1	PROCEEDINGS
2	JUDGE DIPPELL: First of all, I'd like to
3	thank the City of Springfield for allowing us
4	to use their facility this evening. And I will
5	note that the views that are expressed here
6	tonight are not necessarily those of the City.
7	The Missouri Public Service Commission has
8	set at this time a local hearing in our Case
9	No. TO-99-483. This hearing was ordered by the
10	Commission, and a notice of the hearing was
11	sent out by our Commission's information
12	officer to the local newspapers and county
13	commissions in the area. And I hope that all
14	of the notices got out. It looks like we got a
15	good crowd tonight, so I'm feeling good about
16	that.
17	Prior to commencing the hearing, the
18	actual public hearing portion, I wanted to give
19	a brief explanation. And you may some of
20	you who have been here for the informational
21	part of the meeting may have already heard some
22	of this information, but I'm just going to give
23	a brief explanation of the agency.
24	The Missouri Public Service Commission is

25 a state agency which regulates the rates

charged by investor-owned utility companies in

Missouri to ensure that those rates are just

and reasonable. The quality of service and the

degree of safety employed are also regulated by

5 the Commission.

The Public Service Commission is made up of five commissioners who are appointed by the governor to hear and decide the cases such as this one. Two of the commissioners are here this evening, and they are Commissioner Robert Schemenauer to my right and Commissioner Connie Murray to my left.

The Commission employs a staff of engineers, accountants, attorneys, financial analysts and other specialists in the field of utility regulation and relies on their expertise. And some of those individuals are also here this evening. Bill Voight was speaking to you earlier.

And, Bill, is there anyone else from your staff here? Oh, I'm sorry. Amonia Moore to my far right, and Ms. Kardis, Julie Kardis, to her left are both members of our staff.

And so I hope that those of you -- most of you that are present had an opportunity to come

- to the informational meeting that was held in
 the hour immediately before this public hearing
 and heard some of what they had to say about
 their regulation of public utilities.
- 5 Also at the front of the room we have Mike 6 Dandino from the Office of the Public Counsel, 7 and you've had other members --
- 8 MR. DANDINO: Barbara Meisenheimer.

- JUDGE DIPPELL: And Barbara Meisenheimer 9 at the back of the room is also from the Office 10 11 of the Public Counsel. It's the job of the 12 public counsel to represent the public in a 13 hearing before our Commission, and you may want to speak to those representatives after the 14 hearing is over if you have additional 15 16 questions.
 - There's also some representatives of some of the companies that are involved. And I'll just have various company members raise their hands. Maybe we've got some here on the front. Very good.
 - They can also -- I'm sure that the various company members will be sticking around after the hearing if you have specific questions for their companies.

1	In this case the Commission was asked to
2	investigate for the purpose of clarifying and
3	determining certain aspects surrounding the
4	metropolitan calling area service after the
5	passage and implementation of the
6	Telecommunications Act of 1996. A formal
7	evidentiary hearing in this matter will be held
8	on May 15th and is scheduled for that entire
9	week. And that hearing will be held in
10	Jefferson City.
11	Those hearings are very much like a trial
12	that you might see at the courthouse. And in
13	those situations the various parties, including
14	the staff of the Public Service Commission,
15	Office of the Public Counsel, and the
16	telecommunications companies will be presenting
17	expert witnesses to testify and justify the
18	positions that they are taking in this case.
19	Some of that direct testimony has already been
20	filed in commission offices. It's been written
21	and prefiled, and the cross-examination will
22	take place at that evidentiary hearing.
23	Tonight the companies and the staff and
24	the public counsel are not on trial, and they
25	are not really hear at this point to answer

1 questions. This part of tonight is for you-all

- 2 to talk to the commissioners. And it's more of
- 3 a fact-finding mission on the part of the
- 4 Commission and we want your input. We hope to
- 5 take the comments from this evening, and we
- 6 will -- we have a court reporter taking down
- 7 what you say, and we'll swear each of you in
- 8 before you actually testify so that it becomes
- 9 facts in the record, and the commissioners can
- 10 use that information to base their decision on
- 11 later in this case. So your comments are
- 12 important to us and we look forward to hearing
- 13 from you.
- 14 The procedure this evening is basically
- 15 that Mr. Dandino and Ms. Meisenheimer have been
- 16 collecting a list of people who have said that
- they want to testify. We'll go down that
- 18 list. As your name is called, if you'll come
- 19 forward and be seated in front of the court
- 20 reporter here. You may want to sit into the
- 21 second chair so that commissioners can see you
- 22 a little better. But speak into the microphone
- there, and the court reporter will take down
- 24 what you say.
- There may be some questions from

1 Mr. Dandino in the beginning, for example, like

- 2 your address and your name and so forth. And
- 3 then the commissioners may have some questions
- for you before you sit down. You can then
- 5 proceed to make whatever statements you make
- 6 after you are sworn in, but please remain at
- 7 the seat until you are excused in case the
- 8 commissioners have any additional questions.
- 9 Again, this does become a part of our
- formal record upon which a final decision will
- 11 be made, and we look forward to hearing your
- 12 input.
- Before we begin with witnesses, are there
- any elected officials that would like to be
- 15 recognized and come forward?
- MR. FERGUSON: My name is Bill Ferguson.
- 17 I'm an alderman for the south ward of Walnut
- 18 Grove. I don't have any particular statements
- 19 at this time.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. Thank you, sir.
- 21 MR. JOHNSON: My name is Iver Johnson, and
- 22 I'm an alderman from Ash Grove, Missouri. And
- I will be speaking subsequently.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Were there
- 25 any --

1 MR. RANDY: Ray Randy, alderman at Ash

- 2 Grove.
- 3 MR. CHUDOMELKA: Tom Chudomelka, eastern
- 4 commissioner of Christian County.
- 5 MR. GRUBAUGH: Neal Grubaugh, alderman,
- 6 Ozark.
- 7 MR. SPINABELLA: Mark Spinabella,
- 8 alderman, Ozark.
- 9 JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay, then. I believe --
- 10 let's see. Do we have any attorneys from the
- 11 companies that will be asking questions this
- 12 evening?
- Okay. Then I believe, Mr. Dandino, if
- 14 you'd like to go ahead and call your first
- witness, the first member of the public.
- MR. DANDINO: Thank you, your Honor.
- 17 Mr. Carl Locke.
- Mr. Locke, if you'd come over here, and
- 19 let me move this chair out of your way. Sit in
- that other chair.
- 21 If you would, sir, spell your name for the
- 22 court reporter.
- MR. LOCKE: C-a-r-1, L-o-c-k-e.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Would you please raise
- your right hand, sir.

- 1 CARL LOCKE,
- 2 called as a witness on behalf of the public,
- 3 having been first duly sworn, testified as
- 4 follows:
- JUDGE DIPPELL: You may proceed,
- 6 Mr. Dandino.
- 7 EXAMINATION
- 8 BY MR. DANDINO:
- 9 Q. Once again, state your name and address for the
- 10 record, please.
- 11 A. Carl Locke, 1618 Highway 215, Brighton 65617.
- 12 Q. Mr. Locke, do you presently subscribe to MCA
- 13 service?
- 14 A. Yes. I subscribed when it first started.
- 15 Q. And what is your local telephone company?
- 16 A. AllTel.
- 17 Q. Now, sir, just go ahead and give your comments
- to the Commission in your own words.
- 19 A. Well, I've been very pleased with the service.
- I would be certainly welcome for it to remain
- 21 as is. I would also be acceptable -- it would
- 22 be agreeable to a slight increase, possibly \$2,
- if that would expand the service and give us
- 24 access to the nonsubscribers in the tier 2
- 25 communities.

1 JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. Is there anything

- 2 else?
- 3 THE WITNESS: I don't believe so.
- 4 JUDGE DIPPELL: All right. Commissioner
- 5 Murray, did you have any questions?
- 6 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: I don't believe so.
- 7 I'm going to try to keep my questions to a
- 8 minimum because we obviously have a lot of
- 9 people that would like to tell us their
- 10 feelings.
- 11 JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay.
- 12 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: I'll repeat that. I
- have no questions. I'm going to attempt to
- 14 keep my questions to a very minimum because we
- have so many people that wish to speak
- 16 tonight. Thank you.
- 17 JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Schemenauer, did
- 18 you --
- 19 COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: Thank you,
- Judge.
- 21 EXAMINATION
- 22 BY COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER:
- 23 Q. Mr. Locke, you said you lived in Pleasant Hope
- or Morrisville?
- 25 A. I'm on the Pleasant Hope side.

- 1 Q. Pleasant Hope. And you are completely
- 2 satisfied with the service the way it is?
- 3 A. Very satisfied with it.
- 4 COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: I have no
- 5 questions. Thank you.
- 6 JUDGE DIPPELL: Are there any other
- 7 questions from representatives, councilmen?
- 8 Thank you, Mr. Locke.
- 9 I will take this opportunity to say that
- if someone else has testified -- since we have
- a lot of people tonight, and I will have to --
- we scheduled this hearing from 6:30 to 8:30,
- and we really have to cut things off at 8:30.
- 14 But I will tell you that if someone came up and
- 15 said something and you just want to come up and
- say, yeah, I really agreed with what he said,
- 17 that's okay, too.
- MR. DANDINO: But we do need you to come
- 19 up and be sworn in and to give your name, even
- if you just want to say I agree with the
- 21 previous speaker. That way it can be on the
- 22 record.
- Next witness, Jeanne McFall, please.
- Hi, Ms. McFall. Have a seat, please.
- 25 Please spell your name for the court reporter.

