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## PROCEEDI NGS

J UDGE J ORDAN: Let's go on the record. Good eveni ng, everyone. Thank you for attending. Commi ssion is calling the action in File Number WR-2015-0301. This is the general rate action for Mssouri-Ameri can Water Company.
l'Il start with introductions. l'm Dani el Jordan, l'ma regul atory Iaw judge who's assi gned to conduct this hearing. I am not the regul at ory I aw judge that is assi gned to this case. That is someone more experienced than lam For your records, the judge assi gned to this case is Kennard Jones. Kennard is K-e-n-n-a-r-d. He is stationed in the City of St. Louis, but the Commission understands that M ssouri-American has customers across the state and so they have brought this part of the hearing process to you in Mexico, M ssouri.

With us this evening are two of the
Commissioners at the Public Service Commission. To my left is Chai rman Dani el Hall, to my right is Cormí ssi oner Mayda Col enman.

Openi ng remarks, M. Chai rman?
CHAI RMAN HALL: Sure. Very bri ef. Good eveni ng. I want to thank you for coming out to speak to us toni ght. This is a very important portion of --
of this process. This is the ninth of twel ve local public hearings. At these local public hearings, we gi ve customers the opportunity to provi de their thoughts, to provide testimny that becomes part of the record when the Commission considers the rate request sought by Mssouri-American. The evi dentiary hearing in this matter will be in Jeff City the third week into the fourth week of March.

Agai n , thank you for j oi ni ng us toni ght and we look forward to hearing your thoughts.

J UDGE J ORDAN: Commi ssi oner Col eman?
COMM SSI ONER COLEMAN: Thank you. We
thank you for bei ng here toni ght to give us an opportunity to hear and listen to your concerns or comments regarding service or the rate case that's bef ore the Mssouri Public Service Commission.

Our goal is to make sure that all voi ces are heard and that you are gi ven the opportunity to voi ce whatever those concerns, if any, that there may be. A written transcript of this meeting will be available at some point for you to have access to in some manner. The judge probably knows more about that than 1 .

But l'mglad you're here. We appreciate what it is that you're going to have to say. Thank you
so much.
JUDGE JORDAN: I will now take entries of appearance and begi nning with the applicant.

MR. LUFT: Thank you, Judge. Ti m Luft with Mssouri-American hater, and I gave the court reporter my information.

J UDGE J ORDAN: Thank you. For the Cormi ssi on St aff ?

MS. MYERS: Yes, l'mJame Myers with St aff Counsel, M ssouri Public Service Cormi ssion.

J UDGE J ORDAN: And for the Office of Publ ic Counsel.

MR. POSTON: Marc Poston for the Office of the Public Counsel and the public.

J UDGE J ORDAN: Thank you. And are there any interveners who wi sh to make an entry of appear ance?

All right. Hearing none, then as the Commission has expl ai ned to you, the purpose of this proceeding is to hear testimony that will be part of the Commission record that the Cormission will consider when maki ng this decision, and this is why we transcribe it through the court reporter.

I have a couple of names on my list for testifying. l'Il gi ve you a few pointers on giving
testimny. When l call your name, come on up to the podi um There's a microphone there so everyone can hear what you're saying. Just one at a time. I will administer an oath, unl ess you tell me that religious convi ctions prohi bit you fromtaking an oath. If you prefer an affirmation, l will administer an affirmation.

I will get you started with a few questions like state your nare, spell it for the court reporter, things like that. Make sure that you speak clearly. Be concise, but do be compl ete. And when I say that, I mean if there was something that you said or heard during the presentation that we $j$ ust got through, that's not on the record. If you want the Commi ssi on to consi der it, say it again, say it now so that the Commission knows what you think.

And if somebody said something that you agree with, well, come up and tell us that. You don't have to repeat what they said, but add your voice to that thought. Do remember that if you thi nk of somet hing el se afterwards, or your nei ghbors do, Staff, the Office of the Public Counsel are ready to hear what you have to say.

Stay at the podi um until I've excused you, because I might have some clarifying questions for
you, one of the Iawers might, the Commissioners might want to inquire deeper, and that's about what I have to say about our procedure. Any questions before l start calling names frommy list?

Okay. Not seei ng or hearing any, so । will start with the first witness will be Harold S Ensl ey [phonetic].

MR. ENSLEY: Thank you for letting me come before you.

J UDGE J ORDAN: Oh, it's our pl easure, Mr. Ensley. Will you pl ease raise your right hand and I will administer the oath?
(The witness was sworn.)
J UDGE J ORDAN: Thank you very much. And I'Il be giving this brief list to our court reporter, so l'mnot going to ask you to spell your name.

