17	NANCY DIPPELL, Presiding, SENIOR REGULATORY LAW JUDGE
18	HAROLD CRUMPTON
19	CONNIE MURRAY ROBERT G. SCHEMENAUER,
20	COMMISSIONERS.
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1	JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. I think
2	we'll go ahead. If you guys want to
3	take a seat, we'll just go ahead and
4	get started. If somebody comes in,
5	we'll save a few minutes. You can't
6	hear me. I will try to speak up. We
7	can go ahead and go on the record.
8	My name is Nancy Dippell. I'm a
9	regulatory law judge with the Missouri
10	Public Service Commission. The
11	Missouri Public Service Commission has
12	set this time for a public hearing in
13	case number TO-99-483. The hearing
14	was ordered by the Commission and
15	notice of the hearing was sent by the
16	commission's information officer to
17	local newspapers and county
18	commissions. Prior to commencing the
19	hearing I want to give just a brief
20	explanation of the agency and
21	procedures to be followed. You may
22	have already heard some of this
23	information from our staff if you were
24	here for the educational portion. But
25	I'm just going to go ahead and give

1	you a little idea of how the procedur
2	will run tonight, and I will be the
3	person conducting the hearing.
4	The Missouri Public Service
5	Commission is a state agency which
6	regulates the rates charged by
7	investor-owned utility companies in
8	Missouri to ensure that those rates
9	are just and reasonable. The quality
10	of service and the degree of safety
11	employed in their operations are also
12	regulated by the Commission. The
13	Public Service Commission is made up
14	of five commissioners who are
15	appointed by the governor to hear and
16	decide these cases. Three of those
17	commissioners are here this evening,
18	and I would like to introduce them at
19	this time. They are Harold Crumpton
20	who is to my far right, Connie Murray
21	and Robert Schemenauer.
22	The Commission also employs a
23	staff of engineers, accountants,
24	attorneys, financial analysts and
25	other specialists in the field of

1	utility regulation and relies upon
2	their expertise. And some of those
3	individuals are here this evening and
4	they probably already introduced
5	theirselves, so I'm not going to go
6	through the whole list. But I will
7	point out that some of the people who
8	might ask questions this evening of
9	the witnesses are the staff attorneys
10	who is Marc Poston and Julie Kardis
11	here in the second row. And also here
12	with us this evening is the Office of
13	the Public Counsel representative, Mr.
14	Mike Dandino at the far right. And
15	the Office of the Public Counsel's job
16	is to represent you, the public, here
17	at hearings in front of the
18	Commission. All of these individuals,
19	the staff of the Public Service
20	Commission, Office of the Public
21	Counsel and any of the telephone
22	company representatives who are here
23	tonight would be happy to answer any
24	questions they could after the hearing
25	if you have further questions.

Since this is an official hearing
of the Public Service Commission the
statement and testimony of witnesses
will be taken down by the court
reporter and will, therefore, be under
oath. These statements, your comments
are taken down by the court reporter
and put into the official record and
that way the commissioners who aren't
here tonight will be able to read your
comments and consider them as well as
they become a permanent part of the
record.
Our procedure this evening will
basically be that I will call the name
on the witness list that we passed
around and you can come forward and be
seated at the chair. I will swear you
in and you can give your comments to
the commissioners at that time. After
you've given comments I would ask you
to remain seated. I will ask Mr.
Dandino if he has questions that he
might like to ask to clarify things
might like to ask to clarify things

1	testimony, and I may ask the staff
2	attorneys if they have questions and
3	the commissioners may also have some
4	questions they would like to ask just
5	to clarify some of your testimony and
6	get all of your comments.
7	We will have formal evidentiary
8	hearings in this matter which are
9	scheduled to begin on May 15th. Those
10	will be in the offices of the Public
11	Service Commission in Jefferson City.
12	Those hearings will be very much like
13	a trial which you might see in the
14	local courthouse. The staff of the
15	Missouri Service Commission, Office of
16	the Public Counsel and the various
17	telephone communications companies
18	will be presenting formal evidence at
19	that time. But tonight the companies
20	aren't on trial and the commissioners
21	are not necessarily here to answer
22	questions but rather they are here to
23	take your comments and get your input
24	in what's going on. So your comments
25	are very important to us and they will

1	be considered by the commissioners.
2	And again they will be taken down and
3	put into the formal record.
4	I think that's all I have to
5	start. So I would like to go ahead
6	and start with the first witness who
7	has signed, and that is Jerald Zornes.
8	Am I pronouncing that correctly?
9	JERALD ZORNES, being duly sworn in,
10	testified as follows:
11	JUDGE DIPPELL: Would you please
12	state your name for the court
13	reporter.
14	THE WITNESS: J E R A L D Z O R
15	N E S, 303 Northwest Ponderosa Street,
16	Lee's Summit 64064.
17	JUDGE DIPPELL: And since we don't
18	have microphones I will ask you we
19	can hear you up here, but I would say
20	if you would speak up so everyone can
21	hear you.
22	THE WITNESS: Not a problem. I
23	was totally ignorant of what this
24	meeting was about up until this
25	morning. I just happened to be at the

