spell it for the court
24	reporter.
25	A. My name is Brian Gerau, B-R-I-A-N Gerau,

Page 13 G-E-R-A-U. 1 Q. And are you a customer of Liberty Utilities? 3 Α. Yes, sir, I am. Q. All right. Any remarks for the Commissioners? 5 MR. GERAU: Yes, sir. Thank you. I am the Executive Director at the Jackson Area Chamber of 7 Commerce, and I'm here just to kind of speak in favor of Liberty Utilities on what they do for our community. 8 They're a tremendous asset to not only Jackson, but the region as a whole. They're tremendous partners with the 10 Chamber, but, outside of the Chamber, they're extremely 11 12 generous and hard-working with our schools, our 13 non-for-profit... they work well with our city, and we are just extremely fortunate to have them in our area. 14 15 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Thank you so much. 16 Mr. Chairman? 17 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: No questions, Mr. Gerau. you for being here. 18 19 JUDGE PRIDGIN: All right. Thank you, sir. Thank you for your time. 20 21 The next name I see is Harry Snyder, Sr. 22 MR. SNYDER: Yes, sir. 23 JUDGE PRIDGIN: If you will, raise your right hand and be sworn, please. 24 25 HARRY SNYDER, SR.,

Page 14 having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified 2 as follows: 3 EXAMINATION QUESTIONS BY JUDGE PRIDGIN: Please state your name and spell it for the court reporter. 6 7 Harry Snyder, Sr. Harry, H-A-R-R-Y, Snyder is 8 S-N-Y-D-E-R. And are you a customer of Liberty Utilities? Q. Yes, I am. 10 Α. 11 Okay. Do you have any statements for the Q. 12 Commissioners? MR. SNYDER: Well, with regard to the one that my 13 wife made earlier, we received notice of this meeting 14 Saturday in the mail, which doesn't give you a lot of 15 time. Being retired, like I think most of the people in 16 17 here are, we were able to make the meeting, but I thought that was a poor time to receive it and come up with your 18 19 reasons for it. And being retired, you're on limited income. And 20 21 we're better off than a lot of other people, but this 6 dollar and 42 cent rate increase, for us, we can handle, 22 but the companies that -- big businesses that are going to 23 24 be charged this rate increase are going to pass this rate increase onto the individual customers along with their 25

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- 1 already rate increase. And I find that will be really
- 2 hard. And people on a limited income, worse off than I
- 3 am, are not going to be able to afford a rate increase
- 4 when the cost of living doesn't meet their expectations
- 5 and when they're living on a fixed, retirement income.
- 6 And there are cost of living raises this year. So here
- 7 again, we're getting jammed again and paying more. This
- 8 is going to take away food from some people and medicine
- 9 from some people, especially seniors. And I find this
- 10 totally not called for at this time.
- 11 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Mr. Snyder, thank you.
- Mr. Chairman, any questions?
- 13 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Just a couple. Mr. Snyder,
- 14 thank for being here.
- 15 QUESTIONS BY CHAIRMAN KENNEY:
- 16 Q. Did you have an opportunity during the earlier
- 17 portion to address your concerns about the timeliness of
- 18 the notice to the Company?
- 19 A. Yes, I did.
- 20 Q. And did you receive an explanation that satisfied
- 21 you?
- 22 MRS. SNYDER: No.
- A. No, not really.
- 24 QUESTIONS BY CHAIRMAN KENNEY:
- 25 Q. What was the explanation you received?

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- 1 MRS. SNYDER: That they sent notice. I did the
- 2 talking on that one. He didn't.
- 3 A. They said they sent the notices out in a couple
- 4 of billings, and we did not receive any in our billing.
- 5 The first one we got was Saturday, when we received our
- 6 monthly bill, and we found that, you know, really hard.
- 7 And again, you know, if you're not retired, it's hard to
- 8 take off of work, when you need your money, to come to a
- 9 meeting like this at 12:00.
- 10 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Thank you for that comment.
- 11 QUESTIONS BY CHAIRMAN KENNEY:
- 12 Q. One additional question, a similar question that
- 13 I asked of Mr. Craven, other than what you just said about
- 14 the timeliness of the notice that you received, do you
- 15 have any other thoughts that you would like to share about
- 16 the quality or the caliber of service that you've
- 17 received?
- 18 A. Yeah. We went over to the office here to pay our
- 19 bill, and the person who waited on us was not willing to
- 20 give us a receipt for our payment. She did, but, you
- 21 know, we had to argue about it to get it. And I think we
- 22 should receive that automatically, without asking for it.
- 23 That's part of doing business.
- 24 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Well, I'm sure the Company is
- 25 appreciative of those comments. And another portion of

