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#### PROCEEDINGS

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JUDGE DIPPELL: Let's go ahead and go on the record. First I would like to ask everyone to be sure and mute your computer or your phone or how you're calling in unless you are speaking. That will help us with any feedback issues. And if you are on a call-in line, you may have to hit \*6 to unmute when you are ready to speak.

Today is January 29, 2021. The Missouri
Public Service Commission has set this time for a
virtual local public hearing in Case No. WR-2020-0344.
That's In the Matter of Missouri-American Water
Company's Request for Authority to Implement a General
Rate Increase for Water and Sewer Service Provided in
Missouri Service Areas.

The Commission has scheduled this local public hearing, which we are holding virtually, to give members of the public a chance to comment about Missouri-American's request. The Missouri Public Service Commission regulates the rates charged by investor-owned public utility companies in Missouri to ensure that those rates are just and reasonable. The Commission also regulates the quality of service and safety of operations of those public utilities.

The Commission is made up of five

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1	commissioners. The commissioners are appointed by the
2	Governor to fixed terms and confirmed by the Senate.
3	The commissioners employ a staff of engineers,
4	accountants, attorneys, financial analysts and other
5	specialists in the field of utility regulation.
6	My name is Nancy Dippell. I'm a Regulatory
7	Law Judge with the Commission, and I will be presiding
8	over this hearing today. With me on the line are
9	Commissioner Kenney and Commissioner Holsman.
10	This is an official hearing of the Missouri
11	Public Service Commission, and the statements and
12	testimony of the witnesses will be recorded by a court
13	reporter and will therefore be given under oath or
14	affirmation. All of the commissioners will then have an
15	opportunity to read the witnesses' remarks and those
16	comments will be put into the official case file of this
17	case.
18	I'd like to go ahead and begin by asking the
19	counsel that are present for the parties to enter their
20	appearance for the record. Can we begin with
21	Missouri-American Water?
22	MR. LUFT: Thank you, Judge Dippell. Tim
23	Luft, 727 Craig Road, St. Louis, Missouri 63141, counsel
24	for Missouri-American Water. Thank you.
25	JUDGE DIPPELL: And Commission Staff?

MS. PAYNE: Thank you, Judge. Whitney Payne on behalf of the Staff of the Missouri Public Service Commission.

JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Office of the Public Counsel?

MR. HALL: Good afternoon, Judge. Thank you. Caleb Hall appearing on behalf of Missouri's Office of the Public Counsel. Our office address is 200 Madison Street, PO Box 2230, Jefferson City, Missouri 65102.

JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. And are there any of the official intervenors that have attorneys present that needed to make an entry? I'm not hearing any.

So the process that we're going to follow for the second half of this proceeding is that I have a list of names of people who have preregistered to speak. I will go down the list and call those names. When I do call your name, just go ahead and unmute yourself and then I'll ask you to give an oath or affirmation to tell the truth. You can state your name and spell it, and also it is helpful if you'll give us the area in which you receive service since Missouri-American provides both water and sewer service in various places all around this state. So if you could state the type of service that you receive and the area that you receive that service, that would be helpful. And then you'll go

ahead and give us your comments.

We shouldn't have too much trouble with timing; but just to be courteous to everyone and their time today, I would ask that you keep your remarks to no more than five minutes and that way everyone can have a chance to testify that wants to do so.

After I've gone through the list of people who have preregistered, I will open it up and ask those who are still on the line if there are anyone else that wants to give comments to the Commission. I would ask you also to stay on the line immediately following your comments so that if the commissioners, myself or some of the attorneys have some clarifying questions they can ask those of you before you get off the line.

Let's see. The audio of this testimony portion of the hearing is also being streamed on our internet website. That's the Commission's website at psc.mo.gov. That will be recorded and will remain on the website for some time if there are other people that want to hear the testimony portion.

