BE IT REMEMBERED, that the above-entitled matter came on for public hearing at the Incline Village Community Center, 1226 Fairway Drive, in the City of Foristell, State of Missouri, on the 11th day of March, A.D., 2002, commencing at 6:00 in the afternoon of that day, said hearing having been called by the Public Service Commission pursuant to the issuance of due notice to all parties in interest, and the following is the transcript of all proceedings had during the course of said hearing.

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1 (Thereupon, the hearing was called to order.) 2 JUDGE HOPKINS: If you would like to testify and if you have not already signed up on the sign-up 3 sheet, we have one here, and I believe there is another 4 one circulating. 5 6 Barb, do you still have that? 7 MS. MEISENHEIMER: I brought it back, and I'll go get it. 8 9 JUDGE HOPKINS: If anyone wants to testify, 10 we certainly want to give you the opportunity to testify. We have here tonight Ruth O'Neill from the 11 Office of Public Counsel. 12 13 We have Keith Krueger. He is from the General Counsel of the Public Service Commission, and Mr. 14 15 Kurt Schaefer, who is representing the water company. 16 My name is Bill Hopkins. I'm the appointed 17 judge tonight. And I will be the presiding officer here 18 tonight in the public hearing in Case No. WC-2002155, 19 titled Office of the Public Counsel versus Warren County 20 Water & Sewer Company and Gary L. Smith. First of all let, me thank the folks at 21 22 Incline Village or the use of their facility, and I want to note that the views expressed are not necessarily those 23 24 of Incline Village. 25 Let me introduce to you the commissioners who

1 are present this evening to hear the testimony. 2 To my far left is Commissioner Connie Murray, 3 and this is Commissioner Sheila Lumpe on my right here, and this is our newest commissioner, Bryan Forbis. 4 Let me ask these lawyers here, that I 5 previously introduced, if you would formally enter your 6 7 appearance for the record, starting with Ms. O'Neill. MS. O'NEILL: Yes. Hi. My name is Ruth 8 9 O'Neill, and I represent the Office of the Public Counsel, 10 and we represent the public. My address is Post Office Box 7800, Jefferson 11 City, Missouri 65102. 12 Also from my office that are here tonight are 13 14 Kimberly Bolin and Barbara Meisenheimer, and they are also 15 available if you want to talk to them later. 16 MR. KRUEGER: My name is Keith R. Krueger, 17 and I represent the staff of the Missouri Public Service Commission. My address is P.O. Box 360, Jefferson City, 18 19 Missouri 65102. 20 Also here from the staff tonight are Steve 21 Loethen, Martin Hummel, Tracie Hunsaker and Kay Niemeier. 22 MR. SCHAEFER: Kurt Schaefer, with the law 23 firm of Lathrop & Gage. I represent Warren County Water & 24 Sewer Company. My address is 326 East Capitol Avenue, Jefferson City, Missouri 65101. 25

1	JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you.
2	We are going to ask you to be sworn in before
3	you testify.
4	I had a real interesting question come up,
5	and they wanted to know why we didn't swear in the
6	lawyers, and the reason for that is because lawyers are
7	called officers of the court. This is not a court. This
8	is an administrative agency, but, nonetheless, lawyers are
9	called officers of the court, and they are considered to
10	be always under oath. If they would commit some kind of
11	perjury, or something, which I felt needed to be reported
12	to the Office of the Chief Disciplinary Counsel, I would
13	do so, so that is why we don't swear lawyers in.
14	We are here from the Missouri Public Service
15	Commission, and that is a state agency that regulates
16	investor owned utility companies in Missouri.
17	We ensure that the rates are just and
18	reasonable, that the quality of service is satisfactory,
19	and that safety practices are employed in their
20	operations, while at the same time ensuring the utility
21	company a reasonable, an opportunity for a reasonable rate
22	of return for their shareholders.
23	The Missouri Public Service Commission is
24	made up of five commissioners who are appointed by the
25	governor and confirmed by the senate of the State of

1 Missouri, and they hear and decide cases regarding the 2 public utility issues regulated. 3 I introduced you to three of the commissioners who are here tonight. 4 The commissioners who are not present are the 5 6 Chair, Kelvin Simmons, and Commissioner Steve Gaw. 7 All of the commissioners, including those who 8 are not currently present, will have the opportunity to 9 read all of the witnesses' testimony and remarks that we 10 take down tonight. The Missouri Public Service Commission 11 employs a staff of engineers, accountants, attorneys, 12 13 financial analysts, and other specialists in the field of 14 utility regulations, and the Commission relies upon their 15 expertise, along with other expert testimony and consumer 16 testimony. 17 These people that are here, that introduced 18 themselves earlier, represent the PSC Water Staff, the 19 Office of the General Counsel, the Office of the Public 20 Counsel and, of course, the water company is here. 21 The Public Counsel represented by Miss 22 O'Neill here is from the Office of the Public Counsel, and 23 it's separate from the PSC. They represent the public's 24 interest, specifically the Board of Public Service 25 Commission.

1	The purpose of this hearing tonight is to get
2	your input and to take evidence by way of your statement
3	or testimony, or any other written statements or documents
4	that you may wish to provide to the Missouri Public
5	Service Commission regarding allegations against Warren
6	County Water & Sewer Company and Gary L. Smith, and we
7	will take your comments tonight and we will have these
8	transcribed by the court reporter here, and all of the
9	commissioners will be able to read the transcript, and if
10	I could just say one thing here.
11	This is the night for your testimony, and we
12	don't allow questions to the commissioners, or to me, or
13	to the lawyers, or to anybody else that is here, the water
14	company, or the staff, or anybody else. That is not what
15	happens here tonight.
16	We are here for your testimony, and we are
17	merely interested in hearing your testimony, and this lady
18	right here is a court reporter and, like the rest of us,
19	she can't listen to two people at the same time, so if
20	someone else is speaking, please wait your turn so we can
21	be sure to get down every word.
22	At this time I'm going to ask if any of the
23	commissioners would like to have this time for an opening
24	statement.
25	Commissioner Murray?

COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No. I will pass. 1 2 JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Lumpe? COMMISSIONER LUMPE: Just briefly. We really 3 appreciate you coming out. It's a very good crowd, and we 4 look forward to hearing your testimony and what it is you 5 would like to tell us. 6 7 As the Judge said, this is the time for consumers to testify and tell us what your concerns are, 8 9 so we do appreciate you coming out, and we look forward to 10 hearing what your concerns are. JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Forbis? 11 COMMISSIONER FORBIS: You did a fine job. 12 13 Thank you. JUDGE HOPKINS: Public Counsel, do you wish 14 15 to make an opening statement? 16 MS. O'NEILL: Thank you. 17 Do you want me to go to the microphone? JUDGE HOPKINS: If you would, so everybody 18 19 can hear you. 20 MS. O'NEILL: Good evening, Your Honor, 21 Commissioners, Counsel, and good evening to all of you 22 customers of Warren County Water & Sewer Company. 23 My name is Ruth O'Neill and, if you don't 24 mind, I'll turn this a little bit so I talk. 25 As I said earlier, I am an attorney with the

1 Office of the Public Counsel. That is a state agency, and 2 our job is to represent the concerns of you, the public, in cases which come before the Missouri Public Service 3 Commission. 4 And in this particular case, my office has 5 6 filed a complaint with the Commission where we have made 7 some allegations regarding this company and its 8 management. 9 Those are on this blue sheet, which the 10 Commission prepared for you to kind of get an idea of what 11 is going on tonight. When I said we represent the public, that is 12 13 the public in general. I don't represent any particular 14 faction. I don't represent just part of the customers in 15 this case, because my office represents residential 16 consumers and small business customers, and in this 17 particular case everybody is a customer, at least would 18 qualify, residential customer or small business customer, 19 so my office serves everybody. 20 I do encourage you to come up and testify if 21 you would like to tell the Commission about your 22 experiences with this company, and I know there is a 23 sign-up sheet still going around. 24 Thank you so much for coming out, and we look 25 forward to hearing what you have to say. What you say,

1 your testimony is evidence in this case, and that is one 2 of the reasons that the court reporter is writing down what you say, so we really appreciate you coming out. 3 Thank you. 4 JUDGE HOPKINS: Counsel, any statement? 5 MR. KRUEGER: No, Your Honor, I don't have a 6 7 statement at this time. Thank you. JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Schaefer? 8 9 MR. SCHAEFER: No, Judge, I don't have a 10 statement at this time. JUDGE HOPKINS: We will now proceed with the 11 taking of testimony at this time, and if someone says what 12 you wanted to say, or if you don't want to testify, you 13 don't have to, even though you signed up. And since this 14 15 is an official hearing, we have to swear the witnesses in, 16 and I'll swear you in. 17 When I call your name, if you wouldn't mind to come up here and stand up here and testify and, after 18 19 you're sworn, we will ask you to state and spell your name 20 and address, please. 21 So the first person on the list is Nick 22 Kientzle. 23 (Thereupon, Nick Kientzle was sworn.) 24 JUDGE HOPKINS: Please state and spell your 25 name.

MR. KIENTZLE: My name is Nick Kientzle, 1 2 K-i-e-n-t-z-l-e, and I live at, or my residence is 1145 3 Hillside Drive. JUDGE HOPKINS: Go ahead. 4 MR. KIENTZLE: I wasn't aware I was going to 5 6 be up here doing this. 7 My complaint basically is when we were building our house we built simultaneously with our next 8 9 door neighbor, Joe Turbach, at 1137 Hillside, and there 10 was a fourteen hundred dollar charge for trenching and connecting to the water. That is digging a ditch across 11 the road and connecting to the other side of the road for 12 13 water. 14 At the time when we built, there was one 15 trench built, and at that time Gary connected both my 16 water and my next door neighbor's service and charged us 17 both fourteen hundred dollars. Also by doing that, by 18 connecting there on that side, which I was not conferred 19 with when he made the connection, he brought the water 20 into a finished part of my house, rather than an 21 unfinished part of my house, and that is basically what 22 I'm complaining about. 23 JUDGE HOPKINS: Let me see if any of the 24 attorneys or commissioners want to ask any questions. Ms. O'Neill? 25

1 MS. O'NEILL: Mr. Kientzle, you're a customer 2 of Warren County Water & Sewer; is that right? 3 MR. KIENTZLE: Yes. MS. O'NEILL: I have no questions. 4 JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Krueger? 5 MR. KRUEGER: No questions, Your Honor. 6 JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Schaefer? 7 8 MR. SCHAEFER: No questions. 9 JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Murray? 10 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: When you say into a finished area of your home, brought it in there instead of 11 an unfinished area --12 13 MR. KIENTZLE: Yes, ma'am. COMMISSIONER MURRAY: -- what do you mean, 14 15 exactly? 16 MR. KIENTZLE: Well, instead of connecting to 17 the unfinished part of the basement, it comes into a bedroom, finished side, and then we had to divert the 18 19 water up and over to the unfinished part, so I mean we got 20 around the issue, but it would have been better had it been brought into the unfinished part of the basement. 21 22 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: How is your service 23 otherwise? 24 MR. KIENTZLE: Well, we are moving in here 25 April 3rd, so I have no pros or cons about the service, as

1 far as that goes.

2	COMMISSIONER MURRAY: All right. Thank you.
3	JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Lumpe?
4	COMMISSIONER LUMPE: No questions.
5	JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Forbis?
6	COMMISSIONER FORBIS: No questions.
7	JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you very much, sir.
8	Mr. Stillman is next, and after Mr. Stillman
9	is David Turner.
10	(Thereupon, Chester Stillman was sworn.)
11	JUDGE HOPKINS: Would you please state and
12	spell your name, and give us your address, sir?
13	MR. STILLMAN: My name is Chester Stillman,
14	C-h-e-s-t-e-r, S-t-i-l-l-m-a-n. My address is 1153
15	Hillside Drive.
16	JUDGE HOPKINS: Go ahead.
17	MR. STILLMAN: My big problem is the water
18	pressure is just deteriorating something terrible. The
19	more homes that are built, the pressure keeps getting
20	worse, and it's to the point now where if we flush the
21	stool, the water in the basin won't hardly wash the soap
22	off, and it's a real concern. That is my biggest problem
23	right now.
24	JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you very much.
25	Miss O'Neill, any questions?