1	publisher's office at the Lee's Summit
2	Journal and I take the Journal. I
3	overlooked the paper Monday or
4	overlooked the little article they
5	had. Basically all they stated was
6	that you will be here at such and such
7	time, you will be in Kansas City such
8	and such time. You will have an hour
9	before and you will have up to two
10	hours for the discussion until 8:30.
11	I knew nothing about MCA. I still
12	don't know really a whole lot about
13	it. I probably would have some
14	comments, further comments if I had
15	had this sooner. And I just made a
16	comment earlier, I would like to see
17	since you have control over the
18	utilities of mandating that if
19	something comes up, have at least a
20	month's warning to where you can get
21	it into the bills where you have got
22	some explanation of what is coming up.
23	And maybe this is included so that the
24	public can be a little more informed
25	because I was born and raised here in

1	this town in Independence and lived in
2	Lee's Summit here for several years.
3	This is the first one I've ever
4	attended. I've always heard about
5	them after the fact. It was generally
6	if it was something big enough that
7	made the news, otherwise it just got
8	how did that happen? Don't know.
9	That's the only comment that I really
10	have is I would like to see that you
11	mandate that if you have got a problem
12	with the phone company, put it in the
13	phone bill at least a month ahead,
14	utility company, put it in the utility
15	bill because we all get the bills.
16	Somebody is going to have to pay it.
17	I belong to a homeowner's association,
18	we get a monthly magazine. A lot of
19	people don't read it. But we all get
20	our bills, so they put the important
21	stuff in the bills. That's really the
22	only comment. I would like to have
23	some comments, but I can't make any
24	comments on this because I don't have
25	enough information. I didn't have it

1	soon enough to prepare. Also I didn't
2	realize that I was paying the MCA
3	rates that were included in my local
4	service and I live in Lee's Summit, I
5	have an Independence exchange, I live
6	a block east of the eastern boundary
7	line of Kansas City, Missouri. I have
8	no idea where I fit in either yellow
9	or green on that. So I would like to
10	have seen that a little more
11	definitive. Other than that, that's
12	all I've got to say.
13	JUDGE DIPPELL: I will just
14	address a couple of your comments.
15	You may want to speak with Mr. Dandino
16	after the hearing if you think that
17	you might have additional comments
18	since it's his office's job to
19	represent you and your comments in
20	front of us. So there still may be
21	opportunity for you to have some input
22	if you go through the Office of Public
23	Counsel. As far as where your service
24	lies, again some of our staff might be
25	able to help you after the hearing to

1	more to define that a little bit.
2	THE WITNESS: It is not important
3	right now in that sense. What I'm
4	saying it's ambiguous with the color
5	coding because it doesn't designate
6	your prefix. If it had in there this
7	covers these prefixes, I would have a
8	little better idea or if it at least
9	had the boundary lines showing where
10	Lee's Summit separated from Raytown or
11	Independence and Blue Springs and
12	that, Sugar Creek, you have got all of
13	these little towns in between. I mean
14	I know the prefixes of primarily of
15	Raytown is 358, 356, Independence is
16	certain numbers, Blue Springs is two
17	twos, but color coding on that I had
18	no idea where I was in that.
19	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Mr.
20	Dandino, did you have questions?
21	MR. DANDINO: Just a few
22	questions. Mr. Zornes, I will give
23	you my card. It has my e-mail address
24	on it too, so if you do have some
25	comments on it, then you can forward

1	it to our office and we'll make sure
2	it becomes part of the official file
3	of the Commission. We'll file it with
4	any consumer letters that we get and
5	provide copies to all of the parties
6	in the case.
7	Also I do want to ask you about
8	your comment about including the
9	meeting notice in with the bill.
10	Would you think it would be better to
11	have it as a separate bill insert,
12	something in with the bill or a
13	message on the bill?
14	THE WITNESS: Possibly either way
15	or just maybe a colored sheet that's
16	different from what the phone company
17	because right now we get a lot of
18	advertising or propaganda, whatever
19	you want to call it, from the phone
20	companies and utility companies
21	offering different services and stuff.
22	And I mean a lot of people, they look
23	at it and I still think it's a better
24	way than letting the newspaper either
25	put it in or not put it in. If they

