To Whom It May Concern:

I wish to register my opposition to granting MGE a 44% rate increase. This situation was completely avoidable had MGE taken the opportunity last summer to lock in lower prices through appropriate hedging techniques. It is unreasonable to expect the general population of residential ratepayers to bear this type of rate increase. As a public utility and holder of the exclusive franchise to serve natural gas in this area, they have a duty to make sure prices do not spike as they are about to. Actually, they already have had a 27% rate increase in November, 2000, which far outpaces the inflation rate, the Consumer Price Index and any other indication of economic growth.

MGE chose to shift risk from their stockholders to their ratepayers. I believe that it is the job of the Missouri Public Service Commission to prevent these types of abuses. I implore you to not allow this disastrous rate increase which could cause irreparable damage to many, many ratepayers in MGE's service territory.


## MISSOURI GAS ENERGY INCREASE IS UNACCEPTABLE

As you are aware, Missouri Gas Energy (MGE) filed for a 44%increase in gas prices with the Missouri Public Service Commission (MPSC) last week. In November, the utility also received a 27% rate increase.

MGE has a responsibility to serve the natural gas requirements of its customers. Another is to manage costs through an appropriate gas supply/hedging program. Last summer, MGE had an opportunity to kick in or hedge natural gas prices in the \$4 range but did not do so because the MPSC would not pre-approve the expenditure (it is standard policy not to pre-approve expenditures on natural gas, but rather, to review past purchases for lack of prudence).

If this increase is approved, many ratepayers will go bankrupt, go hungry, or go cold. MGE should take responsibility for price risks.

To voice your opposition to this breach of the public trust, contact your City Council representative or write to the Missouri Public Service Commission, P.O. Box 360, Jefferson City, MO,65102. Refer to case GR2001-382. EVERY letter the Commission receives will become part of the public record of this case and will have to be considered. Do not wait - let your voice be heard. Ask a friend or neighbor to write a letter too. If the MPSC does not hear from ratepayers, they will assume the public will tolerate the increase.



# Citizens group should help lead reform of City Hall

ansas City taxpayers may have some worthy allies in the ongoing attempt to reduce costs and improve efficiency at City Hall. No. we're not talking about the consultants who hope to get at least \$2.5 million in fees to help propose some kind of re-engineering scheme for the city.

And there is no proof that enough of the city's department directors are getting serious about the latest attempt to streamline the government. But a citizens oversight committee, appointed last year by Mayor Kay Barnes, appears ready, willing and well-educated to take on its role in the process.

Simply put, it's this: Evaluate the plans that the consultant and city staff are expected to bring forward this year to improve the efficiency of six city functions, such as supplying water and maintaining streets.

If the ideas merit implementation, the citizens group should publicly embrace them and forward their suggestions to Barnes and the City Council for eventual approval. If the ideas are ill-formed, too bureaucratic or too costly, the citizens panel should reject them and demand improved plans.

On Wednesday, Barnes told the citizens committee that she expected the members to ask tough questions of the city staff. She told them not to worry about the political implications of any changes they eventually recommend.

"I believe this council will be receptive," Barnes said. I would endourage you to push forward as if everythings on the table."

That's an open invitation for the staff, consultants and citizens panel to investigate everything that could impede efficiency at City Hall. Can labor union work rules be changed and, if so, how? Should the residency requirement for most employees be loosened? Should women and minority hiring practices be eased? Should rules on how the city purchases goods—and from whom—be altered?

Several members of the citizens oversight committee bluntly told Barnes that the departmental directors were not yet being forthcoming or bold enough with proposed plans to improve their agencies. "They bite their tongues when they show up," said committee co-chairman Greg Baker.

Other members said they were surprised at how disconnected the departments seem to be and how poorly agency leaders communicate with each other on common problems and needs.

City Manager Bob Collins said he was trying to get two messages across to employees. First, Kansas Citians expect a change in attitude and performance at City Hall. Second, the operation of local government is going to change. Collins acknowledged it's going to be difficult to change behaviors that have been inculcated at 12th and Oak for decades.

That's exactly why the work of the citizens oversight panel is so important. This outside body needs to force change at City Hall. If the panel can keep its eyes focused on cutting costs and improving efficiency, it could generate real reform in city government.

While fully acknowledging my own naivete, I wonder if FBI agent Michael Tabman's comment that full jails show that the war on drugs is being won ("FBI agent leads efforts against drugs, violence," 1/9, B-8) isn't a bit ridiculous.

In 1998, according to the Nov. 13, 2000, Newsweek, 21 percent of the approximately 2 million Americans locked up in jails or prisons were incarcerated for drug crimes (up from 6 percent in 1980). So, presumably, in this war we're holding about 420,000 "enemies" captive.

