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Page 4 1 The following proceedings began at 7:05 p.m.: 2 JUDGE CLARK: Let's go on the record. Good evening. It's October 18, 2022, and it is approximately 3 7:05 p.m. and we are at the Greqq/Klice Community Center 4 in Kansas City, Missouri. The question and answer 5 portion of the public hearing just ended. If you had 6 7 questions about this rate case, I hope you were able to 8 get answers to those.

If you have a cell phone at this time, I'd ask 9 10 that you put it on vibrate or silent. The Missouri Public Service Commission has set aside this time for a 11 12 local public hearing in File No. GR-2022-0179, a general rate case which is captioned as In the Matter of Spire 13 Missouri, Inc. d/b/a Spire's Request for Authority to 14 15 Implement a General Rate Increase for Natural Gas Service Provided in the Company's Missouri Service 16 17 Areas.

18 My name is John Clark, and I'm the Regulatory 19 Law Judge overseeing this hearing tonight. Now, the 20 Missouri Public Service Commission regulates the rates 21 charged by investor-owned utility companies in Missouri to ensure that those rates are just and reasonable. 2.2 The 23 Commission also regulates the guality of service and the safety of operations of investor-owned utilities. 24 25 The Commission is made up of five

14	COMMISSIONER HOLSMAN: Thank you, Judge. Good
15	evening. My name is Commissioner Jason Holsman. I just
16	wanted to thank you guys for coming out tonight. There
17	are many things you could have been doing on a Tuesday
18	evening other than being here but you chose to be here
19	to share your opinions with us. We do value them. They
20	do matter. We do listen. And thank you very much for
21	taking this time.
22	JUDGE CLARK: Thank you, Commissioner Holsman.
23	Now, a court reporter is transcribing this hearing so
24	that the other Commissioners may review and read the
25	comments that are made tonight. I'm going to begin,

Page 6 because this is a formal hearing, I'm going to begin by 1 2 asking counsel to enter their appearance for the record 3 starting with Spire. 4 MR. APLINGTON: Thank you, Your Honor. Matt 5 Aplington for Spire Missouri, Inc., 700 Market Street, 6 St. Louis, Missouri 63101. 7 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you, Mr. Aplington. For 8 the Commission staff. 9 MR. STOKES: Thank you, Your Honor. On behalf 10 of Commission staff, Curt Stokes, C-u-r-t S-t-o-k-e-s, and Scott Stacey, S-c-o-t-t S-t-a-c-e-y. We're at 200 11 12 Madison Street in Jefferson City, Missouri. 13 JUDGE CLARK: Mr. Stokes, Mr. Stacey, thank For the Office of the Public Counsel. 14 you. MR. CLIZER: John Clizer on behalf of the 15 Office of the Public Counsel. My contact information is 16 17 in the record. Thank you. 18 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you, Mr. Clizer. Are 19 there any counsel I haven't called or any intervenors 20 present? All right. I see and hear none. 21 Now, for those who would like to provide 2.2 comments at today's hearing, I'm going to call the names 23 listed on the sign-up sheet in the order they appear. 24 When I call your name, please come down to the 25 microphone at the front. I will then at that point ask

Page 7 you to state and spell your name, because the court 1 2 reporter, as I indicated, is taking everything down and that's for the record. Then I will place you under oath 3 and you may offer the Commission your comments. 4 Now, we have a lot of people signed up tonight 5 and a lot of people that are here, and I want to 6 7 accommodate as many people as want to make comments 8 tonight as possible. So I'm going to ask that you keep your comments as brief as possible. 9 If it starts to get 10 repetitive, I may cut you off and move on to the next 11 person. 12 Also, after you've made your remarks, please remain at the podium for a minute. I may have questions 13 The Commissioners may have questions for you. 14 for you. 15 Now, some of the attorneys may also have questions for you. If the attorneys have questions, if you'd please 16 get my attention, I'll let you ask your question. 17 If 18 the Commissioners have questions, please feel free to 19 interrupt me at any time. I'm not going to stop and ask 20 after each person whether or not there are Commission 21 questions. 22 Now, the Commissioners will be unable to 23 answer any of your questions tonight and that's -- We were out of the room during the question and answer 24 25 portion. That's because we have to remain impartial

