4	JUDGE HATCHER: If I could get everyone's
5	attention, please, we'll go ahead and get the hearing
6	started. Let's go on the record. Today is November
7	4th, 2019.
8	The Missouri Public Service Commission has
9	set this time for a local public hearing in Case Number
10	WR-2020-0053, and that also includes the sewer case of
11	SR-2020-0054.
12	That case is captioned as in the matter of
13	Confluence Rivers Utility Operating Company, Inc.,
14	Request For a Water Rate Increase. The Public Service
15	Commission has scheduled this local public hearing to
16	give members of the public a chance to comment about
17	Confluence River Utilities application.
18	The Missouri Public Service Commission
19	regulates the rates charged by public utility companies
20	in Missouri to ensure that those rates are just and
21	reasonable. The Commission also regulates the quality
22	of service and safety of the operations of public
23	utilities.
24	The Commission is made up of five
25	commissioners. The commissioners are appointed by the

1	Governor to fixed terms and confirmed by the Senate.
2	The commissioners employ a staff of engineers,
3	accountants, attorneys, financial analysts and other
4	specialists in the field of utility regulation.
5	My name is Charles Hatcher and I am the
6	regulatory law judge and will preside over this
7	hearing. With me today are Commissioner Scott Rupp and
8	Commissioner Maida Coleman.
9	This is an official hearing of the
10	Missouri Public Service Commission and the statements
11	and testimony of witnesses will be recorded by the
12	court reporter and must be given under oath.
13	All of the commissioners will have the
14	opportunity to read all of the witnesses' remarks.
15	And, additionally, I will brief the commissioners on
16	what was said here tonight. The commissioners do value
17	your input.
18	And I will begin by asking for any opening
19	remarks from the commissioners.
20	Commissioner Rupp?
21	COMMISSIONER RUPP: Welcome. Thank you
22	for coming. It's always good to see people coming out
23	to let us know their thoughts on the issue.
24	When you do step up and give us your
25	thoughts, we like to hear, you know, how is the company

operating and any thoughts and things that you have 1 2 about the pending case. The only thing that I do try to explain is 3 the commissioner and I, we cannot answer any questions. 4 5 We have to remain impartial for the -- for the entire 6 hearing, all the way until this culminates in a hearing 7 in Jefferson City with attorneys and cross-examination and witnesses and schedules, and things of that nature. 8 So if you do have questions, unfortunately, we cannot respond. That's why we had 10 the question and answer period beforehand and why we 11 had to stay outside the room, so that we wouldn't be 12 unduly influenced by any -- any information that is not 13 part of the official record. 14 15 But just thank you very much for coming and we look forward to hearing what you have to say. 16 COMMISSIONER COLEMAN: I would second 17 Thank you for your participation. 18 that. It's very 19 important that we hear your concerns and your remarks. 20 So thank you for taking the time tonight. 2.1 JUDGE HATCHER: I will go ahead and start the hearing by asking counsel to enter their 22 appearances for the record, Confluence Rivers Utility 23 24 Company. 25 Judge Hatcher, please let the MR. MITTEN:

1	record reflect the appearance of Russ Mitten on behalf
2	of Confluence Rivers Utility Operating Company. I

5	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you. And commission
6	or staff?

9	previously provided information to the court reporter.
10	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you. And Office of
11	the Public Counsel?
12	MS. SHEMWELL: Thank you and good evening.
13	Lera Shemwell representing the office of the Public
14	Counsel and the public. I've given my information to
15	the court reporter.
16	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you. The process
17	for tonight's hearing will be to call the names that
18	are listed on the sign-up sheet in the order that they
19	appear.
20	When I call your name, please come on down
21	to the podium. I will place you under oath, ask you to
22	state and spell your name, and then ask for your
23	comments to the commission.
24	Given the number of people that we do have
25	here today I would ask that we try and keep each

1	individual remarks limited to about five minutes so
2	that everyone gets a chance to speak tonight.
3	Again, I just want to reiterate what the
4	commissioners have said. None of us will be able to
5	answer questions. The commission is trying to keep its
6	impartiality in this case. So we are interested in
7	hearing all of your testimony tonight and we'll go
8	ahead and get started now with the public testimony.
9	The first name that I have is Jerome
10	Siess. And I do apologize for my mispronunciations
11	tonight.

