3	JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Well, good
4	evening. It is Tuesday, May 1st, 2012. Commissioners
5	set this time for a local public hearing in files
6	numbers WA-2012-0066 and SA-2012-0067. The cases are
7	captioned as: "In the Matter of Missouri-American
8	Water Company For a Certificate of Convenience and
9	Necessity Authorizing It to Install, Own, Acquire,
10	Construct, Operate, Control, Manage and Maintain Water
11	and Sewer Systems in Christian and Taney Counties,
12	Missouri."
13	My name is Harold Stearley, and I'm the presiding
14	officer over tonight's hearing. With me tonight is
15	Commissioner Jarrett.
16	Before we begin, Commissioner, would you like to
17	make an opening statement?
18	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Thank you, Judge
19	Stearley.
20	Good evening, everybody. Big crowd tonight.
21	That's good. I'm glad we have lots of participation
22	tonight. I am Terry Jarrett, one of the Commissioners
23	on the Public Service Commission. We currently have
24	three Commissioners. We have two vacancies right now.
25	But, anyway, we have other things going on and so we

1	Page4 try to split these local public hearings between us
2	kind of equally. The fact that the other
3	Commissioners aren't here doesn't reflect that they're
4	not interested. It's just that there are other things
5	that we're dealing with. And there is a court
б	reporter here transcribing this, and so all the
7	Commissioners will read that and have this information
8	that you're going to provide for us tonight.
9	These open public hearings are very important to
10	the Commissioners. Normally in cases we have
11	attorneys appear that represent the parties. We hear
12	from expert witnesses, whether they're economists or
13	accountants or engineers or lawyers, and we don't
14	often get a chance to hear from average consumers, the
15	rate-payers. So this is an opportunity, number one,
16	for you to come and give us your thoughts. It's also
17	a chance for us as Commissioners to hear directly from
18	the rate-payers who are affected in these cases.
19	So I welcome you. I'm glad you're here. Look
20	forward to your comments, and I'll turn it back over
21	to the Judge.
22	JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, Commissioner.
23	Normally we begin by me going down our witness
24	list where people have signed in, but I know some
25	people may have some other obligations. So is there

1	anyone who would like to offer some comments to the
2	Commission that may have to leave early tonight as
3	opposed to being able to stay?
4	Yes, sir.
5	MR. CATT: How do you do this? Do you want
6	me to say my name and where I live?
7	JUDGE STEARLEY: I'll have you state and
8	spell your name for our court reporter. I will then
9	swear you in.
10	MR. CATT: Do you want me to come that way?
11	JUDGE STEARLEY: Yeah, you can come forward
12	if you wish. As long as we can hear you.
13	MR. CATT: I'm soft-spoken.
14	JUDGE STEARLEY: So if you would go ahead
15	and please state and spell your name.
16	MR. CATT: My name is Larry Catt, C-A-T-T.
17	LARRY CATT,
18	being first duly sworn by the Judge, testified as
19	follows:
20	JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. You may
21	proceed.
22	MR. CATT: Well, I live in Saddlebrooke;
23	I've lived there for five years. And I'll be brief
24	because I know that people want to speak. But one of
25	the things that I'm concerned about, and my wife and a
1	

Page 6 lot of my neighbors, we have a developer who has 1 2 basically abandoned our area, our village. He owns the water and the sewage, and we're all real concerned 3 4 about what will happen if this sale doesn't go 5 through. Because, quite honestly, he's done some 6 things that normal developers and good people don't 7 We're worried about the ability to have water and do. 8 sewage in the future.

9 We've heard tonight that American -- the American 10 Water Company is proposing a rate that is the same as 11 the rate they're proposing at StoneBridge, which is 12 our neighbors just not too far from here. It's a 13 larger community than Saddlebrooke. And nobody wants 14 to pay too much, but on the other hand, that seems fair if you're paying the same amount as somebody else 15 in the area in a similar situation. StoneBridge is 16 quite a bit larger than Saddlebrooke, so I'm guessing 17 18 that the cost to run that system is less per person or 19 per entity.

