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PROCEEDINGS 1 2 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Ocho, I'm actually going to 3 extend that a step further and ask everyone who has a cell 4 phone or Blackberry to please turn it off completely as 5 those devices can interfere with our recording and б transmission. 7 AUDIENCE MEMBER: I can't hear you. I'm hard of 8 hearing. 9 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Yeah. Can you speak up? 10 JUDGE STEARLEY: Is that any better? 11 AUDIENCE MEMBER: No. 12 TECHNICIAN: Let me turn up the volume in the 13 back. JUDGE STEARLEY: Our tech is going to adjust the 14 volume up here, and hopefully you'll be able to hear me. 15 16 I don't know if he's -- can you hear me better now? I 17 don't know if Dan's got that adjusted yet or not. 18 AUDIENCE MEMBER: No. It's not any better. JUDGE STEARLEY: I can try another microphone, 19 20 too. 21 AUDIENCE MEMBER: That's better. 22 JUDGE STEARLEY: Is it still better on this one 23 than it was? 24 AUDIENCE MEMBER: If you'd talk a little louder, it would help. 25

JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. All right. Well, good evening. It's Monday, February 22nd, 2010. The Missouri Public Service Commission has set this time for a local public hearing in four case files in which Aqua, Missouri, Incorporated seeks to implement a general rate increase for its water and sewer service in multiple rate districts in Missouri.

8 The file numbers for those matters are 9 SR-2010-0023, WR-2010-0025, SR-2010-0026 and WR-2010-0027. 10 My name is Harold Stearley, and I'm the Regulatory Law 11 Judge presiding over tonight's hearing. Our court 12 reporter tonight is Monnie Mealy. And with me this 13 evening is Commissioner Jarrett.

14 And, Commissioner, before I continue with
15 explaining procedure for tonight, would you like to make
16 any opening remarks?

17 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Thank you, Judge. I just 18 wanted to say good evening to everyone. Thanks for coming 19 out tonight. These local public hearings are very 20 important. And on behalf of all five Commissioners, I am 21 glad and I welcome you here tonight.

Please don't take the fact that there aren't any other Commissioners here tonight as meaning that this isn't important to all of us. We normally try to split up the hearings so that at least one Commissioner can be at

1 every hearing.

And, obviously, we've had hearings in this case pretty much all across the state. So since I'm one of Commissioners that lives right here in Jefferson City, I'm -- I'm here tonight.

6 But all of the Commissioners will read the 7 transcripts of all of the testimony that's taken here 8 tonight, so your comments and your statements will be --9 will be considered.

10 My role as a Commissioner, and all the 11 Commissioners, we sit as the decision-makers in this case. 12 So we are like the Judges in a trial in court. So when I 13 make my decision or the Commission makes its decision, we 14 will consider the sworn testimony, and we will also 15 consider the evidence admitted in the evidentiary hearing 16 that will be held in a couple of weeks.

And so your sworn testimony tonight for those of you who are testifying will be considered. So that's why I'm here. I'm here to listen to your testimony and, you know, welcome everybody that wants to speak to speak.

Again, it is very important. We want to hear what you have to say. And I'll turn it back over to the Judge. Thank you.

24 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, Commissioner. And 25 in -- consistent with that, I'd like to point out that

because not all of the evidence has been admitted yet in
 this matter, Commissioner Jarrett is unable to take
 questions from you or discuss the case.

The question and answer session you just had with Staff and the company was for that purpose. This portion of this hearing is for the purpose of hearing from you, your testimony and your comments.

8 The procedure we're going to follow is I have a 9 witness list where people have signed up. I'm going to 10 call each name on the witness list and ask that person to 11 step forward to our podium.

I will ask you to state and spell your name for our court reporter. I may have a couple of introductory questions for you. And then you may proceed and give your comments.

16 When you're through with your comments, please 17 do not sit down. The attorneys who are present for the 18 parties tonight, Commissioner Jarrett or myself may have a 19 couple questions for you regarding the information you've 20 presented. So please wait until all the questions are 21 complete before leaving the podium.

Does anyone have any questions about the manner in which we're going to proceed tonight? Well, seeing none, I will begin by taking entries of appearance from counsel for the parties starting with Aqua, Missouri, 1 Incorporated, or any of its affiliates.

2 MR. SCHWARZ: If it pleases the Commission, Tim 3 Schwarz with Blitz, Bardgett & Deutsch. I represent Aqua, 4 Missouri, and I have completed my entry form with the 5 reporter.

JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, Mr. Schwarz. Staffof Missouri Public Service Commission?

8 MR. DEARMONT: Thank you, Judge. Eric Dearmont 9 on behalf of the Staff of the Missouri Public Service 10 Commission, P.O. Box 360, Jefferson City, Missouri, 65102. 11 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Thank you, Mr. Dearmont. And Office of the Public Counsel? 12 13 MS. BAKER: Thank you, your Honor. Christina Baker, P.O. Box 2230, Jefferson City, Missouri 65102, 14 appearing on behalf of the Office of the Public Counsel 15 16 and the ratepayers.

JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. Thank you, Ms. Baker. And I would point out to the crowd that Ms. Baker is the State-appointed consumer advocate, and she is representing the public in the evidentiary hearing portion of these cases.

All right. Very well. We'll begin by calling the first witness. The first name I have is Ken Lueckenotte. And I'm not sure if I've pronounced your last name correctly, but you can --

1 Mr. LUECKENOTTE: It's close. 2 JUDGE STEARLEY: -- correct me on that. 3 MR. LUECKENOTTE: Thank you, Judge. My name is 4 Ken Lueckenotte, spelled K-e-n L-u-e-c-k-e-n-o-t-t-e. 5 THE COURT: All right. Mr. Lueckenotte, if 6 you'd please raise your right hand. 7 KEN LUECKENOTTE, 8 being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole 9 truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows: TESTIMONY OF KEN LUECKENOTTE 10 11 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. And I'm assuming 12 you are a customer of Aqua, Missouri? MR. LUECKENOTTE: Yes, sir. I live at 2909 Fox 13 Dale Drive in Quail Valley. And I represent several of my 14 neighbors out there. And I would also like to turn over 15 16 some letters that -- that they have submitted in addition 17 to the -- the testimony that I'm about to give. 18 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. MR. LUECKENOTTE: In the early years of Quail 19 20 Valley Lake subdivision, development, money from the sale 21 of each lot was escrowed to help pay for the cost of the 22 treatment system and installation, with the bulk of the cost being paid by the developer of the subdivision. I 23 24 understand he paid something like a quarter of a million 25 dollars for the development of that system.

1 In 1994, the system went online with 2 approximately 45 households hooked into the system. At 3 that time, the system was granted at no cost to cap the 4 utilities to operate and maintain.

5 According to Aqua Missouri's web site, Capitol 6 Utilities was sold to Aqua Source, Inc., in October 1998, 7 but payments were made to Capitol Utilities until May of 8 2000. Aqua America, Inc., acquired the system from Aqua 9 Source in 2003. And Quail Valley residents began making 10 being payments to Aqua Missouri in March of 2004.

Hopefully, in these sales and transfers of ownership the acquiring company did not purchase the system that the property owners had already paid for when they bought their lots and are not now paying again in monthly rates.

We trust that the PSC's analysis of the expenses of Aqua Missouri and establishment of the rate structure would recognize a double payment of the system. The initial rate of \$22.53 a month remained from November of 1994 until November of 2006 when it was adjusted to 27.75 a month.

The rate was again increased in November 2008 to 44.79 a month, and the PSC staff and the company have agreed on another increase to 53.22. In just over three years, this would be a 136 percent increase while the

1 consumer price index shows approximately a 7 percent

2 increase.

3 If the sewer rates had increased since inception 4 at the CPI increase of 45 percent, the current rate based 5 off the original rate of 22.53 would be \$32.67. And since 6 the CPI has actually declined since the last rate increase 7 in November of 2008, how can any increase, not to mention 8 the agreed upon 19 percent increase, be granted?

9 And why was the 61 percent increase granted in 10 November of 2008 warranted when the CPI increase was just 11 over 7 percent? The 61 percent increase followed a 23 12 percent increase just two years earlier.

13 It's also interesting to note the varying rates 14 paid by Aqua Missouri customers. For example, in the 15 September 29th, 2006, PSC news release, the current rate 16 paid by Jefferson City was \$22.53, and the agreed upon 17 rate between PSC Staff and Aqua Missouri was 27.75.

By comparison, Maplewood's rates were 12.93 and \$20.80 respectively. The January 14th, 2010, release has Jefferson City's rate increasing from 44.79 to 53.22 while Maplewood's rate increases from 15.67 to 18.05. Both of those were -- are less than the agreed upon rate noted in September of 2006.

We recognize also that Ozark Meadows' rate iseven higher than Jefferson City. This begs the question,

1 are these systems that much different that the variances 2 in rates are justified? How many subscribers are in the 3 Maplewood system versus Jefferson City, and what effect do 4 the tax rates in each of these communities have on the 5 rate structure of each area?

6 There was evidently a document filed with the 7 Public Service in 1992 with an effective date of May 27th, 8 1992, that provides a schedule of service charges stating, 9 and I quote, "A charge of \$65 per load will be assessed 10 each customer that the company is required to remove 11 solids from the customer's septic tank."

I was not aware that this was Aqua America's responsibility until recently and that three years ago a quail valley resident tried to get Aqua America to pump their septic and were refused.

16 In the 17 years I have lived in my home, the 17 company has never offered nor have they ever pumped my 18 septic. I have had it pumped, but it cost more than \$65 19 that the company agreed to -- to charge back in 1992.

Is it true that the company, along with the rate increase, is requesting that they be relieved of the responsibility of removing solids from the customers' tanks? If so, customers will be paying more than the \$65, so this also is, in effect, a rate increase.

25 When the treatment plant was built at 5-feet

1 height, a woven wire fence was constructed around the 2 plant. Aqua America has since torn down that fence and 3 constructed another fence around the plant. This appears 4 to have been a waste of money as there was nothing wrong 5 with the original fence. This too raises the question, б What are the company's actual cost of doing business at 7 Quail Valley and what are the operating costs per 8 household?

9 Aqua America, Inc. reports strong sales and
10 profits 2007 to 2008 with a 3 percent profit increase.
11 In their annual report, they discuss how they controlled
12 operations and maintenance expenses despite the high fuel
13 cost in 2008.

Aqua America has gradually increased dividends from 2006 through 2009 from 44 cents per share to 55 cents per share, and they declared a first quarter dividend for 2010 of 14 and a half cents per share, which is an annualized rate of 58 per share.

19 In these difficult economic times, when the CPI 20 is unchanged and people on Social Security do not receive 21 an increase in benefits from 2009 to 2010, yet Aqua's 22 sales, profits and dividends are on the rise, how can the 23 increase in sewer rates be justified?

On behalf of my neighbors, Judge, Commissioner,thank you for giving me this opportunity to comment.

JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Let me inquire of 1 2 the attorneys present? Ms. Baker, do you have any 3 questions for the witness? 4 MS. BAKER: Have you had any service issues? 5 MR. LUECKENOTTE: No, I have not. б MS. BAKER: Have you had a chance to contact the 7 customer service for Aqua? 8 MR. LUECKENOTTE: No, I have not. 9 MS. BAKER: Have you had any billing issues? 10 MR. LUECKENOTTE: No, I have not. MS. BAKER: That's all the questions I have. 11 12 Thank you. 13 MR. LUECKENOTTE: Thank you. JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Mr. Dearmont? 14 MR. DEARMONT: I have no questions. Thank you. 15 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. Mr. Schwarz? 16 17 MR. SCHWARZ: No questions. JUDGE STEARLEY: Commissioner Jarrett? 18 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Yeah. Good evening, 19 20 Mr. Lueckenotte. Thanks for your testimony. I just had a 21 question. How long have you lived at Quail Valley Lake? 22 MR. LUECKENOTTE: Seventeen years. 23 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Okay. And so were you 24 there when Capitol Utilities was there? 25 MR. LUECKENOTTE: I was there for just over a

1 year before they installed the -- installed the lines and 2 the system. And -- and as far as I know, each homeowner 3 at the time paid about \$100 for the 20-foot length that 4 they had to run the pipe to the -- to the pipe running 5 through your property. б COMMISSIONER JARRETT: All right. 7 MR. LUECKENOTTE: And they didn't -- they did 8 not repair the yard that they had torn up, either. 9 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Okay. So you -- did you have some issues with Capitol Utilities? 10 11 MR. LUECKENOTTE: Yes. COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Okay. And then how about 12 13 Aqua Source? You were there when they were there. Did 14 you ever have any issues with Aqua Source? 15 MR. LUECKENOTTE: I've had no issues with Aqua 16 Source. 17 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: And you've indicated had 18 you none with Aqua Missouri? MR. LUECKENOTTE: Correct. 19 20 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: And water quality's good? 21 MR. LUECKENOTTE: Well, we're on district water. 22 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Okay. 23 MR. LUECKENOTTE: And we were talking about 24 water usage earlier. And I did inquire last fall of our 25 water district. And the average homeowner use in the

first -- I think it was January through March of 2009 was 1 5,300 gallons per household. 2 3 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: All right. Okay. And I 4 apologize. This is -- this is sewer, right? Because 5 you're on -- you guys are on district water. I'm sorry? б MR. LUECKENOTTE: Yeah. It's great water. 7 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: No other -- no other 8 problems with Aqua as far as service? 9 MR. LUECKENOTTE: No, sir. 10 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Okay. Thank you. 11 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Lueckenotte, you said you had some documents you wanted to present to the 12 Commission? 13 MR. LUECKENOTTE: Yes. 14 15 JUDGE STEARLEY: Have counsel had an opportunity to look at those? If not, I'd like you to show them to 16 17 the attorneys representing the parties in the case. 18 MR. LUECKENOTTE: Okay. JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. Thank you very much for 19 20 your testimony. 21 MR. LUECKENOTTE: Thank you. 22 MS. BAKER: They're fine. 23 JUDGE STEARLEY: Any objection to --24 MR. SCHWARZ: No. We'll stipulate that they can 25 be admitted into the record.

JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Very well. We will 1 2 mark these -- well, I will mark them collectively as 3 Exhibit 1, Mr. Lueckenotte. 4 (Exhibit No. 1 was offered and admitted into 5 evidence.) б JUDGE STEARLEY: And moving on down our list, we 7 have Mr. Edward Cannon. Mr. Cannon, if you'd please state 8 and spell your name for our reporter? 9 MR. CANNON: My name is Edward Cannon, E-d-w-a-r-d C-a-n-n-o-n. 10 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. If you'd please 11 raise your right hand. 12 13 EDWARD CANNON, being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole 14 truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows: 15 16 TESTIMONY OF EDWARD CANNON 17 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. And I'm assuming you, too, also are a customer of Aqua? 18 MR. CANNON: Yes, I am. Just a sewer only. 19 20 JUDGE STEARLEY: Sewer only. And what rate 21 district are you in now? 22 MR. CANNON: The Jefferson City. 23 JUDGE STEARLEY: Jefferson City? 24 MR. CANNON: Cole County, Callaway County. 25 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. You may proceed

1 with your comments.

2 MR. CANNON: I just -- I'm not as prepared as 3 the last guy, but I was just wanting to state that 4 although the -- obviously, things do go up and -- an rate 5 increases are inevitable that over the past three years, б they've been wanting to hit the 50, \$60 mark. And I was just voicing my -- that I was disapproving of that. I'm 7 8 -- I'm done. 9 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Very well. Any 10 questions from Counsel? 11 MS. BAKER: Have you had any billing issues? MR. CANNON: No, ma'am. 12 13 MS. BAKER: Have you had any service issues? MR. CANNON: The only thing that I know of as 14 far as service is they had a DNR issue. They put rock 15 around the lagoon. And it took them some time to do that, 16 17 like six months to meet those qualifications. 18 And then they put -- they put rock down but didn't spread it for -- for several -- several months. 19 20 And, actually, one of the home owners actually went out 21 and spread it for them. But that was the only service --22 as far as -- as far as service of the sewer, we haven't had any. 23 24 MS. BAKER: Okay. Have you had an opportunity 25 to talk with their customer service?

MR. CANNON: Briefly today. But they were very 1 2 helpful. 3 MS. BAKER: Okay. That's the comments -- the 4 questions I have. Thank you. 5 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Mr. Dearmont? б MR. DEARMONT: I have no questions. Thanks. 7 Mr. Schwarz? 8 MR. SCHWARZ: No questions. 9 JUDGE STEARLEY: Commissioner Jarrett? 10 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: I don't have any questions either, Mr. Cannon. But I thank you for your 11 12 testimony tonight. 13 MR. CANNON: Thank you. Have a good night. JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Thank you. Our 14 15 next person is Mr. Ken Oidtman. If you'd please state and 16 spell your name for our court reporter first, and we'll --17 MR. OIDTMAN: Ken Oidtman, O-i-d-t-m-a-n . JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. 18 KEN OIDTMAN, 19 20 being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole 21 truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows: TESTIMONY OF KEN OIDTMAN 22 23 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you. 24 MR. OIDTMAN: First off, I'd like to say that 25 you gentlemen missed a real opportunity during the

1 question and answer period. You probably should have been 2 here. But that's -- that's your business. I understand. 3 We received a letter in 2008 with regard to a 4 rate increase. Now, we're talking about the Aqua Missouri 5 on Wardsville Road, the Dahlmeyer plat, Dahlmeyer area. б We were informed -- when we bought our lot, I 7 was informed by Mr. Dahlmeyer that he was going to build a 8 wastewater treatment plant to serve the 43 or 40-plus 9 houses that was in the subdivision. 10 And he told us at that time what he thought our cost may be, which there's not a whole lot you can do 11 about it. I mean, it's got to go somewhere. We finally 12 13 started paying 27.75 in 2008. And then we received a notification in September 14 15 of 2008 of a rate increase that was going to be put forth 16 by Aqua Missouri. And what was approved by the Commission 17 was a 61.4 percent increase, which they've raised our bill 18 to 44.79 per month. 19 In 11 months, we received another letter dated 20 August the 11th, 2009, where Aqua Missouri was going to again ask for a rate increase. At that time, I was a 21 22 little bit, well, perturbed. 23 And as such, I sought counsel with Christina 24 Baker, your counsel for the -- the Senior Public Counsel

up here. And I informed her of what I had came up with on

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2008 and 2009 and stated that for all intents and purposes 1 2 that they had just received a 61.1 -- 61.4 percent 3 increase. And if these figures are right, and we can 4 thank Ms. Baker. If they're wrong, it's my fault. 5 There was another rate increase that was asked б for in the amount of 29.2 percent, so that put the rate in 7 11 months over 91 percent. 8 Now, we heard during the question and answer 9 period with regard to increased cost, operations and 10 things of that nature -- like the first gentleman, Mr. Edward -- or Edward, when he was up here -- I'm sorry 11 I don't have the figures and facts the way that Ken 12 13 Lueckenotte has. Sounds good, though, I'll tell you for 14 sure. But the question I have is, you know, what --15 16 what's been done since the last rate hike? I mean, where 17 would anybody go to find out what type of money has been 18 expended on what wastewater facilities? And we're talking 19 just wastewater. 20 Is there a Freedom of Information Act that we 21 can go to that we can see where the money was spent? 22 They're talking about millions of dollars or a million dollars or whatever it was. 23 24 What out of the 61 percent increase that we paid

24 what out of the of percent increase that we paid 25 went to the stockholders and what went to the repair of

the plants? Somebody made the comment during the question and answer period that operation costs are going to go up depending on what you want to do. I mean, if you've got a halfway decent truck and you want a new truck, there's your operational costs. So, obviously, we're paying for that as well, which I guess to some degree it's -- it's logical.

8 But other lady in here asked, you know, when 9 does it stop? And the gentleman right here said, you 10 know, well, you know, they can put a moratorium on it. 11 And, boy, for a whole 36 months, there might be another 12 rate increase. I don't think that satisfies a whole bunch 13 of us, judge.

You know, we've got people out there at the subdivision that have a two-member household, empty nesters, so to speak. And when you figure the amount of money we pay and what it costs for one flush, that's pretty exorbitant. So I guess you just get extra or something like that.

But I would just really appreciate you and the Commissioners and your Staff giving this a hard, good look and maybe doing what the gentleman on your staff said, put a moratorium on this thing for a while, even if it's -you know, 36 months is better than nothing. But 72 sounds a hell of a lot better.

1 And I guess that's all I have to say. And no to 2 all three of your questions. So you know, I -- I don't 3 know. I don't know what they've done at our plant. I 4 don't know what they have done at any plant. The only 5 thing can I go by is what I receive from the Public 6 Service Commission. 7 I, as a matter of fact, tried to get a hold of 8 Rick Helms, who was the previous operator of our plant. 9 And I have been unable to do so. And I'm darn sorry about that because I would have asked him to come to this 10 meeting as well. 11 So that's kind of it. I guess we're just kind 12 13 of falling on our knees and saying, Give us a break. 14 Thank you, Judge, Commissioner. 15 JUDGE STEARLEY: With regard to your specific 16 questions, when this hearing is over because myself and 17 Commissioner Jarrett cannot address those, I would 18 encourage you to take advantage of the opportunity of us 19 having Staff members and company representatives, and you 20 can ask them directly those questions and see if they 21 can't get some answers for you. 22 MR. OIDTMAN: Oh, we -- we did, sir, ask your staff. We -- we did. 23 24 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. 25 Mr. OIDTMAN: And some of the questions were

repetitive. And if you didn't get an answer, I would -- I 1 2 would really suggest that they do exactly that as -- as 3 you suggest. And that's all I have, sir. 4 JUDGE STEARLEY: And sometimes this is a good 5 opportunity because we have company representatives here б that you can ask specifically. And if you'll hold on just 7 a moment, let me inquire of counsel. Do you have any 8 questions for this witness? 9 MS. BAKER: No. He got all three of mine, I 10 think, so I'm good. Thank you. 11 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Mr. Dearmont? 12 MR. DEARMONT: No questions. Thank you. 13 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Schwarz? MR. SCHWARZ: No, Judge. 14 JUDGE STEARLEY: Commissioner Jarrett? 15 16 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Sir, I appreciate your 17 time and coming out tonight, and I appreciate your 18 questions. MR. OIDTMAN: You look awful familiar. I know 19 20 you. 21 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Well, I do live here, 22 so --23 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Larry Platt. 24 MR. FLATT: Good evening. Larry, L-a-r-r-y, 25 Flatt, F-l-a-t-t.

JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. If you'll please 1 2 raise your right hand. 3 LARRY FLATT, 4 being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole 5 truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows: б TESTIMONY OF LARRY FLATT 7 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. You may proceed. 8 MR. FLATT: Okay. My first kind of issue that 9 I'd like to bring up is in regards to the -- I'm fairly new to the area, fairly new to the concept. I moved into 10 our home in on Maybert Place in 2003. 11 12 And in 2007, December, I got a notice telling me that my rates were going to significantly increase for my 13 sewer. So I did like I had always learned to do. I wrote 14 a letter to the Public Service Commission, listed out a 15 16 number of questions that I had, listed out some of my 17 concerns about the costs and the amount that it was 18 increasing and how that compared to what my water costs 19 were and how much water I used. 20 I didn't hear from anyone about that. I also 21 wrote a letter to Lewis Mills, who I think at that time in 22 January of 2008 was the person who was supposed to be my 23 omsbudsman, the Office of Public Counsel. Never heard 24 from him either. 25 Then I got a form letter from Mr. Russo who

basically didn't read my letter apparently because his question -- his whole thrust of his letter was that, Be assured that no rate increase will take place until the Commission had acted. Well, I knew that. And my questions were sophisticated enough that he should have been able to figure out that I knew that.

7 I noticed -- took notice of when the public 8 hearing was and everything, had plans to come up and whine 9 to you about all this, but was called out of town on 10 business and didn't get to make it. Was glad to see that 11 they didn't get the entire increase that they were talking 12 about.

13 But then here in August, I got another letter. So this time, I did the same thing. I wrote to the Office 14 of Public Counsel. I wrote to the Public Service 15 16 Commission again with the same -- some of the same 17 questions, different light, little more experience now 18 with what's happened with my water usage and everything. 19 I got almost the same form letter back from 20 Mr. Russo. And I've been mad ever since. But I kind of got over it. I -- I just sent all of you all a letter. I 21 22 think I sent everybody on the letterhead a letter. And I noticed that that at least generated a -- a letter from 23 24 finally a letter from Jim Bush.

25 And I got a phone call or I called and got a

hold of Christine Baker to talk about how to get the answers to my questions. Now, nobody ever gave me any of those answers. Basically, they gave me the web site where I had to go on and search through all the legalese and everything that is on -- in that stuff.

б I'm -- I'm accustomed to asking questions of 7 government officials and agencies about policies and 8 procedure and them being able to answer those questions 9 and let me know instead of having to do all that research myself. But nevertheless, I've done the research now. 10 And that's why I'm here tonight. I'm glad I 11 didn't get called out of town this time. What you need to 12 13 know is that in December 2007, the -- the rates were \$27.75. That worked out for my water usage. I use 3800 14 15 gallons a month on average. I did in the last -- the last 16 year. I didn't water very much because it rained a little 17 bit. But that's -- for 12 months, that's the average. I was paying for my existing sewer about twice 18 what I was paying for water. I don't know whether that 19

20 means anything or not. Just kind of seemed to me kind of 21 -- water might be more valuable than sewage, but I guess 22 sewage is a little harder to take care of. So I can -- I 23 can buy that.

The proposed rate increase that I got -- the notice I got was a -- they said 128 percent. To me, it

1 was going to be more than double. Now, that's -- that 2 sounds worse than 128 percent, although that's a pretty 3 good percent increase.

And it was going to take my water costs to -pardon -- as compared to my water use, it was going to be about almost five times what my water was. Then they actually approved only a 61 percent increase. You actually approved only a 61 percent increase that was about three and a third times my water rate.

10 Then in August of 2009, I got a letter telling 11 me that we were going to raise it only 29.2 percent to 12 \$57.87, which was four times what I paid for my water. 13 And now it's being proposed in the agreement at an 18.8 14 percent increase or 53.22.

And in -- and in my case, I just think this --15 16 this rate is expanding too fast. And there had to be a 17 reason. I wasn't sure what it was because I really didn't 18 get answers to all my questions. I did get answers to some of them tonight. I did find out that -- that there 19 20 shouldn't be any capital costs or new construction costs. 21 I call that capital cost. New construction costs in my 22 bill. And they assured me that was the case and that when 23 -- when they take over an existing facility, it's supposed 24 to be bought up to a minimum standard by the person that's 25 giving it to them or they won't take it or they'll charge

1 him and fix it, I suppose.