The commissioners won't be able to answer your questions today, because they have to remain impartial until after all of the evidence is presented in this case. They have not made any decisions in this case at this point. And this is part of the their fact

gathering process to hear your comments and then use them in conjunction with the evidence the parties present to help make their decision.

If you have questions still after the hearing, you can use the same email address you used to register for this hearing or if you have additional comments you'd like to make in writing. Last little housekeeping thing that I'll say is that there is a chat feature on this WebEx internet interface. That is not an official comment area. Sometimes in other hearings people have used that to get additional information, to find a phone number, and staff are monitoring that chat but those comments, any comments that go into that will not be recorded in the official file.

    a big concern is I listened in to all of the 2018
25
    hearings for many days and many hours, but it was very
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educational on how the process worked. Anyway, I did pay attention to everything that was said. One of the things that disturbed me was the lack of consideration of specific fiscal and social considerations regarding the districts themselves and the demographics of the district with regard to ratesetting. Specifically the household incomes, for instance. The mean household income was not even mentioned for each district.

And there was a lot of assumption made. In fact, one off-the-cuff comment that kind of raised the hair on the back of my neck here was when they made jokes stating that the people in Branson with the \$500,000 homes probably won't notice the rate increase.

Well, specifically we're in Stone County here, and Stone County has a much lower median household income than St. Louis County. In fact, the average household income in Stone County is \$41,000 a year. And while, yes, I specifically live in Stonebridge Village, there's a couple, a few \$500,000 homes, but we have 610 residences here and many of those are one-bedroom, two-bedroom and three-bedroom condominiums. In fact, my mother who is 88 years old lives in one of the three-bedroom condominiums that I purchased for her, and her household income is fixed on social security and that's it. That's why I moved here so she had

assistance.

There's many people like that that live here.

That assumption was wrong and should never have been stated. That was a very poor assumption. So therefore, when you look at St. Louis with the average income of \$61,000 a year versus Stone County average income of \$41,000 a year, I think that's a significant consideration that should be put into the process.

I do know to say that oh, well, we use these people to offset the costs of the infrastructure in St. Louis County, take the Branson, raise their rates so they can offset the costs of doing improvements in St. Louis County. No, that's the wrong way to approach it. That's like let's tap the poor so we can pay for the rich. I think, you know, little bit of reverse logic there when you look at how that works, you know. So anyway, when you look at other processes in a democratic society. That was a major concern. I think it needs to be considered here.

The staff did a great job in the analysis. I read it. Very good analysis on the waterworks financials. And back when you look at that, in 2018, it was agreed upon for 9.55 percent ROE, I believe. Yes, you'll verify that. If that's what was agreed upon in 2018 by all parties, that would be -- no, 9 to 10

percent, that's what it was, 9.5 to 10 percent would be 1 2 the agreed upon ROE. So if that's the case, that's agreed upon ROE. You will go down the road and say hey, 3 we changed our mind, we want ROE higher than that. 4 shouldn't be the way it works. They agreed upon it in 5 6 That's the way it should be. When you work at 7 the American Waterworks Company and the wealth they've 8 acquired in the last two years, it is astronomical. 9 February 1, '17, the stock price was \$78 a share. Today 10 right now I just checked it it's \$159. Okay. So \$78, 11 \$159 in two years or three years here, whatever, I mean, 12 if you look at that rate of increase and it's not a decline. The trend line is up. This company's trend 13 line is up. You know, I mean, it's not trending down. 14 15 The earnings per share goes up. I mean, this is a very 16 wealthy company with the CEO in her third quarter briefing promising -- or forecasting a 7 to 10 percent 17 18 increase annually to the company's dividend to 19 stockholders. A 7 to 10 percent dividend promise from a 20 CEO means hey, we're rich, we're going to get richer, 21 you know. And when you look at what they base their 22 promises on, it's on rate increases. 23 So I think, you know, we get frustrated down 24 here as customers, especially people on fixed income when you're giving companies these kinds of rate 2.5

increases that exceed the Consumer Price Index and the inflation rate for the rest of the country and we're in a pandemic. Half the people here aren't working. You know, the unemployment rate in Branson area goes over 30 percent during this time of year, and the churches are feeding people. That's what we do here in the wintertime. We feed the people that are unemployed when everything shuts down.

