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JUDGE DIPPELL: Let's go ahead and go on the record then. The Missouri Public Service

Commission has set this time for a local hearing in Case Number SR-2008-0080 in which Timber Creek

Sewer Company seeks to implement a general rate increase. The Missouri Public Service Commission regulates the rates charged by investor-owned utility companies in Missouri to ensure that those rates are just and reasonable. The Commission also regulates the quality of service and safety of operations.

The Commission is made up of five commissioners, one of whom is here with me tonight, Commissioner Jarrett. And the Commission also employs a staff of engineers, accountants, attorneys, financial analysts and other experts in the field of utility regulation. My name is Nancy Dippell, I am a Regulatory Law Judge that has been assigned to this case. It is my job to preside over tonight's hearing.

As you know we are video conferencing this from not only the Platte County Middle School from where the witnesses are, but from here in the Commission's offices in Jefferson City. In

Τ	addition to the video conference, we are also
2	broadcasting this over the web. So I just wanted
3	you all to be aware of that.
4	We have a court reporter there in Platte
5	City that is transcribing the hearing so that the
6	other commissioners can read all the comments and
7	review them. The sound and video you are hearing
8	is also being recorded here in Jefferson City.
9	Also here in Jefferson City tonight I have members
10	of the staff. I have Mr. Russo for the water and
11	sewer department, Mr. Hagemeyer, and I also have
12	the Staff Counsel Wayne Baker. And I believe I
13	saw that Ms. Christina Baker is there with you
14	all. She is with the Office of Public Counsel.
15	And of course Mr. Ochoa is our Public Information
16	Officer. I am assuming there are some Timber
17	Creek Sewer representatives there?
18	MR. FINNEGAN: Yes. I am Jeremiah
19	Finnegan. I am the counsel for the Timber Creek
20	Sewer Company. I would like to enter my
21	appearance. Jeremiah Finnegan, Finnegan, Conrad,

Sherry and Willis Sherry, and Emma and Steve, the operator. So we are here present.

1	And I would like to make just one brief
2	comment. Inasmuch as the and I will not try to
3	cross-examine the witnesses because I understand I
4	want them to make their statements. But because
5	the courts have ruled that hearsay, if not
6	objected to, becomes substantial and competent
7	evidence, there may be times where I am going to
8	have to object for hearsay. And I just want to
9	put that in advance and let everybody know that as
10	long as they say what they think, what they know,
11	and not what somebody else told them, I will not
12	object to it.
13	JUDGE DIPPELL: All right. Is there
14	anyone there from Hunt Midwest?
15	MS. REYNOLDS: Yes. Ora Reynolds, Vice
16	President and General Manager for Hunt Midwest
17	Real Estate Development. 8300 Northeast
18	Underground Drive, Kansas City, Missouri, 64161.
19	JUDGE DIPPELL: I'm sorry. Ma'am, were
20	you an attorney?
21	MS. REYNOLDS: No, I am not. I am an
22	employee. And we are not represented here today,
23	but we have hired counsel.
24	JUDGE DIPPELL: All right. Thank you.
25	Ms. Baker, would you like to go ahead and make

1	your entry of appearance.
2	MS. BAKER: Christina Baker, Office of
3	Public Counsel. P.O. Box 2230, Jefferson City,
4	Missouri, 65102. Appearing on behalf of the
5	Office of Public Counsel and the rate payers.
6	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Mr. Baker,
7	would you like to make your appearance?
8	MR. BAKER: Yes. Wayne Baker appearing
9	on behalf of the Missouri Public Service
10	Commission. P.O. Box 360, Jefferson City,
11	Missouri, 65102.
12	JUDGE DIPPELL: All right. I would also
13	like to thank the Platte County Middle School for
14	providing us their facility, especially doing so
15	on somewhat short notice. Just state that the
16	comments and statements that are made here tonight
17	are in no way associated with the school. This is
18	an official hearing of the Missouri Public Service
19	Commission and as such the statements and
20	testimony of witnesses will be recorded by the
21	court reporter and taken under oath or
22	affirmation.
23	The purpose of this hearing is to
24	receive your comments regarding the rate increase.
25	So the company is not presenting witnesses here

1	tonight and are not going to be answering
2	questions while we're on the record. We
3	appreciate the company being there and maybe if
4	you all have specific questions that didn't get
5	answered during the earlier session, hopefully
6	there will be some time that you all can get some
7	more of your questions answered after the hearing.
8	What I will do is, anybody that signed up we will
9	call your name and if you can come forward and sit
10	at the chair there and near the microphone. I
11	will swear you in and then ask you to spell your
12	name so we can get that into the record correctly.
13	After you testify, there may be some questions
14	from Commissioner Jarrett or from some of the
15	attorneys, so I will ask you to remain at the
16	table until I have excused you. Let's go ahead
17	then. We can bring our first witness.
18	Mr. Ochoa, how many witnesses do you
19	have signed up?
20	MR. OCHOA: Judge, I have six witnesses
21	that have signed up.
22	JUDGE DIPPELL: If anyone else wishes to
23	testify after that, you can either let Mr. Ochoa
24	know in the interim or I will ask when we finish
25	with these witnesses if there is anyone else who

T	would like to speak. Who is our litst withess:
2	MR. OCHOA: Ora Reynolds.
3	JUDGE DIPPELL: Ms. Reynolds, could you
4	spell your name for the court reporter, please.
5	MS. REYNOLDS: My name is Ora Reynolds.
6	O-r-a, last name R-e-y-n-o-l-d-s.
7	JUDGE DIPPELL: Would you please raise
8	your right hand.
9	(The oath was administered.)
10	JUDGE DIPPELL: Ms. Reynolds, as you
11	previously stated, you work for the company; is
12	that correct?
13	MS. REYNOLDS: Correct.
14	JUDGE DIPPELL: That you are not an
15	attorney?
16	MS. REYNOLDS: I am not an attorney. We
17	are represented by Mark Connelly and he is not
18	here today.
19	JUDGE DIPPELL: I understand that. And
20	as such, I am not going to be able to allow you to
21	testify on behalf of the company. If you have a
22	public comment from your own personal knowledge,
23	that is fine. But as a corporation has to be
24	represented by an attorney and you all are an
25	intervenor in this case, I am afraid I can't let

