OFFICE OF THE PUBLIC COUNSEL'S COMMENTS REGARDING INDUSTRY 314 NPA RELIEF IMPLEMENTATION PLAN AND SCHEDULE

COMES NOW the Office of the Public Counsel and submits the following comments to the Industry's 314 NPA relief implementation plan and schedule:

- 1. Public Counsel states that although counsel for Neustar, Inc. filed the plan and schedule via overnight courier on November 22, 2000, Public Counsel did not receive its service copy until November 27, 2000.
- 2. Public Counsel concurs with Staff's comment that the Public Service Commission should reject the industry proposal that local calls within and between 314 and the new NPA (552), at the option of the company, can be 1 + 10-digit dialing. Also, Public Counsel concurs that 10-digit dialing within and between the 314 and the new NPA (552) should not require 1 + 10-digit dialing.

These proposals will only confuse customers about what is or is not a toll call. The use of optional 1 + 10-digit dialing creates variances in local dialing patterns based upon local carriers. This does not serve the public interest; a single local dialing pattern should prevail throughout the two NPAs. The use of 1 + 10 for local (non toll calls) also blurs the 1 + 10 pattern as a toll indicator. This confuses the consumer and no longer alerts the consumer that 1 + 10 is a toll call while a 10-digit call is a local, non toll call.



Public Counsel also sees no reason to require toll calls "within and between the 314 and the new NPA" to be dialed 1 + 10 digits. Under the MCA in St. Louis, calls within the present 314 footprint and the new 552 should not be toll calls. Again, this mix of dialing patterns for local calls does not serve the public interest and works to confuse telephone consumers.

3. Public Counsel does not oppose the proposed schedule based upon the directions given the industry by the PSC in its Report and Order. However, Public Counsel would once again encourage the PSC to make it clear that if the co code assignments slow significantly or if recovery efforts increase the available co code inventory, the schedule could be modified to postpone the new NPA's effective date.

The rate of NXX usage has not proceeded as predicted by Neustar. As of July 26, 2000, 160 codes were available for assignment. In the three months from that time, only 12 codes have been assigned so that 148 codes are available as Of December 5, 2000. As suggested by Public Counsel, the usage is considerably under the cap of 14 codes per month. This leaves the door open for the PSC to consider a postponement of implementation if this trend continues.
