These are rate actions on the application of Terre Duc Lac 6 7 Utilities Incorporated. This is the local public hearing for 8 9 those actions. We are here to record the testimony of witnesses on the proposed rate increases. 10 My name is Daniel Jordan. I am not a 11 12 commissioner. I am the Regulatory Law Judge assigned to this action and my job here is to 13 conduct this proceeding in an orderly fashion. 14 Ι 15 will eventually recommend a decision to the commissioners and they will make the decision, the 16 17 final decision, by voting. 18 This is Commissioner Stephen Stoll who is with us. 25	winter and I was without water for ten days. Some

2	been like a week, nine days, and now this year was	
3	the best or the worst, whichever way you look at it,	
4	ten days without water.	
5	JUDGE JORDAN: If I may ask a question	
6	to clarify. Are you saying that the mains under the	
7	streets froze?	
8	MS. DUNCAN: Correct.	
9	JUDGE JORDAN: Okay.	
10	MS. DUNCAN: And there are a number of	
11	reasons for that I guess. I think the depth of the	
12	pipe is primary, but the fact that I'm the only one	
13	on that road leads into it. I'm by myself, so I	
14	don't use a whole lot of water, so that contributes	
15	to it.	
16	They did try working on the road and	
17	they added dirt and they added gravel thinking that	
18	would insulate, but and it worked for two years,	
19	but it didn't work for this year and this year was	
20	an especially brutal year, I admit that, but I still	
21	should have water. I pay my bills every month.	
22	JUDGE JORDAN: Commissioner, any	
23	questions for this witness?	
24	COMMISSIONER STOLL: How often in the	
25	past did you say this has happened?

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Page 11 1 SANDY BENDER, 2 was sworn to tell the truth and testified as 3 follows: JUDGE JORDAN: I'll go ahead and spell 4 5 your name for the reporter. It's just like it sounds, S-A-N-D-Y B-E-N-D-E-R. 6 7 Ma'am, are you a customer of Terre Duc 8 Lac --9 MS. BENDER: Yes. 10 JUDGE JORDAN: -- Sewer or Water? 11 MS. BENDER: Yes, both. 12 JUDGE JORDAN: Okay. And what would you like the Commission to know? 13 MS. BENDER: Well, I think most of us 14 came here this evening in favor of a rate increase 15 because we'd like to see some improvements, but as 16 17 we've learned from the question and answer session prior, that this will only go to pay prior 18 obligations, improvements that have been made. So I 19 think we were a little disillusioned to learn that 20 21 we're still at square one where we are now. And we're all concerned about the quality of water in 22 Terre Duc Lac, we're concerned about the sewer waste 23 disposal in Terre Duc Lac and I don't think any of 24 25 us are going to object to a rate increase if those

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Page 12 things are going to improve. 1 2 I think there are service issues. I had 3 a service issue that's been resolved, but it was sort of painful to do. They responded right away 4 5 when I called, but it took a long time to resolve, but we did resolve it. 6 7 I don't know, but I think maybe how they 8 process the work orders or track their work orders 9 might be an issue. Maybe there was some misunderstanding with who was going to do what, but 10 11 ultimately, it got resolved, but I think the paper 12 flow maybe didn't work well in the office. 13 JUDGE JORDAN: Okay. Thank you. 14 Commissioner, any questions? 15 COMMISSIONER STOLL: Yes. Ma'am, on the issue of the rate increase, what was it that you 16 17 were told about that rate increase? It's to take care of past, what was that? 18 19 MS. BENDER: As we understand the way it 20 was explained, this rate increase will cover repairs 21 or improvements that have already been done. COMMISSIONER STOLL: Okay. But then the 22 rates will continue into the future. 23 24 MS. BENDER: Yes. 25 COMMISSIONER STOLL: And that should

Page 13 help take care of issues so that you don't have 1 2 these reoccurring problems. 3 MS. BENDER: Then I would ask the Commission if they really think it's enough money. 4 COMMISSIONER STOLL: Okay. I appreciate 5 that. I'm going to write that down. Could I also 6 7 ask, have you ever had any problems with frozen water pipes or is it kind of specific to some of the 8 9 areas that maybe have fewer residents or? 10 MS. BENDER: I have not had personally 11 problems with frozen water pipes. 12 COMMISSIONER STOLL: And the quality of 13 service, again, you said was? 14 MS. BENDER: When I called, they responded right away, but evidently, there was some 15 misunderstanding about what was going to do what 16 17 when. 18 COMMISSIONER STOLL: Okay. Okay. Thank you for your testimony. 19 20 JUDGE JORDAN: Any questions from the 21 parties? 22 MR. OPITZ: No, Your Honor. 23 MS. BAKER: No, thank you. JUDGE JORDAN: Very good. Thank you. 24 Thank you for your testimony. 25

