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PROCEEDINGS 1 2 (Starting time of the Hearing: 6:00 3 p.m.) 4 JUDGE STEARLEY: Good evening. It's 5 Wednesday, February 17th, 2010. The Missouri б Public Service Commission has set this time for a local public hearing in four cases that are before 7 8 the Commission involving Aqua Missouri, seeking to 9 implement a general rate increase for its water and sewer service in Missouri. The file numbers for 10 these cases are SR-2010-0023, WR-2010-0025, SR-11 2010-0026, and WR-2010-0027. 12 13 My name is Harold Stearley. I'm the Regulatory Law Judge that will be presiding over 14 tonight's hearing. I know Commissioner Jarrett is 15 16 present on the site. The way we will proceed is 17 staff should have a witness list for us of people who signed up to give testimony. I will swear 18 those witnesses in and they will give their 19 20 testimony, it will be recorded by the court 21 reporter who's present, and made part of the 22 official record of this case. 23 While the other Commissioners couldn't 24 be even on site or here in Jefferson City tonight, 25 they will be reviewing all the comments and

1 testimony of any participants when considering this 2 matter and making their decisions. Commissioner 3 Jarrett, would you like to make any opening remarks 4 before I take entries of appearance? 5 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Yes, thank you, б Judge. As Judge Stearley indicated, I am Terry Jarrett. I'm one of five commissioners on the 7 8 Missouri Public Service Commission and I want to, 9 on behalf of all the Commissioners, thank you for coming out tonight. All of us view these local 10 public hearings as very important in our rate 11 12 cases. 13 Normally, at least one of us tries to be at every local public hearing. I'm the one here 14 15 tonight, so I'm glad to be here in Sedalia. Again, 16 the ones who are not here, you shouldn't take that 17 as their not viewing this as important. Certainly we get a transcript of everyone's comments and we 18 19 do read those as part of the rate case. So your 20 comments are very important and we do consider them in the case. 21 22 So again, welcome. I look forward to hearing your comments. And back to you, Judge. 23 24 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, Commissioner,

and I'd also like to thank our hosts here in

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Sedalia. It helps us tremendously to be able to 1 2 reach out through the web casting as well. 3 I will now take entries of appearance 4 of the attorneys from parties, starting with Aqua 5 Missouri, Incorporated. Is there any attorney б present for Aqua Missouri? Hearing no response, we'll let the record reflect that no attorney has 7 8 entered an appearance for Aqua Missouri. The Office of Public Counsel? Is 9 anyone present tonight for the Office of the Public 10 11 Counsel? MR. OCHOA: No, Your Honor. 12 13 JUDGE STEARLEY: Very well. Let the record reflect the Office of the Public Counsel is 14 also not present. 15 The Staff of the Missouri Public 16 17 Service Commission? MR. DEARMONT: Thank you, Judge. This is 18 Eric Dearmont on the behalf of the Staff of the 19 20 Missouri Public Service Commission, P.O. Box 360, 21 Jefferson City, Missouri, 65102. 22 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, Mr. Dearmont. 23 Mr. Ochoa, do you have a witness list? 24 MR. OCHOA: I do, Judge. The first witness is Mr. Robert Vedder. If I could ask you 25

3	MR. VEDDER: Right here?

б	JUDGE STEARLEY: Alright, Mr. Ochoa,
7	could you please repeat the gentleman's name for

10	JUDGE STEARLEY: Alright, is he present?
11	MR. OCHOA: Yes, he is. We're-
12	JUDGE STEARLEY: Can he raise his right
13	hand and I'll swear him in.

15	(WHEREIN, Robert Vedder was duly sworn
16	by Judge Stearley.)
17	JUDGE STEARLEY: Alright, would you
18	please state and spell your name for our court
19	reporter?
20	MR. VEDDER: It's Robert C. Vedder, last
21	name spelling is V as in Victor, E-D-D as in dog,
22	E-R, Warsaw, Missouri, 65355.
23	JUDGE STEARLEY: You may proceed with
24	your comments.
25	MR. VEDDER: My comments in this public