1	MS. O'NEILL: When you say your water
2	pressure, that is the water pressure you get from Warren
3	County Water & Sewer?
4	MR. STILLMAN: Yes.
5	MS. O'NEILL: That's all.
6	JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Krueger?
7	MR. KRUEGER: No questions, Your Honor.
8	JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Schaefer?
9	MR. SCHAEFER: No questions, sir.
10	JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Murray?
11	COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions. Thank
12	you.
13	JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Lumpe?
14	COMMISSIONER LUMPE: Is it your belief that
15	as they continue to build houses that that will continue
16	to make it worse?
17	MR. STILLMAN: Yes. When I moved in, I moved
18	in February 1, 1992, there were only like sixty something
19	homes in here. The pressure was pretty darn good at that
20	time, although the water had problems with rust and that
21	kind of stuff, but Gary has done some things that has
22	helped that situation, but the pressure now, we've got
23	probably 300 homes, or something, in here, and we don't
24	have no pressure at the top. Like last year one time, I
25	think there was a line cut or something, we didn't have

         any water at all. Down at the lake they got pressure
 2
         because they are low and, you know, they get further.
 3
                      COMMISSIONER LUMPE: It would be your
         perception that the system is not adequate now for the
 4
         number of --

                      MR. STILLMAN: As far as I'm concerned I

         don't think it is. I mean I can be watering the lawn with
         the sprinkler, and my wife can start the dishwasher or
 8

         something in the house, and you can't see the water come

         out.

                      JUDGE HOPKINS: Please state and spell your
25
         name for the court reporter, and then give your address?
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MR. TURNER: David R. Turner, T-u-r-n-e-r. 1 2 JUDGE HOPKINS: Your address? MR. TURNER: My address, 2818 Magnolia Drive, 3 Foristell, Missouri. 4 JUDGE HOPKINS: Go ahead. 5 6 MR. TURNER: Where do I start? Me and Gary, 7 we got a pretty long history of problems, really. 8 It starts out with the water problems back in 9 late '90s before I built my new house. I guess that would 10 be back in '97, when we would lose water for a day or two, you know, and I asked him if he is going to flush the 11 lines, and the lines would never be flushed. We lived at 12 the end of the line. 13 14 There was a fire hydrant right there on the 15 property. The water hydrant was never flushed. 16 The water was always dirty. We had a water 17 softener, water filters. The water still smelled bad. We built a new house in 1998. I mean I've 18 19 got it all documented. I could waste a lot of time here 20 telling you guys about all of this stuff. I can just give you this. I mean it's up to you. 21 22 I've got a new problem tonight. 23 I got home from work, which we have had 24 problems with our lift station before leaking up into our 25 laundry room because the top on the lid wasn't sealed

tight. Well the floats wouldn't work properly. It backed 1 2 up into our house. We had to clean that up. 3 Finally to fix that we screwed eye bolts onto the lid, so the lid would seat down tight. Nobody could 4 fall in it, but if the water comes up, instead of running 5 6 into the house, it will run into the yard, but tonight 7 when I got home we noticed a big wet spot on the asphalt out in front of our house that runs parallel with the 8 9 sewer line coming out, and there is a great big soggy 10 spot, so it looks like our sewer line is busted, or at least has a leak in it somewhere. 11 JUDGE HOPKINS: Okay, thank you. 12 MR. TURNER: We have already filed with the 13 Public Service Commission back in, in 2000, and we won the 14 15 case, but we have gotten nothing from it, and that's all 16 documented right here. 17 JUDGE HOPKINS: Any questions, Ms. O'Neill? MS. O'NEILL: Mr. Turner, you filed a 18 19 complaint regarding, was that regarding a connection to 20 your new house? 21 MR. TURNER: Yes. 22 MS. O'NEILL: And that is the one that was in 23 front of the Public Service Commission? 24 MR. TURNER: Right. 25 MS. O'NEILL: Thank you.

JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Krueger? 1 2 MR. KRUEGER: No questions, Your Honor. JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Schaefer? 3 MR. SCHAEFER: No questions, Your Honor. 4 5 JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Murray? COMMISSIONER MURRAY: I don't think so. 6 7 Thank you. 8 JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Lumpe? 9 COMMISSIONER LUMPE: Mr. Turner, we would want to have those documents. 10 MR. TURNER: You guys already have all of 11 these documents. You've got everything I have right here. 12 I've got some pictures in here, and you've got those. 13 I'll leave these with you if you want to look at them 14 15 tonight. 16 COMMISSIONER LUMPE: If we have them already, 17 that's fine. JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Forbis? 18 19 COMMISSIONER FORBIS: No. 20 JUDGE HOPKINS: All right. Earl Dennler is 21 next, and then after Mr. Dennler is a person who has 22 handwriting worse than mine. 23 Adrian; is that correct? No one wants to own 24 up to that. Anybody named Adrian here? Well, if Adrian 25 is not here --

MR. KUCHARCZYK: I'm here. 1 2 JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you, sir. You're next then after Mr. Dennler. 3 (Thereupon, Earl Dennler was sworn.) 4 JUDGE HOPKINS: Please state and spell your 5 6 name, and then give us your address? 7 MR. DENNLER: Earl Dennler, D-e-n-n-l-e-r, 2563 Fairway Drive. 8 9 I also am the chairman of the ACC. The ACC 10 is the Architectural Control Committee, and the things I 11 want to discuss about the water and sewer company are those things that concern the ACC and the water and sewer 12 13 company. 14 JUDGE HOPKINS: Go right ahead. 15 MR. DENNLER: Here on Cypress Street we have 16 a hydrant that is sunk down very low and it needs an 17 extension, and that extension has been really needed since 18 about June of last year, and it has a cap that is off of 19 it, and I have a picture of that here. And you may 20 already have this picture, but I will give it to you. 21 JUDGE HOPKINS: I want to know, for the 22 record, if we have that? 23 MS. O'NEILL: I don't know that we have. We 24 may want to have this marked, Your Honor. 25 JUDGE HOPKINS: As a Public Counsel exhibit?

MS. O'NEILL: That will be fine. 1 2 JUDGE HOPKINS: We'll mark this as Public Counsel Exhibit No. 1. 3 (Public Counsel Exhibit No. 1 marked.) 4 JUDGE HOPKINS: Go ahead, sir. 5 6 MR. DENNLER: One of the complaints that the ACC has about the water and sewer company has to do with 7 8 our roads. A lot of times we have to -- the roads have to 9 be bored in order to get to the water connection or the 10 sewer connection. Sometimes the water and sewer connection is 11 12 on the side of the road where they are building a home, 13 where that is not required, but many times it's on the other side, and our guidelines specify that the water and 14 15 sewer company shall contact the ACC committee prior to 16 boring so that we can be there to observe the boring, and 17 that way we can tell if they actually took the borer and 18 cut the road, and that doesn't happen too often for us. 19 I have been the ACC chairman since June of 20 this last year, and I have been notified one time by one of the workers that they were going to bore, and I know 21 22 the other chairman of the ACC prior to me had similar 23 problems, as well as the problems that I'm having. 24 Also, I have one of the contracts for the 25 water and sewer company, and the contract states it should

be \$1200 instead of \$1400 for cutting the road, and I 1 2 thought I might draw that to your attention because that is, at least, in the contract that I have in my files. 3 I had to tell the water and sewer company one 4 day -- they were actually digging on the one lot, and the 5 6 owner called me and wanted to know what they were doing 7 there, so I went over and talked to them, and actually 8 what I found out was that they didn't have a contract with 9 that owner to do the digging, so I asked the water 10 company, you know, to please not dig, which they did, and got out of there, but I thought it was kind of strange 11 12 that they were over there digging, and they didn't want 13 them to dig because they didn't have a contract. They wanted to put copper pipe in from the house to the street, 14 15 so that was one of the reasons that they had asked me to 16 go over and talk to them. 17 Another complaint that we have against the water and sewer company is that we just don't feel that 18 they have the type of equipment that they really need to 19 20 do a good job of boring, because we do have a lot of rock under our roads here, and we end up having way too many 21 22 cuts on our road. I think we had thirty-six of them fixed this 23 24 last year, and I don't know how far back those actually

go, but when I observed the boring, it really wasn't

25

1 boring, it was pushing. It was pushing the rock under the 2 road kind of with a backhoe, you know, bring a backhoe 3 this way and push the rock through, and it just seems to me that they should have more sophisticated type equipment 4 for that type of job. 5 That's all that I have. 6 JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you, sir. 7 8 Any questions, Miss O'Neill? 9 MS. O'NEILL: Just a couple. 10 Sir, you have been talking about boring under the road as opposed to cutting the road. 11 12 Is there a reason that your committee decided 13 to ask the water company to bore instead of cut the road when they put their lines in? 14 15 MR. DENNLER: Yes, because it destroys like 16 the integrity of our roads, because a lot of times the 17 road isn't repaired exactly the way it should be and it 18 needs to be. It needs to be done with better material, 19 and we just really don't want it cut. 20 MS. O'NEILL: Were you on the committee when 21 the decision was made that you would ask that the road be 22 bored under instead of cut? Were you on the committee at that time, or did you come on after that policy started? 23 24 MR. DENNLER: I come on right about that 25 time, right about that time.

DENNLER: I don't know their name, but 4 it's the only house on Cypress Street. I couldn't tell 5 6 you their name. 7 MR. SCHAEFER: Does there appear on that photo to be dirt that has been put in around that fire 8 9 hydrant, fill, basically? 10 MR. DENNLER: Yes. What it appears to be is 11 like mud flow that come down from up above into that area. MR. SCHAEFER: Do you know who, if anyone, 12 actually filled that dirt in on that fire hydrant? 13 14 MR. DENNLER: No, sir. 15 MR. SCHAEFER: You discussed briefly a 16 distinction between the contract cost for road cutting. I 17 believe you said there is a difference between the \$1200 18 figure and \$1400 figure. 19 Are you aware whether or not there is a 20 difference between that amount for tariffed areas as 21 opposed to nontariffed areas? 22 MR. DENNLER: No. 23 MR. SCHAEFER: Are you aware of when the 24 dates of those contracts are? 25 MR. DENNLER: No, I'm not.

1 MR. SCHAEFER: Would you be aware if, for 2 example, the rate increased at a certain date, that the 3 contract may be for more at a later date after a contract increase? 4 5 MR. DENNLER: No. I wouldn't be aware of 6 that. 7 MR. SCHAEFER: Are you aware of the road cuts 8 that you were discussing, whether or not those road cuts 9 are actually provided by Warren County Sewer & Water as a 10 utility service, or whether or not those are actually 11 provided by Mr. Smith in his capacity as an independent 12 contractor? MR. DENNLER: I couldn't answer that and give 13 14 you a for sure answer. 15 MR. SCHAEFER: Thank you, Mr. Dennler. 16 JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Murray? 17 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions. JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Lumpe? 18 19 COMMISSIONER LUMPE: Thank you for your 20 testimony. 21 JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Forbis? 22 COMMISSIONER FORBIS: Nothing. 23 JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you, sir. 24 Okay. Adrian, and then after him is Bobby G. 25 Baker.

1 (Thereupon, Adrian Kucharczyk was sworn.) JUDGE HOPKINS: Would you please state and 2 spell your name for the court reporter, and then give your 3 address. 4 MR. KUCHARCZYK: My name is Adrian 5 Kucharczyk. A-d-r-i-a-n, the last name is 6 7 K-u-c-h-a-r-c-z-y-k. JUDGE HOPKINS: Go ahead. 8 9 MR. KUCHARCZYK: The only problems I had with the house was -- I'm new. I'm on 742 Willow Court. 10 Gary Smith was supposed to do work on my lift 11 station and he would show there and then he would leave. 12 13 He wouldn't finish it. I had to get my electrician. He said it was wired for a 110 and a 220, and it was only a 14 15 220 for that lift station, and he kept on arguing with me 16 it was a 110 and 220. 17 The 220 ran the lift station, and then I had, I had to set my own floats, and I had no idea what I was 18 19 doing with my floats, just to get my sewer going because I 20 had problems when it was running. When I finally tinkered around trying to get the floats right, I was getting sewer 21 22 in my basement, and I had to clean that all up, and that 23 was a mess. He seemed nice. And I'm still missing my 24 lift station lid that I was supposed to have, and I had it 25 on there, and he took it, I don't know what the reason

was, and I still don't have that today. I have a piece of
 plywood on top of it.

