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## PROCEEDI NGS

J UDGE WDODRUFF: Good eveni ng, ever yone. Wel come once again. To the people who work here at 5 o' clock, let me introduce myself. My name is Mbris Wbodr uff, l'mthe chi ef regul at ory Iaw judge for the Public Service Commission, and l'Il be the presiding officer today.

This is your chance to talk to the Commission about proposed rate changes or about the servi ce you recei ve from M ssouri-American in general, and in a moment l'Il call you up here to testify at the podi umhere, and l'll swear you in and your testimony will be recorded and will becore part of the case record. It will be preserved so all the commissioners will have a chance to read it and consider it.

I have two commissioners here with me this eveni ng. To my left is Chairman Dani el Hall. Cormi ssi oner Hall, do you want to make any statements.

CHAI RMAN HALL: Very bri efly. Good eveni ng, I just want to thank you for coming out toni ght. Your participation in this event is a very important part of the process. Commission takes your comments seriously. As the judge indi cated, your comments are in the record, they are revi ewed by the commission at the hearing on this matter. The

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attorneys will frequently reference comments at the Iocal public hearings, so again, thank you. I look forward to hearing your comments.

JUDGE WOODRUFF: And to my right is
Cormi ssi oner Wiliam Kenney.
The first step we have to take toni ght is just a matter of determining which attorneys are here for the parties. So it's called taking the entries of appearance. So l'Il start with the company, for M ssouri-American, who's here?

MR. LUFT: TimLuft on behal $f$ of Mssouri-Anerican Water.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you. And for the Staff of the Commission?

MR. THOMPSON: Kevin Thompson for the Staff of the Mssouri Public Service Commission, Post Office Box 360, J efferson City, M ssouri 65102.

JUDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you. Office of Publ ic Counsel ?

MR. KRETZER: l'm Steve Kretzer fromthe Office of Public Counsel.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you very much. I believe that's all the parties who are represented here.

In a moment, l'Il call your name fromthe
list that was out front here, and l'Il ask you come up here to the podi um and testify for me, and l'll swear you in and you can give me your -- you can tell the commission what you want to tell them

And I ask you to keep your testimmy brief and to the point, just in consideration of the other people who want to testify after you. We have a little bit of a technical difficulty in that this is the only working microphone in the room at the moment, so l'm going to hand the microphone back to Kevin Kelly here and he's going to put it on the podi umand l'm just going to try to talk loud. Fortunately, I have a ni ce I oud voi ce.

All right. The first person on the list is Jeff Findlay.

MR. FI NDLAY: It's Jim actually.
(The witness was sworn.)
JUDGE WDODRUFF: And could you start by telling us your name?

MR. FI NDLAY: It's Jim Fi ndl ay.
J UDGE WDODRUFF: Can you spell your last name for the benefit of the court reporter?

MR. FI NDLAY: It's F-i-n-d-I-a-y.
J UDGE WDODRUFF: What would you like to tell us?

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MR. FI NDLAY: I I ive in Legend Court, which is just southeast of Jeff City. We' ve been M ssouri-American, we were there approxi mately when they were AquaSource as well.

The point that l've got is l used to install sewer. The fact that we're paying a rate that's 300 percent over what they're paying in Jefferson City, and it's basically telling me is due to their basic flat costs, their rate costs. I'mhaving trouble buying that our rates, our costs are that much hi gher than all the other -- they' ve got a Iarge popul ation base to draw from it seens to me that they need to suppl ement other di stricts a little bit more to get this down.

The second issue that l've got is that in my nei ghborhood, we are all forced to maintain septic tanks. So we' re maintai ni ng a septic tank. All this pi pe is at the bottom of the house is just taking the affluent water fromour tanks. The rates for that tank is 100 percent on us. Several of my nei ghbors have been repl acing tanks in the last two or three years. That's four or five grand a piece, plus we pay a year, every two years to have them pumped out. Anything that's done, we're totally responsible for, yet we're still paying the hi ghest sewer rates that l've ever

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heard of, and I coul dn't even find anyone el se in the country that's paying more than what we' re paying right now.

JUDGE WDODRUFF: How much are you paying?
MR. FI NDLAY: $\$ 65.22$, I thi nk is what it is. But in Jeff City, we're 300 percent over them My friends in St. Martin's, we're 50 percent over themand they don't have to mai ntain a septic tank. Something's not right here.

You know, if they were mai nt ai ni ng our septic tanks, l'd feel a little bit better about that, but l would just rather see a rate decrease to offset what we're doing here and let some of these ot her pl aces that have the new equi pment, let themfoot more of that bill.

It seens to me that the way this is going, with the way the rural sewer is going, it's time for this stuff to be regul ated in M ssouri. I think that's my main point at this time, because these guys can charge whatever they want and they're getting it, and we really don't have any choi ce unl ess we deci de to move. I think that's about all I have.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: Okay. Whi ch system do you work -- or served by? Whi ch system?

