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JUDGE HATCHER: Let's bring the proceeding to order and go on the record. Good morning. Today is November 2, 2018 at 10:00 a.m. The Commission has set this time for a Pre-Hearing Conference regarding the complaint file Thirty and 141, L.P., Complainant, v. Missouri-American Water Company, Respondent. That is File No. WC-2019-0004.

My name is Charles Hatcher, and I am the Regulatory Law Judge assigned to this case. Let's have the counsel for the parties make their entry of appearance with those being physically present going first.

MS. CARTER: Diana Carter with Brydon, Swearengen & England for Missouri-American Water Company, and the court reporter has my contact information on the written entry of appearance.

MS. KLAUS: Alexandra Klaus on behalf of Staff, and the court reporter has my information.

MR. PARNAS: Michael Parnas, The Parnas Law Firm, and my information is also on record. I represent the Plaintiff.

JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you. And are there any parties that are not present or not represented that you know of? All right. The purpose of a pre-hearing

conference is to bring the parties together so that the Commission knows that they have met at least once to discuss settlement and to set a procedural schedule.

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The procedural schedule, and I'll be reviewing obviously more for my benefit that your all's, first we'll have the prefiled testimony. The Complainant has the burden and they will file first. The Respondent then files rebuttal. The Complainant then files surrebuttal. And also included in that please have a list of the issues between the parties and a position on each issue.

Rule 4 CSR 240-2.090(6) provides that procedural and substantive matters may be considered at the procedural hearing conference. Are there any pending matters or motions that anyone would like to bring up?

MS. KLAUS: None from Staff, Judge.

MR. PARNAS: Not at this time, Your Honor.

MS. CARTER: None from the utility.

JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you. Then really the questions that the Commission has are if a hearing is really necessary to resolve the issue, the number of witnesses you would expect at a hearing and the number of days you would expect the hearing to be needed and, of course, the date for the hearing.

So are there any other issues that the parties wish to discuss?

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MR. PARNAS: Your Honor, I would, if I may, yesterday, and I don't know if you've talked to Tim, Diana, between yesterday and today, but Tim Luft, the General Counsel for the Water Company, he and I spoke yesterday really for the first time since the meter test that was done a couple of -- maybe six weeks ago I want to say. We all met out at the water company and actually had the meter tested.

Tim and I started talking about possibly settling the case. I want to represent to the Court that that part has actually been done or begun maybe is a better way to put it. So I just wanted to alert counsel, local counsel, that that has happened.

MS. CARTER: Yes. Tim and I talked yesterday afternoon and, Judge, my question for you would be would you mind if we delayed filing a procedural schedule to allow time for continued discussion?

JUDGE HATCHER: That sounds great.

MR. PARNAS: Judge, just for purposes of how I would see my case being tried, you know, we would -- If the Court is familiar with the case, this is a dispute involving water usage for a waterfall. So the entity that I represent doesn't have any employees but it's

part of a big shopping center development. So I would anticipate the people that have been paying the bills, G.J. Grewe, that management company, that the person that came in and prepared the exhibit which was attached to my petition which was really basically our billing history with the water company, that individual would for sure testify and then we have companies that we have utilized. We have a maintenance company that routinely on a daily basis that is out there at the shopping center and does maintenance work around the waterfall.

We also have had a number of contractors that have done tests on the waterfall, the lines and that kind of thing, and I would expect those individuals to come.

So my case would maybe be two, possibly three witnesses. That's kind of it in the nutshell from my side of it.

JUDGE HATCHER: All right. Thank you. I appreciate that. Let's get back to kind of what we're going to produce out of our pre-hearing conference, because we're just about at the end of that without any other issues to be brought up.

The Commission does encourage settlement. You all have the room until noon. That is a little under two hours from now. And what we can do given Ms.

Carter's suggestion is if it would be amenable to 1 2 everyone I can ask for a status report in, I'm good with 3 30 or 45 days if anyone has a suggestion that they'd like to make out loud. 4 5 MR. PARNAS: Your Honor, is that a joint 6 statement that's prepared by both parties like as a 7 stipulation or is it individually do Diana and I each 8 submit -- Is it like a pleading that says we're settling 9 or we're going to trial, or is it simply just notifying the Court of what we're doing or the Commission? 10 11 JUDGE HATCHER: These are pretty informal. 12 I'm just looking for a note, you'll have to have it on the official header, of course, but just a note saying 13 14 yeah, we're still talking, we need more time or we 15 finished talking and we don't see eye to eye, we're 16 ready to start scheduling for testimony and such. Diana, Tim mentioned to me with 17 MR. PARNAS: regard to scheduling, I don't know if he said the same 18 19 to you, but he said if we had to have an outside date 20 today for like to actually try this thing he was 21 thinking April, May. Does that comport with what you 22 and he talked about? 23 MS. CARTER: Yeah, and we don't need to do any 24 of that today. We can talk more once the Judge and the

court reporter get to finish their part.

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1	JUDGE HATCHER: I'm going to wrap up my spiel
2	here, and I believe minutes after that the court
3	reporter will leave. We'll leave you guys on the phone.
4	Talk amongst yourselves as the kids say. And out of
5	this meeting all I'm looking for is some type of filing
6	in 30 days from one or all staff depending on how you're
7	all getting along that says we're continuing to
8	negotiate and we just need a little more time to wrap up
9	some details or we're going a different direction and we
10	need to start talking about setting a schedule.
11	MR. PARNAS: Got it.
12	JUDGE HATCHER: Absolutely nothing formal due
13	now. We don't need to pick dates. We don't need to
14	pick anything. I just want to kind of frame the
15	discussion for whatever your next 60 seconds to two
16	hours will be.
17	MR. PARNAS: Okay. I get it. Thank you, Your
18	Honor.
19	JUDGE HATCHER: All right. Absolutely. Any
20	other issues that I can take care of while I'm here?
21	MS. KLAUS: None from Staff.
22	JUDGE HATCHER: Okay. I feel I'm finally
23	rolling along. Excellent. Let's go off the record.
24	Thank you all.