MR. ENSLEY: Okay.
J UDGE J ORDAN: And what woul d you I ike the Cormi ssi on to know?
(M crophone difficulties.)
MR. ENSLEY: Well, does it work now? Okay. Well, we' ve been here several years to these hearings, and some of my friends want to know why I come. I said, well, somebody's got to represent the ol d people that don't come to these meetings. And
they'll say, well, what do you mean by ol d? Okay. I'm one of them And l'minterested in what goes on in the community and l'minterested in what fol ks in Jeff City are doing, and rai sing rates, whet her it's water or el ectric or whatever.

Anyway, we got this letter, the water customers got this letter, and you heard it mentioned before, but l'll mention it here as part of the record. It says Public Servi ce Commi ssi on's seeking to increase base rates by $\$ 51$ million or 19 percent. Well, that's what the customers that read the letter saw.

And I've had several of them mention that and l've tal ked to several that -- in my age group that do see that, yes. But then when I come here toni ght, there's something el se here that these ot her things talk about that they don't understand, and l'm not sure I understand them compl et el y as I ong as I've been coming.

Mexi co has probabl y 25 percent of seni ors in the comminity. They have over 200 housing units, and that's just in public housing units. I mean, what I'mtal ki ng about, public housing, government public housing. And these -- these rates, like thi s that show, that scares themto death.

And I tal ked to the care coordi nat or that
operates in the counties -- every county has a care coordi nator. If you're familiar with that. And so l'Il ask her, I said, are you having di scussions with some of your clients about rate increases? And she sai d, oh, yes. Well, I said, I don't want to know who they are, and she won't tell me, which is nat urally, but she says it is -- it's a concern every year. And it just gets worse. And I can -- I don't know who all her clients are, l don't want to know, but if somebody took it upon thensel ves, they could find out. This would be in any county in the state, as far as that's concerned, with the care coordi nator.

And -- because lots of people don't like to hear this, but people that have water increases, they flush the stool once a day, they use water very sparingly in order to get by with their income. And I'mal most to that ways myself. But l'mnot quite.

Anyway, l'minterested in it and l'm concerned about the increase and the information you put out, like this one the 19 percent on this one page and the paper was handed out here toni ght, I haven't had the time to look at all of it, it doesn't show a 19 percent, and that is really conf using. It's really conf using. And l'Il be glad to answer any questions l can, if you want -- if you have any questions.

J UDGE J ORDAN: Thank you, Mr. Ensl ey. Wbul d you like the Cormi ssion to have that -- the documents that you' ve been referring to? Wbuld you Iike the Cormission to look at those?

MR. ENSLEY: The letter?
J UDGE J ORDAN: You don't have to, if you don't want to, but we could mark it and give it to them as an exhi bit.

MR. ENSLEY: I'msorry, l coul dn't hear you.

J UDGE J ORDAN: We could mark it as an exhi bit and make it part of the record, if you wish.

MR. MARTY: l'Il give them mine.
MR. ENSLEY: Whatever. You don't have a copy of that?

MR. MARTY: l'Il gi ve them my copy.
MR. ENSLEY: Anyway, that's why I'mhere bef ore to represent the people who can't come, and you can see they're not here.

J UDGE J ORDAN: Ri ght.
MR. ENSLEY: And --
J UDGE J ORDAN: Any questions from any
counsel? No?
Commissioners, any questions for this witness?

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CHAl RMAN HALL: Si r, thank you for your testimony.

COMM SSI ONER COLEMAN: Thank you, sir.
MR. ENSLEY: Thank you.
J UDGE J ORDAN: The next name on my list is Robert H. Marty. Mr. Marty, would you like to testify?
(The witness was sworn.)
MR. MARTY: It's my best intention, I secure this information of $f$ of newspapers and printed documents. Some of it's in conflict, but it's my best intention to gi ve you what I know and what I thi nk is right.

J UDGE J ORDAN: So not ed.
MR. MARTY: First of all, l do want to wel come you-all here to the glorious city of Mexico, M ssouri. I hope you spend some money here. Spend some money here. Anrong other thi ngs, we have three excellent Mexi can restaurants. And one is on the way out, not far fromhere on Hi ghway 22, Mbnroe Street, Dos Arcos. The other one is in the center of town, a half of block off on the west side, Las Vegas Burrito, which is my preference, and then there's one on the edge of town going out on Hi ghway 54. You don't have to go to those, but I sure which wi sh you'd spend some
money here. We appreciate it.
Al so, I want to say, Mb. Col eman, I don't mean to be rude, but I think we' ve met before when I was on the Mssouri -- for the trust fund. I thi nk you might have come to a meeting or something and I saw you. Were you a representative at one time?

