## ORDER GRANTING APPLICATION TO DISCONTINUE SOLAR REBATES AND ORDER GRANTING WAIVER

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Issue Date: April 20, 2023

Effective Date: May 20, 2023

On December 13, 2022, The Empire District Electric Company d/b/a Liberty, filed a Solar Rebate Tariff Application (application). Liberty states that Missouri law provides that electrical corporations with 200,000 or fewer customers shall not be obligated to pay solar rebates exceeding an aggregate amount of \$7,000,000 for the calendar years of 2019 to 2023.<sup>1</sup> Liberty states it has fewer than 200,000 customers, and that it has exceeded the \$7,000,000 threshold of paid solar rebates. Liberty further asks for a waiver of the Commission's 60-day notice rule.<sup>2</sup>

The Commission's Staff filed its Recommendation on March 29, 2023. Staff states that Liberty has fewer than 200,000 customers, and has met the \$7,000,000 requirement. Thus, Liberty is no longer obligated to pay solar rebates.

Staff also recommends that the Commission order Liberty to file compliance tariffs, and to further address its loss of solar renewable energy credits (SRECs) in its upcoming

2022 Renewable Energy Standard (RES) filing. Finally, Staff asks that the Commission specify that this order does not make any ratemaking determination. No party has responded to Staff's Recommendation.

The Commission finds that Liberty is entitled to the relief it seeks in its application. Thus, the Commission will grant the application. The Commission will also waive its 60-day notice rule.

Liberty declared in its application, that it had no communication with the "Office of the Commission (as defined in Commission Rule 20 CSR 4240-4.015(10)) within the prior 150 days regarding any substantive issue likely to be in this case."<sup>3</sup> Therefore, for good cause shown, the Commission will waive its 60-day notice rule.

## THE COMMISSION ORDERS THAT:

1. The application is granted.

2. Liberty shall file compliance tariffs to implement the discontinuation of solar rebates.

3. Commission Rule 20 CSR 4240-4.017(1) is waived for this application.

4. Liberty shall further address this loss of solar renewable energy credits (SRECs) in its upcoming 2022 Renewable Energy Standard (RES) filing.

5. The Commission makes no finding that would preclude the Commission from considering the ratemaking treatment to be afforded any matters pertaining to granting this application.

6. This order shall be effective on May 20, 2023.
