2	JUDGE BUSHMANN: We're on the record. Good
3	evening. It's Tuesday, January 17th, 2012. The Missouri
4	Public Service Commission has set this time for a local
5	public hearing in File No. WR-2011-0337, which is
6	captioned as In The Matter of Missouri American Water
7	Company's Request for Authority to Implement a General
8	Rate Increase for Water and Sewer Service Provided in
9	Missouri Service Areas.
10	My name is Michael Bushmann. I'll be presiding
11	over this evening's hearing. With me is Commissioner
12	Steven Stoll. Mr. Stoll, would you like to make any
13	opening remarks?
14	COMMISSIONER STOLL: I would just like to, on
15	behalf of the Public Service Commission, thank you for
16	coming out this evening. Nice cold evening.
17	The Public Service Commission believes that it's
18	important to come to out to the communities that are
19	affected by various cases, and so we're pleased to be here
20	in Brunswick this morning.
21	I want to thank Mary Moser, the Knights of
22	Columbus and the City of Brunswick for hosting this. And
23	we look forward to hearing your comments. And whenever
24	you're ready, Judge, we'll we'll start.
25	JUDGE BUSHMANN: All right. We'll begin with

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- 1 Counsel making their entries of appearance. For Missouri
- 2 American Water Company?
- 3 MR. REICHART: Thank you, your Honor. Appearing
- 4 on behalf of Missouri American Water Company, John
- 5 Reichart. My address is 727 Craig Road, St. Louis,
- 6 Missouri, 63141.
- 7 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Office of Public Counsel?
- 8 MS. BAKER: Thank you. Christina Baker, P.O.
- 9 Box 2230, Jefferson City, Missouri, 65102, appearing on
- 10 behalf of the Office of the Public Counsel and the
- 11 ratepayers.
- 12 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Staff of the Missouri Public
- 13 Service Commission?
- 14 MS. KLIETHERMES: Thank you, Judge. And on
- 15 behalf of Staff, Sarah Kliethermes, Tonya Alm, and Amy
- 16 Moore, 200 Madison Street, Jefferson City, Missouri,
- 17 65101.
- 18 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Are there any Intervenors
- 19 present or any other parties that I've missed?
- 20 MR. WHEELER: Robert Wheeler. I'm the attorney
- 21 for the City of Brunswick, 304 South Walnut, Keytesville,
- 22 Missouri. 65261. And I have an aunt here, also, that I'm
- 23 Durable Power of Attorney for who has a rental house here,
- 24 and so I have that interest, also.
- 25 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you, Mr. Wheeler. The

1	Page 5 process this evening is that I'm going to call the names
2	that are on the sign-up sheet. And when I call your name,
3	I'd like you to come forward and have a seat.
4	Sir, I'll have to ask you to move for the time
5	being.
6	Have a seat right here in front. I'll ask you
7	to please state and spell your name. And then after I put
8	you under oath, then you're free to make your comments to
9	the Commission. The first name that I have is Rick
10	Manson. Could you come forward, Mr. Manson?
11	MR. MANSON: Stand or sit?
12	JUDGE BUSHMANN: You can sit. Could you please
13	state and spell your name for the record?
14	MR. MANSON: Rick Manson, R-i-c-k M-a-n-s-o-n.
15	JUDGE BUSHMANN: And please raise your right
16	hand.
17	RICK MANSON,
18	being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole
19	truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows:
20	TESTIMONY OF RICK MANSON
21	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please proceed with your
22	comments.
23	MR. MANSON: First of all, I'm just a concerned
24	citizen, and I'm also a member of the Brunswick Public
25	Water Supply District. I'm a Board member of that

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1	District.
2	I want to thank the Public Service Commission
3	for organizing this rate hearing concerning Missouri
4	American's Water rates. Over the years, since the
5	inception of the Rural Water District, the Board has
6	always been committed to provide the best quality as well
7	as competitive rate for their services.
8	Missouri American has had, in our opinion, some
9	water quality issues in the past. Hardness and sediment.
10	I think these have been addressed recently, and I commend
11	them on their apparent concerns as they obviously listened
12	to their customers' legitimate complaints and have
13	improved their water quality considerably.
14	Over the years, Missouri American has increased
15	water rates and even decreased some, in all fairness.
16	The last decrease was in 1997, 14 years ago, the most
17	significant rate increase being in October of 2000, when
18	the rate formula went from single share of pricing to
19	uniform stand-alone pricing, which we talked about earlier
20	as Brunswick standing as their own District.
21	The rate increase from this point was 346
22	percent to the Rural Water District as our water for
23	resale. This was granted by the Public Service
24	Commission.
25	We have never been able to understand how this

