E0-2022-0027 and ER-2022-0026, In the Matter of the True-Up of Union Electric Company d/b/a Ameren Missouri's Fuel Adjustment Clause for the 34th Recovery Period and In the Matter of the Adjustment of Union Electric Company d/b/a Ameren Missouri's Fuel Adjustment Clause for the 37th Accumulation Period.

I want to make sure, because these cases have such a short time frame, a 60-day timeline for the Commission and they've already been delayed, I wanted to make sure that I understood what was going to be needed from the Commission.

And mainly I called you all here on kind of last minute. First, I guess I'll let you go ahead and make entries of appearance, I'm sorry, because not all

               MR. POSTON: No, we do not have any issues.

    We're not going to oppose it. So yeah, we're fine with

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               JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. That's good to hear.
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Okay. Well, in that case, I set a shortened deadline for responses. And if those responses don't come in, then I would expect to see an order on next week's agenda regarding the Stipulation and Agreement. My reason for shortening those times, and so forth, like I say, was so that the Commission's order could have at least a 10-day effective date.

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So that just leaves the issue of the tariffs, because there were basically substitute tariff sheets attached to the stipulation but those have not been filed as substitute tariffs. And at some point in order for the substitute to become effective instead of what has previously been filed, I'm going to need Ameren to file those as a substitute.

MR. LOWERY: Judge, this is Jim Lowery. My thought was on the assumption that, and I appreciate Mr. Poston indicating today that OPC is not going to object, my assumption was that the Commission, I don't see why they wouldn't approve the stipulation but obviously they have to make that decision. Upon them doing that, we would submit it's just one tariff sheet. We'd submit that tariff sheet as a substitute. Literally we can do it almost momentarily after its completion -- I mean, the Commission also could -- We could file the tariff sheet and they could let it take

effect by operation of law, too. They don't have --1 2 THE COURT REPORTER: Mr. Lowery, you're 3 cutting out. JUDGE DIPPELL: You're cutting out a little 4 5 bit, Mr. Lowery. 6 MR.