MR. FI NDLAY: The subdi vi si on i s Sl eepy

Hol I ow.
J UDGE WDODRUFF: SI eepy Hol Iow. Okay. Thank you.

Mr. Chai rman, do you have any questions?
CHAI RMAN HALL: No.
COMM SSI ONER KENNEY: I have a question.
Do you have underground or above- ground tanks?
MR. FI NDLAY: Septic tanks are all under gr ound.

COMM SSI ONER KENNEY: Are they onl y storage tanks? They don't leak out?

MR. FI NDLAY: Yeah, they're the typi cal, standard septic tank where you have the sledge field at the top, water in the middle, all the heavi est go to the bottom and the affluent water runs out of the top, down to this tank.

COMM SSI ONER KENNEY: Thank you.
MR. FI NDLAY: And some of my friends -excuse me, some of the nei ghbors with their new tanks actually have additional filters put on. There shoul dn't be anything going there, but they have to-now they' ve taken upon thensel ves, they have to deal with these filters as well. So all they're getting is a flow of water.

COMM SSI ONER KENNEY: Thank you.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: Just a moment. Did any of the parties -- attorneys have any questions?

MR. THOMPSON: No, thank you, Judge.
J UDGE WDODRUFF: Okay. Thank you. Next name is Jeff Hol zem Good evening.

MR. HOLZEM Hello.
(The witness was sworn.)
J UDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you. Could you spell your last name for us?

MR. HOLZEM Ho-I-z-e-m
J UDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you. And what would you like to tell the commission?

MR. HOLZEM First off, I appreciate the opportunity to talk to you about this, I appreciate you guys listening to that. I want to make maybe three points regarding each of the itens that you tend to hear fromare the letter fromthe Public Counsel.

First is the -- the amount of the increase, 51 million . The gentleman from M ssouri-American said the prudency cost is $\$ 7,000,000$. With that al one, they would recover it in about two months time, this increase that they're asking for, so that really seens to be unconsci onable and toolarge.

Second poi nt is regarding the cost adj ustment mechanism To me, if that were permitted,
that would just gi ve thema free range to raise rates as they choose. That seens to be totally inappropriate and bypassing the function of the Commission, really, to regul ate rates.

The third point is regarding the -- us covering St. Louis. It seens like that's totally unfair. If there's a problem with management or rates in St. Louis, whole state shoul dn't be responsible for covering that.

The next point l want to make is the size of the increase in terms of potential profit it would yi el d. It's about a 10 percent profit. Who el se makes that kind of a profit? I don't know of anybody in private that's justified to make that much money froma public busi ness. Social security reci pients like myself got no increase this year, Medicare is actually going up, so we' re Iosing about 15 percent of our buying power. So what in the world would justify asking for 10 percent. I don't get it.

JUDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you, sir. Questions?

CHAI RMAN HALL: No questi ons, thank you. COMM SSI ONER KENNEY: Thank you, sir. J UDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you.

Next name on the list is Leonard Stei nnman
[ phonetic].
Good eveni ng, sir.
(The witness was sworn.)
JUDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you very much.
MR. STEI NMAN: To begin with, Disability
Act says l'msupposed to have somebody in here for hearing impaired so l can read what si gn Ianguage is, that's under the Di sabilities Act. You're breaking the Iaw there. That's federal Iaw. It's a federal Iaw.

J UDGE hDODRUFF: Okay.
MR. STEI NMAN: Number 2, why do we have a Public Service Commission when it can core up to the people for a vote instead of you people. You know, you're not voted in. You're appointed. We need to get rid of the Public Service Cormission. That's the bi ggest problemwith the utilities in the state of Mssouri is the Public Service Cormi ssi on because the peopl e don't have the right to vote.

It's just about ei ght or ni ne people say yeah, we can do it, we can do it. l've had it with Public Service Commission and utilities of all kinds. Utilities got the right to put their $\$ 34,000$ on the ballot and say, hey, let people vote for it. Not you peopl e. You're not el ected. Our for ef athers said there's no taxation without representation. No matter
what you do, it's taxation because all entities, county, state, and city get tax off of the increase. So let's get it straightened out. Thank you.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you. Any
quest i ons?
CHAI RMAN HALL: No questions.
COMM SSI ONER KENNEY: Thank you, sir.
JUDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you.
MR. STEI NMAN: Thank you.
JUDGE WDODRUFF: Next name on the list is
St acy Bushman [phonetic].
J UDGE WDODRUFF: Good eveni ng.
MS. BUSHMAN: Hel Io.
(The witness was sworn.)
MS. BUSHMAN: Okay. So I live on a
street. It's between Holts Summit and Jeff City by the bl uff there, the winery on the bl uff there. There is five streets off our main street. We are all on one I agoon and we -- not all of us pay, that's because they still haven't found out who their customers are, and it's been since -- I don't know when the last hearing was, whenever, they told us that they don't know who they' re suppl yi ng service to.