б

1 hearing for Aqua Missouri Water are the proposed 2 increase of \$35.19 per month to \$53 per month is 3 absolutely absurd. Asking for, in a percentage, of 4 51 percent increase since approximately two years 5 ago, I believe is when I last remember an increase. б I may not be right but please don't quote me on it, but it's in that area. 7 8 This is a luxurious decision especially 9 in a time of economic hardship for many and the rate increase proposed greatly exceeds the 10 inflation rate over that period of time. I 11 personally am sick of corporate executives 12 13 continuously putting profits before people. And I will finally say that I personally don't want to be 14 subsidized to undocumented capital expenditures due 15 16 to mistakes made by the company of Aqua Missouri 17 buying into an antiquated system. That's all I 18 have. JUDGE STEARLEY: And sir, if you will 19 20 please remain standing there, we may have some questions for you. I'll start with Staff's 21 attorney, Mr. Dearmont, do you have any questions 22 for this witness? 23 24 MR. DEARMONT: I have no questions. Thank you, Judge. Thank you. 25

JUDGE STEARLEY: Commissioner Jarrett, 1 2 would you have any questions for this gentleman? 3 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: I don't have any 4 questions for you, Mr. Vedder, but I thank you for 5 your testimony. 6 MR. VEDDER: Thank you. 7 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Appreciate it. 8 JUDGE STEARLEY: I do have just a couple of quick questions, Mr. Vedder. Have you had any 9 service quality issues with Aqua Missouri? 10 11 MR. VEDDER: No, I haven't. I don't have any complaints about the service whatsoever. 12 13 JUDGE STEARLEY: Have you had any talk-MR. VEDDER: Your question again? 14 JUDGE STEARLEY: Have you have problems 15 with their billing or with customer service? 16 17 MR. VEDDER: No, sir, I don't. JUDGE STEARLEY: Well, that's all the 18 19 questions-20 MR. VEDDER: The only other problem, I 21 do-22 JUDGE STEARLEY: I'm sorry, could you 23 repeat that? 24 MR. VEDDER: Well, I was going to say, the only other thing I can comment on is that we're 25

on a sewer district there in Benton County and it's 1 2 not governed by your Commission, but they're also 3 taking a 55 percent increase, which makes my water 4 bill and my sewer bill, which are separate bills, 5 total over \$106 a month. Now, that's pretty б excessive. JUDGE STEARLEY: And that's for both your 7 8 water and sewer? 9 MR. VEDDER: Correct. When the town of Warsaw, the City of Warsaw, has trash, sewer, and 10 11 water for a rate of \$38 a month. Do the math. JUDGE STEARLEY: Alright. Thank you very 12 13 much for comments, sir. 14 MR. VEDDER: Thank you. JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Ochoa, do we have 15 16 another witness? MR. OCHOA: Yeah, Bill Gordon. Stay 17 18 right there and when you get ready to speak, you hold the microphone down if the red light comes on. 19 20 MR. GORDON: Thank you. 21 MR. OCHOA: Go ahead, Judge. Mr. 22 Gordon's ready to be sworn. 23 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Gordon, will you 24 please raise your right hand. (WHEREIN, William Gordon was duly sworn 25

by Judge Stearley.) 1 2 JUDGE STEARLEY: Very well, and you may 3 proceed with your comments. 4 MR. GORDON: Thank you. We see today in 5 many levels of society, the extreme right and the б extreme left, with no middle ground. I'd like to offer a balanced opinion of my personal opinion of 7 8 the situation with Aqua Missouri. 9 We have a family household of two people who live in the Maple Wood area just east of 10 Sedalia, Missouri. Our current bill is 11 approximately \$35 which is fairly standard for us. 12 13 The arithmetic on \$35 a month for two people is just a little over 50 cents a day to have running 14 water. I think that's one of the best values in 15 16 the world today. Equate that with - there's a bottle of 17 18 water over here on the counter. I'm sure that probably cost 99 cents to \$1.29 for a pint. Here, 19 20 we get bathtubs full. My wife and I take a bath 21 everyday. And I think that's a wonderful value. 22 The service is impeccable. The one man, Aqua Missouri employee, who meticulously 23 24 cruises our neighborhood, looks for problems, I 25 only know by his first name, Jim. I've only met

him once. I'm very impressed with his 1 2 professionalism. I had a personal contact with him 3 when we had a pipe breakage outside our home with 4 him on our property, very efficient, very 5 courteous, very professional. I want to compliment б him. It reflects well on your training program and your hiring practices at Aqua Missouri. Those are 7 8 the good things and there's several more good 9 things.