25	about to give is the truth, the whole truth, and

1	nothing but the truth?
2	MS. HENDRIX: I do.
3	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, ma'am. Could
4	you please state and spell your name?
5	MS. HENDRIX: Claudette Hendrix,
6	H-E-N-D-R-I-X.
7	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you. And please
8	give us your testimony.
9	MS. HENDRIX: Okay. I want this is
10	kept confidential, this here. I went to the Social
11	Security office today and I'd like to know how they
12	expect
13	JUDGE HATCHER: Hold on, ma'am.
14	COMMISSIONER RUPP: She can't give any
15	if you want, can't be kept confidential because it's
16	being recorded. So if she gives any personal financial
17	information, she might want to
18	MS. SHEMWELL: This is a Social Security
19	paper, that she may want to enter into the record. Not
20	that her testimony is confidential, the paper.
21	JUDGE HATCHER: Please be careful. If you
22	mention any of your information, I can't make it
23	confidential if you say it out loud because the court
24	reporter is taking this all down. But Ms. Shemwell
25	indicated that you might want to introduce that as

1 evidence, or submit it as evidence. MS. HENDRIX: Yeah. I've got some evidence 2 3 here. 4 JUDGE HATCHER: Okay. I can make sure that that is marked confidential, to protect your 5 6 information. 7 MS. HENDRIX: Okay. 8 MS. SHEMWELL: Just not what you say. 9 JUDGE HATCHER: Yes. Please careful with what you say about that. 10 MS. HENDRIX: I've lived in Villa Ridge 11 around 37 years. I worked -- moved there in 1982 when 12 my son was born. It was in December, around December. 13 14 And that -- and that was when the Villa Ridge Estates 15 first started being built, before Bridgewater or any of 16 them and that was. And the other was used to be an old farm. 17 And with it like it was and that we were on aerators 18 19 and everything and that. And I got my cows through 20 USDA, through the federal government. 2.1 And I'm on low income disability and I am not able to make payments like that, like what they're 22 23 wanting to do and that when you're limited to a certain 24 amount. I'd like to know when a person that could even 25 make it on less than \$800 a month with the rates like

they are, or wanting to be. And I got proof right here 1 2 and that of it. I went today and got it from the Social Security office. And with it like it is and 3 everything, I've had that house now going on to be 4 5 about 37 years, next month. And I kept the upkeep. I've been paying 6 7 the taxes. And with me being on SSI and SSD, now, I 8 have to file every year and that to turn around and that get, like, income tax due, the amount back. 10 And I could get right to Franklin County, so I'd have -- have my taxes partly paid or paid off 11 until -- this year should be in that paid off, still in 12 13 that -- their ratings and the increase again. And if they keep raising the increase, 14 15 again, where is a person supposed to move to or go to? 16 I'm epileptic. I cannot walk -- go like a regular person can. I'm under a strict -- medication and 17 everything since the age of five because of being an 18 19 epileptic. 20 And with it like it is and everything, 2.1 just hearing that is not a bit reasonable. I'm on the public water and I don't have a bit of trouble with it 22 23 or anything and that. At least they're reasonable and 24 sociable. This hearing it, is getting way, way out of 25 hand, too high and that for even a person to even

survive. I can't even -- oh, by the time it's -- that's all taken out, I don't even have enough money in there for groceries.

Lucky enough, I raised my kid and he's on his own now. And he's turned around and that and he's got his own place. But with it like it is, I want to live there as long as I can and that. I bought that place and that, me and my ex-husband. And I bought his section out.

And I turned around and that, and that house that was built in 1982. And with it like it was and everything, it was -- it's brand new and that. I tried to keep it up and that, the best I could and that.

And while I was working at the bank, I was blessed by God and that. And he gave me a job at the church where I worked and went to, where I was able to take 50 percent of what I made and pay it back to the federal government.

And the other part and that, I turned around and that, and did improvements on the house where I got it insulated, and sided and new windows put in. But with it like it is now, I'm on disability and that, where I can't -- can't do anything. I'm just getting SSI and SSD.

1	And I don't think this is fair for the
2	ones that's elderly and that, and disabled and
3	handicapped and can't can't live a normal life.
4	And this is my confidential information
5	for you.
6	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you. I'll go ahead
7	and take that. Thank you, ma'am.
8	Ms. Shemwell, I'll get with you after the
9	hearing to discuss how to get this submitted.
10	Thank you, Ms. Hendrix. Were there any
11	questions?
12	COMMISSIONER COLEMAN: No.
13	COMMISSIONER RUPP: No.
14	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you.
15	Let's move on to Ronald Buhr, B-U-H-R.
16	MR. BUHR: The gentleman who was up at
17	first, who made the comments about Confluence bought it
18	the way it is and it's their problem. And I didn't
19	really have anything else to say.
20	JUDGE HATCHER: Okay. Thank you. So for
21	the record, Mr. Buhr, you're just wanting to echo
22	Mr. Siess'
23	MR. BUHR: Yes.
24	JUDGE HATCHER: comments?
25	MR. BUHR: Yes.