1 MS. McFALL: Jeanne, J-e-a-n-n-e,

- M-c-F-a-l-1.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Ms. McFall, would you
- 4 please raise your right hand.
- 5 JEANNE McFALL,
- 6 called as a witness on behalf of the public,
- 7 having been first duly sworn, testified as
- 8 follows:
- 9 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you.
- 10 EXAMINATION
- BY MR. DANDINO:
- 12 Q. Please state your name and address for the
- 13 record.
- 14 A. Jeanne McFall, 1324 East Warren Avenue, Ozark,
- 15 Missouri.
- 16 Q. What is your local telephone company?
- 17 A. (417) 581-62 -- 6283, and also 581-8500.
- 18 Q. Now, are those MCA numbers?
- 19 A. Correct.
- 20 Q. Do you subscribe to MCA?
- 21 A. Correct.
- 22 Q. From what company?
- 23 A. GTE service.
- 24 Q. Okay. Now, just tell the Commission your
- 25 comments. Thank you.

1 A. We've been through probably a couple of changes

- in the service since it started in our area.
- We had an 820 prefix, and we now have a 581
- 4 prefix. And the prefix is what's recognizing
- 5 that it is a toll free call from Springfield.
- 6 And I don't know exactly what you're proposing,
- 5 because I wasn't able to understand at the very
- 8 end because it was cut off. We just want to
- 9 know if we're going to be able to keep those
- 10 prefixes.
- 11 And the other question is, Ozark is the
- only one that is eliminated from being the very
- outlying area in yellow, and is there a reason
- 14 for that, other than it has GTE service and not
- 15 Southwestern Bell service?
- 16 JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. I'm not going to be
- able to answer your questions, but I hope that
- 18 you'll be able to talk to Mr. Voight
- 19 afterwards, perhaps, and he can answer more
- 20 specifically what -- the questions with regards
- 21 to what the staff or some of the other people
- have proposed or planned. But what we are
- interested in is what kind of service you have
- and want and believe is necessary.
- Were there any other questions,

- 1 Mr. Dandino?
- 2 Q. (By Mr. Dandino) The only other question ${\tt I}$
- 3 would have is, if you had to change your
- 4 numbers again, change your prefixes, change
- 5 your phone numbers, would it be -- would you be
- 6 more inclined to -- in order to keep the MCA
- 7 service, you wouldn't -- you know, what's
- 8 important to you, to keep the phone numbers or
- 9 to have MCA service?
- 10 A. Both.
- 11 Q. Both equally?
- 12 A. Equally.
- 13 Q. And if a new company offered you service and to
- go with them you'd have to change your number,
- 15 you'd be less inclined to do that?
- 16 A. That's correct.
- 17 MR. DANDINO: That's all I have, your
- 18 Honor. Thank you.
- 19 THE WITNESS: Thank you.
- 20 JUDGE DIPPELL: Hold your seat just one
- 21 moment.
- 22 Commissioner Murray, did you have any
- 23 questions?
- 24 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Yes. I just wanted
- 25 to -- I just wanted to clarify that what you've

1 seen tonight has been a proposal that staff --

- 2 the staff of our commission has put forth.
- 3 There have been no decisions made at this
- 4 point, and there are many parties to the case
- 5 so that there are many things that are being
- 6 considered. And we don't have a plan that we
- 7 can put forth and say this is what is going to
- 8 happen. We're just gathering information at
- 9 this point.
- 10 JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Schemenauer?
- 11 COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: Thank you.
- 12 EXAMINATION
- 13 BY COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER:
- 14 Q. You're satisfied with the service you have now;
- is that correct, Ms. McFall?
- 16 A. That's correct.
- 17 Q. If the service were to change to give you a
- 18 larger calling scope or improve your service
- 19 somewhat, and the cost was minimum, a dollar or
- something a month, you wouldn't object to
- 21 that?
- 22 A. What would it be for a business?
- 23 Q. I don't know. There's all kinds of proposals
- out there, and some of them are to change the
- 25 calling scopes to pass on some cost to the

- 1 consumers.
- 2 A. If we could call possibly Branson, Buffalo,
- Bolivar, that would make a difference. But if
- 4 you're talking just the next outlying area, I
- 5 don't think it would be of a great benefit to
- 6 us at this point.
- 7 Q. You would like to see the calling scope go out
- 8 further than it is now?
- 9 A. If the rate is going to be increased, yes.
- 10 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you very much.
- Do you have another witness, Mr. Dandino?
- MR. DANDINO: The next witness, Wanda
- 13 Arthur.
- 14 Please spell your name for the court
- 15 reporter.
- MS. ARTHUR: W-a-n-d-a, A-r-t-h-u-r.
- 17 JUDGE DIPPELL: Could you please raise
- 18 your right hand.
- 19 WANDA ARTHUR,
- 20 called as a witness on behalf of the public,
- 21 having been first duly sworn, testified as
- 22 follows:
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you.
- 24 EXAMINATION
- 25 BY MR. DANDINO:

1 Q. Ms. Arthur, please state your name and address

- 2 for the record. And speak directly into the
- 3 microphone. You can pull it down closer to
- 4 you.
- 5 A. Wanda Arthur, 601 North 12th Avenue, Ozark.
- 6 Q. And what is your local telephone company?
- 7 A. I'm with GTE.
- 8 Q. And are you a subscriber to MCA service?
- 9 A. Yes, I am.
- 10 MR. DANDINO: That's all I have, your
- Honor.
- 12 Q. (By Mr. Dandino) Please just tell the
- 13 Commission your comments.
- 14 A. Basically I'm just here to say that I'm pleased
- 15 with the service I have now. We feel like
- 16 we've fought long and hard to get an MCA
- 17 service. I can remember the hardships that we
- had when we didn't have it in doing business
- 19 and would like to see it stay. I agree with
- 20 what the previous witness said, that we would
- 21 like to see -- if it -- if there's an increase
- in rate, we'd like to see an increase in area
- also.
- 24 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Murray, did
- you have any questions?

1	COMMISSIONER MURRAY: I have no
2	questions. Thank you.
3	JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Schemenauer?
4	COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: The only
5	comment I wanted to share with you is, in the
6	testimony that I've read so far, I have not
7	seen anyone suggesting that the MCA be
8	abolished. I haven't seen that anywhere.
9	THE WITNESS: Right. We got notice of
10	this or found out about it late this afternoon,
11	and we weren't really sure just what the
12	hearing was about. So that was basically why
13	we were here.
14	COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: I think all the
15	parties have taken the position they want to
16	improve it in some way. So
17	THE WITNESS: And definitely keep it.
18	COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: Okay.
19	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you very much.
20	MR. DANDINO: And, Ms. Arthur, just one I
21	did want to follow up on. I was told that, as
22	Ms. McFall had a question about whether the
23	plan as proposed by the staff would change any
24	of the exchange numbers or telephone numbers,
25	it will not have any effect on that

- 19 JUDGE DIPPELL: If there's anyone that
- 20 came in late that didn't get an opportunity to
- 21 sign the witness list, if we have time when we
- get to the end of the list, I'll ask if there's
- other people that would like to come forward.
- MR. DANDINO: Please spell your name for
- 25 the court reporter.

- 1 MS. McVAY: M-y-r-a, M-c-V-a-y.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Would you raise your right
- 3 hand, ma'am.
- 4 MYRA McVAY,
- 5 called as a witness on behalf of the public,
- 6 having been first duly sworn, testified as
- 7 follows:
- 8 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you.
- 9 EXAMINATION
- 10 BY MR. DANDINO:
- 11 Q. Please state your name and address for the
- 12 record, please.
- 13 A. Myra McVay, and I -- I live at Willard. I just
- moved. 700 South -- oh, goodness.
- 15 UNIDENTIFIED FEMALE: Main.
- 16 A. -- Main. I'm originally from the Walnut Grove,
- 17 Ash Grove area, so it's -- I'm really
- interested in this because I've been working
- 19 to -- we worked to get what we had for about 22
- 20 years before we ever got to where we didn't
- 21 have to pay those exorbitant rates. And
- 22 we're -- I think most of us are perfectly clear
- about wanting to keep what we have. Now
- 24 then -- and I don't really think it's fair to
- charge Springfield and MCA 1 for what we want.

1 And, furthermore, I would like to see that 2 the COS people who were cut off the service --3 I'd like to see another MCA, you know, maybe a three zone around, and take them in would be my hope, because I know they desperately need it, 5 6 too. 7 Oh, and another -- my concern -- another 8 concern of mine is the method of notifying us 9 for this -- for this hearing. It was just a 10 little short notice in the paper that someone 11 found after they had heard something on the --12 a Cracker Barrel Sunday morning. And we didn't 13 know a thing about it until then. And that notice was about an inch and a half long or 14 maybe 2 inches, and that's not enough 15 notification for a hearing like this that 16 17 concerns so many people. 18 I do not think that Southwestern Bell 19

should be on a -- I do think that Southwestern Bell should be on an even playing field and be able to enter a long -- a long distance field if AT&T, MCI, and so forth are going to do that. And I don't think our rates should be raised just because other companies want a piece of the MCA pie. Thank you.

- JUDGE DIPPELL: Just the witness that is
- testifying, please.
- 15 THE WITNESS: Sometimes I don't read my
- telephone bill, and honestly, on Sundays, we're
- 17 all so busy that that little tiny notice is not
- 18 enough. I think that we should -- I think that
- 19 the public service should have a -- have it on
- the radio and television so we would know. I
- think the whole area would know that way.
- Otherwise, we did an awful lot of calling
- today.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. I appreciate those
- 25 comments.

1 Commissioner Murray, did you have any

- 2 questions?
- 3 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions.
- 4 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Schemenauer?
- 5 COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: No questions.
- 6 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you very much.
- 7 MR. DANDINO: Thank you, Ms. McVay.
- 8 Tony Love.
- 9 Please spell your name for the court
- 10 reporter.
- MR. LOVE: A-n-t-h-o-n-y, L-o-v-e.
- 12 JUDGE DIPPELL: Would you please raise
- 13 your right hand, sir.
- 14 ANTHONY LOVE,
- 15 called as a witness on behalf of the public,
- 16 having been first duly sworn, testified as
- 17 follows:
- 18 EXAMINATION
- 19 BY MR. DANDINO:
- 20 Q. Please state your name and phone number for the
- 21 record.
- 22 A. Anthony Love, 788-2657.
- 23 Q. What's your street?
- 24 A. 206 East Monroe. You asked for the phone
- 25 number.