COMM SSI ONER COLEMAN: Yes, sir.
MR. MARTY: And I thi nk that's where I
met you at some time. I think I was on the board I onger than I should have been. But I was on the board, and that's why I thi nk I met you before.

I just want to tell you, Harold and I have been coming to these over 35 years. That's why when some peopl e tell me oh, no, you can't, l know you can. Harol d, we' re not bragging, ME. Col eman, but Harol d has served on the city counsel for 11 years and was myyor. I served on the city counsel for six years and was mayor. Harold served on the school board for four years, l served seven years and was presi dent of the school board.

Not that we're heroes, but this will show that we care about this commity and have a Iong-time caring for it. As a matter of fact, the last time we were here on the water company, which I guess is four years ago, why Harold brought up the point that there
was a continuous leak across the street fromthe water company plant on the corner of Hi storical Society on Mbnroe and had been leaking for months, and he couldn't get it fixed. Well, it was fixed the next day, but that's the testimmy Harol d made four years ago.

I want to tell you it has been conf using. I assume you can hear me no matter what. The notice of public hearing regarding rate increases we got, and the first paragraph is difficult to read, like Harold said. It says 19 percent and then it uses an abbrevi ation, ISRS, which is not expl ai ned at all, and then it goes on down to say that will be 9.7 percent increase. It's poor work. l'Il give this to you, ma'am Ve'll put this as an exhi bit.

J UDGE J ORDAN: Madam Court Reporter, woul d you pl ease mark these exhi bits as LPH 9 and then the sequence number for exhi bits. So that will be LPH 9-1.
(Exhi bit Number LPH 9-1 was marked for identification by the court reporter.)

J UDGE J ORDAN: And that was accompani ed with the notice you recei ved?

MR. MARTY: Pardon me?
J UDGE J ORDAN: That accompani ed the notice you recei ved?

MR. MARTY: Yeah, that was mailed to all people and Harol d had one in his hands. I assume it was mailed statewi de, but it was difficult to understand no matter who you are. You'll see it says 19 percent increase and then it says 9 percent increase, and then it uses abbreviations, so who can figure it out.

J UDGE J ORDAN: I just wanted to clarify it.

MR. MARTY: It was a mailing. I got mine the 16th of January.

J UDGE J ORDAN: Very good. Any obj ections to that exhi bit? I'mnot hearing any, so that will be admitted into the record. Thank you.

MR. MARTY: So then when we wal ked in the door, we were gi ven this sheet, which I'mgoing to put as an exhi bit as well, saying the water rates. And Mexi co, M ssouri -- it says the water rates. And in Mexi co, M ssouri, here is the difference between -- । di d a quick cal cul ation in my head -- is about 6. 8 percent increase. If you subtract 41. 11 minus 38.49, di vide -- I came up with 6.8. So it's none of the figures that we had on this sheet here.
(Exhi bit Number LPH 9-2 was marked for identification by the court reporter.)

J UDGE J ORDAN: Any obj ections to that exhi bit?

MR. MARTY: We I earned from the newspaper in Vandalia, our local newspaper didn't publish it, but ISRS stands for Infrastructure System Repl acement Surcharge. But that wasn't made to us by the water company. We had to get out of the newspaper.

So toni ght l've wal ked in, l've gi ven you these two different things. I got another thing from the water company. And it says Mexico's fixed customer charge will increase 30 percent. Now, this is the first notice we have of that. And everything that we got, whi ch Mssy has, l've gi ven her, it doesn't say anything about fixed customer water charge.

So we' re wal king in here, and you tal k about 19 percent Harold, you talk about 9 percent, you talk about 6 percent, and this is going up 30 percent. Wth no notice. We have no notice of this. Now, I had an argument with a nice young man, l don't see him anymore, he left probably, I argued himout of here. Is he way in back?

UNI DENTI FIED SPEAKER: Yes, I am
MR. MARTY: I was under the impression, and he says I'mwrong, but we'll find out. I'malot ol der than he is, is that you had to have a special
hearing for one, the rate increase on the usage and a speci al hearing on the fixed customer charge. I know that -- I know the gas company did that, and we have appeared that, Harol d and I have appeared before that. Inci dentally, Harold and I, did I say we' ve been here 30 years off and on. We'll probably come in here and be the judge one time later. So this is what we get now, right now toni ght. It's the first information we had that they're going to increase the thi ng 30 percent. Ni neteen is nothing compared to 30 percent. l'Il give you this, and this is theirs as well.

JUDGE JORDAN: And we'll have that marked as Number 3.

MR. MARTY: So.
(Exhi bit Number LPH 9-3 was marked for identification by the court reporter.)