Page 8 until after the presentation of evidence at the 1 2 evidentiary hearing. If you have questions, please 3 speak to representatives of the company, the Commission staff, or the Office of the Public Counsel. 4 Also, I'm going to ask that you be polite as 5 people get up here. Treat people as they make their 6 7 comments, whether you agree or disagree with them, as you would like to be treated. Now, with that in mind, 8 I'm going to go ahead and call the first witness. 9 T'm 10 going to apologize. There's a lot of names on this. 11 There's a good chance that I'm going to butcher quite a few of them. So don't take offense. Just let me know 12 that I've butchered your name and I will try and correct 13 it. Mary Esselman. Ms. Esselman, would you please 14 15 state and spell your name for the record. 16 MS. ESSELMAN: Yes. My name is Mary Esselman, 17 M-a-r-y E-s-s-e-l-m-a-n. JUDGE CLARK: And I notice there's also a 18 19 Jessica Kibby signed up from Operation Breakthrough. 20 Are you both --21 MS. ESSELMAN: Yes. 22 JUDGE CLARK: Just you tonight. I just wanted 23 to know if you both wanted to speak together or if you want to speak separately or if it's just going to be 24 25 you. Okay. Would you raise your right hand to be

Page 9 1 sworn. 2 Do you solemnly swear or affirm that the testimony you are about to give at this local public 3 4 hearing is the truth? Yes. MS. ESSELMAN: 5 6 JUDGE CLARK: And what would you like to tell 7 the Commission this evening? 8 MARY ESSELMAN, 9 having been first duly sworn, testified as follows: 10 MS. ESSELMAN: So my name is Mary Esselman. 11 I'm the CEO of Operation Breakthrough. We're the 12 largest community-based early learning center in the region. We serve 450 families with children from birth 13 14 all the way to age 18. Our average income for our 15 families is about a thousand dollars per month. Many of our families are the most vulnerable families in the 16 17 community. On average they may be on a housing voucher 18 which takes a third of their income. For many of the 19 other families, gas becomes a third of their remaining 20 income. 21 As I look at our average income over the past 2.2 two years, 25 percent of our families have required gas 23 assistance from internal. We've spent about 32,000. Another 25 percent of the families have required outside 24 25 assistance that we have referred from local agencies

Page 10 such as Bishop Sullivan, Metro Lutheran, Reconciliation 1 2 Services and others. When I look at the amount of 3 income as it stated in the proposal that it would only be a 10 percent increase for families, many of our 4 5 families, their average gas bill in the winter, because the homes that they rent are not necessarily energy 6 7 efficient, is around \$350 per month. So if you look at 8 a 12.65 increase, that would generate almost a \$44 9 increase per month which is a significant burden for 10 many of our vulnerable families in the community. So in my opinion, based on the information 11 12 that we have, this is not the appropriate time for a rate increase and it does not appear to be just and 13 reasonable in terms of the costs that are being pushed 14 15 on to members of the community. 16 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you. I have no questions 17 for you. Thank you for your comments. 18 MS. ESSELMAN: Thank you. 19 JUDGE CLARK: You said Jessica Kibby is not 20 qoing to be speaking? 21 MS. ESSELMAN: No. 22 JUDGE CLARK: Okay. Damian Muller. 23 MR. MULLER: Good evening. 24 Mr. Muller, would you please JUDGE CLARK: 25 state and spell your name for the record?