1	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you.
2	I didn't hear any testimony, so I don't
3	see any reason to swear in the witness. We'll move on
4	to Evelyn Smith.
5	MS. SMITH: No comment at this time.
6	JUDGE HATCHER: Okay. Thank you, Ms.
7	Smith.
8	Jerry Horton. Mr. Horton?
9	Please raise your right hand. Do you
10	solemnly swear or affirm that the testimony you are
11	about to give is the truth, the whole truth, and
12	nothing but the truth?
13	MR. HORTON: Yeah. I affirm.
14	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, sir. Would you
15	please state and spell your last name?
16	MR. HORTON: Jerry Horton. Jerry Horton,
17	H-O-R-T-O-N. And what else?
18	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you. That was it.
19	Please go ahead and tell us your testimony.
20	MR. HORTON: Yeah, I live at Bridgewater.
21	And I looked over my checks I had written back, at
22	least in 2002. Everything went along pretty good. It
23	was 41.73 for three months until 2012. So that was
24	\$13.91 a month for sewage. Okay. Since then, we've
25	jumped to 24.24.

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Now, you're wanting to go to \$72 a month, instead of 13.91. Okay. I figure that if this thing -- that's five times what we was doing. If we do it five times again the next six, seven years, which would be 2026, our monthly bill would be \$360 a month, the way I figure it. And I could be wrong figuring it out. had it all -- I've been looking at these numbers so much, I done got messed up. But I think that's right. Anyway, that -- if it does it again, just like it has since -- it started at 2012. That's where the problem was after that. And we -- and they claim -- well, I don't know how they can allow other houses being built if the thing is not taking care of the people that's already on it. We've got about 15 houses being built, I think, down in Bridgewater since the end of this summer. We've got them loaded down, some on the hill. How could Missouri allow more houses if it's not -- the thing is not doing the job? That's hard -- hard to And at 360 bucks a month in 2026, that would be a little hard for us. Anyway, I just wanted to make that -- I thought about it. You should be able to see that real I do want clean water, clean sewage and easy.

1	everything, you know. I know these companies ask for
2	it and they going to get it anyway. And that's all I
3	got to say.
4	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, Mr. Horton.
5	I want to take a quick second here while
6	Mr. Horton heads back to his seat. I'm going to move
7	this chair out of the way, so our witnesses can get
8	back to the podium a little bit better.

22	MR. MORCHE: George Morche, M-O-R-C-H-E.
23	I'm here in regards to the Evergreen Lakes' water.
24	Your Honor and Commissioners, I, first of
25	all, want to thank you for coming and being here

tonight to hear our testimony. I have a number of issues. One of the things I do want to say, first to the Commission, I appreciate the fact that the staff attempted to come up with a date. It was announced to the group here tonight, as far as the time period when comments will be taken.

I have a problem with that, however. My personal opinion is, Confluence should be required to send out another letter that is dated and from whenever that letter goes out, I feel that it should be 30 days after that date.

Otherwise, anyone out of these meetings that you're having, do not attend them, or, for that matter, any of the other 1,200-plus customers of Confluence. There's a chance they won't know that there's been an extension on the comment period, without a formal letter being sent out.

I also will be sending a paper to the Commission to be filed in -- in the official file with this concerning the rates. I went through and figured out the percentage of increase for all of these rates on here.

The -- the lowest rate -- the lowest percentage of increase is 59 percent. And it goes from there, up to over 1,100 percent increase.

1 A number of things bother me about this. 2 I agree with the comments that has been expressed already this evening. I don't know how a lot of 3 people, especially on fixed incomes, can handle these. 4 My other concern is from the comments that 5 6 were made during the question and answer session, from 7 the gentleman from Confluence River, he said there's about 1,200 customers. 8 9 My concern with giving these huge rate increases they're asking for is Evergreen Lakes, 10 there's a lot of lots that have not yet been built upon 11 12 or developed. 13 To fix these high rates now, with the idea 14 that the existing customers in Evergreen Lakes are 15 going to take care of this expense, just means that all of the new houses coming in, those rates -- those 16 17 customers are going to be paying these high rates. that's just going to be gravy into Confluence Rivers' 18 19 pockets. 20 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Amen. 2.1 MR. MORCHE: The other thing is, it was mentioned about from the -- from the staff that there 22 is a need for certified operators for these different 23 24 systems that Confluence will have to have. There --

nothing was said, as to whether these operators are in

25

place. Nothing was expressed as to whether these operators are going to be staff people, or whether they're contractors.

2.1

The Office of Public Counsel, and as I skimmed through the sheet they handed out, they made comment in what they handed out. I don't know what the validity of these things. I'm taking it for what they said.