But I think what I really want to make sure I get across is the concern we have that if this doesn't go through, we may be in a situation where we won't have water or sewage, and that's a very likely possibility based on some history that we've experienced in this situation. I'm thinking some of the people here will

1	agree with me and some may not, but I'd suspect most						
2	people would agree.						
3	And like I said, I think from what we have heard						
4	earlier, the rates sound fair, if that's what other						
5	people are paying in the same area, rather than some						
6	other part of the country or the state.						
7	And I think that's all I have, and thank you for						
8	listening.						
9	JUDGE STEARLEY: Before you step back,						
10	Commissioner, do you have any questions for this						
11	witness?						
12	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: No, I don't. I						
13	appreciate your comments. You're straightforward and						
14	understandable. So thank you very much for coming and						
15	sharing with us.						
16	MR. CATT: Thank you.						
17	JUDGE STEARLEY: And do any of the						
18	attorneys have any questions for this witness?						
19	Thank you very much for your testimony.						
20	MR. CATT: Thank you, Judge.						
21	JUDGE STEARLEY: Anyone else who would need						
22	to leave early who would like to offer some comments						
23	for the Commission?						
24	If not, I will go ahead and start reading names						
25	off our sign-in sheet, and the first one I have is						

Page 8 Joel Trautmann. 1 2 Mr. Trautmann, if you'd please raise your right hand. 3 4 MR. TRAUTMANN: Okay. Do you want me to 5 spell my name first? 6 JUDGE STEARLEY: Yes, you can do that. 7 MR. TRAUTMANN: T-R-A-U-T-M-A-N-N. 8 JOEL TRAUTMANN, 9 being first duly sworn by the Judge, testified as 10 follows: 11 JUDGE STEARLEY: Please proceed. 12 MR. TRAUTMANN: Well, I am the president of 13 the Property Owners Association in Saddlebrooke, and I 14 think everybody here tonight and everybody who is currently on the system is in the Property Owners 15 16 Association. And I have to apologize, first, because 17 I'm president of the Property Owners Association, I don't get to act like I'm retired anymore, so the only 18 19 chance I get is to come casual. 20 But at any rate, representing the Property Owners 21 Association, I just want to present that I have not heard one voice of dissent from anybody about their 22 desire for Missouri-American to take over our system 23 24 and to operate it. And as Mr. Catt spoke previously, 25 I think the primary concern is that we not get left in

Page 9 1 a lurch. I get calls quite frequently, Well, what if, 2 you know, my system goes down tomorrow, or what if the 3 sewer line breaks or whatever? Because we are 4 concerned that we don't know that our developer, who 5 is still maintaining it at this point, whether or not 6 he's going to be here, going to be able to do it 7 tomorrow.

8 I had another question I had wanted to ask earlier 9 I didn't get a chance to ask, but that question would have been that if he walks and leaves tomorrow and 10 11 he's not around to fix the system or he doesn't have the wherewithal in the interim while this process is 12 13 going through, my question is, and I think the 14 question of most people here is, what is our recourse? We kind of feel like we're living on borrowed 15 16 time, and so we all feel a real sense of urgency on 17 this. And I guess that's why my comments weren't too sympathetic to the intervenor, and my apologies for 18 19 that, but we have a very serious concern here that this deal go through and that it go through as quickly 20 21 as possible. And that's all I have. 22 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Thank you, 23 Mr. Trautmann. 24 Any questions from Counsel of this witness? MR. CONRAD: No offense taken, sir. 25 Ι

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1	Page 10 would ask you this question, though: If your rates in
2	the future were to go up 30 percent, 40 percent, 50
3	percent, would that still be okay?
4	MR. TRAUTMANN: Well, I guess I would have
5	to answer that in the future, based on the underlying
6	facts. I mean, you're asking me a hypothetical
7	question without any factual background.
8	MR. CONRAD: Well, forgive me, sir, your
9	concern was about what was going to happen in the
10	future, so I thought it was appropriate maybe to ask
11	you about something that might be in the future also.
12	MR. TRAUTMANN: Well, my concern is what's
13	going to happen tomorrow. That's my first concern.
14	What's going to happen further down the road if it
15	goes up 50 percent, then I suppose I will be
16	concerned, but I will be asking for the facts of why
17	it's going up. You're not providing me any facts. So
18	will I be concerned in the future? Maybe I will,
19	maybe I won't. Give me the facts.
20	MR. CONRAD: Okay.
21	JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Any other
22	questions? Commissioner?
23	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Mr. Trautmann, I
24	don't have any questions. I appreciate your position
25	here and your position's stated very clearly, and

