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4	JUDGE PRIDGIN: Good evening. Welcome to
5	tonight's hearing. The purpose of tonight's hearing is to
6	hear from you on Stockton Hill's Water Company's proposal
7	of rate increase. If you have any specific questions or
8	complaints, you can see staff members or someone from the
9	Office of Public Counsel after the hearing. I believe
10	you've been visiting with them for a while and you're
11	certainty welcome to speak with them after the hearing.
12	If you want to testify we have a signup
13	sheet, I believe Mr. Ochoa has it and we have a few people
14	signed up. If you're not able to speak today but you wish
15	to file your comments, we have a way to do that online,
16	you can also call the Staff of the Office of Public
17	Counsel and give your comments to them later.
18	You notice I have a court reporter. We'll
19	be on the record and what will happen here in a minute is,
20	I will read an opening statement and I will then ask for
21	witnesses to testify. Because the room is so small and I
22	think the acoustics are pretty good, you're welcome to
23	testify right where you are. We would normally have a
24	microphone and a podium to stand by, but in this room
25	you're just welcome to keep your seat, if you would like

when you testify.

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2 Are there any questions about the process 3 so far? All right. I will read an opening statement, 4 give some introductions, ask counsel to introduce 5 themselves, and we'll start taking testimony. 6 Good evening. Missouri Public Service Commission has set this time for a local hearing in case 7 8 number WR-2010-0202. The Missouri Public Service 9 Commission regulates the rates charged by investor owned utility companies in Missouri to make sure those rates and 10 just and reasonable. The Commission also regulates 11 quality of service and the safety of the operations of 12 13 these utilities. The Commission is made up of five 14 commissioners, one of them is with me this evening. 15 16 Commissioners are appointed but the Governor for fixed 17 terms and confirmed by the Senate. The Commissioners employ a staff of 18 engineers, accountants, attorneys, financial analysts and 19 20 other specialists in the field of utility regulation. I'm Ron Pridgin, I'm a regulatory law judge 21 22 for the Commission presiding over this evening's and with me this evening is Commissioner Jeff Davis. 23 24 This is an official hearing of the 25 Commission and your statements and testimony must be given

under oath and will be reported by the court reporter. 1 2 All the Commissioners will have a chance to 3 read your remarks. The purpose of the hearing is to hear 4 from you. The company will not present witnesses and will 5 not answer questions during this hearing. This is your 6 chance to testify and your remarks will be made a part of the official record of this case. 7 8 When your name is called, I will ask you a 9 few preliminary questions such as, what your name is. I'll ask you to spell it so that the court reporter spells 10 it correctly. I will ask if you are a customer of 11 Stockton Hills Water Company and then ask if you have a 12 13 statement for the Commission. When you're finished, I may some questions 14 15 for you or Commission Davis may have some questions for 16 you. After that, we will go on to the next the witness 17 and we will continue until nobody else wishes to testify. 18 If there is someone who wished to testify 19 but for religious reasons cannot take an oath, please let 20 me know and I will ask that your testimony be affirmed 21 instead of sworn. 22 Does anyone have any questions about the procedure? All right. Let me get entries of counsel 23 24 please as they are appearing from the General Counsel's Office. 25

MR. RITCHIE: Thank you Judge. Appearing 1 2 on behalf of the Public Service Commission Staff, Sam 3 Ritchie, PO Box 360, Jefferson City, Missouri, 65102. 4 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Mr. Richie, thank you. 5 Appearance on behalf of the Public Counsel, please. 6 MS. BAKER: Thank you, Your Honor. 7 Christina Baker, PO Box 2230, Jefferson City, Missouri, 8 65102, appearing on behalf of the Office of Public Counsel 9 and the Rate Payers. 10 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Ms. Baker, thank you. Any other appearances from counsel? All right. We will then 11 proceed with the testimony. 12 13 Mr. Ochoa, if you will call the first 14 witness. MR. OCHOA: Marge Price. 15 16 JUDGE PRIDGIN: All right. If you'll raise 17 your right hand and be sworn, please. Do you swear the evidence you are about to give will be the truth, the 18 whole truth, and nothing but the truth, so help you God? 19 20 MS. PRICE: I do. 21 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Thank you very much. If 22 you would please state your name and spell it for the court reporter. 23 24 MS. PRICE: Marjorie Price. M-a-r-j-o-r-i-e, P-r-i-c-e. 25