Anyway, so that shouldn't be any of my cost. So my costs really are just maintenance and operation. And I understand there has to be some capitalization in there to replace worn out pumps, equipment and things like that. And I understand that.

7 But I'm -- I'm seeing these kind of percentage 8 rates, which is basically, you know, doubled in, what, 18 9 -- three years, doubled in three years. I can't imagine 10 that continuing on.

11 I was encouraged, though, by the audit because the audit kind of made -- brought out something in the 12 13 agreement in page 2, Section 8, the A through E section. 14 Apparently, there is some question on the part of your auditors that -- that the costs for these different things 15 16 that are not being separated out and accounted for as well 17 as maybe they could be and -- and therein, that kind of is 18 the red flag that I had three years ago that this might 19 very well be a possibility.

20 So, hopefully, they've got some strong words in 21 there. I hope they're the right ones and that we make 22 sure that the right costs are going into the calculation 23 of -- of what my sewer fees are going to be in the future. 24 I appreciate your time. I'll let somebody else get up 25 here and take the space.

JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Hold on just a 1 2 moment, Mr. Platt. Does counsel have any questions for 3 Mr. Platt? 4 MS. BAKER: You know my three. 5 MR. FLATT: My answer is no to all of them. 6 MS. BAKER: That's all the questions I have. 7 Thank you. 8 MR. DEARMONT: I have no additional questions. 9 Thank you. 10 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Schwarz? 11 MR. SCHWARZ: No questions, Judge. 12 JUDGE STEARLEY: Commissioner Jarrett? 13 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Mr. Platt, I have no questions. I thank you for your testimony. It was very 14 detailed, and it will be very helpful. Thank you. 15 MR. FLATT: Yes, sir. 16 17 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you very much. MR. FLATT: Thank you. 18 JUDGE STEARLEY: Keith Kempker. Please state 19 20 and spell your name for our court reporter. 21 MR. KEMPKER: My name is Keith Kempker. Last name is K-e-m-p-k-e-r. I'd like first --22 23 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Kempker, before you start, 24 let me swear you in. 25 MR. KEMPKER: Yes. I'm sorry.

1 KEITH KEMPKER, 2 being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole 3 truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows: 4 TESTIMONY OF KEITH KEMPKER 5 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. You may proceed. б MR. KEMPKER: I'd like to first start out just 7 by stating that I'm frustrated. Again, we're here because 8 there's another rate increase. 9 I'd also like to state that the first bullet in the PSC's mission statement states, and I quote, "Ensure 10 that Missourians receive safe and reliable utility 11 services at just, reasonable and affordable rates." The 12 13 Office of Public Counsel, their web site states on their web site, "Fighting for fair utility rates." 14 15 As I'll get into, I don't think these are fair. 16 And I think a lot of people here tonight agree. I had an 17 opportunity to speak with several employees with the PSC, 18 the Office of Public Counsel. I spoke with Jim Bush here today as well as last week, Jerry Shively a little bit. 19 20 Aqua Missouri took over in February of 2004. We 21 received on May 14th, 2005, their first rate increase that 22 year or shortly thereafter. They received a 23.17 percent increase. The rates went from \$22.53 to \$27.75. 23 24 Yet again on December 7th, 2007, they asked for 25 another increase. That one was a big one. While I don't

have what they asked for, they did receive a 61.4 percent
 increase. Rates went from \$27.75 to \$44.79. Is that
 fair? No.

This time, they're asking for a 29.2. Now, I've got a couple different numbers. What we received tonight, which I really don't quite understand as well, is that I guess the agreed on rate is \$53.22. I don't understand the agreed amount because the PSC has not heard everyone testify yet, so I don't understand why there is an agreed rate.

Whenever we got the letter, it said that they were going to raise our rates from \$44.79 to \$57.87. Again, that's not fair. When is it going to stop? The bleeding has to stop sometime.

15 Again, as I stated, I'm upset. I'm angry, as 16 well as a lot of people here tonight. At this rate, 17 assume four more rate increase at 15 percent that the PSC 18 will approve. We'll be paying over \$90 a month in sewer. 19 Just some other comments at the hearing tonight 20 on the -- during the question and answer, I'm not really 21 for sure why Aqua Missouri does not have a reserve for 22 improvements, while they will pay for them and then ask 23 for reimbursement.

24 Do you know what happens whenever we have to do 25 improvements to our home? We save. Is Aqua Missouri saving? Honestly, I don't know. But it sounds like
 they're not because they're asking for reimbursement. I
 don't understand why they have to ask for reimbursement.
 They should have money in the bank to pay for these
 improvements.

Please put yourselves in our shoes. Would you
want your sewer bill going up this much? I myself have a
wife and two children to take care of. This rate increase
is ridiculous.

As stated in the -- in the question and answer, last year, I specifically remember that Aqua Missouri had billing problems. A lot of people weren't getting bills. I hope that's taken care of, and I hope that you all look back and make sure that those problems have been taken care of.

16 Why is Aqua Missouri seeing a decrease in 17 revenue? They've been given rate increase ever since 18 2005. In my opinion, they should have money.

I live right by the subdivision treatment plant.
I live in Holt Summit, Hidden Valley subdivision. I
actually spoke with Ms. Hale here a few weeks ago because
there was a situation. At approximately 9:45 that
morning, I was home with a sick daughter. I happened to
notice that the white Aqua Missouri truck came down our
drive to go to the treatment plant. I never did see him

1 leave.

2 So approximately, oh, 20 minutes later, I just 3 -- you know, just out of curiosity, you know, just seen 4 what they might be doing down in our area or even if he 5 was still there. He was still there. He was backed into 6 the treatment plant.

7 And to give you a little background of where our 8 treatment plant sits and where my house sits, it sits off 9 the road. You can't see our house from the road very 10 well, and you cannot see the treatment facility from the 11 road. The only -- the only way I can see it is if I 12 actually walk towards the treatment facility because it 13 sits down below a hill kind of behind of a bank.

The Aqua Missouri employee was sitting in his truck. And you want to know what time he left? 12:30. Did he get out of the truck? No. You want to know why I know he didn't get out of the truck? Because there's snow on the ground.

19 This makes me mad, very mad because they are 20 wasting my money, my time, everyone's time, everyone's 21 money. I was so mad, I didn't know what to do. I didn't 22 know if I should just wait for this hearing talk about it 23 here or not.

24 So I called Ms. Hale and talked to her. I 25 wanted to know who was in charge of their field people.

She said that she was the high -- the highest that they could go because she was the Regional Manager. And I told her what was going on. And she asked me, So you're saying if I drive down there right now, I won't see any tracks, any footprints?

6 I said no. And she asked me, Well, how come? I 7 I'm like, Well, because there's snow on the ground. I 8 have pictures, dates and times on the pictures, which I 9 have copies for everyone here. I want you all to look at 10 them, see if you all agree.

11 The only footprints you will see are in pictures 12 that were taken at approximately 3:57. These footprints 13 that you see was of someone that actually came down --14 whether or not it was Ms. Hale or not, I don't know.

But I was seated at my kitchen table working with my children on their homework. And I happened to see a brown, rust-colored vehicle leave. That's when I walked down there to see if they -- if anyone had got out. Someone did. But it wasn't the employee that was down there for almost three hours.

That was not the first time I caught someone down there doing absolutely nothing. Approximately June -- on -- in June 2007, my wife and I, we were trying to sell our house at the time, and I was waiting to hear back from a call from Mr. -- from Aaron.

| 1 | And I saw an Aqua Missouri truck go down. And |

| 2 | since I was waiting on a phone call, I didn't know if it |
| 3 | was him that had went down or not. So I walked down |
| 4 | there. It wasn't him. But it was another Aqua Missouri |
| 5 | employee napping. 8:30 in the morning. Around 8:30 in |
| б | the morning because excuse me. Because I since it |
| 7 | was so long ago, I really don't remember what time. But |
| 8 | it was early in the morning. It was before 9 a.m. |
| 9 | How many other times have they been down there |
| 10 | goofing off, wasting time, my money, everyone else's |
| 11 | money? I don't know. Because I don't sit around looking |
| 12 | to see when they come and when they go. Sometimes I just |
| 13 | notice when they come or go. |
| 14 | Again, put yourselves in our shoes. Do you want |
| 15 | our rates to increase? Again, the bleeding needs to stop, |
| 16 | and the time is now. Thank you. |
| 17 | JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Kempker, just one remark, |
| 18 | and I'll turn this over for questioning. With regard to |
| 19 | what you've seen as a quote, unquote, agreed-to rate, the |
| 20 | Commission staff and the company have filed what is called |
| 21 | a disposition agreement. |
| 22 | MR. KEMPKER: Correct. And that was kind of |
| 23 | explained earlier. |
| 24 | JUDGE STEARLEY: Which is like a recommendation. |
| 25 | MR. KEMPKER: Uh-huh. |

JUDGE STEARLEY: Office of Public Counsel has 1 2 not signed that agreement. The Commission has not made 3 any decision yet in this case. So I just wanted to assure 4 you that the Commission has not -- and the Commissioners 5 have not agreed to any rate increase at this point in б time. They're wanting to hear all the evidence. 7 MR. KEMPKER: All right. 8 JUDGE STEARLEY: Questions from Counsel? 9 MS. BAKER: I think you've probably hit on mine. Billing issues? 10 11 MR. KEMPKER: No. MS. BAKER: Customer service? 12 13 MR. KEMPKER: They couldn't -- you know, with 14 the customer service and service, the only thing is, you know, them wasting time, money. You know, I've testified 15 16 years past. This is not the first time I've been here. 17 I have seen Aqua Missouri do, quote, unquote, 18 maintenance to our plant. But the maintenance was done to 19 the side of our treatment facility that's not even 20 functioning. It's not even being used, but yet they came 21 out and put in a new liner, new rock in it. It's not even 22 being used, still not being used. It's just frustrating, very frustrating. 23 24 MS. BAKER: I think that's all the questions I

25 have. Thank you.
JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Dearmont? 1 2 MR. DEARMONT: I have just one. The first 3 incident, the one with the lack of footprints --4 MR. KEMPKER: Yes. 5 MR. DEARMONT: -- in the snow, can you tell us 6 approximately when that was? 7 MR. KEMPKER: The date? 8 MR. DEARMONT: Just approximately. 9 MR. KEMPKER: It was on February 8th, 2010. 10 MR. DEARMONT: This year? 11 MR. KEMPKER: This year. Yes. 12 MR. DEARMONT: Thank you. 13 MR. KEMPKER: And, again, I -- I do have pictures for the Commission and the counsel. And even if 14 Ms. Hale would like a copy, I'll give her a copy. 15 16 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Mr. Schwarz, any 17 questions? 18 MR. SCHWARZ: No. JUDGE STEARLEY: Commissioner Jarrett? 19 20 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Mr. Kempker, I don't have 21 any questions, but I do appreciate your testimony and 22 coming out tonight. 23 MR. KEMPKER: Thank you. 24 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. And, Mr. Kempker, 25 the pictures you have, do you have copies you can leave

with the Commission? 1 2 MR. KEMPKER: I do. I have four copies. Like I 3 said, I can give those to whoever wants them. 4 JUDGE STEARLEY: If you'll please first show 5 them to counsel. б MR. KEMPKER: I can give -- one copy can be for 7 the counsel, one copy for the Office of Public Counsel. 8 MS. BAKER: Okay. 9 JUDGE STEARLEY: If there are no objections, I'm going to mark these as Exhibit 2 for Mr. Kempker, and it 10 11 will be received into the record. 12 (Exhibit No. 2 was offered and admitted into evidence.) 13 14 MR. KEMPKER: Thank you. JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, Mr. Kempker. 15 16 Richard Allen. MR. ALLEN: It's Richard A-l-l-e-n. 17 18 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Allen. 19 RICHARD ALLEN, 20 being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole 21 truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows: TESTIMONY OF RICHARD ALLEN 22 23 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. You may proceed. 24 MR. ALLEN: And I am a customer on the Sleepy Hollow sewage system. And I have haven't noticed any 25

1 improvement in our system either, but I don't live way 2 down by the treatment plant, so -- I have heard a lot of 3 frustration and anger here tonight.

And I have prepared a letter, which I -- is to the Public Service Commission. It's very brief. I'm just going to read that and make a couple comments.

7 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right.

8 MR. ALLEN: So Aqua was granted a significant 9 rate increase, 61.4 percent, a little over a year ago. It 10 is way too soon for another rate increase, especially in 11 this economy.

It seems that since they didn't get all they 12 13 wanted the last time, they have the gall to try and get 14 the rest now. They claim that their revenue has declined. 15 How is this possible with everyone paying more? My salary 16 has not gone up in the last two years. In fact, with 17 increased deductions, my take-home pay is actually less. When I bought my house in 1997, it was not 18 19 hooked up to their sewer system. And I realize it was

Capitol Utilities back then. But anyway, instead, it had
-- the house had a septic tank and failing drain field,
typical Jeff City situation.

I could have installed a new drain field. But I decided that hooking up to a sewer system was better for the environment. I knew that hooking up would result in a 1 new monthly charge that I wouldn't have to pay if I
2 installed the drain field, but I was willing to live with
3 it since it was reasonable at the time. That was the \$22
4 and some odd cents a month.

5 However, the proposed -- the proposed rate of 6 53.22 is not reasonable. And that hooking up to that 7 sewer system was a considerable expense. I had to run a 8 line down to where their existing line was in their 9 subdivision, had to put in a new septic tank because the 10 old one wasn't up to standards.