14	DAMIAN MULLER,
15	having been first duly sworn, testified as follows:
16	MR. MULLER: In the interest of time, I'll
17	attempt to be as brief as possible. I just kind of
18	prepared my notes here the best I could. I scanned over
19	the Case No. GR-2021-0108 which shows processed in March
20	of 2022, this year, and the Spire response also in March
21	2022, adopting PSC staff recommendations regarding USOA
22	accounting procedures, et cetera. I also perused the
23	public comment approximately 10 or so pages worth of
24	recent public comments to get a general gauge of what
25	everybody else in the room echoes and seems that my

Page 12 1 general assessment is not so far off from what everybody 2 else seemed to indicate. 3 And I also perused general stock analysis over 4 the last several years. Earnings per share and total 5 shareholder return have grown in the past several years during the pandemic. It appears Spire agreed with 6 7 almost all the PSC recommended changes recently I just 8 mentioned and did a diligent job of adopting the 9 changes. 10 Unfortunately Schedules 5, 6, and 7 were deemed confidential and not available for the public to 11 12 view. So there may have been some additional --JUDGE CLARK: Hold on just a second. 13 14 MR. MULLER: There may have been some 15 additional information that may have given extra insight 16 as to why Spire is requesting this rate increase of 17 around 12 percent. I believe this much of an increase 18 is not necessary and places an undue burden on a large 19 segment of the customer base including those of us who 20 try to live within our means but especially those 21 considered in the 2012 suggested low income rate class 2.2 File GW-2013-0046. 23 JUDGE CLARK: Can you give me that case number again, please? 24 25 MR. MULLER: Sir?

Page 13 1 Would you give me the case JUDGE CLARK: 2 number again, please? MR. MULLER: Sure. GW-2013-0046. 3 That was 4 when the low income rate class was considered, and I 5 believe that that low income class has been in existence for quite some time, if I remember correctly. It's bad 6 7 enough with all that has happened in the last two 8 pandemic years but now Spire wants to add insult to 9 injury with this increase. It is possible some increase 10 may be required as, of course, partly according to your 11 chart that you have but most likely not this sharp of an 12 increase. As a main point of interest in reference to as 13 what a company can do to stabilize their positions, I 14 15 use the example of Ford Motor Company. In 2006, they did a smart thing and actually suspended dividends. Not 16 17 stopped but suspended dividends on their common stock 18 for at least a year or more in order to keep the company 19 They took no federal bailout money. viable. Thev 20 weathered the storm and the economic conditions at that 21 time. And continuing that idea of company integrity 22 23 I maintain that Spire needs to follow Ford's example and suspend dividends for a year at least or more, which 24

25 should provide plenty of money to accomplish any

Page 14 necessary capital transfer costs, reclaim funds not 1 2 covered by the ISRS charge, and carry out any of the 3 required provisions or changes requested by the PSC. Now, if that were the case, then by your chart up there 4 it appears that the 30 or so percent, if that's 5 returning dividends and such, if dividends were 6 7 suspended maybe that would cover the actual 25 percent 8 of your other costs that you're trying to get an 9 increase for.

If a bastion of American automotive like Ford can do that kind of an activity, then there should be no reason why Spire cannot follow that example. Unless there's some regulatory thing that keeps them from doing that kind of a thing, then there should be no reason why Spire cannot do the same example and suspend their dividends.

17 The question is if the CEO, senior management, 18 and board of directors have the fortitude to do the 19 responsible and right move. Thank you for your time.

20JUDGE CLARK: Mr. Muller, thank you for your21comments.