The bad things that I feel are two 10 things. Number one, in the Maple Wood area, we 11 have had more than one water main breaks somewhere 12 13 between the pipe itself that pumps the water 14 through the home, so it's not within the homes, or the residences, or the businesses, it's in Aqua 15 16 Missouri's piping system. My wife will give more 17 details and specifics that should substantiate that comment. The materials used seemed to be put in 18 with planned obsolescence. The rate increase of 19 20 the past, we would have like to have seen go to 21 better materials, better state of the art materials 22 that might be available today.

I'm curious to know how much of these
cost increases go for executive pay, staff
increases, bonus, travel expenses, hotel

1 accommodations, you know, expenses that every non-2 profit organization has, but they can be 3 substantial and, as we've seen in national news, 4 way, way excessive for what is really required for 5 utilities or non-profit organizations. I б understand that this is a profit-making 7 organization, but I have thoughts of this increase 8 of 51 percent or whatever it turned out to be going directly for executive bonuses, and we've all heard 9 the excess - executive bonuses on Wall Street and 10 others, so that concerns me. 11 I don't see the increase as going 12 13 toward improvement of products or retrenching to 14 put in the piping that's needed to eliminate the cold weather and warm weather water main breaks 15 16 being replaced with the same old materials that are 17 planned to break again. 18 So that coupled with, as was stated 19 earlier, the rate of inflation which is verging on 20 a period of deflation concerns me. Why is this? We don't see it in product improvement. We see it 21 not in staffing. We still have Jim going the 22 neighborhood. It hasn't increased to three 23 24 vehicles and three people. So that's what concerns 25 me.

1 Are these rate increases going to 2 please stockholders and employees and 3 subcontractors or are they going for improved 4 services and benefits for the customers? I believe 5 that's all I have to say. Those are my concerns. б I would be curious, if it's public information, what the pay structure and bonus 7 8 increases and expense accounts are with the top 9 executives at Aqua Missouri. Are they having their annual meetings in the Caribbean and having a great 10 time at our expense while we are suffering under 11 reduced buying capacity with our dollars. I'm on a 12 13 fixed income, Social Security, so any rate increase does literally come right out of my pocket, when it 14 could be going to other necessities for my family. 15 16 Thank you for your courtesy in hearing 17 my comments. Do you have further questions for me? JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you Mr. Gordon, 18 let me ask Mr. Dearmont. Mr. Dearmont, do you have 19 20 any questions following this? 21 MR. DEARMONT: Not at this time, Judge, 22 thank you. 23 MR. GORDON: My name is William Gordon, 24 last name is spelled G-O-R-D-O-N. I'm a resident 25 at 2803 Monsees Drive in Sedalia, Missouri, 65301.

Thank you.

2	JUDGE STEARLEY: Commissioner Jarrett,
3	would you have any questions for Mr. Gordon?
4	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Mr. Gordon, I
5	don't have any questions, but I do appreciate your
6	comments and appreciate you coming out tonight.
7	You've indicated you might have some questions.
8	You might check with our staff that is here after
9	the hearing to see if they can answer any of your
10	questions or provide you with any information.
11	MR. GORDON: Thank you.
12	JUDGE STEARLEY: I, too, thank you for
13	your testimony, sir. Mr. Ochoa, do we have anyone
14	else on our witness list?
15	MR. OCHOA: Yes, Elayne Gordon.
16	MS. GORDON: I'm Elayne Gordon. My name
17	is spelled E-L-A-
18	JUDGE STEARLEY: Would you please raise
19	your hand for me, your right hand?
20	MS. GORDON: Uh huh.
21	(WHEREIN, Elayne Gordon was duly sworn
22	by Judge Stearley.)
23	JUDGE GORDON: Thank you. I apologize if
24	I interrupted you there. We have a little lag in
25	time on the audio here, so I apologize for that.

1 Would you please state and spell your name for our 2 court reporter? 3 MS. GORDON: My name is Elayne Gordon. 4 E-L-A-Y-N-E, G-O-R-D-O-N. 5 JUDGE STEARLEY: You may proceed with б your comments. MS. GORDON: No one here is contesting 7 8 that water service is important, because obviously, 9 it is. Water quality is important. The continuous service is important, and good service and repairs 10 is important. But I'm not certain that another 11 increase, and an increase of 51 percent at that, is 12 13 really what's needed here. We're not receiving a 51 percent increase in water quality, nor in the 14 infrastructure, the piping and the pumping and so 15 16 forth, or in the service that we're experiencing 17 from this company. I've lived in Maple Wood at my current 18 19 address a little less than ten years and in that 20 time frame, we've received letters of notification 21 that water quality has been substandard and what 22 they've done to fix that. But, of course, that letter came about a month or maybe even a month and 23 24 a half after the actual experience and so none of 25 us had the opportunity to do anything about the

poor water quality at the time.