Page 11 1 thank you for that. 2 JUDGE STEARLEY: And I'll take a moment 3 here. You can go ahead and sit down, Mr. Trautmann. 4 Thank you. 5 I did kind of go a little out of order because I was trying to make sure we got everyone's comments in 6 7 if someone had to leave early. But I do want to take 8 entries of appearance from counsel real quickly and 9 make sure we get that on the record. This little 10 exchange reminded me I'd better do that. So let me ask for entries beginning with the 11 counsel for Missouri-American. 12 MR. REICHART: Thank, Your Honor. 13 14 Appearing on behalf of Missouri-American Water, John J. Reichart. My address is 727 Craig Road, 15 St. Louis, Missouri 63141. 16 17 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, Mr. Reichart. 18 For Ag Processing. 19 MR. CONRAD: Sure. Appearing on behalf, 20 Your Honor, of Ag Processing, Stuart W. Conrad of the 21 law firm of Finnegan, Conrad & Peterson. Our office is at 3100 Broadway, Suite 1200, Kansas City, Missouri 22 23 64111. 24 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, Mr. Conrad. For the office of the Public Counsel? 25

Page 12 MS. BAKER: Thank you. Christina Baker, 1 2 P.O. Box 2230, Jefferson City, Missouri 65102, appearing on behalf of the Office of the Public 3 4 Counsel and the customers. 5 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, Ms. Baker. And for the staff of the Missouri Public Service 6 7 Commission? 8 MS. TOMPKINS: Appearing on behalf of the 9 staff of the Missouri Public Service Commission, 10 Goldie Tompkins, P.O. Box 360, Jefferson City, Missouri 65102. 11 12 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, Ms. Tompkins. 13 And now I'll get back -- yes? 14 MR. CONRAD: I think I misspoke. Our suite 15 is 1209, rather than 1200, but not a big deal. It 16 will get there. 17 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: We can find you if 18 we need to. 19 MR. CONRAD: I think so. 20 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, Mr. Conrad. 21 Now we'll get back to our witness list, and it looks like the next person up is John King. Mr. King, 22 23 if you would please state and spell your name for our 24 court reporter. 25 MR. KING: John, J-O-H-N, King, K-I-N-G.

1	Page13 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you. Raise your
2	right hand.
3	JOHN KING,
4	being first duly sworn by the Judge, testified as
5	follows:
б	JUDGE STEARLEY: You may proceed.
7	MR. KING: I live at 305 Kramer Lane, so
8	obviously I'm in Saddlebrooke, a resident of
9	Saddlebrooke. And I'm here to speak a little bit
10	different angle. The rates are important to me as a
11	resident, but I'm also here to speak from and for all
12	the community regarding life safety and how it relates
13	to water.
14	I am a member of the Highlandville Rural Fire
15	Protection District. I serve as a captain on that
16	fire department. That fire department covers 135
17	square miles, approximately, has five stations and one
18	of the stations is in Saddlebrooke, and we have
19	firemen that are members of that station.
20	That station is equipped, fully equipped for
21	response to our community. Has an engine in it, fully
22	equipped, carries a thousand gallons of water. It has
23	a water tender/tanker that carries 1600 gallons of
24	water; has a wildland brush truck and it carries
25	approximately 200 gallons of water, and we also have a

1	rescue	unit	for	rescue	situations	such	as	car	wrecks	
2	and so	forth	L.							

Over the last few years, myself and our fellow 3 firemen, we haven't had any serious incidents in 4 5 Saddlebrooke regarding fire, thank goodness. We've 6 had a couple of close calls. But we also train. So, 7 therefore, we go to the hydrants to refill our equipment, and we have found over the years several 8 9 hydrants that don't work.

10 Now, we have not done a thorough inventory of the hydrants, so I cannot tell you how many don't work, 11 and I can't tell you where they would be if they 12 I know when I first moved into my house, 13 didn't work. 14 the one right in front of my house did not work. Ι did report it to the developer and it got fixed. 15 But I'm very confident that there are several hydrants 16 that do not work. 17

18 And, furthermore, I'm very confident that, 19 speaking on behalf of the community, I would support the purchase. Because last winter American Water came 20 and gave a presentation to one of our board of trustee 21 meetings, and a lot of us were there and it was in the 22 23 winter, and they stated that they were very, very 24 concerned about the hydrants and that they would -oh, and by the way, I spoke to one of our members on 25