To me, if l was -- okay. I'ma teacher, so if I don't know who I'msupplying my service, whi ch
is educating students to, then l'm hel d accountable for that in order to do my job. Correct? Yes.

So they still don't know who their people are that are using their service, but they still want to raise my rate. I can't afford a raised rate. I pay $\$ 65.22$ for myself. My water bill every month is $\$ 9$ to \$10 a month. I just don't understand why they would ask for a hi gher rate when they don't even know who's on their systems.

They say it's not very easy to find that out, but l find it really easy to drive up and down the streets and look at the addresses, because we all the have them on our mail boxes for ambul ance reasons. Why can't you just check this off? I don't get it.

Seven or ei ght years ago, my grandnother Iived at Lost Valley Lane, it's towards Taos area off of Hi ghway 50. Her rate doubled, so we actually had -she couldn't afford that, so she went from $\$ 30$ to $\$ 60$ in a month just for sewer. So she had to move.
So I thi nk that has made her -- or made her, she di ed, feel less independent because we had to put her in an assisted Iiving hore so she kind of just went downhill so fast, so.

And if l can't afford my bills and l'm not upgraded anything because I have a Iagoon, don't
really upgrade a lagoon, you look over and see if there's still water in there; correct? Yes. So if you can't afford your bills, why not file Chapter 11 bankr upt cy.

There' s a sunshi ne Iaw, so l would like to know what improvements are with my extra money. And they say they have taken care of people not paying their bill because they never knew about them but l know for a fact my friend, we're, like, good friends, । ask her all the time, hey, have you got a back payment bill yet? Nope, nope, nope. So I just want to know what improvements are that they're going to do to my I agoon, so...

J UDGE WDODRUFF: Can you tell we what subdi vi sion you live in?

MG. BUSHMAN: It's Summit View Drive.
J UDGE WDODRUFF: Okay. And is that the name of the system

MS. BUSHMAN: It's a lagoon. I can show
it to you.
JUDGE WDODRUFF: That's okay.
MB. BUSHMAN: Any ot her questions?
JUDGE WDODRUFF: Any questions from
Cormi ssi oners? Parties?
MS. BUSHMAN: I'ma teacher. Sorry.

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J UDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you. Ms. Bushman was the last name on my list. Is there anyone who di $\mathrm{dn}^{\prime} \mathrm{t}$ sign up that would like to testify now?

MR. ALLEN: I woul d.
J UDGE WDODRUFF: Come on forward, sir. Could you tell us your name?

MR. ALLEN: My name is Ri chard Allen.
J UDGE WDODRUFF: Ri chard Allen. Okay. A-I-I-e-n?

MR. ALLEN: That's correct.
J UDGE WDODRUFF: All right. Please rai se your right hand.
(The witness was sworn.)
JUDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you. What would you like to tell us?

MR. ALLEN: I'd like to talk about the sewer part of M ssouri-American Water. And I was on the same stand a few years back when the last rate increase request was -- was before the Commission. And I gave a very -- well, a very detailed accounting of why I di dn't think that rate should be increased to that extent. I'mnot going to do that toni ght. I haven't had time to look this over.
l've since retired, my health has been failing me. My income has been cut 60 percent. And I
see these requests again. I don't think this one is as steep for the sewer as it was the last time, but it's still an increase. And the sewer, the amount we pay for sewer is astronomical compared to most locations in M ssouri al ready.

To be owing 70 bucks a month is just
outrageous. And one of the reasons -- and I'm not sure if -- if this is going to apply to the sewer part, l'm sorry l wasn't here at 5 o'clock informational session, but one of the things they talk about is -- is i mpl ementing regul at ory mechani sms, revenue stabilization mechanism l don't know if this applies to the sewer or $j u s t$ applies to the water aspect.

But these kind of things remind me of what Ameren did with their fuel adj ustment sewer charge and thi ngs like that, whi ch is just a way to pad the amount that the company's getting. And when they say here that they could adj ust future rates up or down, I testified on the Ameren hearing, I said the same thing, it will never go down. And you know what, it never has. It's al ways up. And so I think the same thing would apply here.

Now, I don't know who put out this notice that came in the mail, whether it was PSC or whether it was Mssouri-American, but -- and this is just a small
gripe, but in the first paragraph, they use an acronym, they don't expl ai $n$ what the acronymis. You don't do that. I worked for state government for 27 years. I know that the first time you use an acronym you define what that is. ISRS. It's not defined. First paragraph. It's pathetic.

Another thing l notice in this information sheet about the sewer rates, and I get so tired of hearing this, they say new envi ronmental mandates. Mbst of these sewer systemimprovements are driven by more stringent envi ronmental regul ations. Well, you know what, they al ways say that. And to my know edge, there haven't been any new ones in the Iast coupl e years that apply to the extremes here.

