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| 2 | JUDGE THOMPSON: Good morning. My name is |
| 3 | Kevin Thompson. We are here in the matter of the |
| 4 | application of the City of Rolla, Missouri for an |
| 5 | order assigning exclusive service territories and |
| 6 | for determination of fair and reasonable |
| 7 | compensation pursuant to Section 386.800 RSMo 1994, |
| 8 | Case No. EA-2000-308. |
| 9 | Could we have entries of appearance, |
| 10 | please, starting with you, Mr. Frey? |
| 11 | MR. FREY: Thank you, your Honor. Dennis |
| 12 | Frey, appearing on behalf of Staff of the Missouri |
| 13 | Public Service Commission. Address is Post Office |
| 14 | Box 360, Jefferson City, Missouri 65102. |
| 15 | JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you. |
| 16 | MR. COMLEY: Judge Thompson, let the |
| 17 | record reflect the entry of appearance of Mark $\mbox{W.}$ |
| 18 | Comley of Newman, Comley and Ruth, 601 Monroe |
| 19 | Street, Suite 301, Jefferson City, Missouri, |
| 20 | appearing on behalf of Intercounty Electric |
| 21 | Cooperative Association. |

JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you, sir.

name is Colin Long of the law firm of Smith, Dunbar

MR. LONG: Good morning, your Honor. My

& Turley, and my partner Michael Dunbar is also

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- 1 entering his appearance on behalf of the
- 2 intervenors Southside Neighbors in this matter,
- 3 collectively known as the Southside Neighbors.
- 4 Each resident is named individually in the motion
- 5 to intervene. Post Office Box 494, Waynesville,
- 6 Missouri 65583.
- JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you, sir.
- 8 MR. LONG: Thank you.
- 9 MR. DUFFY: Gary Duffy, law firm of
- 10 Brydon, Swearengen and England, P.C., P.O. Box 456,
- 11 Jefferson City, Missouri 65102, appearing for the
- 12 Applicant, City of Rolla, Missouri.
- JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you.
- 14 Has everyone filled out one of the entry
- of appearance forms and given that to the
- 16 reporter? Very well. Thank you.
- 17 We have a proposed procedural schedule
- 18 due, I believe, a week from today; is that
- 19 correct?
- MR. FREY: Yes.
- MR. COMLEY: Yes.
- JUDGE THOMPSON: I know we have reset
- 23 this. Some of you are new to Commission practice
- or at least one of you is new to Commission
- 25 practice. I will kind of run over what we will do

- 1 at this prehearing conference and what we expect in
- 2 the proposed procedural schedule. Our prehearing
- 3 conference is expected to be an opportunity for the
- 4 parties to discuss settlement primarily. It's also
- 5 an opportunity for you to discuss the procedural
- 6 schedule and work out your dates, so I hope you've
- 7 all brought your calendars with you.
- 8 I will be here for only a short time, and
- 9 then I will leave the room to you. You will have
- 10 it all day until 5:00 p.m. if, in fact, you want to
- 11 use it that long. And I hope you will take
- 12 advantage of the opportunity and have fruitful
- 13 discussions.
- I will be available in the building if for
- 15 any reason you need me today. The proposed
- 16 procedural schedule will set out dates for
- important procedural events during the life of this
- 18 case. The procedural schedule should include, for
- 19 example, dates for a hearing. There is a calendar
- 20 which is kept back in the Administrative Law Judge
- 21 section that you are welcome to come back and look
- 22 at, pick out your hearing dates. Set as many days
- as you believe you will need to present your case.
- We will also have dates in this procedural
- 25 schedule for the filing of direct testimony, filing

- of rebuttal testimony, filing of surrebuttal
- 2 testimony, for the filing of a list of issues, for
- 3 the filing of position statements. Let me explain
- 4 the list of issues and position statements because
- 5 that is an unusual aspect of Commission practice.
- 6 It's certainly not similar to anything I ever
- 7 encountered in circuit court or federal court.
- 8 We will expect you today, hopefully, but
- 9 perhaps in discussions after today, to agree on a
- 10 list of issues to be presented to the Commission
- 11 for determination. You will then put that in a
- 12 list form and usually Staff takes the lead in doing
- that, which will be filed in the case and a copy,
- of course, served on every party.
- 15 Closer to the hearing date, we will expect
- 16 each party to file a position statement. The
- 17 position statement will follow and, in fact,
- 18 restate the issues from the list of issues and will
- 19 then succinctly state the facts and law which
- 20 support each party's position with respect to each
- 21 issue. You will file these things on paper and
- 22 electronically.
- 23 And, I believe the order adopting
- 24 procedural schedule will have detailed instructions
- on these points and will include my E-mail address

- 1 and such like. I will then take the position
- 2 statements, and I will compile from that a document
- 3 that we call the hearing memorandum, which I will
- 4 use to brief the Commissioners prior to the
- 5 hearing. So they will have been briefed in a
- 6 public meeting, but you're welcome to attend if you
- 7 would like, on the issues to be determined and the
- 8 positions of the parties with respect to those
- 9 issues. Okay.
- 10 As to the filing of testimony, if you're
- 11 not used to practicing before the Commission, I
- don't know if you've ever had the experience where
- 13 you prefile testimony, but that's how we do it
- 14 here. We never have direct examination of any
- 15 witness. We only have cross-examination here at
- our hearings. So your witness will file direct
- 17 testimony. It's similar to a deposition. The
- 18 pages are line numbered. The testimony is under
- 19 oath and it consists of questions and answers. The
- 20 same is done with rebuttal and surrebuttal. And
- 21 take a look at our rules to understand how we use
- those terms, direct, rebuttal and surrebuttal.
- 23 When you put your witness then on the
- 24 stand here, the witness simply adopts the testimony
- 25 and is crossed by each of the other parties as to