Page 15 the board of trustees, and I know they met with them, 1 and I was told that they would probably inspect the 2 hydrants at least twice a year. 3 4 I just spoke to the fire chief a couple days ago, 5 and he is working on an ISO inspection, which is an insurance rating inspection, and they will, I'm sure, 6 7 require some type of an inventory and a testing of the 8 hydrants in our community. Well, we as a community 9 are very concerned with our fire insurance rates, and 10 we don't want those to change. If anything, we do 11 want them to change to the better, of course. So I'm here to speak on behalf of the community to 12 13 say that we need a company to take over the system. 14 And I'm very confident, from what I've heard from American Water, that they will, in fact, pick up the 15 ball, get onto this hydrant situation in an immediate 16 manner. I feel confident, after hearing testimony at 17 other meetings, that this will happen, and it's very 18 19 important that it does happen. It's a life safety 20 factor, as well, and not a rate factor. 21 So as I understand it, we are here to speak for or against this purchase, and I'm here to speak for that 22 23 purchase. Okay. 24 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Counsel, any questions for Mr. King? 25

Page 16 MR. REICHART: No questions, Your Honor. 1 2 JUDGE STEARLEY: Commissioner? 3 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: No questions, 4 Mr. King. Thank you for your testimony, appreciate it 5 very much. JUDGE STEARLEY: And next on our list, I б 7 have Jerald Sears. 8 MR. SEARS: That would be me, sir. 9 JUDGE STEARLEY: And if you'd please state 10 and spell your name for our court reporter. 11 MR. SEARS: Jerald R. Sears, J-E-R-A-L-D, middle initial R, S-E-A-R-S is the last name. 12 13 JERALD R. SEARS, 14 being first duly sworn by the Judge, testified as follows: 15 16 JUDGE STEARLEY: Please proceed. 17 MR. SEARS: Thank you. 18 First, I'd like to preface my comments by stating 19 I am a member of the board of trustees, elected officials for the Village, and I also want to state 20 21 that we are very much in favor, as a whole, on the board that this purchase and transfer of assets go 22 23 through. 24 One thing that has not been mentioned is that in the past -- well, last year, we had approximately a 25

1	Page 17 ten percent growth in the number of homes that were
2	built in the Village, which is unheard of. Nationwide
3	that's unbelievably good. That just shows that our
4	growth rate is expanding even in the face of the worst
5	economy in decades, and we're well on the track of
б	doing that same thing this year, if not exceeding it.
7	The second thing I'd like to do, if I could,
8	please, I have here a signed petition that is signed
9	by in excess of 100 people, I believe, certainly 100
10	or more people here that are Village residents, and
11	this is their statement that I would like to read:
12	"We, the undersigned residents of the Village of
13	Saddlebrooke, petition the Public Service Commission
14	to approve the proposed sale and transfer of the
15	assets of Saddlebrooke Water and Sewer Infrastructure
16	LLC to [the] Missouri-American Water Company.
17	"Approval of this sale will afford the residents
18	of Saddlebrooke the experience and high quality of
19	service provided by American Water Company and the
20	future protection of the Public Serve Commission."
21	That's basically all I have to say, gentlemen.
22	And you are welcome to these if you want it.
23	JUDGE STEARLEY: I was going to say, would
24	you like to offer that as an exhibit?
25	MR. SEARS: Absolutely, sir.

Page 18 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. We will mark it as 1 2 Exhibit 1. You can give the copy to our court 3 reporter. 4 MR. SEARS: Thank you, ma'am. 5 (Exhibit No. 1 was marked for identification.) JUDGE STEARLEY: Are there any objections 6 7 to the admission of Exhibit No. 1? Hearing none, it shall be received into the record. 8 9 Any questions from Counsel for this witness? 10 MR. REICHART: No. 11 JUDGE STEARLEY: Commissioner, any questions for Mr. Sears? 12 13 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Yes, Mr. Sears, I do 14 have a question. 15 MR. SEARS: Sir. 16 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Mr. King, who spoke before you, talked a little bit about the problems 17 with the hydrants, and that sparked a question in me. 18 19 Are there any other problems with the system that you 20 are aware of as far as quality of water, quality of 21 the service? Anything you can tell me on that would 22 be appreciated. MR. SEARS: It is my understanding that our 23 24 septic system, particularly, is state of the art. In 25 fact, it was announced in the State house, and I'm not

