STAFF SUBMISSION OF COMMISSION'S PETITION TO FCC

AND LIST OF MSAS

COMES NOW the Staff of the Missouri Public Service Commission (Staff) and for its submission respectfully states:

1. On July 27, 2000, the Missouri Public Service Commission (Commission) issued its Order Directing Filing (Order) which directed Staff to file a copy of the Commission's petition to the FCC requesting additional delegated authority to institute certain numbering resource optimization measures. Pursuant to the Order, Staff attaches a copy of the petition and the supplement to the petition labeled Appendix A.

2. Staff also submits to the Commission, for ease of reference, a list of the top 100 metropolitan statistical areas (MSAs) from 1998 labeled Appendix B. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) used this list in the rollout schedule for local number portability (LNP). The phases mentioned in the list refer to the LNP rollout and, therefore, may be disregarded for purposes of the national pooling rollout.

Staff notes that this list is not presented in any particular numerical or regional order and should not be construed to imply when the FCC will implement pooling in either St. Louis or Kansas City. The schedule for the national pooling rollout will be determined by the national

number pooling administrator as stated in the National Report and Order adopted by the FCC

March 17, 2000:


We also require the thousands-block number Pooling Administrator, once selected, to establish the initial rollout schedule and submit it to the Common Carrier Bureau for approval within 60 days after being selected. (FCC 00-104 ¶ 166).

The FCC has not yet selected a national number pooling administrator.

Staff has been unable to locate an MSA listing for 1999 and 2000 and has been informed that these lists are unavailable. However, Staff believes that the changes in parameters used in compiling the 1998 list will not be significant enough to substantially change the MSA rankings.

PETITION

The Missouri Public Service Commission (MoPSC) respectfully requests additional delegated authority to implement various area code conservation measures in the 314, 417, 573, 636, 660 and 816 area codes in the State of Missouri. This request is the result of an extensive review of central office code (NXX) exhaustion in Missouri and a subsequent finding by the MoPSC that additional delegated authority is necessary for the MoPSC to adequately pursue number conservation.

I. Background

Section 251(e) of the Telecommunications Act of 1996 grants the Federal Communications Commission (Commission) exclusive jurisdiction over numbering issues and allows the Commission to delegate to state commissions all or any portion of such jurisdiction. Pursuant to that section, the Commission delegated additional authority to state commissions in the *Pennsylvania Numbering Order*.¹ The Commission also directed the Chief of the Common Carrier Bureau to determine whether state commissions should be delegated additional authority

to implement innovative or experimental area code number conservation efforts. Following the Commission's Order, the state commissions of California, Florida, Massachusetts, New York and Maine each petitioned the Commission and received additional authority to implement various area code conservation and relief planning measures.² The additional number conservation measures granted by the Commission include thousands-block pooling trials; establishing usage thresholds; reclamation of unused and reserved NXX codes, and portions of those codes; establishing numbering allocation standards; requiring sequential number assignment; hearing and addressing claims of carriers seeking numbering resources outside of the rationing process; maintaining rationing procedures for six months following area relief; requiring the submission of utilization data from all carriers; implementing NXX code sharing; and auditing carriers' use of numbering resources.

II. Number Exhaustion in Missouri

The State of Missouri is experiencing a rapid exhaustion of numbers similar to the problems experienced by the states of California, Florida, Massachusetts, New York and Maine. Missouri currently has 43 incumbent local exchange carriers and approximately 47 certified competitive local exchange carriers that all may require NXX codes to provide service. In 1996 the MoPSC implemented a geographic split of the 314 numbering plan area (NPA) by adding the

In addition to these five states, pending before the Commission are the requests for additional number conservation authority by the state commissions from New Hampshire, Wisconsin, Connecticut, and Texas.

