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Page 4 1 The following proceedings began at 1:17 p.m.: 2 JUDGE CLARK: Good afternoon. Today is October 13th of 2022, and it is currently 1:17 p.m. 3 Now, you just finished the question and answer period of 4 the public hearing. If you had questions about this 5 6 rate case, I would hope you were able to get those 7 answered. 8 Now, before I take comments, I'm going to ask 9 that everybody mute themselves unless they're speaking 10 or actively giving comments at the time, and that will cut down on the noise level and prevent audio feedback 11 12 or unnecessary interruptions. If you need to unmute yourself and you're participating by phone, you may do 13 so by dialing \*6 when it's time to offer your comments. 14 Now, the Missouri Public Service Commission 15 has set aside this time for a local public hearing in 16 17 File No. GR-2022-0179, a general rate case captioned as 18 In the Matter of Spire Missouri, Incorporated d/b/a 19 Spire's Request for Authority to Implement a General 20 Rate Increase for Natural Gas Service Provided in the 21 Company's Missouri Service Areas. 22 My name is John Clark. I'm the Regulatory Law 23 Judge overseeing this local public hearing. Now, the 24 Missouri Public Service Commission regulates the rates 25 charged by investor-owned utility companies in Missouri

Page 5 to ensure that those rates are just and reasonable. 1 The 2 Commission also regulates the quality of service and 3 safety of operations of investor-owned utilities. Now, the Commission is made up of five 4 5 Commissioners: Chairman Ryan Silvey and Commissioners Scott Rupp, Maida Coleman, Jason Holsman, and Glen 6 7 Kolkmeyer. The Commissioners are appointed by the Governor to fixed terms and confirmed by the Senate. 8 The Commission employs a staff of engineers, 9 10 accountants, attorneys, financial analysts, and other specialists in the field of utility regulation. With me 11 12 today are Commissioners Rupp, Coleman, Holsman, and do I have Commissioner Kolkmeyer on? I believe Kolkmeyer may 13 be joining us, but he's not on at the moment. 14 15 Would any of the Commissioners like to make an 16 opening remark at this point? 17 Now, the court reporter is transcribing the hearing so that the Commissioners that are not present 18 19 may read and review the comments at a later date. At this time I'm going to begin by asking counsel to enter 20 21 their appearance for the record starting with Spire. 22 MR. APLINGTON: Good afternoon, Your Honor, 23 and Commissioners. My name is Matt Aplington. represent Spire Missouri, Inc., 700 Market Street, St. 24 25 Louis, Missouri 63101.

22	MS. PADGETT: No. I am a party since I'm part
23	of Consumers Council, but I'm not counsel, no. Thank

After I go through the 7 8 list of people that have signed up for comments, I will 9 ask if anybody who is present on the WebEx would like to 10 make a comment and at that time you can let me know. I may have questions for you, the Commissioners may have questions 13 for you, or one of the attorneys may have questions for 14 15 you. If I have a question for you, I'll just ask it. I'm going to ask that the Commissioners do the same. 16 17 I'm not going to pause after each witness and ask for 18 Commission questions. So just feel free to pipe in and 19 ask your questions when they come to you. 20 As for attorneys, if you'll flag me just so 21 that I can announce your name for the court reporter, 2.2 that would be helpful. MR. MOSS: Your Honor, I'm not sure if I'm on 23 24 the list, because my meeting password would not be 25 accepted on the phone.

MR. MOSS: Well, Your Honor, I'm actually from

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Page 12 1 California. I lived in California for 30 full years, 2 and it's no surprise we all know California, right? It's full of money laundering, full of issues with the 3 government and utility companies. It's just way too 4 5 overpriced. It's gone to complete crap. That's why I moved out and I live in Missouri now. To tell you the 6 7 truth, Your Honor, Spire has been outrageous since I 8 moved here like nothing I've ever seen in my time in 9 California. I mean, it is outrageous, sir, when I'm 10 spending \$75 every single month and I have the lowest 11 amount of gas possible to use, and the only thing it's 12 doing is heating my water. It feels like I'm in some third-world country when I can't even take a normal 13 length shower and I'm still getting charged 75. 14 15 Now, the second part of what I'd like to say is that, you know, the CEO of Spire is Suzanne 16 Okay. She made \$5.6 million over the last 17 Sitherwood. 18 fiscal year, which was 2021. It was a 26 percent raise, 19 sir, over her 4.4 million in pay. She currently gets 48 times greater salary than Spire's median employees, and 20 21 their median employee already makes more than a lot of 2.2 people living in this service area. I looked up the 23 It's about 60,000 or so versus what people difference. earn in this area is much lower, and also everybody on 24 25 the Board that I'm looking at, Mark C. Darrell, Steven

