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Item #7 - Summary of Reasons for the Proposed Changes

The capital investments are part of an ongoing program to upgrade, expand, and/or replace aging infrastructure and to relocate or replace underground water mains related to highway or other road improvements. The higher operating costs are associated with operating and maintaining existing water and sewer facilities. These capital and operating increases are necessary in order to maintain system reliability, to keep the water and sewer systems current with environmental and safety standards, and to continue to meet the needs of customers.