J UDGE J ORDAN: Any obj ection to that?
MR. MARTY: So we' re not beggi ng poor. I'mnot tal king poor. I'mtal king fair. That's what we want to do is fair. And so it's difficult to find out anything about American Water Company. Years ago, we had our own water company. It was bought by Mssouri Water Company, and Mssouri Water Company apparently was bought by Arerican Water Company. Then Aneri can Water Company was bought by a German company.

I thi nk, with the initials RVE, and then it's come back to this water company.

So I tried to find out the figures having to do with Mssouri-American. So l bought stock in American Water Company, I think, and I can't find any figures. I can't find how you can prove any of your costs in this area. I met the presi dent, ni ce looking young lady, which is probably an excellent thing compared to us old guys, but I don't know what big an area she is, but l couldn't find any figures on it.

But I do have a financial report here from whi ch you're going to get, morning side -Mbrni ngstar rating. And they say much of American Water infrastructure is old and poorly maintained. Ol and poorly maintai ned. And it's al ways our worry, Judge, or Commissioners, that the city of Mexi co will be responsible for fixing somebody el se's sewer, somebody el se's water.

Now, I recall for you, and as Yogi Bear says, you can look this up, in the Flood of 1993, give me a year or two, the water works at St. Joe, M ssouri was destroyed. And the water company tried to make all its users through the state of Mssouri pay for the water plant, water plant in St. Joseph, M ssouri.

But we appeared, Harold and I and others
said no, we want to pay for our own water company and the Public Service Commissi on uphel $d$ what we said and made them pay for their own, made St. Joe. But they tried to make us pay across the state for it. And I can't figure it out now what part we got. We certainly don't want to pick up some ol d company. And that list that you had, that you gave me on sewers, you list a sewer in there that was for Branson, whi ch I'msure they've just bought within the I ast couple years, and we al ways read in the paper that the sewer systemin Br anson was one good toil et flush away fromexpl oding. So they're -- well, that's not a warni ng, but it looks to me like you buy worn down water compani es, you ask for rate increases, you get the rate increases, you fix them up, and then you get a double flush, if you excuse the expression. You get the rate increase, but you get a hi gher cash flow. I think you should fix them up before you ask for the rate increase.

Well, anyway, I'mgoing to gi ve this to you, what it said their stuff is in bad repair. It al so on the second page, it describes the RVE purchased by the Germans. I don't know what it stands for. They call it a debacle. A debacle. Now, I hope there's no Iingering charges that we're getting in Mexico,

Mssouri to pay for the German company's debacle. l'Il gi ve you this, you can have the whole thing. The first two pages are what's pertinent.
(Exhi bit Number LPH 9-4 was marked for identification by the court reporter.)

J UDGE J ORDAN: Any obj ection to that document? No objection. That's admitted into the record al so.

MR. MARTY: Continuing, pl ease. I tried to determine the water loss here on the meeting bef ore, asking questions before, and I got it figured that the water loss not counted for is not charged, not priced, is about 15 percent. The president of the -- whatever this company is called here is it's typical. It's a typi cal loss that doesn't get charged. I find that hard to believe. Maybe within their system but I woul d thi nk you would want to have about 90, 92 percent of all the water you produce charged. If Mexico is at 15 to 20 percent not bei ng charged, that's -- if they charge for all the water, they migh not even need a rate increase.

The city of Mexi co really cares about how much water you have by vol ume because that's how they figure the sewer rates. They don't do it by the rate, but they take the vol ume that you use, like Mr. Kent
asked, and it's the top three months. But if you don't have the right arount, the city gets short-changed for its sewer charges. On the other part of it, gross recei pts tax, which is vi ci ous. It goes through the water company and the water company i mmedi at el y charges us, Harol d. I mmedi ately charges us. So we pay the 7 percent.

I think it's outrageous to be that high, but it's been established a long time and it's nothing the Commission can do. l'Il deal with the public peopl e here on that separately. But that means if you don't charge the right amount, their 7 percent is not charged right. So they're Iosing -- the city of Mexico Ioses on not the right count on the water and not the right count on the money.

I thi nk that if you knew how much money you' re using -- I osing, you probably woul d not -- the city estimates, this -- you can write this down, I tal ked to the city manager this afternoon, this is my best i mpression. He thi nks the water company is losing $\$ 30,000$ a month -- a month -- by not counting the water properly.

Al so there does appear to be a probl em with the meters. And even though the presi dent said oh, that's what we do all the time, we're al ways
changi ng meters, I think she's underestimating the meters. Some Iady told me that -- the city manager told me there are 20 cli ents that have the meter misread or not read at all, and they mentioned the company ADM -- Archer Dani el Mdland -- has several different meters and they were registering no charge at all, no water charge at all.