But if they're third-party contractors, the Office of Public Counsel has already raised the question that in past contracts, some of these were not awarded by no bid.

I spent -- I just retired from 30 years in -- in public service, working in different governments. I've handled many bids. And -- and it really disturbs me whenever you're dealing with the public's money and there's not a due diligence on the part of making sure that low bidders are -- low and qualified bidders are found to take care of things.

It concerns me that when the -- when the Commission staff members said that the file -- and I'll be honest with you, I tried to look it up. And what little bit is in that file, I couldn't make heads or tails out of. But it concerns me with these issues, there's so many unanswered questions.

1	I would ask the Commission and the Public
2	Counsel to take their time with this, because I think
3	there's areas where there's a whole lot more
4	information that needs to be made known publicly,
5	before you can decide and before, even, we as
6	customers, can adequately express our concerns with
7	some of the things they're asking for.
8	That is all I have. Would you like a copy
9	of this paper that I'm going to submit?
10	JUDGE HATCHER: Yes, thank you.
11	MR. MORCHE: All it is, is add the column
12	to what Confluence River sent out. That percentage is
13	based on just the percentage of increase that they're
14	asking for.
15	JUDGE HATCHER: If you could stay there.
16	MR. MORCHE: Yes.
17	JUDGE HATCHER: Mr. Commissioner?
18	COMMISSIONER RUPP: I had a question. So
19	the Evergreen Lakes, you said a lot of the lots have
20	not yet been built upon?
21	MR. MORCHE: That is true.
22	COMMISSIONER RUPP: And average, ballpark,
23	how many homes are being built, a year, on the on
24	the lots? How how much growth is there, there?
25	MR. MORCHE: And I am going to leave this.

1	I think there's
2	UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: I think there's five.
3	MR. MORCHE: Right. There's only a few
4	being built each year. In the last two years, there's
5	been more. And I will leave this open if some of the
6	other Evergreen residents, there's many here, have a
7	more accurate number.
8	It's it's a small number. I really
9	don't know how many lots are in there. And I I feel
10	like Confluence needs to go in. And it was already
11	discussed, about they were trying to find out that the
12	the whole questions, as far as deed ownership and
13	this sort of a thing.
14	But without an actual number of potential
15	homes that can go in, I don't know that anybody can
16	say, you know, figure up an estimate of how many
17	potential customers there would be there.
18	COMMISSIONER RUPP: Okay. Thank you.
19	MR. MORCHE: Yes.
20	COMMISSIONER COLEMAN: Thank you, sir.
21	MR. MORCHE: Thank you for your time. I
22	appreciate it.
23	COMMISSIONER COLEMAN: Thank you.

Please raise your right hand. Do you 1 2 solemnly swear or affirm that the testimony you are about to give is the truth, the whole truth, and 3 nothing but the truth? 4 5 MR. WILSON: Yes. JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you. Please state 6 7 and spell your last name. 8 MR. WILSON: Mark Wilson. M-A-R-K. 9 W-I-L-S-O-N. 10 JUDGE HATCHER: Mr. Wilson, please give us 11 your testimony. 12 MR. WILSON: I'd like to start off saying, 13 I don't fault a company for making a profit. They're not into it just to give things away. However, a 14 15 200-plus percent increase is outrageous. There's no 16 excuse for it. In doing some other reading, and I believe 17 the gentleman has already spoke to it, to some degree, 18 19 the company hires third-party contractors to provide 20 service. So nowhere that I've been able to find, a 2.1 mention of how Confluence, themselves, are managing their prices from their third-party service providers. 22 23 That needs to be discussed, because, 24 obviously, they're going to pass it on to us. And then 25 if they're not looking at the lowest bid, then somebody

1 is making money somewhere. We -- never mind. Also. 2 there is no mentioning of any additional improvements needed and when that might come about. 3 And in reading one of the handouts and I'm 5 -- unfortunately, I didn't write down where it was at. According to the document, if the employees and 6 7 Confluence presidency, the CEO, make approximately 45 percent more than their counterparts, which are much 8 9 larger water and waste water providers, I believe that 10 needs to be looked at. And I realize the Commission can't look at 11 12 the CEO's pay, et cetera, and base their concerns on 13 But with that being said, to me, that leads to the 200-plus percent increase. And it -- we've got too 14 15 many people trying to pay for service areas that no one is going to get the benefit from. 16 17 So in other words, if Virginia Lake, according to Confluence, they made -- Confluence has 18 invested more than 78,000 in Lake Virginia and more 19 20 than 192 in Villa Ridge. 2.1 I wouldn't expect Lake Virginia had to pay for the 192,000 in Villa Ridge, or vice versa. It's --22 23 it doesn't make sense. But with that being said, I'll 24 -- I'll leave. 25 JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you.