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2 We've had a couple of water main breaks 3 with only signage on the roads to let people know 4 if there was a boiling order and at one point, 5 there was. But we have a middle-aged to elderly б community and maybe many of those folks don't drive or don't get out of their house or maybe just 7 8 didn't leave the house that day. How would they 9 know that water quality was poor enough and even potentially dangerous enough that it needed to be 10 boiled before we would use it. I have a major 11 problem with that because of the contamination that 12 13 could have happened at that time and could have 14 endangered people's lives at that time. Let's see, there have been three breaks 15 16 in the same footage of pipe in a neighbor's yard

17 within the past year. I think that that's 18 excessive and is another example of the poor 19 infrastructure and possibly the poor replacement 20 parts that are going into place whenever these 21 repairs do have to happen.

Again, water is really important to us. We have to have it to live. We have to have it to be hygienic. We have to have it to wash our house, our clothing, et cetera, and it's also important

that it be of good quality. However, I don't feel 1 2 like a 51 percent increase in the bill is going to 3 make a 51 percent increase in quality or service or 4 infrastructure. Especially since, again, I've been 5 a fairly long term person living in this б neighborhood and we've had a couple of increases in 7 the past and we're still not seeing any increase in 8 the quality or the service that we're receiving. 9 And that's my comment. JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you. Mr. 10 Dearmont, do you have questions for this witness? 11 MR. DEARMONT: I have a few questions, 12 13 Judge. How would you characterize your quality of service overall? 14 MS. GORDON: I would say probably, I'm 15 16 about 75 percent satisfied with the quality of 17 service. I do have to say that when I looked at my 18 bill that I received today, that every one of the 19 readings over the past year have been a manual 20 reading. It wasn't a guesstimation. We have had a couple of those in the past, but over the past 21 year, we did not have any guesstimations about what 22 our water usage was. 23 24 We have had some water stoppages that 25 weren't announced. Thankfully, they didn't last

more than a few hours. If you were in the shower, 1 2 however, that would not have been a good place to 3 be when the water quits. So I would say yes, that 4 I'm about 75 percent satisfied with the services 5 that I get. б MR. DEARMONT: Do you know if those water 7 stoppages were related to a broken main? 8 MS. GORDON: I would say a couple of 9 times, they have been. Sometimes, we hear nothing. 10 It just stops and then in a couple hours, it starts back up again and unless we actually see the water 11 flowing through our yard or a place where they have 12 13 to tear up the road to fix the pipe that's going underneath, most of the time, we don't know what 14 15 has caused the water stoppage. 16 I do know that - I think, what was it, 17 Christmas Eve this year, we got up and wanted a glass of water and just look at the snow because it 18 was coming down intensely, and there was no water 19 20 and we didn't ever hear as to why there was no water. And we thought maybe we had a broken pipe 21 somewhere because that's a reason why you wouldn't 22 have water service, and we went all through the 23 24 house, but we didn't find anything. 25 So it's sort of a worry. Is it us? Is

it Aqua Missouri that's causing the stoppage? Then 1 2 you have to make sure if it is you, how to get it 3 stopped. The one time that we did have a water 4 breakage, we were able to stop it and then get a 5 hold of Jim and he was able to tell us whether it б was a service problem in our property or in Aqua Missouri's. 7 8 MR. DEARMONT: Outside of Jim, have you 9 ever tried to contact the company call center or the local office? 10 MS. GORDON: I did try to call, it seems 11 like it was on a holiday and it was quite hard to 12 13 get hold of anyone. I'm just trying to remember when that was. It has been in the last year, it 14 was in the last couple of years. We had a major 15 16 water break, so that you could actually see the 17 water flowing on top of the ground, through, over the road and down the park into our little lake out 18 there. I don't know how many water breakages there 19 20 have been. I don't know the answer to that 21 questions. 22 MR. DEARMONT: That's all I have. Thank you very much. 23 24 JUDGE STEARLEY: Commissioner Jarrett, do 25 you have any questions for this witness?