22 MR. MULLER: Thank you.

JUDGE CLARK: Nate Morton. Mr. Morton, would
you state and spell your name for the record?
MR. MORTON: Good evening. My name is

Page 15 1 Nathaniel Morton, N-a-t-h-a-n-i-e-l M-o-r-t-o-n. 2 JUDGE CLARK: And would you raise your right 3 hand to be sworn. Do you solemnly swear or affirm that the 4 5 testimony you are about to give at this local public 6 hearing is the truth? 7 MR. MORTON: I do. 8 JUDGE CLARK: And what would you like to tell 9 the Commission? 10 NATHANIEL MORTON, 11 having been first duly sworn, testified as follows: 12 MR. MORTON: I'd first like to thank you for your time. My name is Nathaniel. I am a resident of 13 Independence, and I believe that this rate increase is 14 15 not good for the people and any effort to continue this process will be in complete and utter defiance for the 16 citizens of the state of Missouri. Many folks, myself 17 18 included, are already struggling with gas, grocery and 19 other costs. Companies like Spire must cease squeezing 20 the consumer in order to keep breaking and record 21 breaking profits. This rate increase is, of course, 22 unpopular as was the last, but Spire once again feels it 23 necessary to disregard the consequences hikes will have on the working class with this proposal of this most 24 25 recent increase.

Page 16 Such measures are truly disgusting and goes to 1 2 show us that this monopoly does not value us and will 3 put profit over people time and time again. With that, I urge that this rate to not be passed. Thank you. 4 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you for your comments, Mr. 5 6 Morton. Bob Inman. 7 MR. INMAN: Good evening. My name is Robert 8 Inman, I-n-m-a-n. What else did you say we had to tell 9 you? Oh, sworn. 10 Thank you very much, Mr. Inman. JUDGE CLARK: 11 I'm sorry I didn't say your name correctly. Do you 12 solemnly swear or affirm that the testimony you are about to give at this local public hearing is the truth? 13 14 MR. INMAN: I do. 15 JUDGE CLARK: And what would you like to tell the Commission? 16 17 ROBERT INMAN, 18 having been first duly sworn, testified as follows: 19 MR. INMAN: Well, everybody has done such a 20 professional presentation. I did make some notes but 21 mine is a little more home folksy, I suppose. I'm a 2.2 72-year-old living on a fixed income. I am the 23 treasurer of Hutchins Park Neighborhood Association over in Independence, in western Independence. 24 I was, you 25 know, talking with neighbors and we were all griping

Page 17 about oh, here goes gas prices up again and they're 1 2 taking such a big chunk out of our thing. Many of our 3 people over in western Independence in the neighborhood I live in, the homes were built in the thirties and 4 5 forties and there are a lot of retired people like myself. There are some families moving in again because 6 7 of school district changes but still a lot of retired 8 people. And with property taxes and drug costs and groceries and utilities going up, it really becomes hard 9 10 for them to make some decisions sometimes am I going to get my drugs for, you know, am I going to get my drugs 11 for the month that I need, my blood pressure meds or 12 whatever I need or diabetes meds or am I going to, you 13 know, buy the food I need to keep me healthy or am I 14 15 going to pay my utility bills. So it really is a burden on the elderly community whenever great big increases 16 17 like the last young man said such a big increase at one 18 time. And it really becomes harder year after year for 19 not only myself but many of my neighbors to budget for 20 this.

I wasn't going to come here and talk. I was just talking to my neighbors, and one of my neighbors said hey, why don't you go and tell them for us what we're all talking about around the neighborhood. So passing the costs -- I talked in the question and answer

Page 18 about cost of doing business and asked the Commission 1 2 how they figured the cost of doing business. And they 3 talked about -- Spire talked about their way of doing 4 business was we don't pay for the gas -- they're not 5 charging us for the gas. That's a passthrough of 6 whatever the cost is. What they're charging us for is 7 infrastructure and pipes and buildings and everything 8 like that.

9 I was a former partner in a business many, 10 many, many years ago and I know when we first opened our business they said it was going to take two years before 11 12 you made a profit and it did. That first profit day was What I want to say is we couldn't pass all of 13 great. our costs, you know, when we had to renovate the space 14 15 that we moved into, we had to pay utility bills, we had to pay water bills, we had to buy stock and everything. 16 17 We couldn't pass that all on to our customers. When 18 costs went up, we had to absorb that, otherwise they'd 19 go to our competitors. We don't have a choice to go to 20 competitors with gas services. We only have one gas 21 company to get our heating gas from.