I drove by his house and I spoke with him five times and he said he would bring it by, and he never did, and I'm the kind of person, I'm laid back and I'm polite, I don't argue, and I'm still missing a water lid. I mean, like I said, I'm new here. I don't know -- I mean I have no idea about the lift station and all that.

10 I have one more thing to say, and that is when he ran my water line in, in the foundation, I had 11 12 water coming inside my foundation. I have mud stains 13 coming down on my concrete, but, I mean -- I mean that's little. I mean I can deal with that, but I mean just with 14 15 the lift station not working and all that, I had to clean 16 that for -- oh, it took me eight hours to clean that whole 17 thing, and I mentioned it to him on the phone. I was polite to him. I said I had this problem, and he had no 18 really like, "I'm sorry. We'll get this fixed for you." 19 20 He had his guys working there. I mean -- I don't know. I'm at work. I have no idea. He said he's going to take 21 22 a look at it. Me and my electrician -- I'm not an 23

24 electrician, but with the floats, to get it to working so 25 it can flush out, we messed with it in the nighttime just

to get it halfway decent, and I mentioned it to him, and 1 2 he didn't have the common courtesy to come out and say, 3 "Hey, let me help you on the floats," and that was really the only thing that really bugged me, but that's pretty 4 much all of what I have to say. 5 JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you, sir. 6 Miss O'Neill? 7 MS. O'NEILL: How long was it that you were 8 9 waiting for Warren County Water & Sewer to come in and 10 help you with your sewer to get the flow going before you 11 and the electrician tried to make it work yourselves? MR. KUCHARCZYK: I had the electrician out 12 13 there, but he kept on saying that I needed a 110 and a 14 220, and my electrician said on the specs for that lift 15 station there wasn't -- you did not need a 110. 220 would 16 have ran everything, and we figured out with the floats 17 and all that, that was what was my problem. MS. O'NEILL: About how long of a time 18 19 period? 20 MR. KUCHARCZYK: Oh, I would say at least 21 eight, nine months ago. 22 MS. O'NEILL: And how long, how long a time 23 period was it that you were trying to make your sewer 24 flow, that you weren't getting a response from the 25 company?

MR. KUCHARCZYK: Well, that was -- it's hard 1 2 to remember. When I was building -- I mean I was working. I would say -- oh, geez, I couldn't really tell you the 3 date. 4 MS. O'NEILL: Would you say that this problem 5 6 went on for several days? MR. KUCHARCZYK: Yes, and I mentioned it to 7 8 him, and he kept on replying like he was, you know, I 9 would have to have my electrician, but my electrician, we 10 figured it all out. MS. O'NEILL: Was this going on while you 11 were living in the home? 12 13 MR. KUCHARCZYK: Yes. MS. O'NEILL: About how long after you moved 14 15 into the house did you finally get your flow figured out 16 with your electrician? 17 MR. KUCHARCZYK: It was after -- it was 18 like -- it was before I lived in there. It was before, 19 and not when I was living there, thank God, because I've 20 got all of my stuff down in the basement. Still stuff got a little damaged, but I would say -- I couldn't give you 21 22 an exact date, but it was around that time, around seven, 23 eight months ago. 24 MS. O'NEILL: And you said something about 25 getting sewer in your basement?

KUCHARCZYK: I have a piece of plywood, a 18 19 three-quarter piece of plywood on it. 20 MS. O'NEILL: Thank you. 21 JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Krueger? 22 MR. KRUEGER: With regard to the work on the 23 lift station, do you know who is responsible for doing 24 that, or whom you were expecting to do that? Was it 25 Warren County Water & Sewer, or was it another entity?

17	My complaint is I have extremely low water
18	pressure and very, very discolored water many times. A
19	lot of times we put it into a pitcher, you know, where you
20	have the filters in, and it's amazing the color. At
21	certain times it's almost brown.
22	And I had one incident when I first moved in.
23	I came home and I heard a loud noise in my basement, and
24	when I went down, I traced the noise down to my water
25	softener, and my water softener was imploding.

1	What had happened was a water breakdown in
2	the line, and the vacuum just completely sucked the resin
3	carrier in the water softener, and at that time I asked
4	why that could happen. I asked my contractor, and he said
5	there was no check valve on it, and when I asked the water
6	and sewer company, an employee there, he said there was a
7	check valve, and my contractor said it wouldn't have
8	imploded if it had a check valve, and he installed a check
9	valve and I haven't had a problem since.
10	That's all that I have.
11	JUDGE HOPKINS: Any questions, Miss O'Neill?
12	MS. O'NEILL: And the water company, your
13	water company is Warren County Water & Sewer Company?
14	MR. BAKER: Yes.
15	JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Krueger?
16	MR. KRUEGER: Have you ever attempted to
17	measure the water pressure, or do you know how much it is?
18	MR. BAKER: No, sir. All I can do is when I
19	go over to a friend's house and, you know, we went and
20	visited in Texas with our friends and, you know, I almost
21	scared myself when I turned their water on.
22	I can say that if my wife and I took showers
23	at the same time, somebody wouldn't get wet.
24	MR. KRUEGER: No other questions.
25	JUDGE HOPKINS: Nobody can follow that, Mr.

13	makes me nervous.

         Village, and I have made many a trip around the village,

         and one of the things that we observed, or I observed was
24
         the excavation work done during the digging of some of our
25
         holes here for the hookup of water and sewer.
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Before I go any further, I'll tell you that 1 2 OSHA has been advised of all of these violations. They 3 are aware that all of these things occurred, but I want to bring them to your attention also. 4 I have here pictures of various excavation 5 6 work that involved things such as no safety barrier around 7 holes, a twelve-foot deep hole with no shoring, an 8 individual down working in the hole, another twelve-foot 9 deep hole that was full of water and no barriers around 10 the hole, another hole that has nothing around it and the dirt is dumped in the street, but the hole is there and no 11 12 workers or nothing. There is another hole that was just 13 recently dug about three weeks ago, and up until about a week ago it was left exposed. Nobody bothered to come 14 15 back and finish it. 16 And the same thing with another repair job 17 that was left unfinished for almost thirty days and just 18 looked horrible on the street where these people live. 19 I have also a picture of a lift station that 20 had been called to be repaired by the owner to the Warren County Water and Sewer. She told me that they made three 21 22 trips out and were never able to repair it, and if you will look at these photographs I have, you can see the 23 24 sewage on the lawn sitting there. Nobody to clear it up 25 or anything.

1	I would also ditto the water pressure problem
2	that everybody else seems to have.
3	That's it.
4	JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you.
5	Any questions, Miss O'Neill?
6	MS. O'NEILL: Yes, sir, Your Honor.
7	I would like to have these photographs
8	marked, and I have just a couple of questions.
9	JUDGE HOPKINS: These are all computer
10	printouts and I'm going to have the excavation work, OSHA
11	violations, I'm going to call that Public Counsel No. 2;
12	twelve foot deep, no shoring, I'm going to call it Public
13	Counsel No. 3; open ditch, twelve-foot at the corner of
14	Ponderosa and Fairway, I'm going to call that Public
15	Counsel No. 4; ten-foot deep, no shoring, I'm going to
16	call that Public Counsel No. 5; another hole that is open
17	on another hole left open by WCWS, Public Counsel No.,
18	6; three weeks without finishing, Public Counsel No. 7;
19	lift station, Public Counsel No. 8; and this looks like
20	sewage on the lawn, we will call that Public Counsel No.
21	9; and sewage on lawn, Public Counsel No. 10.
22	(Public Counsel's Exhibit Nos. 2 through 10
23	were marked.)
24	JUDGE HOPKINS: I'll try to talk into the
25	mike. If somebody has trouble hearing, just raise your

1 hand. 2 Go ahead, Miss O'Neill. MS. O'NEILL: Thank you, Your Honor. 3 Sir, I'm going to show you what we now have 4 5 just marked as Public Counsel Exhibit No. 2, No. 3, No. 4 and No. 5. Are these some of the pictures you were just 6 7 speaking about? 8 MR. KOLODGIE: That's correct. 9 MS. O'NEILL: And the notes that are on 10 these, the sheets that have these pictures on them, did 11 you write these notes? 12 MR. KOLODGIE: Yes, I did. MS. O'NEILL: And the locations that are on 13 here, do you have personal knowledge that those locations 14 15 are accurate? 16 MR. KOLODGIE: They are accurate. MS. O'NEILL: Do these pictures accurately 17 depict the situations that you described in your 18 19 testimony? 20 MR. KOLODGIE: They do. MS. O'NEILL: Your Honor, at this time I 21 22 would move for admission of Public Counsel's Exhibits 2, 23 3, 4 and 5. 24 JUDGE HOPKINS: Any objection to those being 25 entered into evidence?

1 MR. SCHAEFER: Yes. If I may take one more 2 look, and I may have a number of questions. 3 MR. KRUEGER: I have no objection. MR. SCHAEFER: Mr. Kolodgie, Public Counsel's 4 Exhibits No. 2 through 5 all seem to be excavation work 5 6 that has been done at various places; is that true? 7 MR. KOLODGIE: I would have to see the 8 pictures. 9 MR. SCHAEFER: Sure. Would you like to see 10 them? MR. KOLODGIE: Two and three are in the same 11 area. Four is a different area, and five is a different 12 13 area. 14 MR. SCHAEFER: I want to ask you, are you 15 aware whether or not this excavation work is actually the 16 service, the utility service that is provided by Warren 17 County Water & Sewer? MR. KOLODGIE: I only presume it is. 18 19 MR. SCHAEFER: But you don't know for sure? 20 MR. KOLODGIE: I would have no knowledge of 21 that, no. 22 MR. SCHAEFER: Did you actually take these 23 paragraphs yourself? 24 MR. KOLODGIE: I did. 25 MR. SCHAEFER: I don't have any objections to

Now, there 17 is just the two of us, but if a family would move into our 18 house, I think they would have to buy an old-fashioned 19 washing machine until the water pressure would get better. 20 That's just mainly what I wanted to 21 illustrate. You know, water pressure can be relative 22 according to, you know, what you're used to, and that is 23 my whole purpose. 24 JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you. 25 Ms. O'Neill?

24	And as we we were building our house, I guess
25	the owner of Warren County Water & Sewer contacted my wife

1	wanting to get paid for services that were not completed.
2	She was not going to pay for work that was not completed,
3	which I do not blame her, and he went off on my wife
4	screaming on the phone to her, and I just didn't think
5	that was good practice for a business.
6	That is basically all I have to say.

7	this, and he said he was supposed to put some sort of
8	extension on to give us more water pressure. I don't
9	think that has ever been done yet. That has been about
10	three years ago. That's all that I have to say.
11	JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you, sir.

14	that is Mr. Smith from Warren County Water & Sewer?