Again acknowledging my own naivete, I simply must ask, how many more prisoners of war might be taken before the fighting ceases?

# Flaw drives Sas prices up

Missouri utilities need more incentives to make good choices

ome would say that calling for the dismissal of the three Missouri Public Service Commissioners that voted for the latest Missouri Gas Energy rate increase is overreacting.

But two Kansas City lawmakers are calling for just that, even though it is highly unlikely that they can muster the two-thirds vote of the General Assembly needed to boot the commissioners.

It's hard not to overreact.

MGE won a 44 percent increase
last week. That increase comes
on top of a 65 percent raise
awarded in November. Since
January 2000, the gas company's
rates have climbed from 41
cents per 100 cubic feet used to
98 cents per 100 cubic feet used.

If the more than 100 percent increase in the rate wasn't enough, a frigid December added a painful spike to the gasheating costs. And there is talk that another adjustment will be needed. It is enough to get plenty of people to react.

The Public Service Commission will conduct a special audit to determine whether MGE made prudent decisions when buying natural gas for its customers. The state attorney general has been asked to investigate whether MGE suppliers were gouging Missouri customers.

Even the Office of Public Counsel, which represents the

interest of utility customers, is willing to take part in a task force to study the problem. But a spokeswoman for the office warned *The Kansas City Star* that past reviews too often ended with reports collecting dust on some bureaucrat's shelf.

Investigations, audits and studies may not be needed. A basic flaw in the regulation of MGE is easy to spot. The PSC regulates MGE. It doesn't regulate MGE's wholesalers. MGE can simply pass that cost on automatically.

Here's the rub: MGE could have "hedged" against spiking gas prices by buying financial options early in order to protect the company and its customers from a season-peak spike in wholesale prices.

But when the PSC refused to promise that MGE would be able to recover any cost that might come from the hedging arrangement, MGE decided to drop that plan. Why not? The gas company knew that it would be able to pass on the wholesale price to customers.

If it turned out to be a bad decision, in other words, the customers would pay for the bad decision. The company wins either way.

Lawmakers need to find a way to inject an incentive for the utilities to get the best buy for their companies. Also, it might not hurt for the utility to bear at least part of the cost of making a bad business decision.

Who's minding the store?

It is interesting to note that just a day or two after Missouri Gas Energy raised its gas prices 44 percent for Missouri customers, customers of ansas Gas got a 22 percent ate reduction. That company made some executive decisions that were correct and did some hedging and can pass the sav-

hedging and can pass the savings on to the customer. Customers of Missouri Gas are being penalized for poor executive decisions when they bypassed the opportunity for hedging last fall.

## In the same boat

Well, the gas is going to go up another 44 percent on top of what we already can't afford. And I'd just like to say everyone is worried about the low-income reople and people on Social

won't go up. Well, do they think that every time the prices go up that my boss turns around to give me a raise to compare to that? Plus, I have to get out of bed every morning and drive my car that's eating up this high-priced gasoline to work every morning.

A public disservice?

I wonder if we ought to be calling the Public Service Commission the Public Disservice Commission. I don't really see what their function is if they're always for the utilities. I just don't understand that.



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



Dear Mr. Roberts:

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The Local Investment Commission (LINC) writes to express its sincere hope that the Missouri Public Service Commission will grant a variance for Missouri Gas Energy so that \$1.3 million in utility refunds can be distributed to low-income and needy ratepayers through the Mid-America Assistance Coalition.

The impact of rising energy costs is a much-discussed public topic. What may not be less appreciated is its impact on low-income families, particularly those who are moving from welfare-to-work, those of fixed incomes and the "working poor". These are individuals and families that LINC – the state's community partner – works with daily through its involvement in welfare-to-work, child welfare, children's health insurance and working with 60 schools located primarily in low-income neighborhoods in Jackson County.

We believe that is a difference between equity and fairness. Reducing the Purchased Gas Adjustment marginally for MGE customers clearly is equitable, but it will make little financial difference to those who receive the refund given the modest amount. We believe it is better to provide the refund to those with the greatest need for whom a larger refund can literally keep them in house and home, kept them from financial insolvency, make it unnecessary to borrow or use "fringe banking" institutions or resort to other means to secure funds to pay for unexpected and unbudgeted utility costs.

We urge Missouri Public Service Commission to take into account the interest of the public most in need and grant the MGE application for variance as requested.

LINC normally does not involve itself with matters before the Missouri Public Service Commission, but the real impact of rising utilities costs on low-income children and families cannot pass without comment when there is a real opportunity to alleviate the great burden on their lives of so many who are living on the edge in communities of great need.





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
