MISSOURI AMERICAN WATER REQUESTS NEW RATES FOR 2009

*Significant Infrastructure Investment Drives Request for Increase
in Local Water Rates.*

Brunswick, Mo. - (March 31, 2008) Today, Missouri American Water filed a rate request with the Missouri Public Service Commission (PSC) that would change rates for water service in all of the company's operating districts. The Company will have invested more than \$149.7 million in water system improvements across the state from June 2007 to September 2008. Missouri American Water's ongoing infrastructure investments, plus increases in operating costs, are the drivers behind the rate request.

In Brunswick, Missouri American Water will have invested approximately \$395,500 in water system improvements from June 2007 to September 2008. This investment includes upgrading well and water treatment plant equipment and replacing water lines along Mulberry and South Small Streets. These improvements maintain water service reliability and quality. Missouri American Water, like many other businesses, has also experienced increased costs for fuel, chemicals, labor and insurance.

No rates will change until the PSC completes a comprehensive audit of the request. The process normally takes about 11 months and includes opportunities for public input.

In Brunswick, the average residential customer's bill (for 3,500 gallons of water per month) will increase by approximately \$10.43 per month, or \$0.34 per day, if the 31.15 percent rate increase is approved in full. The average Brunswick residential customer would pay approximately \$43.91 per month for water service if the request is fully approved.

Customers will be receiving a gallon of water delivered to their homes for about a penny per gallon.

Jefferson City, Mo. - (March 31, 2008) Today, Missouri American Water filed a rate request with the Missouri Public Service Commission (PSC) that would change rates for water service in all of the company's operating districts. The Company will have invested more than \$149.7 million in water system improvements across the state from June 2007 to September 2008. Missouri American Water's ongoing infrastructure investments, plus increases in operating costs, are the drivers behind the rate request.

In Jefferson City, Missouri American Water will have invested approximately \$2.7 million in water system improvements from June 2007 to September 2008. The investment includes filter improvements to maintain water quality, new power generation capability to sustain service during electrical outages and replacing and enlarging waterlines along Bolton and Riverside Drives. Missouri American Water, like many other businesses, has also experienced increased costs for fuel, chemicals, labor and insurance.

No rates will change until the PSC completes a comprehensive audit of the request. The process normally takes about 11 months and includes opportunities for public input.

In Jefferson City, the average residential customer's bill (for 5,000 gallons of water per month) will increase by approximately \$5.83 per month, or \$0.19 per day, if the 21.15 percent rate increase is approved in full. The average Jefferson City residential customer would pay approximately \$33.40 per month for water service if the request is fully approved.

Customers will be receiving a gallon of water delivered to their homes for less than a penny per gallon.

Cedar Hill, Mo. - (March 31, 2008) Today, Missouri American Water filed a rate request with the Missouri Public Service Commission (PSC) that would change rates for water and wastewater service in all of the company's operating districts. The company will have invested more than \$149.7 million in water system improvements across the state from June 2007 to September 2008. Missouri American Water's ongoing infrastructure investments, plus increases in operating costs, are the drivers behind the rate request.

In Cedar Hill, Missouri American Water will have invested approximately \$20,600 in wastewater system improvements from June 2007 to September 2008. These investments are designed to improve reliability and environmental performance. Missouri American Water, like many other businesses, has also experienced increased costs for fuel, chemicals, labor and insurance.

No rates will change until the PSC completes a comprehensive audit of the request. The process normally takes about 11 months and includes opportunities for public input.

In Cedar Hill, the average residential customer's wastewater bill will increase by approximately \$6.84 per month, or \$0.22 per day, if the 29.08 percent rate increase is approved in full. The average Cedar Hill residential customer would pay approximately \$30.36 per month for wastewater service if the increase is fully approved.

"If the total increase is approved, wastewater service will remain one of the best values residents of Cedar Hill receive every month when they pay utility bills," said Cedar Hill Operations Superintendent Randy Smith. "This increase reflects our ongoing investment to ensure Cedar Hill customers continue to receive quality, reliable wastewater service."

Item #7 - Summary of Reasons for the Proposed Changes

The proposed changes represent a general rate increase request. The need for an increase in rates is primarily caused by the Company's increasing capital and operating expenditures. The rate request is based upon the Company's need to continue to invest in capital improvements and to recover higher operating costs at its existing water and sewer facilities. The capital investments are part of an ongoing program to upgrade, expand, and/or replace aging infrastructure and to relocate or replace underground water mains related to highway or other road improvements. The higher operating costs are associated with operating and maintaining existing water and sewer facilities. These capital and operating increases are necessary in order to maintain system reliability, to keep the water and sewer systems current with environmental and safety standards, and to continue to meet the needs of customers.