573 NPA due to this exhaustion and released almost 250 NXX codes for the St. Louis area. However, as more competitors entered the competitive telecommunications market and as the growth of second lines, cellular service, paging, residential and business service continued in the 314 NPA, it was necessary for the MoPSC to initiate a second geographic split of the 314 NPA. The new split will add a 636 NPA and will take affect in February 2000. This year in the 816 NPA, the MoPSC implemented a geographic split as a result of number exhaustion in Kansas City and the surrounding area. Despite these recent geographic splits, the MoPSC received notice from the North American Numbering Plan Administration (NANPA) that it has already begun scheduling industry meetings to begin additional relief planning for the 314 NPA and the 816 NPA. Number exhaustion continues in Missouri at a rapid pace and additional authority is necessary for the MoPSC as it strives to take the appropriate measures necessary to assure that the requirements of 47 C.F.R. § 52.9(a) are met.³

III. Additional Authority Requested

To address the rapid exhaustion of numbers in Missouri, the MoPSC respectfully requests the Commission delegate to the MoPSC the authority to implement the following:

- Thousands-block pooling trials;
- Establish usage thresholds;
- Reclaim unused and reserved NXX codes, and portions of those codes;
- Establish numbering allocation standards;
- Require sequential number assignment;

- Hear and address claims of carriers seeking numbering resources outside of the rationing process;
- Maintain rationing procedures for six months following area relief,
- Require the submission of utilization data from all carriers;
- Implement NXX code sharing; and
- Audit carrier's use of numbering resources.

By granting the MoPSC the additional authority to implement the above measures, the Commission will ensure a more effective use of Missouri's numbering resources.

IV. Conclusion

At this time the MoPSC has not determined which of the requested measures is best for Missouri's area codes. However, it is necessary that the MoPSC be allowed the full range of options available to ensure its ability to implement the measure best suited for a particular area code. For these reasons, the MoPSC respectfully requests that the Commission delegate to the MoPSC the additional authority to implement the number conservation measures contained herein for the 314, 417, 573, 636, 660 and 816 area codes in the State of Missouri.

**MISSOURI PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION'S SUPPLEMENT
TO PETITION FOR ADDITIONAL NUMBERING AUTHORITY**

On November 1, 1999, the Missouri Public Service Commission ("MoPSC") petitioned the Federal Communications Commission ("Commission") for additional authority to implement number conservation measures. With the petition, the MoPSC seeks authority to adequately address the rapid exhaustion of numbers in the State of Missouri.

The MoPSC respectfully submits this supplement to its petition for additional numbering authority in response to the Commission's March 31, 2000 release of its Report and Order and Further Notice of Proposed Rulemaking ("Report"), in CC Docket No. 99-200, In the Matter of Numbering Resource Optimization. In the Report, the Commission requires "that states include a showing of specific criteria in their petitions for pooling authority."¹ The specific criteria that must be demonstrated by the states are as follows:

- 1) That an NPA in its state is in jeopardy;
- 2) That the NPA in question has a remaining life span of at least a year; and

- 3) That the NPA is in one of the largest 100 MSAs, or alternatively, the majority of wireline carriers in the NPA are LNP-capable.

The MoPSC's original Petition did not demonstrate these three criteria. However, the current state of number exhaustion in Missouri meets all three criteria as set forth below.

1. The 314 NPA in Missouri is in jeopardy.

The 314 NPA in Missouri is in jeopardy. On April 17, 2000, NeuStar, Inc., the North American Numbering Plan Administration (NANPA) Central Office Code Administrator for Missouri, declared that the 314 NPA is in jeopardy of exhaust. A letter from NANPA to the Missouri 314 NPA code holders and other industry members indicating that the 314 NPA is in jeopardy is attached hereto as Attachment A.

2. The 314 NPA has a remaining life span of at least a year.

The 314 NPA has a remaining life span of at least one year. The NANPA projects that the 314 NPA will reach exhaust in the third quarter of the year 2001. Attachment B is a table on the NANPA web page² that lists the status of active and pending NPA relief projects. This table demonstrates that the projected exhaust date for the 314 NPA is at least one year.