1 Q. Oh, okay. I wanted the address though. And

- 2 that's in Walnut Grove?
- 3 A. Walnut Grove, correct, 65770.
- 4 Q. And what is your local telephone company?
- 5 A. Southwestern Bell.
- 6 Q. And are you an MCA subscriber?
- 7 A. Yes. I have been since 1993.
- 8 Q. Please make your comments to the Commission.
- 9 Thank you.
- 10 A. I have to admit (sic) with a lot of the people
- 11 that have expressed a -- an appreciation of
- 12 having this MCA program, but I'd like to object
- to just about any kind of an increase, whether
- it be a dollar or two. Consider across the
- board, there's thousands of people that are
- going to be adding that cash into -- from his
- 17 pocket. It seems to me like we're -- already
- paid for the wire, haven't they? And they have
- 19 the service. Why are we expected to pay more
- for the same service? I don't understand that
- 21 at all.
- Now, I don't mind paying for the service.
- I did pay for AOL; it was a service; but
- 24 because of costs and rise in gas prices, rising
- 25 taxes, I had to let it go. And it just seems

1 to me to be a little unfair having to pay the

- 2 same thing -- pay more for the same service.
- 3 Q. Mr. Love, if you would -- if the service was
- 4 expanded -- or you want to keep it just the
- 5 same as it is now and at the same price; is
- 6 that right?
- 7 A. That could be agreeable.
- 8 Q. Okay. And if it was expanded, you think that
- 9 a -- expanded to, let's say, another tier, that
- 10 probably those people should pay -- are you
- 11 saying those people should pay for it more than
- the people that already have it?
- 13 A. Well, let me answer that by stating that I grew
- 14 up in California, southern California, and the
- two area codes that they had there for years
- and years and years, 714 and 213, covered
- millions of people. And I don't see why the
- 18 outlying areas are excluded from this MCA now.
- 19 MR. DANDINO: That's all I have, your
- Honor.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Did you have any further
- 22 comments, Mr. Love?
- 23 THE WITNESS: On page 6 of the handout it
- 24 referred to the criticism of the prefixes
- 25 having to be changed. And my feeling is, from

- 1 what I've read and heard so far, that if we
- were to expand, like you were just stating, the
- area, or to increase it by either a dollar or
- 4 two or double it, whichever they decide to do,
- 5 the prefix is going to change again anyway.
- 6 Q. (By Mr. Dandino) Well, Mr. Love, the -- right
- 7 now, when we're talking about the prefix
- 8 changing, the way I understand it, and maybe
- 9 the staff can explain it a little more, is that
- if you're an MCA customer, you have one certain
- 11 prefix. If you do not subscribe to MCA, you
- 12 get another prefix. If they would expand it to
- the outer or, you know, to another level, the
- existing customers are not going to have their
- 15 prefix changed. The -- and it wouldn't make
- any difference, the way I understand it,
- whether you're a subscriber or not, so there
- 18 would be no need to change your prefix or
- 19 telephone number if it was expanded.
- 20 A. Then why bring it up?
- 21 Q. Well, one of the criticisms of the current MCA
- 22 program is if you do not subscribe to MCA and
- if you wanted that service, you'd have to
- 24 change your telephone number. Or if you are on
- MCA and you felt that it got too expensive,

- 1 kind of like the AOL, and you wanted to get rid
- of it, you'd have to change your number because
- 3 they no longer have that. In this plan,
- 4 whether -- or the staff's proposal plan, no
- 5 matter -- it doesn't make any difference. If
- 6 you subscribe to MCA, someone -- you could call
- 7 someone, whether they're not a subscriber, and
- 8 it's not a toll call, except for if you are not
- 9 a subscriber and you call another
- 10 nonsubscriber, then that's a toll charge; is
- 11 that correct?
- 12 A. Well, I know --
- 13 Q. That's the best I can do.
- 14 A. And I know for certain, like a lot of these
- 15 people, that not having the service costs a lot
- of money.
- 17 Q. That's right.
- 18 A. That's all I've got to say.
- 19 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Are there any
- other questions from counsel?
- 21 MS. KARDIS: Yes. Can Bill Voight make a
- 22 statement?
- 23 JUDGE DIPPELL: I'm going to hold that
- 24 right now. I kind of let Mr. Dandino go into
- an explanation there out of courtesy, but I

don't want to get into too much explanation of
everybody's position, because that's what the
evidentiary hearing is all about.

What we're here for tonight is to get the
comments from the public and not the comments
from the lawyers. So I'm going to -- I'm going
to ask him to hold that, and if Mr. Love has
further questions afterwards, Mr. Voight would
be happy to try to explain the staff's position
to you at that time.

11 Commissioner Murray, do you have 12 questions?

MR. MURRAY: No questions.

14 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Schemenauer?
15 COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: Just so I can

16 clarify something, Mr. Love.

The service that you currently have you're satisfied with, and you think it's at a reasonable price, and you'd like it to stay the same. There are over 30 interveners in this case, most of them are telephone companies, and everybody has a suggestion on how to improve this service. We haven't made any determinations and won't until months after the hearing when they present all the evidence.

1 But I think -- I think most of the interveners

- 2 are interested in their welfare, so they want
- 3 to improve the service. I don't really think
- 4 that anybody's going to do away with it or harm
- 5 it in any way.
- 6 And the MCA in Kansas City and St. Louis
- 7 cover a lot larger areas geographically, but
- 8 there are a lot more people there. So I think
- 9 expansion in the Springfield MCA area will
- 10 probably depend on the population and how far
- 11 it's going out. And so I think the -- the
- 12 testimonies in this is one of the
- 13 considerations. So I just want to assure you
- 14 nothing's been prejudged on anything.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, Mr. Love.
- MR. DANDINO: Thank you, sir.
- 17 Blakemore? Vickie Blakemore?
- 18 Please spell your name for the court
- 19 reporter.
- MS. BLAKEMORE: V-i-c-k-i-e,
- B-l-a-k-e-m-o-r-e.
- MR. DANDINO: Ms. Blakemore, if you could
- 23 move a little closer to that microphone, so
- 24 we've -- maybe if you push it down right there
- it would help.

1 JUDGE DIPPELL: Would you please raise

- 2 your right hand.
- 3 VICKIE BLAKEMORE,

- 5 having been first duly sworn, testified as

- 7 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Please speak

- 18 A. Yes, I do.
- 19 Q. Just go ahead and give the commissioners your
- 20 comments.
- 21 A. Well, I agree with most of the people here that
- 22 we have a good plan now, and I wouldn't like to
- 23 see a raise at all. And if we had to have one,
- 24 not very much at all. But I -- we really have
- fought hard for this for 22 years, and I don't

think the commission really gave it to us. It

- 2 was Bell Telephone so tired of us fighting them
- 3 that they gave it to us. So we don't see the
- 4 need to change it or really have to pay any
- 5 more for it. And that's just about all I
- 6 have.
- 7 JUDGE DIPPELL: Are there any further
- 8 questions, Mr. Dandino?
- 9 MR. DANDINO: No further questions, your
- Honor.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Any other questions from
- 12 counsel?
- MS. KARDIS: No questions.
- 14 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Murray, did
- 15 you have questions?
- 16 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions.
- 17 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Schemenauer?
- 18 COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: No questions.
- 19 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you very much,
- Ms. Blakemore.
- 21 MR. DANDINO: Linda Voris.
- 22 Please spell your name for the court
- reporter.
- THE WITNESS: L-i-n-d-a, V-o-r-i-s.
- 25 JUDGE DIPPELL: Would you please raise

- 1 your right hand, Ms. Voris.
- 2 LINDA VORIS,
- 3 called as a witness on behalf of the public,
- 4 having been first duly sworn, testified as
- 5 follows:
- 6 EXAMINATION
- 7 BY MR. DANDINO:
- 8 Q. Please state your name and address for the
- 9 record, please.
- 10 A. Linda Voris, 303 East 565th Road, Walnut Grove,
- 11 Missouri.
- 12 Q. Ms. Voris, who's your local telephone company?
- 13 A. Southwestern Bell.
- 14 Q. And are you presently a subscriber to MCA
- 15 service?
- 16 A. Yes, I am.
- 17 Q. Go ahead and give your comments to the
- 18 commissioners.
- 19 A. Okay. I feel that the existing MCA plan works
- 20 well. I'm satisfied with it the way that it
- 21 is. I feel like having the 788 prefix instead
- of the 994 prefix that the other Walnut Grove
- 23 customers that are not subscribers have
- 24 identified as being toll free to the other
- MCA 1 and MCA customers. I'm not so much

- 1 interested in this proposal to increase my
- 2 phone bill so that MCA and MCA 1 customers can
- 3 call our green area, the MCA 2 area, toll
- 4 free. I cannot see how that would really
- 5 benefit us.
- 6 It's my understanding that the people in
- 7 the MCA and MCA 1 areas, they get MCA with
- 8 their basic charge. Only the green area pays
- 9 an additional charge. We can call Springfield
- 10 MCA and the MCA 1 area toll free because they
- are all subscribers automatically if they have
- 12 a phone. It's in their basic charge. That's
- 13 all I have.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Mr. Dandino?
- MR. DANDINO: I have no further questions,
- 16 your Honor.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Are there other questions
- 18 from counsel?
- 19 Stay in your seat for just one moment
- 20 more.
- MS. KARDIS: No questions.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Murray?
- 23 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Schemenauer?
- 25 COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: No questions.