1	sure how long ago this was. Probably two thousand
2	I've been there since 2004. This was probably in 2005
3	or '6, that that system was touted as being one of the
4	best systems in the state. And there was a proposed
5	bill, as I understand it, that was going to mandate
6	that all new systems were going to have this same
7	success rate or or, you know, efficacy.
8	As far as the water, our water, as I understand
9	that, we've got a pipe 1500 feet in the ground. It
10	was told to me that our water comes out of the ground
11	cleaner than Springfield's drinking water. We have a
12	2,500 gallon, I believe, tank water tower up on the
13	hill.
14	We've never had any problems at all with any of
15	that. The water quality has been superb. It's very
16	clean. Tastes really good. Crystal clear. I don't
17	know of any problems that have not been addressed.
18	Anything that did happen with the system was easily
19	fixed as far as the water system. So, no, sir, I
20	don't know of any problems.
21	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Okay. Thank you.
22	That's the only question I had. I appreciate it,
23	Mr. Sears.
24	MR. SEARS: Appreciate it, sir.
25	Anyone else?

Page 20 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you for your 1 2 testimony. 3 MR. SEARS: My pleasure. 4 JUDGE STEARLEY: Next on the list, and you 5 might have to help me with your last name here, Marie -- is it Stopyra? 6 7 MS. STOPYRA: Take me off, please. JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. I hope I didn't 8 9 butcher your name. 10 MS. STOPYRA: No, you said it about right. 11 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Last, we have Carol Gaines. 12 13 MS. GAINES: My name is Carol, C-A-R-O-L, 14 Gaines, G-A-I-N-E-S. 15 JUDGE STEARLEY: If you'd raise your right 16 hand. 17 CAROL GAINES, being first duly sworn by the Judge, testified as 18 19 follows: 20 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. Please proceed. 21 MS. GAINES: My name is Carol Gaines. I am a Saddlebrooke resident. I'm also chairman of the 22 Village Board of Trustees, along with Mr. Sears, and I 23 24 think the other trustees are also in attendance this 25 evening. And I just -- I don't want to repeat a lot

1	Page 21 of information, but I can't reiterate enough.
2	You can see, the people in this room are the
3	people of the Village of Saddlebrooke. They've taken
4	the time to come to all of our meetings as we've been
5	working with Missouri-American Water Company, who has
6	worked with us very closely, answered all the
7	questions that we've had up to this point.
8	We thought that the sale was going to be concluded
9	hopefully last year. It has seemed to draw out and
10	draw out longer, and it's very disappointing and
11	disturbing to us, as the Village representatives, to
12	hear that now we're still looking at several more
13	months down the road.
14	I'd like to reiterate also what Mr. Trautmann, our
15	Property Owners Association president, said. This is
16	a situation that is very serious for Saddlebrooke. We
17	understand the concerns that other communities have.
18	I also own property in St. Louis, Missouri.
19	Missouri-American is my provider up there. I have had
20	nothing but good service from them.
21	The people of Saddlebrooke deserve some good
22	service, they deserve uninterrupted service, and they
23	deserve quality service from somebody that is
24	regulated by the Public Service Commission, because we
25	have not had that to this point. They come out in

1	Page 22 numbers, they support the community. Again, you can
2	see by their attendance tonight how important an issue
3	this is to all of us, and I just really want you to
4	understand that this is a vital issue, and time is of
5	the essence here for us. We cannot afford to have any
б	interruptions in our service.
7	The health and safety of our community and
8	everything that we bought into when we bought here,
9	because we were told touted the same thing as
10	Mr. Sears said, this was a model system, in Jeff City.
11	As the chairman of the board of trustees, I had a
12	call today from a community in the Lake of the Ozarks
13	area who is trying to put in a sewer system, and they
14	were told to call Saddlebrooke because they heard that
15	our system was a very good system and a model to be
16	used throughout the state for small communities, and
17	they, too, were a village.
18	We had a very long conversation with them, got
19	them in touch with the engineering firm and everybody
20	that designed our system. We have not had any
21	problems with it. It has worked well, but we are
22	concerned because of the ownership and the quality of
23	service and the health issues for our community.
24	So, as a community representative, please note all
25	of the attendance from the people in Saddlebrooke