20	I had trouble with a toilet. When I would
21	flush it, it would back up, so I called up Warren County
22	Sewer & Water. I left a voice mail. Gary called back and
23	said that the people that lived in my house before always
24	had that problem and it was the way the toilet was
25	installed, it was not his problem, but I asked him to

1 please come out and check it anyhow, and within two or 2 three days he did come out and they pulled the lid off the 3 pump station and it was full, so they decided to pump it out. That was a Friday night. I don't know the date. 4 The next morning they had a truck sitting out 5 6 there and they pumped all of the raw sewage out in my 7 yard. It ran into my garage where my dogs are tied up, 8 and I live about forty yards from the lake, so it was 9 running down towards the lake, so I took a bunch of 10 pictures, which are on file in Jeff City. I talked to the man that was working for 11 12 Gary, his name was Steve, and I asked him why he was 13 pumping that sewage in my yard, and I was very unhappy 14 about it. He said he was told to do it, and that's the 15 way it was done, so I took the pictures, got them 16 developed, spoke with one of the neighbors, and in the 17 meantime Steve and, I guess, Gary came back, I don't know, 18 but somebody turned off the pump, and the pump was broke 19 at the bottom of the station, and they said they would 20 pour a concrete slab so it would work right, and when I 21 got back they had put an eight-pound bag of premix in the 22 bottom, just in the bag. It wasn't mixed. It was sitting 23 on the bottom with the pump sitting on top of it, and I 24 talked to Steve and I said, "That's not going to work. 25 You know, it doesn't look like that's proper procedure,"

1	and he said that is the way Gary said it should be done,
2	and that's what they did. It did work for awhile. I did
3	have problems again. They came back. I wasn't home, but
4	my neighbors took more pictures of what they pumped out in
5	my yard, but apparently they remedied the problem. I
6	haven't had backups since then, but I don't like the
7	sewage being pumped out in the yard.
8	JUDGE HOPKINS: I have a question.
9	You said these pictures are on file at Jeff
10	City. Do you know where?
11	MS. ULLRICH: She knows where.
12	JUDGE HOPKINS: She, meaning Miss O'Neill. I
13	just wondered which agency, and you indicated the Public
14	Counsel, and that's fine.
15	Ms. O'Neill, do you have any questions?
16	MS. O'NEILL: And just so the record is
17	clear, you sent those pictures to my office; is that
18	correct?
19	MS. ULLRICH: I gave them to Rick Kolodgie.

MYERS: Barbara Myers, M-y-e-r-s, 1002 12 Sugar Maple Court. 13 14 We built our house in the summer of 2000, and 15 we had a niece and nephew that were already living here, 16 and we were kind of excited being back to civilization where you had city water and sewers because we had been in 17 18 Indiana for eleven years and we were on well and septic. 19 We didn't have a problem with that, but we thought, oh, 20 city water and sewer has to be better. 21 But our niece had told us that they had had 22 problems with the taste of the water and their water 23 heater had, something had rusted inside of the water 24 heater, so my husband had a whole house water filter 25 installed before a drop of water went into the house

1	through the pipe, and he thought that would take care of
2	it.
3	Well, I never have liked the taste of the
4	water, and I have always carried the reverse osmosis water
5	from the grocery store, and he'll let me carry as many
6	jugs of water as I want to carry because it's my taste
7	buds, but last summer when the water pressure started
8	going down and he scrubbed the toilets and the shower,
9	then he was exposed to the grit of calcium buildup and the
10	rust and everything, and then he got a little upset about
11	the quality of the water. So that's our problem.

JUDGE HOPKINS: Would you please state and 4 spell your name for the court reporter, and then give us 5 6 your address. 7 MR. KASSEBAUM: My name is Don Kassebaum, K-a-s-s-e-b-a-u-m. My address is 2524 Village Lane, 8 9 Foristell, Missouri. 10 JUDGE HOPKINS: Go ahead, sir. MR. KASSEBAUM: Between September of 1997 and 11 this past September of 2001, I was a trustee for Incline 12 13 Village, and during that period of time I, on dozens of occasions, what might amount to in excess of a hundred 14 15 times, spoke to this, spoke to the Public Service 16 Commission either by phone, by fax, by letter, sent audio 17 tapes, photographs. 18 I spoke to -- a lot of the times I spoke to 19 Miss Shannon, who I believe is no longer a member of the 20 Public Service Commission, and I also spoke to Mr. 21 Merceil, Miss O'Neill, Mr. Loethen, and forgive me if I 22 didn't say that correctly, Mr. Merceil is not here, of 23 course, Mr. Krueger, and I spoke with the Department of 24 Natural Resources. 25 I had a lot of conversations both in writing

1	and verbally with Mr. Smith, and all of these
2	conversations and letters and photos were to do with
3	problems that were conveyed to the Board of Trustees, and
4	to me on many occasions, by customers of Warren County
5	Water & Sewer. When I say customers I'm not just limiting
6	it to Incline Village residents, because there were
7	situations, although it may not be as great in quantity as
8	the Incline Village residents, but there was situations
9	where I was dealing with or speaking with customers
10	outside of the Incline Village perimeter.
11	One example which was highly viewed on the
12	news last winter was a customer, or customers of Warren
13	County Water & Sewer whose water line, for whatever
14	reason, had froze and was left, was in that condition for
15	a long period of time.
16	We took my wife and I took hundreds of
17	gallons of water to one of those families which we knew,
18	and they dispersed them, I suppose, but what I'm
19	discussing now is the situation whereby they, those folks
20	had a, who had a problem and which they were out of water
21	for a long time, and it was expressed on television and to
22	me personally how in order for them to take a bath, they
23	had to go gather snow and allow it to melt and to cook, or
24	whatever they were doing with it, but that was their
25	problem, one that I personally conveyed to the Public

1 Service Commission.

Everything that I am speaking of now and in the next few moments has been documented to the Public Service Commission and/or the Department of Natural Resources and, as I said, by both letter, fax, photo or audio tape.

7 I refer to audio tape because of situations 8 whereby Mr. Smith used vulgarity, words which I wouldn't 9 repeat to customers when they would complain, or when they 10 would ask for something that they needed, and all they would get is an earful for an answer, and which they were 11 12 not, they did not need to hear, in my opinion, from an 13 owner of a company and, like I said, some of it was put on tape, you know, through an answering machine, or whatever, 14 15 and then forwarded on to Shannon Cook at the time.

16 We spoke earlier of a hookup fee that some 17 people were referring to. It is my understanding it was, 18 and I believe it still is, that the hookup fee that Warren 19 County Water & Sewer charges to hook up to their water 20 lines and their sewer lines is \$450 combined.

In my conversations with Mr. Krueger, he produced to me copies of tariff sheets that I suppose was what kind of law that the utility company was to work under, and in those tariff sheets it described how, for a fee, Warren County Water & Sewer was to tap on to the

1 water line that runs throughout, and run a service line up 2 to a water meter, and provide the water meter, and at that 3 point it was the new customer's financial responsibility to then take and run a line from the water meter to their 4 new home, or to their home. 5 6 Furthermore, in the tariff sheets it was 7 described that, to my knowledge, the way I read it, when 8 you pay a fee, part of this \$450 to Warren County Water $\mbox{\ensuremath{\&}}$ 9 Sewer for hookup to their sewer line, that meant, in my 10 opinion, that Warren County Water & Sewer was to tap into 11 their, or hook on to their sewer line, and run a line to a 12 cleanout somewhere between that point and the new 13 construction. That's the way I read it, and that's the way 14 15 in my conversations to the Public Service Commission, 16 that's the way I expressed my belief on how it was to be. 17 Well, I can tell as a homeowner who paid the fee, and then as a trustee who heard all, everything that 18 was going on for four years and got involved with a lot of 19 20 the situations, that \$450 bought you the right to hookup to those two lines, period, and it, you also received your 21 22 water meter, depending on what kind you received, but you 23 received a water meter for that fee, which you didn't pay 24 extra for, but then on top of that the homeowner would 25 then pay an additional fee which usually, depending on the

1 situation, was in excess of a thousand dollars or more to 2 actually pay someone, either pay Mr. Smith's company, 3 which I think he has an outside company called Smith & Associates, or another company to actually do the hookups 4 and run the line, and do all of the work, and it was my 5 6 contention that that was not the way that the tariffs 7 spelled it out, and that's my opinion. If I'm wrong, so 8 be it, but that's the way I read those tariffs. 9 In the summer of 1999, a previous employee of 10 Warren County Water & Sewer took me and two other then trustees throughout this village and pointed out to us, 11 12 which I made -- everything was in writing, and made aware 13 to Shannon Cook at the time, and it was either the summer of '98 or '99, you'll have to forgive me, I don't know the 14 15 exact date, a number of his words were violations that he 16 was told to do by Warren County Water & Sewer, by Mr. 17 Smith, things that, things such as pumping stuff, I call it sewage, I don't know what it is exactly, gray water, 18 19 someone called it gray water, pumping stuff from this 20 treatment plant down here close to the golf course, directly out of that hole, pumping it directly into the 21 22 little lake that sits next to it which leads into the big 220 acre lake. 23 24 He made us aware of hookups that normally 25 would be done with, when two pieces of PVC are brought

together, normally you use PVC cement, and he made us aware, and showed us, although it would be underground, where duct tape was used to bring PVC together at a certain spot.

As many people in this room have already 5 6 said, the water has been a problem for a long time. Prior 7 to me becoming a trustee, there was a conditional use 8 permit that was granted, I think I'm using the correct 9 words, and Incline Village was sued in order to allow 10 Warren County Water & Sewer to condemn two lots which were 11 adjacent to his, to the water tower that is now, and the 12 condemnation of these two lots was to provide proper land 13 so that Warren County Water & Sewer could construct a new water tower, and it was spelled out there clearly by the 14 15 Public Service Commission as to what was supposed to be 16 done, and there was a very strict time line, and it was 17 very well done and, coming in as a new trustee, you know, 18 it was very impressive.

19 Unfortunately, it was all words, because in 20 many, many conversations with Mr. Smith personally and at 21 meetings where there was one or two hundred people in a 22 room at an annual meeting, we were told that the water 23 tower was being sand -- a new one was being sandblasted 24 down in Tennessee, I believe, and was coming shortly. It 25 was going to be installed the next spring.

1	I can go back and look at water bills that
2	will say things about the new water tower, approximate
3	dates when it may be coming, or what the status is.
4	My point is this, Incline Village lost two
5	lots. We were granted a damage dollar amount for those
6	lots, which was paid to Incline Village, but we lost the
7	two lots that became the property of Warren County Water &
8	Sewer, but there is no water tower, there is I mean
9	there is no new water tower. Those two lots have just
10	become fenced in, and basically become an area where
11	refuse and gravel and stuff has accumulated and, in my
12	opinion, has not become the purpose for which they were
13	intended.
14	When we talk about the water, the smell of
15	sulfur in the water is pretty significant on occasion.
16	Last summer excuse me. In the summer of
17	2000 there was a serious situation, in my opinion, I use
18	the word serious, whereby a number of customers had a
19	serious problem with chlorine, a heavy percentage of
20	chlorine in the water coming into their home.
21	In fact, I saw with my own eyes a number of
22	situations where laundry was spotted white, if not turned
23	white, because of the excessive amount of chlorine coming
24	into their home at that point in time.
25	Now, some will say maybe the homeowner did
1	something wrong. Maybe they poured something into their
----	--
2	laundry. It happened in not just one home, but it was in
3	more than just one home, and it happened at the same time.
4	We are talking about the same week, the same, on the same
5	days. It happened, and I find it hard to believe,
6	although I'm not a chemist, and I don't profess to be, I
7	find it hard to believe that that high a concentration of
8	a substance in the water is acceptable, and acceptable to
9	drink by children, taking the adult out of the question
10	for a moment.
11	I want to make sure that I covered
12	everything.
13	And then in conclusion, on the sewage side of
14	the ledger, as the Public Service Commission is well
15	aware, there was many a situation where raw sewage, or
16	gray water, as Mr. Smith would call it, would be going
17	from a manhole cover, or from a lift station, as expressed
18	by Miss Ullrich, directly into a body of water and the
19	lakes that we have here, and the three lakes that we are
20	discussing are recreational lakes. People fish in all of
21	them, and the main lake, everything from skiing to
22	swimming to fishing to just general recreation takes
23	place, so I find it hard to believe that the gray water or
24	raw sewage on occasion, as in Miss Ullrich's situation, is
25	acceptable in these bodies of water where fishing and

1 swimming, and what have you, take place.

2 Also in conclusion to the sewage, as many 3 folks already have discussed or talked about the lift station, lift stations have been, were one of the hottest 4 topics during the four years that I was a trustee, because 5 6 alarms were -- I don't have a lift station, but an alarm 7 is on a lift station, I believe, to tell someone that it's malfunctioning. 8 9 Well, I have driven by lift stations, and I 10 have talked to people with lift stations who have had the ringer or the buzzer, if that is the right word, or the 11 12 red light, that had those disconnected so that no one 13 would know that they were malfunctioning. Again, those have been documented to the PSC 14 15 when those situations would arise. 16 I believe that is all that I have to say. 17 JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you, sir. 18 For the record, I want to point out that 19 Shannon Cook was an attorney with the Office of Public 20 Counsel, and she was never with the Public Service Commission, as far as I know. 21 22 MR. KASSEBAUM: Well, to my knowledge, she was predecessor to Ruth O'Neill. 23 24 JUDGE HOPKINS: Yes, she was with the Office 25 of Public Counsel.