- 1 that testimony, and the Commissioners will ask
- 2 questions as well. All right. I guess that pretty
- 3 well sums up the way we do it. There will be an
- 4 opportunity for written briefs following the
- 5 hearing, and we'll set the briefing schedule at the
- 6 close of the hearing. And the Commission will then
- 7 take the case under advisement.
- 8 If you have a particular -- I believe we
- 9 have a statutory deadline in this case. And so the
- 10 Commission will make sure that it disposes of the
- 11 case prior to that statutory deadline, but not
- 12 necessarily very soon before the statutory
- 13 deadline. So if you need the decision sooner than
- 14 that, you should let us know that in your proposed
- 15 procedural schedule.
- Do any of the parties have any matter they
- would like to bring to my attention at this time?
- 18 (NO RESPONSE.)
- 19 JUDGE THOMPSON: Okay. Now, I believe we
- 20 extended the time for decision in this case because
- of a representation that there was going to be
- 22 extensive discovery, isn't that correct?
- MR. LONG: Yes.
- MR. COMLEY: Yes.
- JUDGE THOMPSON: Okay. A new thing that I

- 1 would like to do -- I know lawyers hate to hear
- 2 about new things -- but I would like to see a date
- 3 for close of discovery in the procedural schedule.
- 4 This is a common federal court practice, and I
- 5 think we need to start doing it here, because we
- 6 have had some unhappy experiences with cases that
- 7 are just extremely contested and where the Law
- 8 Judge is having to determine discovery issues on
- 9 the very eve of the evidentiary hearing. Okay.
- 10 So in order to make my life more calm, I
- 11 would like to have a date proposed for the cut off
- 12 discovery. Now, if you later decide if you want to
- 13 go further, of course, you just file a motion. All
- 14 right. And ask for that date to be modified. I
- would like to see in the proposed procedural
- schedule a date for the close of discovery. Okay.
- 17 MR. FREY: Your Honor?
- 18 JUDGE THOMPSON: Sir?
- MR. FREY: Do you have sort of a latest
- 20 date in mind?
- JUDGE THOMPSON: I don't care when it is,
- 22 frankly. I don't care when it is. I just want
- 23 there to be one.
- MR. DUFFY: As long as we're on that
- 25 topic, I know the question has -- the question of

- 1 whether the Commission should order things like
- 2 that has come up in the past and some rule makings,
- 3 and I know the Commission is going through some
- 4 rule makings.
- 5 JUDGE THOMPSON: That is true.
- 6 MR. DUFFY: Is the Commission going to put
- 7 a requirement like that in a rule that's coming
- 8 up?
- 9 JUDGE THOMPSON: No, I don't believe so.
- 10 MR. DUFFY: So this is your own personal
- 11 preference?
- 12 JUDGE THOMPSON: Well, nothing is strictly
- 13 personal. There are non-law judges, and we discuss
- 14 these procedural matters among ourselves very
- 15 frequently. And this is something that has come up
- 16 recently in discussion among the law judges based
- on experiences that one or another of us has had.
- 18 It is our job, of course, to manage the case and to
- 19 bring the case to decision in a timely way. It's
- 20 not our job to decide the case. That's the
- 21 Commissioners' job.
- 22 So in terms of case management, I think
- 23 the close date for discovery would be a useful
- thing based on some cases that I have seen.
- MR. DUFFY: I understand the policy.

- JUDGE THOMPSON: Right. Okay. So, yes,
- 2 we're going to try it here. And if it doesn't
- 3 work, I guess we won't try it again. Sorry to make
- 4 you guys guinea pigs, but, you know, somebody has
- 5 to be. Anything else?
- 6 (NO RESPONSE.)
- JUDGE THOMPSON: Very good. Well, it's
- 8 your room. Please take some time to discuss
- 9 procedural dates.
- 10 (MS. COOK ENTERS THE HEARING ROOM.)
- JUDGE THOMPSON: My goodness. We started
- 12 without you. I didn't think you were coming.
- MS. COOK: I'm very sorry. I didn't think
- 14 I was either.
- JUDGE THOMPSON: Let the record reflect
- 16 the appearance of the Office of Public Counsel. Go
- 17 ahead and make your oral entry of appearance, if
- 18 you would?
- 19 MS. COOK: Thank you. Shannon Cook, on
- 20 behalf of the Office of the Public Counsel and the
- 21 Public, P.O. Box 7800, Jefferson City, Missouri
- 22 65102-7800.
- JUDGE THOMPSON: Now, for you, Mr. Long,
- 24 who are not typically involved, I guess, in
- 25 Commission cases, by law the Office of Public

| 1 | Counsel is involved in every case if they choose to |
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| 2 | participate as is Staff. |
| 3 | What we've done, Shannon, is just run over |
| 4 | the procedural schedule and what should be |
| 5 | happening today. The one quirk will be I want a |
| 6 | date for close of discovery in the proposed |
| 7 | procedural schedule. Other than that it's |
| 8 | everything like you're used to. |
| 9 | Anything else? |
| 10 | (NO RESPONSE.) |
| 11 | JUDGE THOMPSON: Thank you very much for |
| 12 | coming today. It's your room till five o'clock. |
| 13 | The best thing you can do would be to make this |
| 14 | case go away. Then you don't have to file a |
| 15 | proposed procedural schedule and you don't have to |
| 16 | see me again. Thank you very much. We will |
| 17 | adjourn the prehearing conference at this time. |
| 18 | WHEREUPON, the on-the-record portion of |
| 19 | the prehearing conference was concluded. |
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