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Page 23 here, because this is a vital issue to everybody. 1 2 Thank you. JUDGE STEARLEY: Are there any questions 3 4 from Counsel for this witness? 5 Yes, Mr. Conrad? 6 MR. CONRAD: Yes, ma'am. Thank you very 7 much for your attendance. Has anyone from the 8 company, by "company" I mean Missouri-American, made 9 any statements or representations to you with respect 10 to what the future might hold on rates? 11 MS. GAINES: No. 12 MR. CONRAD: Thank you. That's all. 13 MS. GAINES: I can tell you from my 14 experience in St. Louis from years and years --15 MR. CONRAD: You've answered the question, 16 unless the Commissioner wants you to go ahead. 17 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Please go ahead. MS. GAINES: They have Public Service 18 19 Commission hearings for the water rates in St. Louis 20 all of the time. I'm sure that people are in this 21 room who are always involved with that, and they get good attendance. But percentage-wise, they don't have 22 the attendance that we have here, and they've always 23 24 worked out the issue for the benefit of the consumer. You're looking at the consumers, you're looking at 25

1	the people who need the service very badly, and that
2	has to be at the very top of the list of we'll work
3	out all of these other small details. The people here
4	understand that the rates probably will go up or will
5	increase because of our service, but I don't think
6	you'll find them objecting to that. We want to have
7	quality assurance service on our utilities in
8	Saddlebrooke. It's a vital issue for any community,
9	and we are all here telling you that that is what we
10	want.
11	COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Thank you. As
12	Mr. Conrad will attest, sometimes it's fun being the
13	Commissioner and getting to go last. Thank you very
14	much.
15	JUDGE STEARLEY: That completes the list
16	that we had where people had signed up to testify, but
17	anyone is certainly welcome to. Is there someone else
18	who'd like to oh, please come forward, sir.
19	Like with everyone else, would you please state
20	and spell your name.
21	MR. WILSON: Robert Wilson, W-I-L-S-O-N.
22	JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Wilson, if you'd raise
23	your right hand.
24	ROBERT WILSON,
25	being first duly sworn by the Judge, testified as

1 follows:

Page 25

2	JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. Please proceed.
3	MR. WILSON: I'm a property owner in
4	Saddlebrooke. We do not currently live there. We
5	have not built yet. So I kind of want to speak from
6	the position of somebody that's got about 35 years of
7	public works experience, water, sewer, storm water,
8	pretty much streets, everything you can think of.
9	I appreciate the fact that there have been no
10	major issues with the sewer or the water at this point
11	and that it's of good quality, and the sewer system is
12	supposed to be and I would believe is state of the
13	art. But the one thing that is untangible is we
14	really don't know what condition that these systems
15	are in.
16	We don't even really know where they are in some
17	respects. We don't know where the water mains are,
18	the sewer mains are. We have no drawings. We have no
19	nothing I mean, nothing to base anything on, which
20	is something we desperately need. And we would expect
21	that, you know, eventually down the road, should this
22	go through, that we would be able to get that
23	information so we could use it for other important
24	purposes as the operation of the Village.
25	So, really, we just you know, we don't know

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1	what we're really up against, per se, and we
2	desperately need to know that. We desperately need to
3	have a system that we can rely on and a company we can
4	rely on, and you know, so we can trust that our
5	system is in good shape and that the health of the
б	people, you know, are being maintained and the health
7	of the system is being maintained.
8	As a public works employee, as an engineer, I
9	understand exactly what the fire department is saying.
10	You know, you can't afford to have a hydrant that is
11	in a non-working condition, when you might have a fire
12	right next to it and you can't use it, and you don't
13	know exactly how far away the other one is.
14	So, you know, even though things may be going well
15	right now, how long will that last without some sort
16	of management? And I don't believe that we can rely
17	on the current developer to really do anything to help
18	us out. So the quicker this goes through, the better
19	off we all will be. So that's all I have.
20	JUDGE STEARLEY: Any questions from Counsel
21	for this witness?
22	MR. CONRAD: Just to clarify. You have no
23	management now from the developer?
24	MR. WILSON: I'm not aware of any. We may,
25	we may not. I don't know.
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Page 27 MR. CONRAD: And no drawings of where lines 1 2 are? MR. WILSON: No. That's been asked for by 3 4 multiple entities many times within the Village, and I 5 don't believe those have ever been provided. 6 MR. CONRAD: And you've asked the 7 developer? 8 MR. WILSON: Oh, yeah. I mean, please correct me if I'm wrong. That's the information I'm 9 10 going off of. 11 MR. CONRAD: Thank you. 12 JUDGE STEARLEY: Any other questions? Commissioner Jarrett? 13 14 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: None from me, 15 Mr. Wilson. Thank you for your testimony. I 16 appreciate it. 17 JUDGE STEARLEY: Is there anyone else who would like to -- yes, please come forward. 18 MR. BAKER: Richard Baker. 19 20 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right, Mr. Baker, if 21 you'd raise your right hand. 22 RICHARD BAKER, being first duly sworn by the Judge, testified as 23 24 follows: 25 JUDGE STEARLEY: Please proceed.