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1 JUDGE PRIDGIN: And are you a customer of 2 Stockton Hills? 3 MS. PRICE: Yes, I am. 4 JUDGE PRIDGIN: All right. Do you have a 5 statement for the Commission, ma'am? 6 MS. PRICE: Yes. The majority of the folks that live in Edgewood, which are served by the Stockton 7 8 Hills Water Company, mostly on fixed incomes as my husband and I are. For many of them, this \$66.72 a year increase 9 10 might not seem like a lot to you, but we don't get an increase on our social security, but everybody is getting 11 increases on what they're getting. 12 13 So, my question is, at this time we're being asked to shell out more money for the same services 14 that we've been getting all along and I wonder if that is 15 16 an appropriate thing to do at this time, during this time 17 in the economy. That's what I have to ask or what I'm 18 meaning to say. JUDGE PRIDGIN: Okay. All right. Thank 19 20 you very much, I appreciate your comments. Commissioner 21 Davis, do you have any questions. 22 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Ma'am, we're not necessarily supposed to respond comments. It's our job to 23 24 listen and decide things, but I want you to know that we have to decide these cases based on the facts and on the 25

1	evidence. And you know, I'm just going to paraphrasing
2	the law and I don't know what was said in the previous
3	meeting, what people asked, but the company is entitled to
4	have the opportunity to earn a fair return on its
5	investment. And usually the way it works is, if they
б	invest more money, you know, then they will come and
7	present evidence to them Commission and that's up to us to
8	make the decision. That's, kind of, where we are right
9	now. So, I mean, does that help you understand the
10	process at all?
11	MS. PRICE: I assume then, that it doesn't
12	make any difference the status of the income of the folks
13	in the community, it's only that the company can get a
14	return on their investment, not how it effects the overall
15	population of the area, as far as it biting into the
16	income. That doesn't enter into it at all. It's just
17	their return on their the investment. Is that what your
18	saying?
19	COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Perhaps Ms. Baker can
20	maybe answer that. Ms. Baker and Sam here can answer that
21	for you after the meeting. They can talk to you about it
22	about it if you're wanting to.
23	MS. PRICE: Okay.
24	JUDGE PRIDGIN: Any my further questions,
25	Mr. Davis.

COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I don't have any 1 2 questions. Ma'am, thank you for your testimony. 3 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Any questions from 4 counsel? 5 MR. RITCHIE: No questions, thank you. б MS. BAKER: No questions, thank you, but I 7 will talk to you afterwards. 8 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Thank you. Mr. Ochoa. 9 MR. OCHOA: The next name is Bob Stone. 10 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Thank you, sir. If you would, please raise your right hand to be sworn. Do you 11 12 swear the evidence you are about to give is the truth, the 13 whole truth and nothing but the truth, so help you God? MR. STONE: I do. 14 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Thank you very much, sir. 15 16 If you would, please state your name and spell it for the 17 court reporter. MR. STONE: Robert Stone, R-o-b-e-r-t 18 19 S-t-o-n-e. 20 JUDGE PRIDGIN: And Mr. Stone, are you a 21 customer of the water company. 22 MR. STONE: Yes, I am. 23 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Any statement for the 24 Commission, sir? MR. STONE: I just don't particularly see 25

1 at this point in time, with being a customer for several 2 years, a need for an increase. Not only because the 3 economy, but what little maintenance that I have witnessed 4 being done to the system. The rudeness and harshness you 5 get from the company when you make calls to them and ask 6 for certain things.

