**ORDER GRANTING CHARTER FIBERLINK-MISSOURI'S APPLICATION**  
**TO INTERVENE**

On April 2, 2009, AT&T Missouri filed an application asking the Commission to waive the Commission rule that requires AT&T Missouri to distribute a paper copy of its residential white pages to each of its customers in its St. Louis and Kansas City markets. The Commission provided notice of AT&T Missouri's filing to potentially interested parties and established April 23 as the deadline for potential parties to file applications to intervene.

Charter Fiberlink-Missouri, LLC filed an application to intervene on April 22. The Commission ordered that any party wishing to object to Charter's application to intervene do so by April 30. AT&T Missouri filed a response on April 30 indicating it does not object to Charter's proposed intervention. No party has objected to Charter's application.

Commission Rule 4 CSR 240-2.075(4) provides the Commission may grant an application to intervene if: "(A) The proposed intervenor has an interest which is different from that of the general public and which may be adversely affected by a final order arising from the case; or (B) Granting the proposed intervention would serve the public interest."

Charter provides local and interexchange voice communications in competition with AT&T Missouri. Pursuant to the interconnection agreement between the companies, AT&T Missouri's white page directory is also distributed to Charter's customers. Thus, Charter has an interest in how the Commission deals with AT&T Missouri's application to cease automatic distribution of the white page directory.

The Commission finds that Charter's interest in this case is different from that of the general public, and may be adversely affected by a final order arising from this case. Furthermore, the Commission finds that allowing Charter to intervene will serve the public interest. Therefore, the Commission will grant Charter's application to intervene.

**THE COMMISSION ORDERS THAT:**

1. Charter Fiberlink-Missouri, LLC's Application to Intervene is granted.
2. This order shall become effective immediately upon issuance.