11 The system our neighborhood is on has small 12 diameter sewer pipes, which means that every house still 13 has to have and maintain a septic tank. The only benefit 14 we receive is that we don't need drain fields since the 15 partially treated sewage offloads to a central treatment 16 plant.

I do not believe that it costs anywhere near \$53.22 per household per month to run the treatment plant and maintain the sewers. Please do not grant this increase.

And I'd like to make an additional comment. I live by myself now in my house. My kids are gone. My wife's gone. Just me. My water bill averages between five and \$6 a month. So with this proposed \$53-some-odd cents a month, that's ten times what I would be paying in sewage as what I pay for water. Somehow, that just
 doesn't seem right.

3 And I guess in the -- you know, in hindsight, 4 back in 2003 when the PSC -- and I don't mean the Public 5 Service Commission. I mean the Philadelphia Suburban 6 Corporation, which became Aqua America. When they offered 7 the -- their rate -- offered the people -- I guess it was 8 probably not limited to the people on their sewage plants, 9 but they said, Become a shareholder. All it takes is so 10 much. Maybe I should have taken advantage of that because with this increase, they should be making lots of money. 11 12 I would have been better off if I'd have invested in the 13 company, I guess. Thank you. 14 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you. Questions? 15 MS. BAKER: Have you had any billing issues? 16 MR. ALLEN: Yes, I have. But that was resolved. 17 And I brought that up the last time we had a hearing. And 18 -- and no billing issues since this. 19 MS. BAKER: Since then. Okay. 20 MR. ALLEN: They've done a good job since then. 21 MS. BAKER: How about customer service issues? 22 MR. ALLEN: No. I talked with customer service people once, and that was in relation to that billing 23 24 issue. It wasn't resolved. I sent a letter to the Public 25 Service Commission. It was resolved instantly.

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MS. BAKER: All right. Quality of service

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             MR. ALLEN: Okay. Thank you.
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             JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you very much. Richard
25 Fisher? Would you please state and spell your name for
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1 our court reporter? 2 MR. FISHER: Richard Fisher, R-i-c-h-a-r-d 3 F-i-s-h-e-r. 4 RICHARD FISHER, 5 being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole б truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows: 7 TESTIMONY OF RICHARD FISHER 8 JUDGE STEARLEY: You may proceed. MR. FISHER: First off, I want to thank the 9 Commission for letting us come up here and air our dirty 10 11 laundry. Mr. Lueckenotte and Mr. Kempker pretty well hit 12 13 it on the head for all of us. We're frustrated, and we 14 think this rate increase is outrageous. The last gentleman had a comment about he should have joined up 15 16 with the PSC, Philadelphia, last year. 17 Aqua America's net income, 97 million dollars. They're not struggling. I live in the Vandelicht Lake 18 19 subdivision. And I'm not going to go over some of the 20 points that some of the other folks have made. But with 21 the proposed rate increase before the recommendations, we 22 crunched some numbers, and currently, we have 56 occupied homes in the subdivision. 23 24 At the \$53 and some odd -- or \$57 that they

wanted, that would come to about \$39,000 a year. We don't

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-- we have septic tanks, so the treatment process is 1 2 pretty minimal. Not too labor intensive. The developer 3 wants to expand for a total of 93 lots out there. 4 If that ever does come to fruition for him, that 5 will be \$64,600 a year that Aqua America -- or Aqua Missouri will make off that. That's a lot of money. б 7 We haven't seen any improvements in our septic 8 system -- or our system out in the subdivision. The 9 developer put a new cell in last summer. And he told me that he had to pay the bill to have that system installed. 10 So if he's footing the bill, Aqua Missouri's making a lot 11 12 of money off of him and us. And that's all I have. Thank 13 you. JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Questions from 14 15 counsel? 16 MS. BAKER: Have you -- you know the three. 17 MR. FISHER: I have no -- I have no problems with the service, if you want to call it service. They 18 19 don't do anything. 20 We did have one lady in the subdivision that 21 told me this evening that she's had -- still having 22 billing issues as they can't get it straight. It's 23 supposed to be 44.79 a month, but they still can't get it 24 straight. Other than that --MS. BAKER: All right. And I would recommend 25

1 that you pass the name along to -- to Staff and all of 2 that. And then we can see if we can get that taken care 3 of. I appreciate your comments tonight. 4 MR. FISHER: Thank you. 5 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Dearmont? б MR. DEARMONT: I have no questions. 7 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Schwarz? 8 MR. SCHWARZ: No questions, Judge. 9 JUDGE STEARLEY: Commissioner Jarrett? COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Mr. Fisher, thanks for 10 your testimony. I appreciate it. Thanks for coming out 11 12 tonight. 13 MR. FISHER: Thank you. JUDGE STEARLEY: Next, I have Paul Bernskoetter. 14 Did I get your name right? 15 16 MR. BERNSKOETTER: Yes. My name is Paul, 17 P-a-u-l, Bernskoetter, B-e-r-n-s-k-o-e-t-t-e-r. JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. 18 Mr. BERNSKOETTER: I reside --19 20 JUDGE STEARLEY: Please raise your right hand. 21 PAUL BERNSKOETTER, 22 being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole 23 truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows: TESTIMONY OF PAUL BERNSKOETTER 24 25 JUDGE STEARLEY: You may proceed.

MR. BERNSKOETTER: I reside at 5216 Tanner
 Bridge Road, Jefferson City, Missouri. I'm part of the
 Grand Holland Estates.

The first notice I got from Aqua Missouri was they wanted a 338,600 -- \$338,600,000 rate increase, \$600. And now I understand that the last one I got, the Commission has kind of agreed to settle on 50 -- 50-some dollars. I think it's \$53 or whatever it is a month, roughly.

And I didn't know they could agree to anything until actually the -- there was a hearing. But anyway, I guess the thing is the letter I received earlier from Aqua Missouri stated that they need to spend in excess of \$200,000 for improvements.

What I see as in the past increase that was in the last increase that they need repairs on companies that they have purchased in the past. Grand Holland Estates has a pressurized sewer treatment that turns all the sewage into liquids.

20 When I built my home, we had to purchase the 21 concrete tanks with pumps in the tank along with an alarm 22 system with a price of approximately \$3,500. My sewer 23 liquid empties into a 2-inch line. That's all. Just a 24 2-inch. It's liquid.

My eight years that I have not seen any repairs

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1 made in the Grand Holland Estates sewer lines. I -- I do 2 face Tanner Bridge Road, but I do drive back in Grand 3 Holland Estates occasionally, and I have never seen 4 anything dug up or repairing any kind of lines of any 5 kind.

6 I strongly feel that we should not pay for 7 problems in the older systems that they have purchased. 8 My water bill in November through March is an average of 9 \$13.30 to \$13.70 per month. I strongly feel we should 10 have a decrease in rates rather than an increase in rates 11 according to what -- what water usage I use.

12 It's just me and my wife. My wife and I did not 13 receive any increase in Social Security. Our health 14 insurance increased the first of the year. And, of 15 course, the sales tax have increased several times within 16 the last year. And if this keeps up, we will just have to 17 sell our home.

And it's not fair. I just think this is an unfair rate increase, and I really strongly believe that. And I also feel like your sewer charge should be on the amount of water you use like other -- the other companies do. I think if that would happen, then everybody would be a little more happier with what's going on. That's about all the comments that I have.

25 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. Ms. Baker, any

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              MS. BAKER: Have you had any billing issues?

             COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Yes. Mr. Bernskoetter, I
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just had a couple of questions. You say had you contacted 1 2 the Staff of the Public Service Commission? 3 MR. BERNSKOETTER: Uh-huh. 4 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: When was that? 5 MR. BERNSKOETTER; I -- I called about, oh, a week and a half to two weeks ago, and I called the Public б 7 Counsel this morning. 8 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Okay. Now, just talking 9 about Staff, did they address your concerns or answer your 10 questions? 11 MR. BERNSKOETTER: They -- they would -- they said he should -- they would record what I had to say, and 12 that's all they said. They were very kind. I didn't have 13 14 any problem with that. 15 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Okay. They were 16 courteous and professional to you? 17 MR. BERNSKOETTER: Yes. COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Okay. Appreciate that. 18 Thank you. Appreciate it. 19 20 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you very much for your 21 testimony. 22 MR. BERNSKOETTER; thank you. 23 JUDGE STEARLEY: Robert Kraus? Will you please 24 state and spell your name for our court reporter? 25 MR. KRAUS: My name is Robert Kraus, R-o-b-e-r-t

1 K-r-a-u-s. 2 JUDGE STEARLEY: Please raise your right hand. 3 ROBERT KRAUS, 4 being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole 5 truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows: б TESTIMONY OF ROBERT KRAUS 7 JUDGE STEARLEY: You may proceed. 8 MR. KRAUS: Thank you. My name is Robert Kraus. 9 I live at 417 Highland Way in Grand Highland Estates. And 10 I'm here in opposition to the proposed rate increase as are many of my neighbors. Some have written letters as 11 12 well to the Commission with regard to this matter. 13 I guess I could just say that, for the most 14 part, my comments have been reflected over -- I'd just reflect the comments that we've heard earlier by the other 15 16 people who spoke prior to me. 17 I've been out in that subdivision since 2000. 18 And, of course, we're faced with the rate increases as 19 everyone else has spoke about already this evening up from 20 27 to 44 now proposed to 53, which, much like everyone 21 else has said as well, it doesn't seem -- as we look at 22 economy and as we look at the cost of living and so forth actually getting a little bit less with the consumer price 23 24 index that we be faced with another increase after this 25 short amount of time.

1 And it just seems ridiculous again to the fact 2 that, again, my wife and I are the only two people -- much 3 like Paul Bernskoetter and other folks that live out 4 there, we only have a \$14 a month water bill for this, and 5 we're looking at a \$53 a month -- bill increase with our б sewer. It just seems a little out of hand. 7 Actually, I -- I just wanted to have the 8 Commission seriously look at this and to see if there are 9 real issues as far as their costs is concerned. I know that everyone in this audience has had, you know, some 10 increase in cost in the economy the way it is, too, and 11 it's been tough on a lot of people. With that said, I 12 13 have no other comments. Thank you. 14 JUDGE STEARLEY: Questions, Ms. Baker? MS. BAKER: Any billing issues? 15 16 MR. KRAUS: I haven't. 17 MS. BAKER: Service issues? 18 MR. KRAUS: Not myself. We have issues -- my 19 daughter lives there and son-in-law down the street on 20 Edenberg Way, and they've had to call a couple of times 21 with odor nearby. 22 MS. BAKER: All right. How about --MR. KRAUS: And I witnessed that myself. Yes. 23 24 MS. BAKER: Okay. Have you contacted the 25 customer service line for Aqua?

1 MR. KRAUS: They did. 2 MS. BAKER: Okay. Do you know if they had a 3 good experience or --4 MR. KRAUS: Apparently, they didn't have to call 5 back. But I think it only occurred twice last summer --MS. BAKER: Okay. 6 7 MR. KRAUS: -- when they were outdoors. 8 MS. BAKER: All right. Thank you very much. 9 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Dearmont, any questions? 10 MR. DEARMONT: I have no questions. Thank you. 11 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Schwarz? MR. SCHWARZ: No questions, Judge. 12 13 JUDGE STEARLEY: Commissioner Jarrett? COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Mr. Kraus, I have no 14 questions. But thank you for coming out tonight. 15 16 Appreciate your testimony. 17 MR. KRAUS: Thank you. JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you. Tom Boyer? 18 Thank you. We've all seen the drill here. Please --19 20 MR. BOYER: Hi. My name is Tom Boyer. I live 21 at 2818 Foxdale Drive. Mr. Lueckenotte, who spoke first, 22 is a neighbor of mine down the way. I agree with a 23 hundred percent --24 JUDGE STEARLEY: Before you continue, let me 25 please swear you in.

1 MR. BOYER: Oh, okay. 2 TOM BOYER, 3 being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole 4 truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows: 5 TESTIMONY OF TOM BOYER б JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Please continue. 7 MR. BOYER: Mr. Lueckenotte lives down the street from me. I -- we had a subdivision meeting in the 8 9 summer about these rate increases. And I agree 100 percent of what -- what he said is pretty accurate. 10 11 I have a -- I wrote a letter to the Public 12 Service Commission on September 9th about this and called 13 after that and amended it, added some other things. I 14 have a couple of things that -- prepared here. But listening to Mr. Lueckenotte speak, I moved 15 16 into -- into that subdivision right early in the year in 17 2001. And I've been living in the city for most of my 18 life. My parents had a septic tank, had a cabin in Michigan when I was a kid. First thing I did was went out 19 20 and had someone pump the septic tank or the -- the holding 21 tank and, of course, wanted to make sure I got my money's 22 worth and looked in the tank. I got my head down in there 23 and looked.

24 When the guy went to take -- before he took --25 when he took the top off, he -- it was a cement tank. He took and he goes, Man, this is an old -- you know, a
20-year-old house. He goes, It's never been opened.
So he takes off the little bit of lead and it's
stuffed with wool. And we open it up, and he washes it
out. He goes, Man, Mr. Boyer, that didn't even need to be
cleaned. So the 20 years before I moved in, 2001, nobody
had cleaned it.

8 And then a short time later than that, although 9 this company was not in there, August 13th that month I 10 get a letter from the -- from Roger Wheeler who is the 11 operator, lead operator at the time, and it went to 12 everyone in the subdivision. And they said, Tank needs to 13 be pumped. I just had it pumped a few months earlier. 14 They didn't care. They were going to pump it.