1	you make just a public comment on behalf of the
2	company.
3	MS. REYNOLDS: Our attorney told us we
4	could do this. And I can I guess I can do it
5	on behalf of my knowledge and not on behalf of the
6	company. Is that what you are telling me?
7	JUDGE DIPPELL: That's what I am telling
8	you.
9	MS. REYNOLDS: Okay. All right. Let me
10	go ahead. My name is Ora Reynolds and I obviously
11	work for Hunt Midwest. I would like to take a
12	minute to thank the Commission for allowing our
13	firm to intervene. I would like to keep my
14	comments fairly brief this evening with the
15	understanding there are going to be other
16	opportunities to express our position on the
17	tariffs. I can give you a little bit of company
18	background. We are a Kansas City-based real
19	estate company involved in residential, commercial
20	
21	MR. FINNEGAN: I am going to object to
22	this. You have already ruled that she cannot
23	testify on behalf of the company. If you are here
24	as an individual.
25	MS. REYNOLDS: We can skip the company

1	portion of this and talk about the agreement I
2	entered into, again that was on behalf of the
3	company.
4	JUDGE DIPPELL: If this is going to be
5	facts, ma'am, that your company is going to be
6	presenting in its case in opposition to the rate
7	increase, then it needs to be done so in an
8	evidentiary hearing. This hearing tonight is
9	really for public comments about the rate
10	increase. And as I said, your company is an
11	intervenor.
12	MS. REYNOLDS: So we are not a part of
13	that public process?
14	JUDGE DIPPELL: Well, at this point you
15	have become a part of the case itself.
16	MS. REYNOLDS: All right. I understand.
17	Thank you.
18	JUDGE DIPPELL: I'm sorry if there was a
19	misunderstanding. Mr. Ochoa, who else is there?
20	MR. OCHOA: The next witness is Nancy
21	Wakefield.
22	JUDGE DIPPELL: Ma'am, could you spell
23	your name for the court reporter, please.
24	MS. WAKEFIELD: Nancy Wakefield.
25	N-a-n-c-v, W-a-k-e-f-i-e-l-d.

1	JUDGE DIPPELL: Please raise your right
2	hand.
3	(The oath was administered.)
4	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Go ahead
5	with your comments.
6	MS. WAKEFIELD: Okay. I am Nancy
7	Wakefield, President of Timber Park Homeowner's
8	Association and I am here tonight representing my
9	neighbors in Timber Park. And first of all, I
10	have a petition to give to the commissioners, or
11	to leave, from the homeowners of Timber Park.
12	This is an informal petition that was passed
13	around asking people to support us in this
14	endeavor. Everyone that was approached was eager
15	to sign and had questions. There are 192 homes in
16	Timber Park. Adjusting for the homes that are
17	rented or vacant because they are for sale or
18	recently sold, we have 185 homes that could have
19	had homeowners sign up. We had 149 homes or
20	homeowners from 149 homes that signed this
21	petition. And I want to thank all of those who
22	took the time to pass it around. I will read the
23	petition.
24	"The Timber Creek Sewer Company has
25	proposed to the Missouri Public Service Commission

1	Request Number QS-2007-0008" I know that has
2	been changed now "to increase sewer rates to
3	\$35.67 per month, an increase of 32 percent over
4	the current rates. This comes on top of a 63
5	percent increase in July of 2004. The company's
6	increase operations expenses come primarily from
7	sewer construction in the surrounding areas, not
8	Timber Park. We the undersigned find this
9	proposed increase of 116 percent in three years to
10	be wildly excessive and therefore urge the
11	Missouri Public Service commission to reject it.
12	If that is not done, then we ask that Timber Park
13	subdivision, the original site of the sewer plant
14	and sewer lines, to be grandfathered in at the
15	current sewer rates as most of the sewage goes
16	through our neighborhood to reach the new sewer
17	plant. We are requesting to be grandfathered in
18	at the current sewer rate and I hope to explain
19	why in this statement."
20	Number 1. Around 1995 the Timber Creek
21	Sewer Company built a sewer plant in our
22	subdivision, Timber Park. It was located in the
23	western part of our subdivision several hundred
24	feet from proposed building lots. The new homes

were built in 1995 in our subdivision.

Number 2. In 1998 our homeowners

association provided a petition signed by most of
the homeowners at that time to the Public Service
Commission to continue to have Timber Creek Sewer
Company provide our sewer services and not allow
Platte County Regional Sewer District to take over
the sewer services in our subdivision. Timber
Creek remained as a sewer service provider. I do
not know if our petitions helped or not, but it
shows that our homeowners have always been
concerned about the sewer services in our
subdivision. At that time we supported Timber
Creek because we thought they wanted to provide
the most reasonable sewer rates.
Number 3. A number of other homes,
subdivisions and businesses have been connected to
the sewer lines in our subdivision since 1995.
First, the Lakes of Oakmont subdivision was added.
This is an aboveground pipeline near our park
area. Second, our park area was torn up for one
whole summer as the line to Timber Park Meadows
subdivision was added. Third, the corner at 134th

Street and Running Horse was torn up as Oak Creek

subdivision was added. Fourth, 136th Street was

torn up when Summit Way subdivision was added.

1	And finally and I have pictures of this that I
2	can also submit "the lawns, sidewalk and
3	driveway of two homes on Northwest 135th Court
4	were torn up to connect the new subdivision, the
5	townhouses of Platte Valley. The homeowners were
6	told that it saved Timber Creek Sewer Company and
7	the townhouses of Platte Valley \$120,000 by
8	allowing them to take the sewer line through their
9	yards. Hopefully this is the last time our
10	subdivision will be torn up to add connections.
11	Number 4. Timber Creek Sewer Company
12	authorized J & J Septic Company to dump raw sewage
13	in a manhole at one of the entrances of our
14	subdivision.
15	MR. FINNEGAN: Objection, this is
16	hearsay, Your Honor.
17	MS. WAKEFIELD: I talked to the people.
18	MR. FINNEGAN: I'm sorry, but you are
19	not the people.
20	JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Finnegan, I am going
21	to note your objection. I am not going to rule on
22	it right now. I am going to let the witness go
23	ahead and finish her testimony. I suspect you
24	will have some objections to her petition and her
25	pictures as well. When we get all of this on

1	we're going to I am going to reserve ruling on
2	your objections this evening. And we will get
3	those all formalized and give you an opportunity
4	to do that when the transcripts come in.
5	MR. FINNEGAN: Thank you, Your Honor. I
6	just want you to know that I have to do that to
7	protect
8	JUDGE DIPPELL: I understand that. I'm
9	sorry, I am having a little feedback issue. I
10	think it is corrected now. So I am going to let
11	the witness go ahead. And I think, Mr. Finnegan,
12	just in the interest of time and so forth this
13	evening, I am going to let you reserve all of your
14	objections and I will give you an opportunity to
15	object to testimony when the transcripts arrive.
16	Is that agreeable?
17	MR. FINNEGAN: At a later date, that is
18	fine. Yes. As long as I am not waiving my right.
19	JUDGE DIPPELL: I am sorry, I am having
20	a hard time hearing you.
21	MR. FINNEGAN: As long as I am not
22	waiving my right. Basically it is a continuing
23	objection. And I can object to the transcripts.
24	Thank you.
25	JUDGE DIPPELL: You're not waiving your

1	right.	Thank	vou.	Go	ahead,	ma'	am.