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1	COMMISSIONER RUPP: What's your service
2	area?
3	MR. WILSON: Villa Ridge.
4	COMMISSIONER RUPP: Villa Ridge. Thank

1 JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, sir. Please 2 state and spell your last name. MR. CALZADA: It's Luis, L-U-I-S. 3 name is Calzada, C-A-L-Z-A-D-A. And I'm a member of 4 5 the Bridgewater Estates Subdivision. JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, Mr. Calzada. 6 7 Please go ahead. 8 MR. CALZADA: What brought me here was 9 when I received the Confluence Rivers' letter, it stated here that they had invested more than a million 10 dollars in improving, I guess my water and waste water 11 12 infrastructure in my community. 13 Now, I live in a fairly new community. 14 And so I was looking around, to see where could a 15 million dollars have been spent for improvements? water is provided by Franklin County District III, so 16 that excludes us there. 17 And I'm still going back to the minutes 18 19 that -- a couple years back in Union, Missouri, when a 20 group of us showed up to state our concerns about a new 2.1 development in Bridgewater Estates, which was on the -the far side of our levy. 22 23 That development was adding another, like, 24 a 55 and older community, at the time. And what was 25 brought up to the Committee was, can our sewer system,

1 you know, accept all the addition? We were assured 2 that there was no problems. This was just a couple of years back. And that our system was running under and 3 there would not be an issue. 4 So I was really puzzled when all of a 5 6 sudden, we're going to go from \$290 a year, to \$920. 7 mean, we are being nickel and dimed to death out of our community, really. I find myself, all the time, 8 9 looking for other areas. It's just -- it's very unfair 10 between the home assessments and now this. Under Confluence Rivers, on the breakdown, 11 12 it states here that 192,000 was spent in the Villa 13 Ridge sewer. Now, it doesn't state for how long a period time that 192,000 was. I know that prior to 14 15 them taking over, I was still paying a sewer bill to 16 someone, to Jeff City. 17 I was -- what's that? UNIDENTIFIED: Probably MPD. 18 19 MR. CALZADA: I just know that I've never 20 skipped a beat paying a sewer bill. So when they 2.1 acquired it, was there no monies at all in the kitty, when they it took over? 22 23 And, once again, you know what you're 24 buying. And you have to have some sort of a breakdown 25 and a period of time. It can't be over just a couple

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    of years. You know, it may be over ten years. And,
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    too, I could see gradually increasing, but, I mean, for
    over 200 percent increase, I just -- I don't find it
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    reasonable.
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                 And I don't -- I don't see the numbers
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    from them on the breakdowns on -- on what they've

24	I knew it was coming. We all knew it was coming.
25	But it looked ludicrous to me, to to expect a

1 400-plus percent increase in one fell swoop. Now, if 2 the company had come and said, okay, we're going to double -- double and half you, everybody needed 3 improvements out here. Okay, whatever. 4 But it looks like we're trying to take 5 care of the next fifteen years, like you say in one 6 7 fell swoop. And that's just not the way that works. If they did their due diligence prior, like the 8 gentleman admitted, that they said they did, they would 10 know that there's a lot of issues. There's a -- that the plans and the plats 11 and the meters and the blah, blah, it's all an 12 13 unseen factor. And so they got to write in, okay, we'll buy this for X amount and then tack on whatever, 14 15 25 percent, unseen factors. 16 Well, that's not how it works. You guys know far better than I do. It's your job. 17 responsibility. When -- when they buy ten shovels and 18 five backhoes, or whatever they do, they have to 19 20 account for it. They can't just say, well, we had 2.1 unseen factors. They have to prove that down the line, 22 correct? 23 So -- well, as Americans, we all want --24 we're proud of our country. We're proud of our 25 standard of living. We see pictures of India. Wе

don't want people drinking out of sanitation trucks and 1 2 all that ridiculous stuff. And I have no thoughts that this company would buy that and had planned it to run 3 4 anything into the ground. 5 I think their intention is to, as the State of Missouri says, make a reasonable return on a 6 7 profit, I believe is the wording. If -- it's not, 8 like, private industry, where, like, Ford Motor wants to buy brand X motor company, they got to do their 10 diligence and understand that the brand X's factories aren't up to date. 11 12 They're going to have put new machinery 13 and all that stuff in. And -- and so they end up having a \$30,000 -- a Buick costs \$120,000. Well, 14 15 people ain't going to buy \$120,000 automobile. 16 discretionary income. 17 Waters and sewers are not discretionary They're -- they're lifeblood to every home in 18 income. this district. And for them to come in and try to sell 19 20 us on these -- these increases -- you've heard 2.1 everybody. I'm not a business man. 22 I've been a 23 worker bee all my life. But I think I know how a lot 24 of the board rooms and lawyers that get in there and

