2	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Good evening	
3	everyone. Let's go ahead and get started.	
4	I'd like to introduce myself. My name is	
5	Morris Woodruff. I'm the Chief Regulatory Law	
6	Judge for the Public Service Commission, and I'll	
7	be the presiding officer today.	
8	To my right is commissioner Bill Kenney.	
9	He's one of the five commissioners on the Public	
10	Service Commission.	
11	Mr. Kenney, any opening remarks?	
12	MR. KENNEY: First off, I'd just	
13	like to welcome our guests here and customers of	
14	Raytown Water. The process is a lengthy one. We	
15	are here right now to hear from you.	
16	I represent the commission. There are	
17	four commissioners. And the big thing is our	
18	court reporter is taking everything down, and	
19	they will be able to read the testimony that you	
20	put forth today.	
21	So thank you very much for coming here	
22	tonight.	
23	JUDGE WOODRUFF: The procedure	
24	we're going to follow tonight is we have a sign-up	
25	sheet out there, and we've got two witnesses	

Page 3 1 signed up. 2 I'll call you in the order that you signed 3 I'll ask you to come to the podium here. 4 I'll swear you in to tell the truth. And then you can make your statement for the commission, 5 6 whatever you want to say. But before we do that, we need to 7 8 determine which attorneys are here. So I'll take 9 entries of appearance beginning with the staff. 10 MR. WESTEN: Jacob Westen, staff counsel for the PCS, P.O. Box 360 in Jefferson 11 City, Missouri, zip code 65102. 12 JUDGE WOODRUFF: For the record, 13 the Office of Public Counsel? 14 MS. BAKER: Christina Baker, P.O. 15 16 Box 2230, Jefferson City, Missouri, 65102, 17 appearing on behalf of the Office of Public 18 Counsel and the customers. 19 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you. And 20 does the company have an attorney here? I don't 21 believe so. All right. If you want to introduce 22 vourself. 23 MR. CLEVENGER: Mel Clevenger, company manager and president. 24 25 JUDGE WOODRUFF: I believe that's

1	all the attorneys here, so we'll go ahead and ask	
2	the first witness to come forward.	
3	Mr. Crawford, if you please raise your	
4	right hand.	
5	SCOTT CRAWFORD,	
6	of lawful age, sworn and examined, testified as	
7	follows:	
8	MR. CRAWFORD: I'm kind of	
9	concerned because, you know, I only have so much	
10	money, and I seem to have more bills than I have	
11	money, and it keeps, you know, and so any increase	
12	has to be compensated for by a decrease somewhere	
13	else.	
14	I've already cut my food budget from \$93	
15	every four weeks to \$45. I can't afford to cut	
16	it any further than that. In fact, I'm probably	
17	going to have to increase a little bit. I don't	
18	know where that money is going to come from.	
19	So any water going up, electric going up,	
20	you know, it's got to come from somewhere, and I	
21	don't have it. So I'm really kind of between a	
22	rock and a hard place if this goes through.	
23	I understand they need money, but so do I.	
24	That's all I have.	
25	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Just a moment.	

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1	Mr. Kenney, do you have any questions?	
2	COMMISSIONER KENNEY: No. Thank	
3	you, Mr. Crawford.	
4	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Any of the	
5	attorneys have any questions for Mr. Crawford?	
6	MS. BAKER: No, but thank you for	
7	coming.	
8	MR. WESTEN: Thank you for coming.	
9	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Any problems with	
10	the service you've been receiving?	
11	MR. CRAWFORD: No. I receive good	
12	service. Bills seem to be, you know, awfully	
13	close to when I receive them, but from what	
14	they've said, you know, 21 days in advance of when	
15	they're due, so it's just that I do wish that they	
16	would allow electronic funds transfer. That would	
17	help quite a bit in paying them.	
18	JUDGE WOODRUFF: So you don't have	
19	to write a check you mean?	
20	MR. CRAWFORD: The thing of it is	
21	I go to my bank's online bill payment system, and	
22	electronic transfer is possible. In fact, it so	
23	happens that I bank at the same bank that the	
24	water company banks at.	
25	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Okay.

1	MR. CRAWFORD: So it wouldn't even	
2	require much just to electronic transfer in their	
3	computer. Instead, it has to be a paper check,	
4	which really slows things down.	
5	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Okay.	
6	MR. CRAWFORD: It would be nice to	
7	be able to pay the have the bank pay them	
8	electronically. That would help a lot.	
9	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Anything else you	
10	want to tell us?	
11	MR. CRAWFORD: That's all I can	
12	think of.	
13	JUDGE WOODRUFF: Thank you very	
14	much for coming tonight. Next name on the list is	
15	Don Belk.	
16	DON BELK,	
17	of lawful age, sworn and examined, testified as	
18	follows:	
19	JUDGE WOODRUFF: What would like	
20	to tell us?	
21	MR. BELK: I just want to say to	
22	begin with I'm not upset with the Raytown Water	
23	Company, the quality of water. I think we're	
24	lucky that we have the quality that we do. I go	
25	up through Liberty, Missouri. I'm not able to	

