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PROCEEDINGS 1 2 JUDGE REED: Okay. We're here for two 3 cases today for a prehearing conference that I've asked 4 for. Those cases are WR-2006-0250, an application of 5 Hickory Hills Water & Sewer Company for a small company 6 rate increase, and also SR-2006-0249, application of 7 Hickory Hills Water & Sewer Company for a small company 8 rate increase. 9 My name is Steve Reed. I'm the Regulatory Law Judge who's been assigned to hear these two cases. 10 11 They're not consolidated, but they're running the same 12 course at present. 13 I think what we need to do is get entries of appearances first. From Hickory Hills, correct? Could 14 15 you give us your name? MR. CLIFFORD: Randy Clifford, P.O. 297, 16 Tipton, Missouri. 17 JUDGE REED: And Staff? 18 MR. KRUEGER: Keith R. Krueger for the 19 20 Staff of the Missouri Public Service Commission, P.O. Box 360, Jefferson City, Missouri 65102. 21 22 JUDGE REED: And Public Counsel? 23 MR. WHEATLEY: My name is Mark Wheatley. 24 Our address is Post Office Box 2230, Jefferson City, Missouri 65102, representing the Office of the Public 25

1 Counsel and the public.

JUDGE REED: Thank you. Today's hearing may be a little bit unusual, but I wanted to get us together to talk about a couple things if we could. The primary reason that I wanted to get everybody together is because I wanted to see if at this point currently the Office of Public Counsel was going to request a local public hearing.

9 You may not know yet. I realize that you 10 have 20 days from the date that the filing was made to ask 11 for a public hearing, but the -- I would calculate that to 12 run about January 1st. I think that's a Saturday. So we 13 may be looking at January 3rd if you took the full 20 14 days.

The tariff effective date is February 1st, 2006, and I have a concern about January filling up on the Commission's calendar. There are already three local public hearings scheduled, and so we may need to do another one. And I was hoping that if we could know now, it would make it easier to schedule and get everybody's schedule together.

22 MR. WHEATLEY: Yes, Judge, on behalf of 23 Public Counsel, we've already decided that we will be 24 making a request for a local public hearing, and we've 25 notified Staff of that also.

JUDGE REED: Well, if it's all right with 1 you, Mr. Wheatley, what I'd like to do is consider that a 2 3 request on the record. And so when I issue an Order after 4 this hearing, it will reflect that Public Counsel has, in 5 fact, requested a public hearing. 6 MR. WHEATLEY: That's fine. 7 JUDGE REED: Makes sense. Okay. Thank you. Whenever I issued the initial Order in this case, I 8 9 mentioned in that Order that the company would need to 10 notify the customers about the filings, about the rate increase and the agreement with Staff, and also would need 11 to notify the customers of the date and place for the 12 13 local public hearing. What I hoped to do was consolidate those 14 two notices so that the company wouldn't have to send out 15 16 two of them. So that's the other reason that we're here, 17 to sort of put everything together. 18 What I want to do next is get with the Commission and talk about dates when we would have this 19 20 local public hearing. Now, the customers are all in 21 California; is that right? Is that close enough so that 22 we could have the public hearing here? I'd like you each 23 to comment on that if you would. Is it 25, 30 miles, or 24 is it too far? Mr. Clifford? 25 MR. CLIFFORD: 35 miles from Tipton, so

1 it's approximately 25 miles.

2 JUDGE REED: How many customers are there? MR. CLIFFORD: Currently, there are 48 3 4 customers. JUDGE REED: 48. Is this a subdivision? 5 6 MR. CLIFFORD: Yes, two small subdivisions 7 together. 8 JUDGE REED: Are they new or older, can you 9 tell me? 10 MR. CLIFFORD: No. The original was in the early 1970s, and the latest homes to be built were in the 11 12 late 1990s. 13 JUDGE REED: Okay. Public Counsel, Mr. Wheatley, do you have any -- what do you think about 14 15 asking people to drive over here? 16 MR. WHEATLEY: Our office would prefer that the public hearing be held in California just because 17 that's where the customers reside and would be more 18 convenient for them. 19 20 JUDGE REED: That's the county seat for 21 Moniteau County, correct? So I would think there's plenty 22 of facilities there. 23 MR. KRUEGER: Your Honor, the Staff would 24 also support that. I think convenience of the customers, 25 that's more important.