1 JUDGE DIPPELL: You may be excused. Thank

- 2 you.
- MR. DANDINO: Nancy Parson, please.
- 4 JUDGE DIPPELL: Would you go ahead and
- 5 spell your name for the court reporter.
- 6 MS. PARSON: N-a-n-c-y, P-a-r-s-o-n.
- 7 JUDGE DIPPELL: And would you please raise
- 8 your right hand.
- 9 NANCY PARSON,
- 10 called as a witness on behalf of the public,
- 11 having been first duly sworn, testified as
- 12 follows:
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you.
- 14 EXAMINATION
- 15 BY MR. DANDINO:
- 16 Q. Please state your name for the record, and
- 17 address.
- 18 A. Nancy Parson, 994 Cottonwood Road, Rogersville,
- 19 Missouri 65742.
- 20 Q. And who is your local telephone company?
- 21 A. GTE.
- 22 Q. And are you a subscriber to MCA service?
- 23 A. Yes, sir, I am.
- 24 Q. Go ahead and make your comments.
- 25 A. All right. I hate to take up time, but I would

1 like to apologize to Mr. Dandino. I came

- 2 flying in the room here when this -- the
- 3 informational meeting started and asked him to
- 4 stop because there were people over at the
- 5 other building who could not get in. The
- 6 message in the paper said 840 Boonville, and
- 7 that is the address of that building over
- 8 there.
- 9 JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. Thank you.
- 10 A. The notice is in the paper. I did read a
- 11 notice one day this week or last week, and I
- 12 can't find it. But it did tell about a 5:30
- informational meeting. Then there was a notice
- in the paper yesterday. Both of them were very
- short. I had no idea what I was coming to
- 16 tonight except that I thought you were doing
- away with my MCA, and that made me furious, so
- I wanted to be here.
- 19 I'm very satisfied with my MCA. I do live
- in the MCA 2 area, Ozark, even though my
- 21 address is Rogersville. I am not going to be
- 22 happy if my rates are raised. I feel like I'm
- getting my money's worth for what I'm paying
- 24 for. It is a hinderance to call numbers that
- 25 aren't MCA numbers and you don't know that they

1 aren't. But I would not be happy to have my

- prefix changed because I've already had an 820
- 3 prefix, then it was changed to 581, and I
- 4 certainly don't want to have to go through that
- 5 again to change it to another thing.
- I would think that if it was mandatory for
- 7 everyone to be on MCA and pay the price that I
- 8 pay, which is a charge plus a monthly charge,
- 9 that there would be no need to raise rates
- 10 because that would take in all these other
- 11 people paying the same thing I am. There's
- just an old saying at our house, if it ain't
- 13 broke, don't fix it, and that's the way I feel
- 14 about it.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you.
- Mr. Dandino, did you have anything
- 17 further?
- 18 MR. DANDINO: I have no further questions.
- 19 JUDGE DIPPELL: Are there any other
- 20 questions from counsel?
- MS. KARDIS: No questions.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Murray?
- 23 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Schemenauer?
- 25 COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: No questions.

1 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you very much.

- 2 MR. DANDINO: The next witness -- I
- 3 apologize. I cannot read the last name. Tom
- 4 on Harpers Hill.

- 6 MR. DANDINO: Please spell your name for

- 10 JUDGE DIPPELL: Would you please raise
- 11 your right hand.
- 12 TOM CHUDOMELKA,
- 13 called as a witness on behalf of the public,
- 14 having been first duly sworn, testified as
- 15 follows:
- 16 EXAMINATION
- 17 BY MR. DANDINO:
- 18 Q. Please state your name and address for the
- 19 record.
- 20 A. Tom Chudomelka, 1952 Harpers Hill Road, Ozark,
- 21 Missouri.
- 22 Q. And, sir, who is your local telephone company?
- 23 A. GTE.
- 24 Q. And are you an MCA subscriber?
- 25 A. Yes, I am.

- 1 Q. Please make your comments.
- 2 A. Okay. I'd like to reference page 8 of the
- 3 handout.
- 4 JUDGE DIPPELL: Excuse me, sir. We've had
- 5 some other references to the handout, and I
- 6 will tell you that the commissioners have not
- 7 received the handout that was given at the
- 8 informational meeting. If that was -- it may
- 9 have been in bits and pieces in the staff's
- 10 testimony as it was submitted, but they didn't
- 11 get that particular handout.
- 12 THE WITNESS: Do they have a current map
- of the current MCA areas?
- 14 JUDGE DIPPELL: I'm sure -- that's in the
- 15 record, yes.
- 16 THE WITNESS: All right. Then I will
- 17 reference that.
- 18 A. Although you may not have it in front of you,
- 19 I'd like to point out that the Ozark calling
- area is an MCA 2, although, in places it
- 21 borders the principal zone. And much of it
- borders the MCA 1 calling area, which means
- instead of having what we believe should be an
- \$11.40 charge a month, including local
- 25 services, we pay a local service charge and the

1 additional MCA 2 charge. We believe this is an 2. error and would like to see that fixed. And 3 I'm not only speaking for myself, but also from the Christian County Commission which has discussed this at length at different times. 5 6 I'd also like to point out that the 7 enlarged -- if there is an enlarged calling 8 area, that it would seem -- well, the 9 investment from the companies is already there. And although there may be added 10 service, there may not necessarily be added 11 12 cost to that service. We have, of course, 13 Christian County in this area, or much of 14 Christian County, which is the fastest growing county in the state of Missouri. And a number 15 16 of people moving in that use this will only 17 help their revenue and not hurt it. 18 Also we would hope that there would be no 19 increase in the MC 2 calling area because we 20 believe that the MC 1 and the principal zone, and especially the principal zone, if they are 21 22 going to be allowed to call out, too, MCA 2

- in the new -- on the new plan. And we believe
- it should be.

1 JUDGE DIPPELL: Are there additional

- 2 comments or questions from counsel?
- 3 MS. KARDIS: No.
- 4 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Murray?
- 5 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions.
- 6 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Schemenauer?
- 7 COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: Thank you,
- 8 Judge.
- 9 EXAMINATION
- 10 BY COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER:
- 11 Q. Mr. Chudomelka, does anyone in Christian County
- 12 have any problems with MCA in their area? I
- 13 know Christian County -- does that take in
- 14 Sparta and Highlandville?
- 15 A. Yes, it does, and Clever and Billings.
- 16 Q. And they are all satisfied with the service the
- 17 way it is?
- 18 A. I've not heard any negative comments toward it,
- 19 no.
- 20 Q. And it doesn't affect your 911 service any at
- 21 all or the --
- 22 A. I don't believe the MCA does. Of course, we
- are serviced by two local carriers, GTE and
- 24 Southwestern Bell. And that in itself has
- 25 created some hurdles. Not necessarily

1 problems, but some -- some logistics that we

- 2 had to work out. But that all seams to be
- 3 working correctly.
- 4 COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: That's all I
- 5 have. Thank you.
- 6 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, sir.
- 7 MR. DANDINO: Thank you, Commissioner.
- 8 Rich Lee.
- 9 Please spell your name for the court
- 10 reporter.
- 11 MR. LEE: R-i-c-h, L-e-e.
- 12 JUDGE DIPPELL: Would you please raise
- 13 your right hand, sir.
- 14 RICH LEE,
- 15 called as a witness on behalf of the public,
- 16 having been first duly sworn, testified as
- 17 follows:
- 18 EXAMINATION
- 19 BY MR. DANDINO:
- 20 Q. Please state your name and address for the
- 21 record.
- 22 A. It's Rich Lee, 1423 North Jefferson Avenue in
- 23 Springfield.
- 24 Q. And who is your local telephone provider?
- 25 A. The firm I represent has all of the local

1 carriers, Sprint, Southwestern Bell, AllTel,

- 2 GTE. So we have all as -- providers in the
- 3 areas that we touch.
- 4 Q. What company do you represent?
- 5 A. I have a large medical concern that I
- 6 represent.
- 7 Q. And would you want to state that for the
- 8 record, the name?
- 9 A. Not necessarily, no.
- 10 Q. And does your company subscribe to MCA service?
- 11 A. In some locations we do. In other locations we
- have similar programs or products that have
- different acronyms or have different full term,
- 14 as far as names. And then we have some areas
- 15 that we do not have.
- 16 Q. Are you primarily served by any particular
- 17 company?
- 18 A. The core is served by Southwestern Bell, but
- 19 all of the local -- as far as local on the
- other end, which most of these patrons or
- 21 persons here have spoken of, are -- is GTE.
- MR. DANDINO: That's all I have, your
- Honor.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you.
- Would you like to make a comment, sir?

