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- JUDGE DIPPELL: This is Case No. EC-2001-345,
- 3 the complaint of Zoltek Corporation vs. Union Electric
- 4 Company, doing business as AmerenUE.
- 5 At this time I'd like to go ahead and take
- 6 oral entries of appearance. Zoltek Corporation?
- 7 MR. ALLEN: My name is Terry C. Allen, and
- 8 it's T-e-r-ry, middle initial C., A-l-l-e-n, with Allen,
- 9 Holden & McIntosh Law Offices, LLC here in Jefferson City,
- 10 and I've supplied the reporter with the document for the
- 11 entry of appearance.
- 12 I am cocounsel with the firm of Kodner,
- 13 Watkins, Muchnik & Dunne. Jerry Dunne, D-u-n-n-e, and
- 14 that's Gerald, G-e-r-a-l-d, Brian May, M-a-y, and Zane
- 15 Yates, Y-a-t-e-s, also appear of record on the entry of
- 16 appearance that's heretofore been filed.
- 17 I might mention that the original counsel who
- 18 filed the Complaint was a Dempster Holland. That withdrawal
- 19 as I understand it has now been granted in light of the new
- 20 entry of appearance, and all of us folks represent Zoltek.
- 21 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. And I will note,
- 22 however, that you are the only counsel physically present
- 23 here today; is that correct?
- MR. ALLEN: I was asked to appear by the lead
- 25 counsel.

- JUDGE DIPPELL: That's fine. Thank you.
- 2 AmerenUE?
- MR. COOK: James J. Cook, 1901 Chouteau
- 4 Avenue, Post Office Box 66149, St. Louis, Missouri 63166,
- 5 appearing on behalf of Union Electric Company, doing
- 6 business as AmerenUE.
- 7 JUDGE DIPPELL: Staff?
- 8 MR. DOTTHEIM: Lera Shemwell and Steven
- 9 Dottheim, Post Office Box 360, Jefferson City, Missouri
- 10 65102, appearing on behalf of the Staff of the Missouri
- 11 Public Service Commission.
- 12 JUDGE DIPPELL: And Office of the Public
- 13 Counsel?
- MR. MICHEEL: John B. Coffman and Douglas E.
- 15 Micheel appearing on behalf of the Office of the Public
- 16 Counsel and the Public, P.O. Box 7800, Jefferson City,
- 17 Missouri 65102-7800.
- 18 JUDGE DIPPELL: And again, I will note for the
- 19 record that there is only Mr. Micheel present, that
- 20 Mr. Coffman is entering his appearance but not present
- 21 today.
- 22 As I said, my name is Nancy Dippell, and I am
- 23 Regulatory Law Judge at the Commission. Judge Thompson has
- 24 been assigned to this case and will continue to preside over
- 25 the remainder of it. However, he couldn't be available this

- 1 morning, so I'm presiding over the prehearing conference.
- There was some discussion before we went on
- 3 the record about objections that were made to the form of
- 4 the Complaint, and those have not been ruled on. I'm not
- 5 prepared to rule on those today, and I understand that
- 6 you-all are going to have some additional discussions
- 7 perhaps at this prehearing conference about what you would
- 8 like to do with regard to those.
- 9 And along that vein, part of what has been
- 10 ordered in this case is, part of the procedural order says
- 11 that there should be a filing of a joint list of the issues,
- 12 and something -- this might be a little unusual, but because
- 13 of the questions raised in this case regarding what exactly
- 14 this Commission is being asked to determine, I'm going to
- 15 direct that when you set out your procedural schedule, you
- 16 go ahead and set a date for filing your list of issues as
- 17 your first item instead of waiting until after the testimony
- 18 is filed so that it's clear to this Commission and clear to
- 19 all of you when you're preparing the testimony exactly what
- 20 issues it is that you're dealing with.
- 21 If you have supplemental issues after the
- 22 testimony is prepared and filed and want to request
- 23 permission to supplement that issues list, you can do so at
- 24 that time.
- 25 So I would expect that you would take part of

- 1 your time today, as well as discussing settlement, to
- 2 discuss a proposed procedural schedule, which is supposed to
- 3 be filed by February 15th, and include that issues list as
- 4 the first item to be filed.
- 5 Also, on procedural matters, I just wanted to
- 6 remind you-all that there are procedures set out for
- 7 Commission hearings if you haven't been before the
- 8 Commission before or very much. Those are found in Code of
- 9 State Regulations 240 Chapter 2.
- 10 And I recommend that you-all review those and,
- 11 as a reminder, to remember to bring six copies for the Bench
- 12 of any exhibits that you don't prefile and, of course,
- 13 copies for counsel. That's one for each Commissioner and
- 14 one for the Regulatory Law Judge.
- 15 Are there any matters that you wish to discuss
- 16 on the record or --
- 17 MR. ALLEN: I have none, your Honor.
- MR. COOK: I don't believe so.
- 19 JUDGE DIPPELL: Well, again, I hope you'll
- 20 take this opportunity to discuss settlement of these issues,
- 21 at least discuss -- do you have some feeling for how long
- 22 the hearing might last on this?
- MR. ALLEN: I really don't at this time. In
- 24 terms of what has been filed and in reviewing it and being
- 25 kind of the new kid on the block, if you will, with respect

- 1 to these matters, it appears that there's been substantial
- 2 discovery in the past in regard to an existing damage suit
- 3 that this is a spinoff from, and I understand there will be
- 4 some other need for discovery from talking to Mr. Dunne, and
- 5 we can talk about that also off the record.
- 6 But until personally we have more involvement
- 7 in this with cocounsel, I wouldn't be able to speak to the
- 8 time.
- 9 JUDGE DIPPELL: I will just again refer you,
- 10 the Commission does have some different procedures than
- 11 other courts, the circuit court would have for discovery,
- 12 and there are some special procedures set out in the
- 13 Commission's rules regarding data requests and that kind of
- 14 thing.
- 15 MR. ALLEN: I have reviewed the rules, ma'am.
- 16 Thank you.
- 17 JUDGE DIPPELL: I will refer you to those to
- 18 familiarize yourself with the process before the Commission.
- 19 And is there anything else? Mr. Cook?
- 20 MR. COOK: At this point, unless -- of course,
- 21 prior to knowing what the list of issues might show, the
- 22 company would anticipate as many as eight witnesses, again
- 23 depending on what it is that the complaint really is asking
- 24 for. Hopefully it will not be that much. So it may be a
- 25 longer hearing than a typical bill complaint case.