1	rate was arrived at, especially when we were told by a
2	Missouri American representative that at that time, which
3	was Jeff Guard, that they had only requested a 54 percent
4	increase.
5	Seven years later, in 2007, again, Public
6	Service Commission approved a rate increase of 63 percent.
7	This also created more hardship for our community of
8	Brunswick and rural customers as the median household
9	income is merely 20 to 25,000 per year.
10	This current price restricts the water usage for
11	agriculture purposes and any non-essential usage. At this
12	time in 2007, the Rural Water District was purchasing 1.3
13	million gallons from Missouri American at a rate of \$3.97
14	per thousand.
15	After the increase, our purchase in March of
16	2008 of 709,000 gallons was \$6.76 per thousand, almost
17	double. In May of 2008, our purchase of 1.3 million
18	gallons was \$6.35 per thousand.
19	In 2008, the Rural Water District Board decided
20	to find other sources with better prices as well as
21	quality. As a result, our usage has declined ever since.
22	Our usage for December of 2011, for instance,
23	with Missouri American was only 40,000 gallons, and our
24	rate was \$20.78 per thousand. Now, present date, the
25	Rural Water District's 440 customers' usage is

1	Page 8 approximately 1.75 million gallons per month, between four
2	and 5,000 gallons per month per customer.
3	For instance, 3600 gallons per month costs our
4	customers \$55, and 5,000 gallons per month costs \$74.
5	This is too expensive. It's my understanding in cities
6	with trash and sewer included, the same amount of water is
7	only 30 to \$40 per month.
8	Now, Missouri American has requested a single
9	tariff pricing which would allow them to spread these
10	costs of production over the entire service area, a huge
11	customer base. These economic environments, it's
12	important to be a viable provider.
13	This pricing formula would decrease our cost of
14	water considerably. The Rural Water District's usage of
15	1.7 to 2 million gallons per month would be better
16	utilized with the Missouri American again as the supplier.
17	I would like and the Rural Water District would
18	like the Public Service Commission to grant single tariff
19	pricing to Missouri American for the good of our community
20	and the Rural Water District.
21	American Water is finally affordable. It's been
22	14 years since our last rate decrease. Our District is
23	able to purchase water from a nearby City District for a
24	rate of \$4.70 per thousand. Thank you.
25	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you. Could you stay

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1	right there for a second?
2	MR. MANSON: Yes, sir.
3	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Is there any questions from
4	Counsel?
5	MR. REICHART: Your Honor, I just have a
6	clarification question, if I may.
7	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Go ahead.
8	MR. REICHART: Mr. Mason, I just wanted to
9	confirm, the Water District that you represent is not an
10	Intervenor in the case, an official Intervenor, to your
11	knowledge, are they?
12	MR. MANSON: That's correct.
13	MR. REICHART: Okay. Thank you.
14	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Commissioner Stoll, did you
15	have any questions?
16	COMMISSIONER STOLL: Mr. Manson, how much does a
17	customer currently pay per 1,000 gallons of water?
18	MR. MANSON: Our minimum rate is \$20 per
19	thousand. First thousand.
20	COMMISSIONER STOLL: And you had how many
21	customers in the Rural Water District that left and and
22	chose to buy their water other places?
23	MR. MANSON: We haven't had any rural customers
24	leave. We have had some go back to their wells that they
25	did have as a source.

1	Page 10 COMMISSIONER STOLL: Okay.
2	MR. MANSON: They have no other place to get
3	water unless they go to a well.
4	COMMISSIONER STOLL: Okay.
5	MR. MANSON: There's no other District to serve
6	our District.
7	COMMISSIONER STOLL: All right. Thank you.
8	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you, Mr. Manson. You may
9	be excused. Clyde Black?
10	MR. BLACK: I've got some samples here.
11	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Have a seat, sir.
12	MR. BLACK: Sure.
13	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Could you state and spell your
14	name, please?
15	MR. BLACK: Clyde Black, C-l-y-d-e B-l-a-c-k.
16	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please raise your right hand.
17	CLYDE BLACK,
18	being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole
19	truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows:
20	TESTIMONY OF CLYDE BLACK
21	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please proceed.
22	MR. BLACK: Okay. I've only been a Missouri
23	American Water Company customer for three months. I've
24	lived at well, I live right next door to their pump
25	station out on Shell Creek in Missouri.