I used to work for the Mssouri
Department of Natural Resources and I worked for the Water Pollution Control Commission, now it's been a lot of years, but certain streans required hi gher level s of treat ment. I don't believe the streans that these sewage facilities are rel easing to are any of those streans.

Now, I haven't kept up with it recently, but that's just a generic way when they bl ame -- let's bl ame it on the state regul ations or federal regul ations, l'mtired of hearing that when that's not
the case. It may have been the case at some time back, but to use that over and over again for a -- for another increase is outrageous. Thank you.

JUDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you, sir. Any quest i ons?

COMM SSI ONER KENNEY: Thank you, sir. CHAI RMAN HALL: Thank you.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: I saw another hand go up back here. Yes, sir. Good eveni ng, sir. Tell us your name.

MR. BORGMEYER: My name is Bill
Borgmeyer, it's B-o-r-g-me-y-e-r, and I ama--
JUDGE WDODRUFF: Let me swear you in first.
(The witness was sworn.)
J UDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you. Now you can tell us what you'd like to tell us.

MR. BORGMEYER: I am a wastewater user of Mssouri-American hater and I live in a small di strict across the river in Call away County. I recently moved there. I have had experience with the Jefferson City provi ders in the past, and going back in history, l've worked with maj or water and wastewater users, or I guess you'd say customers, by working with the Department of Economic Devel opment and working with
compani es who are the I argest users of water and wastewater treatment facilities in Mssouri. So l have some working know edge of it. I worked with those compani es to get built and to mai ntain their systens and empl oy peopl e in the state, some of the very I argest.

One of the concerns that I have at the Iocal level is the mistreatment by certain entities within the di stricts of Mssouri-American Water. The small area that l moved into has about ten users of a modern facility, whi ch was provi ded by the devel oper of the property. In the past several years, that new system was provi ded to a Mssouri-American hater at no cost to them A brand new facility. And we're still paying the same rate at $\$ 65.22$.

No consi deration was given for the lack of invest ment that they would have to make in a facility as opposed to the purchase of a system within a commity somewhere in the state where in order to get that facility, l'msure they' ve entered into many agreements in order to upgrade the system and provi de new facilities and a lot of other thi ngs that had to go into that systemas opposed to a small systemthat has a greater capacity to treat a lot more sewage than what it's doing right now. It has some 10 to 12 providers
or users of that systemthat's being provided.
And there was no consideration gi ven when
that was turned over or future considerations for the I ack of investment that would have to necessarily be made on a new system as opposed to one that they're purchasing that needs a lot.

And I ooki ng over thei $r$-- thei $r$ annual reports and information provided on the Web site on either communities in terms of what they' ve done in those commuities and upgrading systens and the dollars that have been spent, it's been large in many cases.

So my real concern is the breakdown of the rate -- of the different zones that are going to be established, and I just happened to count a couple of them One of them probably has less than 3,000 customers in the zone. The zone that l would be in, it looked to me like it was in the nei ghborhood of less than a 100, 000 customers as opposed to the one Iarge di strict that has the St. Loui s area in it, and it looked to me like it may have over a million customers. And that's just looking at it from you know, just a qui ck count of what was provi ded on the map.

So I guess the real concern is -- and I thi nk based upon the questions and the answers that were provi ded previ ously, many of the people here are

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in the very small systems, feel that they're not getting the service provi ded for what they have put into their system and there's been no consi deration gi ven to those people when they are brought into the system

So it would be my concern that $\$ 51$
million increase without having a well laid-out plan, they're in front of you, would not justify a \$51 million increase pl us the fact that the aut onatic increases woul d be coming al ong if the adj ustment factor were provi ded to this company -- to this company. That's it.

J UDGE hDODRUFF: Thank you, sir. Can you tell me which subdi vi si on you live in?

MR. BORGMEYER: I live in Back Nine Tounhouse Devel opment across in Callaway County.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you, sir.

## Questions?

COMM SSI ONER KENNEY: Thank you, sir.
CHAI RMAN HALL: Thank you.
J UDGE hDODRUFF: Thank you. I saw over here.

Good eveni ng.
MS. BEACH Good eveni ng.
JUDGE WDODRUFF: Wbul d you tell us your
name, please?
MS. BEACH: Yes. My name is Carol Beach, B-e-a-c-h.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: Okay. Rai se your right hand, l'Il swear you in.
(The witness was sworn.)
JUDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you. What would you like to tell us?

MS. BEACH: All right. I live in Shagmeyer Wbods [phonetic] subdi vision. This is in Cole County, about six miles southwest of Jeff City off Hi ghway 54.

Thi s subdi vi si on is 38 years old. Our little sewer treatment machine, l will call it a machi ne because it's hardly big enough to be a plant, and we have no lagoon. I assume that the water is treated and then goes into the ground or into a nearby creek or something like that.

In the 38 years that the subdi vi si on has been there, to my know edge, and we' ve lived there about 36, this sewer treat ment machine has only been upgraded once. And that was not by American Water. Ameri can Water is probably -- I can't say for sure, but probably the third entity that has owned this little machi ne.