And the questions today, we found out that the meter hadn't been changed at ADM from one flavor to another flavor to the third flavor, but there was a problemthere. And it's the city of Mexico that called it to the water company's attention. Wen he told me that this afternoon, l got my own water bill out, and you have to understand, I don't want to cry poor. I'm not crying poor. I'mcrying fair.

I've been using -- like Ron says, I've been using about 2,000 gal Ions or less, pl us or mins, for years, and then one month came al ong and l got 7, 000 gallons. I've got a new home. I'd have to have every faucet, every toil et running 24/7 to get to 7,000 gal I ons. So somet hing's wrong. Now --

J UDGE JORDAN: I thi nk we' re up to
Exhi bit 5.
MR. MARTY: Yeah, you can have the whol e thing.
(Exhi bit Number LPH 9-5 was marked for identification by the court reporter.)

J UDGE J ORDAN: Any obj ections? Very good.

MR. MARTY: So I thi nk you' ve got several problems there. You're not able to count the water for whatever reason it is. You don't have control of it, and despite the fact what the president says, that 15 percent is standard. That's an outrageous loss. I thi nk you ought to fire anybody that's Iosing 15 percent of their product out there. We know it does I eak all around, last time we tol d you about Harol d.

There is something wrong with the meters, and I heard, I believe, that the Public Service Commission is going to have an audit. And they do have an audit. And I would formally request that you audit thi s Mexi co plant and see how this goes. See about the meters, see if l'mright about the meters, see if l'm right about the loss.

Now, I want to tell you this: The water we have here is the best water in M ssouri. It comes fromthe St. James underground -- flowing up from St. James to us. We have deep wells, deep wells, and the water's the best in the state of Mssouri. Not Iike Col unbia where they take it out of the M ssouri

Ri ver not far from where they put their sewage, or Jeff City where they have little green frogs when they turn on the knob. l've heard that in testimony in the water company hearings. Ours is really good, so l'mnot compl ai ni ng about the water. I'm compl ai ning about the fact that we don't think we' ve got this figured out financially correctly. If you're losing \$30,000 a month, l'd like you to see if l'mright or wrong.

Al so, you're tal king about increasing costs. What costs would those be? The price of gasol ine is down sharply. Every day it's down. Even fromthe time this was filed July 15th, it's dropped. The price of natural gas has dropped. Copper is at a 15-, 10-, 20- -- 15- or 20-year low. Coal, steel is way down, and money. It costs them money to finance things is really low. I just saw toni ght that a five-year treasury note went bel ow 1.3. It's 1.27 interest rate. So these costs, what are the costs that they're tal king about? I think if you consi dered the proper costs, got your water loss under control, and found out what was wrong with your meters and your computer, you'd probably decrease the rates.

Now, this gentleman who left, when you go to the back of the room did you tell me? He's a smart guy to get out of the way. Some years ago, the gas
company at this very stage that -- we don't al ways meet here, Dr. Col eman, we don't al ways meet here, we meet at other places that are just as awkward. We' ve got them all over town. When we met on their charge, thei $r$ monthly charge, they onl y showed up just for the monthly charge, not for the gas rate or anything el se. And to gi ve you an example, they said, well, I want to tell you, they were charging $\$ 8$ a househol d, approxi matel y . They wanted to raise it to $\$ 18 \mathrm{a}$ househol d, which is like this increase we have, somet hi ng Iike this, or much worse.

So Harold and I testified. We said that's kind of unusual because since the Iast time you had a rate increase, you're now reading these by remote. You' ve got a satellite reading these meters.

You don't have a guy in overalls come around reading gas meters anymore. And when you call the gas company, well, you don't get a human. You got some other mechani cal voice. I said really, you ought to be reduci $n g$ the charge.

Well, time passes. Fi nally Amer enUE
sai d, oh, you know what, we don't want $\$ 18$, we want $\$ 12$, which is still more than $\$ 8$ but less than $\$ 18$. So the papers asked them the papers and like Yogi Bear says, you can look this up. They said how come you
want less? They said, well, we used the ol d figures. They used the old figures. This is public testimony. Ameren did not -- di dn't use the right figures. You worry about fraud or incompetence. I worry about these figures. I'mnot charging anybody with that. But I would formally request we do have an audit to see about the water loss, to see about the computer or system they had.

You know, the most gutted word you ever hear when you come into a savings and Ioan or any company that said, you know, we got a little trouble here, we got a new computer. And I thi nk they may have had trouble with the new computer or a new meter. So I think I'mdone. I've thought of as much as I can, and I thank you for hearing re, and I thank you for hearing Harol d. Harol d, how old are you? You tol d me 84?