1	And when I first got the place, I asked what it
2	would cost to put a meter in. They said \$25,000. I'm in
3	the city of Joplin, but I thought that was a little
4	expensive. I didn't pay that much for the three acres.
5	And like I say, I'm right next to Shell Creek.
6	There was an old well there, so I hooked onto
7	it. And it turned out to be not treatable. The bacteria
8	required treatment with chlorine. And when I treated with
9	chlorine, me having a knowledge of chemistry, when you put
10	chlorine in a well, it dissolves heavy metals, and the
11	chlorine caused the heavy metals to go above acceptable
12	levels.
13	So EPA paid to have bottled water hauled to me
14	for about six or seven years. I was scheduled to have a
15	well drilled by the EPA in October of last year. And
16	before that happened well, the tornado that hit Joplin,
17	the three acres, I had a lot of people staying there.
18	Church groups were hauling them bottled water.
19	And I decided it would be nice since it's 110
20	degrees out to have some cold water which would come out
21	of the tap. So I once again asked. And they put a
22	freeze-proof faucet at the far side of my property one day
23	before the police asked everyone to leave. And I thought
24	that was rather strange.
25	And anyway, the first month, I used about 10

1	Page 12 gallons or so, and the second month, about 10 gallons or
2	so. I'd only used it to you know, to drink.
3	And I noticed the taste was different. And I
4	was putting it in a blue one of these blue jugs that
5	you can't see through and I'm just assuming it's coming
6	out clean.
7	And then I did that. That bottle is the first
8	before when I first opened the tap. And then I let 30
9	gallons of water run through, and I got that. There's
10	creek water right there that I dipped right out of my
11	creek.
12	I'm assuming that what it is I know what
13	they've done. The reason they wanted \$25,000 is the
14	nearest treated treated water is about a mile away. I
15	live right next-door to the pump station, so they thought,
16	why not just suck it out of the pump, you know.
17	Essentially, they're sucking it out of Shell
18	Creek. But instead of dipping it out, they suck so fast
19	that I'm assuming that's some of the Shell Creek
20	bacteria or whatever.
21	And you can check with the chlorine test there,
22	which, by the way, the I think the City water is
23	supposed to be one part per million. And if that test is
24	accurate, it looks like it's over four.
25	And my water, the No. 3 sample that had 30

1	Page 13 gallons run out before it is clear as a bell. There's no
2	chlorine in it. And I've got a \$425.17 bill here for
3	three months service.
4	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Anything further?
5	MR. BLACK: That's it.
6	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any questions from Counsel?
7	Commissioner Stoll, did you have any questions?
8	COMMISSIONER STOLL: Not at this time.
9	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you, sir.
10	MR. BLACK: Uh-huh. Do you want to take those?
11	JUDGE BUSHMANN: We can't put them in the
12	record, I don't think, so
13	MR. BLACK: Okay. Well, yeah. Probably
14	hazardous waste anyway.
15	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Colleen Johnson? Could you
16	please state and spell your name?
17	MS. JOHNSON: Colleen Johnson, C-o-l-l-e-e-n
18	J-o-h-n-s-o-n.
19	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Raise your right hand.
20	COLLEEN JOHNSON,
21	being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole
22	truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows:
23	TESTIMONY OF COLLEEN JOHNSON
24	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please proceed.
25	MS. JOHNSON: I really don't have a testimony,

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1	per se. I just feel freely that anybody that has an
2	opinion on what affects their whole community is obligated
3	to say that. And I do favor single tariff pricing.
4	That's the only statement that I care to make.
5	But I think it would benefit our community,
6	which is small, and a farming community, which is no doubt
7	declining. And we are we are struggling, and I think
8	single tariff pricing would relieve some of the stress
9	that is put on our citizens in our community.
10	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Okay. Any questions from
11	Counsel?
12	MS. BAKER: No.
13	MR. REICHART: No.
14	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Mr. Stoll?
15	COMMISSIONER STOLL: No. Thank you.
16	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you, ma'am. Robert
17	Wheeler? Can you please state and spell your name?
18	MR. WHEELER: Good evening. Robert Wheeler, W-h
19	R-o-b-e-r-t W-h-e-e-l-e-r.
20	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Will you raise your right hand?
21	ROBERT WHEELER,
22	being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole
23	truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows:
24	TESTIMONY OF ROBERT WHEELER
25	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please proceed.