MR. KASSEBAUM: Okay. I'm sorry. I didn't 1 2 say that correctly. JUDGE HOPKINS: Ms. O'Neill, any questions? 3 MS. O'NEILL: Just a couple. 4 And as you said, you have talked to people in 5 my office as well as the Public Service Commission; is 6 7 that right? MR. KASSEBAUM: Yes, sir. 8 9 MS. O'NEILL: And DNR and other agencies, as 10 well? MR. KASSEBAUM: Yes, sir. 11 MS. O'NEILL: And I just want to go through a 12 couple of things and ask you a little bit of 13 14 clarification. 15 You said that you heard from people who were 16 not even in Incline Village. Were those people who also 17 were within the Warren County Water & Sewer Company's service area? 18 19 MR. KASSEBAUM: Yes. 20 MS. O'NEILL: Places like Shady Oak? 21 MR. KASSEBAUM: Shady Oak, and Miss Brinkman, 22 as I referred to earlier, I think it's called Green 23 Trails -- is it Green Trails, I forget the name of the 24 establishment, but it's on Highway WW just a little bit --25 it's down the street from Shady Oak.

MS. O'NEILL: That is also a customer of 1 2 Warren County Water & Sewer? 3 MR. KASSEBAUM: I'm assuming it is. I'm sure it is. 4 MS. O'NEILL: And that is the company that 5 6 she had the problems with? 7 MR. KASSEBAUM: Yes, ma'am. 8 MS. O'NEILL: And you talked about an audio 9 tape, and that was an audio tape that contained messages 10 left by Mr. Smith on an answering machine of a customer; 11 is that correct? MR. KASSEBAUM: Yes. 12 13 MS. O'NEILL: And you gave that to Miss Cook? 14 MR. KASSEBAUM: I mailed it to her. 15 MS. O'NEILL: You were talking a little bit 16 about the connection fees and indicated that there were things that after the \$450 was paid, the three hundred for 17 18 water and one hundred fifty for the sewer connection, that 19 there were more things that had to be done, and that was 20 done by Mr. Smith, either the utility company or another 21 company of his; is that correct? 22 MR. KASSEBAUM: I would say that the extra 23 work was done by Smith & Associates, which would be his 24 other company, or other companies. If you didn't want to 25 hire Mr. Smith and his other company, you could hire other

1 companies, plumbers or trenchers, or what have you, to do 2 the work for you. 3 MS. O'NEILL: Was there somewhere the utility said that the customer would have to pay the utility or a 4 designee of some designated company that the utility 5 6 picked to do the services? Did you ever hear about that 7 complaint? 8 MR. KASSEBAUM: Say that again. 9 MS. O'NEILL: That Mr. Smith made the 10 customers pay the services either to the utility company or to his other company, that said that they had to hire 11 Smith & Associates? 12 13 MR. KASSEBAUM: There was -- gosh. There was a lot of situations whereby a new customer coming into 14 15 this village who didn't know a thing about anybody, when 16 they would go to Mr. Smith to pay the \$450 and fill out 17 the contract for new service, many of them felt that they 18 had to use Mr. Smith to do their hookups and what have 19 you. Many felt -- in fact many told me that they were 20 told that they had to. 21 MS. O'NEILL: Okay. And you said that you 22 had several conversations, or were involved in several 23 meetings where Warren County Water & Sewer through Mr. 24 Smith indicated that the water storage tower was in the 25 process of being obtained and was going to be put up?

1 MR. KASSEBAUM: That is correct. 2 MS. O'NEILL: But it hasn't been done yet? MR. KASSEBAUM: That is correct. 3 May I add to that? 4 MS. O'NEILL: Sure. 5 6 MR. KASSEBAUM: A lot of people are talking 7 about the low water pressure, and I'm no expert, but I do 8 agree that what a couple of people have said about the 9 more and more customers that are on the existing system, 10 that may cause the water pressure to go down and down. I thought it ironic that shortly after, and 11 12 we are talking about a few weeks, maybe a month at most, a 13 couple of months, shortly after, and this goes back to, I 14 would say the fall of '97, or early '98, shortly after the 15 Public Service Commission granted the conditional use 16 permit for Warren County Water & Sewer, a new subdivision 17 was being constructed in which water was, in my opinion --18 in my opinion, a new subdivision was being hooked up to 19 this water service called Brandy Lynn, and it's in Lincoln 20 County, I believe, and it was just another situation where 21 that much more territory was drawing down on a system that 22 couldn't handle what was already in line to service. 23 MS. O'NEILL: And just one other thing. You 24 have testified about people complaining that the alarm 25 mechanism on their lift stations had been disconnected?

1	MR. KASSEBAUM: Yes.
2	MS. O'NEILL: Do you know, or did they
3	explain to you who disconnected those alarms?
4	MR. KASSEBAUM: They told me that a worker,
5	in other words, a worker for Warren County Water & Sewer,
6	but they did not expressly say Mr. Smith and, to be honest
7	with you, I didn't know by name any of the workers for
8	Warren County Water & Sewer.
9	But to answer your question, when they would
10	call me they would say something to the effect that an
11	employee or worker from Warren County Water & Sewer
12	disconnected the alarm and now we still have our problem,
13	but now there is no alarm to tell us or anybody else about
14	it.
15	MS. O'NEILL: Thank you.
16	JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Krueger?
17	MR. KRUEGER: No questions.
18	JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Schaefer?
19	MR. SCHAEFER: No questions.
20	JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Murray?
21	COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions.
22	JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Lumpe?
23	COMMISSIONER LUMPE: No. Thank you very
24	much, sir.
25	JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Forbis?

COMMISSIONER FORBIS: No questions. 1 2 JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you. Patricia Metz? 3 MS. METZ: I have nothing to say because 4 everything I was going to say has already been said, so I 5 6 am not going to testify. 7 JUDGE HOPKINS: If someone has said what you wanted to say, you do not need to testify if you don't 8 9 want to. Dale Hinton? After Mr. Hinton Roger Nichols 10 will be next. 11 (Thereupon, Dale Hinton was sworn.) 12 JUDGE HOPKINS: Please state and spell your 13 14 name, and give us your address? 15 MR. HINTON: My name is Dale Hinton, 16 H-i-n-t-o-n. I live at 261 English Road, and it's in the 17 Brandy Lynn subdivision. JUDGE HOPKINS: Go ahead. 18 19 MR. HINTON: I just got a couple of things to 20 add that has already been mentioned. The water pressure, 21 I guess I've got to thank the good Lord above, that my 22 pressure is better than some of these people. My garbage 23 disposal doesn't work, so I guess I'm lucky there. 24 I purchased this lot -- I looked at it two or three times in 2000 and 2001. There was a fire hydrant 25

out in front of it. Somebody damaged it and knocked it 1 2 over, tore it up, or whatever. I was told that it would 3 get replaced. It never has been replaced. So we don't have no fire hydrant over there. It seems like a little 4 issue as compared to some of these other people. 5 6 Then I got a letter in the mail that says 7 that this meeting was coming down. Maybe I ought to 8 attend. It says in the letter here that Incline Village 9 was trying to take over the water company, or something to 10 that effect here, and it says that I could be disconnected, or possibly somebody else could be denied 11 water, which is very upsetting if you build a new home and 12 13 you're told you have water and everything works. 14 I come within about two hours of just 15 forgetting the water and putting a well in, and I kind of 16 wish we had done that now. There is the odor. You can't water your yard. The sprinkler won't work. It won't go 17 18 around. 19 That's about all I've got. 20 JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you, sir. 21 Ms. O'Neill? 22 MS. O'NEILL: Mr. Hinton, do you have a copy of that letter you were referring to? 23 24 MR. HINTON: Yes. MS. O'NEILL: May I ask that it be marked for 25

JUDGE HOPKINS: No objection being heard, 16 17 this will be the Warren County Water & Sewer company letter of March 6th. 18 19 (Public Counsel's Exhibit No. 11 was 20 admitted.) MS. O'NEILL: I have no other questions. 21 22 JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Krueger? 23 MR. KRUEGER: No questions, Your Honor. JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Schaefer? 24 25 MR. SCHAEFER: No questions.

1	JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Murray?
2	COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Yes. You said that you
3	live in Brandy Lynn subdivision; is that right?
4	MR. HINTON: Yes, ma'am.
5	COMMISSIONER MURRAY: How long have you had
6	service problems with Warren County Water & Sewer?
7	MR. HINTON: Our water was probably turned on
8	back in July.
9	COMMISSIONER MURRAY: How long have you lived
10	there?
11	MR. HINTON: I'm sorry?
12	COMMISSIONER MURRAY: How long have you lived
13	there?
14	MR. HINTON: We moved in in September of
15	2001.
16	COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Thank you.
17	JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Lumpe?
18	COMMISSIONER LUMPE: Mr. Hinton, you talked
19	about odor, and a number of people talked about odor.
20	Is it both sulfur and chlorine?
21	MR. HINTON: We haven't got chlorine. It's
22	more sulfur.
23	JUDGE HOPKINS: I have a question, sir.
24	Do you live in a fire protection district?
25	MR. HINTON: Yes. Wright City.

JUDGE HOPKINS: Is the fire protection 1 2 district, or the water company responsible for having 3 those fire hydrants? MR. HINTON: I believe, I'm not a developer, 4 but I believe the developer put the water lines in. The 5 6 water definitely comes from Warren County. 7 JUDGE HOPKINS: How about the fire hydrants? MR. HINTON: There are some there, too. In 8 9 the subdivision itself I can go ahead and mention other 10 things. Some of them, the caps are off of them, and I 11 don't know the exact word, it's not operable or something. JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you. 12 13 Commissioner Murray? COMMISSIONER MURRAY: I was just reading the 14 15 letter that, skimming the letter that you received from 16 the company, and it said that if you would like to express 17 your position regarding the trustees of Incline Village, 18 or the effect they might have on your water and sewer 19 service, you may want to attend the public hearing. 20 Is that why you're here? 21 MR. HINTON: Yes, ma'am. I'm concerned. 22 I've got a new home, and if my water got turned off, $\ensuremath{\mathsf{I}}$ would have a little problem there. 23 24 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Are you satisfied with 25 the service that you're receiving?