7 The water system, we have to put in our own 8 purification systems because they don't do that. So, if 9 you don't have a purification system, which most people 10 can't afford, your replacing hot water tanks every couple of years, your faucets, your kitchen appliances, such as 11 coffee pots and so on and so forth, because the lime and 12 13 calcium builds up that comes out the water. So, we're 14 already at a major expense, yearly at replacing appliances 15 and household goods and items that we need every day. So, 16 now they want us to pay even more for that something 17 that's going to keep costing us more on top of that.

18 I just do not feel it's right at this point19 in time.

Let alone there are no fire hydrants. I found one hydrant in that entire area. It's an inch and a half line which our local department just this last year got the adapter to hook up to it and the water company is more worried about who is going to pay for the water then someone's house burning down, because I've watched two of

1 them burn down. 2 The fire department has had to come to 3 Stockton, or go back to the firehouse or up to lake to 4 pump water to fill their water trucks so they can keep 5 putting the fire out. 6 There's something wrong with this picture 7 to me. That's all I got at this time. 8 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Mr. Stone, thank you. Let 9 me see if we have any questions. Mr. Davis? COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Mr. Stone you talked 10 about the rudeness of the employees when you called 11 in. And can you be a little more specific, kind of give me 12 13 an idea of when those, when that happened. Do you remember who you talked to, do you remember what the 14 issues were, you know, was there another underlying 15 16 problem, did it ever, did the issues ever get resolved? 17 MR. STONE: The issue was a matter a of 18 reading the meter at my and my wife's old home. We wanted the water shut off permanently. My wife had called and 19 20 talked to somebody, I'm not sure who it was, and she was told that they would read it the next time they came out 21 22 to do the water meters, read all of the rest of water meters. That's not the point, we wanted the water shut 23 24 off at that time so we weren't billed for any extra 25 seepage or anything else out of the meters.

As Ms. Cassel said, the meters are leaking 1 2 so she's had to replace them. Okay? I called up and I 3 talked to Ms. Cassel and I told her, I says, "I want the 4 meter read now, not next week or in two weeks or whenever 5 you come to do the meter readings because if it changes б from the time that I shut it off," I took the meter 7 readings, "And you come up with another number, I will be 8 one pissed off, " whatever. And she said, "Goodbye," and 9 hung up. I never called her a name, I never said nothing 10 derogatory towards her, I said it about myself and I got 11 hung up on. I ain't talked to her since and if at all possible, I won't, because I know where that goes. I 12 13 ain't going there. But that's, that was the big one. 14 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. MR. STONE: That is the most recent. That 15 16 was this year. 17 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: So that was this year, 18 this spring? MR. STONE: March. 19 20 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: March. And with 21 regard to the fire hydrants. It's just that there are no 22 fire hydrants, and that the one that's out there is 23 inadequate? 24 MR. STONE: Way inadequate. Our whole 25 water system is inadequate for fire hydrants.

COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. 1 2 MR. STONE: I've already talked to a local 3 fireman and they cannot, they can't even pump water out of 4 it. 5 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: They don't have enough б pressure? 7 MR. STONE: Nope. 8 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Mr. Stone anything else 9 that you want to add? 10 MR. STONE: That's it. 11 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Thank you, sir. Mr. Davis, thank you. Anything from Counsel? 12 MR. RITCHIE: No, thank you. 13 MS. BAKER: No questions, thank you. 14 JUDGE PRIDGIN: I don't have any 15 16 questions. Mr. Stone, thank you for your testimony and 17 your time. Mr. Ochoa. MR. OCHOA: Linda Lindberg. 18 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Raise your right hand to be 19 20 sworn, please. Do you swear the evidence that you are 21 about is the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the 22 truth, so help you God? 23 MS. LINDBERG: I do. 24 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Thank you, ma'am. If you would, please state your name and spell it for the court 25