Page 17 the public hearing -- or another reason for the public 1 2 hearing is we do have those kinds of concerns, and there 3 are representatives from the Company that are able to address those. After this portion is over, I would 4 5 encourage you to take advantage of that and share those concerns with Mr. Green and others from the Company. 6 7 thank you for being here. We do appreciate the time that 8 you're taking to be here and appreciate your comments and your wife's comments. 10 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Commissioner Rupp, any questions? COMMISSIONER RUPP: Yeah. I just have one. 11 12 EXAMINATION 13 QUESTIONS BY COMMISSIONER RUPP: 14 What was the reason you were given for not Q. 15 getting a receipt when you paid your bill? MRS. SNYDER: She didn't really give us a reason. 16 17 She just acted disturbed that she had to get up and go and get it from the printer. And we were going on vacation, 18 and I was paying my bill in advance, and we went in there 19 20 to ask if that was possible and how much did we owe, and 21 so when I wrote the check, nothing was said. She just kind of took the check. And I said, could we have a 22 23 receipt? And she acted disturbed that she had to get up and go to where I couldn't see over here into another room 24 25 and get that from the printer.

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1	COMMISSIONER RUPP: Thank you.
2	JUDGE PRIDGIN: I don't have any questions.
3	Thank you for your time and your remarks.
4	I don't have anyone else who has signed up to
5	testify. Is there anyone else who wishes to testify
6	before The Commission?
7	Yes, sir. All right. If you will, give me your
8	name, please.
9	MR. GLEASON: My name is Tom Gleason. I've been
10	a resident of Jackson for 39 years.
11	JUDGE PRIDGIN: Okay. If I could get you to
12	raise your right hand and have you spell name for the
13	court reporter
14	MR. GLEASON: First name is Tom, last name is
15	Gleason.
16	JUDGE PRIDGIN: Let me swear you in first,
17	please.
18	TOM GLEASON,
19	having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified
20	as follows:
21	EXAMINATION
22	QUESTIONS BY JUDGE PRIDGIN:
23	Q. Thank you, sir. Please state your name and spell
24	it for the court reporter.
25	A. My first name is Tom, T-O-M. My last name is

Page 19 Gleason, G-L-E-A-S-O-N. 1 2 Q. And are you a customer of Liberty Utilities? 3 Α. Yes, sir. Q. Okay. Any statement you have? 5 MR. GLEASON: Well, I've been a resident of Jackson for 39 years, and all the time I've been here in 6 7 Jackson, I've been with the gas company, is what I'm 8 saying. And when I found out that -- the cost that 9 Liberty paid just a while ago before you gentlemen came in 10 here to talk to us, is what I'm saying. They spent 11 12 \$7,000,000. And if you go to Cape Girardeau, you've got the old Blue Cross Blue Shield building and you've got the 13 old Sears building, which is empty, is what I'm saying. 14 15 And I just think that the money that was spent could have been spent in a better -- on meters or on 16 17 equipment instead of spending money on capital 18 improvements like building a new building. 19 The other thing, I was talking to one -- the 20 accounting lady from the Public Service Commission, and I 21 had asked her if at all possible, if she was -- she was talking about the increase that Liberty Utilities is 22 asking for, and I was asking her, are we paying all of the 23 24 salary costs and everything else so that whatever Liberty utility gets is all a hundred percent profit? 25