might -- might react to things. Throw it on the wall

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and see if it sticks. And -- and it's your job, and I

    think you, gentlemen, Mr. Hatcher and Rupp and
    Ms. Coleman, it's your job to start an appeal on this

    stuff and really see what -- what does this company

5	with people that can't pay?
6	I guarantee what you're going to do
7	what they're going to do, you know? And this is
8	this is water and sewer. It's not a camper. It's not
9	an extra apple pie that you don't eat, you know? This
10	is stuff we got to have. So thank you.
11	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, Mr. Busby.

13	Mr. Busby.
14	JUDGE HATCHER: Okay. I said I would call
15	other witnesses. Are there any other witnesses?
16	You're just closest to the microphone, sir. I got you
17	next, and you, so we've got three, total?

19	JUDGE HATCHER: Four, thank you.
20	Ma'am, if let's do your oath first.
21	Please raise your right hand. Do you
22	solemnly swear or affirm that the testimony you are
23	about to give is the truth, the whole truth, and
24	nothing but the truth?
25	MS. MEESEY: Yes.

1 JUDGE HATCHER: Please state and spell 2 your last name. 3 MS. MEESEY: My name is Launa Meesey. Μy first name is L-A-U-N-A. My last name is M, as in 4 5 mouse, E-E-S, as in Sam, E-Y. I am from Calvey Brook 6 Estates. My family moved there approximately a year 7 and a half ago. Shortly after moving in, we were told that 8 9 the system was being sold to Confluence for the water 10 and sewer treatment, because of regulations changed by Missouri requiring an oversight committee, that our HOA 11 12 could no longer maintain the system because of 13 Missouri's laws. So, from my understanding of the HOA in 14 15 the previous ten, twelve years that the subdivision existed, they maintain the system. They billed the 16 17 customers. And the rates may have changed every couple of years by five, six dollars, to go up. 18 They did have some households that did not 19 20 pay their water and sewer, so they did incur expenses 2.1 because of that. But they did not push those expenses off on the other households that were paying. 2.2 23 My house, before I bought it, was one of 24 those nonpaying households. When my house was 25 purchased by me, part of the terms of the house was

that that old debt was paid off in closing. So the subdivision did, in the end, get their money from my household before I moved in. And they were also paid for the full year for our water and sewer before we ever moved in. And then that money had to be refunded to us whenever Confluence took over that September. We moved in, in January.

2.1

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Since we moved in, we've had several boil orders. The boil orders generally last for several weeks, three to four weeks. This affects people with pets. You have to go out and, you know, buy bottled water for your pet for the month. And I have cats and dogs, so that is an inconvenience.

People in my subdivision, I mean, it's little houses. It's little families, you know? I'm a family of three. My in-laws are getting ready to move into the subdivision. They're two senior citizens on fixed incomes.

There's other families, like us, in that subdivision. We are not a big subdivision, don't have big families. There's no big pools. There's no big sprinkler systems to put any tax on this system that's been in place for ten or twelve years.

And this letter from Confluence, it says that the building moratorium has been lifted for Calvey

Brooks. So Calvey Brooks was originally supposed to have three times the amount of households that are there. Three houses have been built in that subdivision since we moved in a year ago.

2.1

2.2

My in-laws are one of the people buying one of those households. There are two more roads, where ten more houses on each of those two roads could be built.

So that's going to give Confluence a lot of money, because the system is already there. You know, they don't have to run new pipes. They don't have run anything because that was all put in when the subdivision was originally put in and it was originally designed for that number of households. So I don't see how Confluence can say that they've put \$85,000 into our system.

Maybe it did need more maintenance than what the subdivision was doing, but the subdivision was regularly maintaining it and we were getting monthly or yearly statements from the subdivision saying what they had to put into our system.

They had one man, his name was John. He would come around and check the system, make sure that, you know, things weren't bad. We didn't understand how the system worked coming from a household where we had

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a well and a septic before. We didn't have the sewer system. So we didn't understand how the tank worked. Our tank started backing up into our house because it got clogged with hair. 4 Confluence didn't want to help us out. had to call our HOA. HOA sent John. John took care of The HOA didn't bill us for that. They wanted to take care of us. But Confluence sent people out and they said, oh, that's what you need to do. And then they walked away. I don't know how to pull off the lid and clean the vent thing that they wanted me to do. The HOA had taken care of it for all the people. And now the HOA has increased their rates, slightly to continue that maintenance for the other households in our subdivision. Our rates for the HOA didn't double because they're going to continue to maintain those holding tanks that Confluence refuses to maintain, that the HOA did maintain in the past. So our HOA is still taking on some of this burden and they're not doubling our rates like Confluence wants to do. And I can get the statements from the HOA of the past 12 years of how much it cost them to maintain that system and what our rates were and how they were fixed. And I do intend to submit

those at a later date.
Thank you.
JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, Ms. Meesey.
MS. MEESEY: Meesey. Uh-huh.
JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you.
COMMISSIONER COLEMAN: Thank you very
much.
JUDGE HATCHER: And that seemed to work
pretty well.

