3	I would ask that everyone please mute themselves unless
4	speaking. That will hold down on the noise level and
5	prevent any audio feedback. One thing to note if you

7	Commission has found in doing these WebEx online
8	hearings is to shut off your video. We do appreciate
9	when you're speaking having the video on. That helps

12	And we have Commissioner Coleman joining us.
13	COMMISSIONER COLEMAN: I am here.
14	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, Commissioner. I
15	appreciate hearing from you. We were just getting
16	started. The Commission, Public Service Commission, has
17	set this time for a local public hearing to give members
18	of the public a chance to comment about Confluence
19	Rivers Utility Operating Company's General Rate
20	Increase. That is File No. WR-2023-0006. If I did not
21	say it already, today is June 14, 2023.
22	The Public Service Commission regulates the
23	rates charged by public utility companies in Missouri to
24	ensure that those rates are just and reasonable. The
25	Commission also regulates the quality of service and

2	five Commissioners. They are appointed by the Governor
3	and confirmed by the Senate.
4	The Commissioners employ a staff of engineers,
5	accountants, attorneys, financial analysts and other
6	specialists in the field of utility regulation. My name
7	is Charles Hatcher. I am the Regulatory Law Judge and
8	will preside over this hearing.
9	As I stated before and I'll state for the
10	record, with me today are Chairman Scott Rupp and
11	Commissioners Maida Coleman and Glen Kolkmeyer.
12	This is an official hearing of the Missouri
13	Public Service Commission and statements and testimony
14	of witnesses will be recorded by the court reporter and
15	are given under oath. The Commissioners have not made
16	any decisions in this case and cannot answer any
17	questions today because they do have to remain impartial
18	until after all of the evidence is presented.
19	Brandy, I see that your hand is up. If you
20	could hold on for just a moment, I will come around and
21	address any questions.
22	Let's go ahead and get our counsel to
23	introduce themselves and make their entries of
24	appearance. Counsel for Confluence Rivers.

21	have had Confluence Rivers I think it's almost close to
22	ten years now. What they stated earlier was true. They
23	did make improvements on the water from what we had
24	before. We have been paying now 150 to \$200 per month
25	for this whole entire time. Yes, what they said earlier

1	was true, this particular case they were requesting ours
2	to go down. That's like \$2. The reason why I wanted to
3	state this is because this is our chance.
Δ	T know how the Dublic Service Commission works

I know how the Public Service Commission works 4 5 I became quite invested in this the past ten years now. 6 So I know how it works. I know that while or so. 7 they've been asking for an increase that this is our one 8 and only chance while this is open for discussion to try 9 to get the Hillcrest rate down, because it has been now 10 close to so long that we've been paying these extremely 11 high rates.

12 If you look at the other water sources around 13 us, they don't pay anything like we do. I have been in 14 touch with Senator Holly Rehder's office with some help 15 to try to get, you know, what we've experienced here in 16 Hillcrest. I feel like I've been getting a little deja 17 vu lately when I was on this call listening to some of the new homeowners in the other subdivisions that have 18 19 been stating what they're seeing with Confluence.

This is the exact same thing we went through so many years ago. They're saying all the same things. I'm in the business. I mean, I'm a business person and I don't know how they can say they're not making a profit. Like they're not just doing this out of the goodness of their heart. I feel like that they take

1	Page9 companies that are struggling and, you know, residential
2	areas that are struggling and they capitalize on that.
3	And I feel for all of you that are on the call
4	that are asking will our rate go down. No, your rate
5	will not go down until you get the opportunity that
6	we're getting today to talk to the Public Service
7	Commission again about what this company has done.
8	Yes, the improvements have been there. Do
9	they justify the high costs that we're all paying?
10	Absolutely not still at this point. I can't personally
11	still drink the water. It's high in chlorine. It does
12	not taste right. I buy bottled water still. Of course,
13	I cook with it. It's hard water. I've been through
14	three hot water heaters since living here.
15	Gosh, it's Strictland Engineering. That's the
16	people that come and read the meters. I don't know how
17	much of our bill goes towards it. There's a truck here
18	all the time, literally I feel like it's 24/7, driving
19	around the neighborhood. What are they doing this
20	entire time, I have no idea. I feel like that might be
21	an exorbitant cost that we're having to take on.
22	The sewer still smells and reeks in the summer
23	when it's super hot outside. Our bill in March was
24	about \$20 higher than normal, because it said we used
25	8,900 gallons. We normally use 2,400 gallons. We were

