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Page 4 The following proceedings began at 12:25 p.m.: JUDGE HATCHER: Let's go ahead and I will 2 3 bring our hearing to order. Let's go on the record. Today is August 28, 2024, and the Missouri Public Service Commission has set this time for a local public 6 hearing to give members of the public a chance to comment about Liberty's general rate increase 8 application. That is File No. GR-2024-0106. 9 The Commission regulates the rates charged by 10 public utility companies to ensure that those rates are 11 just and reasonable. The Commission also regulates the quality of service and safety of the operations of 12 13 public utilities. There are five Commissioners. They are 14 15 appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate. The Commissioners employ a staff of engineers, 16 17 accountants, attorneys, financial analysts and other 18 specialists in the field of utility regulation. My name is Charles Hatcher, and I am the 19 20 Regulatory Law Judge that will preside over this 21 hearing. With me today are Chair Kayla Hahn, 22 Commissioner Maida Coleman, Commissioner John Mitchell, 23 and we have on WebEx Commissioner Jason Holsman, and I 24 expect any minute to be joined also by Commissioner Glen Kolkmever. 25 The Commissioners have not made any decisions 1 2 in this case, and therefore they cannot answer any questions that you might have as they need to remain 3 impartial until the introduction of all of the evidence 5 in the case. 6 We'll go ahead and start with entries of 7 appearance by the parties. First for Liberty. 8 MS. GRUBBS: Good afternoon. Jermaine Grubbs 9 appearing on behalf of Liberty Utilities (Midstates 10 Natural Gas) Corp. d/b/a Liberty. I'm the Director of 11 Legal Services for the Central Region of Liberty, and my business address is 602 South Joplin Avenue in Joplin, 12 13 Missouri. Zip code is 64801. Thank you. 14 JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, Ms. Grubbs. For 15 the Commission Staff. MS. KERR: Thank you. My name is Carolyn 16 Kerr, attorney for Staff, and the address is 200 Madison 17 18 Street, Jefferson City, Missouri 65102. JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, Ms. Kerr. And for 19 20 the Office of the Public Counsel. MS. MARTIN: This is Anna Martin appearing on 21 behalf of the Office of the Public Counsel. 22 23 JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, Ms. Martin. The rocess for this hearing will be to call the names on 24



the sign-up sheet in the order that they appear.

1	call your name, please go ahead and come forward. I'll
2	ask you to raise your hand and I'll place you under oath
3	and ask you to state and spell your name, and then I'll
4	ask you to go ahead and offer your comments to the
5	Commission.
6	After we're done with the witnesses that have
7	signed up, I will open up the floor for anyone else that
8	has decided that they would like to testify and make
9	sure that everyone has that opportunity. But to start,
10	I'll start with James Western.
11	Thank you, Mr. Western. If you would state
12	and spell your name for the record, please.
13	MR. WESTERN: James Dean Western.
14	JUDGE HATCHER: Can you spell your last name,
15	please?
16	MR. WESTERN: Pardon?
17	JUDGE HATCHER: Can you spell your last name
18	for the record, please?
19	MR. WESTERN: I can't hear very good. The
20	acoustics in here are terrible. Just like the
21	direction, W-e-s-t-e-r-n.
22	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, sir. I appreciate
23	it. Let me swear you in first. Please raise your right
24	hand. Do you solemnly swear or affirm that the

L	MR.	WESTERN:	Yes
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JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you. Please go ahead.

JAMES DEAN WESTERN,

having been first duly sworn, testified as follows:

MR. WESTERN: As I mentioned earlier, when we got the notice from Liberty that they were going to increase our gas prices, and sure enough comes December, cold month, they increased them. Mine went up 300 percent. Now, 300 percent, like I said earlier, I can't believe the Energy Commission would even allow an increase like that.

He says they didn't get a penny of that. But I don't know where it went. I mean, everything else has gone up too but not 300 percent. The same thing with just the other day when I was looking at their notice, unless I misread it, I thought they said they were wanting to raise it here 15 percent. And 15 percent, now it's saying it's 20.6 percent. Maybe I misread it. I'm not sure. But to me an increase of 320 percent over two years, it just -- it's outlandish. How could the Energy Commission even allow that. It just doesn't make sense to me.

Other people I talk to, some of them their bills went up from \$160 to 560. One gal went up 600 and some dollars. Mine was averaging around 160 and it went



- up to \$465. To me that's ridiculous. If you were to

  buy a new house, you found just what you wanted, they

  said well, the mortgage rate is \$1,500. That's not

  outlandish for a real nice place. And then couple years

  later they send you a notice saying the price has gone

  up, now you need to pay \$4,750, what would you think, on
- a mortgage rate for a month? But that's what I have to say right now. Thank you.
- JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, Mr. Western. Are there any questions from the Commissioners? Thank you, sir.
- The next witness we have is Susan Limestall.

  Thank you, ma'am. If you would please state and spell

  your name for the court reporter.
- MS. LIMESTALL: Susan, S-u-s-a-n, Limestall, L-i-m-e-s-t-a-l-l.
- JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you. And would you
  raise your right hand. Do you solemnly swear or affirm
  that the testimony you are about to give will be the
  truth?

- JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you. Please go ahead with your comments.

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having been first duly sworn, testified as follows:

MS. LIMESTALL: I was surprised to learn during the Q&A part that there's been no great increase since 2018, when I've been watching my bills go up even though my usage is going down. So it's not the variable purchased price increase. It's all these other things that get added in. So if we're going to add an average of \$15 a month to my bill, which is what their full increase will do, that's a 20 percent increase, you know, for the past year.

So I do track my usage from July to June. So for the last three years, you know, my monthly costs, this is the average, back in '21-22, it was \$67. Then it went up an astronomical amount like Mr. Western just talked about. I was \$106 a month on average even though my usage was less. My usage has been less again for this past 12 months, and yet still my monthly cost is up to \$77 a month.

So costs are going up whether they get an increase or not. I just hope that the Commission will take that into consideration is that 20 percent increase for the average bill is just too much.

JUDGE HATCHER: Ms. Limestall, is there anything else that you'd like to say?

MS. LIMESTALL: No.
