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P R O C E E D I N G S

JUDGE WOODRUFF: It's clicked over to 10:00 so we'll go ahead and get started. We're here today for a Pre-Hearing Conference in the File No. EA-2019-0021 which concerns Ameren Missouri's Application for a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity Authorizing it to Construct a Wind Generation Facility in Atchison County, Missouri.

We'll begin today by taking entries of appearance from the attorneys who are here representing parties. We'll begin with Ameren Missouri?

MR. LOWERY: Good morning, Your Honor. Jim Lowery with Smith Lewis LLP. The court reporter has the remainder of my contact information. I'm representing Ameren Missouri.

JUDGE WOODRUFF: And for Staff?

MS. MERS: Nicole Mers and Alexandra Klaus on behalf of the Staff, and the court reporter has our information.

JUDGE WOODRUFF: And Public Counsel?

MR. SMITH: Morning. This is Ryan Smith and John Clizer. We represent the Office of the Public Counsel. The court reporter has our information.

JUDGE WOODRUFF: And for Renew Missouri?

MR. LINHARES: Good morning. This is Andrew

1 Linhares on the phone for Renew Missouri. Address, if
2 the court reporter needs it, is 409 Vandiver Drive,
3 Building 5, Suite 205, Columbia, MO, 65202.

4 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Okay. And for the Tarkio
5 Schools?

6 MS. MEYSTEDT: Rachel Meystedt with Ed
7 Counsel, LLC in Columbia, Missouri. Our address, if the
8 court reporter needs it, is 2401 Bernadette Drive, Suite
9 117, Columbia, Missouri, 65203.

10 JUDGE WOODRUFF: And MIEC? Rock Port Schools?
11 Anyone here for the Rock Port Schools?

12 Henry Robertson representing the Sierra Club
13 and NRDC indicated that he would not be able to be here
14 today and asked to be excused. So he is excused.

15 Atchison County?

16 MR. SCHRAEDER: Your Honor, Ivan Schraeder
17 appearing for Atchison County with a Motion to
18 Intervene, 25 West Moody Avenue, St. Louis, Missouri,
19 63119, 314.236.0065 and e-mail
20 ischraeder@wagnerlawgroup.com.

21 JUDGE WOODRUFF: DeKalb County, which is you
22 again.

23 MR. SCHRAEDER: The same. DeKalb County has a
24 pending Motion for Intervention, same information
25 attends.

1 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Department of Conservation?

2 MS. BELL: Sure. Missouri Department of
3 Conservation has a pending Motion to Intervene. My name
4 is Stephanie Bell with Ellinger & Associates. The court
5 reporter has my information. Also on the phone is
6 Jennifer Frazier. Her address is 2901 West Truman
7 Boulevard and that's Jefferson City, Missouri, 65102.

8 JUDGE WOODRUFF: And then Division of Energy?

9 MR. HYMAN: As I indicated, our attorney
10 Michael Lanahan could not be here today. We do have
11 myself, Martin Hyman, and Lisa Kremer here. I can give
12 the court reporter contact information.

13 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you very much.

14 MR. HYMAN: We also have a pending Motion to
15 Intervene.

16 JUDGE WOODRUFF: And I'll take up the various
17 Applications to Intervene. We have -- I already granted
18 Renew Missouri's because the 10 days had passed for
19 them. So then we've got Tarkio Schools, Sierra Club,
20 MIEC, Rock Port Schools, NRDC, Atchison County, DeKalb
21 County, Department of Conservation and Division of
22 Energy have pending Applications to Intervene.

23 This morning, or actually yesterday afternoon
24 I believe it was, Ameren Missouri filed an Opposition to
25 the DeKalb County Application to Intervene.

1 Mr. Schraeder, did you wish to respond to that
2 at this point?

3 MR. SCHRAEDER: I would briefly, Your Honor.
4 We haven't had a chance to file a document because we
5 received it late yesterday. DeKalb County's interests
6 are parallel to that at Atchison County. We do have
7 wind towers that have been constructed that are
8 operating and power is being sold. Ameren is not
9 currently, as we understand it, purchaser of that power,
10 but the decision and the interests that are being
11 expressed in what could come in this decision certainly
12 have the potential for impacting DeKalb County in the
13 same way that it will affect Atchison. While that is
14 not an immediate impact, the county, DeKalb County, was
15 asking for intervention so that it is at least
16 recipients of the various pleadings and the opportunity
17 to participate, if needed, knowing that even though it
18 is somewhat of a tenuous issue the interest that we have
19 deals with kind of the secondary level of this and that
20 is the taxation that may be impacted as a result of the
21 Commission's decision.

22 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Well, I'm not going to make
23 any rulings on DeKalb County's Application to Intervene
24 today. I'll give you a chance to file a written
25 response and we'll take it to the Commission. If you

1 could file a written response by Friday of this week --

2 MR. SCHRAEDER: Yes, sir.

3 JUDGE WOODRUFF: -- we'll take it to the
4 Commission and make a decision on DeKalb County.

5 MR. LOWERY: Your Honor, if I could be heard
6 just a moment on this.

7 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Sure, Mr. Lowery.