MR. ENSLEY: Ol der than you are, 86
MR. MARTY: He's 86, I'm82. The next time we come here, we will be in gurneys, but we're goi ng to come. Can I hel p you anymore? Any questions?

MR. LUFT: Did you see where M ssouri-American is requesting a decrease --

MR. MARTY: I did, and I had a hard time getting the people to acknow edge that. The water's down, do you understand the economy of this, Doctor, is
that you send us a notice that you're raising the price of water, raising the price of water. We get in here, we' re reducing the water, but you're really kicking up the unit cost of the service, whi ch you di dn't tell us at all. You ought to be ashamed for that.

But l'mglad to see the decrease. l'm not compl ai ni ng. I magi ne how much you could decrease if you counted all the water. You got to like a guy like that. Listen, I've spoken rather vociferously. That doesn't mean I don't love you. We're just out to being fair here. Are there any questions?

JUDGE JORDAN: Further questions from Counsel? Cormi ssi oners?

CHAl RMAN HALL: Si $r$, thank you for your testimony and thank you for your service.

MR. MARTY: Okay. Thank you.
COMM SSI ONER COLEMAN: Mr. Marty, I do remenber you. I al ways remember a good-looking man.

MR. MARTY: You rock my boat. What ever you run for, l'm voting.

COMM SSI ONER COLEMAN: You caught my attention the moment I wal ked up here, and I al so want you to know, one, I appreci ate your testimony, and the testimony of Mr. Ensley. Secondly, l'mgoing to drink a lot of water fromthat water fountain down the hall
before I leave because I thi nk the city of St. Loui s has the best water in the state, but if you claim you-all do, l want to taste it. And thirdly, I filled up the gas tank since l've been here --

MR. MARTY: That's wonderful.
COMM SSI ONER COLEMAN: -- and spent \$44,
so I want you to know that I have dumped some money into Mexi co, M ssouri.

MR. MARTY: Dr. Col eman, this is going to go into your personnel file.

COMM SSI ONER COLEMAN: My boss is here, so I need someone to speak hi ghly of me. Thank you, Mr. Marty.

MR. MARTY: Thank you very much.
J UDGE J ORDAN: And those are the onl y names that l have on my list, but if someone el se wants to testify, we can certainly hear you. We're all here now.

MR. KENT: l'd like to just make a couple of brief comments.

J UDGE J ORDAN: Very good. Core up to the podi um and make sure you're speaking into the mi crophone. And first, what's your name, please?

MR. KENT: I'm Ron Kent.
JUDGE JORDAN: And that's $\mathrm{K}-\mathrm{e}-\mathrm{n}$ - t ?

MR. KENT: K-e-n-t. I'ma resident here in Mexi co, M ssouri.
(The witness was sworn.)
MR. KENT: When I came, I di dn't intend to make any comments, and l'Il try not to take too much more time. Bob likes to do this, and he took plenty of your time, but l think all he was sayi ng was very worthwhile.

I do agree with Bob al so that the water in Mexico is excellent water, and sol'mnot here to try to beat up on the water company. l've lived in Mexi co for many, many years. l've hel d a real estate license for 50 years, and I sent it in Mbnday. I deci ded to -- since I didn't need to be doing that anymore. l'Il be 72, not near the age of these -- the experience of these gentlemen, but l'Il be 72 this February.

But my main concern, first, l understand fromthe -- some of the staff, that the water company has had one increase in the last four years, and I don't know what before that, but since 2008, the economy in the country pl us the economy in Mexi co has been fairly flat, and as Bob pointed out, a lot of stuff has gone down.

I would ask you public servants to really
consi der very closel y the economic situation since 2008 before you hand out any increases. I know in running a business, a real estate business, l wasn't able to increase charges for apprai sal s and commissions and so forth. If the economy -- in fact, I had to negotiate commi ssi ons down in these ki nd of economi es, so it seens like the -- the tax authorities, the water people, the Ameren, all of themseemto be able to just continuously rai se the cost to the public, but the public's not getting any more incore, I guess l'mgoing on fixed incore now, but anyway, please ask,

Commissioners, before you approve this. Or bef ore you deci de what to approve, thi nk about the economy, and how it's been pretty flat for the last several years. And other busi nesses can't just go to somebody and have them rai se their income or rates.

Another thing, too, it was poi nted out to me while l was asking questions, it appears at least from what the water company was telling me just awhile ago, there is no slush fund that they can create to make i mprovements or to repl ace exi sting water lines, fire hydrants, meters, et cetera. I don't knowif it's in the power of the Commission or if it has to be voted on by the public, but we ought to allow the water company to take some of their moni es that we' re paying
them and I don't know that we need to rai se it, but they ought to be able to create some sort of fund, maybe it needs to be watched, so they don't abscond with it, to where they can create moni es to repl ace their facilities, their lines and thei $r$ water meters and so forth without having to come to the Public Service Commission to ask permission to get the money back.