1	MR. WHEELER: Thank you. My name is Robert
2	Wheeler. I reside in Keytesville, Missouri. I am Durable
3	Power of Attorney for my aunt who has a rental property
4	here in Brunswick.
5	As part of our lease, we provide the water to
6	the apartments in the house. And the lease payments are
7	I mean, the water payments are seem high, and it's
8	difficult to maintain rental property with the high
9	utility rates and with the high water rates.
10	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Am I correct it's your
11	testimony tonight is as Durable Power of Attorney for your
12	aunt and not as counsel for the City of Brunswick?
13	MR. WHEELER: Yes. That's right. Yes.
14	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Anything else you wanted to
15	add?
16	MR. WHEELER: I don't.
17	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any questions from Counsel?
18	MR. REICHART: No questions, your Honor.
19	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Mr. Stoll?
20	COMMISSIONER STOLL: No questions. Thank you.
21	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you.
22	MR. WHEELER: Thank you.
23	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Mary Barnett?
24	MS. BARNETT: Hi.
25	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Could you state and spell your

8	TESTIMONY OF MARY BARNETT
9	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Go ahead.
10	MS. BARNETT: I feel that flat rate tariff would
11	be best for Brunswick. Earlier, it was stated that we pay
12	for what we get. But many times, in a small community,
13	rural community, for Brunswick, we're asked to pay for
14	things in large cities, and we're not supposed to be upset
15	by it. So asking St. Louis to pay a couple dollars more
16	to I do not see as an issue.
17	We our electric bills are figured every
18	month. You're not charged more because we live out here
19	in the sticks for our electric, so I feel the same way
20	should be for water.
21	As far as quality, it was stated you pay for
22	what you get. If that's the case, our water bill should
23	definitely be lower, although American Water has worked
24	recently to improve things. I know that if you don't have
25	a water softener, you go through appliances much quicker

1	than you should. So that's all I have.

17	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please go ahead.
18	MR. KISTLER: My name is Robert Kistler,
19	R-o-b-e-r-t K-i-s-t-l-e-r. I am Superintendent for
20	Chariton County SD No. 2. Our Board President spoke a
21	little while ago. I just wanted to reiterate that we
22	serve a population of about 1400 people.
23	We used to buy in the minimum neighborhood of
24	1.3 million gallons of water a month from Missouri
25	American. Right now, we buy 30,000 gallons water a month

1	from Missouri American.
2	And the reason we do that, our infrastructure
3	won't allow us to supply them any other way. And then we
4	do have a contract where we have to buy water from
5	Missouri American, so we'd have to pay a minimum if not.
6	I do believe that, from what Missouri American
7	has told us, with this single tariff pricing, if that
8	would materialize, that my Board of Directors would be
9	more than willing to purchase that 1.3, if not more, per
10	month.
11	And I would hope that would, you know, help
12	justify lowering the rate for the rest of the community.
13	They do not sell it now. But
14	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Just to clarify, is that the
15	same Rural Water District that Mr. Manson is involved in?
16	MR. KISTLER: Yes. That's right. He's our
17	President, Board President.
18	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any questions from Counsel?
19	MR. REICHART: No, your Honor.
20	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Commissioner Stoll?
21	COMMISSIONER STOLL: Yes. Question. So
22	currently, your Water District buys 30,000 gallons per
23	month?
24	MR. KISTLER: Yes.
25	COMMISSIONER STOLL: From Missouri American?

1	Page 20 MR. KISTLER: From Missouri American. That's
2	correct.
3	COMMISSIONER STOLL: And it used to buy a
4	million
5	MR. KISTLER: Million three was about the
6	minimum. And then it it there's times we've done 2
7	million.
8	COMMISSIONER STOLL: And at that at that
9	time, approximately what was the highest water rate that
10	you paid? Do you recall?
11	MR. KISTLER: I don't have that.
12	COMMISSIONER STOLL: But it was obviously
13	substantially less than that?
14	MR. KISTLER: Oh, substantially less. Yeah.
15	I'm I don't want to misquote.
16	COMMISSIONER STOLL: Right.
17	MR. KISTLER: But I'll say six and a half a
18	thousand. But
19	COMMISSIONER STOLL: So your customers now are
20	getting their water from wells and
21	MR. KISTLER: The few that have them. And we
22	buy water from two suppliers.
23	COMMISSIONER STOLL: Okay.
24	MR. KISTLER: And one of them being a small town
25	and one would be another water district.