MR. WUNDERLICH: I do.
JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you. Please state
and spell your last name.
MR. WUNDERLICH: Joseph Wunderlich,
W-U-N-D-E-R-L-I-C-H.
JUDGE HATCHER: Go ahead.
MR. WUNDERLICH: I'm Villa Ridge
community. Ideally, with what's been sent out, you
know, in the price increases, is honestly ridiculous.
And the statement here that the Commission ensures the
public has access to safe, reliable and reasonably
priced utility service, on my paper, the reasonably

priced is highlighted because what they're attempting to do is not reasonable, at all.

2.1

As I said, you know, originally, the sewer in Villa Ridge, Bridgewater was \$16. There's was a 50-percent increase to 24. Now, they're asking for 216. I understand, when I was asking questions earlier, you guys weren't in here, that obviously bigger communities that have more people, the prices are going to be less.

However, the surrounding communities for water and sewer, they're paying between 30 and 50 bucks for both. I understand that, yeah, it's going to be a little more in a smaller community. Seventy-six dollars is almost what I pay for my electric. For sewer, it's absolutely ridiculous.

And one of the people were talking about how the system was already there. They didn't put in new sewer lines. They were already there. And the system that they bought, they inspected. They knew what they were getting. So to take over that system, they know what is involved. There's no reason for this kind of cost increase.

And then you look at the other people that are doing in the surrounding areas, PWSD number three that does our water, obviously, they have people that

1 operate these systems for them. And, yet, their costs 2 are nowhere even close to this. And I don't think 3 anybody has an issue with a cost increase. I'm not in a community that needs water. 5 We pay 50, \$60 a month for water because we got a couple of teenagers that spend, you know, quite a bit 6 7 of time in the shower. So we go through a lot of I -- I understand where that's at. 8 But I understand that, yeah, if you're only paying \$5 for water, that's -- that's going to 10 increase. And it -- that's extremely low. 11 12 But the sewer at \$24, I mean, they -- they 13 can increase it. Even if it went to \$32 and they had a 100-percent price increase from the original cost, that 14 15 would be easier to swallow. But swallowing \$76? 16 You know, they -- they said they'd been 17 put in 192,000. I don't know how many homes are in Villa Ridge. They couldn't tell me that when I was 18 asking questions, which I don't understand. 19 20 I would think that they would have these 2.1 numbers down pat. If they know that they're asking for these increases, I would think they would know how much 22 23 they're making off each community. 24 However, in Bridgewater, there's about 130 25 So on their increase, just in a year, that's homes.

So I'm assuming there's guite a few more 1 \$120,000. 2 homes that are a part of the Villa Ridge, not just our subdivision. The 192, they'd recoup in -- in a year. 3 Someone even said they don't mind a 4 5 company making a profit. I -- I understand you -- you got to make a profit. But this is ridiculous. And I 6 7 even asked the quy, and, once again, you guys weren't in here, if, okay, once they recoup their -- their 8 investment, which wouldn't take long at these prices, 10 is it going back down? As I said, all these other water and sewer 11 companies run -- I'm assuming there are similar 12 13 facilities. I've never actually seen one. But I'm assuming they're all based on the same type of thing. 14 15 So how can they do it for so much less? 16 And these guys, as I said, I -- I understand that we're smaller communities, we're going to pay a little more. 17 I don't expect to pay 30, 40 bucks for my 18 19 water and sewer. But I don't expect to pay over 100 20 bucks for water and sewer. To me, that's insane. 2.1 -- I think that definitely needs to be looked at. And the -- the worst thing is -- what would be nice is if 2.2 23 we had an option. Because I don't think anybody in 24 this room, if they had an option of sticking with 25 Confluence Rivers, would.