Well, I was mumbling about it. But they took Association money. Mr. Story got someone to pump everybody's tank in the neighborhood. I didn't pay directly for it, but, you know, Association fees go up just a little bit every once in while, so, indirectly, I did pay for that.

His statements on the tanks being pumped is no one's ever offered to -- and when we were having the meeting, there was talk that it was time to pump the tanks again. Well, I have no problem pumping septic tanks if they need it. And I have no problem no matter who pays 1 for it, myself or the Association paying for it 2 indirectly, if there's something in the law that says --3 or in the agreements that they should be paying a portion 4 of it.

5 I've lived out there since 2001. And it looked 6 like they -- from about 2006, somewhere these owners took 7 place, we've had almost a hundred percent increase in our 8 -- in our fees. And, of course, what I wrote to the 9 Service Commission mentioned 20 -- 29 percent increase, 10 but it's only a 19 percent increase.

I I don't have any service problems. The toilets I flush. They don't back up into the house. I do see a truck once in a while drive down and check the pumping stations.

I have no experience -- nothing I see wrong around my house. My wife and I have been walking several miles for the last six years. We walk around the lake and -- all but these last two months a couple times every day.

On the other side of the lake, there's a couple places where I believe there are some smells. But they're a long ways from my house, and I didn't figure it was my place to say anything about it.

I do believe that I have worked in -- I brought something up here beforehand, and I was told there were studies. And in my letter, one of the items said that there's the same -- I noticed a charge -- all I have is
 sewer. But I noticed that the charge is different for a
 household, for an apartment and this and that.

I spent my entire career working for State
Government. Half of it was a Database Administrator. I
was involved in the 2000 census, preparing for it and
stuff.

8 I don't -- and I was quoted by the Staff, and 9 I'm sure there's a study that says that big houses use 10 more sewage than apartments and this and that. And I did 11 some research this summer. I couldn't find it, the pages 12 I -- because I've retired, I don't have the bookmarks I 13 kept at work.

But I -- I would ask someone to look again to see if the demographics and stuff -- I walked that -everybody out there knows me. Half of them think our names are Walker, not Boyer, because we walk all the time. But I don't think there's more than two people -- and the average out there is two people.

I knows there a lot of houses with just one person in them. And I feel that this idea that -- and we hear on the news that school districts are going to be losing students and stuff. I don't remember any dealings with census information that households in this country are about two or three people. And I don't believe that those are correctly adjusted. And I know there are studies. I would ask that someone look again for another study, a study done by a public entity other than -- another organization -- an official study because I don't believe those tiers reflect what's going on today from my gut. I have a pretty good gut feeling for data when I look at it.

8 I think these -- these increases are just -- go 9 up, up, up a hundred percent. One of my calculations --10 Mr. Lueckenotte, I think, mentioned something about 136 percent. I've worked with a lot of contractors, a lot of 11 businesses and stuff in State Government, and I can make 12 13 -- any contract, I can use up -- I can -- if I was a 14 project manager and I was coming in under budget, I could 15 make any project go over budget and go into change orders 16 and be more expensive. That's a fact.

What I'm wondering here about the man sleeping, everyone has personnel problems in their individuals that do things that are wrong. But I would -- every family right now knows someone, a brother, a brother-in-law or somebody who has been laid off and has reduced work.

And we've all had people complaining you didn't fill the positions behind me and I'm doing twice as much work. I just wonder since they're in this regulatory thing that we spend the money, we've incurred the

expenses, now you have to pay us back for it. It's kind
 of like the government cost plus program.

If they're really doing -- if they're really trying to do what everyone else has been doing for the last few years, and that's cutting back, working harder thinking about doing a better job. Because I think these ncreases -- I don't know. Maybe -- maybe we shouldn't live in this state anymore.

9 I mean, and I really think maybe realtors when 10 you buy a house, it should be disclosed -- the realtors 11 should disclose to the people in the disclosure that you 12 can expect in five years a 130 percent, 136 percent sewer 13 increase because, if not, that's not proper disclosure.

And nobody that I know has got a raise this year other than a few exceptional people. Retirees haven't. They -- employees haven't. About the only people I know got one were federal employees. And so I think these -these costs are way out of line with what's going on in this economy.

20 We hear of people all over taking pay cuts, 21 decreases, doing more for less. And I would just hope 22 that these people aren't doing that, not taking advantage 23 of this situation and will spend it -- we'll have in 24 making 19 -- I believe -- the first calculation was 29.2. 25 It's 19 percent interest. I read an article the other day on one of the top performing banks in the country. Through the recession, the most they made, it was in the Jeff City paper, was 10 percent. And they were the most -- one of the top eight banks in the whole country.

6 Making 19 percent in this economy is wrong. 7 It's just flat out wrong because most people are lucky 8 they have a job. They're hoping the company breaks even 9 until they can get out of the recession. This is wrong. 10 It's just not worth going on. 19 percent. 19 percent 11 increase.

I don't -- I -- this is -- this is just scary. 12 And especially these people who are on fixed incomes and 13 14 stuff. There's -- there's something wrong with these kind 15 of increases. Somebody needs to look at cost containment, 16 shuffling their employees and thinking outside the box, 17 all this stuff I heard for 30 years in state government. 18 Somebody -- this kind of regulatory thing is ripe for someone to -- well, we'll spend the money, we'll 19 20 go on trips. We'll get -- we'll buy supplies from Uncle 21 George and -- I don't know. There's all kinds of things 22 that can go on in this world. But I think there's something wrong here with these kind of increases in such 23 24 a short time.

Nobody else in this country is doing that. Not

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even health care. All the debate for the last three 1 2 months, not even that -- not even the health care costs in 3 this country -- the whole country is in a roundabout isn't 4 going -- raising as high as these sewer prices are going 5 up. That's an interesting thing to think about. That's 6 it. 7 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. 8 MR. BOYER: That's my feeling. 9 JUDGE STEARLEY: Questions for Mr. Boyer? MS. BAKER: I have none. Thank you. 10 MR. BOYER: Okay. 11 JUDGE STEARLEY: On. Hang on. Mr. Boyer, don't 12 13 run away yet. MR. BOYER: Oh, okay. Yes. 14 JUDGE STEARLEY: Let me just doublecheck with 15 16 Mr. Dearmont and Mr. Schwarz. Any questions? 17 MR. DEARMONT: I have none, Judge. 18 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. Commissioner Jarrett? COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Yes. Mr. Boyer, I just 19 20 had a couple of questions for you. In your testimony, you 21 indicated you had written a letter to the Public Service 22 Commission? 23 MR. BOYER: On the 9th? 24 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: September? MR. BOYER: September 9th. I have it here. 25

COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Is that a comment letter,
 or did you have some specific questions you wanted Staff
 to answer?

4 MR. BOYER: I had the reference number to the 5 case and To Whom It May Concern. I sent one to the Public 6 Counsel and to the PSC. I think there were two addresses 7 there.

8 And it says -- it starts out, My wife and I are 9 concerned about this, and I listed seven reasons. And shortly after I wrote the letter, I thought of two other 10 things about the demographics and that. And I called the 11 12 Public Service Commission and talked to a woman, and she 13 was very polite. Of course, she's on the bottom end of 14 the totem pole, not on the top. So -- but she was very polite to me and had very good manner over the phone. So 15 16 I don't know --

17 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: All right. And so then 18 you -- did you send those comments in in writing again 19 or --

20 MR. BOYER: Yes. The additional comments, I put 21 over the phone. She said I would not need to put them in. 22 They would append them to the letter.

23 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Thank you. I just wanted
24 to make sure of that. Thanks.

25 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Blaine Preston.

1 MR. PRESTON: Blaine Preston, B-l-a-i-n-e 2 P-r-e-s-t-o-n. 3 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Mr. Preston, if 4 you'd raise your right hand. 5 BLAINE PRESTON, б being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole 7 truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows: 8 TESTIMONY OF BLAINE PRESTON 9 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. You may proceed. MR. PRESTON: Okay. I appreciate you for having 10 me here this evening, Judge and Commissioners. And I've 11 12 actually learned a lot about water and sewer tonight, to 13 be honest with you, more than I care to ever know. But a 14 lot of interesting things here that I've -- that I've learned tonight. 15 16 And -- and I actually had a neighbor prepare a 17 document outlining the rate increases that we were going 18 to be seeing or the rate increases that we have seen and 19 the rate increases that were going to be proposed. And it 20 was a real eye opener for me. 21 And what I've learned tonight is that not only 22 is -- you know, me and my subdivision, which has sewer, you know, the people that utilize Aqua Missouri for water 23 24 were all impacted. 25 And you take a step back and you look at, you

1 know, the economy. And I'd ask you, Judge, or I'd ask you, Commissioner, and if I told you in two years now your -- your bread, your milk, your stuff you buy every day are going to be a hundred percent plus in two years from now, what are you going to tell me? You're going to say, That's crazy, and I'm not going to buy it. And I'm kind of stuck here as a customer of Aqua

8 Missouri in that I really have nowhere else to go. Sewer 9 goes downhill. My sewer goes one place. To see this rate 10 increase be put in front of me is -- is -- for me, as a 11 customer, is astronomical. It's unacceptable.

I don't know how a company can come to us one year and ask for a rate increase just to follow it up by another rate increase.

Now, we've heard a lot of statistics. I know specifically from my subdivision in Grand Holland Estates, we're looking at -- I think it's right around a hundred percent rate increase since I've been in there.

Now, I moved into the subdivision in -- let's see here. August 2008. And I want to say the rate increase changed September of 2008. So I was really lucky to get one month in there at \$24 before it increased to what we're paying now of \$24.

And now I get another thing in the mail saying, Hey, guess what? It's going to go up. So a hundred 1 percent. Wow. How can we get to this point with this
2 company?

You've got to start looking at the basic building blocks of this company. Who is spending this money? Who is making the decision to go out and buy new trucks? You know, just like in state government or local government, you have to trim the fat when times are tough.

8 And I can speak for everybody sitting in this 9 room, the economy is not good. So how can we see 10 something from a company that says, Hey, we need more 11 money, when they're posting profits? Okay?

We get that. We're -- we're a paying customer. How can you keep coming back -- or going back to the well -- and for those of you that are -- get water from Aqua Missouri, you know, the well's going to go dry, you know. It's unacceptable. And I don't even get water from Aqua Missouri. Mine's strictly sewer.

So it is a great concern of mine. I'd ask you, Judge and Commissioners, you guys hear out these comments that you've heard tonight. Think about if this was your bill that was coming to you, how -- you know, are you going to accept this? And -- and it's simple to me to -to -- to do the math.

24The math is there. It's easy. You cannot25expect customers to want to pay a hundred percent rate

increase every two years. It's just unacceptable. 1 2 So I don't want to stand up here and keep 3 repeating myself. But I appreciate you taking our 4 comments this evening. And I ask that you listen to the 5 people that are speaking tonight and look at it from their 6 side of the fence and take that into consideration when you guys are making your decision. Thank you. 7 8 JUDGE STEARLEY: Any questions for Mr. Preston? 9 Ms. Baker? 10 MS. BAKER: You said you'd been in since 2008; 11 is that correct? 12 MR. PRESTON: That is correct. 13 MS. BAKER: Have you had any billing issues? MR. PRESTON: I'm not trying to be smart here, 14 but can you define billing issues? 15 16 MS. BAKER: Have you gotten bills? 17 MR. PRESTON: I have gotten bills every month. 18 MS. BAKER: Have you gotten bills whenever you 19 were supposed to get them? MR. PRESTON: Yes. The company has never had 20 21 any problem with sending me bills. 22 MS. BAKER: Have you had multiple bills in one 23 month? 24 MR. PRESTON: No, ma'am. MS. BAKER: All right. And that's the kind of 25

1 -- of question that I meant. 2 MR. PRESTON: Okay. 3 MS. BAKER: Any service issues? Have you 4 contacted the customer service line? 5 MR. PRESTON: No. No service issues. б MS. BAKER: All right. Thank you. 7 MR. PRESTON: Thank you. 8 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Dearmont? 9 MR. DEARMONT: I have no questions. Thank you. JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Schwarz? 10 MR. SCHWARZ: No questions, Judge. 11 JUDGE STEARLEY: Commissioner Jarrett? 12 13 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Mr. Preston, thank you for coming out tonight and giving your testimony. I don't 14 have any questions. But I can assure you that certainly I 15 16 will consider all of the comments very seriously. So 17 thank you. 18 MR. PRESTON: Thank you. JUDGE STEARLEY: I need a little help with this 19 20 next name. I don't know. It's scribbles. Charles -- is 21 it Truben? Trubler? 22 MR. LUBERT: That's probably me. But I till you 23 what, my names is Charles Lubert. But I just -- I talked 24 before, and I -- there's been people here said what I wanted to say. But I just wonder why the company changed 25

hands so many times. And it seemed like every time it 1 2 changed hands, we get an increase. That's all. 3 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right, sir. Thank you very 4 much. The last name I have on my list is Ann Colter. 5 MS. COLTER: My name is Ann Colter, A-n-n б C-o-l-t-e-r. 7 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. Ms. Colter, if you'd 8 please raise your right hand. 9 ANN COLTER, being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole 10 truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows: 11 TESTIMONY OF ANN COLTER 12 13 JUDGE STEARLEY: You may proceed. 14 MS. COLTER: Mostly what I wanted to say was --15 has already been said this evening. The rate increases, 16 we went from 27.75 to 44.79. That was a \$17.04 increase. 17 And now just a little over a year later, they want another 18 increase of \$8.43. That's a total of 25.47. That's about 19 what -- what the bill was to start with a little over a 20 year ago. 21 My husband and I are retired. We draw Social 22 Security. Our water bill runs between 14 and \$15 a month. So there again, it's about three to four times the amount 23 24 of what our water bill is. We've been in our house for 39 25 years in Crossroads subdivision out on 54 South.