1	THE WITNESS: Well, I'm a full-time
2	professional. I do nothing but
3	telecommunications. I've been trained by some
4	of the largest companies, and it to me it is
5	confusing. I have tracked and tried to keep up
6	with MCA, EAS, COS, SLC, and any other acronym
7	that you would want to throw at it, and unless
8	you know the origin of the acronym, a lot of
9	times you get lost in what it becomes because
10	in telecommunications, SLC is subscriber line
11	carrier. It doesn't mean a federal EUCL as far
12	as a charge. But it can become that.
13	I'm curious because this affects on a
14	business rate what my firm has to look at,
15	which is my responsibility to try to be
16	informed and to try to administer. And with
17	COS going away, with changing within an area
18	code of the NXX, and dealing with lots of
19	different things that sometimes are technical
20	issues with technical hardware and software
21	releases, sometimes it's not being farsighted
22	enough in the implementation of plans.
23	So those are all the outcomes, I feel, and
24	those have been the challenges, even since 1993
25	with the implementation and then the benefit of

- 1 MCA.
- 2 Likewise, it's a very difficult challenge
- 3 to administer a higher cost line for everything
- 4 at a premise or a location when you don't
- 5 necessarily have all of your calling to an MCA
- 6 area. We have strived to abide by the
- 7 regulations and the law. And sometimes it's
- 8 difficult to determine how much calling, how
- 9 much margin, how much profit, or how much
- 10 business constitutes a business line versus a
- 11 residential line.
- 12 It also is difficult to deal with the fact
- 13 that you may have five, six, or eleven lines,
- 14 depending on how many doctors or how many
- 15 practitioners you have at a location. Yet, if
- 16 you are going to have MCA, you have to have it
- on all that are on that bill. And as you might
- suspect, all of those lines are not used for
- 19 like an MCA call. Yet, you're subsidizing or
- 20 you're paying rates that are higher because
- they happen to be at the same premise or the
- same bill when, in fact, that seems to be
- something that's a bit misapplied, whereas a
- household or a business and a household
- business, a home office, those kinds of things

- 1 come into play.
- 2 And, likewise, you've also got everything
- 3 else to be considered nowadays with regard to
- 4 use of voice type technologies or legacy
- 5 hardware and software which these people refer
- 6 to as the lines being paid for. Yet, they are
- 7 being used for not a three-minute voice call,
- 8 but they are being used for four-, six-,
- 9 eight-, twelve-hour or even dialed-up-all-the-
- 10 time data calls or AOL calls or MSN or anything
- 11 to do with the internet.
- 12 Likewise, we as a business have to weigh
- and keep up with each and every thing that is a
- 14 product or a tariffed item or something that
- 15 becomes, in this case, a short notice to try to
- 16 figure out what is going to be discussed in a
- forum such as this.
- So I appreciate the commissioners being
- 19 here, and I appreciate you conducting this,
- 20 because I do believe that the more it is
- 21 discussed, the more that can be understood.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you.
- 23 Mr. Dandino, did you have anything
- 24 further?
- 25 MR. DANDINO: I have no further questions.

1 JUDGE DIPPELL: Were there other questions

- 2 from counsel?
- 3 MS. KARDIS: No further questions.
- 4 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Murray?
- 5 EXAMINATION
- 6 BY COMMISSIONER MURRAY:
- 7 Q. I just wanted to ask you if -- you said that
- 8 all of your businesses or all of your lines
- 9 within one business have to subscribe to MCA if
- 10 you are in an optional MCA area?
- 11 A. If it's on the same bill and it's at the same
- 12 premise and it applies, yes.
- 13 Q. And that's in the optional area?
- 14 A. I believe that would be the optional, yes.
- I -- I've never really, I don't think,
- 16 evaluated it on the not optional, because it's
- so close to the same price, the local and the
- 18 MCA 1.
- 19 Q. Okay. And you mentioned use of the MCA calling
- area for access to internet service providers.
- 21 Does your business -- is your internet service
- 22 provider somewhere within the MCA that would
- not be a local call if it were not designated
- 24 as an MCA area?
- 25 A. We -- we have a lot of different providers, and

some would be in the core or the primary zone.

- 2 And there could be others that would be within
- 3 an optional zone as a local call, I -- I
- 4 believe.
- 5 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Thank you.
- 6 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Schemenauer?
- 7 COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: No questions.
- 8 JUDGE DIPPELL: And I've got just one
- 9 question for you, sir. I'm sorry. You may
- 10 have answered this already and I just didn't
- 11 quite catch it, but the firm that you speak of,
- 12 are you an owner or a partner or principal
- 13 or --
- 14 THE WITNESS: I just direct
- 15 telecommunications.
- 16 JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. And do you
- 17 personally subscribe to MCA service?
- 18 THE WITNESS: I do not personally.
- 19 JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. Thank you.
- MR. DANDINO: Thank you, Mr. Lee.
- 21 Shirley Crain -- or Sherry Crain.
- 22 Please spell your name for the court
- 23 reporter.
- MS. CRAIN: S-h-e-r-r-y, C-r-a-i-n.
- 25 JUDGE DIPPELL: Could you please raise

- 1 your right hand, ma'am.
- 2 SHERRY CRAIN,
- 3 called as a witness on behalf of the public,
- 4 having been first duly sworn, testified as
- 5 follows:
- 6 EXAMINATION
- 7 BY MR. DANDINO:
- 8 Q. Please state your name and address for the
- 9 record.
- 10 A. Sherry Crain, 11477 West Farm Road 48, Walnut
- 11 Grove, Missouri 65770.
- 12 Q. Ms. Crain, are you a subscriber to MCA?
- 13 A. Yes.
- 14 Q. And who is your local telephone company?
- 15 A. Southwestern Bell.
- 16 Q. Go ahead with your comments, please.
- 17 A. All right. I, too, was involved 22 years ago
- when we tried to get this for our area. I have
- 19 had it since its inception. I'm very pleased
- 20 with it. The commissioner -- and I'm sorry, I
- 21 didn't -- I don't remember what your name is,
- 22 but --
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Let me just refresh
- everybody's memory because it's been a while.
- 25 This is Commissioner Schemenauer, and this is

1 Commissioner Murray, and my name's Nancy

- 2 Dippell.
- 3 THE WITNESS: Thank you.
- 4 A. Commissioner Schemenauer has stated on a couple
- of occasions the phrase "minimal cost." And
- 6 \$13 I do not consider to be a minimal cost.
- 7 I'm now paying 11.45. That would more than
- 8 double what I am now paying. So I would like
- 9 to speak to minimal cost being a minimal cost.
- 10 I hardly think doubling -- more than doubling
- 11 what we are now paying could be considered
- 12 minimal.
- 13 And then I think the -- speaking to the
- 14 being able to call people who are not in the
- 15 MCA would be a nice thing. And I think if
- 16 that's something that they want to give to us
- on what we are paying, that would be
- 18 wonderful. I don't think an increase of any
- 19 kind would be something that we would be
- 20 interested in. Thank you.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Could you
- remain seated just one moment?
- THE WITNESS: Sorry.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Dandino, did you have
- any additional questions?

1 MR. DANDINO: No, your Honor.

- 2 JUDGE DIPPELL: Were there any additional
- 3 questions from counsel?
- 4 MS. KARDIS: No questions, your Honor.
- 5 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Murray?
- 6 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions.
- 7 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Schemenauer?
- 8 COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: Thank you,
- 9 Judge.
- 10 When I asked the question whether or not
- 11 expanded service would be worth a minimal
- increase, I wasn't advocating that. I was
- trying to get a response from the folks to see
- where they are at, I mean if they are satisfied
- or not, whether they think they're paying
- 16 enough or they want to pay any more, or whether
- they are wanting to increase their scopes for
- 18 another dollar or two. And no one has made any
- decisions. And I assure you, my mind is not
- 20 made up.
- 21 So I just want to let you know, I'm trying
- 22 to get your input of your intent on it. And I
- 23 understand your position. You're satisfied
- 24 where you are at, and you don't want to go any
- 25 higher.

- 1 THE WITNESS: Correct.
- 2 MR. DANDINO: But you would go lower,
- 3 correct?
- 4 THE WITNESS: Yes.
- 5 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you very much.
- 6 MR. DANDINO: Thank you, Ms. Crain.
- 7 Lon Covington, please.
- 8 Please spell your name for the court
- 9 reporter.
- 10 MR. COVINGTON: Lon, L-o-n,
- 11 C-o-v-i-n-g-t-o-n.
- 12 JUDGE DIPPELL: Would you please raise
- 13 your right hand, sir.
- 14 LON COVINGTON,
- 15 called as a witness on behalf of the public,
- 16 having been first duly sworn, testified as
- 17 follows:
- 18 EXAMINATION
- 19 BY MR. DANDINO:
- 20 Q. Please state your name and address for the
- 21 record.
- 22 A. Lon Covington, 3239 Southern View, Ozark,
- Missouri.
- 24 Q. And who is your local telephone company?
- 25 A. GTE.

1 Q. And are you a subscriber to MCA?

- 2 A. Yes, sir.
- 3 Q. Okay. Go ahead and make your comments to the
- 4 Commission, sir.
- 5 A. Okay. I'd just like to say that I am very
- 6 satisfied with the service the way it is, and I
- 7 would desire that it not be changed. At the
- 8 opening of the meeting a comment was made that
- 9 this was one of the options, it could stay the
- same, and they were not here to take it away,
- so that's what we're interested in. That's
- 12 what I'm interested in.
- 13 And I tend to be a little concerned if
- someone offers me something that's going to be
- great and improve my world and doesn't cost but
- 16 a dollar a month, or something like that. I
- tend to be a little worried. Maybe I'll
- 18 understand it more later, but right now I would
- 19 prefer that it remain the same.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you.
- 21 Mr. Dandino, do you have any further
- 22 questions?
- 23 MR. DANDINO: I have no further questions.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Ms. Kardis?
- MS. KARDIS: No questions.

1 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Murray?

- 2 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: And Commissioner
- 4 Schemenauer?
- 5 COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: No questions.
- 6 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, sir.
- 7 MR. DANDINO: Thank you, Mr. Covington.
- 8 Fred Hall.
- 9 Please spell your name for the court
- 10 reporter.
- MR. HALL: Fred Hall, F-r-e-d, H-a-l-l.
- 12 JUDGE DIPPELL: Could you please raise
- 13 your right hand, sir.
- 14 FRED HALL,
- called as a witness on behalf of the public,
- 16 having been first duly sworn, testified as
- 17 follows:
- 18 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you.
- 19 EXAMINATION
- BY MR. DANDINO:
- 21 Q. Please state your name and address for the
- 22 court reporter.
- 23 A. Fred Hall, 619 North Washington, Walnut Grove,
- 24 Missouri.
- 25 Q. And, Mr. Hall, are you a customer -- are you an

- 1 MCA subscriber?
- 2 A. Yes, sir.
- 3 Q. And you are a customer of what company?
- 4 A. Southwestern Bell.
- 5 Q. Okay. And did I understand that you are also
- 6 an alderman for the City?
- 7 A. No.
- 8 Q. Oh, I'm sorry.
- 9 A. No, thank you.
- 10 Q. Go ahead with your comments, sir.
- 11 A. I am pleased to be given the chance to speak
- 12 here tonight. I'm very pleased with the MCA
- 13 program in Walnut Grove. Over the years it's
- 14 meant a lot to me. I just retired as an
- 15 over-the-road driver, and the ability to have a
- 16 24-hour call coming in without having to be
- 17 collect was a -- was a great benefit. I've
- 18 never heard any negative response.
- We have some people present in the
- 20 building tonight, specifically Ms. McVay, the
- 21 champion of the cause a few years ago, and the
- 22 subject of the notice in the paper, which I'd
- like to reiterate, it was not adequate in my
- opinion. If it weren't for a couple or three
- people in the crowd tonight, there wouldn't be

a handful of people here. The notice was very short and very minute.