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We are paying the $\$ 65.22$ a month for sewer treat ment. There are 13 homes that l know for sure, approxi mately 13 , l'।l say, 12 or 13 , that are connected to thi s sewer treatment. We're a single-family dwelling. There's no apartments in the subdi vision. The people on the other side of our circle have septic.

Now, I don't know whether the septic goes i nto the sewer treatment or not, but l do know that the people on the inside of the circle, which is approxi mately 13 houses, are connected to it. We mai ntain our own pi ping and everything. If anything happens between the main line and us, we are responsible. That does not include our water. We pay on the average maybe $\$ 15$, $\$ 20$ a month, dependi ng on the month for water in addition.

Agai n, we are retired, we're seni ors. And this just seens exorbitant to me. And it did when it went up several years ago when American hater acquired this and al nost doubl ed our sewer payment. It seems that no consideration is gi ven to where you are -- this seens really odd to me because Jefferson City pays less than we do, and that incl udes their water. So this is something I do not understand.

You cannot tell me that it costs $\$ 800$ a
month or something like that to maintain that little sewer treat ment machi ne at the end of our block, which would be approxi mately what is brought in fromall the peopl e that are paying the $\$ 65.22$ a month. I have a suspi ci on that thi s company is endeavoring to instal I ots of new ones in new subdi vi sions. If they would pass the total cost that have on to other customers, they would not stand for it, and so they're passing it on to everybody, even those of us who have been on this systemfor years and years and years and years. And I resent that. This doesn't mean anything, but when I write my checks, l put a note on the bottom corporate greed. Thank you very much.

JUDGE WDODRUFF: I have a question for you. Do you get your water from M ssouri-American hat er?

MS. BEACH: No, we do not. We get it from Water Di strict Number 2.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: Okay. Any ot her quest i ons?

COMM SSI ONER KENNEY: Thank you, ME. Beach.

CHAI RMAN HALL: Thank you.
J UDGE WDODRUFF: Yes, sir. State your name, pl ease.

MR. KAYSEN: Scott Kaysen, K-a-y-s-e-n. JUDGE WDODRUFF: Okay. And if you'll rai se your right hand.
(The witness was sworn.)
JUDGE WDODRUFF: What would you like to tell us?

MR. KAYSEN: I'ma nei ghbor of Jim Findl ay who spoke earlier. I'mjust here to support that. I Iive in the Sl eepy Hollow subdi vi sion. I've been there for 20 years, pretty much fromthe begi nni ng.

I just want to iterate what he had said. They talk about service. I live on a systemthat । mi ght see a truck go down my street, because I actually live on the street where the storage unit is where they collect our run- off water, maybe once a month, if l'm I ucky. So service is ki nd of a ni ce name for what they provi de, and we're paying $\$ 65$ a month for very little. So that is an issue with me.

The other issue is the fact that they -I understand that they have costs and they' ve spent some money to do improvements in areas ot her than our area, yet those costs are getting passed to us. So in addition to the fact that l thi nk our rates are too hi gh for no service, pl us we are absorbing some of the
costs for the expenditures that they' ve made is al so a probl em

I have -- I don't know that Jimhas, but I have had to repl ace my septic tank and it cost me $\$ 3,000$ to do so and have had it pumped out several times in the 20 years that l've been there. And again, no si gn of Mssouri Water. So that's all I wanted to say.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: Thanks. Questions? Thank you.

COMM SSI ONER KENNEY: Thank you, sir.
J UDGE WDODRUFF: Any other peopl e out there wi sh to testify?

Yes, sir. And could you tell us your name, sir?

MR. ILLSTON: Valter Illston, that's spell ed I-I-I-s-t-o-n.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: All right. Please raise your right hand.
(The witness was sworn.)
JUDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you. What would you like to tell us?

MR. I LLSTON: Well, this just has to do with sewer rates, because l get $m y$ water fromanother source. When I look at these sewer rates, I don't

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understand, the sewer I thought was a usage utility. It should be based on how much is used, how much water -- wastewater goes into it. Well, they got these flat rates here, whi ch mean nothing. It could be anything. And they're more than double what the usage rates are. I'd call usage rate where they put how many gallons is goi ng down into the sewer.

So it seens obvious to me that these flat rates are way out of line. I mean, people should be treat ed the same way. If l -- if l'musing 3, 000 gallons a month, whatever, l should be paying at least pretty close to what my nei ghbor is paying for 3,000 gallons. Wy aml paying more than twice?

Now, I know there's probably some irregularities here, but that just seens to me outlandi sh to re. And it's been that way for years. And now they' re wanting to rai se them another 20 percent. Well, I wasn't born yesterday. I know they're not goi ng to get 20 percent, but they'll probably get an increase, but this \$65. 22 compared to Rock Creek or Meramec is \$20.93, makes no sense to me whatsoever. That's all I have to say.