1 JUDGE REED: All right. I'm going to take that to the Commission as well as some potential dates 2 3 that we might set this. We currently are looking at 4 public hearings in other venues in other cases January 5 11th and 12th probably, and then another one January 18th. 6 Some of those public hearings are significant distances 7 away. 8 What I was looking at in this case is 9 potentially that first week of January, maybe January 5th, or it might even need to be a Friday night, January 6th. 10 Does anybody see problems with that? Speak up if you do. 11 12 MR. KRUEGER: I could probably attend 13 either one of those. The 6th would actually be a little more convenient for me. 14 15 JUDGE REED: Has the Commission -- I'm sorry. Mr. Wheatley? 16 MR. WHEATLEY: I was just going to comment 17 18 on the ability to notify the customers of the hearing, whether we would have sufficient time to do that. 19 20 JUDGE REED: That's a good point as well. 21 I know that you gentlemen have been here for some time 22 with the Commission, or maybe you haven't, but there 23 have -- are there occasions where we have Friday public hearings, Mr. Krueger? 24 25 MR. KRUEGER: I don't recall any.

JUDGE REED: Really? Okay. What about the 1 second full week of January, does anybody here see some 2 3 significant conflict with any dates there that week? 4 MR. CLIFFORD: The end of the week. 5 JUDGE REED: The end of the week would be a 6 problem? 7 MR. CLIFFORD: Yes. 8 JUDGE REED: Like Thursday/Friday you mean? 9 MR. CLIFFORD: Yes. MR. WHEATLEY: Judge, is that the week that 10 includes the 11th? 11 12 JUDGE REED: Yes, it does. There may be two public hearings going on that week already. 13 MR. WHEATLEY: Because I believe I will be 14 involved in the Empire local public hearing, which is 15 perhaps one of those cases. 16 JUDGE REED: Yes. Okay. Potentially 17 18 January 10th or 9th, I think, which is a Monday. That's Monday, Tuesday, 9th and 10th. The following week, the 19 20 16th, the Monday, is Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. The 21 17th may be available. The Aquila rate case is going on 22 for most of January or the last half of January. So 23 whenever we choose it in the last part of January, it's 24 going to cause some problems. We can still get it done, 25 I'm sure.

1 So potentially January 17th. January 18th, the Commission has a local public hearing in, I think it's 2 Insbrook, Missouri, something like that, and then 3 4 potentially January 19th or January 20th, which are 5 Thursday and Friday of that week. Do you guys see any 6 problems with those two? 7 MR. KRUEGER: I don't. 8 JUDGE REED: Mr. Wheatley? 9 MR. WHEATLEY: I don't. Again, I'd be interested in how we're going to notify the customers. 10 Will there be a bill cycle going through then? 11 12 JUDGE REED: Mr. Clifford, do you -- it's 13 48 customers. They need to be notified about the rate 14 case and the agreement anyway. So what I'd propose is that we couple that with the notice of public hearing once 15 16 we get it set, and I would hope that we could issue an Order probably by early next week, after Christmas of 17 18 course. So, Mr. Clifford, if you were asked to 19 notify your customers during the week of the week after 20 21 Christmas, could you just send a separate mailing with all 22 that information to the 48 customers? 23 MR. CLIFFORD: Yes. Our normal billing will be mailed December 31st, January 2nd. 24 25 JUDGE REED: And that goes to everybody?

1 MR. CLIFFORD: Yes. We can include it in normal mail or we can do it separate. 2 3 JUDGE REED: It would be good if we could 4 do it with the normal mailing. 5 MR. KRUEGER: Your Honor? 6 JUDGE REED: Yes. 7 MR. KRUEGER: The Staff is willing to assist Mr. Clifford in drafting up the notice if that 8 9 would --10 JUDGE REED: That would be great. MR. KRUEGER: -- facilitate matters. And 11 the other point I had was, I think the Aquila hearing was 12 13 scheduled to begin on the 9th, but I heard in agenda 14 yesterday that it's not going to start on that date. I don't know what date it's finally going to start, but I 15 16 think we'd be -- from our point of view, I think it would 17 be preferable to do it before that begins, if possible, 18 but allowing sufficient time for the delivery of notice and so forth. I think maybe the 17th might be good from 19 20 those regards. 21 JUDGE REED: Yes, and I'll check with the 22 Commissioners and see what we can figure out with that, 23 with regard to that, too. 24 What I propose to do is establish a date 25 for the local public hearing, then I will issue an Order

1 telling the company to send out notice of the rate case and the agreement, and Staff will help you with that 2 3 notice, the notice of public hearing as well, so that they 4 all go out together. And maybe we can do this when your 5 normal billing goes out, the end of December, correct? 6 MR. CLIFFORD: Yes. 7 JUDGE REED: And set up -- of course, I've got to find a place in California and make sure that we 8 9 have a place available. MR. CLIFFORD: The company held a public 10 hearing to discuss needed improvements back in August at 11 12 the City Hall. Some of the Staff attended the meeting. 13 They might be able to tell you whether that would be 14 adequate for this meeting. If not, the library is across the street. The library has a public meeting room. I 15 16 looked into it, and it would hold 80 people or something like that. 17 18 JUDGE REED: Okay. That's good to know. 19 Thank you. 20 MR. CLIFFORD: The City Hall contact would 21 be the city clerk, Brian Scrivener. 22 JUDGE REED: What's the name again? 23 MR. CLIFFORD: Brian Scrivener. 24 JUDGE REED: Okay. Anything else, 25 Mr. Wheatley?