1	Page 10 in the Dominican for a week in March on top of that. So
2	I find that hard to believe. I had a case that I put in
3	to the Public Service Commission for that. So overall
4	basically my goal on tonight's call was to speak on
5	behalf of the subdivision for Hillcrest so other
6	communities don't have to go through what we've been
7	going through, and we hope the Public Service Commission
8	will not only deny their huge rate increase for these
9	other subdivisions but they will also relook at
10	Hillcrest Subdivision to try to get our water and sewer
11	bills down to a more manageable cost.
12	We have a lot of older people in this
13	subdivision, a lot of older homes. And if you had a
14	family larger than mine, they'd be paying even more than
15	we are. I encourage the Public Service Commission to
16	really look closely at this company and what You
17	know, Hillcrest could be a poster child for what these
18	other subdivisions could be experiencing. So that's
19	pretty much what I wanted to tell everyone.
20	JUDGE HATCHER: Sure. Thank you. I
21	appreciate your comments, Ms. McIntire. If you could

Page 12 1 I am here also a resident of the MR. NEWMAN: 2 Hillcrest Subdivision like Brandy. I have not lived 3 here as long as Brandy. I moved to the neighborhood 4 about three and a half years ago. Our water bill here 5 is consistently 160 to \$170. It doesn't matter if we're 6 not home, like Brandy mentioned, the water rate remains 7 the same no matter what. And the water quality, like 8 Brandy mentioned, is not very good. We still buy 9 bottled water in our household.

10 We purchased a water softener. Earlier 11 Confluence Rivers explained -- Somebody asked if they 12 had plans to improve the water quality and that was a 13 no, that they do not plan to improve water quality. 14 They said it was a type one and type two. You're 15 probably more familiar with that than I am. I'm just 16 here to say that -- I'm basically here to back up 17 Brandy's statements.

18 I live right across the street from the 19 lagoon, and you can smell it at night. We've contacted 20 them about that I couldn't tell you how many times. You 21 can smell it. Usually at night I'll let my dog out and 2.2 it smells like sewage outside about nine o'clock 23 usually. That's not every day. Right now it doesn't 24 stink. But there's been oftentimes where it does. And 25 I'm just here to say that I hope that we can lower our

2	improve the quality of our water.

18	clarifying.
19	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, Chairman. Are
20	there any other Commissioner questions for Mr. Newman?

17	service call. So that kind of covers the lagoon side of
18	it.
19	The water side of it, we moved here in 2019.
20	Of course, whenever we were going through the buying
21	process, when we got the comps to what the water bill
22	would be we were shocked. We were going from paying \$40
23	a month for water, sewer and trash to now 140 to 150 a
24	month for just water and sewer. Having said that, we

25 did purchase. But we've also had friends that have

1	Page 16 looked at purchasing in this neighborhood. The reason
2	they did not was because of the high fixed costs that
3	water and sewer would be. So I know that Confluence was
4	saying that the improvements they've made have made it
5	to where you can get the Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac
6	loans through here now, which may be true, but there's
7	also another side to the sword where it is driving
8	people away from this community.
9	The water quality, just like Jon and Brandy
10	have said, it's destroyed many of our appliances: The
11	dishwasher, water heaters, coffee pots in particular,
12	coffee makers I should say, which doesn't seem like a
13	big expense but, you know, if you're buying a coffee
14	maker every year, then that adds up. But those are all
15	the points I had.

2	pay a base of 145 for 3,000 gallons a month for a family
3	of two in a one-bathroom, two-bedroom duplex.
4	The neighboring city of Cape Girardeau pays
5	for that same amount of water \$39.03 and a town next to
6	us on the other side, Gordonville, currently pays 32 for
7	that same amount of water. We also do not consume our
8	water. I have a refrigerator with a water filter that I
9	use for myself and my animals. We do cook, of course,
10	with it. That is due to taste and hard water.
11	We have had to replace, as they mentioned,
12	numerous coffee pots, washers, dishwashers, even down to
13	your clothes, the wear and tear on them. So it just
14	seems like Brandy stated this is our one opportunity to
15	get to let you all know exactly what's happening to us
16	in this neighborhood. People are having to move out of
17	the neighborhood to find more accessible, cost effective
18	water and sewer.
19	I don't think that anyone should have to
20	consider that for the normal amenities of water and
21	sewer in this day and age.