COMMISSIONER JARRETT: I don't have any 1 2 questions. Ma'am, thank you for your testimony. I 3 appreciate it. 4 MS. GORDON: You're welcome. 5 JUDGE STEARLEY: I wanted to clarify б something with you. You mentioned getting a notice about improved water quality and some concern about 7 8 not receiving a boil order. Was the water 9 contaminated that that water needed to be boiled? MS. GORDON: I don't know what caused 10 them to put out the boil order. I just know that 11 one time when I came home from work, there was a 12 13 sign as I was coming into the neighborhood that said boil order. And I'm not even certain how long 14 it lasted. It seemed like maybe it was a day or 15 16 two, but the sign stayed out. 17 I would have thought that maybe a door to door notification in our small little 18 19 neighborhood might have been a better way to get 20 the word out maybe to find out whether or not it 21 was a bacterial contamination or maybe it was a chemical contamination, something like that would 22 have also been helpful information. I never ever 23 24 heard as to, other than just a main breakage, why 25 there was a boil order.

1 JUDGE STEARLEY: So there was a sign 2 posted for you? MS. GORDON: Yes, and it was handwritten. 3 4 JUDGE STEARLEY: And did you know - okay. 5 And were you notified some way when the boil order 6 was lifted? 7 MS. GORDON: The sign disappeared. 8 JUDGE STEARLEY: Or did the sign just disappeared? 9 10 MS. GORDON: That's correct, the sign 11 disappeared. 12 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. So you assumed the water was safe at that point? 13 MS. GORDON: I assumed that. That may 14 have been a poor assumption to make. I guess kids 15 could have taken the sign and I would never have 16 17 known that it was still unsafe to drink. JUDGE STEARLEY: I'm just trying to 18 clarify regarding the type of notice you received 19 20 and what you were aware of. Were there any other 21 incidents similar to this or was this a one time 22 incident? 23 MS. GORDON: This was a one time 24 incident, as far as I know. JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. Well, I thank you 25

1	very much for your testimony.
2	MS. GORDON: You're welcome.
3	JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Ochoa, do we have
4	anyone else signed on our list?
5	MR. OCHOA: Yes, Your Honor. Duane
6	Weston or Barb? There are two names. I don't know
7	if you both want to testify?
8	MR. WESTON: No.
9	MS. WESTON: No.
10	MR OCHOA: Okay. Mr. Preston, Bob
11	Preston?
12	MR. PRESTON: Yes.
13	JUDGE STEARLEY: Could you repeat that
14	name for me again?
15	MR. OCHOA: Sure. Bob Preston.
16	JUDGE STEARLEY: Alright, sir. If you
17	could please raise your right hand for me?
18	(WHEREIN, Bob Preston was duly sworn by
19	Judge Stearley.)
20	JUDGE STEARLEY: If you will please state
21	and spell your name for our court reporter.
22	MR. PRESTON: My name is Bob Preston, B-
23	O-B P-R-E-S-T-O-N.
24	JUDGE STEARLEY: Alright. You may
25	proceed with your statement, sir.

MR. PRESTON: Okay. Well, I just, you 1 2 know, like the Gordons, you know, I'm basically 3 satisfied with - by the way, I live out at Maple 4 Wood Subdivision and I'm the president of the 5 homeowner's association, just newly president this б year. But, you know, water service - water 7 quality, sewer basically is good. I don't have any 8 issues with that. I would trade my bill with the 9 Gordons. Mine's a little bit higher than theirs. MR. GORDON: You bathe more frequently. 10 MR. PRESTON: You know mine runs about 50 11 bucks a month, which is not bad. It's about double 12 13 what it was when I moved out there four years ago. 14 It would run twenty - upper twenties. But the breaks are a concern. I don't think they're as bad 15 16 as they were. Actually I'm the new president out 17 there, so I'm not real familiar with the past 18 breakage. There was quite a few. The winter of last year, I think was 19 20 pretty bad, like three or four breaks, and I'm not aware of all of them. And I have heard, don't know 21 22 first hand, when they're repaired, they are repaired with a quality product that's not - could 23 24 be better, let's put it that way. 25 Personally, you know, I don't - one