These are the things. The social consideration should be in there. I mean, this is a utility company providing a necessary service. Okay. So that's what frustrates us here. Yeah, okay, we got a golf course like, you know, and so forth. You know, other people are impacted by this. I'm lucky enough to be in good shape financially. But I look at the other people here. They are not such. This is hurting them.

We actually had people move out of here because of the cost. Okay. And this is one of the things they're very frustrated at is that these water rates are just going up, up, up and the sewer rates are going up, up, up.

Anyway, I just don't understand it, how we can make this company so wealthy off the backs of the ratepayers. If this company was breaking even, I can see one thing but it's not breaking even. And I looked

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at the executive salaries, and I don't want to get into

ALLYNN: Well, I guess it was I had 11 mentioned earlier too that I just wanted to know why we 12 were doing this during the middle of a pandemic when, I 13 think David Ward said it best, we've got 30 some percent 14 unemployment. Most all of us -- I mean, we live in a 15 tourist industry. And we, you know, when I always joke 16 about and say we are the -- the nonessential of 17 nonessentials. We don't have anybody coming. We don't 18 have any income. We don't have anything. And then to 19 see that there's a 5, \$6 increase going to come every 20 single month, you know, for a lot of us we're having a 21 hard time just feeding our kids. It's like why now. 22 Why can't we have this discussion just 12 months from 23 now. 24 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Are there any questions for Ms. Allynn? I'm not hearing any. Thank 25

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you so much for your participation, Ms. Allynn.

JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. Go ahead with your comments for us.

MR. SMITH: I'm just commenting that I have not done extensive research like the first gentleman, but the rate increase is considerable considering we had a rate increase just a couple years ago. And the rate increase for St. Louis for my area probably would cover a brand new water tower which is about 50 percent larger than the existing one over in Sunset Hills area.

So that's what this -- supposedly this rate increase is going to cover part of. Also, it's just -- It seems like the rates just keep going up and up and up. I understand to a certain point but not like -- It's going to be like a 22, 23 percent increase. That's pretty steep. I'm just asking that you please reconsider this and perhaps make better use. I'm not complaining but I'm just saying that a lot of the times that we have water service repairs done on the streets in St. Louis County, specifically my street real close to me, Concordia School Road is having new water service put in up there and sewer service.

The gentleman that had been up there for the last three days with the exception of yesterday, that

would be -- well, they started on Friday and then 1 2 Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday they sat in their cars the entire time. They didn't do anything. Well, wait a 3 minute. Let me back up one. Tuesday they did work. 4 5 They started digging up the street. The rest of the 6 time they sat in their cars. And this could be verified 7 by other residents in the subdivision. 8 I just think that that's not really good use 9 of manpower and I don't think that the executives at the 10 water company would put up with that. I don't care if 11 they're union or not. You just don't do that. 12 So I would ask that that doesn't happen any 13 more. Anyway, that's the end of my discussion. 14 you very much. 15 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, Mr. Smith. there any questions for Mr. Smith? 16 17 MR. LUFT: Just one clarifying question. 18 Mr. Smith, you're in Concord Village. Is your sewer 19 provider MSD, Metropolitan St. Louis Sewer District? 20 MR. SMITH: Yes, sir. 21 MR. LUFT: Thank you. 22 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Are there any 23 other questions for Mr. Smith? Thank you, Mr. Smith, 24 for participating today. We appreciate your comments. 2.5 MR. SMITH: Thank you for the opportunity to

1 speak.