1	put it in, they edit it down to the
2	point there is a meeting such and
3	such, so what? How is that going to
4	affect me?
5	MR. DANDINO: You don't know what
6	the meeting is?
7	THE WITNESS: I had no idea.
8	MR. DANDINO: You would like at
9	least some detail to let you know what
10	it means to you as a consumer, at
11	least that in the notes?
12	THE WITNESS: This is the first
13	time I've ever been to one of these
14	that I knew about it far enough in
15	advance, and I happened to catch it
16	this morning or I wouldn't have been
17	here tonight and I probably wouldn't
18	have known anything about it.
19	MR. DANDINO: That's all I have,
20	your Honor. Thank you, sir.
21	JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner
22	Crumpton.
23	COMMISSIONER CRUMPTON: No
24	questions.
25	JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner

1	Murray.
2	COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No
3	questions.
4	JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner
5	Schemenauer.
6	COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: No
7	questions.
8	JUDGE DIPPELL: Edith Parker.
9	EDITH PARKER, being duly sworn in,
10	testified as follows:
11	JUDGE DIPPELL: Go ahead, if you
12	would spell your name for the court
13	reporter and give her your address.
14	THE WITNESS: E D I T H P A R K
15	E R, and 2203 Northwest Chipman Road,
16	Lee's Summit, Missouri 64081.
17	JUDGE DIPPELL: You can go ahead
18	and give us your comments.
19	THE WITNESS: Well, I will
20	follow-up with what the previous
21	gentleman said because that was one of
22	the first things I had on my list was
23	it's very upsetting to find out after
24	the fact when something is done to a
25	consumer of anything And I think

1	just throwing it out in a newspaper
2	willy-nilly doesn't get the job done.
3	If you have consumers of a certain
4	utility, for God's sakes, say so in
5	your bill. You are going to bill them
6	every month or whatever. So let them
7	know what you are doing and what you
8	are up to and you need them at a
9	meeting to say something. That
10	doesn't mean they will be there. I
11	have attended political rallies where
12	you've had two or three people in the
13	audience too. So people are
14	apathetic. But I think if they
15	understand it affects something they
16	use everyday like their phone and what
17	the billing could become and all the
18	ramifications of it, I think they
19	might show up. So that would be my
20	suggestion. And I would use it as a
21	separate insert, not on their bill
22	because not everybody reads that. All
23	they read is oh, I owe so much and I
24	have got to have it in by such and
25	such a date, that's it. A lot of

1	people are that way. That's one
2	thing.
3	And I don't understand why people
4	have to pay for things they may or may
5	not use. So I don't think you can
6	just throw it out there that you are
7	going to pay this much money more on
8	your bill because you live here or
9	there. To me that's not right.
10	There's a lot in our phone bills now
11	that I'm very unhappy with, and I have
12	been writing to the federal
13	communications about it. And that's
14	your \$3 charge whether you make a
15	telephone call or not. Come on, give
16	me a break. You shouldn't have to pay
17	for things you don't use.
18	I think these handouts are
19	confusing to people. If you provided
20	them to everybody, they probably
21	wouldn't understand it all because
22	it's very confusing. Like you don't
23	even know where you live on there. It
24	doesn't really show. So you don't
25	really know how you are affected or

1	who else you might know is affected.
2	I don't make enough calls outside my
3	area to worry much about it as some
4	people might. If I do, I'm willing to
5	pay for that. I don't want to be
6	precharged for something I may or may
7	not use.
8	Another thing is I think these
9	hearings can be academic in the long
10	run because I think future of
11	communications are cell phones. They
12	are going to be able to reach
13	everywhere different places. How you
14	all handle those numbers, I don't
15	know. But that's what's going to
16	happen. Telephone lines are going to
17	be pretty nonexistent. We're going to
18	go through the air. We're in the
19	millennium, so to speak. So I'd say,
20	I think this is a dead horse we're
21	beating here anyway on MCA.
22	The other thing I would put in
23	here is, as you mentioned in here
24	about the billing of all these other
25	companies that can be involved in this

1	and all, I can see where that could be
2	so confusing to people trying to make
3	an accurate billing crossing these
4	lines and that lines, I can see that
5	being a total mess. I don't even
6	think the people that make up the
7	bills will understand it, much less
8	the people that get them. That's
9	pretty much what I have to say about
10	it.
11	JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Mr.
12	Dandino, did you have questions?
13	MR. DANDINO: I have no questions.
14	Thank you, ma'am.
15	JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner
16	Crumpton.
17	COMMISSIONER CRUMPTON: No
18	questions.
19	JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner
20	Murray.
21	COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No
22	questions.
23	JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner
24	Schemenauer.
25	COMMISSIONER SCHEMENAUER: No

1	questions.
2	JUDGE DIPPELL: Those were the
3	only witnesses I had on the witness
4	list. We did have some questions that
5	came in. Is there anyone else that
6	would like to come forward to testify?
7	All right then. If there's no one
8	else that would like to speak at this
9	hearing, then I will conclude the
10	hearing and adjourn. Thank you very
11	much for attending.