MR. HINTON: No. I mentioned earlier that 1 2 the pressure was better than a lot of these people, it 3 sounds like, but you can't even water your yard, you know. The sprinkler will not work. I have been calling and 4 spoke to Mr. Smith, I believe, on the phone, and I didn't 5 6 get a return -- I'm sorry, it was his answering machine, 7 and I never got a call back. COMMISSIONER MURRAY: So are you satisfied --8 9 are you saying you're dissatisfied? 10 MR. HINTON: I'm dissatisfied with the water pressure and with the odor, and dissatisfied with somebody 11 12 for that fire hydrant. COMMISSIONER MURRAY: And are you 13 concerned -- do you have any concerns about the trustees 14 15 of Incline Village, other than what was stated in this 16 letter that you might be disconnected? 17 MR. HINTON: That's all, yes. COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Thank you. 18 19 JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Forbis? 20 COMMISSIONER FORBIS: No questions. JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you very much. 21 22 JUDGE HOPKINS: Roger Nichols is next, and then after Roger Nichols is Fern Weld. 23 24 (Thereupon, Roger Nichols was sworn.) JUDGE HOPKINS: Would you please state and 25

1 spell your name for the court reporter, and give us your 2 address? MR. NICHOLS: Roger Nichols, N-i-c-h-o-l-s, 3 and I live at 2470 Village Lane. 4 JUDGE HOPKINS: Go ahead. 5 MR. NICHOLS: I'm going to start -- I'm a new 6 7 resident to Incline Village. I purchased a home that was being constructed and I put a contract on it, roughly, in 8 9 August. 10 At that time the exterior was done, the interior wasn't, and there was a manhole on the side of my 11 12 house, and I asked the builder about it, and he said, "Well, that is the sewer line." 13 14 I was not aware that this sewage line would 15 need a lift station or lift pump in it. Dumb me. I 16 should know better. I have run into this before. 17 Before we moved into the house we talked to 18 the builder several times after we found out about this 19 lift pump. So we get into the house and so forth, this is 20 all hearsay, but the builder said he was in contact, I 21 don't know what his excuse was, but the lift pump was not 22 being put in. I have no idea why. I know it was delayed. 23 Finally the lift pump was put in and the 24 people finishing off the inside of the house started using the toilets, the sinks, and so forth. We kept telling 25

1 them not to because we had water backups coming into our 2 basement. That was our first time with this. 3 We got moved into the house. Things went along pretty well up until February 2nd, about midnight, a 4 neighbor come across the street and told us we had a red 5 6 flashing light going on. We knew instantly what this was. 7 There had been no siren. We were under the impression 8 that there was supposed to be a buzzer that we could hear, 9 since this light is on the blind side of the house. 10 I immediately called the Warren County Water Company and got the recorder and left a message. I went 11 12 down in the basement. We had water backing up in our 13 sewers again. At this time we had contents in the house. The next morning at 9:00 o'clock I called 14 15 Warren County Water and talked to Gary Smith, and he told 16 me somebody would be right over. At 2:30 nobody had shown 17 up. We had left the house -- it was Super Bowl. We left the house. We came back at 7:00 o'clock and there was no 18 19 sewage in the basement. 20 We assumed that the pump had been repaired 21 and we started flushing our stools and so forth, and right 22 away we had clogged drains. We had this mess to clean up. 23 On Monday at 8:00 o'clock I checked the sump 24 hole and it was filled with sewage again. I called Warren County Water and left a message. Wife called at noon and 25

1 talked to Gary Smith and he said somebody would be over 2 shortly. At 2:30 no one had come to pump it out. 3 My wife was recovering from major surgery at this time and this was something that she was very upset 4 about and she shouldn't have been bothered with. 5 6 After 2:30 and nobody had come over, she 7 called the PSC to see what could be done. 8 At 5:30 an employee came out and pumped the 9 sewage out of the line, and I was there when he did it, 10 and he told me that apparently a fuse was the problem, and 11 he would replace it the next day. 12 Tuesday, the 5th, the fuse was replaced, but the pump wasn't working. I had seen how the employee 13 14 pumped the sump hole out that night, how he did it, so I 15 pumped two times that day. I pumped the sump hole out so 16 my wife would be able to use the water in the house. 17 February 6th, called twice and left message 18 on the recorder. I had pumped it twice that day. 19 February 7, the PSC, one of the few people 20 from PSC had been out and told Gary Smith, or called Gary 21 Smith, and Gary Smith told him that he couldn't get an 22 electrician, this was on a Thursday, he couldn't get an 23 electrician out until Monday of next week. The PSC 24 employee called us and relayed this to us. 25 The next two days my wife was home alone and

1 she had to go out and pump this thing out twice. 2 Monday, the electrician from Wentzville 3 showed up and diagnosed the problem, and Gary Smith didn't 4 have him repair it. Later in the day an employee came and pulled 5 the circuit breaker and left all of the hot wires exposed. 6 7 There is no way to pump the sewage out if you don't have circuit breakers or buttons in there to push. 8 9 On February 12th, Tuesday, about 10:55 an 10 employee came by, looked, left, nothing done. In all of this time we never had a phone call from Gary Smith. The 11 only time I had contact with anyone in person was when the 12 13 employee was there. 14 February 14th a contractor doing some work on 15 the house said Warren County Water came by and installed a 16 new electrical box -- I'm sorry. We had left town that 17 week, but the contractor working in the house called us 18 when we were in Florida and told us they had been by and 19 installed a brand new box. We arrived home to find that 20 the new box was there. Everything looked fine. 21 My wife, the next day, heard water running. 22 She looked outside and there was three people around this manhole. Come to find out, the floats had been put in 23 24 wrong and PSC employes had come by to inspect it, saw it 25 was wrong, and contacted Gary Smith to come and fix it

1 right.

2 Since that time I heard I had a water leak 3 going. Apparently it has been leaking since October when Gary Smith was backfilling this sump hole. 4 A neighbor and also the contractor that was 5 6 working there said that he backed over the water jar in 7 the yard. They were going to fix it, and they have never 8 fixed it, and it's sitting there at an angle, and an 9 employee came out and dug up next to the jar between the 10 meter and my house, said there was a little small leak, 11 they tightened it up, however the water leak is still there. I think I'm in the fifth day of that now, and 12 other than coming back and filling up the hole, that's all 13 14 that has been done. 15 I would just like to say that I am an 16 independent businessman, and it's my impression that if I 17 gave the type of service that I have received and things that I have heard here tonight, I would be out of 18 19 business. 20 I'm a captive user of this public utility, 21 and I think that anybody with any decency in them at all 22 would not put us through what we have gone through as a 23 new resident. I think it's totally unacceptable. 24 That's all that I have. 25 (Applause.)

4	What would you like to see done? That we can
5	do legally?
6	MR. NICHOLS: I haven't even got around to
7	thinking about that. I left my last house because of the
8	public utility and it was because the public utility had
9	the right, and they treated me like I just got off a
10	turnip truck. I was put through the ringer, went through
11	a court case, and enough is enough, so I moved. I came
12	out here.
13	I should have known better, because I'm no
14	stranger to this area. I have lived in this county
15	probably close to thirty years now, I guess, and it's kind
16	of a strange thing, because my real estate agent showed me
17	a house here and I kept telling him, "No, I don't want to
18	live here," but when I came back out here, this place had
19	changed since the last time I was here, and I thought this
20	place is great, this community has moved along.
21	And to answer your question, I would like to
22	see the utility company respond to the needs of their
23	clients in one fashion or the other.
24	The water pressure here is a problem.
25	Somebody asked how low is it. I had sod in my yard. I

1 had one sprinkler. That was all I could run at one time, 2 and it was one of the rotating types, and it would throw 3 water out about ten feet. In my other home I could run three of those and it would throw the water out 4 twenty-five feet. 5 6 I started asking people about this, and they 7 started telling me, we've got low water pressure, we've 8 got a high chlorine taste in the water at various times. 9 I thought I've got other problems. I can get by with 10 this, but I think for public safety, I think for the community that something needs to be done. Either Mr. 11 12 Smith needs to straighten out his act, or we need somebody to come in and do this right. One of the two. 13 14 (Applause.) 15 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Do you think that Mr. 16 Smith and the Warren County Water & Sewer Company are 17 capable or qualified to do the job right? 18 MR. NICHOLS: From my experience, I would say 19 no, but I have no idea, but my experience would be, I 20 don't know if they are capable or not. All I know is I sat there for nineteen days and did not have a sewer 21 22 system working properly in a brand new house. I sat there not knowing when I go home tonight if I have a problem or 23 24 not. COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Do you think that the 25

1 value of your property is in any way affected by the type 2 of water and sewer service you have? MR. NICHOLS: I'm scared to think about that. 3 I would say the way this community is growing, probably it 4 isn't yet, but with TV exposure, press exposure, and 5 things not improving, I would say definitely it's going to 6 7 be a real problem. COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Can you tell me 8 9 approximately what percentage of lots and homes are sold 10 in this area, and that eventually will be here? MR. NICHOLS: That I have no idea. Like I 11 12 say, I have been dealing with a lot of things besides 13 sewer and water systems since I have moved in that was 14 unplanned, but I don't know that much about the community. 15 I think there is like three hundred homes here now, or 16 something like this. 17 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Is it accurate to say that they are still being advertised and being sold? 18 19 MR. NICHOLS: Oh, definitely so. 20 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: And --MR. NICHOLS: I would say if this system 21 22 continues like this, there is not going to be very many 23 homes built. 24 First of all, the water pressure is not going to be able to handle it. Second of all, there are going 25

         to be so many breakdowns with the sewer system and
 2
         problems with the lift stations, there wouldn't be enough
 3
         employees to take care of all of this, there is no way,
         unless they get this operating right.

We moved in 5 in January, and I had no idea of all of the horror stories 6 7 that everybody has had. I definitely would not have built in here if I would have known that. 8 9 My complaint is I've got rust on my clothes, 10 in the washing machine, and my fish, there is rust on the bowl. I thought maybe some other folks were having the 11 same problems and I would come and try and find out what I 12 13 could do. We went ahead and put a water softener in. 14 15 We put an iron filter in. We put Iron-out in, and this is 16 after all of that has happened. And as far as the service 17 goes, when we first moved in we had some problems with our 18 lift. It was going on and off every three seconds, it 19 would click on and off, on and off, and the alarm would go 20 off constantly. 21 We never had any sewage in our house and 22 there was never anything down on the ground where it was 23 going to come out at, but every time I called they came 24 out. The guys worked very hard, the workers did. I felt extremely sorry for them. One guy busted his hand while 25

he was working on our, digging the dredge underneath the 1 2 road. I really didn't think conditions were very good for 3 them, but, other than that, that's all that I've got. JUDGE HOPKINS: For the record, you're 4 referring to the jar of water you brought with you that 5 has a fish if it? 6 MS. SAUER: Yes. 7 JUDGE HOPKINS: Did you put that in there? 8 9 MS. SAUER: My fish? JUDGE HOPKINS: Yes. 10 MS. SAUER: My fish was in here, and I put 11 the water in here for the fish, yeah. 12 JUDGE HOPKINS: Miss O'Neill? 13 MS. O'NEILL: Is this rust -- you said that 14 15 you have taken several steps to try and get the rust out 16 of the water? 17 MS. SAUER: Yes. MS. ONEILL: You're still having those 18 19 problems? 20 MS. SAUER: Yes. This is after I have taken 21 those steps. 22 JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Krueger? 23 MR. KRUEGER: No questions. 24 MS. SAUER: We also have water, as far as 25 pressure, it's also pretty poor, too.

JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Schaefer? 1 2 MR. SCHAEFER: When was the last time you cleaned the fish bowl that you're holding there? 3 MS. SAUER: This is a week old. 4 5 MR. SCHAEFER: It's a week old, and your fish seems to be doing fine in the water? 6 7 MS. SAUER: Yes, he is doing fine. I was just concerned. It's like what else can I do to get rid 8 9 of rust? Can I set up my softener or can I add more 10 stuff, what can I personally do, and that's what I was trying to see. 11 12 MR. SCHAEFER: I have nothing further. JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Murray? 13 14 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Nothing. 15 JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Lumpe? 16 COMMISSIONER LUMPE: No. Thank you. JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Forbis? 17 COMMISSIONER FORBIS: No. 18 19 JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you, ma'am. 20 Wayne Rellergert. JUDGE HOPKINS: Would you please state and 13 14 spell your name for the court reporter, and give us your 15 address. 16 MS. HENKE: My name is Mary Henke, M-a-r-y, 17 H-e-n-k-e, and I live at 1028 Butternut Court, Foristell, Missouri. 18 19 JUDGE HOPKINS: Go ahead. MS. HENKE: We just moved in in November of 20 21 2001, so we are pretty new. 22 I guess I'll start at the beginning. One of 23 the things, we had heard rumors there might be problems 24 with water just by talking with other homeowners, and my 25 builder had -- we lived kind of far away. We lived in

1 Spanish Lake, and we weren't able to be out here every day 2 and doing stuff, and he had some other problems, backups, 3 so when we got to him and said that we would like to maybe not use, I guess it's Gary Smith's Company, Warren County 4 to put in our hookup for our water, he said, "I have 5 already done it," and, "I was told that I had to use him." 6 7 So I do not know who he talked to, or why he was told 8 that, but he said he was told that he had to use them. He 9 said, "I know there are some problems, but I had to use 10 them." I wasn't going to say it earlier, but it was 11 in my head when I heard another person saying that, but I 12 13 do remember him saying that, and I thought, oh. We had no problems with, any hookup problems 14 15 or anything. We do have the chlorine smell that gets very 16 strong at times. In fact, my daughter, who is like 17 twenty-three or whatever, when she comes over she can't stand to be near the water. If it's like poured in a cup 18 19 or something, she's like, "Oh gosh, it's so strong." 20 I haven't had any trouble with, you know, clothes being totally bleached out. I think we are too 21 22 new, you know, to kind of notice that yet. 23 But our biggest problem is the water pressure and, you know, you buy a new house, we've got a shower 24 25 that has a seat in it, and my husband was so looking