MS. WAKEFIELD: I will point out that I talked to J & J Septic Company. This is what they told me. When we protested, the septic company drove all the way through our subdivision to our old sewer plant and dumped it there. This went on for about one year before it stopped. We wondered why the truck could not have been driven to the main plant on Highway N. Why was it allowed to dump raw sewage in our subdivision?

Number 5. Sewer odors have been a serious problem in our subdivision. They first appeared around the sewer plant area. I received many calls from homeowners who lived near the plant stating that the odors were constant. The odors decreased once the sewer plant was relocated to its current address on N. Highway in Platte County, yet I continue to receive complaints about sewer odors, mostly coming from the outside. I have a list of 15 people who have complained. It is interesting that the odors appear to be on the west side of our subdivision and I think that is — that most of the sewage from the other subdivisions also flows through that same side of the subdivision.

Timber Creek said they had spent
hundreds of man hours checking this out. In fact,
the company threatened a lawsuit concerning this
matter. They did not have a telephone number on
their billing statements, yet they asked us to
notify them as soon as possible when a sewer odor
was detected. So we put telephone numbers on our
Timber Park website. Our own lawyer reviewed the
posting and found no problem. They sent a lawyer
to ask us to remove the telephone numbers or they
would sue us. We agreed to do so if they would be
available to receive the phone calls for a 24-hour
period and if they would try to find out what was
happening with the sewer odors. The irony of the
situation was not lost on us. They were
threatening to sue us, their customers, because
they could not solve the problem with the sewer
odors.

Number 6. Recently, three sewer lines have had to be replaced in the curb area or at the curb area. The sewer lines are not in the front yards or coming from the houses." And this question was just answered. I am asking if they could consider using a camera to check on the sewer lines. And I am suggesting that they start

checking the sewer lines that carry the sewage
from outside from subdivisions outside of ours.
"What should be done with the soil that has been
contaminated due to these sewer leaks? Is it
toxic? Can it be harmful to our neighbors? Is
this the cause of the sewer odors? Before Timber
Creek Sewer Company receives a rate hike, I think
they need to work with our subdivision to make
certain that the lines are intact and try to find
the sewer odors.

To summarize, we are asking to be grandfathered in at the current rate of \$26.97 for the following reasons. One, sewage from other homes, subdivisions and businesses go through our neighborhood every day and our sewer lines. Two, our neighborhood is the one that is continually torn up when new lines are connected to our sewer lines. Three, we are still smelling sewer odors after all these years. Four, sewer lines are being replaced because they are broken. We were concerned about the soil that is around these broken sewer lines. Five, we have had a long history with Timber Creek Sewer Company, often to the benefit of the sewer company and to the expense of our homeowners in the neighborhood.

1	Do you want me to leave these petitions
2	and these pictures?
3	JUDGE DIPPELL: Yes. I would like to
4	mark those I would like to mark the petition as
5	Public Hearing Exhibit Number 1. And I will mark
6	your pictures as Exhibit Number 2. If you would
7	give those to the court reporter, then they will
8	be attached to the transcript.
9	Ma'am, I have a few questions for you.
10	First of all, is your signature on the petition?
11	MS. WAKEFIELD: Yes.
12	JUDGE DIPPELL: From what time frame
13	were the odor issues that you are discussing?
14	MS. WAKEFIELD: They have been constant
15	since the beginning of the well, as far as I
16	know, I moved there in 1997 and I know that they
17	were there in 1997.
18	JUDGE DIPPELL: Are you personally aware
19	of a sewer leak or are you just implying that from
20	the odors?
21	MS. WAKEFIELD: I am just wondering if
22	because they have found broken sewer pipes, if
23	this could possibly be the cause of the sewer
24	odors. That's all I am asking.
25	JUDGE DIPPELL: You have not personally

4	Jarrett, did you have any questions?
5	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Judge, I do not
6	have any questions. Ms. Wakefield, thank you for
7	your testimony. It has been very helpful.
8	Thanks.
9	MS. WAKEFIELD: Thank you.
10	JUDGE DIPPELL: Let me see if anyone
11	else has any questions. Mr. Finnegan, did you
12	have questions at this time?
13	MR. FINNEGAN: I have no questions at
14	this time.
15	JUDGE DIPPELL: Ms. Baker?
16	MS. BAKER: I have a couple of
17	questions. You said that you are here
18	representing the Timber Park Homeowners
19	Association?
20	MS. WAKEFIELD: That's right.
21	MS. BAKER: Do you hold an office?
22	MS. WAKEFIELD: I am the president.
23	MS. BAKER: How many homeowners are
24	members of the homeowners association?
2.5	MS WAKEFIEID: 10 we have 102 lots

1	And they are when they buy, they are a member
2	of the homeowners association.
3	MS. BAKER: You are a resident there in
4	Timber Park?
5	MS. WAKEFIELD: Yes.
6	MS. BAKER: Have you had any service
7	problems?
8	MS. WAKEFIELD: You mean no. I have
9	not. We have smelled sewer odors a couple of
10	times in our home too.
11	MS. BAKER: Have they been recent?
12	MS. WAKEFIELD: No, I don't think so.
13	MS. BAKER: Does it come and go?
14	MS. WAKEFIELD: Come and go.
15	MS. BAKER: Is there a certain time of
16	year?
17	MS. WAKEFIELD: No.
18	MS. BAKER: That's all the questions I
19	have. I appreciate you coming.
20	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Mr. Baker,
21	do you have anything?
22	MR. BAKER: No.
23	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. You may be
24	excused. Thank you very much. Who is our next

witness, Mr. Ochoa?