One of the things that -- I would like to

see, first of all, the MCA stay as it is. One

of the things that -- if I might impress the

panel there with, the real problem we have in

our community is the seniors, and I'll speak on

their behalf tonight.

Trying to balance a budget between the pharmaceuticals, food, rent, and gas, they -there is a mass confusion about programs within the phone systems, how to pick the right provider. I've had calls to my home from people that are very bright, but -- but there's so much confusion. I wish there was some way we could go back and start all over, you know, after the divesture of Ma Bell. This is one of the things that I think haunts us all, even including me.

So if that was -- would be my best shot at you-all tonight, to try to -- try to -- if -- whatever happens, is to try to make this thing simplified to where the people can understand what they are purchasing. That's -- that's the big problem I see in our community right now.

- 1 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you.
- 2 Mr. Dandino, did you have additional
- 3 questions?
- 4 MR. DANDINO: Yes, your Honor.
- 5 Q. (By Mr. Dandino) Mr. Hall, what would you --
- if there was a change or an effort to try to
- 7 simplify any of the telephones, whether it's
- 8 MCA or any other plans, and try to reach, as
- 9 you said, the elderly community, do you have
- 10 any suggestions on how we can -- how is the
- 11 best way to reach the community?
- 12 A. Well, you know, you have the TV ads continually
- 13 telling you you can do this for so many cents a
- 14 minute and this program. A lot of them are
- 15 confusing, there's no question.
- They've been, I think, recently forced to
- 17 have to change some of their wording on their
- 18 ads when a lot of people are really up against
- it when it comes to financial, trying to make
- and keep the phone without having to pay the
- 21 very much limit. I can't give you an answer
- 22 except to try to get the plan simplified. You
- 23 know, every company should be responsible to
- 24 make these things where they -- a senior
- 25 understands, or anyone, including me, what they

- 1 are buying in the way of a provider. That
- 2 would be my best wish for you-all.
- 3 Q. Would you think it would be beneficial for the
- 4 Commission to -- whenever they adopt the -- if
- 5 they adopt a plan or authorize a service, that
- 6 the Commission itself would send out something,
- 7 kind of a generic explanation rather than as a
- 8 sales pitch? Would that be beneficial?
- 9 A. Yeah, I think that's a good idea, yes, sir.
- 10 Q. And do you think -- would it be also helpful if
- 11 you had that type of information about the MCA
- 12 service and other calling plans in the
- 13 telephone directory where they can refer to
- 14 it?
- 15 A. Well, if -- I think I understand your
- 16 question. When these hearings come up for
- 17 proposed changes, I have to go back to my other
- 18 statement, the mass confusion. I think
- 19 everybody understands MCA. You know, it took a
- while. A lot of people, it took a while, but
- 21 they do understand it, and they understand that
- there are some certain areas that they can't
- 23 call without a toll. But simplification is
- 24 what we all need.
- 25 Q. If they put something like -- require the

telephone companies to put it in their -- in

- 2 the phone bill, a generic explanation, would
- 3 that be beneficial?
- 4 A. Anything that would help explain what goes on
- 5 monthly, yes, sir.
- 6 MR. DANDINO: That's all I have, your
- 7 Honor. Thank you.
- 8 JUDGE DIPPELL: Are there any other
- 9 questions from counsel?
- MS. KARDIS: No questions.
- 11 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Murray?
- 12 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: I would just say to
- Mr. Hall, we couldn't agree with you more. We
- do need simplification for all of us. This is
- a very complicated industry, and with the
- 16 advent of competition, it becomes more
- 17 complicated every day. But we at the
- 18 Commission do attempt to be aware that we do
- 19 need to do more public education on these
- issues, and we are working in that direction.
- 21 THE WITNESS: Thank you.
- 22 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Schemenauer?
- 23 COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: Thank you,
- Judge.
- 25 Your simplicity plea -- I mean I

```
1 understand it, and I'm very sympathetic to it.
```

- 2 I have a hard time myself trying to figure out
- 3 how come I can call the capital of California
- 4 for a nickel a minute, and call the capital of
- 5 Missouri, it's 12 cents a minute or 15 cents a
- 6 minute from the same company. So we're working
- 7 on that to try to get this thing simplified and
- 8 cleaned up. But it's a long road, and I don't
- 9 know if I'll be around when the end of it
- 10 comes. But we're working on it. Thank you.
- 11 THE WITNESS: Thank you, sir.
- 12 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, sir. You may
- 13 be excused.
- 14 THE WITNESS: Thank you very much.
- MR. DANDINO: Thank you, Mr. Hall.
- 16 Sarah Pilgrim.
- 17 Please spell your name for the court
- 18 reporter.
- 19 MS. PILGRIM: S-a-r-a-h, P-i-l-g-r-i-m.
- 20 JUDGE DIPPELL: Would you please raise
- 21 your right hand, ma'am.
- 22 SARAH PILGRIM,
- called as a witness on behalf of the public,
- 24 having been first duly sworn, testified as
- 25 follows:

1 EXAMINATION

- 2 BY MR. DANDINO:
- 3 Q. Please state your name and address.
- 4 A. Sarah Pilgrim, 304 Franklin, Walnut Grove,
- 5 Missouri 65770.
- 6 Q. Who is your local telephone company?
- 7 A. Southwestern Bell.
- 8 Q. And are you a subscriber to the MCA service?
- 9 A. Yes, sir.
- 10 Q. Go ahead. Your comments, please.
- 11 A. Okay. It's been commented on several times
- 12 tonight about the -- the notice or the lack of
- 13 notice. The little notice that came out in the
- 14 Springfield paper Sunday morning -- Ms. McVay
- is who I think made a lot of Walnut Grove
- 16 aware. She happened to see it. Some people
- 17 sitting next to me pointed out that it wasn't
- in the outlying papers at all. You know,
- 19 there's several outlying papers that I think --
- I feel it should be in because many people
- 21 don't take the Springfield paper.
- 22 Also the time listed in the paper, 6:30 to
- 8:30, and the address was 840 Boonville. I
- 24 think it -- I hope in the future when there are
- 25 meetings that whoever is responsible for

```
1 publicizing the meetings -- I hope it'll get
```

- better because -- I mean get better service
- 3 from you because that made us suspicious right
- 4 off. I'll just have to tell you, I -- I was so
- 5 upset all day because I thought I was going to
- 6 lose my local -- my MCA, you know. It's --
- 7 it's wonderful to have this.
- 8 Another thing, I -- I have a question, if
- 9 I can. This -- this hearing is put on by the
- 10 Missouri Public Service Commission; is that
- 11 right?
- 12 JUDGE DIPPELL: That's correct.
- 13 THE WITNESS: Who are the constituents?
- Who are your constituents?
- 15 JUDGE DIPPELL: The Missouri Public
- 16 Service Commission is in charge of regulating
- the publicly-owned utilities, so we service
- both the customers and the companies.
- 19 A. Okay. Well, the reason I asked, like I say, I
- 20 was pretty upset. So I phoned my
- 21 representative, E-mailed, and also my senator.
- 22 And I received a fax from Senator Westfall that
- I feel should have been available to the -- to
- 24 all the public. I have several copies of it if
- you would like to see it. I'd love for you to

- 1 see it.
- 2 JUDGE DIPPELL: If you'd like to put it in
- 3 the record, that would be fine.
- 4 THE WITNESS: Do I just hand this to you
- 5 or who do I give it to?
- 6 MR. DANDINO: I'll take that.
- 7 JUDGE DIPPELL: I'll just mark that as
- 8 Exhibit 1 for the public hearing and that way
- 9 it will be in the transcript.
- 10 (Public Hearing Deposition Exhibit 1
- 11 marked for identification.)
- MR. DANDINO: Your Honor, at this time I'd
- just like to offer it in the record as
- 14 Exhibit 1.
- 15 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. We don't have
- an opportunity for the people to make
- objections as such as evidence, but I would --
- 18 since the witness is referring to it, I'll let
- 19 her put it in the transcript if you want it to
- 20 be evidence at the evidentiary hearing.
- 21 MR. DANDINO: Sure. I'll have to
- 22 separately introduce it. I meant only for this
- 23 record.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you.
- 25 THE WITNESS: I don't understand. You

```
don't want me to read it, do you?
```

- JUDGE DIPPELL: I'm just trying to say
- 3 that I want it to be in the record since that's
- 4 what you're testifying from.
- 5 THE WITNESS: Okay.
- 6 JUDGE DIPPELL: Whether or not it can be
- 7 considered evidence without the attorneys
- 8 having an opportunity to object, we'll deal
- 9 with that as -- at the evidentiary hearing.
- 10 THE WITNESS: Okay. So I just move on
- 11 from that? Because I have a couple more
- 12 things.
- MR. DANDINO: Yes, please do.
- 14 THE WITNESS: Okay. Thank you.
- 15 A. It has been rumored, and it's worried about,
- the fact that there is talk of change, that
- 17 perhaps one of the options might be that we
- 18 wouldn't have two-way service, we would only
- 19 have one-way service. It -- like those of us
- 20 who live in Walnut Grove could call
- 21 Springfield, but Springfield could not call
- 22 us. And I -- we do not want that. I mean that
- 23 would just be -- I hope that that option will
- 24 be struck because that's not a good option.
- I think it's very unfair for those of us