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You know, but we -- we don't have an option. We're -- we're, kind of, you know, excuse the term, screwed in this. And, you know, basically, it's up to you guys. I mean, if you guys actually went 4 along with this ridiculous price increase, what -- what do we do, other than suck it up and figure it out? And, unfortunately, some people are going to be out of their homes because they're not going to be able to pay it. And I know, like, if I didn't pay it, then they shut my water off. So I can't have that. I -- I got a daughter at home. So it's just mind numbing to me that they can actually ask for something so unreasonable. have to go through this whole process for something like that. I mean, I just -- like I said, and we don't have any options. As I said, we can't -- you know, like with our trash service, I got a bunch of people I can have come pick up my trash. Someone gets out of hand, we just switch it. We -- we can't do that here. And as I said, I bet anybody in these communities, I can't think of a single person that will see this price increase letter that is okay with it. And I even ask you, look at what your bills Not a one.

1	are, your sewer bills are. I asked him what his was.
2	
	I guarantee he pays about \$45 for sewer. It's MSD.
3	But this is not reasonable. And,
4	hopefully, the the biggest thing in this that you
5	guys are responsible for is providing reasonably priced
6	utility service.
7	And, hopefully, that you guys, you know,
8	take a look at this and realize how unreasonably priced
9	this is, because it's like I said, it's ridiculous.
10	And if I had an option, I would love not
11	to have to do anything with Confluence Rivers.
12	That's it.
13	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, Mr. Wunderlich.
14	COMMISSIONER COLEMAN: Thank you, sir.
15	JUDGE HATCHER: We have two thank you.
16	Come on up. And I think we have one more witness after
17	this.
18	Sir, if you would raise your right hand.

22	MR. TUCKER: Yes.
23	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you. Please state
24	and spell your last name.
25	MR. TUCKER: James Tucker, T-U-C-K-E-R.

1 JUDGE HATCHER: Mr. Tucker, please go 2 ahead. MR. TUCKER: I live at 621 Bridgewater in 3 4 Lakeview Terrace. I agree these rates are totally 5 astronomical. I think it was approximately three 6 months ago, I don't have the exact date, we got a 7 letter wanting us to pay, kind of, like, a warranty system for the sewer pipes that were going through our 8 9 property. And I -- you know, it just -- to me, it 10 just shows that they're trying to get funds any way 11 12 they can, you know? I mean, no, I didn't agree to it 13 and I will not agree to it. If it breaks on my property, I'll take care of it. But, hey, I'm not 14 15 going to just give money because they ask. But my -- my big complaint is, I don't 16 17 think it's fair to lump everybody into a flat rate. The other communities I was with, it was based on how 18 19 much water you use is what your -- your sewage fee 20 would go up or down, according to that. 2.1 And I believe that's the fair way to do There is some single people, and I'm married. 22 23 there is some single people on low income that doesn't 24 use much water. Therefore, they don't use the sewer 25 system near as much. And I don't think they should

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1	have to pay as much as us that use it more. I think
2	that that's only fair that it's broke down that way.
3	And that's that's my comment.
4	COMMISSIONER COLEMAN: Thank you, sir.
5	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, sir.
6	MR. TUCKER: Okay. Thank you.
7	JUDGE HATCHER: And we have one more
8	witness. And I'll just call again. Is anybody else
9	that has not signed up would like to testify?
10	Please raise your right hand, sir. Do you
11	solemnly swear or affirm that the testimony you are
12	about to give is the truth, the whole truth, and
13	nothing but the truth?
14	MR. PAXTON: Yes.
15	JUDGE HATCHER: And please state and spell
16	your last name.
17	MR. PAXTON: Christopher Paxton,
18	P-A-X-T-O-N.
19	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you. Please go
20	ahead.
21	MR. PAXTON: A lot of the comments have
22	already been said by the last couple of people, but the
23	letter we got stated that they've invested a million
24	dollars. And this was less than ten days ago.
25	Tonight, all of a sudden, it's 2.7 million.

So they don't even know how much they've spent and can't even relay that, with precision. But even if the 2.7 million, they're wanting an increase of almost 900,000 a year. And they didn't -- according to him earlier tonight, they didn't even have to borrow any of that 2.7 million. They've had that in cash flow, from either them or their parent company.

2.1

So based on what we've already been paying, they can afford this 2.7 million. And now they're wanting to make even more than that in less than a three-year return. And I'm a small business owner, I would love a three-year return. It just doesn't happen, you know?

So to give them that kind of an increase is just unheard of. There's nothing -- there's no market out there today, even in a great economy, making a three-year return. It's unjustifiable.

You know, but then to sit there and spread out that costs over different communities and different regions, they're not looking at the wages from other areas in O'Fallon and St. Charles, where people are making more than the retired folks in Villa Ridge.

They have everybody paying the same. It doesn't work.

Socialism doesn't work, you know? ObamaCare has proven that. To have everybody paying the same thing, it

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can't happen, you know, if it's not -- not good.
