1 The following proceedings began at 9:03 a.m.:

2 JUDGE DIPPELL: Let's go ahead then and go on
3 the record. This is Case No. EA-2023-0017, In the
4 Matter of the Application of Grain Belt Express, LLC for
5 an Amendment to its Certificate of Convenience and
6 Necessity Authorizing it to Construct, Own, Operate,
7 Control, Manage, and Maintain a High Voltage, Direct
8 Current Transmission Line and Associated Converter
9 Station.

10 My name is Nancy Dippell. I'm the Regulatory
11 Law Judge assigned to this matter. We've come here
12 today for a procedural conference to just see where we
13 are, the status of the case, and allow the parties to
14 discuss a procedural schedule going forward.

15 I'm going to begin by having the parties make
16 their entries of appearance, and so I will begin with
17 Grain Belt Express?

18 MR. CARO: May it please the Commission. This
19 is Frank Caro. On behalf of Grain Belt Express LLC, the
20 applicant, I'm here with Andrew Schulte and Anne
21 Callenbach with the Polsinelli law firm. Also I believe
22 on the line from -- on the call is Nicole Luckey who is
23 Vice President of Regulatory Affairs with Grain Belt.

24 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. The Public Service
25 Commission Staff?

1 MR. THOMPSON: Thank you, Judge. Kevin
2 Thompson for the Staff of the Missouri Public Service
3 Commission, Post Office Box 360, Jefferson City,
4 Missouri 65102. On the line are numerous other staff
5 members.

6 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. The Office of the
7 Public Counsel?

8 MR. WILLIAMS: Nathan Williams, Chief Deputy
9 Public Counsel appearing on behalf of the Office of the
10 Public Counsel and the public, PO Box 2230, Jefferson
11 City, Missouri 65102.

12 JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. Then I'm just going to
13 start down with the intervenors as they're kind of here
14 on my service list. I think they're alphabetical. So
15 Associated Industries of Missouri?

16 MR. ELLINGER: Good morning, Judge. Marc
17 Ellinger, Ellinger & Associates, on behalf of Associated
18 Industries of Missouri.

19 JUDGE DIPPELL: Clean Grid Alliance?

20 MR. BRADY: Good morning. My name is Sean
21 Brady. I'm appearing on behalf of Clean Grid Alliance.
22 Our address is PO Box 4072, Wheaton, Illinois 60189.
23 I'm also appearing with local counsel, Judith Willis.
24 Would you like her address as well?

25 JUDGE DIPPELL: We have it on the file. So I

1 think we can skip the addresses and I can make sure the
2 court reporter has those if she needs them.

3 David and Patricia Stemme?

4 MS. STEMME: Good morning, Judge Dippell,
5 Dippell. I'm sorry. I don't know how to pronounce your
6 name.

7 JUDGE DIPPELL: Dippell.

8 MS. STEMME: This is Patricia Stemme, and I'm
9 representing myself and my husband.

10 JUDGE DIPPELL: And just to clarify, Ms.
11 Stemme, are you an attorney?

12 MS. STEMME: No, I am not. I might be the
13 only one here that isn't.

14 JUDGE DIPPELL: So today you'll really just be
15 representing yourself, but we all understand that your
16 husband's interest and yours are similar.

17 MS. STEMME: Yes, he's out harvesting, and I'm
18 probably going to be mainly a listener today. I'm going
19 to be learning.

20 JUDGE DIPPELL: That's perfectly fine.
21 Welcome.

22 MS. STEMME: Thank you so much.

23 JUDGE DIPPELL: Dustin Hudson?

24 MR. AGATHEN: Thank you, Your Honor. This is
25 Paul Agathen. I'm at 485 Oak Field Court in Washington,

1 Missouri 63090. And Judge, I represent a number of
2 other clients. Do you want me to list them now or take
3 them in the order you've got them?

4 JUDGE DIPPELL: Go ahead and list your other
5 clients.

6 MR. AGATHEN: Missouri Landowners Alliance.
7 The second one is Eastern Missouri Landowners Alliance,
8 d/b/a Show Me Concerned Landowners. Another one is
9 Norman Fishel, F-i-s-h-e-l, and last, Gary and Carol
10 Riedel, R-i-e-d-e-l.