1 who live down here in the corner of southwest

- 2 Missouri to have to -- to have to do pittance
- 3 for those people who live in the big cities of
- 4 Kansas City and St. Louis. I feel like if
- 5 there's a problem in Kansas City and St. Louis
- 6 that it should be dealt with in those areas,
- 7 you know, not make us have to give up what we
- 8 feel like is a very good thing to -- to
- 9 compensate for what's going on in the big
- 10 cities.
- 11 And I do appreciate you letting me talk.
- 12 JUDGE DIPPELL: We appreciate you being
- 13 here. Just hold your seat for just one
- moment.
- Mr. Dandino, did you have any additional
- 16 questions?
- MR. DANDINO: No, your Honor. Thank you.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Ms. Kardis?
- MS. KARDIS: No questions.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Murray?
- 21 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions.
- 22 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Schemenauer?
- COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: No questions.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Just let me address this
- just briefly. I saw you looking towards the

1 staff when you were speaking of the notice, and 2. I will let everyone know that I'm responsible for the notice. So I do apologize for the 3 incorrect address. That's just my 5 unfamiliarity with the City of Springfield, not 6 realizing that the person -- the address of the person handling the scheduling of the room was 7 8 a different building. And I will make sure 9 that that gets corrected in future public 10 hearings. 11 Also, you made a comment about a newspapers. And we did order -- and I will 12 speak to our information officer to make sure 13 that he did, but I believe all of the 14 newspapers that are in the Secretary of State's 15 office directory should have received notice. 16 17 That does not mean they publish it, but they did receive notice, and then they choose 18 19 whether or not to publish that notice or not. MR. DANDINO: Your Honor, if I may, also, 20 the Office of Public Counsel sent out a press 21 22 release on Wednesday to all the media in the area, not only to the newspapers, but also 23 radio stations, television from down to Joplin 24 25 up to Lebanon in order to try to encourage

```
1 people to come to this hearing. And, again,
```

- 2 sent out a copy of the handout to those same
- media on Friday trying to encourage, you know,
- 4 some type of coverage on that. But once,
- 5 again, as your Honor said, we can send it to
- 6 them, but they don't necessarily have to print
- 7 it or announce it. And then sometimes they
- 8 don't even print it accurately.
- 9 JUDGE DIPPELL: So I do appreciate the
- 10 fact that people that saw it got the word out.
- 11 And we do have a good crowd, and I do
- 12 appreciate that. And I just wanted to let you
- know we're always willing to try to improve
- 14 where we can. So we do take your comments to
- 15 heart. Thank you.
- 16 THE WITNESS: Thank you.
- 17 MR. DANDINO: Dennis Overall.
- 18 Please spell your name for the court
- 19 reporter.
- 20 MR. OVERALL: Dennis Overall,
- 21 O-v-e-r-a-l-l. I reside in Springfield. I own
- 22 a business in Springfield.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Can I swear you in before
- you begin to testify, sir?
- 25 DENNIS OVERALL,

1 called as a witness on behalf of the public,

- 2 having been first duly sworn, testified as
- 3 follows:
- 4 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you.
- 5 EXAMINATION
- 6 BY MR. DANDINO:
- 7 Q. Sir, could you give your name and address for
- 8 the record?
- 9 A. My name is Dennis Overall, reside at 1655 South
- 10 Ingram Mill Road here in Springfield,
- 11 Missouri. I own a business here in town. I do
- 12 not feel like an increase is needed on
- anybody's phone bill. I do not see anything in
- this plan that says we're going to have new
- 15 wires, new -- new equipment or anything. I
- think everything needs to stay as it is. Any
- 17 changes to senior citizens on a fixed budget or
- 18 people on minimum wage would affect this quite
- 19 a bit.
- I also would like to address a problem
- that I've tried to get addressed, and I haven't
- had much luck with it. And that is when we go
- to a pay phone, and we have an emergency
- 24 situation where we need to interrupt a phone
- line, we are charged \$1.85 to interrupt a

1 busy. A lot of people don't know that. It's

- 2 not printed in the phone book. And I do feel
- 3 like that if there's going to be any charges to
- 4 anybody in a phone book, it should at least be
- 5 printed. That's all I can say.
- 6 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you.
- 7 Mr. Dandino?
- 8 MR. DANDINO: I have no further questions.
- 9 JUDGE DIPPELL: Any other questions
- 10 from counsel?
- MS. KARDIS: No questions.
- 12 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Murray?
- 13 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Just one.
- 14 EXAMINATION
- 15 BY COMMISSIONER MURRAY:
- 16 Q. You said that you have a business?
- 17 A. Yes.
- 18 Q. I wanted to ask, are you an MCA subscriber for
- 19 your business or your residence or both?
- 20 A. Business.
- 21 Q. Business, all right.
- 22 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Thank you.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: And, Commissioner
- Schemenauer, did you have any questions?
- 25 COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: No.

- 1 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, sir.
- 2 MR. DANDINO: Thank you, sir.
- 4 You might want to pull over to that other
- 5 mike there. I think that's the live one.
- 6 Please spell your name for the court
- 7 reporter, sir.
- 8 MR. JOHNSON: My first name is spelled
- 9 I-v-e-r. Last name is Johnson, J-o-h-n-s-o-n.
- 10 JUDGE DIPPELL: Would you please raise
- 11 your right hand, sir.
- 12 IVER JOHNSON,
- 13 called as a witness on behalf of the public,
- 14 having been first duly sworn, testified as
- 15 follows:
- 16 EXAMINATION
- 17 BY MR. DANDINO:
- 18 Q. Please state your name and address for the
- 19 record.
- 20 A. My name is Iver Johnson. I reside at 904
- 21 Auburn Drive in Ash Grove, Missouri.
- 22 Q. And are you a subscriber to MCA?
- 23 A. Yes, sir, I am.
- 24 Q. And who is your local telephone company?
- 25 A. Southwestern Bell.

1 Q. And I believe you are an alderman; is that

- 2 correct?
- 3 A. Yes, sir, I am.
- 4 Q. For that city?
- 5 A. For the City of Ash Grove, yes.
- 6 Q. Yes, the City of Ash Grove. Go ahead with your
- 7 comments, sir.
- 8 A. I have just a few points here, and they will be
- 9 brief.
- 10 First of all, I'd like to state that we
- are very pleased with the service that we have
- in our MCA 2 area. We would not desire to see
- any change to that. If -- if the commissioners
- 14 feel that there is a need for additional
- 15 competition for other phone companies to have
- 16 access, we think that's fine so long as
- 17 competition does not wind up costing us more
- money.
- 19 At this point, the \$2 proposed surcharge
- for the change to the MCA 1 area represents
- 21 approximately a 20 percent increase in the
- service charge that we are already paying in
- 23 the MCA 2 area. We feel that is a patently
- 24 unfair procedure to provide access to other
- telephone companies, and we strongly voice an

- 1 objection to it.
- 2 We desire not to have to change telephone
- 3 numbers again. In our particular area the
- 4 subscribers to the MCA 2 have a 751 prefix, and
- 5 those who do not have a 672 prefix. People are
- 6 used to that, and it would be unfortunate if
- 7 all of the telephone numbers would have to
- 8 change just to make this accommodation. So if
- 9 there's some way that that could be prevented,
- that would be our request.
- We see the need to expand the area beyond
- 12 the MCA 2 limits that are currently set. As an
- example, for our community, the City of Ash
- Grove, we have a school district that
- 15 encompasses an area significantly wider than
- the city limits. And those people communicate
- with and are a part of the community, even
- 18 though they are in somewhat of a rural setting
- 19 with country-type homes. It would be
- 20 beneficial to them also to have this type of
- 21 service available.
- When you consider that a telephone is no
- 23 longer a luxury -- a telephone today is an
- 24 absolute necessity. It's necessary for
- 25 medical, access to major cities such as the

1 hospitals in Springfield, and whatever can be

- 2 done to improve that access to the local
- 3 residents will provide greater service to
- 4 people here in Missouri. And that's our
- 5 request.
- 6 The last point that I would like to
- 7 address concerns the proposed \$2 charge for
- 8 converting the MCA 1 principal area to include
- 9 the City of Springfield. And by doing that, to
- 10 make that benefit to the residents of
- 11 Springfield to have access to nonoptional
- 12 subscribers at no cost and ask the people in
- the MCA 2 areas to bear that cost seems quite
- 14 unfair.
- When you consider the population of
- 16 Springfield alone, it's close to 160,000
- 17 people. Our community is just over 1100.
- 18 Springfield outpopulates us by more than 150 to
- 19 1. If you take the entire MCA area that
- 20 surrounds Springfield, the MCA 2 area, and look
- 21 at the total population there, you're looking
- at somewhere close to 30,000 people.
- 23 Springfield alone, not including these
- 24 peripheral cities right around, but Springfield
- alone, outpopulates the entire MCA area at

- least five to one or perhaps even greater.
- 2 If there's to be an increase in rates
- 3 to -- to make this whole process work, if
- 4 that's necessary to raise money for capital
- 5 costs, it would seem more appropriate to
- 6 possibly rearrange the basic rate in the
- 7 Springfield MCA 1 area. A small increase to
- 8 the greater population could more easily be
- 9 born than asking an almost 20 percent increase
- 10 to a lesser population in the outlying areas.
- 11 And I might add that the people in the
- 12 outlying areas benefit the City of Springfield
- as the principal area because they do their
- shopping there for major items, for major
- services, for medical services, all of those
- things these people are dependent upon, and we
- must contact the principal area for that. So
- 18 whatever we do benefits the commerce of the
- 19 principal area. And I would ask that the rate
- structure be looked at and possibly be
- 21 considered as to equity.
- 22 And I will thank you for listening.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you very much.
- Mr. Dandino?
- MR. DANDINO: No further questions, your

- 1 Honor.
- 2 JUDGE DIPPELL: Is there anything further
- 3 from counsel?
- 4 MS. KARDIS: No questions.
- 5 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Murray?
- 6 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions.
- 7 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Schemenauer?
- 8 COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: Yes.
- 9 EXAMINATION
- 10 BY COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER:
- 11 Q. Just that when you mentioned the proposed \$2
- increase, where did you read that? I mean --
- 13 A. It was mentioned here that that would be a
- possibility.
- 15 Q. You mean in the handout that you have?
- 16 A. Yes, sir.
- 17 Q. Okay. I --
- 18 A. It said somewhere in the range of perhaps a 1
- 19 to \$2 increase. And in some of the more
- 20 outlying areas it suggested rates as high as a
- 21 2 to \$6 increase.
- 22 Q. And that's one of the proposals that is before
- 23 us?
- 24 A. Yes, it's in the handout.
- 25 O. It's this one?