1	MR. OCHOA: Eric Murray.
2	JUDGE DIPPELL: Sir, could you spell
3	your name for the court reporter, please.
4	MR. MURRAY: My name is Eric, E-r-i-c,
5	Murray, M-u-r-r-a-y. I am a resident of Timber
6	Park.
7	JUDGE DIPPELL: Would you please raise
8	your right hand.
9	(The oath was administered.)
10	JUDGE DIPPELL: Go ahead with your
11	comments.
12	MR. MURRAY: I am a single father with
13	three kids. And I try to control my expenses and
14	with this rate increase, it is just, my average
15	water bill for the last nine months is \$26.05. I
16	pay the sewer company \$26.97 a month. So I am
17	already paying dollar for dollar water to sewer.
18	If they increase this rate to the \$34.74, my
19	average would be \$8.69 more to flush my toilet
20	than to turn on the water. We have had the sewer
21	odors a continuing problem. It hasn't been so bad
22	this year, but the last two years were pretty
23	horrible. I had it in my own shower. There was
24	nothing I could do about it except buy a lot of
25	air freshener. That's all I really wanted to

1	comment on.
2	JUDGE DIPPELL: All right. Thank you
3	very much. Commissioner Jarrett, do you have
4	questions?
5	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: No questions.
6	Thank you, Mr. Murray.
7	JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Finnegan?
8	MR. FINNEGAN: No questions.
9	JUDGE DIPPELL: Wait just a moment, Mr.
10	Murray.
11	MS. BAKER: I do have a question. You
12	said that you have been experiencing some sewer
13	odors?
14	MR. MURRAY: Yes. Like I said, this
15	year hasn't been so bad, but the last few years it
16	was pretty bad in my bathroom.
17	MS. BAKER: Did you notice if those were
18	at a certain time of year or certain time of day?
19	MR. MURRAY: No. It was just, like I
20	said, I shower every day. I know it is not the
21	drain trap. I made sure all my traps had water in
22	them. And it is at no particular time of day. I
23	can't remember a particular time of year. Like I
24	said, this year has been better. I still have air
25	fresheners in the bathroom because you never know

Т	when it is going to come back.
2	MS. BAKER: Do you have any other
3	service issues that you have had with your sewer
4	service?
5	MR. MURRAY: Water goes down the drain.
6	MS. BAKER: Thank you very much.
7	JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Baker?
8	MR. BAKER: No questions.
9	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, Mr. Murray.
10	Who is the next witness, Mr. Ochoa?
11	MR. OCHOA: Cecil Murray.
12	JUDGE DIPPELL: Sir, could you spell
13	your name for the court reporter, please.
14	MR. MURRAY: Cecil Murray. C-e-c-i-l
15	M-u-r-r-a-y.
16	JUDGE DIPPELL: Raise your right hand.
17	(The oath was administered.)
18	JUDGE DIPPELL: Go ahead with your
19	comments.
20	MR. MURRAY: First I am going to address
21	the sewer odor, since my house seems to be the one
22	that is attracted to it. Since about 2000 late
23	2003, 2004 to about April of this year, the sewer
24	odors are atrocious in my house. My house faces
25	north and it has an alcove where to the front door

1	and that's where the sewer gas would pocket. For
2	the first year or so, Jeff Yocum would come by and
3	we would check the neighborhood over trying to
4	find out where the sewer smell was coming from.
5	Since it was intermittent it was very difficult to
6	find. Anyway, as time went on I felt like I
7	wasn't getting anywhere with the sewer company, so
8	I started calling the Public Service Commission.
9	I talked to Mr. Mark Humbell there. I called the
10	Missouri Department of Natural Resources, had them
11	come out. I tried everything in the world I could
12	to find an answer to this problem that I had.
13	It wasn't until I believe in 2005 I had
14	my brother-in-law come for a visit. And he
15	smelled the odors and he told me that smelt like
16	the problem that he had in Springfield, Missouri.
17	And that was from Strafford. The City of
18	Strafford had outgrown their lagoon and they were
19	holding the septic or the sewage in the lagoon and
20	it was pumping to the city utilities' main line.
21	And when they pump, that produced the odor that
22	was coming out through some houses.
23	Well, when he told me that, for the
24	first seven years I lived there I don't recall of
25	any sewer odors at all, but after they started

Summit Way we started having sewer odors. And that is because they have that pump station, the lift station there I believe. Although I am not an engineer by any imagination, but it is the only explanation for their odors. It is being selected, it is held, and it is pumped through a solid pipe for approximately a half a mile. It sits there in between pumps and then when it is pumped through the gravity flow, it comes right back through our neighborhood. And I have got some names too of people that have smelled the sewer odor over the time.

Like I said, I smelled it all the way up until this year. And here I am going to have to give Derrick Sherry a very good compliment, because he called me and talked to me about the problem and he purchased some charcoal filters to put on my roof to stop the odor. Which it has. It is a shame it took four years to get somebody to do this. Now, how long them charcoal filters is going to last, I don't know. I have been told they last from six months to five years. So my question now is, what is going to happen after those charcoal filters wear out. Will I get the sewer odor back? Apparently the odor is coming

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1	from Summit Way. And of course it would have been
2	nice if they could have went straight south out of
3	there instead of having to pump it over through
4	our neighborhood.

That's to the sewer odor problem. Now, to the cost of living. Everybody is worried about costs. Well, last year my wife and I both retired. We got a 3.3 percent raise in our pensions. That amounts to \$225.77 a month. And out of that increase, water has -- our water has went from point 0048 in 1966 to point 0056 per gallon today. Or as of January. That's the figure I use. That is a point 008 cent increase in 11 years. Which is not bad. Electric rates are going up at about a three to five percent a year for three years to build a power plant that is not in existence yet, but we are paying to the electric companies so they can pocket this money and build a new electric plant for future electricity.

And I think most people will agree that sewer and electric companies both are similar because they have a large outlay at the beginning. But those sewer pipe is going to lay in that ground for the next 40 years. So why do they have

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to have all their money back the first two or
three years is my question.

Anyway. Natural gas, my natural gas has gone up \$30.91 a month. This is over a six-year period of time. Which isn't too bad yet either, but it is still going up. And of course gasoline. Everybody is well aware of what gasoline costs today. It has gone up about a dollar a gallon over what it was a year ago. That costs everybody, including people that is retired. Food has gone up three to five percent. We just got hit this year with a new property evaluations that is supposed to be -- they were supposed to have been doing it every other year I understand for the last 10 years, but they didn't do it. So I took a \$47,000 increase in my house. I don't know what it is going to cost me. I will find that out in December.

The point of all this is -- my house and car insurance has gone up 10 percent this year.

So to keep it in perspective to my income, I have lowered my coverage. I raised my deductible just so I can maintain my style of living. The point of all this is, when is enough going to be enough? When I have to sell my house to go to someplace

else where I can buy in cheaper that doesn't have
all this high cost of living? I don't really have
much, that \$225 a month left when you add all
these increases left and that's just a few of
them. That's not all of them. That isn't even
mentioning anything about medical.