1 We did not always have a sewer system. We had a 2 septic tank. We've been pleased with the services with 3 Aqua. However, there is very little maintenance done. I 4 think if they mow one time during the summer, that's about 5 all that it ever gets. And there has been some trees down б since the ice storm two years ago. 7 I just think that we need to look at these 8 charges and say there has to be a limit. We can't just keep going up and going up. \$53.22 is just too much for 9 10 sewer. That's all I have. 11 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. Questions for Ms. 12 Colter? Ms. Baker? 13 MS. BAKER: Have you had any billing issues? MS. COLTER: Not since this last increase. We 14 did prior to that. 15 16 MS. BAKER: How about customer service issues? 17 MS. COLTER: No. MS. BAKER: How about quality of service? 18 MS. COLTER: It's fine. 19 20 MS. BAKER: All right. Thank you very much. 21 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Dearmont? 22 MR. DEARMONT: I have no questions. Thank you. 23 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Schwarz? 24 MR. SCHWARZ: No questions, Judge. 25 JUDGE STEARLEY: Commissioner Jarrett?

COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Mrs. Colter, thanks for
 coming out tonight. I don't have any questions, but I
 appreciate your testimony.

4 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. That is the last name I 5 have on my witness list. But I want to give anyone else 6 here an opportunity who would like to speak. First hand here, come forward, sir. And if you'd please state --7 8 MR. HOWARD: I'm James Howard. James Howard, 9 J-a-m-e-s H-o-w-a-r-d. I live at --10 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Howard, if you'd please raise your right hand. 11 12 JAMES HOWARD,

being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows: TESTIMONY OF JAMES HOWARD

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17 MR. HOWARD: I live at 2838 Foxdale Drive in 18 Quail Valley. And I don't want to be redundant from what 19 Mr. Lueckenotte said. But I did have -- and this may be a 20 question more than -- than a statement concerning or 21 septic system in our subdivision.

JUDGE STEARLEY: Please proceed.

It is also a gray water treatment facility where we still have our septic tanks in place, as many of the others in the room do as well. And about four years ago, the Department of Natural Resources told us that we needed, all of us, to have our septic tanks pumped and
 they should be pumped approximately every three to four
 years.

And as has already been mentioned, I personally contacted Aqua Source to pump our tanks. Aqua Source said they didn't have to pump our tanks and they wouldn't pump our tanks. And so our Association contracted out the pumping of our tanks, and all of the tanks in the Association were pumped at cost to us through our Association dues.

11 Then I discovered through the Public Service --12 and I'm -- my question -- this is more of a question than 13 actually a statement. And I have -- have a notice from 14 the Public Service Commission -- or it's actually a filing 15 of Aqua Source.

And it states that the company will inspect the system for excess solids, retention at no additional expense to the customer. The removal of the retained solids may be arranged for and provided by the company at a cost to the customer as provided in the schedule of service.

I think that's probably under filing of their tariff filing. And that's a question, not a statement. And that charge, if -- if what I have as far as public service document is correct, if it's still in effect is \$65. I also have been told that the Aqua Source is trying
 to get that taken out of the tariff.

3 If that is true, if this statement that I have 4 here is correct and if it is true, then that is also 5 another hidden rate increase that we, the consumer, will 6 actually eat up.

So I decided in October -- because it had been
approximately three years since we had our septic tank
pumped, three to four years, I decided to find out about
this pumping.

So I called on October the 8th and asked to have our septic tank pumped, and they said, Well -- this was Aqua Missouri, Aqua Source. I called them and spoke with a Tina. And they said, Well, I'll have to refer that to the manager. And they said, Well, yes, that tariff is still active, and it will be sometime, though, before we will pump your tank. You'll have to go on a waiting list.

And so I said, Well, that's fine. I'll go on the waiting list, and please let me know because I want to be here when you pump it because I want to witness the pumping to make sure that the solids are taken out and not just the liquids.

23 So a few weeks passed. And they contacted me, 24 and they said, We're ready to come out and pump your tank. 25 I said, Fine, I'll meet you there. And I did. And two gentlemen came out. I don't know their names, but they
 came out in a tandem axle truck with about a 3,000 gallon
 tank on it, and they pumped my tank.

And I said, Oh, by the way, I said, I think Rita Story, who kind of more or less takes care of our subdivision, is planning on you all pumping all of the tanks. And so Rita did contact them. And I -- this is secondhand information.

9 They weren't -- she was told yes, they would pump the tanks. While they were there, I said, Well, if 10 you're going to pump all the tanks -- and the two 11 gentlemen that were there -- and I'm sorry I didn't write 12 13 down their names. I said, You might as well -- if you're 14 going to pump all the tanks in the neighborhood, you might as well pump the neighbor's tank also since you have 15 16 enough hose that you can reach from where you're parked 17 and you've got a 3,000-gallon or 4,000-gallon tank. And 18 my septic tank only holds a thousand. You could also pump 19 the neighbors at the same time.

And they did. They went over, and they pumped my neighbor's that lives to the south of me. And I assumed that they were going to proceed in pumping the rest of the tanks. Well, they hadn't.

I talked last week with Rita to see if any other
pumps -- any other tanks in the neighborhood of
1 approximately 70 homes had been pumped other than mine and 2 my neighbor's. And they said no. Rita said no. 3 So I guess really my question, is this -- is 4 this a double barrel rate increase? Are we really 5 removing this filing, if it is a current filing, on the б tariff plus a rate increase? Or what is really -- what is really correct here? And I'm not sure I'm correct. Thank 7 8 you. 9 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Thank you. Ms. Baker, any questions for Mr. Howard? 10 11 MS. BAKER: Have you had any billing issues? MR. HOWARD: I have had no billing issues. And 12 I've had no service issues. The only thing that I can say 13 14 that I have seen transpire in our subdivision -- and I'm -- like the gentleman that was up here earlier, I walk a 15 16 lot as well. 17 And we've got an ideal neighborhood to walk in. 18 Our subdivision is a great subdivision. But we have lift 19 stations. And the lift station on the north end of the 20 lake, I have seen overflow. And when that occurs, the --21 the water that is in the lifting pump goes right into our 22 lake. 23 MS. BAKER: And when was the last time that you 24 saw that? 25 MR. HOWARD: Back in the spring. So it would be

1 nine or ten months ago. 2 MS. BAKER: And how many times do you think 3 you've seen that? 4 MR. HOWARD: Once or twice. 5 MS. BAKER: All right. I have no other 6 questions. 7 MR. HOWARD: And it has -- that lift station, by 8 the way -- and I assume all of them do -- has a -- an 9 alarm on it. And the alarm was just ringing and a binging 10 and carry on. But it was still running over. The alarm, 11 when no one's there to -- to shut it off still rings. 12 Whether or not that automatically goes into 13 dispatch for Aqua Source to get a service tech out there, I don't know. But I don't know how the alarm works other 14 15 than it rings. 16 MS. BAKER: Do you know how long it -- it rang? MR. HOWARD: I do not know because I live 17 18 approximately a quarter mile from it. MS. BAKER: Okay. That's all the questions I 19 20 have. Thank you. 21 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Dearmont? 22 MR. DEARMONT: When the company pumped your 23 tank, were you personally billed for that service? 24 MR. HOWARD: You mean the -- the two months? 25 MR. HOWARD: Yes.

MR. DEARMONT: Yes?

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2 MR. HOWARD: Supposedly, Rita has been billed. 3 Rita Story, as I mentioned, is the one that had contacted 4 Aqua Source about pumping all of the tanks. And she told 5 me that they had given -- given her some type of statement 6 that they had pumped them. 7 MR. DEARMONT: Okay. Thank you. 8 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Schwarz? 9 MR. SCHWARZ: No questions. MR. HOWARD: I have not personally been billed. 10 JUDGE STEARLEY: Commissioner Jarrett? 11 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Yes, Mr. Howard. I just 12 13 had a quick follow-up question. You indicated the -- the lift station had overflowed. Did you notice, did the 14 15 company come out and fix anything? 16 MR. HOWARD: I did not see them come out and fix 17 anything myself. When I was walking -- of course, I walk 18 early in the morning. And so I'm assuming they fixed it or else the -- possibly a back-up pump kicked in or 19 20 something. 21 I'm not sure how those lift stations are set up. 22 I have one in the lot next to mine, and I've talked to the gentlemen that have serviced it in the past, and they said 23 24 in that particular station, there was two pumps. So I'm 25 not sure whether it was simply more affluent than the one

1 pump could handle and maybe one pump was broke or whether 2 the affluent slowed down after people went to work. I 3 don't know. 4 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Okay. Thank you. 5 Appreciate your testimony. Thanks for coming out tonight, 6 sir. 7 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Howard, a couple quick 8 follow-up. 9 MR. HOWARD: Sure. 10 JUDGE STEARLEY: Did you report that incident to 11 the company? 12 MR. HOWARD: The overflow? 13 JUDGE STEARLEY: The overflow. MR. HOWARD: No, I didn't. Because that 14 afternoon when I came home, the bell wasn't ringing 15 16 anymore. So I just assumed they had fixed it. 17 JUDGE STEARLEY: Do you know if anyone has ever reported such instances to the company, to the Public 18 Service Commission or to DNR? 19 20 MR. HOWARD: Oh, I think is has been reported by 21 Mr. Story more than once. And I think possibly that he 22 has at one time either filed litigation or threatened 23 litigation against Aqua Source. 24 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. And that was reported by -- who was that? 25

MR. HOWARD: Ed Story. Ed Story was the 1 2 developer -- is the developer. 3 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. Thank you very much. 4 MR. HOWARD: Thank you. 5 JUDGE STEARLEY: I believe we had a couple other 6 hands go up. The gentleman in the far back, I saw yours 7 first. Please come forward. And if you'd please state 8 and spell your name for the court reporter. 9 MR. MAY: Steve May, S-t-e-v-e M-a-y. 10 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. May, if you'd please raise your right hand. 11 12 STEVE MAY, 13 being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows: 14 15 TESTIMONY OF STEVE MAY 16 JUDGE STEARLEY: Please proceed. 17 MR. MAY: I just want to reiterate that -- the same feelings a lot of these folks have. I'm in the Ryans 18 Lake subdivision out by New Bloomfield. My billing 19 20 problems were resolved last year. 21 I have not had any service problems. My 22 neighbor has. He couldn't be here tonight. A couple 23 years ago, it backed up. He called. They came out and 24 fixed it. 25 And I guess in January of this year, he had a

1 similar situation where it backed up into his basement. 2 He called the number. Or his wife called the number. And 3 the woman who answered the phone was rude and vulgar. So, 4 you know, he -- when he got home, he called the number 5 back and talked to the woman, and she was again un --6 unpleasant. 7 He found another number to call. They came out 8 and fixed it and took care of it. But -- and I just 9 wanted to -- to get that in there since that is one of 10 your questions about service problems. JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Any questions for 11 Mr. May? 12 13 MS. BAKER: I have no further questions. Thank 14 you. MR. DEARMONT: I have none. Thank you. 15 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Schwarz? 16 17 MR. SCHWARZ: No questions, Judge. 18 JUDGE STEARLEY: Commissioner Jarrett? COMMISSIONER JARRETT: No questions, Mr. May. 19 But thanks for coming out. Appreciate your testimony. 20 21 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you very much. 22 MR. MAY: Thank you. JUDGE STEARLEY: I saw another hand back here. 23 24 Please come forward, sir. And if you would, please state 25 and spell your name for our court reporter.

1 MR. ROCKWOOD: Sure. It's Ron, R-o-n, Rockwood, 2 R-o-c-k-w-o-o-d. 3 JUDGE STEARLEY: And, Mr. Rockwood, if you'd 4 please raise your right hand. 5 RON ROCKWOOD, б being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole 7 truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows: 8 TESTIMONY OF RON ROCKWOOD 9 JUDGE STEARLEY: Please proceed. MR. ROCKWOOD: I live at 5911 Sterling Ridge 10 Road, which is in the Lake Vandelicht subdivision, same 11 12 subdivision as Mr. Fisher who was up here this evening. 13 Unfortunately, for the remaining customers here, I don't 14 have a whole lot of information to offer, but I do think 15 it's important that you hear from the customers who are 16 very frustrated and aggravated by the continual rate 17 increases. 18 And I really have three main points that I want 19 to bring up and just reiterate. The concern about being 20 charged on the amount of use, being that everyone gets a 21 flat fee rate, I think is completely unfair. If you look 22 at any other utilities that you use, whether it's electric, natural gas, water, you are charged on a per 23 24 rate basis by how much you consume, what your family uses.