- 1 A. Yes, sir.
- 2 Q. Well, those are -- I mean there will probably
- 3 be a whole lot of proposals in this case, and
- 4 we will address them as -- you know, as they
- 5 come before us. But --
- 6 A. I would quote you here in one sentence. It
- 7 says, "If such projections are accurate" -- and
- 8 this is a projection, "most customers,
- 9 approximately 97 percent, would experience a
- 10 rate increase of \$2 or less per month in their
- 11 MCA rate. A small percentage of MCA
- 12 subscribers, approximately 2 percent, may
- receive a rate increase ranging from 2 to \$6,
- and then a small group of 1 percent may
- experience a rate increase ranging from 6 to
- 16 \$13 per month."
- 17 And all I'm asking is that the
- 18 commissioners study the rate structure and find
- an equitable method by which this can be
- 20 apportioned equally or more fairly among all of
- 21 the subscribers in the general metropolitan
- area.
- 23 Q. Okay. And I understand you completely. You
- 24 are not in favor of increasing the MCA rates
- 25 for anyone, correct?

- 1 A. Not if it's absolutely necessary, no, sir.
- 2 Q. All right. You mentioned one of the proposals
- 3 before us, and you are on the record as
- 4 opposing that, and I hear you. Thank you.
- 5 A. Thank you, sir.
- 6 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you very much.
- 7 MR. DANDINO: Thank you, Mr. Johnson.
- 8 Bill Ferguson, please.
- 9 MR. DANDINO: Please spell your name for
- 10 the court reporter.
- 11 MR. FERGUSON: Bill, B-i-l-l,
- 12 F-e-r-g-u-s-o-n.
- 13 JUDGE DIPPELL: Would you please raise
- 14 your right hand, sir.
- 15 BILL FERGUSON,
- 16 called as a witness on behalf of the public,
- 17 having been first duly sworn, testified as
- 18 follows:
- 19 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you.
- 20 EXAMINATION
- 21 BY MR. DANDINO:
- 22 Q. Please state your name and address for the
- 23 record.
- 24 A. Bill Ferguson, 214 South Washington, Walnut
- 25 Grove.

1 Q. And who is your local telephone company?

- 2 A. Southwestern Bell.
- 3 Q. Okay. And are you an MCA subscriber?
- 4 A. I am.
- 5 Q. And you are an alderman with the City?
- 6 A. I am an alderman. And I would like to speak in
- 7 both capacities, as a citizen and as an
- 8 alderman.
- 9 Q. Please do. Go ahead.
- 10 A. As a citizen, we are happy with the MCA program
- as it stands, real concerned with the option of
- 12 competition increasing prices. That's normally
- adverse to the information that you'd expect to
- 14 hear.
- I have one issue as an alderman that I
- need to bring up, and one constituent that was
- 17 concerned that the increase to them would be
- 18 extreme because they do not currently subscribe
- 19 to MCA, and their concern was that they would
- 20 have to. Being on a fixed income, they were
- very concerned about that and would expect, in
- their opinion, that everybody's phone bill is
- going to go up if competition makes the prices
- 24 go up.
- 25 JUDGE DIPPELL: Is that all of your

- 1 comments?
- 2 THE WITNESS: That's all my comments.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Dandino?
- 4 MR. DANDINO: I have nothing further.
- 5 JUDGE DIPPELL: Are there any other
- 6 questions from counsel?
- 7 MS. KARDIS: No questions, your Honor.
- 8 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Murray?
- 9 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions.
- 10 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Schemenauer?
- 11 COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: No questions.
- 12 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you very much, sir.
- MR. DANDINO: Neal Grubaugh.
- Mr. Grubaugh, please spell your name for
- 15 the court reporter.
- MR. GRUBAUGH: N-e-a-l, G-r-u-b-a-u-q-h.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Would you please raise
- 18 your right hand, sir.
- 19 NEAL GRUBAUGH,
- 20 called as a witness on behalf of the public,
- 21 having been first duly sworn, testified as
- 22 follows:
- 23 EXAMINATION
- 24 BY MR. DANDINO:
- 25 Q. Please state your name and address.

1 A. Neal Grubaugh, 804 East Dawn, Ozark, Missouri.

- 2 Q. And who is your local telephone company?
- 3 A. GTE.
- 4 Q. And are you an MCA subscriber?
- 5 A. Yes, I am.
- 6 Q. And you are an alderman for the City of Ozark?
- 7 A. I am.
- 8 Q. Okay. Please go ahead with your comments,
- 9 sir.
- 10 A. I just don't want to take any more of your
- 11 time. I just want to say that I agree with
- most with what has been said before. We are
- pleased that there is no plan to do away with
- 14 MCA. The only question that I have asked, and
- 15 I will speak for myself as well as the
- 16 constituents of the city that have spoken with
- me, is when we live practically close in on the
- 18 principal area, we still have to pay the basic
- 19 rate or the residential rate as well as the
- 20 optional rate. And that's the one question
- 21 that they asked, and that's basically mine. I
- 22 want to agree with the people, and I won't take
- 23 the time to -- for -- other than that.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, sir.
- 25 Any further questions, Mr. Dandino?

- 1 MR. DANDINO: No, your Honor.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Counsel?
- MS. KARDIS: No questions.
- 4 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Murray?
- 5 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions.
- 6 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Schemenauer?
- 7 COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: No questions.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, sir.
- 9 MR. DANDINO: Thank you.
- 10 Mark Spinabella.
- 11 Please spell your name for the court
- 12 reporter, sir.
- MR. SPINABELLA: M-a-r-k,
- S-p-i-n-a-b-e-l-l-a.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Would you please raise
- 16 your right hand, sir.
- 17 MARK SPINABELLA,
- 18 called as a witness on behalf of the public,
- 19 having been first duly sworn, testified as
- 20 follows:
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you.
- 22 EXAMINATION
- BY MR. DANDINO:
- 24 Q. Please state your name and address for the
- 25 record, sir.

1 A. Okay. Mark Spinabella, 1609 Melanie Court,

- 2 Ozark, Missouri.
- 3 Q. Who is your local telephone company?
- 4 A. GTE.
- 5 Q. And are you an MCA subscriber?
- 6 A. Yes, I am.
- 7 Q. Please go ahead with your comments.
- 8 A. I'm not going to say too much. Like Neal said,
- 9 I'd like to keep our numbers the same in
- 10 Ozark. I'm also alderman for our area. And
- 11 I'd like to look at changing to MCA 1 for Ozark
- instead of MCA 2 due to our proximity to
- 13 Ozark -- to Springfield. I'd like no rate
- 14 increase and might look into including Branson
- into the MCA 2 service area.
- 16 And the biggest thing, I was at our local
- 17 newspaper today, and they still have not got
- 18 the -- or received the fax. So I don't know
- 19 what happened on the breakdown of
- 20 communication.
- 21 JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. Thank you. I will
- investigate that.
- 23 THE WITNESS: The City Hall did get it but
- not the newspaper.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you.

1 Did you have anything further Mr. Dandino?

- 2 MR. DANDINO: No.
- 3 Q. (By Mr. Dandino) Oh, Mr. Spinabella, are you
- 4 an alderman for the City?
- 5 A. Yes, I am.
- 6 MR. DANDINO: Okay. Thank you. That's
- 7 all I have.
- 8 JUDGE DIPPELL: Any further questions from
- 9 counsel?
- 10 MS. KARDIS: No questions.
- 11 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Murray?
- 12 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Schemenauer?
- 14 COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: No questions.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, sir.
- 16 THE WITNESS: Thank you.
- 17 MR. DANDINO: Your Honor, I don't have any
- other witnesses.
- 19 Is there anyone else that's not testified
- that wishes to testify now?
- 21 Seeing none, your Honor, I have no further
- 22 questions.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you very much.
- 24 Well, I would say again that I appreciate
- all of you coming out this evening, giving up

- 1 your evening to put your input in here.
- 2 Members of the staff, and there are some
- 3 representatives from the various companies, and
- 4 also Mr. Dandino and his staff are going to be
- 5 around right after, immediately after, if you
- 6 have specific questions.
- 7 Again, the commissioners appreciate you
- 8 being here.
- 9 Would you like to say anything in closing
- 10 Commissioner Murray?
- 11 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: I believe you
- 12 covered it, Judge Dippell. We do appreciate
- your time, and we do take your comments
- 14 seriously. And the other commissioners who
- were not here tonight will be reading the
- transcript, so your comments will be shared
- with all of the commissioners.
- 18 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Schemenauer,
- 19 did you want to make closing comments?
- 20 COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: I'd just like
- 21 to thank everybody for coming, and we do hear
- 22 and we do listen, and we appreciate all your
- comments.
- JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you very much. I'll
- 25 bring the hearing to a conclusion then. We can