But the question that I have about the Public Service Commission, when I called and complained or I guess called and complained, issued my objection to the raise, I was told I was the first caller. Another caller, a neighbor of mine called and then he called me the next day and he said he called and he said, "I thought you said you called them." I said, "I did." They told him that he was the first caller. So apparently we are getting some lies out of the Public Service Commission.

And also the letter I have got here from the Public Service Commission didn't even mention about the 5:30 question and answer session.

Then I have some questions that, how much has the chemical cost gone up and how much has labor cost gone up in the last three years?

Since they have already had one 66 percent increase three years ago, how much of this is cost

1	that has gone up so much that they need a 33
2	percent raise now? I would love for Uncle Sam to
3	give me a 33 percent raise. And I know that they
4	brought in another layer of management. Is
5	management costing more than the other? Is this
6	where the labor cost is coming in, is the new
7	management? That's all I have.
8	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, Mr. Murray.
9	I have just a couple questions for you. You
10	mentioned Jeff Yocum. Is that an employee of the
11	company?
12	MR. MURRAY: Yes. I think he I don't
13	know if he was a worker or pretty much run the
14	company for a while.
15	JUDGE DIPPELL: Then when did you have
16	the charcoal filters installed?
17	MR. MURRAY: It was April the 2nd, I
18	believe. No, April the 6th. No, it was April the
19	2nd, because April the 6th I got the notice on the
20	new increase on rates. I don't know if there is a
21	correlation there or not. I am giving Eric the
22	benefit of the doubt. I think he is honest and
23	sincere.
24	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Commissioner
25	Jarrett, did you have any questions?

1	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Yes, I had a
2	couple of questions. Thank you. Good evening,
3	Mr. Murray.
4	MR. MURRAY: Good evening.
5	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Are you related
6	to the previous witness, Eric Murray?
7	MR. MURRAY: Yes, he is my son. He
8	lives seven houses up the street.
9	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Okay. You had
10	mentioned something by the name of Summit Way, a
11	pump station?
12	MR. MURRAY: Yes, they have a lift
13	station there.
14	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Can you tell me a
15	little bit more, about why you think that caused
16	the odors by adding some more capacity?
17	MR. MURRAY: Well, I think the odor is
18	caused because it is a collection station. It
19	collects everything coming out of Summit Way into
20	a lift station, then it is pumped through a solid
21	pipe. It has to go up over a hill, it has to go
22	over two hills actually before it gets into
23	gravity flow. But it is pumped east and then it
24	is pumped back north and then it goes back east to
25	the main trunk line which comes right down through

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۷	And especially, we are tarking, the
3	subject we are talking about, it smells. I don't
4	care how. It smells, period. And if it sits
5	awhile, it smells even more. I believe in my
6	whole heart that once that pump station pumps, it
7	is pumping all that sewage up to a certain point,
8	then it gravity flows. Okay. From the lift
9	station to that point where it breaks to gravity
10	flow, it sits there until the next pumping cycle.
11	So it is fermenting or whatever it does. It is
12	creating odor. When it starts pumping it is
13	pushing that odor right down through our
14	neighbors. And unfortunately my house sits where
15	the sewer line goes south and then turns and goes
16	east right in front of my house. And for some
17	reason or another it vents right there real
18	strong. Like I said, I have got some names of
19	people that will testify that they have smelled
20	the odor. It has been really bad up until, like I
21	said, April.
22	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Okay. And you
23	also said that you had called and complained to
24	the Public Service Commission and whoever you
25	talked to said that you were the first caller. Do

1	you know who you talked to, the name of the
2	person?
3	MR. MURRAY: No, I didn't get their
4	name. Whoever was taking the calls. Actually I
5	think I got a different person than the other
6	than my neighbor got. I think. I wouldn't swear
7	to it. But anyway, he said that when he called
8	they told him he was the first and they gave the
9	number. My number was 001 and his was like 003,
10	so.
11	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Okay.
12	JUDGE DIPPELL: If I may interrupt
13	there. I did want to mention, Mr. Murray, we have
14	had at least 60 some odd complaints before this
15	case number switched from an informal case to a
16	formal case and then we have had a few comments
17	submitted in our system since then. And I don't
18	know what the timing of all of that was. I did
19	want to let you know that the Public Service
20	Commission has numerous complaints or comments at
21	least from the public on file already.
22	MR. MURRAY: I figured that. That's the
23	reason why we are having the hearing today.
24	Tonight.
25	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: That's all the

Τ.	questions i have. Thank you, Mr. Murray.
2	JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Finnegan, anything?
3	MR. FINNEGAN: No questions.
4	JUDGE DIPPELL: Ms. Baker?
5	MS. BAKER: I do have a couple of
6	questions. How close is your home to where the
7	Summit Way lift station is? How far would you
8	say?
9	MR. MURRAY: By the crow flies, it is
10	about a half a mile. By the sewer line, I would
11	say it is probably three-quarters of a mile, a
12	mile. Something like that. But the thing is
13	right now, once that lift station dumps, there is
14	only about 14 houses before it gets to me. I know
15	there are two manholes, I don't know how many
16	more, between them and me that it can vent out of.
17	MS. BAKER: You have manholes by your
18	house?
19	MR. MURRAY: Yes, I have one right by my
20	house. It doesn't come out the manhole, it comes
21	out the vents in my house.
22	MS. BAKER: So after the charcoal filter
23	was installed, you noticed an improvement inside
24	of the house?
25	MR. MURRAY: I never had it inside my

1	house. It has always been outside.
2	MS. BAKER: So you noticed an
3	improvement outside the house?
4	MR. MURRAY: Yes. It has been so awful
5	outside, you couldn't even sit outside. My
6	grandkids couldn't even play outside because it
7	smelled so bad.
8	MS. BAKER: As I have asked before, did
9	you notice any times whenever the odors were
10	stronger, during certain times of the year?
11	MR. MURRAY: During my complaining and
12	everything, I have been told to extend the vents
13	on my house. I have been told to, various things
14	to do. I have even documented the times that I
15	smelled it, the wind direction, the time and
16	temperature. This is what I was asked to do and
17	nobody come and looked at it. Until Mark Humbell
18	he finally did come by one time and asked to look
19	at it. Outside of that, nobody else seemed
20	interested in my time of documentation.
21	MS. BAKER: Is that something that you
22	would like to submit with your comments today?
23	MR. MURRAY: I don't have copies of it.
24	I don't want to get rid of all of my originals.
25	MS. BAKER: Do you have any other

1	service
2	MR. MURRAY: But all this was before
3	and my brother-in-law explained what he thought
4	the problem was. In correlation between what
5	happened at his house in Springfield and what I am
6	experiencing up here. So it has got to be coming
7	from somewhere north of me. The only thing north
8	is all those apartments and houses up north and we
9	had the odor before they were hooked on. The only
10	thing north of us that was hooked on at the time
11	that we started having that odor was Summit Wood
12	lift station.
13	MS. BAKER: I have no further questions.
14	Thank you for coming.
15	JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Baker, anything?
16	MR. BAKER: No, Your Honor.
17	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, Mr. Murray.
18	I appreciate you coming to testify. Who is next
19	on the list, Mr. Ochoa?
20	MR. OCHOA: Casey Callow.
21	MR. CALLOW: My name is Casey Callow,
22	C-a-s-e-y C-a-l-l-o-w, and I live in the Summit
23	Way subdivision in Platte City.
24	JUDGE DIPPELL: Could you raise your
25	right hand.

