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00004 1 PROCEEDINGS 2 JUDGE MILLS: We're on the record this 3 morning for a prehearing conference in Case No. GO-2004-0443, which is styled in the matter of the 5 verified application and petition of Laclede Gas Company 6 for establishment of an infrastructure system replacement 7 surcharge. 8 Let's begin by taking entries of 9 appearance, beginning on my left with the Staff. 10 MS. SHEMWELL: Lera Shemwell representing 11 the Staff of the Missouri Public Service Commission, Post Office Box 360, Jefferson City, Missouri 65102. 12 MR. PENDERGAST: Michael C. Pendergast, 13 14 W.R. England, III and Rick Zucker appearing on behalf of 15 Laclede Gas Company. My business address is 720 Olive 16 Street, St. Louis, Missouri 63101. 17 MR. COFFMAN: Appearing on behalf of the 18 Office of the Public Counsel, John B. Coffman and 19 Douglas E. Micheel, P.O. Box 2230, Jefferson City, 20 Missouri 65102. Mr. Micheel will be the lead attorney. 21 MS. VUYLSTEKE: For the Missouri Industrial 22 Energy Consumers, Diana Vuylsteke of the firm Bryan Cave,

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Missouri Energy Group, Lisa Langeneckert, the Stolar Partnership, LLP, 911 Washington Avenue, St. Louis, Missouri 63101.

JUDGE MILLS: Thank you. One of the things we discussed briefly before we went on the record this morning was the proposed notice that Laclede filed, and as I mentioned to the parties off the record, and then I'll reiterate here on the record, to date there hasn't been any party that filed anything either supporting or opposing or commenting on that proposed notice.

And later today I will issue a short order setting a deadline for that because, as you all know, this case is on a fairly tight time frame. So if we can get that out of the way, we'll do so. Since it's been on file for a week or so, I'll just give the parties a few days to file responses to that if anybody wishes to.

If this case is going to go to hearing, how many days do we think we're going to need and when are the parties looking at? There's a schedule due a week from today by the Order that set this prehearing conference. I believe the tariffs are only suspended until June 29th. We're well into April here.

I think, if this is going to go to hearing, we'll probably need to have a hearing by the end of May or at the very latest the first week of June, and if we do

that, we probably won't have a chance to have Briefs.
We'll have to do closing arguments, maybe one round of
Briefs quickly in order to get an Order out in time to
beat the operation of law date. I see nods around the
room.

I understand that the MGE case that was a substantially similar filing was settled, and perhaps this case will go that way. But you-all need to plan for the worst case scenario, which is having to go to a full-blown hearing and get that resolved in time to beat the operation of law date.

MR. PENDERGAST: Your Honor, my anticipation would be that if it does need to go to hearing, that it would probably only take one day, but it would be my expectation -- or probably just to make sure we don't disappoint anybody else's expectations, it might be appropriate to reserve two. And I was just wondering what is available. Do you know what the Commission has open?

JUDGE MILLS: I don't have a calendar here with me this morning. You can consult with me or you can come look at the tentative ALJ calendar on the ninth floor, look at the official ALJ calendar on the -- I suppose it's on the Internet. At least in the next month there are very few days available. I think if you get

towards the end of May, there may be more. MS. SHEMWELL: Staff would agree with the

estimation of one to two days. Probably one.

JUDGE MILLS: Well, let's go for two if we can. Hearings for the last few months have tended to run longer than most people anticipated. Let's not cram it up against the operation of law date and scramble to find a place to hold a hearing some night.

Anything else? Okay. Well, if you-all need me during the course of the day, you know where to find me. I'll be available, and either call me or come up and see me if you need to. If there's nothing further, we're off the record.