It's not like my customers could have gone to somebody else. So I really think that regulated -- and we talked about winter usage and the ISRS fees, which is I guess the pipeline costs and everything, and how many

Page 19 of those should be considered cost of doing business 1 2 rather than being passed on to the customers. Ιf 3 they're going to make money off of the gas things and everything being in the ground and everything like that, 4 5 then their investors shouldn't be making great profits on the backs of the poor people. 6 7 So I urge the Commission to require Spire to carry more of the costs of doing business themselves 8 instead of allowing them to pass these costs on to the 9 10 I do appreciate your time to be heard customers. 11 tonight. Thank you. 12 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you, Mr. Inman, and thank So far I haven't had any 13 you for your comments. questions but I am going to remind you after you've 14 15 given your comments if you can stay there for just a second, sometimes we do have questions. I don't at this 16 17 point. Cathy Rinehart. 18 MS. RINEHART: Cathy Rinehart, C-a-t-h-y 19 Rinehart, R-i-n-e-h-a-r-t. 20 JUDGE CLARK: Ms. Rinehart, do you solemnly 21 swear or affirm that the testimony you are about to give 2.2 at this local public hearing is the truth? 23 MS. RINEHART: Correct, yes. 24 What would you like to tell the JUDGE CLARK: 25 Commission?

Page 20 1 CATHY RINEHART, 2 having been first duly sworn, testified as follows: MS. RINEHART: I'd like to tell you what has 3 happened in Clay County. I used to be the Clay County 4 5 In 2014, '15, somewhere in through there, Assessor. 6 Missouri Gas Energy was sold to Laclede. And when 7 Laclede declared their personal property, 40 percent was 8 taken off on the personal property line. When we asked 9 them where it went, we never got what I considered or 10 what my office considered a reasonable answer. We just didn't get it. 11 12 So to make a long story short, we started asking questions, we went to court, we had -- we went 13 down to Columbia at one point in time and sat in a room 14 15 and tried to negotiate a settlement. We couldn't come 16 to anything. 17 And in our digging and in our depositions, we 18 found out that Laclede, now Spire, had been declaring 19 almost all of their meters in the Platte R-3 School District, which is one of the smallest school districts 20 21 in Clay County, but also has the smallest levy for the 2.2 school. And that was very upsetting. So then we asked if we could see their GIS, 23 which is Geographic Information Services Systems, and we 24 25 were told that it would violate national security, we

Page 21 couldn't have it, and we couldn't figure out why we 1 2 couldn't have it. And then we found out that, and I'm 3 just going to make up an example here. I'm a developer. I have 50 houses that I want to put in the ground, put 4 out in the ground somewhere. I asked Laclede/Spire to 5 come out and I'd pay them to put the gas line in, I'd 6 7 pay them to put the meters in, and then I'd turn around 8 and give it back to them but they don't declare that as an asset. Don't ask me why it's an asset according to 9 Accounting 101, but they don't declare that. 10 So that 11 was a problem.

12 And then I retired, and this last year they 13 went to Jefferson City to try to get the law changed to 14 go back retroactive eight years, because that's how long 15 we've been arguing over this. Clay County has won in 16 the courts, Clay County won at the State Tax Commission, 17 and now it's back to the State Tax Commission to decide 18 what the value should be.

19 What Clay County wanted and what all the other 20 counties wanted was a standard that we could work with 21 with Laclede and Spire so that they would pay their fair 22 share on personal property. I just thought this was 23 information you might need to know, might want to know, 24 may not care to know. I just thought it was important. 25 Thank you.

22	going to have Mr. Aplington repeat his question.