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- 1 And as Mr. Cravens was talking about and the
- 2 gentlemen down the isle here on the desk here, you know,
- 3 we're in -- Jackson or Cape County is pretty okay. It's
- 4 pretty healthy, but when you get further south, the people
- 5 are on -- you know, their income level is low. Some of
- 6 it's okay, and some of it's good, but what would the
- 7 outcome be if Liberty Utilities was like Murphy USA?
- 8 Right now, the price of gasoline is running
- 9 \$3.34, and if Liberty Utilities is the only gas company,
- 10 it would probably go up to five bucks a gallon. What
- 11 would the outcome be there? And then you've got another
- 12 company down the street selling gas for \$3 a gallon. Why
- 13 such an increase?
- I just think it -- well, I don't know if you guys
- 15 ever bought a house or if you rent or whatever, but when
- 16 you're negotiating to buy a house, you don't give the
- 17 seller the full price of what they're asking for. You
- 18 come back with a counter-offer. And -- but is this the
- 19 first offer, is what I'm saying? This \$13? I don't mind
- 20 the increase. The company is entitled to make a profit,
- 21 but \$13 more in addition to what they're already getting
- 22 now? To me, it's sad.
- 23 And I just think on the big picture. And
- 24 Mr. Cravens talked about ever since President Obama has
- 25 taken office, the unemployment -- or before he took

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- 1 office, unemployment wasn't real low, and we weren't in
- 2 that much of a debt. And now we're in a pickle, is what
- 3 I'm saying.
- 4 And the jobs -- a couple months ago, Governor
- 5 Perry came to Texas and was trying to get businesses to go
- 6 from Missouri to Texas. And Missouri has a high tax rate,
- 7 is what I'm saying. If we're more competitive, we --
- 8 Governor Nixon could lower the tax rates, and we would add
- 9 more jobs to the community. We could create more
- 10 services. And I just think that it's going to affect
- 11 everyone. Everyone.
- 12 And then this accounting lady from the Public
- 13 Service Commission, she's never -- I don't think she's
- 14 looked at what the actual cost is per employee; what
- 15 they're paying the employee; the cost of doing business.
- 16 And, to me, with this increase from 13.75 to
- 17 19.70, that's probably half of their cost right there.
- 18 And I just think that we're going backward instead of
- 19 forward.
- 20 And I don't know if -- I wouldn't spend
- 21 \$7,000,000 on a brand new building. And the other thing,
- 22 when they built the building, MODOT had to expand -- put
- 23 a -- widen the path on 61 because everyone was turning
- 24 into that lane, and then tax payers had to pay a major
- 25 portion of that cost; absorb that cost. And the tax

Page 22 payers in Jackson shouldn't absorb that cost. Liberty 2 utilities should have absorbed that cost, and not passed 3 that cost onto us. That's it. JUDGE PRIDGIN: Mr. Gleason, thank you. 4 5 Mr. Chairman, any questions? 6 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Just one, Mr. Gleason. 7 for taking the time to testify. We appreciate the remarks. I just want to ask a similar question that I 8 asked some of the others. 10 EXAMINATION QUESTIONS BY CHAIRMAN KENNEY: 11 12 Do you have any thoughts or perspective on the 13 quality or caliber of customer service that you've 14 received thus far? 15 No, it's good. Α. 16 Q. Again, thank you for sharing your perspective. 17 JUDGE PRIDGIN: I don't have any questions. 18 Mr. Gleason, thank you. 19 Does anyone else wish to testify? No? 20 All right. Closing remarks, Mr. Chairman? 21 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: I will just thank everybody again. This is first in the series of public hearings. 22 We will have another one this evening in Sikeston and then 23 24 tomorrow in Hannibal and then again on Wednesday in 25 Kirksville.

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1	So we will have other opportunities for other
2	customers receiving service to be able to provide their
3	perspective as well. We appreciate that you've been here.
4	This process will culminate in a hearing in Jefferson
5	City. You're welcome to come and attend that evidentiary
6	hearing, as well, or watch it streaming live on the
7	Internet, as well, and watch how this case is progressing.
8	Thank you for being here, and have a good day.
9	JUDGE PRIDGIN: Commissioner Rupp?
10	COMMISSIONER RUPP: Thank you for being here. We
11	will take all of your comments to heart. We will look at
12	all of the evidence and make a right and just decision
13	when the whole Commission has the chance to hear all of
14	the evidence.
15	JUDGE PRIDGIN: Thank you.