JUDGE WDODRUFF: Questions?
COMM SSI ONER KENNEY: No.
CHAI RMAN HALL: Thank you.

COMM SSI ONER KENNEY: Thank you very much.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: Anyone el se wi sh to speak? Back there. Good evening. Could you tell us your name?

MS. HULL: Greta Hull, Hu-I-I.
J UDGE WDODRUFF: Okay.
(The witness was sworn.)
MS. HULL: So I live in the Sl eepy Hollow nei ghborhood. You' ve heard froma couple of $m y$ nei ghbors. l'mreally just here to echo their sentiment that our -- the amount that we' re paying is di sproportionate for the service that we' re recei ving. We're not perpetually di sgruntled people in the nei ghborhood, but it's just that, you know, we pay to have our sewer mai ntai ned and to make sure that it's working and it's what we have -- we're responsible for all of that, and then -- so we pay for our water, we pay for our own sewer, and on top of that, we have this fee that is rising. And so we just wanted to say that we're happy with paying for a service, but it seems like it's disproportionate with the amount that we're getting in return.

And so I just want ed to support the peopl e. We have about 55 homes in our nei ghbor hood.

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We all are responsible for our own sewer pl us the American hater bill on top of that. Any questions?

J UDGE WDODRUFF: Questions?
COMM SSI ONER KENNEY: Thank you.
JUDGE WDODRUFF: For all the people from
Sl eepy Hol Iow, I'mgoing to vol unteer Jim Busch [phonetic] back there in the back. If you have questions, you might want to find himafter the hearing and you might be able to get some -- ask himsome more questions --

MS. HULL: Okay.
JUDGE WDODRUFF: -- about your specific situation.

MS. HULL: Let's see what he looks like.
J UDGE WDODRUFF: Pi nk shirt.
MS. HULL: Okay. Thank you.
J UDGE WDODRUFF: Anyone el se? l'Il come back to you.

Yes, ma' am Good evening. Coul d you
tell us your name, please?
MS. BUSCHMAN: Debra Buschnan,
B- u-s-c-h-ma-n.
J UDGE WDODRUFF: Okay.
(The witness was sworn.)
JUDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you.

ME. BUSCHMAN: Hi. This is dej a vu for me. I've done this before with my mom She lived east of Jeff City at Lost Valley Lane and had the same sewer company. And when she moved in to her home there, there was only maybe ten houses on that bl ock, on that street because it came up to Hi ghway 50 and it dead-end. And her sewer bill was under $\$ 20$.

In the course of her living there for 25 years, it went from under $\$ 20$ to over $\$ 60$. And when it was around $\$ 30$, we cane to a hearing, testified al ong with other people, there were businesses here, there were, you know, people in a family. She was a wi dow person by herself and still had to pay the same rate as busi nesses or big families.

And they didn't raise the rate all at one time, they did it over a coupl e of years, but basically, it more than doubl ed in that length of time. That was, l'mtrying to remenber, back in, like, 2007 or '8. So here we are agai n .

Now my daughter lives -- when she found the perfect house, 23 years ol d, schoolteacher, good head on her shoul ders, wants to buy this house in Surmit View subdi vi si on and I saw the sewer company. I sai d oh, my God, not again. We're going to go through the whol e same thing. You have $\$ 60$-something a month
for sewer. She's, like, it's okay. I love the house. Here we are again.

And same thing back when we testified for my mom there's people that said they had never paid a sewer bill. Never. To American Water. And she has friends on the -- in the subdi vision where she lives, my daughter, and she's checked with them never paid a sewer bill. Never.

So they're treating the people that are paying their bills horrible and it's the ones that aren't that say, well, we can't keep track of everyone. Yes, you can. You can keep track of your customers. If you can't, then you need to lower the rate. None of it is increasing the rate by 10 to 19.6 percent. Decrease it for the ones that have been loyal customers and pay their bills.

I don't know what el se to say. I mean, I don't understand what the Commission is for if you're not listeni ng to every testimny that's up here.

Unl ess they can show papers to why they're going to rai se these rates, what huge systemthey're going to put in that can make a difference, at least your water bill, you have a meter. They don't have meters, so what expense do they have? They don't have to keep those meters up-to-date, change them out. Half the
time，they don＇t have to get out of their car，they can just link it with the meter．We＇re not tal king technol ogy here．We＇re tal king about a little machine or sewer system There＇s no meter．It＇s a flat rate． There＇s nothing to keep upgraded as far as the technol ogy part goes．I think that＇s it．

JUDGE WDODRUFF：Any questions？
COMM SSI ONER KENNEY：Thank you．
CHAI RMAN HALL：Thank you．
J UDGE WDODRUFF：Anyone el se wi sh to
testify？
Yes，n⿴囗十 pl ease？

MS．ADAMS：My name is Shi rley Adans．
JUDGE hDODRUFF：Wbul d you spell the Iast name？