You know, certainly, with some of those, you

1 don't have a choice to go anywhere you want. You have 2 electric companies -- for instance, we're on Three Rivers. 3 I can't go to Ameren, so I am certainly with them. 4 But I appreciate the fact that I don't get 5 charged for how much electricity my neighbor uses. I only б get charged for what I -- what I use. 7 On the other hand, your other items in terms of cell phones, TV, trash, pickup, all the other utilities, I 8 9 have other choices. And if I find the rates from those 10 companies to be deemed too excessive or the service poor and unprofessional, I will do my business elsewhere. 11 12 Aqua Missouri is the only company I don't have 13 that choice with. I'm stuck with them. I have nowhere to 14 go. I'm here based solely on the issue of the sewer 15 increase. I obtain my water from the Taos District, so I 16 don't have any concerns there. But that is the first 17 point is I think they really need to find a way, not 18 necessarily Aqua, but maybe PSC. As a gentleman mentioned 19 earlier, they really don't have any way of controlling it, 20 so like it's some sort of free entity there where they can just kind of not disclose information or they can disclose 21 22 information as they want. It's -- I think that needs to be looked into, however that can be corrected. 23

24 The second issue is basically, again, the cost 25 of treatment on fairness of treating solids for somebody

who does not have a septic tank versus somebody like us
 who we do maintain our own septic tank and, therefore,
 like many of the other customers, are responsible for the
 cost of pumping and maintaining that septic tank.

5 You surely can't tell me that it costs the same 6 to treat gray water versus gray water and solids. I think 7 there has been to some kind of allocation where there's 8 going to be a difference of cost, and, again, to be 9 charged across the board charge the same as everybody else 10 I feel is completely unfair.

11 The third point would be documentation. This is 12 more really of a question than -- than anything else is 13 that, you know, Aqua Missouri keeps saying, We're spending 14 millions of dollars to improve things in your, quote, 15 community.

16 Well, you know, I guess the Jefferson City
17 community is pretty big because I haven't seen the
18 improvements in our treatment plant. And from the sound
19 of it, neither have a lot other customers here in the
20 area.

21 So I'd like to know exactly where I can go to 22 view these, quote, improvements to see exactly how much 23 money has been spent, what it's been spent on, when it was 24 spent and see the details.

25 I think, as a consumer, I have a right to that

1 information, especially if you're asking me for a -2 another, you know, 29 percent increase when they just got
3 a 61 percent increase less than a year ago.

4 I think the increase is ludicrous. I think the 5 61 percent increase was, in fact, ludicrous. And I do 6 feel the same sentiments as other people in here that they 7 didn't get all the money the first time around, so they 8 want to take off small bites.

9 And I completely have expectations they'll be 10 back in two years when the moratorium is up and they're 11 going to ask for more money. Again, one of my questions 12 in the main Q&A session is where does it end? That's all 13 I have. Thank you.

JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Questions forMr. Rockwood? Ms. Baker?

MS. BAKER: Have you had any billing issue?
MR. ROCKWOOD: No. They've got everything right
since the rate increase last year. They have no problem
billing me for that.

20 MS. BAKER: Quality of service issues? Issues 21 with the customer service line?

22 MR. ROCKWOOD: When we initially started up with 23 the service on the increase, we did have some issue with 24 getting bills in a timely manner. We were told they'd be 25 mailed out within the next week or so.

1 We literally would receive them a month, month 2 and a half later. By then, we were getting disconnection 3 notices with the actual bill, which made no sense to us. 4 How can you disconnect somebody's service when they 5 haven't received the bill? 6 We did contact customer service, treated several 7 times in a very unprofessional manner by several different 8 people through Aqua Missouri. 9 MS. BAKER: And when did that occur? MR. ROCKWOOD: That was in September of 2008, 10 right when the rate increase took effect. As far as 11 problems, we do notice a significant odor throughout the 12 13 subdivision. So I can't -- I'm pretty -- I'm pretty sure it's not our septic tank. And it's not our neighbor's 14 septic tank because as me and my wife walk throughout the 15 16 subdivision, it is quite noticeable throughout the entire 17 subdivision. So I'm fairly sure it's coming from the 18 treatment facility, not from somebody's unmaintained 19 septic system. 20 MS. BAKER: Okay. Those are all the questions I 21 have. 22 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Dearmont? 23 MR. DEARMONT: I have no questions. Thank you. 24 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Schwarz? 25 MR. SCHWARZ: No questions.

JUDGE STEARLEY: Commissioner Jarrett? 1 2 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Mr. Rockwood, no 3 questions. But thanks for your time. Appreciate you 4 coming up. 5 MR. ROCKWOOD: Thanks for letting me speak. 6 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you. I believe I saw another hand. Sir, if you'd please come forward. 7 8 MR. GARRISON: I just had a comment. It was in 9 reference to James Howard's comment about the -- the 10 septics and the overflow. 11 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Sir, you need to come up if you want to testify and be sworn. 12 13 MR. GARRISON: Sure. 14 JUDGE STEARLEY: Had you previously testified or 15 not? MR. GARRISON: No. 16 17 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. Let me have you state and spell your name for our court reporter. 18 MR. GARRISON: Name is Rollan, R-o-l-l-a-n, 19 20 Garrison, G-a-r-r-i-s-o-n. 21 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Garrison, if you'd please 22 raise your right hand. 23 ROLLAN GARRISON, 24 being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole 25 truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows:

TESTIMONY OF ROLLAN GARRISON 1 2 JUDGE STEARLEY: Please -- please continue. 3 MR. GARRISON: When -- when Mr. Howard was 4 talking about the -- the lift station or the -- the 5 station on the north end of Quail Valley that he had seen б it overflow, the times that it overflows, some of the 7 times I've called in because it's right next to me. 8 I can hear it from my -- actually, from inside 9 my house because it is loud. And, yes, I have called 10 about it. Did they come out? Sure. They have come out. As far as how long it takes them, I don't know. The red 11 12 light goes on, and the buzzer goes off. 13 Now, when they -- when the letters came out 14 initially about all of our properties had to be pumped -and that's -- that' fine. We've lived there since '96. 15 16 We had not had ours pumped, but they did come out and pump 17 it. 18 But in the process because, one, I didn't know 19 anything about it, they said that we had to have them 20 pumped, and I said, Well, you know, you need to contact me 21 about my property. I called them and told them that I 22 wanted to know exactly when they were going to pump mine. I wanted to be there. If I want to pay -- if I have to 23 24 pay for something, I want to be there. I want to know 25 this.

1 And they couldn't give me a time, and I said, 2 Well, I don't want you on my property if you can't give me 3 a time. I said, That's called trespassing. And they 4 weren't -- and like I said, now, this is several years 5 back. They weren't overly pleasant. And -- and that's 6 fine.

7 And finally, what I said to them was, you know, 8 if you don't want to do this, you come on my property, 9 we're in deep trouble. Or somebody's in deep trouble. 10 More important is I live right next to your station. I report some of your station's problems. And if you're not 11 going to cooperate with me, I will let your station burn 12 13 the motors up. It makes me no difference. You're going 14 to have to replace them. It's not going to be me.

From that point on, I had no problems with them as far as -- if I called, they accepted the call, and that was it. But I haven't done this in -- and it's been a while. I don't know when the last time it was that it -that the stations went off. But I hear it very plain when they do.

And I've seen tracks where they've come in and worked on it. But I just wanted to add that because I knew -- when Jim was talking about the north end, that's where I live. But that's all I have to say.

25 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. Questions for

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1 MR. GARRISON: Okay. 2 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you very much. 3 MR. GARRISON: Sure. 4 JUDGE STEARLEY: I still had a couple of hands 5 up. Sir, if you'd please come forward. And if you'd 6 please state and spell your name for our court reporter? 7 MR. DUKE: My name is Bill Duke, B-i-l-l, last 8 D-u-k-e. 9 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Mr. Duke? 10 BILL DUKE, being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole 11 12 truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows: 13 TESTIMONY OF BILL DUKE 14 JUDGE STEARLEY: Please proceed. MR. DUKE: My wife and I moved into Lake 15 16 Vandelicht subdivision in approximately 2006. In the 17 beginning, we did have some billing issues with getting bills on time and things of that nature. And we kind of 18 related that back to we just moved into the area. They're 19 20 probably trying to get things settled. 21 But once we were able to get that settled and 22 direct pay it, we haven't had any billing issues since then, since those have been your basic questions. But I 23 24 can tell you that when we did deal with them for billing

25 issue, they were very rude.

And the first person you would call would say, well, you have to contact the corporate number or you then have to contact another number. So it turned into something that really should take you about ten minutes ended up talking a great deal of time during that.

6 I think some of the other issues that my family 7 would have are similar to what many of the others have 8 had. A, where is the ceiling on this rate increase? When 9 does it stop? When do you stop paying for what your 10 neighbors are doing and how much they're using?

I know my water bill -- even with four children at home and my wife and I, our water bill is about \$20 a month. We don't even get water from Aqua Missouri. We also go through Taos. So we're handling just waste liquids here. I mean, that's all we're handling.

16 And to continually increase above and beyond 17 almost three-fold what we pay for water seems a bit absurd 18 to me. When you also look at it, the odor is a 19 significant problem. There are many times when my wife 20 and I can't go outside with our children at night during 21 the spring and summertime because the odor is so bad. 22 When your 4-year-old or 7-year-old is saying, Mom, I don't want to stay out here, it smells too bad and 23 24 they want to go inside and play instead of being out on a 25 sunny day, that's a problem.

And when you call up to ask about it, which we've done many times, and they said, Oh, well, I think there are some cows around you. It's the cows. You should call the farmers. Now, we've all lived probably in this area for a long time now knowing that cows are not this type of odor that would cause an entire subdivision to not want to come outside and be outside.

8 We've called several times and asked what are we 9 paying \$44 a month for if the person who developed the 10 subdivision had to pay for all of the equipment to be put 11 in? Never can we get an answer.

And, in fact, most of the time we call and we -we will get a comment that says, Well, you're paying for water. And we have to tell them, no, we don't pay you for water. We use a different service. We're only paying you to take care of our liquid waste.

And then they -- people would tell us on the phone, No, we're taking care of your solids, too. No, ma'am, we have a septic tank that we maintain. So the lack of education and information at their company is just -- it's astounding. You couldn't get away with that in any normal business place.

23 There's no reason why the increase should
24 continue. There's absolutely none. People have pointed
25 it out on many different levels. In fact, it should

1 probably be decreased back to what it was several years
2 ago.

3 If there's no -- no way to show us the 4 improvements that have been made, then why should we 5 continue to pay for these?

б I actually filed the complaint online when we were told that we could. I filed the complaint, and I 7 8 received a call from an accountant who was studying the 9 books for Aqua Missouri. And I asked him what his 10 credentials were. He told me he was an accountant. 11 I said, Why are you calling me about my complaint against -- for a water company? And he said, 12 13 Well, I'm just letting you know that we look at these. We

have so long to review them. And after a certain period of time, we will make our findings public, and they'll be available online. But for me looking at them, I can tell you that I think, based on the improvements they've made, that their rate hike is justified.

I said, Well, that's nice that you have information that we don't have. But, again, why is an accountant looking at the books calling me? Shouldn't Aqua Missouri be able to tell me what these are? And why do we keep going through rate increases?

24 Mr. Rockwood said it perfectly. We have no 25 other voice. You can't go to anybody else. It's 1 essentially a monopoly in that area.

2 Case in point. I originally had Three Rivers to 3 get my propane. They got too high. I called Locks Mill. 4 I got my propane cheaper. They came out, filled up my 5 tank, no problem. Three Rivers asked, Why are you not б using us anymore? You're too high. The company down the street is cheaper. Okay. We'll meet their price or beat 7 8 it to you. 9 That's -- that's the way this society has worked for a long time. But, unfortunately, Aqua Missouri 10 doesn't follow those practices because they do have a 11 monopoly over the area. 12 13 Again, the rate increase is -- is not right. 14 It's ridiculous. There's a point in which you are taking advantage of people, and they're taking advantage of 15 16 everybody who uses their service. That's it. 17 JUDGE STEARLEY: Questions for Mr. Duke? Ms. 18 Baker? MS. BAKER: No. He's answered mine. Thank you 19 20 very much for coming. 21 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Dearmont? 22 MR. DEARMONT: I just wanted to clarify if you filed a complaint or a comment? Did you file it in the 23 24 rate case? 25 MR. DUKE: Uh-huh. I -- I put on the I.D.

number and everything online and typed up my --1 2 MR. DEARMONT: Online. Okay. Thanks. 3 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Schwarz? 4 MR. SCHWARZ: No questions, Judge. 5 JUDGE STEARLEY: Commissioner Jarrett? б COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Mr. Duke, I have no 7 questions, but thanks for your testimony. I appreciate 8 it. 9 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you very much. Is there 10 anyone else who would like to offer testimony? Please 11 come forward, ma'am. 12 MS. RULE: My name Annette Rule, A-n-n-e-t-t-e R-u-l-e. 13 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mrs. Rule, if you'd please 14 15 raise your right hand. 16 ANNETTE RULE, 17 being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows: 18 TESTIMONY OF ANNETTE RULE 19 20 JUDGE STEARLEY: Please proceed. 21 MS. RULE: We moved into our new home in two --22 actually, June of 2008. The rate was like 27 something. 23 And then two months later, it was 44.79. And then we get 24 this other one. And ours -- we've had a brand new septic tank 25

1 put in. It was at least \$5,000. And the pump and 2 everything it goes to get that down to their station and 3 down to the plant for gray water only, you know, I just 4 feel like -- and our plant is small.

5 There's only two families that are using that 6 plant. And both of us, it's just a husband and wife. We 7 are retired. I mean, everything's been stated. It's just 8 -- the economy is so bad and to have these kind of raises, 9 and I -- I just can't tolerate that.