Public Service Commission Local Public Hearing October 13, 2022 Page 13 Lindsey, Steven Rasche, Michael Geiselhart, Suzanne 1 2 Sitherwood, the lowest any of them make at all in cash value, not bonuses, is \$700,000 and it goes up to almost 3 2.5 million and then millions of dollars in equity and 4 5 other benefits and everything. It's just -- I can't believe that we've come to this, Your Honor, because 6 7 it's like how can somebody that makes 30,000, \$50,000, 8 be expected to spend more when they're already not getting anything and yet the CEO has raised her pay \$1.1 9 10 million in one year and the year prior was almost a million dollar raise as well. 11 12 Now, lastly I note that the people representing Spire are most likely to say well, that's 13 different money and she was paid from -- it comes from a 14 completely different place and all that. To that I have 15 to say we all know what money laundering is, right? You 16 17 take money, you put it in one account, you say that it's 18 for something else, but it's still money comes from 19 something. If there's money that's going to them and 20 it's increasing, then we should not have any type of an 21 increase at all. I shouldn't have to pay a dollar more. They should take a cut, and they should make it happen 2.2

HEELAN: Well, everybody is -- There's no 4 equitable explanation that I've heard today that will 5 6 take care of everybody in the rate case. The poor 7 people, they're having to beg for a rate for their 8 situation. I myself don't have any trouble paying my bills, but other people in this hearing are going to be 9 10 -- I listened to a lady that had an 18 -- she lives on \$1,800 a month. And I looked on the computer this 11 12 morning. We're going to get a \$140 Social Security raise in January. Well, this rate increase is going to 13 pretty much eat that up. And every time that some of 14 our senior folks get a little bit of an advantage 15 somebody comes along and takes it away. 16 17 Now, they say they need money for this and 18 money for that and they need money for new meters and all that kind of stuff. I don't understand why the 19 general ratepayer is paying infrastructure fees. 20 21 I was a mechanic for 35 years. All the tools in my toolbox I had to buy. I had to have them every 2.2 23 day in order to do my job. The Gas Service Company is

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the same way. Spire is the same way. They need to buy

the stuff out of their profit to run their company. I

- 7 here should be that utility consumption is a mandatory
- 8 thing. Utilities are a monopoly. You don't have a
- 9 choice to go to a different one to get your warmth for
- 10 your house or to be able to cook in your kitchen.
- 11 People shouldn't have to apply for help to pay utility
- 12 bills. That is ridiculous, especially when you look at
- 13 the salaries being paid to some of these executives.
- 14 Spire is not managing their business with
- 15 executives being paid four times as much as they should
- 16 be making. Regardless of what they say about
- 17 appropriations, these executives are already overpaid.
- 18 So they should stop paying grossly outrageous salaries,
- 19 cut Spire's dividends, stop moving the goal post and
- 20 putting the burden on the customers. This is crazy.
- 21 This is absolutely crazy. Even if you can afford to pay
- 22 utilities, you shouldn't have to be counting your
- 23 pennies trying to figure out how you're going to pay
- 24 your bills so you don't freeze to death. What are we in
- 25 Texas now? Okay. That's it.

However, the Spire representatives have failed to account for the drastic increases, especially after 6 7 the increase they did last winter which raised my 8 personal bill about \$30 a month keeping the same 9 temperature. Spire in 2021 had a net profit of \$271 10 million triple that of 2020. Net profit is after they paid all expenses, business taxes, and yes, the 11 12 shareholders. So the investors got their money and they still had 271 million leftover doing whatever. 13 I don't understand why that money cannot be funneled back into 14 15 their services to keep the costs the same, if not possibly lower them, especially when their shareholder 16 rate is 4.26 percent, the dividend rate that is. 17 18 By contrast, I work for a Fortune 500 company 19 who has a 2.3 percent dividend rate. So they can still 20 pay their shareholders and they can still help their 21 consumers except they choose not to. When the vice 2.2 president was making comments trying to explain all 23 these discrepancies, well, he was inadequate. He talked about a revenue model. He didn't explain it. He didn't 24 25 even have the public 10K filing that shows the