16 Further, when Spire took over the Missouri Gas 17 Energy in roughly 2017, we were promised improved service with no additional costs. This rate increase 18 19 request shows Spire is stepping back on its promise made 20 years ago on to Missouri. If more money is needed for 21 property infrastructure and program development, the 2.2 money should come from perhaps current profits made off 23 of Spire customers or a bank note like other companies 24 and individuals do.

Page 28 for ways to shave this revenue down, I think executive compensation is always something you can take money out of.

I also saw when Kansas City was passing 4 5 recently its Climate Protection and Resiliency Plan, not just while that plan was passing but through the entire 6 7 process Spire employees did come to manipulate that process, tried to push for weaker strategies included in 8 that plan not just limited to burning gas in homes to 9 10 provide heat but also electrifying the grid as a whole, removing natural gas from the electric grid. 11

12 So when I hear Spire talk about in this room today saying burning gas in homes is only about 6 13 percent of emissions in the US, which 6 percent of the 14 US's total emissions, that's a lot of emissions still. 15 They say that's just a small piece of it. 16 They also 17 came out and fought in our city for a plan that would --18 they fought against this plan in our city that would reduce emissions from our grid and also reduce emissions 19 from our transportation that they cited as well. 20 So 21 when they say oh, it's just a small piece, they fought 2.2 against the larger pieces as well and they fought very 23 hard.

21	In addition to inflation, Kansas City has one
22	of the biggest energy burdens in the country and is one
23	of the top 15 cities with the worst energy burden for
24	low income, black, and Latino households as reported by
25	ACEEE. In the most energy burdened census tract in

Page 43 1 Kansas City, the average resident spends 20 percent of 2 their income on utilities.

Spire's primary rationale for filing this rate 3 case seems to be that they want to increase their profit 4 5 The PSC approved a 9.3 return on equity in the margin. last rate case and the company is requesting a 10.5 ROE. 6 7 The average return on equity for a distributed natural 8 gas company in the United States based on an S&P global 9 financing is 9.33. Kansas City acknowledges as 10 documented in major energy rate case decisions in the US January to June 2022, that, quote, state regulatory 11 12 support and the authorization of adequate returns to ensure ongoing capital attraction in the utility sector 13 will be instrumental as the industry shifts away from 14 15 fossil fuels to renewables and storage and invest in strengthening the nation's power grid against climate 16 17 and other risks, unquote.

18 However, when ruling in this case, we urge the 19 Public Service Commission to carefully consider the risks to Kansas City residents and consumers at a time 20 21 when they are already facing increased rates of inflation and energy burden. Natural gas prices are 2.2 23 expected to soar this winter, and those costs will be 24 passed on to ratepayers without their input. 25 The Public Service Commission and Spire need

Page 53 December 23, 2021 article in St. Louis Today entitled 1 2 Spire CEO Sitherwood Nets Pay Raise Amid Year of Record Earnings Growth, it reads, and I guote, Spire President 3 and CEO Suzanne Sitherwood, Sitherwood 61, was 4 5 compensated almost \$5.6 million over the last fiscal year, a 26 percent raise over her 4.4 million in pay a 6 7 year prior according to the new Securities and Exchange 8 Commission's filings from the St. Louis based natural 9 gas utility. Her pay last year was 48 times greater than that of Spire's median employee, end quote. 10 11 Spire also maintains that this rate increase does not cover costs for lobbying or campaign 12 contributions, and this may be legally true on paper but 13 time and again Spire has lied about fossil gas as a 14 clean fuel as you've heard in testimony from elected 15 city officials here. And this is even though gas, 16 17 fossil gas, not natural gas, fossil gas, it's a fossil fuel is linked to asthma, lung cancer and the climate 18 19 crisis.

20 Congress literally just passed a law 21 regulating methane which is a -- which is what makes up 22 the natural gas that Spire provides. You know, they 23 passed a law regulating that as a greenhouse gas. And 24 during the Q&A, again, reps seemed focused on carbon, 25 not methane. So while Spire may not be legally allowed