3. The 314 NPA is in one of the largest 100 MSAs.

The 314 NPA encompasses the City of St. Louis and is in one of the largest 100 Metropolitan Statistical Areas ("MSA"). In the Commission's Deployment Schedule for Long-Term Database Methods for Local Number Portability found at Title 47 C.F.R. Part 52 – Appendix to Part 52, the largest 100 MSAs are listed. Attachment C contains the Appendix to Part 52 and ranks the City of St. Louis among the largest 100 MSAs at number sixteen (16).

Having demonstrated the criteria necessary to receive additional pooling authority pursuant to the Commission's Report, the MoPSC respectfully requests that the Commission grant the MoPSC the authority to implement additional number conservation measures as requested in its original petition. Considering the short remaining lifespan of the 314 NPA, the MoPSC respectfully that the Commission act on this petition as expeditiously as possible.

RE: Declaration of Jeopardy Condition in the Missouri 314 Area Code

We have been advised by the NeuStar, Inc. North American Numbering Plan Administration (NANPA) Central Office Code Administrator for Missouri that the demand for CO codes in the 314 Numbering Plan Area (NPA) in Missouri has increased significantly beyond the normal forecast. As a result, the 314 NPA is in jeopardy of exhausting prior to when relief will be provided. According to the *Central Office Code (NXX) Assignment Guidelines*, a "jeopardy NPA condition exists when the forecasted and/or actual demand for NXX resources will exceed the known supply during planning/implementation interval for relief."

Therefore, the code administrator has declared the 314 NPA to be in jeopardy and has invoked the attached interim Jeopardy Procedures for the Missouri 314 NPA. These procedures ration the assignment of central office codes (NXXs). This rationing process will remain in effect until one of the following occurs:

- Industry stakeholders reach consensus on Final Jeopardy Procedures; or,
- All available NXXs in this NPA area assigned; or,
- Mandatory dialing for the relief NPA goes into effect.

On May 3, 2000, NANPA will facilitate an industry conference call to discuss and develop jeopardy code assignment procedures for this NPA. We will follow the consensus process, developed in an open industry forum, which is supported by the Alliance for Telecommunications Industry Solutions (ATIS).

Accordingly, you are invited and encouraged to participate in a conference call on **May 3, 2000, at 9 AM Central** to develop the needed procedures. **The conference bridge number is (847) 413-2931, access code 5074341# (35 ports).**

Also attached is a proposal for discussion and modification set of jeopardy procedures for your consideration and study prior to the conference call.

PART 52--NUMBERING--Table of Contents

Subpart D--Toll Free Numbers

Sec. 52.109 Permanent cap on number reservations.

(a) A Responsible Organization may have in reserve status, at any one time, either 2000 toll free numbers or 7.5 percent of that Responsible Organization's numbers in working status, whichever is greater.

(b) A Responsible Organization shall never reserve more than 3 percent of the quantity of toll free numbers in spare status as of the previous Sunday at 12:01 a.m. Eastern Time.

(c) The Common Carrier Bureau shall modify the quantity of numbers a Responsible Organization may have in reserve status or the percentage of numbers in the spare pool that a Responsible Organization may reserve when exigent circumstances make such action necessary. The Common Carrier Bureau shall establish, modify, and monitor toll free number conservation plans when exigent circumstances necessitate such action.

PART 52--NUMBERING--Table of Contents

Subpart D--Toll Free Numbers

Sec. 52.109 Permanent cap on number reservations.

(a) A Responsible Organization may have in reserve status, at any one time, either 2000 toll free numbers or 7.5 percent of that Responsible Organization's numbers in working status, whichever is greater.

(b) A Responsible Organization shall never reserve more than 3 percent of the quantity of toll free numbers in spare status as of the previous Sunday at 12:01 a.m. Eastern Time.

(c) The Common Carrier Bureau shall modify the quantity of numbers a Responsible Organization may have in reserve status or the percentage of numbers in the spare pool that a Responsible Organization may reserve when exigent circumstances make such action necessary. The Common Carrier Bureau shall establish, modify, and monitor toll free number conservation plans when exigent circumstances necessitate such action.