1 day, I do have a - my main comments is going to be 2 on the fire hydrants. And we happen to have one in 3 our front yard, which I was very pleased, you know, 4 when I bought the house, you know, to have a fire 5 hydrant right in the front yard, you know. I did come home one day last year and my front yard was 6 dug up. Never did hear why. And of course, they 7 8 repaired it and smoothed it out and everything. I 9 don't have a problem with that. Just kind of wondered what was going on there. No notice or 10 anything about that. 11 But the fire hydrants, from what I've 12

13 been told by the fire department, we have had three fires out there this winter. One house burned to 14 the ground. They say they can't hook onto the fire 15 16 hydrants out there because their equipment will 17 pull more than what the system can produce and the 18 lines will collapse. So I think that's a concern 19 of mine. Is it because of a pressure situation or 20 of the quality of lines or - I'd just like to know more about why we have fire hydrants that can't be 21 used. That's really my main question, about the 22 fire hydrants, and I guess-23

24JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Dearmont, do you25have any questions?

MR. PRESTON: The one thing I was going 1 to add is, you know, the increases, you know, I 2 3 understand, you know, in order to improve and do 4 things, you know, it has to be paid for. You know, 5 it has to come from somewhere and I certainly б understand that. But I'm like some of the others have voiced, you know, we see continual increases 7 8 out there and, to my knowledge, there's been zero 9 improvements in the four to five years I've lived out there. But maybe there are improvements that 10 11 I'm unaware of. JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Dearmont, do you 12 13 have any questions for this witness? MR. DEARMONT: Just one, Judge. For the 14 purposes of contacting them, can you tell us who 15 16 provides your area with fire protection services? 17 Is it city or county? 18 MR. PRESTON: It's county, Benton County, 19 yeah. 20 MR. DEARMONT: County? Thank you. 21 JUDGE STEARLEY: Commissioner Jarrett, 22 any questions? 23 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: I don't have any 24 questions, but I do thank you for your testimony 25 tonight.

1 MR. PRESTON: Okay. Thanks. 2 JUDGE STEARLEY: Sir, I would like to 3 point out we do have, as you know, staff members 4 present and I believe there are some 5 representatives from Aqua Missouri here that may be б able to directly either answer your question regarding fire hydrants or perhaps we can figure 7 8 out who we need to contact with regard to if 9 there's a water pressure issue that could be resolved there. So I would encourage you to take -10 when we're done with the formal part of this 11 hearing and taking testimony, I would encourage you 12 13 to speak with the staff members who are present 14 regarding that question. And I thank you for your testimony. Mr. Ochoa, do we have anyone else on 15 16 our witness list? 17 MR. OCHOA: Judge, that was the last name on the sign up sheet. Is there anyone else that 18 19 wishes to testify? 20 MR. GORDON: My name is William Gordon. 21 I'm speaking for the second time here tonight. I 22 do want it noted that part of the service area of 23 Aqua Missouri in our neighborhood is the Senior 24 Center associated with the Four Seasons Nursing 25 Home and their retirement community for people over

the age of 55, I believe, 50, many - all of whom 1 2 are not here. There's not a single representative. 3 I think they need a voice here tonight and I hope 4 I'm speaking for them when I say there are many 5 fixed income people living in the community in and б around the Maple Wood development who I'm sure would like to be here tonight, but for health and 7 8 weather and other related information, they can't 9 attend. 10 But some concern must be given to seniors, many of whom are single and on a very 11 limited fixed income, a high percentage of which 12 13 goes to medications and simply existing, not 14 necessarily living. So please take into 15 consideration the hardships that this poses, 16 especially here during very difficult economic 17 times for every Missouri family who works to keep 18 their family intact. So please give special 19 consideration to those low income people. Thank 20 you. JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, again, Mr. 21 22 Gordon. Is there anyone else who wished to testify? Hearing nothing further, I would like to 23 24 remind those who are present and those who may be

watching on our webcast that there are many ways to

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get in contact with the Commission to provide 1 2 comments for these matters. You can call us, mail 3 us, email us, you can post comments on our web 4 page, or you can contact the Office of the Public 5 Counsel. Commissioner Jarrett, would you like to 6 make any closing remarks? 7 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: I would just like 8 to quickly again thank everyone for coming tonight, 9 especially everyone who testified. You all did 10 very well, lots of good comments, and we will 11 consider every one of them in the case. So thank 12 you again. JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, Commissioner, 13 and since we have no further witnesses, I will 14 bring this local public hearing to adjournment.