1	(The oath was administered.)
2	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Go ahead
3	with your comments.
4	MR. CALLOW: What I am here tonight to
5	talk about is the rate increase involving the
6	grinder pumps. As a homeowner, where I have
7	selected to build and live, I am subjected to
8	having a grinder pump beside my house to transfer
9	our sewage up to a pump station so they can pump
10	it to their facility. I am being asked not only
11	to pay an additional \$7.77 as a rate increase, but
12	\$5 in addition to that to rent a grinder pump.
13	Which equates to \$12.77 or roughly a 45 percent
14	monthly increase. I feel that the proportion that
15	I am asked to, that I am being asked to pay is
16	totally unfair. The grinder pump \$5 fee, from
17	what I have been told, is to maintain the grinder
18	pump. So if I should never have problems with my
19	grinder pump, the maintenance would be in vain.
20	If I do have a problem with my grinder pump and
21	the sewer company comes out and works on the pump
22	and deems it is my responsibility, I will be
23	charged an additional service fee to fix the pump.
24	So I guess, just in summary, I am totally against
25	paying \$5 for a pump that I did not select, for a

Τ.	pump that I am not allowed to maintain, and
2	proportionally the rate increase is targeting
3	homeowners like myself unfairly.
4	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, Mr. Callow.
5	Commissioner Jarrett, do you have any questions?
6	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: No questions.
7	Thank you, Mr. Callow.
8	JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Finnegan, any
9	questions?
10	MR. FINNEGAN: No questions.
11	JUDGE DIPPELL: Ms. Baker?
12	MS. BAKER: No questions. Thank you for
13	coming.
14	JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Baker?
15	MR. BAKER: No questions.
16	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you very much, Mr.
17	Callow, for testifying. We appreciate your time.
18	Who is our next witness?
19	MR. OCHOA: Your Honor, that was the
20	last name on the sign-up sheet. Is there anyone
21	else that wishes to testify? We have one
22	individual.
23	JUDGE DIPPELL: All right. Could you
24	please spell your name for the court reporter,
25	please.

1	MR. WINTER: Dean, D-e-a-n, Winter,
2	W-i-n-t-e-r.
3	(The oath was administered.)
4	MR. WINTER: I just wanted to go on
5	record that I too have been having lots of
6	problems with sewer gas. Mine all comes into the
7	main shower in the main bathroom. That's the only
8	place I have sewer gas. But I have spent quite a
9	bit of money with certified plumbers to come look
10	at the situation. And everything is hooked
11	upright, but yet the smell is there and they
12	cannot figure out why. I don't have it all of the
13	time. Maybe it will go two weeks, three weeks,
14	but when we walk in the house we can smell it.
15	And we can go right to the bathroom and there is
16	water in the trap and the odor in the bathroom
17	would knock you over. So I usually white vinegar
18	and soda, and that takes care of it for a little
19	while. I just wanted that to go on record.
20	That's all I have.
21	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, sir. How
22	long have you lived in your home?
23	MR. WINTER: I have lived there nine
24	years.
25	JUDGE DIPPELL: And have you had this

Ţ	problem the whole time?
2	MR. WINTER: No, I have not. It
3	probably started about two years ago.
4	JUDGE DIPPELL: Which subdivision do you
5	live in?
6	MR. WINTER: I live in Timber Park.
7	JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Jarrett,
8	did you have questions?
9	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Yes, sir. Good
10	evening, Mr. Winter. Did you ever complain to the
11	company about the odors?
12	MR. WINTER: No, sir, I have not.
13	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: That's the only
14	question I had. Thank you, sir.
15	JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Finnegan?
16	MR. FINNEGAN: No questions.
17	JUDGE DIPPELL: Ms. Baker?
18	MS. BAKER: Again the same questions.
19	Have you noticed there being any time of day that
20	it would be stronger or any time of the year?
21	MR. WINTER: No. It seems like it is in
22	the evenings, early evening, you know, in the
23	afternoon. I have never noticed it we take a
24	shower every morning. So I never notice it in the
25	mornings at all But a lot of times when we're

1	gone and we come back in the house, it will hit
2	you at the back door. And it will be in the
3	bathroom is where it is, in the main shower.
4	MS. BAKER: How far does the smell
5	permeate throughout the house? Is it just in the
6	bathroom?
7	MR. WINTER: It is not all throughout
8	the house. Living there you can tell when you
9	walk in that there is a different odor. Of course
10	the closer you get to the main bathroom the
11	stronger the odor.
12	MS. BAKER: Thank you. Thank you for
13	coming.
14	JUDGE DIPPELL: Any questions? Mr.
15	Winter, could you come back for just a minute.
16	Mr. Baker has a question for you.
17	MR. BAKER: Did you ever contact the
18	staff of the Commission about the odor?
19	MR. WINTER: No, I have not. I have
20	written some letters on the increase of the sewer
21	rates, but I have not on the odors.
22	MR. BAKER: Okay. That's all I have.
23	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, sir. You may
24	be excused. Is there anyone else who wishes to
25	testify?

