14	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you very
15	much. And I believe that's all the parties.
16	The primary purpose in coming to bring you
17	today was to discuss the proposed procedural
18	schedule. And by previous order, that is due
19	one week from today on the 15th. And we also
20	need to discuss the proposed test year. Part
21	the company proposed a test year ending
22	December 31st of 2003. And the parties were
23	given an opportunity to respond to that. And
24	I believe all parties indicated they would
25	prefer a test year ending June 31st June

1	30th of 2003, which is actually the test year
2	that was used in the company's initial direct
3	testimony. Now, I want to get the
4	MR. HACK: Judge, I think we
5	haven't had a chance to to discuss the
6	pleadings as to the test year item, but at
7	least broadly among all the parties. But I
8	think basically what they propose is what we
9	intended so far as the test year goes.
10	So we may have to have a little more
11	conversation to understand what is meant by an
12	update. But I think I think it's what we
13	did last time. And if that's what it is, then
14	I think we're probably comfortable with that.
15	And and hopefully we can let let you
16	know that today.
17	JUDGE WOODRUFF: So there's may
18	not be any controversy?
19	MR. HACK: As to the test year,
20	correct.
21	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Okay. Good. You
22	may have noticed that an order regarding the
23	test year is on the agenda for tomorrow.
24	MR. HACK: Okay.
25	JUDGE WOODRUFF: I wanted to put

1 that on because the Commission doesn't have an 2 agenda on Thursday of this week. 3 MR. HACK: We will let you know today before we leave. 4 5 JUDGE WOODRUFF: I appreciate that. And just come upstairs and tell me. Or if you 6 need to file something, go ahead and file it. 7 8 MR. HACK: Okay. 9 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Any other matters anyone wants to bring up while we're on the 10 11 record? MR. FRANSON: Yes, Judge. In the 12 13 event we need to consult with you, are you 14 available this morning? 15 JUDGE WOODRUFF: I will be here all 16 day. 17 MR. FRANSON: Thank you. 18 MR. HACK: Perhaps two anticipatory questions before you leave. One, we have 19 20 circulated some alternative procedural 21 schedules among the parties, and it seems like 22 the -- the hearing date -- dates are causing 23 some -- some squeezing of everyone or 24 perceiving squeezings of everybody. How --25 how fixed in stone are those dates?

1	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Well, they're
2	they're on the calendar at the moment. But
3	everything's subject to change.
4	MR. HACK: Okay.
5	JUDGE WOODRUFF: The problem I have
6	is the third week of June, the the
7	Commissioners won't be here. There's a
8	conference or something that takes up that
9	block. But working around that, if if the
10	parties want to propose something else, we'll
11	consider it.
12	MR. HACK: Okay.
13	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Of course
14	MR. HACK: It will be considered and
15	that's it.
16	JUDGE WOODRUFF: It will be
17	considered and not necessarily granted.
18	Obviously, there are time frames for the
19	Commission as well.
20	MR. HACK: I understand. Right.
21	The other question I had was that in, I guess,
22	the initial order that came out, the
23	Commission asked the parties to make true op.
24	recommendations. And for the most part, the
25	true op. recommendations of everybody that

1 have been filed other than MGE says we'd like 2 to wait to make our true op. recommendation. 3 And I just wondered where the Commission was or where you were in terms of what you 4 expected from the parties regarding a true op. 5 6 recommendation at this point in time. 7 JUDGE WOODRUFF: I was aware of what 8 the other parties have suggested. And the true op. is currently on the calendar for two 9 10 days in July, I believe. And if -- if you all don't need a true op., that's fine. And I 11 don't necessarily need to have a 12 13 recommendation today as far as the true op. The orders that's on agenda for tomorrow is 14 15 only regarding the test year. MR. HACK: Okay. 16 17 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Anything else 18 anyone wants to bring up? All right. Then 19 I'll leave you to your discussions. And with 20 that, we're off the record. Thank you. 21 22 23 24 25