8 MR. LOWERY: As we indicate in our written
9 response, you know, if this property is locally
10 assessed, if it was owned by a developer but not
11 ultimately owned by a regulated public utility under the
12 Missouri law, there would be no impact on DeKalb
13 County's taxes at all. In fact, Atchison County is
14 going to get all the tax revenue.

15 If it's centrally assessed, DeKalb County's
16 taxes are actually going to go up. Probably not a lot
17 but we have some pole miles in DeKalb County so they're
18 going to get a piece of that central assessment.

19 If DeKalb County's intervention can be
20 justified, then the same could be said of every one of
21 the other 112 counties in the state because they have an
22 interest that's no different than those 112 counties or
23 at least any of those counties that have the potential
24 for wind development, and there are a number of other
25 counties that have that. So I don't believe this very

1 speculative interest that if the Commission makes the
2 decision somehow that might have precedential effect and
3 the Commission might let a regulated utility buy a wind
4 farm in another jurisdiction or even build one let alone
5 buy one from a developer has any bearing. In fact,
6 you've already made a decision in the Terra-Gen case
7 that if there is a precedential value that same
8 precedent has already been set. I don't believe there
9 is precedential value to decide each case on the merits.

10 The interest that they have to I think
11 establish is some direct interest that's different than
12 all the other counties. I think in this context the
13 general public under your rule really would be all the
14 other counties. They absolutely don't have that at all
15 and I don't see any circumstance where this particular
16 county's intervention serves the public interest.
17 Atchison is there. Atchison can carry the county torch
18 so to speak. In fact, if they're represented by the
19 same lawyer, they're going to get all the pleadings,
20 they're going to get the discovery.

21 I think while we very, very, very seldom
22 almost never oppose an intervention, this is one that we
23 think is just far beyond what's reasonable. So for that
24 reason we have chosen to oppose this one. I appreciate
25 the moment.

1 JUDGE WOODRUFF: So noted. Like I say, this
2 will be the decision for the Commission to be made.
3 My understanding is that all the other Applications to
4 Intervene are unopposed; is that correct?

5 MR. LOWERY: We don't oppose the others.

6 JUDGE WOODRUFF: I will go ahead and grant all
7 the other Applications to Intervene. DeKalb County is
8 certainly welcome to participate today in the
9 pre-hearing conference and ultimately the Commission
10 will make a decision on whether or not they come in.

11 Once I get back upstairs, I'll go ahead and
12 issue a written notice indicating that all those other
13 parties have been allowed to intervene in the case and
14 that would be Tarkio Schools, Sierra Club, MIEC, Rock
15 Port Schools, Natural Resources Defense Council,
16 Atchison County, Department of Conservation and Division
17 of Energy.

18 We also have a pending Motion for Protective
19 Order that was filed by Ameren Missouri providing a
20 little extra layer of protection for some of the
21 information that's in this case. Does anyone oppose
22 that Motion for Protective Order? Hearing no
23 opposition, I'll go ahead and grant that. And this is
24 very similar to the one --

25 MR. LOWERY: It's identical.

1 JUDGE WOODRUFF: -- to the earlier case that's
2 pending from north of Kirksville.

3 MR. LOWERY: That's correct.

4 JUDGE WOODRUFF: The other matter then to take
5 care of is the procedural schedule. Ameren proposed --
6 has filed a motion for adoption of a procedural
7 schedule. Anyone wish to be heard on that proposed
8 schedule?

9 MR. LOWERY: I would point out that Public
10 Counsel and the Staff did indicate in advance that they
11 were okay with the schedule as we indicated in the
12 motion.

13 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Right. It would include to
14 schedule a public hearing early January in Rock Port, at
15 least in Atchison County. Rock Port is the best
16 location for it.

17 MR. LOWERY: We made a suggestion. Obviously
18 that depends on ADA and its availability, but I think in
19 terms of centrality to the project we made a suggestion
20 that we thought was probably made the most sense.

21 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Okay. Anyone opposed to the
22 proposed schedule? I'm inclined to grant it. Again,
23 procedural schedules are set by the Commission, not by
24 the Judge. So I'll put an order on for agenda next week
25 to adopt that procedural schedule.

1 Anyone else? Anything else anyone wants to be
2 heard while we're on the record?

3 MR. LOWERY: In terms of local public hearing,
4 you'll be dealing with that by further order as well?

5 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Yes. I know you indicated a
6 location there. We'll check on that availability and
7 set that up.

8 MR. LOWERY: Thank you.

9 MR. SCHRAEDER: Your Honor, I might make a
10 suggestion in that case if you're not familiar with the
11 Rock Port area.

12 JUDGE WOODRUFF: I actually used to live in
13 Rock Port.

14 MR. SCHRAEDER: Then that works out just fine.
15 I was going to say the county clerk up there would know
16 facilities or alternative locations that would be
17 available.

18 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Okay. All right. Anything
19 else then? All right. We're off the record then. If
20 you want to have any further discussions with each
21 other, that's fine. The phone line will be open for
22 another two hours if anyone needs to have any more
23 conversations. With that then I'm going to leave the
24 room and you can discuss things as you like.