1 forward to it, that he was finally going to be able to sit 2 down and have the hot water hit him. That was, you know, 3 a big thing for him. He can't sit on the seat and have the water hit him. It doesn't go that far. You pay all 4 of this money and it doesn't do that. 5 6 When we moved in November, it was still kind 7 of nice weather, and we were putting stuff out in the 8 yard. We had a few plants and we bought one of those 9 regular sprinklers that go back and forth, and we turned 10 it on full blast, nothing else going on in the house, and we thought maybe they're not working right, maybe somebody 11 12 is taking a shower or something. We turned all of the 13 water off in the house, and that sprinkler went that high at full blast. I'm like, you know, what --14 15 JUDGE HOPKINS: You're gesturing about two 16 feet? 17 MS. HENKE: Two, two and a half at the most. Then, you know, we are very easy going people 18 and we like to give people the benefit of the doubt that, 19 20 well, maybe, you know, some of this stuff is going to be fixed, so I tried calling a couple of times, and I'm not 21 22 real pushy. I'm like oh, we can kind of live with this a little bit and kind of wait and see if we run into him, or 23 24 whatever. 25 I didn't run into Mr. Smith going around, so
1	I put a couple of calls in to him, and I work in a very
2	busy place. I'm a nurse. You know, we have a lot of
3	people with cell phones, you can't talk to them right
4	away, so you get voice mail. You know, if you can't get
5	them on one number, they give you another number, or they
6	give you voice mail, which is very good for messages
7	saying, "Call this number, call that number if I'm not
8	here, I'll get back to you."
9	I put two or three calls in. I never said it
10	was urgent. I think I gave, you know, the major things,
11	you know, this is Mary Henke, you know, I need to talk to
12	you, whatever. I never have been called back. And, you
13	know, like I said, we are kind of easy going. I haven't
14	pushed it.
15	I kind of think, you know, if you're running
16	a business I know in the hospital we are so busy, but
17	you always get back, even if it's a day later, you know,
18	you always get back to the person, "I got your message.
19	I'm sorry. I was busy, you know. I couldn't get back to
20	you," and I've never gotten a phone call. I have voice
21	mail. I've never even gotten a message on my voice mail
22	saying, "I tried calling you, you weren't home," that kind
23	of thing.
24	JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you, Miss Henke.
25	Ms. O'Neill?

MS. O'NEILL: Ma'am, you said your contractor 1 2 had indicated that he believed that Mr. Smith required him 3 to use that company; is that right? MS. HENKE: Yes. 4 5 MS. O'NEILL: What is your contractor's 6 name? 7 MR. HENKE: Don Ebbert. MS. O'NEILL: Where does he work out of? 8 9 MS. HENKE: Well, that's who it is, Don Ebbert & Associates. I don't remember like the last part 10 of it. Ebbert Remodeling, that's what it's called. 11 MS. O'NEILL: Do you know what town he 12 13 operates out of, his office is in? 14 MS. HENKE: I think -- I don't know that he 15 has a specific office. He lives out on Bryan Road. He is 16 a small contractor. He does like a house at a time. 17 JUDGE HOPKINS: Where is Bryan Road? MS. HENKE: Bryan Road is in, I guess 18 19 O'Fallon. It's just not too many exits off of 70 going 20 back. 21 JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Krueger? 22 MR. KRUEGER: No questions. 23 JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Schaefer? 24 MR. SCHAEFER: Just a couple of questions. 25 Do you have any personal knowledge what was

1 told to your contractor? 2 MS. HENKE: All I know is what he told me. 3 And we wanted -- after we heard a few things, we thought maybe we should get somebody else to put the water in, and 4 5 he's the one that said, "I already did it because I was told that I had to use him." 6 7 MR. SCHAEFER: I would like to object on the basis of hearsay. 8 9 JUDGE HOPKINS: We'll note the continuing 10 objection against hearsay, sir. 11 Commissioner Murray? COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions. 12 JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Lumpe? 13 14 COMMISSIONER LUMPE: No. Thank you. 15 JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you very much. 16 Jim Roberts is next, and after Mr. Roberts we 17 are going to have Dan Purtle. 18 (Thereupon, Jim Roberts was sworn.) 19 JUDGE HOPKINS: Would you please state and 20 spell your name for the court reporter, and give us your 21 address? 22 MR. ROBERTS: Jim Roberts, J-i-m, 23 R-o-b-e-rt-s, 1034 Butternut Court, Foristell, Missouri. 24 My problem mainly is water pressure, the 25 smell of chlorine, and I guess I kind of get offended when

1	somebody lies to me. I talked to Mr. Smith when I was
2	first moving in about the water pressure because nobody
3	warned me about it, and he told me, and I inquired also, I
4	have a friend that runs a water company for a major city,
5	and he told me what the requirements were for the water
6	pressure, and he told me that it couldn't be lower than
7	twenty psi, and he gave me a gauge to bring home to hookup
8	to my house and check it, and I registered something like
9	seventeen and a half, and I approached Mr. Smith about
10	that, and he said, "You live on top of that hill. That's
11	probably right," and he said, "We are going to put a tank
12	in and it's going to raise the water pressure," and that's
13	been two years ago, and there has been no tank yet.
14	We've had lots of times when the water would
15	be shut off without any warning and turned back on without
16	any warning. You could have a load of clothes in the
17	washing machine and they would be brown because of the
18	brown water after he turned the water back on without
19	warning anybody.
20	Like I said, I can hear at night my water
21	softener trying to start, trying to suck some water in to
22	purify it, and this guy that was in here earlier talking
23	about the fire hydrant, that got me to thinking. I would
24	hate to see what the water pressure in the fire hydrant

25 is. If I don't have water pressure to run a sprinkler,

how are they going to put my house out if it's on fire? 1 2 We have no knowledge of what kind of water pressure that 3 fire hydrant has, and that really scares me, and then I also have a strong feeling against sewage in our lakes. I 4 think that is a crime. They should be punished. 5 That's all that I have. 6 JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you, sir. 7 Ms. O'Neill? 8 9 MS. O'NEILL: No questions. 10 JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Krueger? MR. KRUEGER: Has this water pressure been 11 consistent or is it just occasionally? 12 MR. ROBERTS: No, it's consistent. I tell 13 you what, if the wash machine is running or somebody is 14 15 taking a shower and you flush the toilet, you have to go 16 get a plunger because the toilet doesn't have no pressure 17 to force it through. MR. KRUEGER: Have you measured it more than 18 19 once? 20 MR. ROBERTS: I just measured it the one time 21 when I approached Mr. Smith. 22 MR. KRUEGER: And on the time you did that, 23 was that typical of the kind of pressure that you 24 generally have? MR. ROBERTS: Right. It's not changed. It 25