1 reporter. 2 MS. LINDBERG: Linda, L-i-n-d-a, Lindberg, 3 L-i-n-d-b-e-r-g. 4 JUDGE PRIDGIN: And are you a customer of 5 Stockton Hills Water Company. 6 MS. LINDBERG: Yes, I am. 7 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Do you have a statement for 8 the Commission, ma'am? MS. LINDBERG: Yes, I do. I read on the 9 paper here that you wanted to hear us tell you, in our 10 11 words, whether we had concerns about quality of service or problems or how the rate increase would affect our 12 13 family. I'm going to publicly say that I am more than willing to pay for my water if it is safe and reliable. 14 And the only thing that I have to go on that tells me that 15 16 that is not the case and leads me to worry about what's 17 going to happen in the future, is based on what's happened 18 in the past. And if you read the DNR engineer's report, and I know nobody from the DNR is here and that's all 19 20 right, but there is a report and they did a sanitary 21 survey with results and there are a multitude of 22 recommendations made for the Stockton Hills Water Company in terms of water safety, water quality, water 23 24 reliability. And my only concern is that we want to make 25 sure that our water supply is safe and reliable.

JUDGE PRIDGIN: Ms. Lindberg, thank you 1 2 very much. Mr. Davis? COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Ma'am, do you know 3 4 approximately when this DNR Engineer's report, this 5 sanitary survey was? 6 MS. LINDBERG: It was done last fall. 7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Fall of 2009? 8 MS. LINDBERG: Right. 9 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: And --10 MS. LINDBERG: It was a engineer's, a DNR 11 Engineer's report, or it was an DNR sanitary survey with a previous engineer's report attached to it and I believe 12 13 that engineer's report was done in January, maybe January 2009. 14 15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Do you remember the 16 name of the DNR employees who might have worked on that 17 report by chance? MS. LINDBERG: If I had been known I was 18 19 going to be asked I would have brought a complete copy of 20 the report which I have at home. I'd be more the happy to 21 send those to you, but I'm sure that you would have access 22 to that. 23 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Right. 24 MS. LINDBERG: Yvonne, the engineer from Springfield, the Springfield DNR office of DNR, was 25

Yvonne, somebody. 1 2 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. 3 MS. LINDBERG: She did the sanitary survey. 4 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: And ma'am, I'm just 5 going to ask you one more question, that is, what is your б mental impression of the findings of the sanitary survey 7 engineer's report mean? 8 Ms. LINDBERG: You mean mental? 9 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yeah, what's your 10 impression? I can't ask you what was in the document, 11 that would be hearsay so I have to ask you what your 12 mental impression. 13 MS. LINDBERG: It makes me worry because even they were recommendations, they were not mandatory 14 they were recommendations, they made me feel like my water 15 16 supply was not clean and reliable and unfortunately then, 17 that's why I don't support the rate increase. COMMISSIONER DAVIS: And can you give me an 18 example of the recommendation that made you feel unsafe? 19 20 MS. LINDBERG: The system need to the 21 chlorinated. 22 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay? 23 MS. LINDBERG: The standpipe needed to be 24 cleaned. 25 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: That's okay.

1 MS. LINDBERG: It was so long ago I saw it. 2 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Anything else, ma'am? 3 MS. LINDBERG: No, thank you. 4 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Mr. Davis, any further 5 questions? б COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No. 7 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Counsel? 8 MR. RITCHIE: No questions. 9 MS. BAKER: No questions but thank you for 10 your comments. 11 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Ms. Lindberg, thank you very much for your testimony and time and if that report 12 13 is something that you would like the Staff of Public Counsel to see, you can certainly speak to the them after 14 the hearing and see how they can get that information. 15 16 Thank you. 17 MR. OCHOA: The last name on the sign up --COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Would it be possible 18 for staff to file a copy of that with commission? Okay, 19 20 but I need to make sure that's it's in the record so that 21 we legitimately have ways to see it and so that everybody 22 has access to it. Thank you, I'm sorry, Judge. 23 JUDGE PRIDGIN: That's fine. 24 MR. OCHOA: The last name on the sign up 25 sheet is Ed Lindberg.