Page 28 1 MR. BAKER: Thank you, Your Honor. I just actually wanted to clarify something that 2 Mr. Wilson said. I have been in contact with the 3 4 Department of Natural Resources, and I know that when 5 those lines were put in and the systems were put in, 6 that those blueprints were there. I've seen 7 blueprints there. So I'm confident that there are at least some 8 9 blueprints on file at some location which would indicate where those water lines are and where the 10 11 mains are. There was a big issue because some of 12 those were put in before they knew it, but I think they've settled that issue. In other words, he did it 13 14 without getting permits, but he did it and the blueprints were there. 15 16 JUDGE STEARLEY: Any questions of Mr. Baker? Mr. Jarrett? 17 18 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Thank you for 19 clarifying that, Mr. Baker. MR. REICHART: Your Honor, I believe we 20 have some more clarification from the company on that 21 issue if Your Honor would like to hear that --22 23 JUDGE STEARLEY: Certainly. 24 MR. REICHART: -- the question about the blueprints of the mains. 25

1	Page 29 MR. BARNHART: Yes, we do have drawings.
2	We have different sets.
3	JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. And before you
4	continue, if you would please identify yourself.
5	MR. BARNHART: Matthew A. Barnhart with
6	Missouri-American Water Company. I'm the operations
7	manager. And the answer is, yes, we do have some
8	drawings. Do they need some fine work? I'm sure they
9	do.
10	Like the gentleman said before, there were
11	drawings submitted when different phases of the
12	projects were done. So I just want to get that
13	clarified.
14	MR. WILSON: May I speak to that?
15	JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Mr. Wilson.
16	MR. WILSON: I didn't want to give the
17	impression that I didn't think that no drawings had
18	ever been you know, had never been used or any of
19	the system had not been designed per a drawing. What
20	I was trying to say was, the residents, the occupants
21	of Saddlebrooke, do not have that information and have
22	never been able to obtain that information.
23	I would assume that Missouri Water would have been
24	able to get them or would at least get them if the
25	sale went through. And that's one of the reasons to

Page 30 push for this, in that we would then have a resource 1 2 for that to be able to conduct some of our other city business -- or village business. Just to clarify 3 4 that. 5 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Thank you for 6 the clarifying statements. 7 Is there anyone else who would like to offer 8 testimony? 9 MR. TRAUTMANN: Joel Trautmann again. I 10 assume I'm still under oath. JUDGE STEARLEY: You're still under oath. 11 12 MR. TRAUTMANN: Maybe to tag onto what 13 Mr. Wilson said as a point of clarification. There 14 has been a fairly antagonistic relationship between the developer and the community, and this has a lot to 15 do with why we have difficulty getting documentation 16 on things that we need. So that's just part of the 17 larger problem, and relates to the urgency that so 18 19 many of us have talked about. 20 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. Thank you very much. 21 I see a hand going up; is there someone else who'd 22 23 like to speak? 24 MS. LEWIS: I'm Joan Lewis. 25 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. If you don't

Page 31 1 want to come all the way up here, you can --2 MS. LEWIS: No, I can make it. 3 JOAN LEWIS, 4 being first duly sworn by the Judge, testified as follows: 5 JUDGE STEARLEY: Please proceed. 6 7 MS. LEWIS: Okay. I just know in every situation when there's such a tension between 8 9 different groups, that they're really coming from 10 strong places. You know where we're coming from. Ι 11 do not quite understand where the intervenor is coming from. 12 I don't know what St. Joe's real concern is. 13 You 14 say that it's because they feel the water rate, their water rate is going up. What is it truly based on? 15 Has the town had an experience that has prompted them 16 to take such an adamant position and prevent us from 17 18 moving forward? 19 MR. CONRAD: Do you want an answer? JUDGE STEARLEY: Normally for these 20 21 hearings the comments are directed to the Commission and we make a record of them. 22 23 MR. CONRAD: I would think so. 24 JUDGE STEARLEY: If the parties want to stick around and kind of continue on with their 25