11 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, Mr. Agathen.

12 MR. AGATHEN: You're welcome.

13 JUDGE DIPPELL: Missouri Cattlemen's
14 Association?

15 MR. HADEN: Good morning, Judge Dippell. This
16 is Brent Haden here for the Missouri Cattlemen's
17 Association, and then I've got the other agricultural
18 associations. I can just sort through those if you'd
19 like me to.

20 JUDGE DIPPELL: Yes, go ahead.

21 MR. HADEN: I'll be representing the Missouri
22 Farm Bureau Federation, the Missouri Pork Association,
23 Missouri Corn Growers Association and the Missouri
24 Soybean Association.

25 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Missouri Electric

1 Commission?

2 MS. WHIPPLE: Good morning, Judge Dippell.
3 Peggy Whipple and Doug Healy of the Healy Law Offices.
4 I believe our address is on record, but I'll be glad to
5 provide it if the court reporter needs it later.

6 JUDGE DIPPELL: I have it. Thank you.

7 MS. WHIPPLE: You're welcome.

8 JUDGE DIPPELL: Renew Missouri?

9 MS. GREENWALD: Good morning. Alissa
10 Greenwald and Andrew Linhares for Renew Missouri, and I
11 believe that our business address is also on file.

12 JUDGE DIPPELL: Yes, it is. Thank you.

13 Sierra Club?

14 MS. RUBENSTEIN: Good morning. Sarah
15 Rubenstein from Great Rivers Environmental Law Center.
16 Also with me is co-counsel Madeline Semanisin, and I
17 believe our address is on file with the Court as well.

18 JUDGE DIPPELL: It is. Thank you.

19 MS. RUBENSTEIN: Thank you.

20 JUDGE DIPPELL: Union Electric Company?

21 MR. LOWERY: Good morning, Judge. Jim Lowery
22 appearing on behalf of Union Electric Company d/b/a
23 Ameren Missouri. I have a new address. That is 9020
24 South Barry, B-a-r-r-y, Road, Columbia, Missouri 65201.

25 JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. Thank you for that.

1 You may need to change that at the Commission in our
2 electronic filing system, Mr. Lowery, when you get a
3 chance.

4 MR. LOWERY: I certainly will. Thank you.

5 JUDGE DIPPELL: William Hollander and Amy
6 Hollander?

7 MR. HOLLANDER: This is William Hollander. My
8 wife Amy and I are landowners here. We are also members
9 of the Missouri Landowners Alliance. I also am an
10 attorney, and I'm representing myself and my wife here
11 today. My address is on the entry of appearance and the
12 motion which we filed.

13 JUDGE DIPPELL: Say that again, Mr. Hollander.
14 You're also members of the Missouri Landowners Alliance?

15 MR. HOLLANDER: Yes.

16 JUDGE DIPPELL: All right. Was there any
17 other party that I might have missed?

18 Okay. Very good then. Well, to start I will
19 just kind of run through the things that are pending
20 right now to make sure that I haven't missed anything.
21 So we have a request for summary determination, and
22 those responses are not yet due. And I realize that
23 should that be granted a procedural schedule would look
24 very different. But when you're making your procedural
25 schedule, just go with the theory that that will be

1 denied and see what you can come up with.

2 As the attorneys know, it's very difficult to
3 get a summary determination if there's any controversy
4 there that the Commission can hear. So just proceed
5 with the thought that that will be denied. And if it is
6 granted, then obviously that will change the procedural
7 schedule or eliminate it, whichever the case may be.

8 There's also a request for local public
9 hearings. So consider that in your proposed procedural
10 schedule. And if the requesters for the local public
11 hearings, or the applicant, or anyone has suggestions
12 for a place that might be conducive to local public
13 hearings or if you want to have them electronically,
14 please also include that information maybe in your
15 proposed procedural schedule or an additional filing
16 after to accompany that.

