

Dear Mr. Davis,

As PSC members your stated mission is "to ensure Missouri consumers have access to reasonably priced utility service" How can the deal between KCPL and Aquila provide this?

- 1) KCPL isn't disclosing cost overruns of plant near Weston - KCStar 2/15/2008
- 2) KCPL to delay wind farm promised in plant agreement - Associated Press 2/23/2008
- 3) Great Plains, KCPL outlook cut to negative on Aquila acquisition - Moody's - Forbes 2/28/2008
- 4) Court ruling puts Aquila's Cass County power plant nearer to being torn down - KCStar 3/4/2008
- 5) KCPL delays upgrade to La Cygne Plant - KCStar 3/7/2008

I don't see why this merger is still being discussed. It is obvious that KCPL can't afford to meet current obligations to their customers so why would we expect future obligations to be met? This situation isn't going to improve by adding Aquila's current debt, a lower credit rating and whatever additional costs there will be with the Cass County plant. Long term the combination of KCPL and Aquila may be the goal of the PSC but this goal should not be achieved on the backs of the rate payer.

What really gets my goat is that KCPL must have known about the Iatan cost over runs and lack of financing for the wind farm and the La Cygne plant before approaching the PSC about this deal. They were trying to pull the wool over ours eyes and got caught red handed. Not only should the deal be dismissed Mike Chesser should step down or be fired.

As it stands if the PSC does approve this deal they will be doing a great disservice to Missouri customers and the integrity of the PSC.