1	MR. OCHOA. 1es, four hollor. Bob
2	Omundson.
3	MR. OMUNDSON: My name is Bob Omundson,
4	O-m-u-n-d-s-o-n.
5	JUDGE DIPPELL: Could you please raise
6	your right hand, sir.
7	(The oath was administered.)
8	MR. OMUNDSON: I just have a couple of
9	comments. One was, as a that I thought I would
10	say something about as a result of the attorney
11	objecting to something that Nancy Wakefield had
12	said about the dumping. That J & J Truck dumping
13	something into our sewer system. I saw the truck.
14	And it was dumped, it was being dumped at the
15	second entrance away from Running Horse. And I
16	don't know how many times they dumped there or
17	whatever, but I did see it dump one time. That is
18	not hearsay information. I saw it personally.
19	The other thing I have a question about is, if I
20	understood what they were saying correctly
21	tonight, when we had about 600 customers, our bill
22	was \$16 a month or so and change and that was
23	okay. We got to about 2600 customers or 1200
24	customers, it got to about \$26 a month. And now
25	as we continue to grow or the sower company

Τ	continues to grow, our bill is supposed to go to
2	\$34 a month. Why does Timber Park have to finance
3	that growth? Wouldn't it be better if we just
4	stayed small and not grow? Every time the sewer
5	company or every time there is a new development
6	and the sewer company grows, and we have to
7	increase our rates, shouldn't the growth finance
8	that rate increase?
9	JUDGE DIPPELL: I can't answer your
10	question, but I will leave that to the experts.
11	MR. OMUNDSON: As far as a statement.
12	JUDGE DIPPELL: I understand. I
13	understand. Did you have any questions for Mr.
14	Omundson, Commissioner Jarrett?
15	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: No questions,
16	Judge. Thank you.
17	JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Finnegan, did you
18	have any questions?
19	MR. FINNEGAN: Just a couple of
20	questions. Where did you say this
21	MR. OMUNDSON: At the second entrance.
22	In other words, coming from Running Horse and
23	136th Street, not the first entrance there but at
24	the second entrance. And that was shortly after
25	Summit Way was just getting underway.

1	MR. FINNEGAN: Do you know now long ago
2	that was?
3	MR. OMUNDSON: Summit Way was two years
4	ago. About two years ago. It is right by it
5	is a common area there. It is like a park type
6	area right there, over behind your place.
7	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Do you want me to
8	testify? I can also eyewitness the fact that
9	JUDGE DIPPELL: Let me interrupt. Mr.
10	Finnegan, I am having trouble hearing you. And if
11	I could suggest to the audience to not speak so we
12	can just get one witness at a time on the
13	reporter's transcript. Mr. Finnegan, could you
14	speak up and ask your question again.
15	MR. FINNEGAN: Yes. Have you seen it
16	since then?
17	MR. OMUNDSON: I only actually saw it
18	one time myself. Others apparently have seen it.
19	And subsequently when Nancy said that somebody
20	MR. FINNEGAN: I am sorry, I am going to
21	have to object to that.
22	MR. OMUNDSON: They are dumping
23	someplace else, but I saw it once.
24	MR. FINNEGAN: One other question. Are
25	you aware that Mr. Sherry, the general manager.

1	president of the company has not taken a salary
2	all these years?
3	MR. OMUNDSON: No.
4	MR. FINNEGAN: That's all. Thank you.
5	JUDGE DIPPELL: Ms. Baker, did you have
6	questions?
7	MR. OMUNDSON: I imagine his equity has
8	grown.
9	MS. BAKER: Which subdivision do you
10	live in?
11	MR. OMUNDSON: Timber Park.
12	JUDGE DIPPELL: Just one moment, sir.
13	MR. OMUNDSON: I thought I was excused.
14	JUDGE DIPPELL: Did you have a question?
15	MS. BAKER: How long have you been a
16	resident there?
17	MR. OMUNDSON: Five years.
18	MS. BAKER: Do you have any other
19	service issues?
20	MR. OMUNDSON: No. Fine.
21	MS. BAKER: Have you had any odor?
22	MR. OMUNDSON: None.
23	MS. BAKER: Thank you. I thank you for
24	coming.
25	JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Baker, did you have

1	anything?
2	MR. BAKER: No questions, Your Honor.
3	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, sir. You may
4	be excused. Thank you for testifying.
5	MR. OCHOA: Your Honor, we have one
6	other witness. Before I call that witness, Mr.
7	Murray who testified earlier has said that he was
8	going to supply you with that information that Ms.
9	Baker had asked. So I told him that he would send
10	that to the Commission. The next witness is Mr.
11	Hansen.
12	MR. HANSEN: Oscar, O-s-c-a-r, Hansen,
13	H-a-n-s-e-n.
14	JUDGE DIPPELL: Please raise your right
15	hand, sir.
16	(The oath was administered.)
17	JUDGE DIPPELL: Go ahead with your
18	comments.
19	MR. HANSEN: I just wanted to go on
20	record in saying that in walking the trail about a
21	year ago, at the head of the trail, as it goes out
22	of Timber Park, there is a sewer dump there. And
23	I have seen the sewer truck there dumping twice
24	and had actually called to find out why that truck
25	was dumping in our neighborhood. So that is not

1	nearsay. That is an actual sight for me twice
2	that I saw the truck dumping.
3	JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. Did you have any
4	other comments?
5	MR. HANSEN: That's all I have. Thanks.
6	JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Jarrett?
7	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: No questions.
8	Thank you, Mr. Hansen.
9	JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Finnegan?
10	MR. FINNEGAN: Just a couple of
11	questions. Where was this dumping taking place?
12	MR. HANSEN: It was taking place down
13	where the old pump house used to be.
14	MR. FINNEGAN: When was the last time
15	you saw it?
16	MR. HANSEN: The last time I saw it was
17	last summer when we were walking on the trail. My
18	wife and I.
19	MR. FINNEGAN: Do you know what company
20	it was that was dumping it?
21	MR. HANSEN: No, I do not.
22	MR. FINNEGAN: You didn't see the truck?
23	MR. HANSEN: I walked right by the
24	truck. The smell was so bad we got away as fast
25	as we could.

1	MR. FINNEGAN: That was last summer?
2	MR. HANSEN: Yes.
3	MR. FINNEGAN: That's all the questions
4	JUDGE DIPPELL: Ms. Baker?
5	MS. BAKER: Which subdivision are you
6	in?
7	MR. HANSEN: Timber Park.
8	MS. BAKER: How long have you been
9	there?
10	MR. HANSEN: Six years.
11	MS. BAKER: Have you had any service
12	issues or any odor issues there in your
13	MR. HANSEN: No, just odors from that
14	truck dumping. We walk the entire neighborhood
15	and we have smelled odors in that neighborhood in
16	different places.
17	MS. BAKER: By that, is there a walking
18	area that
19	MR. HANSEN: When we smelled it, it was
20	in the lower areas. It was later in the evening
21	when the air was a little heavier.
22	MS. BAKER: No further questions. Than
23	you for coming.
24	JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Baker?
25	MR BAKER: Did von call anybody about