JUDGE PRIDGIN: Thank you, sir. Could you 1 2 raise your right hand and be sworn please. Do you swear 3 that the evidence that you are about to give is the truth, 4 the whole truth and nothing but the truth, so help you 5 God? 6 MR. LINDBERG: I do. 7 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Thank you, sir. Could you 8 please state your name --9 MR. LINDBERG: My name is --JUDGE PRIDGIN: I'm sorry, could you state 10 your name --11 MR. LINDBERG: Edward, E-d-w-a-r-d, 12 Lindberg, L-i-n-d-b-e-r-g. 13 14 JUDGE PRIDGIN: And are you a customer of Stockton Hills Water Company? 15 16 MR. LINDBERG: Yes, sir. 17 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Statement for the Commission? 18 MR. LINDBERG: Yes. My biggest concern is 19 20 the fact that what was in the report, that mentioned 21 they're losing 30 percent of what their pumping. And if she was selling 30 percent more of the water, she wouldn't 22 need the rate increase near as big as what she's asking 23 24 for. And that 30 percent is coming from someplace and it's been said before, there's been no two little 25

maintenance done over time. Even when they came to change 1 2 my meter, I had no idea they were changing my meter. It 3 only a fluke that I saw them changing the meter, otherwise 4 I never would have known it was changed. That means they 5 opened my pipe, took out the meter, if they're losing 30 6 percent, who's to say what's going into that line where 7 these leaks are. Every time we have a leak we have a 8 problem with water quality. You have 30 percent of water 9 leaking somewhere. So that means that there is a chance that something is going into the water and I don't trust 10 the way it's tested. And 30 percent is a lot of waste. 11 That's all I have to say. 12 13 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Mr. Lindberg, thank you. Mr. Davis do you have any questions? 14 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: So Mr. Lindberg are 15 16 you saying that not only yourself but other people like 17 yourself had problems when the company replaced the meters 18 that they had --MR. LINDBERG: They didn't know what was 19 20 going on. 21 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: So, nobody knew what 22 was going on --23 MR. LINDBERG: No, sir. Nobody came to the 24 door, nobody knocked and said we're replacing the water --25 they replaced the water meter and then they were gone.

COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. And to the best 1 2 of your knowledge, did people have sanitary or water 3 quality problems associated with the change in meter? 4 MR. LINDBERG: I have no idea. 5 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: You have no idea? 6 MR. LINDBERG: All I know is that if 7 somebody is messing with my system, I want to know about 8 it. 9 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: And so, it's your impression that this DNR's engineer's report shows that 10 they're losing approximately 30 percent of their water? 11 12 MR. LINDBERG: It was like 33 percent. 13 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: That they're probably, they're just line losses? Okay. Thank you, sir. 14 15 MR. LINDBERG: You're welcome. JUDGE PRIDGIN: Mr. Davis, thank you? 16 17 Counsel, anything? MR. RITCHIE: No questions, thank you. 18 MS. BAKER: No questions but thank you. 19 20 JUDGE PRIDGIN: I don't have any questions. 21 Mr. Lindberg, thank you for your time and your testimony. 22 Mr. Ochoa, thank you. I don't think there 23 he has any more names on the signup sheet. Is there 24 anyone else who wished to testify? All right. I'm seeing 25 no indication anyone wishes to testimony at this meeting.

We have the closing remarks, Commissioner Davis? 1 2 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I want to thank 3 everyone for coming out tonight and obviously I will go 4 back and report to my other four colleagues who couldn't 5 be here this evening. I promise you that I will take a 6 look at this DNR's engineer's report and the sanitary 7 survey and that we will take a look at all the issues that 8 you've raised this evening. Thank you. 9 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Commissioner Davis, thank you. Anything from Counsel? 10 11 MR. RITCHIE: No, thank you. 12 MS. BAKER: Thank you all for coming 13 tonight. JUDGE PRIDGIN: I will also echo them and 14 thank everyone for coming out and for participating in the 15 16 question and answer session and bringing your comments to 17 the commission. There being no further witnesses this will 18 conclude the local public hearing for case number 19 20 WR-2010-0202. Thank you very much, we're off the record. 21 (PROCEEDING CONCLUDED AT 6:36 P.M.) 22 23 24 25
