2	(The hearing commenced at 6:29 p.m.)					
3	JUDGE DIPPELL: We can go ahead and go					
4	on the record.					
5	The Commission has set this time for a					
6	local public hearing in Case Nos. GR-2017-0215 and					
7	GR-2017-0216, in the matter of Laclede Gas Company's					
8	request for a rate increase for its gas services,					
9	and in the matter of Laclede Gas Company's rate					
10	increase for its Missouri Gas Energy territory, and					
11	the company has since changed its name to Spire.					
12	My name is Nancy Dippell and I'm the					
13	regulatory law judge assigned to preside over this					
14	matter tonight. I have with me Commissioner Maida					
15	Coleman.					
16	Commissioner, would you like to say					
17	something?					
18	COMMISSIONER COLEMAN: Sure. Thank you,					
19	Judge.					
20	Good evening, everyone. Thank you so					
21	much for coming tonight to provide us with your					
22	comments and concerns relative to this rate case. I					
23	am one of five Public Service Commissioners, and I					
24	will be listening to and writing down the comments					
25	that you have tonight, in addition to the					

1	information that will be provided to the PSC by the					
2	court reporter. We will provide that information to					
3	the other four commissioners who will be able to					
4	read your comments and be able to gauge from that					
5	the information that the five of us will need to					
б	make a decision concerning this.					
7	Do know that we take your comments very					
8	seriously. It is important for us to hear from the					
9	customers of Spire, and I am one that's particularly					
10	interested in any customer service concerns that you					
11	have.					
12	So, thank you for coming tonight and					
13	providing us with your information.					
14	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you.					
15	So, the process tonight, now that we've					
16	finished the question-and-answer portion, will be					
17	the formal testimony portion. And so, I will call					
18	off the names that have signed up on the list and I					
19	will ask you to come forward to this microphone					
20	here. I'll ask you to give your testimony under					
21	oath or affirmation and the court reporter will					
22	transcribe what you have to say, and that will all					
23	become part of the record that way. So, I will ask					
24	you to say your name and to spell it so the court					
25	reporter gets it in the record correctly. After I					

1	finished the people on the list, if anyone else					
2	would like to testify, I'll give you the opportunity					
3	to do so. I'd ask you to stay at the microphone					
4	after you finished giving your comments just in case					
5	there are any clarifying questions from myself or					
6	the Commissioner or some of the attorneys that are					
7	present.					
8	So, to start with, I'm going to ask the					
9	attorneys that are present to make their entries of					
10	appearance. Can we start with Staff, please?					
11	MR. JOHNSON: Thank you, Judge. Mark					
12	Johnson on behalf of the Staff of the Missouri					
13	Public Service Commission, and the court reporter					
14	has my contact information.					
15	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you.					
16	And for Spire.					
17	MR. PENDERGAST: Thank you, Your Honor.					
18	Michael C. Pendergast appearing on behalf of Spire.					
19	My business address is 423 South Main Street,					
20	St. Charles, Missouri 63301.					
21	JUDGE DIPPELL: And for the Office of					
22	Public Counsel.					
23	MS. SHEMWELL: Thank you, Judge Dippell.					
24	Good evening, Commissioner Coleman. Lera Shemwell					
25	on behalf of the Office of the Public Counsel, and					

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1 the court reporter has my information. Thank you. 2 Thank you. JUDGE DIPPELL: 3 And are there any intervenors present 4 that want to make an entry? 5 Seeing none. Then we'll go ahead with the testimony portion. So, the first name, and I 6 7 probably won't pronounce this correctly, the last name H-O-Y-N-A-C-K-I. 8 9 MR. HOYNACKI: Just Paul. JUDGE DIPPELL: Paul, okay. That works, 10 11 too. 12 PAUL HOYNACKI, 13 being first duly sworn, testified under oath as 14 follows: 15 JUDGE DIPPELL: Could you go ahead and 16 state your name and spell it for the court reporter. 17 MR. HOYNACKI: My name is Paul Hoynacki, 18 H-O-Y-N-A-C-K-I. 19 JUDGE DIPPELL: Go ahead with your 20 comments. 21 MR. HOYNACKI: Okay. Well, I thank you 2.2 for the opportunity to appear here and I very much 23 appreciate your interests. 24 The Missouri Public Service Commission 25 is supposed to be regulate -- and does regulate

1	Laclede Gas and now Spire. It is a public utility,				
2	which basically cannot ever lose money. They pass				
3	along any extra costs they ever have. Like a fuel				
4	rate rider, like, when the fuel rates go up and so				
5	forth, they have the ability to pass that on if any				
6	additional cost. Any other commercial company can't				
7	do that. I mean, if they're not very well managed,				
8	they may lose money. A public utility can't.				
9	That's a bug and they're not entitled to the same				
10	profit potential as any other commercial venture in				
11	my opinion.				
12	Laclede started this TPIS or ISP TPIS				
13	I guess it is, surveillance charge some years ago.				
14	I understand it was done all the way back in the				
15	early 2000s, but this year in February my rate was				
16	\$3.01. In April it went to 3.57. In June it went				
17	to 3.86. In July it went to 3.94. That's a 32				
18	percent increase in six months. That doesn't make				
19	any sense to me at all. I mean, annualize that,				
20	it's a 64 percent increase, but the I mean, how				
21	can you-all continue to let this happen?				
22	And I thank you so much for the ability				
23	to present this.				
24	JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Coleman?				
25	COMMISSIONER COLEMAN: Sir, the numbers				