                      MR. PURTLE: Most of my comments will be
```

1	somewhat redundant, as we came in a little late, but the
2	primary issue I think is water pressure, or lack thereof.
3	It gets to the point where you can't even run
4	the aerator in the kitchen because it won't force the
5	water out of there, and also the coloration is frequently
6	rusty and dirty and you have to change the little wire
7	screen meshes in the faucets every four to six weeks in
8	order to get the rust and residue out of there.
9	We have also been the victim of the chlorine
10	problem. I've lost several pair of slacks that have come
11	back a different color, shirts and that sort of thing,
12	streaked from the chlorine and a little bit of the sour
13	egg smell, but not nearly as bad as the chlorine issue.
14	I would like to, rather than go into detail,
15	just revalidate the comments of Don Kassebaum in
16	particular. Most of those issues that he brought up we
17	were involved with together, as I was on the board at that
18	same time and was familiar with a lot of those comments.
19	That's about the extent of it.
20	JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you, sir.
21	Any questions, Miss O'Neill?
22	MS. O'NEILL: Sir, do you have personal
23	knowledge about the problems that Don Kassebaum testified
24	about?
25	MR. PURTLE: Yes.

MS. O'NEILL: No further questions. 1 2 JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Krueger? 3 MR. KRUEGER: No questions, Your Honor. JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Schaefer? 4 MR. SCHAEFER: No questions. 5 JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Murray? 6 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions. 7 JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Lumpe? 8 9 COMMISSIONER LUMPE: You said you were trustee at the same time Mr. Kassebaum was? 10 MR. PURTLE: Yes. We served in tandem for at 11 least a couple of years. He served more years than I did, 12 13 but there were two years that we were serving at the same 14 time. 15 COMMISSIONER LUMPE: Did you discuss when you 16 were the trustees about taking over the --17 MR. PURTLE: It was a frequent topic of 18 conversation in our monthly board meeting. 19 COMMISSIONER LUMPE: What was the gist of 20 what you thought you might be able to do? 21 MR. PURTLE: Well, we met with Gary a number 22 of times to go over some of the problems with him, and 23 there was never any positive results out of it. 24 COMMISSIONER LUMPE: And you took no further 25 action then to try to do something?

1 MR. PURTLE: It kind of got passed on to the 2 next board, and it's been an ongoing situation as long as 3 I have been out here, which has been between four and five 4 years. JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you very much, sir. 5 6 The next person is Darwin Zimmerman, and 7 after Mr. Zimmerman will be Tanya Brewington. 8 (Thereupon, Darwin Zimmerman was sworn.) 9 JUDGE HOPKINS: Please state and spell your 10 name for the court reporter, and give us your address. MR. ZIMMERMAN: My name is Darwin Zimmerman, 11 D-a-r-w-i-n, Z-i-m-m-e-r-m-a-n. I live at 2708 Village 12 13 Drive West. I have been here for seven years. I'm a past 14 15 trustee, and served as a trustee for five years and also 16 served with Don Kassebaum. 17 I, myself, have no real problems other than 18 what has already been mentioned as far as the chlorine 19 odor and some possibility of rust. I have replaced 20 filters many, many times, but I think that what I wanted to get across here is the fact that I myself was quite 21 22 involved with the trustees and going to Jefferson City and confronting the PSC and DNR about our problems. 23 24 I also took samples of water and offered it 25 to drink, which no one wanted to do, but that is neither

1 here or there.

2 This has been going on for at least the last 3 six years, that I know of, and I know for a fact that legally I have spent for the village close to \$60,000 on 4 legal fees, and I'm hoping that something would come of 5 it. Unfortunately it looks like it's coming about now, 6 7 which is good. The one thing that I was virtually concerned 8 9 about was the fact that there was a committee in Jefferson 10 City that stated that the water tank was supposed to be installed after a period of time. This was never done. 11 Why that was, I don't know. 12 Being a trustee, I would be confronted by 13 14 people about what is the village doing about the water and 15 sewer? It's kind of hard as a trustee to say, well, our 16 city officials, our county officials are handling it, it's being taken care of, Warren County Water & Sewer has been 17 18 told what they have to do, it's going to come about, it's 19 a matter of time now. It's been pretty long, and I think 20 people are pretty exhausted over waiting and waiting, and 21 that is basically what I wanted to say. 22 JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you very much. 23 Ms. O'Neill? 24 MS. O'NEILL: No further questions. JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Krueger? 25

1 MR. KRUEGER: You said the village spent 2 \$60,000 on legal fees? MR. ZIMMERMAN: I, myself, know for a fact I 3 was involved with at least a \$60,000 bill for attorneys, 4 which I was a little embarrassed about because I didn't 5 6 know I spent that much money. 7 MR. KRUEGER: Were these legal fees all 8 related to Warren County Water & Sewer? 9 MR. ZIMMERMAN: I believe so, yeah, with the 10 phone calls and conversations between trustees at different intervals and also meetings they were attending 11 in Jeff City. I wasn't the only one that attended the 12 meetings in Jeff City. There were two or three other ones 13 14 involved. 15 MR. KRUEGER: Over what period of time were 16 these fees incurred? 17 MR. ZIMMERMAN: The best that I can 18 recollect, I would have to say between -- I have been out 19 now for a year and a half, I guess. 1998 was, I believe, 20 when I was there. I was a trustee for five years, so I 21 had been on for a year and a half at that time, and it was 22 dumped in my lap and I tried to handle it the best $\ensuremath{\text{I}}$ could, and I couldn't get the county to help us look into 23 24 these things. 25 As far as some of the things, we have been

1 showing these pictures for the last seven years and Chet, 2 I don't know if Chet is here tonight, but he's had 3 pictures -- there are records of all of the things that you talked about today. The trustees have records of all 4 of this, and I'm sure that any of those can be subpoenaed. 5 6 MR. KRUEGER: That's all of my questions. 7 JUDGE HOPKINS: Mr. Schaefer? 8 MR. SCHAEFER: Mr. Zimmerman, are you aware 9 that the original proposal for the water tower was to 10 locate the water tower outside of Incline Village? MR. ZIMMERMAN: I believe that was Warren 11 12 County's intention, and that's why he annexed the lot next 13 to his lot in order to do that, and that was never done, and that is one hundred fifty feet away from the existing 14 15 tank. 16 MR. SCHAEFER: Isn't it true that the legal 17 fees were actually incurred fighting the location of the water tower outside of Incline Village? 18 19 MR. ZIMMERMAN: No, not necessarily. It had 20 to do with all the problems that we were having with the water system itself, the taste and smell and the pressure. 21 22 And in order to do this, then we had to 23 further say how are we going to solve this problem, and 24 that problem came from Warren County Water & Sewer, "Hey, 25 I need a new tank." So we said okay, and that's what we

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         went to court over to get something moving here and, then,
 2
         yeah, that was implemented and said you need to get
 3
         another water tank and, getting back to your question,
         possibly yes, that could be what came about, all of the
 4
         other transactions that came before that. There was
 5
 6
         smaller concerns that came legally before that.
 7
                      MR. SCHAEFER: And are you aware that as a

         result of all of the legal action that you took, that the

         plan was changed and the water tower did have to be

         located within Incline Village?

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1 (Thereupon, Tanya Brewington was sworn.) 2 JUDGE HOPKINS: Please state and spell your 3 name. MS. BREWINGTON: Tanya Brewington, T-a-n-y-a, 4 B-r-e-w-i-n-g-t-o-n. 2964 Village Drive West. 5 JUDGE HOPKINS: I didn't know you were 6 7 waiting to speak, and I know you have a small child. Here she comes. 8 9 Go ahead. MS. BREWINGTON: We moved in October of '98, 10 and in December of '98 we kept hearing water leaking, and 11 we turned off all the water. We heard water running, I 12 13 should say. 14 We believed that there was a leak right 15 outside of the foundation wall, so we were going Christmas 16 shopping and we went up to the water house up there and we 17 asked Gary, my husband did, to go down and investigate it and see if there was a problem. Gary got belligerent and 18 19 ignorant, and I know that the two -- my husband does not 20 go for that, and the two were about to go head to head with each other when one of Gary's employees got between 21 22 the two of them and said, "Hey, I'll go down there and 23 I'll take care of it and look at it." 24 By the time we got home, he had fixed the 25 problem. He said when he got down to the water, water had

dug -- had shot up like forty feet. 1 2 Well, before all of this happened, the 3 basement had flooded. At that time it was all clear water, there was no sewer or anything, and I had lost 4 stuff that I was saving for years for my kids. 5 Well, then starting in May of '99 the sewer 6 7 backed up in the basement, and we probably had three or 8 four inches of raw sewage, and I had to ask my thirteen-9 year old son to come and help me clean that out. 10 We had Roto-Rooter come out and they fixed 11 it. We thought, okay, it was a one time fluke. August 22nd of '99 here comes Roto-Rooter 12 13 again. I had to get my son again, because every time it 14 happened it seemed my husband was at work. 15 November 7th, here they come again. We've got raw sewage in the basement. It's like a pattern every 16 17 three months. In November of '99 we finally asked Gary to 18 19 come and check the system. We had been leaving voice mail 20 messages and we never heard from him. He never did come. 21 February 6th, here we go again. Now, we've 22 got Drain Masters coming out. The first time with 23 Roto-Rooter we had to pay, and the second, two times after 24 that we didn't, but Drain Masters charged us every single 25 time.

1	July 13th we went again, sewage in the
2	basement.
3	October 2000, we asked Gary to come help
4	again, and he never came.
5	November 1st, it did it again. We probably
6	had six inches at that time.
7	January and February, we asked Gary to check
8	the system again, and he said he would be down in March or
9	April when the weather broke, and he claimed he had never
10	heard from us before. He never came.
11	So then, again, here we go to March 9, 2001.
12	More water or more sewage in basement. We asked Gary
13	to come again and, again, Gary didn't know we had a
14	problem down there. He never came.
15	And I know that there was another time before
16	we finally had B & J Septic come September 14th to replace
17	the sewer line at a cost of a thousand fifty-eight
18	dollars. When they got down there I have pictures.
19	Unfortunately I don't have copies. If you would like
20	them, I can get copies for you and give them to you.
21	You can see where the sewer line is bowing up
22	and going sideways, and there is no rock underneath the
23	sewer line, no rock under there to hold that sewer line in
24	place. There is one spot where there is like ten inches
25	of nothing underneath part of the sewer pipe where it

1 bowed under.

2	Besides all of that, you know, there was
3	sewage in the basement every three or four months.
4	When we did move in, or when we were building
5	our house, we were the general contractor, we were told by
6	Gary we had to use him, and at that point I called Dan
7	Purtle, and Dan said, "Tanya, it's your property. You can
8	hire whoever you want." Well, we were getting pretty much
9	flack, so we went ahead and used him.
10	We have only been here a little over three
11	years. We have replaced the dishwasher because of calcium
12	buildup. We now have an eighty gallon tank in the
13	basement that has to be installed because we are putting
14	new heating elements in it every three months maybe, three
15	or four months. We get the chlorine, we get the rust, and
16	we get the sulfur.
17	A lot of times we don't have water, which I
18	have to admit has been a little better for us lately.
19	When we first moved in we had no water meter
20	outside and, I guess, I'm guesstimating five to six months
21	they had to come in and physically read our water meter in
22	the basement, and all of a sudden one time, I guess they
23	weren't doing it for a period of time, we got one big
24	utility bill.
25	That's pretty much what I've got.

1 JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you. 2 Ms. O'Neill? MS. O'NEILL: You indicated there were 3 several times you actually had contact with Mr. Smith and 4 the company. Were there other times you left messages 5 while all of this --6 7 MS. BREWINGTON: Every time the sewer would back up, it was pretty much me, I would call and leave a 8 9 message. I would call that number that says, "If you 10 can't reach me here, call this." You would never get anything there. My husband would actually go get in his 11 12 truck and track Gary down. Beings as we are contractors, 13 we have dealt with Gary before, so, you know, he would pretty much track him down. He would just go find him. 14 15 MS. O'NEILL: So in addition to the times you 16 have said you had contact with him, there were other times you tried to get a hold of him to try to fix a problem? 17 MS. BREWINGTON: Right. There are times that 18 19 we actually physically got to say something to him. 20 MS. O'NEILL: Okay, the ones that you 21 described, but every time it backed up, you tried to get a 22 hold of him? 23 MS. BREWINGTON: Right, because I wanted him, 24 instead of paying somebody to come, I wanted him to come with his equipment and do it. It wouldn't happen. 25

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MS. O'NEILL: And you have personal knowledge

         of Gary demanding that you use his services?

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1 COMMISSIONER LUMPE: Thank you. 2 JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you. 3 Our last witness is Frank Ziener. (Thereupon, Frank Ziener was sworn.) 4 JUDGE HOPKINS: Would you please state and 5 6 spell your name for the court reporter, and give us your 7 address. MR. ZIENER: My name is Frank Ziener, 8 9 Z-i-e-n-e-r. I live at 18 Greenbriar, that's one word, Court, here in Incline Village. I have lived here since 10 1996. 11 My remarks will be rather brief. I'm 12 13 fortunate not to have some of the problems that I have heard enumerated up here tonight. Where my area of 14 15 concern is, and I have set that concern down on paper, and 16 I suppose -- is everything Public Counsel's exhibit? 17 MS. O'NEILL: We can make that Public 18 Counsel's exhibit if the Judge will let us. 19 MR. ZIENER: My concern from the fact sheet 20 that was handed out tonight was the possibility of the 21 water system being put into a receivership, and I asked 22 one of the ladies here who the receiver would be, and that 23 is kind of up in the air. 24 The first thing I would like to do before I 25 start in on any remarks, is to thank and commend the

1 Public Service Commission for bringing the hearing to our 2 front door. 3 (Applause.) MR. ZIENER: Thank you very much. 4 The second thing I'm going to say, if either 5 6 this water system or sewer system has to change hands, 7 you're my line of defense from the State of Missouri, and 8 I don't want to lose you, and it's my understanding that 9 if our group, the trustees of Incline Village, acquire the 10 water system, you no longer have any authority or say over 11 them, and I don't want to see that happen. I want you to 12 stay where you are. We are not especially an inclusive group. We 13 14 have approximately eight hundred twenty-two members who 15 pay equal shares to fund this organization. By reason of 16 some of the logistics that are manufactured, in my 17 opinion, at the last annual meeting we had one hundred 18 seventy voters of those eight hundred twenty-two. There 19 is probably five hundred twelve people that don't know 20 about this hearing tonight that own property here. 21 I echo the comments of Mr. Sebacher. If you 22 are going to take it away, and I'm sure there has to be 23 just compensation, but if you are going to take it away 24 from him, give it to another utility who knows how to 25 operate it.

ZIENER: I'm saying that I personally 5 6 don't experience the problems that I heard enumerated up 7 here tonight. Everything I have on is washed in my house, 8 and you don't see bleach spots. I dress the same way 9 every day in black and white, so I don't have those 10 problems. I'm not saying that. I'm saying if somebody 11 12 has to run it, I don't know anybody on the Board of Trustees that knows how to run a water and sewer system. 13 14 Let's get somebody in here that knows how to run one. 15 Missouri-American Water. I think you have to be smart 16 enought to realize if there is two hundred fifty or three 17 hundred houses, I don't know what we've got, and they pay 18 \$40 a month, we can't have St. Louis County Water System 19 here. I wish we did. I drink fifty cups of coffee a day, 20 but I guess I'm not taking a position in that regard, 21 except that I do not want to see somebody running this 22 utility that is not subject to your oversight and 23 authority. 24 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Have you had any sewer 25 problems?

1	MR. ZIENER: No, ma'am. We did have a
2	sewer I don't have a lift pump like these people are
3	talking about. I forget what those are called. I think
4	they are grinder pumps, but there is one down below us
5	that went out about three years ago, and I will say this,
6	personnel from Warren County Sewer & Water came out there
7	in the ice, we had ice on the ground, for three days
8	trying to get that thing straightened out.
9	One other thing I would mention and, look,
10	I'm the first one, me and a good looking gal, used to swim
11	in that lake every day in the summertime, so we use it,
12	and we appreciate that lake, but in the wintertime I seen
13	a thousand geese sitting on the ice out there, and I never
14	saw a one of them go to the port-a-potty.
15	COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Is it important to you
16	that your water and sewer company abide by the Department
17	of Natural Resources
18	MR. ZIENER: Sure. Just like it's important
19	for me to have the telephone company do what they are
20	supposed to do, and they recently came through with the
21	Internet.
22	Yeah, I would like to see you force them to
23	comply, if you can.
24	COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Thank you.
25	JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you.

Any questions? COMMISSIONER LUMPE: Thank you, sir. JUDGE HOPKINS: Commissioner Forbis? COMMISSIONER FORBIS: No questions. JUDGE HOPKINS: Thank you, sir. I have a couple of housekeeping measures and that is Public Counsel's Exhibits 1 through, I believe it's 13, I'm going to hand them over to Miss O'Neill and let you make sure that all of the other parties and commissioners get these. Thank you. That concludes the hearing, and I want to tell you all that your testimony is extremely important to the Commission, and we certainly appreciate it. Thank you very much.