20	We've lived in Terre Duc Lac for ten	
21	years. We were weekenders for some period of time.	
22	Over the ten years, probably on three occasions our	
23	septic, the holding tank has failed. One occasion	
24	years ago I called after hours and told the people	
25	that there was a problem. They came out and just	
1		

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Page 15 turned off the light. 1 2 And so a week or so later there was 3 waste water draining in -- first of all, I live on one of the lakes, and so I called them back and I 4 5 said the water is overflowing, it's going into the lake. The gentleman, this was probably five years 6 7 ago, said, ma'am, let me take a shower and then I'll 8 be right out and he never came. So it wasn't 9 repaired until probably a week or so later. 10 This last winter, we called because 11 there was -- it was not our sewer system, it was our 12 next door neighbor who is higher than we are. We 13 had what looked like a frozen Niagara Fall coming down the side. I called the utility company because 14 15 at one point we thought it might even be from the fire hydrant. It was coming down our front yard, 16 17 going around our garage and down into the lake. They never came out. 18 19 We finally our neighbor came out and he 20 looked. His light was not on. He looked into his 21 holding tank. It was completely overflowing down 22 across the road into our yard, around our house, down into the lake. Now, this is the lake where we 23 24 swim and where we fish and to me that is just a huge 25 concern.

8	it's held in the holding tank and then it's pumped

Go ahead and give your testimony then. 15 16 MR. DALAVIRAS: I'm here to support an 17 increase for the utility company because it's been so long since they've got any money and with the 18 price of gasoline and labor going up, they should 19 20 have got an increase years ago, but through some 21 reasons that the Commission didn't see fit years ago to give them money, I don't know what happened, if 22 23 there is a grudge between the Commission people on 24 the board at the time and the utility company. If that's their problem, I hope that's cleared up. 25

1	But I'm in favor of giving them a rate	
2	increase of what they're asking for. Even if the	
3	board feels that they need more money, I'm in favor	
4	of that, because I've been paying the same rate for	
5	so long it's ridiculous and it's not right.

8	working for them and make sure that the work is	
9	being done in a proper order, though the sewage is	
10	being taken care of the way it should be and if it's	
11	going to take the DNR to come out or whoever else

20	there some kind of mismanagement in the company? If	
21	you ask for money and then you decide, no, you don't	
22	want it, and that was back in 2009, you know,	
23	something doesn't jive here. I think it's probably	
24	a lot of mismanagement in that company, and I don't	
25	know if your staff can go out and monitor what	

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Page 20 happens in that company, how things are being done. 1 2 That's all. 3 JUDGE JORDAN: Thank you. Commissioner? 4 5 COMMISSIONER STOLL: I have no questions, but I thank you for your testimony. 6 7 JUDGE JORDAN: Anything from the 8 parties? MS. BAKER: Not from Public Counsel. 9 10 MR. JUDGE JORDAN: The company had filed a 22 request for a rate increase in one or both of its 23 24 services of the services of the companies, but withdrew, dismissed those actions; is that correct? 25

Page 23 Terre Duc Lac. I was quite surprised to see --1 2 JUDGE JORDAN: Hang on a second, if you 3 please. Will you spell your name for the reporter 4 please. 5 MR. HITE: Oh, yes. Sorry. Richard, R-I-C-H-A-R-D, Hite is H-I-T-E. 6 7 RICHARD HITE, 8 was sworn to tell the truth and testified as 9 follows: 10 JUDGE JORDAN: Thank you. Go right ahead. 11 12 MR. HITE: Okay. As I reviewed the 13 staff's report, to me there are two major issues. One is customer service or lack of customer service 14 and the other is violations of Clean Water Act. 15 This has come up earlier, a little bit earlier in 16 17 the question and answer session, but I was quite surprised to see that no one from DNR is 18 represented, there's no one here tonight. 19 20 And I'm just wondering at what point in 21 time that DNR is going to do something about these violations, violations of the lakes and primarily 22 the area of Big River. We were told that they are 23 24 involved and I just wonder at some point are they 25 going to impose fines or do something about this.