MS．ADAME：A－d－a－ma．
JUDGE WOODRUFF：All right．
（The witness was sworn．）
JUDGE WDODRUFF：What would you like to tell us？

MB．ADAMB：Well，l guess my concern is
－－we purchased a house in 1976 on Shamrock Road．We have a I agoon there and so we pay sewage onl y to that company．We have a separate billing we get fromour
wat er.
And I guess my concern is when we
purchased a house, we were told we would never have a sewer bill there because we had the Iagoon. We' ve went fromzero to now if this passes al most $\$ 90$ with our -well, it will be $\$ 70$ and then we have a $\$ 20$ water bill, $\$ 20$ to $\$ 25$. That's getting up cl ose to the $\$ 100$ mark for people on retirement. 67, 68 years old. Like the gentleman sai d, we haven't gotten a rai se fromsocial security this year and I just wanted to be on record for stating that the sewer amount is just ridiculously high, as other people have mentioned here this eveni ng.

JUDGE WDODRUFF: Do you know the name of the subdi vi si on?

MS. ADAME: Well, we're on Sham ock Road, so it's out toward Taos.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: I know the area. Okay. Thank you. Any questions?

COMM SSI ONER KENNEY: Thank you very much, ma' am

CHAI RMAN HALL: Thank you.
J UDGE WDODRUFF: Anyone el se wi sh to

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testify?
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MR. ALLEN: l'mstill Ri chard Allen, l'm still under oath.

J UDGE hDODRUFF: Okay.
MR. ALLEN: I -- I did mention that the subdi vision that l'min is Sl eepy Hollow. I've heard from some ot her fol ks. We bought our house there al nost 20 years ago. At that time, this house did not -- was not connected to the system lt had its own indi vidual septic tank in the drain field whi ch was failing miserably. And I expl ai ned this on the Iast rate hearing.

I wanted to do the right thing. I would like to have sewage servicing. I could have put in a new drain field, but with the clay soil there, it might not have worked. So spend money to connect to the Sl eepy Hollow system Had to run a Iong line, had to put in a new septic tank.

The reason they have every house in that system on a septic tank before it gets to the main line is the main line is a small diameter line and it can't handle a lot of solids. They have to be collected from the septic tanks before it hits the main line. And yes, we are responsible to mai ntain our septic tanks and our lines all the way out to the main line, whi ch as other people have said, I think it's outrageous that we have to pay $\$ 70$ on top of all we have to do for our own part.

Although I will say, I mean, l've got to tell both sides of it. I will say that at least last summer, I saw thei $r$ truck about once a week go down the street. I don't know how much time they were spending or what they were doing. And one time when I had bl ockage in my line going down to the main line, I wasn't sure where it was, I thought it might have been the main line and l called them and one of their techni cians came out. And he determined it wasn't in the main line, it was in on my property. Joy, joy. But he did try to clear it. Free. So I got to say some good thi ngs where there are good. There's not much, but l've got to say that he did try. It wasn't successful. I had to hire somebody.

But yes, we do have to -- for that system and all the pretreat ment we have to do with our septic tanks first, we should catch a break. Cone on, fol ks. Thank you.

JUDGE WDODRUFF: One question for you. Do you know when Mssouri-Anerican bought your systemp

MR. ALLEN: I think it's about four or five years ago. It's been owned by several compani es. Go way back to this Capital Utilities way back and then it was -- it was some other company and every company's asked for an increase in rates.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: I thi nk you mentioned AquaM ssouri?

MR. ALLEN: Yeah, Aqua was one of them I think they were in between Capital and M ssouri - Ameri can.

J UDGE hDODRUFF: Okay.
MR. ALLEN: So, but anyway, I'm happy to answer any other questions.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you. Anyone el se wish to testify?

Yes, sir. Can you tell us your name, pl ease?

MR. KEMPKER: Keith Kempker, I ast name is K-e-mp-k-e-r.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: Okay.
(The witness was sworn.)
J UDGE WDODRUFF: What would you like to tell us?

MR. KEMPKER: I woul d just ki nd of like to reiterate kind of what we heard a little bit toni ght. Just back up a little bit.

Four or five years ago, one of the last rate increases that -- that M ssouri-American had -had asked for, there was talk specifically about billing issues, talk specifically about people being on
their system but not recei ving a bill, and people were tol d back then that -- that it would be addressed. But yet we al so hear toni ght that there's still an issue toni ght with billing issues, people just not getting their bill. Through thei $r$ question-and-answer session bef or ehand, you know, yes, you know, we're told that, you know, sometimes those are hard to find.

But what I would like to point out to each of you three toni ght and even the other Commission menbers as you-all decide on this rate increase is go back and Iook, and see how many -- how many billing issues and how many connection issues were resol ved within the last four years.