1	the dumping that you saw?
2	MR. HANSEN: I had talked to at that
3	point in time I called Derrick. Derrick Sherry.
4	And he said he would let somebody know.
5	MR. BAKER: Thank you very much.
6	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thanks, Mr. Hansen.
7	Thank you for testifying.
8	MR. HANSEN: Thank you.
9	JUDGE DIPPELL: Is there anyone else?
10	MR. OCHOA: Is there anyone else who
11	wishes to testify? We have one other witness,
12	Your Honor.
13	MR. WOLFE: My name is Robert Wolfe,
14	R-o-b-e-r-t W-o-l-f-e.
15	JUDGE DIPPELL: Would you raise your
16	right hand, sir.
17	(The oath was administered.)
18	JUDGE DIPPELL: Go ahead with your
19	comments.
20	MR. WOLFE: I wanted to make a comment.
21	I am not here for any complaints. I live in
22	Summit Way and I have no issues personally in my
23	family. But before I write checks to the sewer
24	company, I want to make sure I said everything I
25	could. This is more so I have no problem with

any of the fees. I understand that it costs to have equipment and things like that goes up. It doesn't affect me. I don't believe that I have a grinder pump. I guess I will find out if this goes through. But the actual sewer bill. Having worked in distribution for the last 12 years, and this is a distribution business to a degree, the more customers that you have typically the cost per -- to distribute that product goes down.

Now, I know this is different than a retail or wholesale business. My feeling is that at 33 -- I guess it has been knocked down a bit. But the percent increase in what is before you now is excessive. And I think that projecting, most of the fees are based upon things that are going to be built. So to say that -- it was brought up in questions and answers earlier that you cannot project what is going to happen, only what is going to be effected. It is a for profit business, that was established earlier in the question and answer. In order for them to become more profitable, they have to increase their fees and their rates.

But I guess my point is, you get into business, in any kind of business, and you figure

1	in your expenses and the growth of expense and you
2	figure in your based on a comment that was made
3	earlier, you figure in a salary for the person
4	that is a general manager and then you spread that
5	about. And you develop that in your business plan
6	at the beginning. I understand an increase, but I
7	do believe that 30 plus percent is excessive. My
8	family is against it. That's it on my comments.
9	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Commissioner
10	Jarrett, did you have a question?
11	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Yes, Mr. Wolfe.
12	You state that you are in distribution. What
13	exactly line of work are you in?
14	MR. WOLFE: I distribute food service
15	products in my day job and I own a business that
16	distributes on-line products.
17	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: You say you live
18	in Summit Way?
19	MR. WOLFE: I do.
20	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: How long have you
21	lived there?
22	MR. WOLFE: We moved in May of '04. Go
23	ahead, I am sorry.
24	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: I'm sorry. I was
25	just going to ask. Any

1	MR. WOLFE: I neard your question. Can
2	you hear me? I have absolutely no complaints.
3	That's why I wanted to make that very clear. I
4	have had no problems. We are behind I believe one
5	of the we live next to one of the pump stations
6	that is right on 136th Street. Occasional odor
7	issues. The alarm goes off from time to time.
8	But I don't expect everything to run perfect.
9	Once again I don't have the problems the people in
10	Timber Park have. Because I can't go to the gas
11	station and complain to them about the cost
12	increases and this is a public forum for that.
13	That's why I am here.
14	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Very well. Thank
15	you, Mr. Wolfe. Appreciate it.
16	JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Finnegan, do you
17	have any questions?
18	MR. FINNEGAN: No questions.
19	JUDGE DIPPELL: Ms. Baker?
20	MS. BAKER: No questions. I do
21	appreciate you coming.
22	JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Baker?
23	MR. BAKER: No questions.
24	MR. WOLFE: Thank you very much.
25	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, Mr. Wolfe.

1	Thank you for testifying. Is there anyone else?
2	MR. OCHOA: Is there anyone else who
3	would like to testify? We have one other one,
4	Your Honor.
5	JUDGE DIPPELL: Please spell your name
6	for the court reporter.
7	MR. STROM: Gary Strom, G-a-r-y
8	S-t-r-o-m.
9	JUDGE DIPPELL: Please raise your right
10	hand.
11	(The oath was administered.)
12	JUDGE DIPPELL: Go ahead with your
13	comments.
14	MR. STROM: My comment would be the rate
15	increase for the product I am getting. My water
16	use has actually went down because we went and got
17	our efficiency washer. It seemed to drop our
18	water level. We have efficiency toilets, dropped
19	our water level. And so actually my water usage
20	has went down, but yet my sewer rate is increasing
21	so many percent. I just don't think it is right.
22	That's all the comment I have.
23	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Commissioner
24	Jarrett, any questions?
25	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Where do you

live, Mr. Strom?

2	MR. STROM: I live at Timber Park.
3	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Do you have any
4	service problems that you experienced over the
5	years?
6	MR. STROM: No.
7	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: How long have you
8	lived there?
9	MR. STROM: Six years.
10	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Thank you, sir.
11	Appreciate it.
12	JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Finnegan?
13	MR. FINNEGAN: Just one question. Who
14	supplies water service?
15	MR. STROM: I think it is Number 4.
16	MR. FINNEGAN: Public Water Supply
17	District Number 4?
18	MR. STROM: Yes. I didn't bring my
19	water bills, but I can show you or I could bring
20	water bills showing my usage is down.
21	MR. FINNEGAN: I just wanted to know who
22	supplied your water. It is not a public utility,
23	it is a water district. Thank you.
24	MR. STROM: Yes.
25	JUDGE DIPPELL: Ms. Baker, do you have

1	any questions?
2	MS. BAKER: I have no questions. Thank
3	you for coming today.
4	JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Baker?
5	MR. BAKER: No questions.
6	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, Mr. Strom.
7	MR. OCHOA: Is there anyone else who
8	wishes to testify at this time? I don't have
9	anybody, Your Honor.
10	JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. I want to again
11	thank everyone for coming out. It is very
12	important that the public participates in these
13	kind of things and we appreciate you taking the
14	time to do so. Commissioner Jarrett, did you have
15	any closing remarks?
16	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: I would just like
17	to echo the Judge's comments. I appreciate you
18	testifying. Your comments are important and the
19	Commission will give them serious consideration as
20	we move forward in this case. So your comments
21	and your participation are greatly appreciated and
22	useful for us. Thank you.
23	JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Finnegan, when I
24	receive the transcripts I have forgotten
25	exactly, I have them expedited, but I have

1	rongotten exactly winten day they are due back.
2	Would two days from the return of the transcript
3	be sufficient for you to submit your objections in
4	writing?
5	MR. FINNEGAN: I believe that would be
6	fine.
7	JUDGE DIPPELL: All right. Let's do
8	that then. Thank you all again for your
9	attendance. I believe that concludes the hearing.
10	We can go off the record.
