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JUDGE HATCHER: Let's go on the record.

I see that we have our trusty court reporter in attendance. We'll start this hearing. First I would ask that everyone please mute themselves unless they are speaking. That will cut down on any background noise and prevent any audio feedback.

Today is August 29th, 2024. The Missouri Public Service Commission has set this time for a local public hearing to give members of the public a chance to comment about Liberty's General Rate Increase application. And that is File No. GR-2024-0106.

The Commission regulates the rates charged by public utility companies in Missouri to ensure that those rates are just and reasonable. The Commission also regulates the quality of service and safety of the operations of public utilities.

There are five commissioners. They are appointed by the governor and confirmed by the senate. The Commission itself also employs a staff of engineers, accountants, attorneys, financial analysts, and other specialists in the field of utility regulation.

My name is Charles Hatcher and I'm the



regulatory law judge that will preside over this

hearing. Online with me today are Chair Kayla Hahn,

Commissioner Maida Coleman, Commissioner Glen

Kolkmeyer, and Commissioner John Mitchell.

The commissioners have not made any

The commissioners have not made any decisions in this case and, therefore, they cannot answer any questions that you might have today as they have to remain impartial until after all of the evidence is presented.

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Are there any opening remarks from the commissioners before we begin?

Okay. We'll move on to our entries of appearance by the parties. For Liberty, please go ahead. If that's Ms. Grubbs, you're hard to hear again. And a reminder, if you've called in, it is Star 6 to unmute yourself.

MS. GRUBBS: Good evening. This is

2	Mr. Matz, if you would speak up and

4	MR. MATZ: I'm happy to speak up. My
5	name is Robert Matz, R-o-b-e-r-t M-a-t-z.
6	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, sir. And if
7	you'll please raise your right hand.
8	(Witness sworn.)
9	ROBERT MATZ
10	having been first duly sworn, testified
11	as follows:
12	JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, sir. Please
13	go ahead and give us your comments.
14	MR. MATZ: Thank you. I appreciate the
15	opportunity to address the commissioners, the judge,
16	the OPC, the PSC, and all that are gathered here
17	about the proposed rate increase by Liberty
18	Utilities.
19	I serve as president of Hannibal-LaGrange
20	University in Hannibal, Missouri. We were first
21	informed of the rate increase by Liberty Utilities on
22	February 9th via an email that was sent directly to
23	myself. After dialoguing with folks from Liberty
24	Utilities, I was informed there would be a public

hearing and that I would be informed of that date via

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the same correspondence as has taken place. I did
not receive that correspondence and unfortunately as
a result was not able to attend the in-person hearing
here in town. But as was shared a minute ago, that
the purpose of these hearings is to determine if this
rate increase is just and reasonable. And while I
can fully understand the position of Liberty
Utilities and a desire to rate rates, I would propose
to the Commission that this rate increase at the
level that is proposed is not just and reasonable.

And I would propose this to the

Commission for three reasons: First, a Wall Street

Journal article seven days after the rate increase

was first announced reads as follows: Natural gas

hasn't been this cheap in decades. Adjusted for

inflation, natural gas futures recently hit their

cheapest price since trading began on the New York

Mercantile Exchange in 1990. This is good news for

American consumers who can look forward to lower

utility bills.

Again, this is an article from the Wall Street Journal that was published on February the 16 of this year, seven days after the rate increase was announced.

In addition to that one when one goes and



checks the New York Mercantile Exchange, while there has been a slight increase, the rate today I still believe is below \$2 per million British thermal units or BTUs. This is a significant rate increase to be proposed when rates were actually higher last time rate increases took place.

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So the first reason I would propose to you that these are not just and reasonable rate increases at the level that is proposed is that natural gas, according to the Wall Street Journal, is at its lowest level pretty much ever.

Second reason I would propose that this rate increase is not just or reasonable is it neglects the gains and efficiency that Liberty notes in its own press release about the rate increase. Specifically, they note that they've moved to a system of automated meter readings, that they've updated their aging infrastructure, and that many of these costs that have been there, improving their customer experience, many of these things should result in decreased personnel costs for them as well as a stronger infrastructure.

Their current rate -- rate was sufficient to allow them to do this and so for that reason as well it would seem that a rate increase on the level



of 20 percent as was reported in the Courier Post here in Hannibal yesterday here in -- as is being proposed, seems quite extreme given those circumstances.

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Third I will hype the particular impact that this rate increase will have in the northeast region of the state, most particularly Hannibal. At this time here in the Hannibal area, our school board has recently voted to raise or to increase the property tax assessment on all of us here in this region by nearly half a percent. In addition to that, the Hannibal Board of Public Works has recently announced rate increases of both electric at a very high level as well as even water at about a 3 percent level.

While I see the desire from Liberty
Utilities noting their desire to help low-income
customers, and that is to be commended, for small
businesses, nonprofits such as Hannibal-LaGrange,
this is an unusually burdensome increase, especially
when combined with other factors.

For these three reasons, that the rate increase is not based on market forces, that it neglects the gains and efficiency that Liberty themselves are self-reporting, and because of the



particularly hard impact this will have on small businesses and nonprofits that are vital to the health of this community, I would propose that this is not a just and reasonable rate increase. Thank you.

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JUDGE HATCHER: Thank you, Mr. Matz. Are there any questions from the commissioners for Mr. Matz? All right. Thank you again, Mr. Matz, for testifying.

Is there anyone else who would like to offer their comments to the commissioners tonight. That sometimes happens. It can be a little intimidating to -- even on Webex to offer up comments to the Public Service Commission or to any public So what I'll do is I'll ask one more time, but before I do that I'll go ahead and give the instructions on how to leave written comments. you know somebody who couldn't be here tonight or if you would just prefer to offer your comments in writing, you can go to the PSC's web page. PSC.MO.gov. And in the upper right-hand corner there's a link that says Submit Comments, and you can submit your comments. Just make sure to include the case number, and once again that is GR-2024-0106. And I'll ask again if there's anyone in attendance