Page 26 financials which I have sitting in front of me. 1 2 unable to account for a myriad of factors and trying to hand wave everything, and ultimately Spire's solution to 3 this problem was to pass the buck and tell consumers 4 well, you can apply for public assistance and hope for 5 the best. That's not how you run a utility being a 6 7 necessity especially when you're the only game in town. 8 That's all I have to say, Your Honor. 9 JUDGE CLARK: Okay. Thank you for your 10 comments. Who else would like to speak to the 11 Commission? 12 MR. DANNER: My name is Ryan Danner. 13 JUDGE CLARK: Ryan. I'm sorry. Say your last 14 name again. 15 MR. DANNER: It's Danner. I own my house along with my 4 fiancee. Our home like much of St. Louis was built over 5 a hundred years ago. And while it's been remodeled 6 7 since then, the house wasn't designed as an energy efficient building. The house is 1,200 square feet and 8 we keep it at 62 degrees in the winter, yet our gas bill 9 10 is still over \$200 at any given winter month. additional 10 percent from the proposed rate hike would 11 12 add a considerable amount to our monthly expenses. Many people in St. Louis live in similarly sized and age 13 homes, and many of them work jobs that didn't allow for 14 them to participate in this meeting. Working class 15 people are being squeezed financially from every 16 direction these days. An additional 10 percent to gas, 17 18 a necessity, going into a projected very cold winter 19 would be devastating to the residents of St. Louis. Spire has already increased rates last winter. 20 21 they're trying to increase rates again to cover the bungling of the St. Louis pipeline. 22 23 The people in Missouri shouldn't bear the 24 burden of Spire's mistakes. Spire is pushing dirty 25 infrastructure that pollutes their state with pipelines

Page 28 1 that infract gas and they need to see the writing on the 2 wall and realize that gas isn't the future and stop 3 trying to strong arm unnecessary gas infrastructure into our state. We can send this message by not allowing the 4 rate increase. It will put the burden of Spire's 5 mistakes on Spire and not on the people of Missouri. 6 7 want to thank the Missouri Public Service Commission, 8 and please vote no on the proposed rate increase and 9 protect the people of Missouri. Page 32 1 And somebody else had made a comment that 2 having an all electric house it wouldn't be more efficient. And the house I've lived in for the last 20 3 years was initially all electric, had a heat pump and 4 5 was very efficient. It was built well. And my combined electric and gas are similar to what it was just all 6 7 electric. 12 years ago when we needed to replace the 8 heat pump, we couldn't find anybody in the St. Louis 9 area to work on a heat pump. Even the company that had 10 installed the heat pump no longer had older people that knew how to work it or had even seen a heat pump. 11 12 everything I've read recently says that the heat pump is environmentally better and for the whole environment 13 better than both gas and electric. So having an all 14 15 electric house was very efficient, but we couldn't find somebody to work on it. So now we pay almost \$25 a 16 17 month, you know, at least nine months out of the year 18 for not having heat on. And so to have it go up another 19 \$10 seems like a very significant increase. That's my 20 comment. 21 JUDGE CLARK: Ms. O'Brien, thank you for your 2.2 comments. 23 MR. FERDMAN: I'd like to make a comment to 24 the Commission. 25 JUDGE CLARK: Yes, sir. What's your name?

There was also, of course, this infrastructure need that seems to be above and beyond 24 what the public would have had any opportunity to choose 25

Page 36 1 like maybe the fracking or something like this. 2 In general, however, it was very unclear due to the complicated financial model multiple private 3 interests what was really going on here other than what 4 I've already stated. So it's clear to me the additional 5 money and rate increase is really going to support this 6 7 financial model, perhaps a flawed model. There was one 8 person that came in and explained that they felt it was very flawed. And as a result, it seems that some of the 9 10 need here is being misrepresented. Instead, 19 I would suggest that Spire basically look at their current profits, which we've heard today, maybe reduce 20 21 the dividends paid to shareholders, maybe reduce executive based compensation or use other business 22 23 rigors to make up this shortfall, especially since they're already very profitable. And you've heard that 24 25 today from others.

But if you do vote yes, I 1 2 would suggest in that case some consideration for seniors on a fixed income and non-seniors making less 3 than 176,000 per year or the 24 percent federal tax 4 5 bracket to be exempt from any increase.