17 MR. AGATHEN: Judge, can I interrupt for one
18 moment. This is Paul Agathen.

19 JUDGE DIPPELL: Yes. Go ahead, Mr. Agathen.

20 MR. AGATHEN: I may have jumped the gun with
21 that motion for public hearings. I for some reason just
22 assumed that the discussion today regarding procedural
23 schedule would concern the procedural schedule for the
24 actual formal hearings with the briefing, et cetera, and
25 didn't realize that we had this opportunity at this

1 point to suggest local public hearings. So I probably
2 jumped the gun on that. I apologize. It certainly was
3 not meant to gain some kind of advantage by any means.

4 JUDGE DIPPELL: I appreciate that. Yes, your
5 procedural schedule and the rest can encompass pretty
6 much, you know, how the parties think that the rest of
7 the case should go. Obviously it's all suggestive and
8 the Commission will set the eventual final schedule, but
9 it's very helpful to know where the parties think the
10 case should go and the timing. I know that the original
11 application requested a certain final date I believe in
12 May; am I correct about that? Does Grain Belt, when was
13 the requested decision date?

14 MR. SCHULTE: The requested decision date for
15 the final order from the Commission?

16 JUDGE DIPPELL: Yes.

17 MR. SCHULTE: That was originally requested as
18 May 31, 2023. We have since been in discussions. We
19 discussed whether that was practical with Staff already
20 and understand that they have some work that they need
21 to balance with the Ameren rate case, and so we have
22 circulated a proposed procedural schedule that has a
23 requested Commission order date of June 30, 2023. So
24 we've already conceded a 30-day delay in that initial
25 request.

1 JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. I'm sorry. Can you
2 identify yourself for the court reporter?

3 MR. SCHULTE: Certainly. Sorry about that.
4 Andrew Schulte.

5 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, Mr. Schulte. All
6 right. Well, hopefully then there's been some
7 groundwork laid already on procedural schedules and that
8 should make things go a little easier for all of your
9 discussions. Along that line typically when these kind
10 of cases, an application case starts, I would order the
11 Staff to file a recommendation. I don't believe I did
12 that in this case. So Mr. Thompson, do you see Staff
13 filing a recommendation or would you see that as being
14 just initial testimony? I don't know. Should the
15 Commission order Staff to go ahead and file a
16 recommendation?

17 MR. THOMPSON: I anticipate Staff will file a
18 recommended procedural schedule.

19 JUDGE DIPPELL: I'm talking about a
20 recommendation on the application itself.

21 MR. THOMPSON: We'll be happy to do that,
22 Judge, if that's what you would like.

23 JUDGE DIPPELL: Well, I'll look at that
24 further. Like I say, typically I would have ordered
25 that originally, but I was looking at the order and

1 realized I hadn't done that. So I'm not sure if that's
2 necessary. Maybe I'll wait and maybe you can consider
3 that in your procedural schedule as well.

4 MR. THOMPSON: When would the proposed
5 procedural schedules be due, Judge?

6 JUDGE DIPPELL: I think I said the 17th, a
7 week from today.

8 MR. THOMPSON: Very good.

9 JUDGE DIPPELL: Is that sufficient?

10 MR. THOMPSON: Thank you. That's sufficient
11 for Staff.

12 JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. And then the only other
13 thing I had that was still pending, I think there was
14 still a motion to amend a filing errata. I'm not sure
15 if I ever granted that or not. If not, I will look at
16 that.

17 Was there any other motions pending that I
18 might have missed? I'm not hearing anything. Well,
19 like I say, I really brought you all together so that
20 you could discuss the procedures going forward, and I
21 will give you the opportunity to do that off the record
22 if you want to hold this line and continue with this
23 conference.

24 Is there anything else that the parties wanted
25 to discuss on the record?

1 MR. SCHULTE: Nothing from Grain Belt Express.

2 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. All right. Well,
3 I'm not hearing anything. So we will go ahead then and
4 I will drop off the call as well as Ms. Bentch when we
5 go off the record and you all can stay on this line and
6 have your discussions.

7 MR. THOMPSON: Thank you, Judge.

8 JUDGE DIPPELL: If there's nothing else then,
9 we can go ahead and go off the record.

10 MR. AGATHEN: Thank you, Judge. Paul Agathen.

11 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you.

12 (Thereupon, the proceedings concluded at 9:20
13 a.m.)