They say they' ve spent several million dollars in Mexico. I assume that's paid for, so I guess they took it out of some fund to pay for it, but they' re probably trying to get rei nbursed for that. But they should be allowed to accumul ate funds for that sort of thing and not have to come get a rate increase to just maintain the system So that's -- the staff said I should comment because those thi ngs came up while I was asking my questions, and unl ess you have some questions of me.

J UDGE J ORDAN: Counsel, any questions? I have no questions. Commissi oners?

CHAI RMAN HALL: No questions. Thank you for your testimony.

COMM SSI ONER COLEMAN: Mr. Kent?
MR. KENT: Yes.
COMM SSI ONER COLEMAN: l'd just like to
say we don't mind at all when you take as much time as you need when we make comments because this is why we're here.

MR. KENT: Well, yeah, I realize that.
COMM SSI ONER COLEMAN: We do want to hear your concerns and we' ve got all ni ght.

MR. KENT: I was just ribbing Bob.
MR. MARTY: Yeah, l've onl y known hi m 50
years.
COMM SSI ONER COLEMAN: No probl em । appreci ate it.

MR. KENT: I appreci ate you coming to Mexi co.

J UDGE J ORDAN: Thank you. Anybody el se like to testify toni ght? I see someone approaching the podi um

MR. SCHULTZ: I ki nd of come in late. I ki nd of missed the meeting, I di dn't know it was today, but I had to do taxes and stuff, and H\&R Block ki nd of overrode you guys.

J UDGE J ORDAN: Can we start with your name, pl ease?

MR. SCHULTZ: I'mMark Schultz, and I want to start with --

JUDGE J ORDAN: Can you start by spelling

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your name for the court reporter?
MR. SCHULTZ: S-c-h-u-I-t-z.
J UDGE J ORDAN: Thank you. Now I will
need to administer an oath.
MR. SCHULTZ: Okay. I'm--
J UDGE J ORDAN: Pl ease rai se your right hand.

MR. SCHULTZ: You' re going to swear me in, huh?
(The witness was sworn.)
MR. SCHULTZ: As I'mstanding here and God is my witness.

JUDGE J ORDAN: Very good. Now let's hear what you'd like to tell the Commission.

MR. SCHULTZ: Okay. Earlier, in the past years, I don't remenber, I can't tell you quite the dates and stuff, but l recei ved a water bill fromthe company, fromthe water company, saying that within two days, I had used 50,000 gallons. Okay? I can fill two swi ming pools with 50,000 gallons. That's a lot of water.

I argued with them and ever ything. They gave ne, like, a hundred dollars off and l ended up paying for it all. My wife is on some kind of site that she -- on the computer, she calls it the Mexi co
bitch site. I kind of wi sh a lot of the people that are on this site would have come in because everybody seenゅ to -- you know, I thought that it was just an ordeal, but it seems that everybody, there's a lot of ot her peopl e out there compl ai ni ng about that happeni ng to them

When I called the water company, I suggested that -- I'ma pl unber by trade. l've got 40-some years in the pl unbing field and l've seen meters go backwards. And so l told the water company I thought maybe mine had run backwards and stuff. I di dn't say it was a scamor anything, but the guy core out and checked it and told me it di dn't, but the next day he put a new water meter.

I've had three new water meters this year. They keep -- they're putting new water meters everywhere, but I've had three this year, and I just thi nk -- other than that, the water's good -- it's a good price, it's not as good as Callaway County's is, but it's a fair price. The sewer's a fair price, and I understand they're going to go up, they want to improve the sewers, but that's the city. That's not the water company.

But another thing is l don't know, l grew up in the desert and I'mkind of picky on water and
stuff, but if you take a gl ass of water right fromthe tap, Mexi co water and stuff, and you take that glass of water and you put it under a microscope, man, there's all kinds of parasites and bugs in the water. So l'Il boil anything that I use Mexico water for. I boil it first. But that's just me. I'mjust a water-paranoid person, but l just kind of -- I thought all these people that are on this site bitching about the water company, man, you know, l thought maybe this place would be full, but I guess not.

But I just wanted you guys to know that something's going on with the water bills around here. People being charged for more gallons than they're using, you know. 50, 000 gal lons. That's a lot of water to use in two days, so...

J UDGE J ORDAN: Okay.
MR. SCHULTZ: Thank everybody that came anyway. l'mjust a little mad. I thought there would be more people than this.

JUDGE J ORDAN: Questions for this witness?