21	TESTIMONY OF SARA-ANNE KOONTZ
22	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please go ahead.
23	MS. KOONTZ: My name is Sara-Anne Koontz. I
24	live on a fixed income. My water bill for the last two
25	months has been \$200 for two months. And I don't use that

1	Page 22 much water.
2	I live practically by myself. I have a son that
3	lives with me off and on. He goes and stays with his
4	girlfriend sometimes. But, I mean, I don't see how
5	raising the prices of the water rates will benefit anybody
6	other than people that, you know, don't have to I mean,
7	there's people that can punch wells. I can't. What do I
8	have to do? Go down to the river and and draw a pipe
9	through so that I can have water?
10	Because if my water rates go up, I can't afford
11	to pay them. And Missouri Valley has already stated that
12	they can't pay those rates to help me out. So, I mean,
13	I'm I'm going to be stuck. I won't have any water at
14	all then.
15	That's all I've got to say. But, I mean,
16	there's a lot of people that live on disability in this
17	town, and they live on fixed incomes less than what I get.
18	Last year, I made \$8,000 total for the whole year. And I
19	doubt seriously that anybody could live any less than
20	that.
21	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Okay. Questions from Counsel?
22	Commissioner Stoll?
23	COMMISSIONER STOLL: No. Thank you for your
24	testimony.
25	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you.

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1	MS. KOONTZ: Uh-huh.
2	JUDGE BUSHMANN: John Benson? Would you please
3	state and spell your name?
4	MR. BENSON: John P. Benson, J-o-h-n, P, as in
5	Patrick, B-e-n-s-o-n.
6	JOHN P. BENSON,
7	being first duly sworn to testify the truth, the whole
8	truth, and nothing but the truth, testified as follows:
9	TESTIMONY OF JOHN P. BENSON
10	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please go ahead.
11	MR. BENSON: I just wanted to voice my opinion
12	that I'm all for the single tariff pricing. It was talked
13	about earlier that we do pay for things that are
14	throughout the state that I may never use, stadiums and
15	other things like that. We kind of share that cost
16	amongst us.
17	And I believe that the sharing the cost of the
18	water is is a positive thing. I'm all for trying to
19	get a vote, even though it goes down to the Commission of

21	If the group of folks who are all trying to go
22	and share the water costs, if they were to vote against
23	it, fine. Then we go with what the majority said to go
24	ahead and just pay for it ourselves.

21	because water is a basic need. It should be affordable,
22	it should be high quality, and it should be available to
23	all citizens whether they live in a rural community or in
24	a major city.
25	It is a major part of our it's an integral

1	Page 27 part of our infrastructure here in Brunswick as it is in
2	any other city. And what happens in Brunswick affects the
3	whole state. Just because what we have here we need to
4	have affordable water here just like that they do in the
5	city, and so we need to share that cost across the board
6	in the single tariff pricing.
7	I can understand the citizens in St. Louis or
8	Jefferson City not wanting to or I'm sorry St. Joe
9	not wanting to incur the cost of our water here.
10	But the reality is is that as a state, as a county, as
11	a city, we share the cost of many things, roads,
12	electricity, telephones, all kinds of things. And so it
13	stands to reason that we would share the cost of the water
14	as well through the District that provides our water
15	service.
16	Again, I want to reiterate that it's important
17	that the Commission protect the rights of all citizens,
18	even though it does cost some citizens more money. It's
19	not about what people want to do necessarily. It's about
20	what's right and good and best for the whole state. And
21	so that's my testimony.
22	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any questions from Counsel?
23	Commissioner Stoll?
24	COMMISSIONER STOLL: I might ask there's one
25	suggestion out there that instead of having a single rate

1	Page 28 that there possibly possibly be three hybrid water
2	districts. Is that something that's been discussed among

5	That I I know businesses need to make money to stay

18	I've been involved the last five years with our
19	City Council trying to write a comprehensive plan for our
20	community and plan for the future. Infrastructure is
21	critical. We can't have businesses coming here to
22	revitalize our community, which is the life blood, that's
23	where we get our tax base from, if our water is so
24	expensive.
25	So if the Commission goes ahead with the rate

1	increase and doesn't go with the single tariff pricing,
2	that is like a death blow to any small community, not just
3	our community, but any small community. It's like putting
4	your thumb on them and saying, You know what? We don't
5	want you to thrive.
6	And I'm really sorry if it's going to cost
7	somebody \$2 on their water bill in St. Louis. I would say
8	that that's indicative of a hard attitude, it's all about
9	me or my budget or what I want to do.
10	It is not about that. It's about what's right
11	and good and what's best for the whole state. A bunch of
12	people who are already on low income continuing to create
13	a serious financial burden for them and put a greater
14	strain on the welfare system or the system that helps them
15	is not good for the whole state. It's going to cost us

18	pressure here by creating affordable water? That was a
19	long answer.