1 that you're giving us, you're talking about fixed 2 rate costs? 3 MR. HOYNACKI: No. That's just the 4 incremental cost for this, what is it, the ISRS. 5 That's the incremental cost increase on my bill 6 every month from February to July and, I mean, four 7 increases. One of the gentleman explained to me, well, some of it was incremental because it was one 8 9 transfer over to the other, but it resulted in four 10 increases however you read it. I can't read it any 11 other way than what it appears on my bill. 12 COMMISSIONER COLEMAN: Thank you, sir. 13 MR. HOYNACKI: Thank you. 14 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you very much. 15 Ron Oakley. 16 MR. OAKLEY: My name is Ronnie W. 17 Oakley, O-A-K-L-E-Y. I live in Dardenne Prairie, Missouri. 18 19 JUDGE DIPPELL: I'm going to swear you 20 in. 21 RON OAKLEY, 2.2 being first duly sworn, testified under oath as 23 follows: 24 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Go ahead 25 with your comments.

1	MR. OAKLEY: I guess, you know, having
2	worked for other companies and so forth, I'm used to
3	them always putting back a set amount of money each
4	year for infrastructure or building repair, also
5	setting aside money for new product development or
6	additional infrastructure expansion. I don't know
7	if Laclede does this. I do not know, but all I do
8	know is that in January of this year the customer
9	charge for delivery of gas was 19.50 and the gas
10	itself was about 80 bucks. Okay. In July of this
11	year the charge was the same, 19.50 for delivery of
12	\$2.53 worth of gas. I just have a hard time
13	perceiving that. If the fixed charges were attached
14	more to the rate of the gas so you use more, you pay
15	more, I can see that. But according to their bills,
16	they pass the price of the gas onto us directly with
17	no added charge, but I still don't see this fixed
18	rate. And like I said, as far as their rate
19	increase, they said that it's, like, a 10 percent
20	profit rate. I know a lot of companies that don't
21	get 10 percent, and this seems a little you know,
22	it's not 50 percent, but it seems a little harsh to
23	guarantee them that income. Thank you.
24	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. And I will
25	just say if you have any questions about the way the

1 rates are structured, I will ask you to speak to some of these people either with the company or the 2 Staff of the Commission or Office of Public Counsel. 3 4 I think you understand it from your comments, but if 5 you need --MR. OAKLEY: Yeah. 6 7 JUDGE DIPPELL: -- more explanation, please take opportunity tonight when there's people 8 9 available. 10 MR. OAKLEY: Thank you. 11 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you for your 12 comments. 13 John Elek. 14 JOHN ELEK, 15 being first duly sworn, testified under oath as 16 follows: 17 JUDGE DIPPELL: Can you, please, state 18 your name and spell it, please. MR. ELEK: John Elek, E-L-E-K. I live 19 in St. Charles County. I do have another home in 20 21 south St. Louis City. 2.2 My question is based on a monopoly 23 situation. All public utilities seem to be a monopoly. I've been to several rate increase 24 25 hearings with Ameren, also with the water company,

1	and they all give me the same type of answer. It					
2	is it is what it is because we can do because					
3	we are a monopoly. My question is: When is this					
4	going to stop? Some of us have fixed income, I am					
5	one, and sooner or later I'm not going to be able to					
6	pay the pills. Maybe I'm going to die before then,					
7	I don't know, but sooner or later there's got to be					
8	some way of capping the pricing of services to maybe					
9	just the senior citizens of the group, but sooner or					
10	later it's going to have to stop.					
11	Basically that's my comments and I thank					
12	you for your time.					
13	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, sir.					
14	COMMISSIONER COLEMAN: Thank you, sir.					
15	JUDGE DIPPELL: Norm Hild.					
16	MR. HILD: I, unfortunately,					
17	misinterpreted the function of that piece of paper.					
18	JUDGE DIPPELL: That's fine.					
19	MR. HILD: I have no need to make any					
20	further questions.					
21	JUDGE DIPPELL: All right. And Sharon					
22	Hild?					
23	MRS. HILD: No. He put my name on					
24	there.					
25	JUDGE DIPPELL: Also. All right.					

1	That's fine.					
2	Is there anyone else who would like to					
3	testify?					
4	Okay. Well, we appreciate you-all					
5	coming out, spending your valuable time here to give					
б	us the information that we need to help make					
7	decisions at the Commission, and I'll wish you-all					
8	safe travels home, and we can go off the record.