Page 7 drink the water or make a cup of tea, it's so 2 horrible. So I have no concern about that or the 3 times down service that we have when we're out of water. There has to be a break someplace or some 4 kind of major catastrophes. 5 6 Now, the last time we had a meeting here, 7 it was how long ago? Could somebody help me out? 8 I go through these senile moments. 9 JUDGE WOODRUFF: We were talking 10 about that earlier. I believe it was 2012. MR. BELK: Okay, 2012. And when 11 12 they talked about the return on investment for the water company, it was 12 and-a-half percent. I 13 don't know what the heck it is now. But I 14 personally think that's a little excessive because 15 16 my return on investment is .0003, so I think 17 there's a discrepancy there. 18 And the other thing that bothers me is the 19 wastewater that I see. You know, I live over off of 51st Street, and I've called the Public 20 21 Service Commission. We have the water tower is 22 at the top of the hill. They have a line that 23 comes down to a hydrant. I cannot get any municipality to tell me 24

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who owns that, who has responsibility for that

Page 8 1 fire hydrant. I don't even know if the son of a 2 gun, you know, if it works. So if my house 3 catches on fire, you know, I'm not going to sue 4 the insurance company; I'm going to sue whoever owns that hydrant, because I don't even know if 5 6 there's any water in it. 7 But there's been a leak there for years 8 and years and years. And again, I might be, you 9 know, feeling bad towards the Raytown Water 10 Company because it might not even be their hydrant, but Independence doesn't claim it. They 11 say it doesn't belong to Raytown Water. Now 12 13 they're telling me it belongs to Kansas City. 14 And when I talked to your people down in Jeff City, they said that they would refer the 15 16 information to Kansas City, but they said don't 17 expect any help or don't expect, you know, 18 anybody to get back with you quickly. 19 And I guess the older I get, the more 20 times I say I don't understand things because 21 there ought to be a grid map someplace they could 22 go in and find every electrical wire buried, 23 every sewer system, every waterline and everything else and in two seconds tell you who 24 25 owns that.

Page 9 I checked this morning. They don't even 1 2 have -- the cap hasn't been on it for years. 3 cap wasn't on it this morning, but it's not 4 So I don't know. That might tell me 5 that they got the line shut off. And these 6 things bother me. 7 And during when they have a break, and 8 again, I don't know where the water leak comes 9 from, but if we have so much water coming down 10 51st Street and during the winter months you 11 can't even get up and down that hill. And when I talked to Independence, they're the ones that's 12 13 supposed to do the salting and things like that. 14 They say they don't have any trouble. But in the years that we've lived there, 15 16 I've had at least five trucks or five vehicles 17 come down, cannot stop, run through the stop --18 when I say run through the stop sign, I'm saying 19 run over the stop sign and end up in the ditch. 20 But the water's coming from someplace, and 21 it's, to me it's being wasted. Now, if they're 22 flushing out, I can understand it if they're 23 flushing out their line. That makes sense. They do that. But for just running down the hill, 24 25 running across the street, running in my ditch

- 1 and heading on down the highway, I do not
- 2 understand this. Okay?
- 3 And again, here I'm back to my old senile
- 4 ways. I just don't understand things the older I
- 5 get. But that's my complaint. I'd like to know,
- or not complaint, concern, yes. But, you know,
- 7 the return on investment.
- 8 You know, it's almost like kids up there
- 9 that are, you know, making trouble on Wall
- 10 Street. You know, the ones at the top and the
- 11 ones at the bottom.
- Now, I can pay this increase, but there's
- 13 a lot of people in Raytown or even in
- 14 Independence, you know, that has this water.
- 15 They might have to determine if they're going to
- 16 eat or pay their water bill. And I think we need
- to, you know, take a look at them, too.
- But that's my two complaints, so waste of
- 19 the water, and I still would like to know who
- 20 owns that waterline that comes from the top of
- 21 51st Street and goes down past Fuller. And
- 22 nobody seems to know.
- And, you know, you call the city halls,
- and it's like talking to an empty suit, you know.
- 25 Here's what you can do. And I'm saying, hey,

Page 11 1 you're my representative. You know, you're 2 supposed to take care of me if I come to you and 3 ask a question and, you know, it's a waste, a 4 waste of -- I don't know if it's a waste of time, 5 but it gives you a chance to get upset again. 6 But, I mean, nothing ever gets done. So 7 I'd like -- I'd like to know who owns that and 8 what they're going to do, who in the heck I can 9 call the next time, you know, that street during 10 the winter months, you know, I have to put on my ice skates and my chains just to get up to Blue 11 12 Ridge Boulevard. 13 JUDGE WOODRUFF: All right. 14 MR. KENNEY: Sir, I will tell you this. If you decide that you want to have a poor 15 16 day, call the Kansas City Water Department. 17 MR. BELK: You might have been the

the same thing he told me.

21 Kansas City water service. It's an interesting

guy I talked to down in Jeff City, because that's

- in Jeff City. And I don't remember who. I don't
- have my notes with me, so I'm not sure who I
- 17 talked to.
- 18 COMMISSIONER KENNEY: Thank you.
- 19 JUDGE WOODRUFF: Any parties have
- any questions?
- MS. BAKER: No. Thank you for
- 22 coming tonight.
- JUDGE WOODRUFF: Those are the
- only two names on the list, and I don't see anyone
- 25 else in the room. But if there is anyone else

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1	that wishes to testify, let me know.	
2	All right. At this point, then, we are	
3	adjourned. Thank you for coming.