MR. POSTON: I just had one question. I di dn't know if you had identified the Web site that you're referring to?

MR. SCHULTZ: I don't know. I got her
phone -- I don't know if she's got it up on here or not. But she got it off of Facebook somewhere. I can't call her because I got her phone, so...

MR. POSTON: I can get it fromyou af ter war ds.

MR. SCHULTZ: l'mleaving. I stopped
here after H\&R Block because I met a couple ni ce women from St. Louis that were gi ving a meeting and they told me I should come and -- let's see here.

JUDGE J ORDAN: Questions from the Commi ssi on, Mr. Chai rman?

MR. SCHULTZ: No, I don't. I don't have it on here. But if you go on -- it's some kind of Web site that's set up here for people to complain about -it's a Mexico -- it's a Mexi co bitch site, pretty much. Excuse my language, but you know, that's pretty much what it is.

MR. POSTON: Thank you.
COMM SSI ONER COLEMAN: Mr. Schultz?
MR. SCHULTZ: Yes.
COMM SSI ONER COLEMAN: Two questi ons.
One, you said that the meter showed that you had used -- was it 50, 000 gall ons?

MR. SCHULTZ: Yeah, the bill.
COMM SSI ONER COLEMAN: Oh, the bill.

MR. SCHULTZ: I read the meter now. COMM SSI ONER COLEMAN: Okay.

MR. SCHULTZ: But at that point, I wasn't readi ng the meter, but yeah, I got a bill that says । used 50,000 gal I ons of water.

COMM SSI ONER COLEMAN: And you said thi s year, but l'msure you probably meant last year that you got your meters replaced three times

MR. SCHULTZ: It was 2015, yeah, 2015.
COMM SSI ONER COLEMAN: And were you gi ven a reason why your neter needed to be changed?

MR. SCHULTZ: No, no, I wasn't. I was gi ven -- I got a -- I got a new meter in, and then it was, like, I don't know, the month l got the new meter is the month that they overcharged me, and then a couple days later after I compl ai ned, they put another meter in, and then this fall, they just went around the whole nei ghborhood and got all brand new meters and they repl aced it again.

COMM SSI ONER COLEMAN: Al I right.
MR. SCHULTZ: But yeah, I read my meters now, so...

COMM SSI ONER COLEMAN: Thank you, Mr. Schultz.

MR. SCHULTZ: Okay. You' re wel come.

CHAI RMAN HALL: Mr. Schultz?
MR. SCHULTZ: And I want to say Mexi co has got a great city staff, okay. You know, all the people work hard to run this city and they do a good job, but the water company part isn't the city, and I thi nk they maybe should be looked into.

CHAI RMAN HALL: Mr. Schultz, with regard to the 50, 000-gal I on meter reading, did you contact our consumer unit about that issue?

MR. SCHULTZ: I called -- oh, you' re the wat er company?

CHAI RMAN HALL: No, no, no. I'm with the Cormi ssi on.

MR. SCHULTZ: I called the water company up.

CHAI RMAN HALL: Okay.
MR. SCHULTZ: And I tal ked to a supervisor, and when I got a supervisor on the phone, I i meedi at el y tol d himl wanted to tal k to his supervi sor because I like to go to the top of the chai n when l'm upset.

CHAI RMAN HALL: No, I'mwith the Mssouri Public Service Commission and I'm wondering whet her you contacted our --

MR. SCHULTZ: No, just the water company.

CHAl RMAN HALL: Well, we have some indi vi dual s in the back of the roomthat you should probably have a conversation with about that.

MR. SCHULTZ: Okay. All right. Thank you very much.

CHAI RMAN HALL: Thank you.
COMM SSI ONER COLEMAN: Thank you.
J UDGE J ORDAN: Thank you. Anyone el se want to testify this eveni ng? I am not seei ng anyone, so l will mention that if you thi nk of anything later, gi ve a call to Staff or to your lawyer, which is the Office of Public Counsel, and their representatives are here, and they' ve probably gi ven you thei $r$ contact i nf or mation.

And that bei ng cl ose of testimony. Thank you so much for testifying. You' ve probably noticed that the staff works pretty hard on these cases, but they just cannot be everywhere all the time, so this is a good time to bring up these service issues. So on behal $f$ of the Commission and the Cormissioners, I want to thank you for that. Thank you for attending. Thank you for anyone coming out. Any cl osing remarks from the Chai rman?

CHAI RMAN HALL: No.
J UDGE J ORDAN: Commi ssi oner Col eman?

COMM SSI ONER COLEMAN: No, thank you. J UDGE J ORDAN: Thank you very much. We will adj ourn this hearing and we have of $f$ the record.