Page 32 1 information session --2 MR. CONRAD: Judge, I'll be happy to talk with this young lady. 3 4 JUDGE STEARLEY: If you're free afterwards. 5 I'm assuming you don't want to speak to her on the record right now. You're certainly free to 6 7 afterwards. 8 MR. CONRAD: I can, but it's your hearing. 9 JUDGE STEARLEY: If you have no preference. 10 If you want to speak on the record, you're certainly 11 free to. 12 MR. CONRAD: I think the answer you posed 13 is simply answered by "yes." 14 MS. LEWIS: I think the question I asked 15 was, Why? MR. CONRAD: Our rates need to be based on 16 the costs in St. Joseph, not in costs in Saddlebrooke, 17 or in St. Louis, or in St. Charles, or Warrensburg, or 18 19 Mexico. 20 MS. LEWIS: Okay, and they need to be that 21 because you don't want to pay -- you feel you're going 22 to be paying higher rates because of us? 23 MS. BAKER: I do think this is probably 24 something that's better off the record. We will make sure that we answer that question, because I know that 25

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1	that is something that's on everyone's mind.
2	JUDGE STEARLEY: That's perfectly fine.
3	All right. Any other comments for the Commission?
4	All right. I'm not seeing any other hands.
5	I do want to let you all know, if you don't want
6	to speak tonight, there are other ways you can submit
7	comments to the Commission. And our staff can go over
8	those with you, but you can actually file them
9	directly on the computer into the case file. We'll
10	accept letters, phone calls, et cetera, but they can
11	follow up with you with that information. Actually
12	they normally pass out an information sheet which has
13	all that contact information.
14	MS. BAKER: The Public Counsel has the pink
15	sheet, and it has all that information on it.
16	JUDGE STEARLEY: And the Public Counsel is
17	your state-appointed attorney who's representing you
18	all. So if you have any questions specifically about
19	the case or how things are proceeded legally, you can
20	direct them toward Ms. Baker.
21	The evidentiary hearing for this case, where the
22	expert witnesses will come to Jeff City and present
23	testimony, is scheduled for June 28th and 29th. That
24	hearing will be Webcast, so you can log onto the
25	Missouri Public Service Commission's Web page and find

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1	a link there and you can actually watch it live on
2	your computer if you would like.
3	I can't tell you exactly a time frame in which the
4	Commission's decision will follow that hearing, but
5	there'll be a briefing period and you can probably
6	expect a decision somewhere in the order of six to
7	eight weeks after the hearing, depending on what
8	happens with that process. So I did want to give you
9	an idea of the timeline in which the case is
10	proceeding.
11	MR. TRAUTMANN: So we're looking at the
12	earliest probably August to September before we get
13	movement on this process?
14	JUDGE STEARLEY: I won't necessarily I
15	won't say that conclusively because I don't know what
16	the parties will do in between now and then. Parties
17	do settle cases. Sometimes they settle them right on
18	the eve of hearing. We don't know. They may want to
19	try certain issues. My best guess is if we do go to
20	the evidentiary hearing, there will be a decision
21	sometime in August for you. I can't say if that will
22	be early or mid August.
23	MR. CONRAD: Judge, am I correct that there
24	is a procedural schedule that's been posted on the
25	Commission's Website, if folks wanted to look?
	I

Page 35 JUDGE STEARLEY: I'm not sure if it's been 1 2 posted there. It is in the file, of course. I do have a copy of the whole procedural schedule with me. 3 4 I'd be happy to share it with people before we leave 5 tonight, as well. Mr. Jarrett, do you have any 6 closing? 7 COMMISSIONER JARRETT: Just real quickly, 8 Judge. Again, I want to thank everybody for being 9 here. It is very -- I'm very impressed when I come to 10 these local public hearings. I think Ms. Gaines was 11 talking, in some cases we'll have a hearing and maybe 12 two or three people might show up. And I really appreciate everybody coming out. And all of the 13 14 witnesses gave their testimony very clear, very understandable, so I think it will create a very good 15 record for this local public hearing. So, again, I 16 personally appreciate you all being here. Thank you. 17 18 JUDGE STEARLEY: And I'd like to thank you all for bearing with us. The room was a little 19 smaller than we had anticipated for the crowd, so I 20 21 appreciate you all having the patience to stay and stand and offer us your comments tonight. 22 23 So, with that, we'll go ahead and conclude the 24 hearing and we stand adjourned. 25 (Hearing adjourned at 6:45 p.m.)