David with Mssouri-American said that, you know, last fall that they went through and tried to take count of other issues. But I do ask that you menbers do look into those and make sure -- and ask for a specific list of how many -- how many billing issues have been -- I say billing issues, how many connection issues have been resol ved in those last four or five years. And ask, are they good enough? That's all । have toni ght.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: Mr. Kempker, whi ch
nei ghbor hood are you in?
MR. KEMPKER: We Iive in Hi dden Valley

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subdi vi si on in Cal laway Count y.
J UDGE WDODRUFF: Okay. I believe several ot her peopl e have tal ked about that.

MR. KEMPKER: Not toni ght, I don't believe, but possibly in past public hearings.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: Okay. Thank you, sir.
MR. KEMPKER: Thank you.
COMM SSI ONER KENNEY: Thank you.
J UDGE WDODRUFF: Anyone el se wi sh to

ME. Adans?
MS. ADAME: Yeah, I'mstill under oath, yes.

I forgot to mention awhile ago that my concern l'd like to go on record for is that l guess as many of them here have stated toni ght, l'magai nst the flat rate for the sewer. I feel that it ought to go on by what you use. I don't feel like a family of six or ei ght people and one or two people ought to have the same rate. I think that's totally unfair.

I think with all the computer systems that the different water compani es use now, l feel that it wouldn't be a big issue for the company to get a hol d of those records and bill accordingly by usage instead of a flat rate. That can be done nowadays in

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the 21st Century, and I just want to go on record for saying that.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: Okay. Thank you, m'am Anyone el se wi sh to testify?

Mr. St ei nman.
MR. STEI NMAN: I'mstill under oath. If you haven't noticed, the stock market's going downill. They keep tal king about empl oyment being up. Great, but it's not. It's just people run out of unempl oyment insurance. What's going to happen is the same thing's going to happen in 1955 if you don't remenber and in 1929. You're going to -- you're going to let these people bill and bill and bill and the next thing you know, everybody's goi ng to be looking for a refrigerator box to live in. And that's what's happeni ng now, if you're not paying attention. That's what's the problemis, is nobody's paying attention. They're out here, they're dumping right here in J efferson City. Any pl ace you walk, you mi ght step into your own stuff. Thank you.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you, sir. Anyone el se wish to testify?

Yes, sir.
MR. DI SHMAN: I don't know if | can
follow that.

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J UDGE hDODRUFF: Tell us your name, pl ease.

MR. DI SHMAN: My name is J ames
D-i-s-h-ma-n.
(The witness was sworn.)
MR. DI SHMAN: I think the recurring there that l'mhearing here is we're all individuals. We're all mandated to pay a certain amount with the flat fees. It seems like -- I live in the Sl eepy Hollow subdi vision as well. Thank you for getting us together come talk to you fine fol ks this eveni ng.

I thi nk what our bi ggest problemis we do have a septic tank systemthat then will filter into the treat ment facility down bel ow. I just put in a new systemtwo years ago, 2014, that is requi red now to have a filter before -- so that no solids can go to the treat ment facility. So all they're getting is water which would be leached out into a regul ar leach field if we had one. But since we don't have one, we use a treat ment facility. Theref ore, that water has to be fairly clean at that point.

So we're paying \$65. 22 every month to gi ve themfairly clean water. Don't want to drink it, but nothing wrong with that. So I'mnot sure, though, why our systemisn't looked at compared to differently
for ot her systens. I just want you to come and see what I have.

Your inspector came out and was at my house when my septic tank went in. He tol d me l have to have this filter in the septic tank, otherwi se you guys will come out and shut off my system You'd have to dig up the pi pe and cut it off and do things like that, but I guess you could. So I thi nk you need to come out and look at all the variances that people have and find out what their rates should be.

The $\$ 65.22$ for somebody that bel ongs in -- or has a lagoon, doesn't make any sense, the -- for the people that have a septic that l think go into water treat ment facility, doesn't make any sense either. Thank you for your time.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you. Anyone el se wi sh to testify?

Come on back up.
MR. BORGMEYER: My name is Bill
Borgmeyer. I'mstill under oath.
l'Il make this very brief. You've heard some of the customers refer to the fact that they don't -- M ssouri hater -- or Mssouri-American takes thei r water and then does some additional treatment. In our particul ar case, they don't take the water. The water
is treated entirely within the systemthat is onsite, and the water that comes out of it discharges into a clear creek into a golf course -- or that runs through a golf course. So they're really not doi ng a whole lot to the treatment of the water that is used within our stmall di strict. So -- and we're still being charged $\$ 65.22$ a month.

J UDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you. Anyone el se? All right. Well, I thank you all for coming toni ght.

COMM SSI ONER KENNEY: I want ed to make a statement. Chai rman Hall mentioned how important these public hearings are to us. Part of the probl em happens sometimes we have conflicting interests, we have three ot her Commissioners that are not here, but we have a court reporter that takes down all the information and they will read all of your testimony and take it into consi deration. Thank you.

JUDGE WDODRUFF: Thank you all for coming toni ght. We are adjourned.