10 The other thing is we -- as public funding people, we need to have a list. An audit doesn't mean 11 anything to us. We need to know, okay, there's a 12 13 subdivision. This pump that's going to take care of this 14 subdivision costs so much. Or our small unit, this pump 15 cost so much. Or if you have to replace any walls or 16 whatever, what that cost is for each size of a unit. 17 I mean, then maybe we can make some sense of

18 this. But to me, it -- I know what we paid for our pump 19 for the -- for the septic tank. It wasn't that much. But 20 even our well pump, we paid 3,000 for that, and it was a 21 big pump to pump our water up.

22 So there's no water -- I mean, we don't have a 23 water bill. It's just -- we have the well. And there's 24 no water with this. And so it's just -- gray water to go 25 to 53.22 a month, I just totally object. And I just wish

1 to thank you for hearing my testimony. 2 JUDGE STEARLEY: Any questions for Ms. Rule? 3 MS. BAKER: You've heard my three questions. 4 Billing issues? 5 MS. RULE: No. They're very good about taking 6 your money. 7 MS. BAKER: All right. 8 MS. RULE: No problem. 9 MS. BAKER: Any customer service experiences? 10 MS. RULE: No. They're -- we never see anybody. And the family that lives on the other street that looks 11 12 right down at it, she says they haven't ever seen anybody 13 come stop and check it out. 14 MS. BAKER: Okay. Any quality of service issues? Any odors in the area, anything like that? 15 MS. RULE: No. No. It's too small. It's a 16 small --17 MS. BAKER: Okay. Thank you for coming. That's 18 -- no further questions. 19 20 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Dearmont? 21 MR. DEARMONT: I have none. Thank you. 22 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Schwarz? 23 MR. SCHWARZ: No questions. 24 Mr. STEARLEY: Commissioner Jarrett? COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Yes. Ms. Rule, what area 25

or subdivision do you live in? 1 2 MS. RULE: Autumn Woods Estates. 3 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Thank you. I have no 4 further questions. Thanks for your testimony. 5 MS. RULE: Thank you. б JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you. I believe there was 7 another hand. Sir, if you'd come up. 8 MR. ZEMAN: Bill Zeman, Z-e-m-a-n. 9 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Mr. Zeman, if you'd raise your right hand. 10 11 BILL ZEMAN, being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole 12 13 truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows: TESTIMONY OF BILL ZEMAN 14 15 JUDGE STEARLEY: Please proceed. 16 MR. ZEMAN: Thank you. I am actually going to 17 offer some fresh, new testimony that you haven't heard this evening. I am very privileged and grateful to be 18 19 able to take advantage of the formal complaint system that 20 the Public Service Commission offers, and I hope to work 21 with the Public Service Commission to work through our 22 formal issues that we have against Aqua Missouri. 23 Also, I'm the President of the Golden Pond 24 Homeowners Association. It's in Holt Summit, Missouri. 25 Just this Saturday, we did hold a -- an annual meeting of

the homeowners. And I just asked a dumb bill question,
 said, does anybody know -- or does everybody know who Aqua
 Missouri is?

And I had one individual that's moved in for five months now that has no idea who Aqua Missouri is. It's kind of disheartening to me, your Honor, because it was -- and I may have these years wrong, so please forgive me for that.

9 But a couple of years ago, before this last 10 increase, I did write in to the Public Service Commission, 11 and I wrote a great big old three-page handwritten letter. 12 And I don't know if you all keep them on file. But you 13 can go to that file if you still do.

And what I wrote in there on that -- one of those three pages was the fact that not all the individuals are being charged that are utilizing the Golden Pond Homeowners Association sewer.

Okay. So -- well, I didn't -- I did not attend 18 that public hearing. But this most recent one, I believe 19 20 it was about a year and a half ago, I also wrote in another letter and said, P.S., I don't believe that 21 22 everybody is -- is paying for the use of this service. 23 And I got up here and testified before the 24 Commission and even handed the Commission a list of names, 25 and I don't know what more I need to do. I handed them a

list of names of everybody who needed to be charged for the use of Golden Pond Homeowners Association. And what's truly disheartening is this last meeting that I just held on Saturday, and I had another member say, I don't know who Aqua Missouri is. Who are they, Bill? Well, they happen to be your sewer system that you should be paying 44-whatever dollars it is a month.

8 So that's what I really have to offer to this 9 Commission, that I hope that we can seriously work through these issues. I'm not out to say -- I will tell -- I will 10 -- if I have to, I will give names. And it's real easy. 11 12 You can just go right down the county road and up Mallard 13 and Teal Lane and up the road a little further and go down 14 Old Barn Lane, and you can see everybody who should be 15 paying sewer bills.

Golden Pond Homeowners Association is a gravity flow system. We have no benefits of these pump stations that other people are having. It all -- it -- the price of gravity hasn't increased since Sir Isaac Newton.

And I'm just frustrated that, one, not everybody's getting charged for service. And I -- and I believe that there's other people in this room who can testify, not about Golden Ponds, about maybe their own sewer system of people who are not getting charged. I am willing to answer questions at this moment.

1 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. Ms. Baker? 2 MS. BAKER: Other than -- than this particular 3 billing issue, have you, through the Homeowners 4 Association, heard of any other billing issues that your 5 members have faced? б MR. ZEMAN: Wow. I'll mention a few. I know 7 for the fact that when one of my homeowners did, in fact, 8 call in to Aqua and they said, Hey, I'm -- you know, 9 they're good people and wanted to come forthright and 10 upfront. Aqua told them that they were going to shut off 11 their water. We are served by Callaway County Water 12 13 District No. 1. Aqua Missouri has no -- absolutely no control over our water that's coming in to the housing. 14 Another one was that, in fact, they tried to 15 16 back bill -- this is beautiful. This is my -- my 17 next-door neighbor, okay, right next -- houses couldn't 18 have been built more than six months apart at the very, 19 very most. 20 My next door neighbor said, Bill, I don't know 21 who Aqua Missouri is. Who -- what are you telling me? 22 Aqua Missouri? And here I am -- here, I've been paying a bill for ten years, and my next-door neighbor hasn't been 23

25 I said, well -- I gave him the phone number.

24

paying one?

1 Being good, Christian folks that they are, they call in. 2 And they wanted to bill -- Aqua Missouri -- and we'll 3 probably bring this out in the formal complaint and any 4 testimony that you want to hear at that as well. 5 But they were wanting to back charge for the previous б person that owned the house. And I found that -- I don't 7 -- I didn't like it, personally. 8 MS. BAKER: All right. That's all the questions 9 I have. Thank you. 10 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Dearmont? MR. DEARMONT: I have just a few questions for 11 you. What's your personal affiliation with the Homeowners 12 13 Association? MR. ZEMAN: I'm President of Golden Pond 14 Homeowners Association. I started out as a Board member. 15 16 I have lived there -- and I want to say it was 2000 or 17 2001. I don't remember the exact year that I moved in, 18 but it was one or the other. MR. DEARMONT: You have a formal complaint 19 20 pending against Aqua Missouri, correct? 21 MR. ZEMAN: Yes, sir, I do. 22 MR. DEARMONT: And you have retained independent counsel in that complaint? 23 24 MR. ZEMAN: You're required to, as a 25 subdivision, to have independent counsel.

1 MR. DEARMONT: No further questions. 2 MR. SCHWARZ: No questions, Judge. 3 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. Commissioner Jarrett? 4 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Mr. Zeman, I don't have 5 any questions. But I appreciate your testimony. Thank 6 you very much. 7 MR. ZEMAN: You're welcome. 8 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, sir. 9 Mr. ZEMAN: You're welcome. 10 JUDGE STEARLEY: And I believe I have a couple more hands. But before I call those people forward, just 11 12 let me check, my poor court reporter, we've been working 13 her for a little over two hours. Do you need a, break, Monnie, or do you --14 15 THE COURT REPORTER: I'm fine. 16 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Showing of hands, 17 please. Please come forward, sir. 18 MR. MUENKS: My name is Shawn Muenks, S-h-a-w-n 19 M-u-e-n-k-s. 20 JUDGE STEARLEY: And if you'd please raise your 21 right hand, sir. 22 SHAWN MUENKS, 23 being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole 24 truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows: 25 JUDGE STEARLEY: Please proceed.

MR. MUENKS: Thank you. I have a formal comment 1 2 letter that I'd like to present to the Commission and 3 counsel. Pretty much all my comments have been spoken 4 already, so I'll be brief. 5 I have one recommendation. I wonder if Aqua б Missouri has looked at trying to get federal stimulus money before coming to customers for -- to get 7 8 reimbursement for their -- their costs. 9 And I'd also like to state that I do support the water-based -- water usage based fees because I think 10 that, you know, if I'm going to pay that much money for 11 12 sewer, I'm probably going to flush a toilet as much as I 13 can. So if -- you know, if it was based on water, I 14 think I would conserve water use a little bit more that 15 16 way just like you would turning off your lights for saving 17 electricity. So that's about all I have to say. JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Questions, 18 Mrs. Baker? 19 20 MS. BAKER: Have you had any billing issues? 21 MR. MUENKS: I do have a customer service issue. 22 MS. BAKER: Okay. 23 MR. MUENKS: I have a main line that runs through my property. And, one, the manhole covers didn't 24 25 fight quite right, so I called them last summer to come

1 out and change it and didn't hear anything for about a 2 month. 3 I called them back, and they said they did come 4 out and look at it and take a new manhole cover to fix it. 5 It took another couple weeks, and I finally saw another б manhole cover on it. But it was an old one that still doesn't fit quite right. And I just have concerns because 7 8 it was wobbly, and small children or animals could fall into it. So --9 10 MS. BAKER: Okay. So when was this again? 11 MS. MUENKS: This was last summer. MS. BAKER: All right. And is still -- there is 12 13 not a -- a properly fitting --MR. MUENKS: No. No, there is not. 14 MS. BAKER: All right. That's all the questions 15 16 I have. Thank you. 17 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Dearmont? 18 MR. DEARMONT: I have none. Thanks. JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Schwarz? 19 20 MR. SCHWARZ: No questions. 21 JUDGE STEARLEY: Commissioner Jarrett? 22 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Sir, just one question. What subdivision or area do you live in? 23 24 MR. MUENKS: Bradford Court. 25 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: And there are some

company people here tonight. I would urge you to talk to 1 2 them after the hearing about that. 3 MR. MUENKS: Okay. Thank you. 4 JUDGE STEARLEY: The letters you have, have you 5 already filed that with the Commission or --6 MR. MUENKS: No, I have not. 7 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. If you want to bring a 8 copy forward. And if you have another copy, can you --9 MR. MUENKS: Yes, I do. 10 JUDGE STEARLEY: I'll have you give it to our 11 Staff. 12 MR. DEARMONT: We'll take it. 13 JUDGE STEARLEY: And we can see that it gets filed in the Comments section for this case. All right. 14 Are there any other persons who wish to testify this 15 16 evening? Mr. Kempker, did you want to say something? 17 MR. KEMPKER: I still -- I already testified, 18 but, you know, hearing others talk, I've got some other comments I'd like to make if I can. 19 20 JUDGE STEARLEY: That's fine. Please come 21 forward. I'll remind you that I hadn't excused you as a 22 witness so you're still under oath. 23 MR. KEMPKER: Sure. Do I need to -- state my 24 name again? JUDGE STEARLEY: No. You don't have to 25

1 Mr. Kempker.

2 FURTHER TESTIMONY OF KEITH KEMPKER 3 MR. KEMPKER: Hearing Mr. Howard testify earlier 4 on Quail Valley about the pump station overflowing, that's 5 a DNR violation. And if that has not been reported, Aqua 6 Missouri should be fined or whatever -- whatever the 7 penalty is for failing to report raw sewage spills. 8 Hearing Bill Zema -- Zeman testify earlier on the Golden Pond's subdivision, I specifically remember the 9 10 last hearing Commissioner Davies -- Daves, Davies --11 JUDGE STEARLEY: Davis. MR. KEMPKER: Saying that the billing problems 12 13 would be looked into. I specifically remember him saying that. It sounds like there's still problems. 14 And it sounds like the Public Service Commission 15 16 hasn't done their job. I would urge the Public Service 17 Commission look into it and make sure those problems are 18 fixed because, again, if they're having problems with 19 their billing, they're not receiving all the revenue they 20 should be getting. So, therefore, is this rate increase 21 really justified? That's all I have to say. Thank you. 22 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Any additional questions for Mr. Kempker? 23 24 MS. BAKER: No, your Honor. 25 MR. DEARMONT: I have nothing none. Thanks.

1 MR. SCHWARZ: No.

2 JUDGE STEARLEY: Commissioner Jarrett? 3 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: None for me. Thanks. 4 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Is there anyone 5 else who would like to offer testimony at this time? Well, seeing none, I would like to remind those people who 6 7 are either with us in our gallery or watching us on the 8 web that we do have multiple avenues for people to make 9 comments. And they can still make comments in this case 10 either by calling the Commission, mailing us, e-mailing, 11 posting comments on our web page, contacting the Office of 12 13 Public Counsel. Commissioner Jarrett, did you have any closing 14 remarks you'd like to make? 15 16 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Yes. Thank you, Judge. 17 It's been kind of a long night, but I think it's been a good night. Lots of good testimony, good information that 18 we've heard tonight that, again, will be transcribed and 19

20 will be in the record.

So we appreciate everyone coming out tonight, appreciate everyone's courtesy and professionalism while they were testifying. Everyone spoke very well, very clear and succinctly about their issues, and that's very helpful to us. And so I appreciate it, and thanks again.