JUDGE DIPPELL: So that was all of the names that I had on my preregistered list, but I do have some people who said that they would like to testify. This is the eighth of these local public hearings, comment hearings that we've had in the last week and a half. I'm going to just go through these names in case some of these people are on this line.

And I'm going to go through these pretty quickly. Again, if I go past you and you're not able to speak up, just speak up when you're able. You may again have to press \*6 if you're on a phone to unmute. David Parr? Julie or Terry Hayes? Is someone -- there we go. Barbara Yusen? Bruce Kondracki? Phillip Mitchel? Clarissa Cobb-Fritz? Jasmine Jones or Nancy Norton? I'm not getting anything from any of those folks. So at this time then I would just open it up to the rest of you that are on the line if you wish to give comments. If you can unmute and speak up, I will get to you as I can identify you.

Is there anyone else that -- There we go. Is that someone on the line to give comments?

MR. LAMOUREUX: This is Les Lamoureux.

JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. Can you please raise your right hand.

2	JUDGE DIPPELL: Can you please spell your name

6	JUDGE DIPPELL: And Mr. Lamoureux, would you
7	tell us what part of the state you reside in and what
8	kind of service you receive from the company?
9	MR. LAMOUREUX: Branson West Area and
10	Stonebridge Village. And I receive water and wastewater
11	sewer.
12	JUDGE DIPPELL: All right. Go ahead and give
13	us your comments.
14	MR. LAMOUREUX: My comments have to do with
15	again the amount of increase here being 15 percent plus
16	for water and 20 percent plus for wastewater. And in
17	the last session that we had with the Q&A, it was
18	explained that infrastructure drives most of this need
19	for increase. I certainly understand that everything
20	wears out and needs to be replaced. And I also
21	understand that some of this needed to be replaced many
22	years ago.
23	However, when it comes to how to pay for it,
24	I'm not I don't think that a rate increase is the
25	best way to do it because the rate increase like taxes

once you raise tax rarely ever does that tax go away.

So the rate increase you're basically forever going to
be paying for that infrastructure even after it has been
paid for.

I was thinking more along the lines of special assessment. There are -- In a certain project in a certain district there may be a certain dollar amount of infrastructure improvements and those customers could be billed a special assessment for that improvement and maybe it could be stretched out over 12 to 24 months, whatever. And once that special assessment is paid, that improvement has been paid for. And we go on paying your regular rate for water and sewer with maybe a smaller increase from year to year like a 1 to 2 percent increase.

I mentioned earlier that I'm on social security, and the government has promised me a whopping 1.3 percent increase. Others have already expressed their concern about this being during a pandemic that has hurt many people financially.

So I just don't like the way that the infrastructure improvements are included in a rate increase that's probably never going to go away. And I'm also concerned about the amount of that increase. Those are my concerns.

JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, sir, for those 1 2 comments. Are there any questions for this witness? 3 Okay. I appreciate your comments, Mr. Lamoureux. 4 MR. LAMOUREUX: Thank you very much. 5 JUDGE DIPPELL: Is there anyone else on the 6 line that would like to testify? If you would like to 7 speak or give further comments, just unmute yourself. 8 If you're on a phone, you'll have to unmute your phone 9 and then hit \*6 to unmute the system. If you're logged 10 in on the internet, you can hit the unmute button at the 11 bottom of your screen. I don't want to cut anybody off 12 if there's anybody there that would like to speak up. 13 We certainly appreciate all of your time in logging in and participating in these processes. Like I say, this 14 15 is the eighth of these and the last of these local public hearings, but there are other ways to give your 16 17 comments. You can contact the Public Service Commission by email. You can email comments to 18 19 mawccomments@psc.mo.gov. You can go to our website at 20 psc.mo.gov and click on the comments section there or 21 you can call our consumer services if you need to figure 22 out a way to get additional information or to give 23 comments and that's 1.800.392.4211. 24 Is there anyone else that would like to speak 25 at this time? I'm not seeing anything else. Again, the