1 MR. WHEATLEY: We have one question, and I'm not sure whether or not you were prepared for this, 2 3 but we were -- the Staff work papers have been provided to 4 Public Counsel, as they normally are in these types of 5 cases. We were wanting to know if that would also be 6 considered a release to the public, whether those audit 7 results could be released to the public. I don't know if Staff has a position on that or not. 8 9 MR. KRUEGER: Could Mr. Johansen address 10 that? 11 JUDGE REED: That would be fine. 12 MR. JOHANSEN: I'm Dale Johansen. I'm the manager of the water and sewer department for the 13 Commission here. 14 The Staff normally makes a filing in the 15 case file a few days ahead of the local public hearing 16 17 that will include some of the information at least 18 regarding our audit results. It will include a review of the company's current revenues, a review of the revenues 19 20 under the proposed rates, as well as the income statement 21 showing how the revenue requirement was derived. 22 The notice that we normally send, that the 23 companies normally send regarding the disposition agreement or local public hearing advises the customers 24 25 how to access that information in the case file through

1 EFIS.

2 So that the full set of work papers, what 3 we call the EMS run is normally not provided until after 4 the local public hearing as a part of the Staff's 5 recommendation, and the reason for that is because there 6 may be issues that come up during the local public hearing 7 that would result in changes to the audit results, and we don't want -- we don't want to confuse the case file with 8 9 significant sets of work papers, more than one set of the 10 full work papers. But the basic information regarding the 11 results will be available to the public prior to the local 12 13 public hearing. 14 JUDGE REED: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Johansen. Mr. Wheatley, does that answer your 15 16 question? MR. ROBERTSON: My name is Ted Robertson. 17 I'm with the Office of Public Counsel. I'm an accountant. 18 I understand what Dale said, but basically 19 what we're looking at here is a very small system of 48, 20 21 49 customers. And our thinking, now, we don't want to 22 give out any information that's confidential. We 23 certainly don't want to do that. But it's such a small 24 system, and the people there are actively involved in 25 what's going on. They formed a committee. They're

concerned with what's going on with the system, not just
 with the audit. It's got some other situations related to
 DNR.

4 Our thinking was, if we're going to have a 5 public hearing, we would like the people to be as much 6 informed as possible about what's going on, so that if a 7 few days before the public hearing occurred we could get this information to them, they could have time to look 8 9 through it, develop any questions they might have, and then when they get to the public hearing be able to 10 discuss it more fully. That's all we were looking for. 11 12 So what I was wanting to do with the work papers -- and in most situations work papers are 13 14 confidential. I mean, they're work product. But this is such a small company, and I don't know of anything that's 15 highly confidential, and so basically what we were just 16 17 trying to do was give them as much detail as we possibly 18 could so they could look at what's going on, what the company's asking for, what the situation is going on with 19 20 the company, and then they could respond or make comments 21 at the public hearing in a rational way.

That's all we're looking for. We're not trying to blind side anybody or anything like that. We're just trying to give the consumers as much information beforehand so when they get to the public hearing, they're

not just fumbling. They can actually discuss the specific 1 issues in detail, and if they have questions, the 2 3 questions could be explained. 4 JUDGE REED: Mr. Krueger, do you see the 5 information that they're after as being confidential and 6 not subject to public disclosure? 7 MR. KRUEGER: I do. The income statement lists every expense category, and so that would be 8 9 available to the ratepayers, so they would be able to see that and evaluate that, and the additional detail I think 10 probably is not necessary. 11 12 JUDGE REED: Okay. Well, I think what 13 we'll have to do for today is leave it like this. 14 Mr. Wheatley, if there is additional information that you believe that you're entitled to, file a motion to that 15 16 effect with some supporting authority. If Staff could 17 respond to that. Once it's filed I'll set probably a shortened time period within which to respond, and we'll 18 resolve it that way. All right? 19 20 MR. WHEATLEY: Very good. 21 JUDGE REED: Anything else? 22 MR. KRUEGER: Not from Staff, your Honor. 23 JUDGE REED: Mr. Clifford? 24 MR. CLIFFORD: No.

25 JUDGE REED: Thank you for being here.
